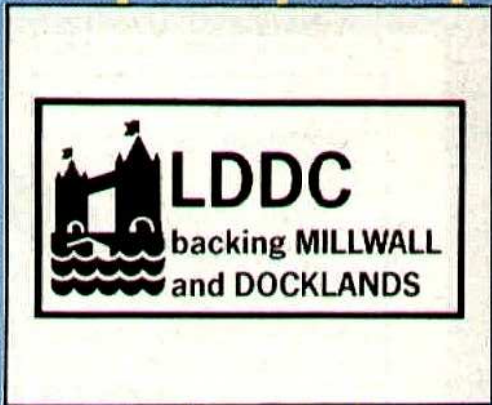

# GEORGE GRAHAM

Good afternoon and welcome to the Den for a match which we hope will put us in the hat for the third round F.A. Cup draw to be made at half past five this evening. Swindon Town of course hope for the same thing, and the reports I've had of them suggest they'll prove difficult opponents.

As I've stressed to the players all week, the fact that they are in the Fourth Division doesn't mean we can afford to treat them less seriously than any other club we've played this season. It would be terrible if complacency prevented us making the most of home advantage, which as our record shows, should be a real benefit to us.

Interestingly, Swindon's record is almost identical to ours, both at home and away, so we're certainly pleased to have come out of the hat first and have to make the most of it.

Our away form, in fact, has been slowly improving. The 1-1 draw at Walsall last week to continue our unbeaten run was deserved reward for a positive second-half performance after having gone a goal behind. Steve Burke was close to giving us that elusive first away win after Steve Lovell's equaliser.

Walsall had received a lot of publicity after that sensational Milk Cup tie at Highbury, which is the sort of thing that can sometimes work against you when you get back down to the bread-and-butter Third Division stuff.

Our satisfaction with the result was marred slightly by the sending-off of Andy Massey. He'd been booked for a foul in the first-half and was then dismissed after catching a Walsall player with a tackle just as the ball was flicked away. Three other players were booked, yet the match was played in an excellent spirit by both teams.

Several times this season I've bitten my tongue rather than criticise individual referees — knowing that refs, unlike the rest of us, are supposed to be above public criticism. But it has to be said that the general standard is causing great concern among people in the game. The managers of Spurs and Queens Park Rangers recently spoke out on the same topic after their match at White Hart Lane, and referee Clive Thomas has suggested that there us an urgent need to get together and dis-



cuss the problems. Top of my agenda would certainly be the number of bookings being handed out willy-nilly, especially in the lower divisions, where for some reason the officials seem much less tolerant.

One effect is that at the end of the season it will almost certainly be the smaller clubs again who face FA fines which they can't afford, for having poor disciplinary records.

I'll return to this same theme when setting out my hopes for the New Year in the Bristol Rovers programme on Friday December 30th. A reminder that that is our second attractive home fixture over the holiday period: we also look forward to a good gate for the local derby against Orient on Boxing Day morning.

And let's hope that by then we have a third round F.A. Cup tie to look forward to as well! As ever, your encouragement is vital to help us take an important step for the club this afternoon.

# TODAYS VISITORS ARE SWINDON TOWN



This afternoon we afford a very warm welcome to The Den to Swindon Town Football Club. Our opponents from the Fourth Division come here for a second round FA Cup clash which promises to be one of the best matches of the day. In the first round Swindon crushed their opponents.

Last season Swindon beat non-league Wealdstone 2-0 in the first round at the County Ground, knocked out Brentford 3-1 in a second round replay after a 2-2 draw in the first match and beat Aldershot 7-0 in a third round game. They eventually went out of the competition 3-1 at Burnley in round four but showed that they are bonny Cup fighters.

Swindon finished eighth in the Fourth Division last season and they are currently a place lower — ninth — this season with just one victory in their nine away games.

During the close season Swindon sold their 20-goal striker Paul Rideout to Aston Villa to bring in some much needed cash which is a lifeline to clubs in the lower divisions.



KEN BEAMISH

Manager of the Wiltshire club is their former player Ken Beamish who took over in April on a caretaker basis. He was given the job permanently during the summer and has signed a number of players of his own choosing. Ken Beamish started and finished his playing career at Tranmere and also played for Brighton, Blackburn, Port Vale and Bury.

Goalkeeper Jimmy Allan is Swindon's longest serving player having joined the club from Scottish Junior football in 1970. He has made more than 370 League appearances for Swindon since he made his debut against Queens Park Rangers in 1971.

Allan has been out of the team recently his place going to Lewisham born Scott Endersby. A former Ipswich apprentice

he spent two seasons at Tranmere before moving to Swindon in May. Defender Kevin Baddeley although born in Swindon served his apprenticeship with Bristol City and made one League appearance for them.

Then he moved to Swindon and quickly established himself in the team. He can play in either full back position. His full back partner is Colin Bailie who made his debut in 1982 and had made 27 League appearances up to the end of last season.

Leigh Barnard in midfield served his apprenticeship with Portsmouth and made 79 League appearances for them.

He moved to Swindon in June 1982 and was an ever-present in the side last season.

Midfield player Gary Emmanuel gained First Division experience with Birmingham City and then moved to Bristol Rovers before his transfer to Swindon in 1981.

Defender Mike Graham began his career with Bolton Wanderers and moved to Swindon from the Lancashire club in July 1981.

Striker Dave Hockaday's only previous club was Blackpool and he made more than 140 appearances for them before joining the Wiltshire club in the close season.

Alan Mayes is now in his second spell at the County Ground after playing for QPR, Watford, Northampton and Chelsea.

Alan rejoined Swindon in July and is a prolific goalscorer. Another new signing this season is Gary Nelson who joined Southend from school and made a century of appearances for them.

Midfield star Paul Richardson joined Swindon in July as player/coach.

He was an apprentice at Nottingham Forest making his league debut for them in May 1968.

In all he played more than 220 League games for them before a move to Chester in 1976. He then moved to Stoke City and played in their promotion winning team in 1978-79. His next move was to Sheffield United and from there he made his journey to Swindon. Andy Rowland has been a consistent goalscorer with a number of clubs and previously played for Derby and Bury before joining Swindon in 1978.

# PLAYER PROFILE

## DAVE CUSACK

Defender Dave Cusack, who is one of the most experienced players in the Third Division, certainly has reason to remember the goals he has scored for Millwall.

On his debut for The Lions in March he had the misfortune to put the ball into his own net against Sheffield United.

But Dave turned out the hero a couple of months later when his penalty goal gave the club victory at Chesterfield to ensure that they avoided relegation and stayed in the Third Division.

Dave has also scored once this season in the cup match with Dartford.

Sheffield born, Dave played for Rotherham District Boys team and Sheffield United as a schoolboy. But the team across town, Sheffield Wednesday were the side he supported so he jumped at the chance of joining them as an apprentice professional.

Dave made over 100 League and Cup appearances at Hillsborough and played under a number of managers there before moving to Southend United in September, 1978 for £55,000.

Whilst at Roots Hall Dave played more than 200 matches before joining Millwall with his Southend team mate Anton Otulakowski.

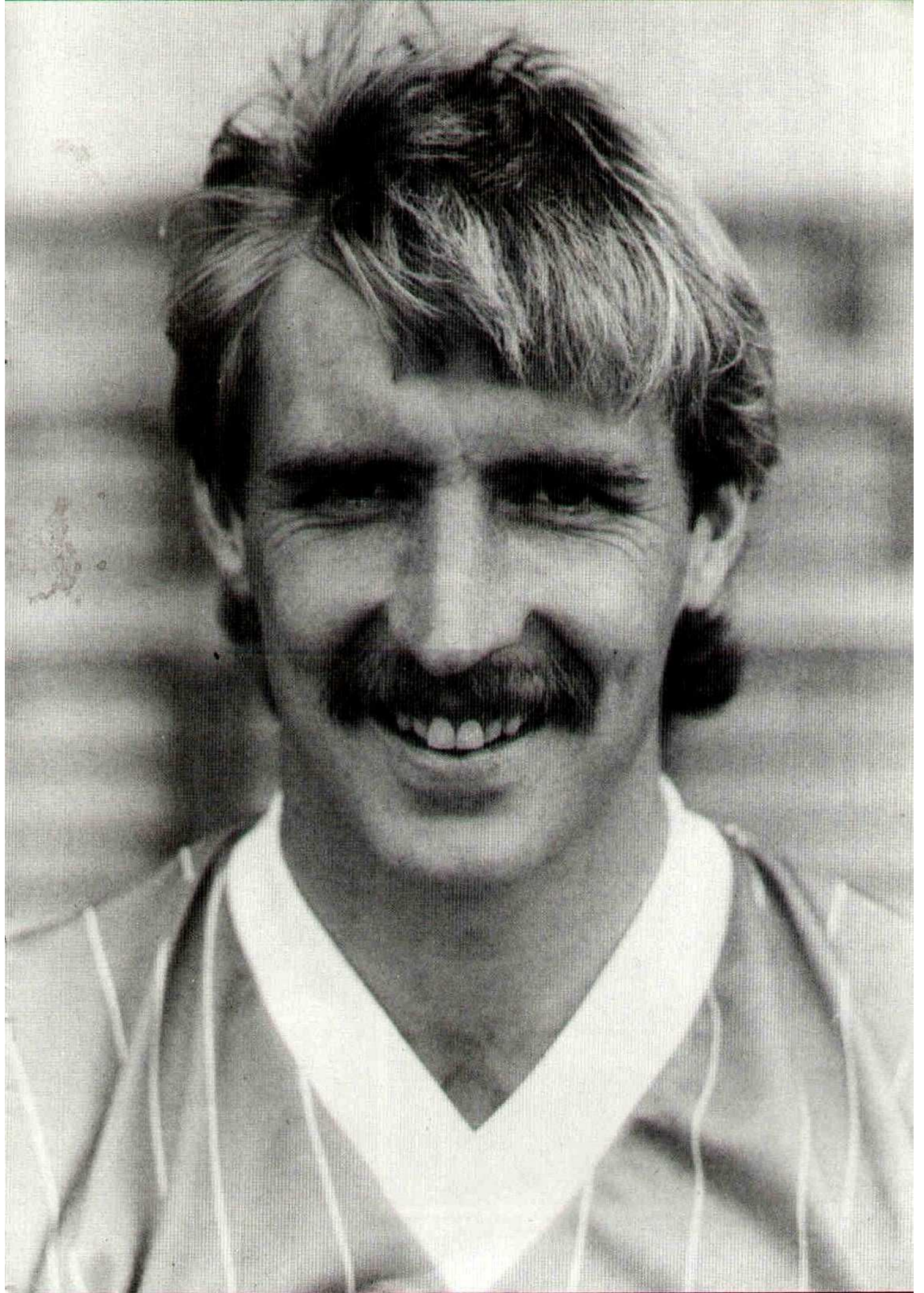
The two men live just a short distance from each other at Thorpe Bay near their former club.

Dave and his wife Diane have a daughter Lucy-Ann who will be four in January and they are expecting an addition to the Cusack household in February.



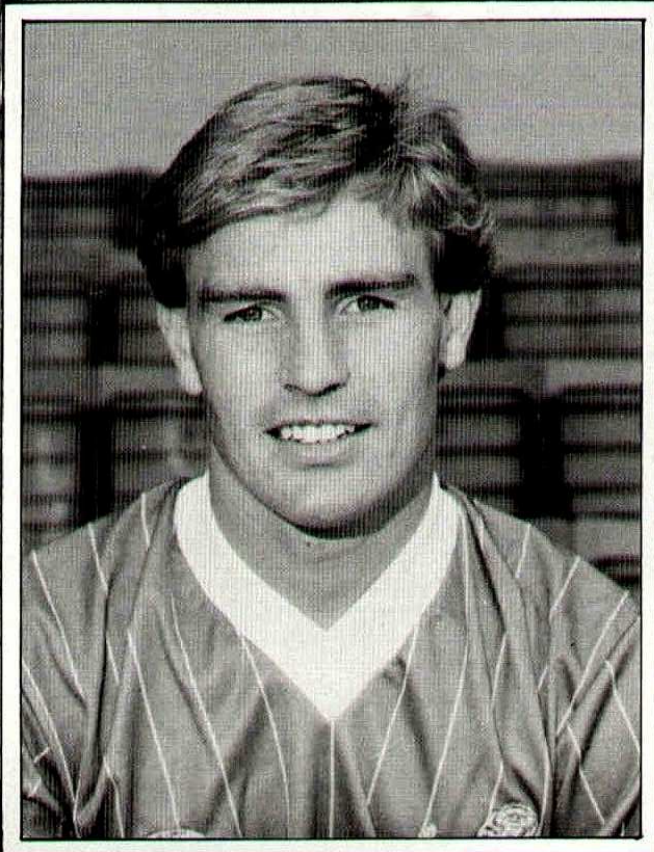
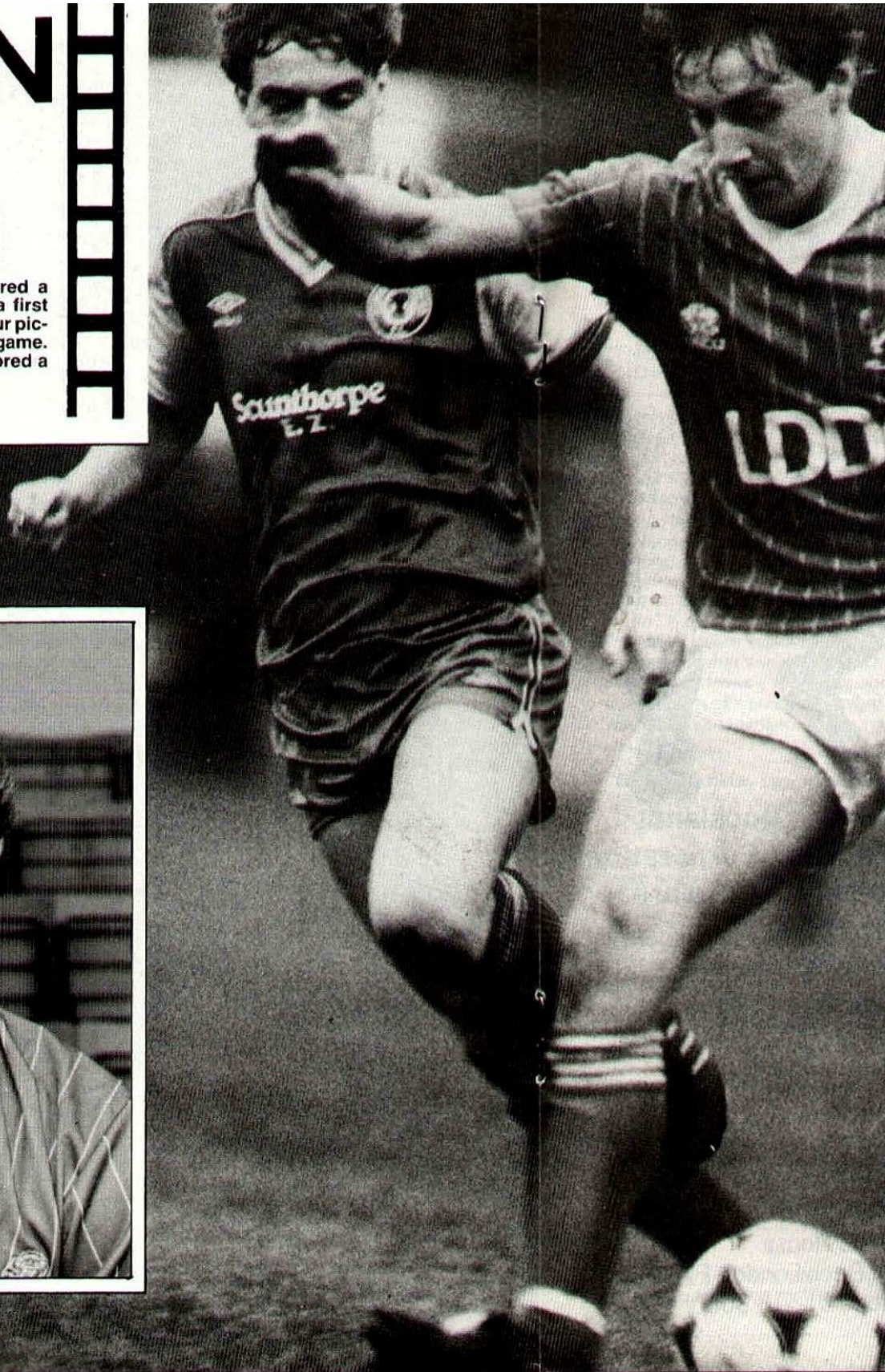




# ACTION AT THE DEN

## ***The Things They Say***

*Some points from the papers that you may have missed — on the problems of Arsenal, Derby and Charlton... and other topics*

"Is any job worth holding down if the price is to run a weekly gauntlet of hate? As the next worrying weeks unfold, only Terry Neill will know the answer to that question. All I know is that if sports writing involves witnessing the sickening scenes I saw outside the famous old stadium on Saturday, then the sooner I become a gardening correspondent the better." — Peter Batt (Daily Star)

"The only remedy now, especially for Neill and Howe, is to get back to doing what they do best. Disciplined team-work rooted deep in a dedicated defence is what they do best. Organisation and method are Howe's hallmarks and within such a framework Neill's purchases might yet prosper the way Brady and Stapleton used to do." — Jeff Powell (Daily Mail)

"Charlie Nicholas says he's not worried by the big fee. But he didn't pay it." — Danny Blanchflower (Sunday Express)

"In the past few weeks stringent economies have been promised. They may be too late but the story of Derby County, caught more than most by the collapse of the transfer market and the drop in attendances, is a good example of how clubs can go desperately wrong. The honest search for stability has been unsuccessful because a succession of businessmen have all thought that they could do better than the last. All the money frittered away, and the blood splattered on the panelled walls of the boardroom, had taken its toll." — Charles Burgess (The Guardian)

"I don't think Derby will die either. Not because this is one more mismanaged football club crying wolf. Somebody, somewhere is going to acknowledge the truth that old Rams don't perish. Even when they're nearing a hundred they can still perform. All they need is a leg up." — John Sadler (The Sun)

"On a night when brass monkeys would have wanted to sit astride a radiator, even the live tele-

vising in Scotland of the first leg of Forest's UEFA Cup third-round tie with Celtic could not prevent about 12,000 of the Glasgow team's supporters from turning up noisily at the City Ground. As Clough added BBC fees to the money paid at the gate by a crowd of 32,000 he would scarcely feel like challenging the suggestion that being drawn against Celtic in a European competition is the kind of privilege that can help English First Division clubs to stay out of the hands of the bailiffs." — Hugh McIlvanney (The Observer)

"Malcolm Allison arrived at The Valley on the eve of the 38th anniversary of his joining soccer's professional ranks — when he signed as a youngster for Charlton. Later, after seeing his Middlesbrough side go down to two Kevin Smith penalties, he said of the present Charlton financial crisis which threatens their existence: 'It's terrible. I put it down to bad management in the past. Charlton should be one of the great First Division clubs, attracting at least 25,000 people each week.'" — Kevin Moseley (Daily Mirror)

"How much should gifted boys have to endure, and how much should they be prepared to sacrifice... before they need protection from themselves? Recently 16-year-old Stewart Brady received a questionnaire from the Football Association, signed by Bobby Robson... which seeks to discover the kind of work-loads which our most talented young players are undertaking. 'When I filled it all in, I added up all the games I played last season. It came to something like 112. Ridiculous isn't it?' — Patrick Collins (Mail on Sunday)

"Cup results were always a poor guide to relative strengths in the League. It was claimed over the weekend that because Wimbledon and Walsall had knocked Nottingham Forest and Arsenal out of the Milk Cup... this proved the game was leveling up. The theory would have been naive even if West Ham had not beaten Bury 10-0 and Queens Park Rangers sent eight past Crewe." — David Lacey (The Guardian)

# THIRD DIVISION SCENE

The importance of an F.A. Cup victory to the Third Division sides in today's competition will be evident around 5.15 p.m. this evening when the draw for the third round is made. The winners will go into the famous red bag with the First and Second Division clubs with the chance of a lucrative tie against the big boys.

One Third Division side Walsall who surprisingly crashed out of the F.A. Cup 4-0 at Bournemouth are keeping the flag flying in the Milk Cup with that famous victory over Arsenal at Highbury. That is the kind of giant killing other teams will be dreaming of, but first they have to win through today's games.

One of the best matches involving Third Division sides is the clash at Sincil Bank between Lincoln City and Sheffield United.

Keith Edwards the United striker who is the division's leading goalscorer with 17 hit four in the first round 5-1 win over Wrexham.

Lincoln disposed of Port Vale 2-1 in far less spectacular fashion and this match could go to a replay to get a result. Burnley who won 2-0 at non-League Hyde in the first round should be too good for Fourth Division Chesterfield.

One of the most intriguing ties is the clash of Fourth Division Reading and the Third Division leaders Oxford, who were all set to amalgamate at one stage last season.

There is also an excellent match in prospect here at The Den with Millwall taking on Fourth Division Swindon.

Another Third against Fourth clash features Scunthorpe against Bury at The Old Show Ground. West London has a confrontation all to its self with Brentford, struggling in the League taking on Wimbledon. This is a dress rehearsal for the League match on Christmas Eve.

There is also a West Country clash between high riding Bristol Rovers and their Fourth Division neighbours from the Avon, Bristol City. Bolton have home advantage against Mansfield from the Fourth managed by their former boss Ian Greaves.

Gillingham would appear to have one of the easier games with a home match against Southern League Chelmsford but Newport have a very tricky game visiting tiny Harrow Borough.

Another non-League side Barking make what looks like a fruitless trip to Plymouth and Bournemouth reviving lately under Harry Rednapp and Stuart Morgan's guidance have to visit Windsor and Eton.

A Third Division Yorkshire derby between Rotherham and Hull puts the icing on the cake — and thoughts of bigger things to come.

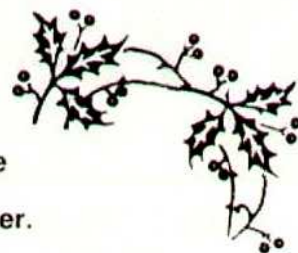
