Introducing.... The Men from Gresty Road

Crewe Alexandra have had to re-apply for re-election to the Fourth Division on seven occasions since the Fourth Division was introduced in 1958-59. The last application was last season when they finished in twenty-third position, one place above bottom club Hereford United, but only on goal difference.

That they will not have to do so this season can be attributed to the astute and shrewd management of Dario Gradi. One of the more unusual managers in the Football League in that he has never played football at League level. Dario's playing career was spent in the main with Sutton United, he did play for England at amateur level, he has had spells as coach to Chelsea, Derby County, Wimbledon and was also Youth team coach at Orient. His managerial experience before being appointed as manager of Crewe in May of last year as successor to Peter Morris was at Wimbledon where he led them to promotion in 1978-79 from the Fourth and Crystal Palace.

The first assignment that faced Dario on his appointment was to recruit virtually a new squad of players for this season, this was achieved with no money available, just a shrewd knowledge of the transfer market and knowledge of players who would blend into the framework of the playing style he wished to adopt last August.

After last seasons struggle Crewe's playing record holds comparison with most, with five wins away only Aldershot, Doncaster and York City can boast more away wins, and it was only a fortnight ago that the men from Gresty Road registered their highest score of the season in a 6-1 home win over Halifax Town. In fact the last three league matches have involved Crewe participating in seventeen goals for after the Halifax match, they lost 2-5 at York and last weekend beat Bury 2-1 in a home match with Dave Waller and a John Crabbe penalty turning a 1-0 half time deficit into victory.

At home Crewe have suffered three defeats, the first to a Mike Quinn hat trick for Stockport in a 0-3 defeat, by the same score to York, and a solitary goal defeat to Rochdale. Besides the recent home wins over Halifax and Bury others have been gained over Chesterfield (2-1), Darlington (2-1), Swindon (2-0), Northampton (3-2), Hartlepool (2-0), Torquay (2-1), and Blackpool (2-1). They have had to share the points with Aldershot (0-0), Doncaster (1-1), Bristol City (2-2), Chester (1-1), and Colchester (1-1).

Those five away wins have been at Chester (1-0), the only points to come from the first seven away matches, Tranmere (3-2), Hereford (1-0), Chesterfield (3-1) and Stockport (3-2). Those three wins coming in a four match sequence of away matches, the other match a (3-3) draw at Mansfield. Defeats have been at Rochdale (0-1), Blackpool (0-3), Peterborough (0-1), Reading (0-5), Halifax (0-1), Colchester (0-2). The last three away matches have resulted in defeats for Crewe at Hartlepool (1-1-2), Northampton (0-2) and the loss at York.

The squad of players assembled by manager Dario Gradi includes goalkeeper Stuart Naylor, this 21 year old former Lincoln City keeper was a England Youth International, made only seven appearances for Lincoln and eight with Peterborough before moving to Alexandra.

Central defender Bob Scott has now been with Crewe for five seasons, 31 year old Bob was born in Liverpool and began his career with Wrexham with fifteen matches, spent a brief period on loan to Reading before joining Hartlepool where he made forty appearances, a free transfer to Rochdale followed, Bob making seventy eight appearances at Spotland scoring three goals. Joining Crewe he has now made near two hundred and twenty appearances for the Club scoring fifteen goals, five of them this season.

Steve Edwards was born at Birkenhead, 26 year old Steve made eighty four appearances for his first League Club Oldham Athletic. A former Boundary Park apprentice Steve joined Crewe last season and has made over fifty appearances for the Club scoring once.

25 year old Nigel Hart made a solitary appearance for his first League Club Wigan, before joining Leicester City on a free transfer, but he had to move to Blackpool to again sample first team football where he made over forty appearances before joining Crewe, has since made over fifty appearances for the Gresty Road Club, this season scoring his first goals in League football when scoring both goals in a home 2-0 win over Hartlepool.

Paul Brady was a former Birmingham City apprentice, but only on joining Northampton Town did he break into League football, made over sixty appearances for the Cobblers before joining Crewe. 22 year old Paul has scored four career goals, three at Northampton and one with Crewe, scoring against Chesterfield in the Gresty Road Club's first match at home this season.

Peter King joined Crewe after being released on a free transfer from Anfield, failing to make the Liverpool first team it was only on a move to Crewe he made his league debut this season, has six goals to his credit.

Ian Bowers born at Stoke, began his career with his home town Club making just over forty appearances in the Potteries Club first team. He left to join Crewe for a £8,000 fee five seasons ago, a left sided player 29 year old Ian has scored three goals with Alexandra, only one this season but that was enough to give Crewe a single goal advantage in a home Milk Cup win over Third Division Burnley.

Midfield player Dave Pullar was born in London and was a former Portsmouth apprentice, 25 years old he made over one hundred appearances while at Fratton Park scoring seven goals. A £12,000 transfer took him to Exeter where he played over 150 matches scoring twenty seven goals before being given a free transfer at the end of last season.

'The Build Up, and the Aftermath'

On a day fifteen year ago this weekend, we enjoyed our greatest triumph, victory in a Wembley Cup Final. A lot has been written about that day, then and since, but let us look at the day from a different angle, the build up, and the aftermath.

The media beforehand were viewing the match as City Slickers v Country Bumpkins. A view that was encouraged more by Geographical location than the progress the two teams had made to the final. The progress made by Swindon had hardly been any less impressive than that of Arsenal.

For after disposing of Torquay and Bradford City in early rounds, we beat First Division Clubs Coventry and Burnley, and the men from Turf Moor were eventually beaten on neutral ground, at the Hawthorns, home of West Bromwich Albion after three titanic matches.

Before those semi-final matches with Burnley, two Second Division Clubs were to fall to Danny Williams team, Derby who were to finish Second Division champions and Blackburn. At that time we were joint leaders of the Third Division, and in 1968-69 we had outstanding players in all departments, before the match serious students of the game felt that Arsenal possessed no better individual players than Swindon but as a First Division Club they were obviously regarded as clear favourites.

The Fleet Street press of that day were depicting the London Club as being in a specially determined mood to wipe away the memory of the previous seasons final when they were defeated by Leeds United, the team they were trying to model.

This in itself brought them grudging praise as they battled to the final, beating Sunderland, Liverpool, Tottenham, Blackpool and Scunthorpe, such verbal descriptions as dogged, physical, disciplined and purposeful. Arsenal craved friends as much as they did trophies.

As we all know, we were to end that day victorious 3-1 after extra time. The after match quotes were predictable especially from the vanquished, Don Howe saying 'A match that should have been over and won by us at half time', adding amazingly 'We won't take too much notice of it! This image of unconcern was only to show a mask to the public, but upon deeper reflections he knew, as did most of the Nations soccer public, that Arsenal would not win any important trophies without considerable evolution.

Again the result raised a familiar and a somewhat pointless speculation, as to whether our success following in the wake of that obtained by Queens Park Rangers two seasons before, would bring a likewise breakthrough by Third Division Clubs in the F.A. Cup.

Of course Third Division Managers are usually advocating the theory that they would, this is usually stated because it is understandable that a Third Division Clubs success is not to be cheapened by suggestions that First Division Clubs do not try as hard in this competition.

They do - but more so in later rounds, though with financial gain to be had it is no coincidence that no Third Division Club has won the Cup since.

In retrospect how can we look at Arsenal's attitude to us on that March afternoon fifteen years ago, well no one will ever convince me that a team reaching a final is concerned with any other matter than winning, and even more so when the opposition is from a lower Division. Surely no team likes to lose in the way Arsenal lost to us at Wembley, the humiliation is particularly hard to bear when the rivalry is considered with Arsenal's nearby neighbours in North London, Tottenham.

My view is that Swindon Town were to play a large part in the conception that took place in the minds of Arsenal manager Bertie Mee and coach Don Howe, they had quietly expressed doubts upon their playing strategy, after the defeat Swindon Town inflicted upon them, those doubts they had were hardened into conviction.

Consider their team of that day: Wilson, Storey, McNab, McLintock, Ure, Simpson, Sammels, Court, Gould, Armstrong. Sub Graham.

The following season Arsenal achieved the double of the League championship and F.A. Cup, also winning the Fairs Cup in 1970.

From that defeat Arsenal introduced such players as Ray Kennedy, Eddie Kelly, Charlie George, and the conversion of Frank McLintock into a centre half, were to provide Arsenal with an upsurge in promoting their own staff as replacements for those players the management team considered to have fallen by the wayside on that fateful March day.

Swindon did Arsenal a favour that day, although no sense of gratitude could be, or was born towards us that day, only a taste of bitterness, but this match was a major influence in their thinking for the decade that followed.

There is no easier stance in football than to view from retrospect and it is somewhat easy to say that Arsenal lacked a player with the flair of Don Rogers, who didn't? His vision, acceleration, control and finishing ability were on a par with any player then, or since. The subsequent events of the change in tactics and personnel of the following season highlighted the lessons learnt from that match, a less violently committed centre half than Ian Ure was found by curbing the adventurous attitude of Frank McLintock, then an attacking

wing half, by moving him to the pivot position. The replacements of David Court and Bobby Gould, with a sharper midfield player, a more predictable and reliable front player. Yes Swindon played its unobvious part in the good fortunes of Arsenal in the early seventies.

What of Swindon besides the much vaunted Don Rogers, there was the midfield expertise of the resourceful John Smith, a much travelled player prior to his County Ground days, a player who could have been a large part of the capital scene if his arrival had not coincided with such names as Blanchflower, MacKay and Moore. It was his arrival from Torquay for a fee of £8,000 that completed that vital part in Danny Williams famed eleven.

The departure of Danny Williams to Sheffield Wednesday was not to become such a blow until several seasons had departed, his successor Fred Ford sensibly kept the team intact after his arrival from Bristol Rovers. It was upon the introduction of Dave MacKay to follow Fred that Danny was missed. His sorties into the transfer market helped by his aide of pre Wembley days in the building of that team, Jack Conley, would have helped to

replace and rebuild those sections of the team that had served the Club so well. Instead the decline of the next decade had begun and brief flirtation with a League Cup semi-final with Wolverhampton Wanderers in 1979-80 is the only incursion we have made into the later rounds of the now renamed Milk Cup.

Since that season Arsenal have retained their First Division status with more Cup final appearances, we gained a Division, and lost two, Don Howe like Danny Williams left and returned, as did Don Rogers, and you, like me remain, and this is the only consistent aspect of soccer, the supporter, although despite those post match quotes of 1969 made by Don Howe 'We won't take much notice of it', he did, and so did Arsenal and that image of unconcern is something he subsequently drastically disproved, and Arsenal's success, from the day of that defeat, had its consolation. Whilst no futuristic event will ever dim that memory of a golden day in March 1969 which will live forever in the memories of those privileged to be there.

While the day is forever the main concern, the build up and aftermath all play a significant part.

Dave Waller was leading goalscorer for Crewe last season, his first full season with seventeen goals. After a slow start to this season Dave is again leading scorer this term with thirteen goals, which include two hat tricks, the first in a Milk Cup Tie against Queens Park Rangers in a 3-0 second leg match, mind Rangers had won the first leg by 8-1! Dave's second hat trick was only a fortnight ago in a 6-1 home win over Halifax, with a goal in nearly every second match Dave is a useful acquisition for Alexandra.

Mark Leonard was signed on a free transfer from Everton this season, born at St Helens Mark failed

to make the Everton First team and was loaned to Rochdale last season to make six appearances with eight goals to his credit. Mark is the second highest scorer for Crewe this season, he has scored in three of Alexandra's last four home matches.

Paul Spittle, signed on a free transfer from Oxford United, scored one of the two goals to defeat us earlier this season, the only goal he has scored to date, his appearances being spasmodic.

Gary Blissett has scored four goals for Crewe this season, signing for Crewe just before the season started from non League football. He scored twice in Crewe's 3-2 away win at Tranmere last November.

Phil Williams has made over fifty appearances for Crewe and this season has scored three goals. Born at Swansea, Phil had earlier spells with Arsenal and Blackpool without breaking into their League team and then entered American Football before returning to English soccer with Crewe.

We lost 2-0 on October 8th in our fourth away defeat of the season to goals from Paul Spittle and Bob Scott in front of 2,111, the half time score was 1-0, Crewe's third home win of the season.

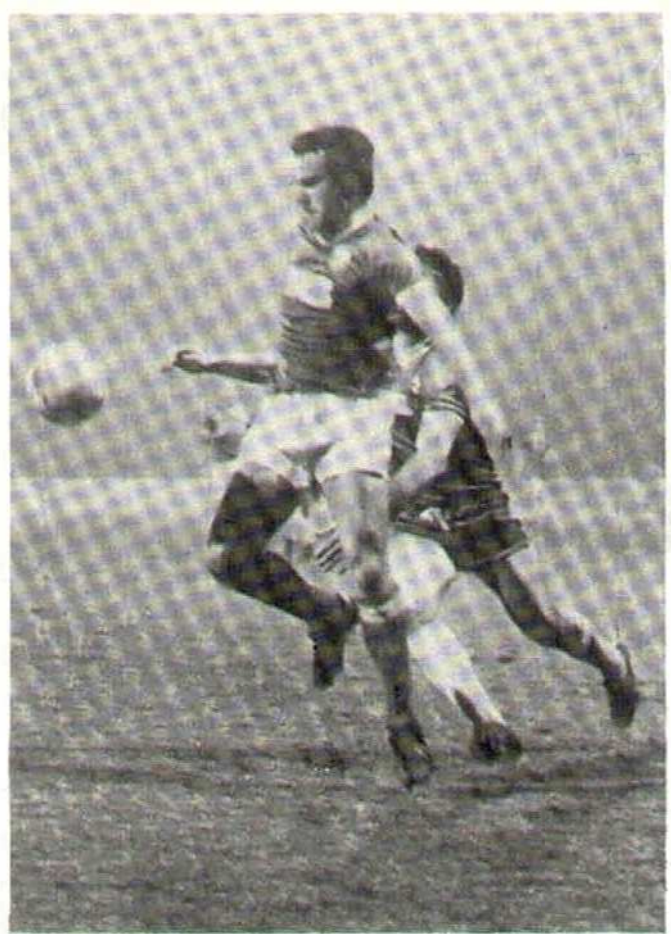

Featuring the Youth Team

Over the last four or five years the Youth policy has produced a number of first team players but unfortunately the future of the Youth policy depends upon whether the Club's financial position is strong enough for it to continue. Due to money problems it was at one time doubtful that such a policy would be possible this season but the generosity of sponsors such as Pretty Things and The Supporters Co-Operative made sure that it did. Having sorted out these problems, we went ahead and signed three apprentices and three others on the Youth training scheme and so maintaining our intake to around six lads a year. This gave us sufficient numbers to work with during the working week and of course it is in training sessions where improvements in the players capabilities are made. One only has to look at the South East Counties League Table to see how successful we have been this season, thus justifying the faith shown in us by our sponsors.

Looking forward to next season, we have already sounded out three possible new apprentices to join us in the summer in readiness for next season. The P.F.A. and the Manpower Services are hoping to continue the Y.T.S. scheme and if this is so we shall certainly be looking to take our quota. These lads will have been involved with us in some way,

probably playing in the South East Counties side during this season, so giving us the chance to assess their capabilities against lads of similar age at other Clubs.

To reach this stage a lot of time is spent looking at lads of all ages, even as young as twelve years of age. We also get a lot of recommendations and we always endeavour to follow these up. At present no Club is able to sign a lad until his fourteenth birthday but this is to change shortly, under a new scheme being initiated by the Football Association. With so many Clubs chasing so few good lads we are bound to suffer some disappointments as we did only a week ago with two lads from Chippenham but with the Swindon Schoolboys team doing so well, we have already signed seven of them on Schoolboy forms, the future of the Youth Team looks promising.

We must at all costs look to maintain our Youth set up and we are always looking for financial assistance whether by direct sponsorship or the support of The Co-Operatives activities.
