The Tony Barton Column...

AFTER saying last week how important this week was for us, the way the results have turned out has been very disappointing. First we lost to Bury here at home and then we went down at Crewe on Wednesday - each time by the odd goal.

It was even more disappointing that the winning goal in the Bury match came in the very last minute. I feel we have to accept responsibility because everyone hared forward when we were awarded a free-kick close to their goal, instead of paying more attention to holding on to what we have achieved.

Certainly we were not disgraced because we had held them

well and really did deserve at least a point.

Then more frustration at Crewe where we went one behind to an early goal that put us with our backs to the wall for a while. We weathered all that only to concede two quick goals early in the second half. Even then we were playing some great football and came back with two goals to open up the match.

Crewe's goalkeeper did a lot to save them and we were pleased to be told by a number of people that we are the best footballing side seen at Crewe for some time. But, just at the moment,

everything does seem to be going against us.

Phil Cavener was forced to go off at Crewe early in the second half. He received a painful blow from a knee at the base of the spine and in falling damaged several fingers. He had to go to hospital for treatment and had his ring cut off because his fingers were so swollen. At the time of writing I am waiting for reports on how he is.

So to today's match and welcome to Lou Macari and his Swindon team. The match has become even more important to us. We are left with this match to pick up three points where we were hoping to take all nine from Bury, Crewe and then Swindon.

Next week we look forward to the start of our FA Cup campaign and we will be meeting V.S. Rugby from the Southern League here next Saturday in the first round. We know that they have a good record in various Cup competitions and we expect a big crowd because the Rugby people are excited about their firstever match against a League club.

They plan to bring up to 2,000 supporters. We will hope for about the same number of our own so it should be a great atmosphere. We will be going all out for a result at the first attempt and to avoid any replays on non-league grounds.

There is an added incentive in that V.S. are at the moment under the spotlight from BBC Radio 2 as part of their "Wembley to feature. The BBC started out following Wembley Town and once they were beaten switched their attention to the team that knocked them out.

So they are following the pattern through. Rugby took over when they beat Stourbridge, and if we can beat them, then it will



In Retrospect

SWINDON TOWN

SWINDON have met Northampton more times than any other club, 114 times, in the Southern League, Divisions 2, 3, 4 and Three South, the Three South Cup, the F.A. Cup and the League Cup (Milk Cup).

Swindon come out on top in all these meetings but that was not always the case. Cobblers won the first four encounters including an 8-0 win.

In 1908 the Cobblers won the Southern League and Swindon were runners-up, two seasons later the roles were reversed.

Again, when Northampton won the Third Division in 1962, Swindon were in second place. The very first game that was abandoned involving the Cobblers was against Swindon, in 1903.

After the war, Swindon were the first visitors to Northampton, the Wiltshire club were managed by Lois Page, the ex-Cobbler. By winning 4-1 Northampton headed the Third Division table, for that one game, they ended the season lower than Swindon. Two players known to both clubs were Herbert Chapman, better known for his managerial expertise, and Edward Lloyd Davies, the Welsh International who Northampton bought from Swindon, the first time the club paid a fee for a player.

FIFTEEN YEARS AGO:

A WEEK after picking up a useful point at mid-table York we disappointed our fans by losing 1-0 here to Chester on November 8, 1969 with ALAN TARBUCK getting a second half winner. Teams:

Felton, Ross, Large, Fairbrother, Fagan.

Attendance: 5,659.

Amongst the front runners ARFON GRIFFITHS netted a penalty in Wrexham's 2-0 win over Notts County and DAVID GWYTHER opened the scoring in Swansea's 3-0 win over Crewe while in Division Two Swindon went down 2-0 at Birmingham, their team at that time including PETER DOWNSBOROUGH in goal, JOHN TROLLOPE and STAN HARLAND in defence and JOHN SMITH, ARTHUR HORSFIELD and PETER NOBLE up front.

In Division One Liverpool were held to a goalless draw by Wolves at Anfield. DENIS LAW got Manchester United's matchwinner at Coventry and two present-day managers, EDDIE GRAY and JOHNNY GILES were on the mark in Leeds' 4-0

win over lpswich.

TEN YEARS AGO:

JUST five years later on November 9, 1974 we beat Chester 2-0 here in a battle between two clubs on the edge of the Fourth Division promotion race. BARRY TUCKER netted a penalty in the first half and ROBIN WAINWRIGHT got a second after the break.. Teams:

NORTHAMPTON: Starling; Tucker, Oman, Gregory, Robertson, John,

Farrington, Best, Mabee, Wainwright, Stratford.

CHESTER: Milington; Edwards, Loska, Storton, Matthewson, Mason, Whitehead, Owen, Draper (Moore), James, Lennard. Attendance: 5,240.

Swindon picked up a point in a 1-1 draw at relegation haunted Brighton to stay in third place in Division Three, FRANK BURROWS getting their goal while Manchester City took over the leadership of Division One with a RODNEY MARSH matchwinner against Stoke. This was made possible by Arsenal's spectacular 3-1 win at Anfield where all the goals came from midfielders, namely ALAN BALL (2) and LIAM BRADY for Arsenal and RAY KENNEDY for Liverpool against his former colleagues.

FIVE YEARS AGO:

WE picked up a point from a goalless draw at Darlington on November 10, 1979 in a gem between two clubs on the edge of the Fourth Division re-election zone, the teams being:

BRIAN WILLIAMS got the Swindon goal in a 1-1 draw at Mansfield that kept them in fifth place in Division Three while in Division One MICHAEL ROBINSON got one of the Manchester City goals that enabled them to win the derby game against neighbours. United and so enabled Liverpool to take over the leadership with KENNY DALGLISH getting two of the goals in a 4-1 win at Brighton. There was one remarkable Second Division scoreline namely Orient 3 Chelsea 7 with LEE FROST getting a hattrick.

COLIN BAILIE (full-back): Born Belfast. A former apprentice he made his league debut at Oxford United in April, 1982 but began to claim a regular place in the side the following season. He became an established member of the team last season at the end of which he had made 71 appearances and can fill either full back position or play in midfield.

LEIGH BARNARD (midfield): Born Worsley. Served his apprenticeship with Portsmouth making his league debut at Exeter City in September, 1977. He made 89 appearances for Pompey plus 4 on loan to Peterborough United before signing for Swindon in July 1982. An enthusiastic player always in the thick of the action he can play in any midfield position but is, perhaps, best wide on the left. Made 92 appearances for Swindon to the end of last season.

PAUL BATTY (midfield): Born Doncaster. A former Swindon apprentice who made his league debut against Crewe Alexandra in September 1982. He quickly became a regular in the centre of midfield and had made 91 appearances to the end of last season. Although short for a professional footballer he makes up in determination for his lack of inches.

SCOTT ENDERSBY (goalkeeper): Born Lewisham. He appeared in an F.A. Cup tie for Kettering Town at the age of 15 but served his apprenticeship with Ipswich Town where he won an England Youth Cap. He moved to Tranmere Rovers in the summer of 1981 and made his league debut against Hereford United in September 1981. He made 91 appearances for the Birkenhead club and joined Swindon in July 1983. He made 40 appearances last season and won the Supporters Player of the Season award with some spectacular saves.

SIMON GIBSON (defender): Born London. Although born in Loindon Simon is a former Scottish Youth International. He served his apprenticeship with Chelsea but limited opportunities there led him to join Swindon, initially on laon, in October 1983. He immediately made his league debut against Colchester United and had 367 appearances to his credit at the end of last season. Strong centre-half, good in the air.

LOU MACARI (midfield): Born Edinburgh. Swindon's player-manager appointed in July, 1984 after a distinguished career with Celtic, Manchester United and Scotland. He joined the Old Trafford club in 1973 after over 50 appearances for Celtic and went on to make around 390 appearances for United. He also gained 24 Scottish caps. Originally a forward he has played more in midfield in recent years but continued to score goals regularly.

ALAN MAYES (forward): Born London. Alan is in his second spell with the club having resigned in July 1983 after 76 appearances for Chelsea. He began with QPR but only made his league debut (against Port Vale) after a move to Watford. He made 155 appearances there (plus 10 on loan to Northampton) before coming to Swindon in February 1979. He made 112 appearances before moving to Chelsea in December 1980. A mobile striker whose skills enable him to make as well as take chances he made 43 appearances last season.

GARRY NELSON (forward): Born Braintree. Garry's only previous club was Southend United for whom he made his league debut against Colchester Uniter in October 1979. He went on to make 140 appearances for Southend and joined Swindon in July 1983. Basically an old fashioned left winger who likes to get past his full-back, he made 43 appearances last

ANDY ROWLAND (forward): Born Derby. Although Andy began with Derby County it was not until he moved to Bury that he played first team football. Made his league debut at Swindon in August 1974 and a total of 203 appearances for Bury before moving to Swindon in September 1978. A consistent goalscore: for much of his career the last couple of seasons have seen him make a number of appearances at centreback. He has also been the team's emergency goalkeeper and has performed well in that role on several occasions. With 264 appearances for Swindon to the end of last season he is the club's senior professional and before this season began, his career goals scored totalled 161.



MIKE GRAHAM (defender): A former Bolton Wanderers player he made his debut at Mansfield in March 1978 and went on to appear 51 times for that club. He joined Swindon in July, 1981 and had made 125 appearances at the end of last season when he was given a free transfer under the Freedom of Contract rules but re-signed in August, 1984. Most of his appearances have been alongside the centre-half but he has also played at full-back and in midfield.

NIGEL GRAY (defender): Born Fulham. An experienced defender with 262 appearances for Orient, his only other club, plus 3 on loan to Charlton Athletic before joining Swindond in July 1983. Basically a centre-half he has also played full-back and, for Orient, in midfield but last season was a disappointment for him with only 16 appearances and a period on loan to Brentford.



A married man with a son, David works as a printer. He enjoys playing badminton, cross country running and gardening. In addition he likes to travel as much as he can.



Division Four Scene

MOST prolific scorer in recent weeks has been PORT VALE'S former Everton wing man EAMON O'KEEFE, whose hat-trick against SOUTHEND on Monday took his tally to seven in his last six games and lifted his side into sixth place in the table while BOBBY MOORE'S men are dangerously near to the re-election zone and have now lost four away games in a row conceding 14 goals in the process.

They have also lost on each of their last three visits to Vale Park, scoring one goal

against eight.

Currently providing plenty of goals on their travels are **BLACKPOOL**, just 10 days after going down 3-0 at **TRANMERE** they won 4-1 at **SOUTHEND** in what was their biggest away win since their 4-0 success at **YORK** in October 1981.

Crewe had won all their previous four games and another team currently going well as a contrast to so many re-election battles are **DARLINGTON**, whose 2-1 win over **CHESTER** was their third home success in a row and their sixth game in succession without defeat.

Their last defeat was at the hands of HARTLEPOOLS at the beginning of October and since then 'Pools have extended their unbeaten run to eight games, a run of success that won manager BILLY HORNER the Fourth Division Bells' Whisky award for October.





Meanwhile YORK CITY, who won promotion from Division Four last season, hammered GILLINGHAM 7-1 to lift them into the Third Division promotion race this being their biggest win for 20 years.


