This afternoon we welcome the Directors, Players and Supporters of Aldershot Football Club and hope that we all see an enjoyable game. Last season Aldershot did the double against us winning 2-1 at home and defeating us by 2-0 here at the County Ground to set them—selves up for a promotion push towards the end of the season which they unfortunately failed to maintain.

Our last League game away at Northampton was a tremendous disapoint— ment with the side giving a below par performance after their previous efforts immediatley prior to this when a run of two wins and two draws had made us all look forward optimistically. Once again it shows that we must bring more consistency to our game before this will happen.

Whilst on the subject of replays, John Trollopes youth team had to face Newport County here on Wednesday last after drawing 4-4 at Somerton Park the week before in what was a very exciting encounter, with our lads drawing level int the last minute with a Sheldon Lee header after previous goals by Mark Gardiner (2) and Mark Hughes. The eventual winners of the replay will visit Home Park to play Plymouth Argyle in the next round.

You may have read in the Evening Advertiser recently of our difficulties in maintaining our schedule of payments on the North Stand but I would like to re— assure you that we are not sitting back and ignoring the problem but are positively putting suggestions to the Thamesdown authority to resolve this very difficult situation, our problem being that when the present schedule was worked out back in 1972 nobody foresaw that our attendances would drop to the present low level.

Finally may I thank all those suporters who travelled to Dagenham on Monday evening and alsoall of you present this afternoon. Enjoy the match.

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
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Firstly, hello to everyone here this afternoon.

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Welcome to Aldershot

Change! is the operative word to describe recent happenings at the Recreation Ground. A syndicate of six new directors took control of the Club two weeks ago including former Chelsea player Ron Harris who was appointed Managing Director. But less than one week under the new administration Manager Len Walker left the Club and was promptly replaced by the former Chelsea star and Brentford Coach.

When the Recreation Ground Club visited us last April they were on the verge of promotion to the third division. That they failed and finished seven points behind fourth placed Bristol City, in fifth position, is now part of the club's history. Seven of the players in the Shot's team that gained a 2-0 win here on that April afternoon are still with the Club, while Les Lawrence joined Rochdale in a £15,000 transfer deal, Les Briley is with Third Division leaders Millwall, Steve Berry with First Division Synderland, and Joe Jopline was given a free transfer.

Aldershot have struggled in the League so far this season, their only victories at home have come in their last two matches with Southend United, and Port Vale. They have also recorded two away wins at Halifax Town and Rochdale. Struggling to find some consistency in their results the Army Garrison Town Club have had to look to their Cup exploits for any consolation. A magnificent 5-0 aggregate win over Third Division Bournemouth in the First round of the Milk Cup, was followed by a 4-3 aggregate win in the Second round over Second Division Club Brighton. This victory earned the Shots a third round tie with First Division Norwich battling display enabled them to hold the Canaries to a goalless draw at Carrow Road.

That display, creditable as it was, left the Club feeling it was a match they knew they could have won but for missed chances, and that was to cost them dear in the replay, in front of 9,773 they lost a mist shrouded replay 4-0. Their league results to date have been:— Home: Chester lost 1-2, Exeter drew 1-1, Peterborough drew 0-0, Darlington lost 3-4, Bury lost 0-1, Mansfield drew 0-0, Southend won 6-2, Port Vale won 1-0. Away: Chesterfield lost 1-2, Halifax won 2-1, Colchester lost 0-2, Rochdale won 2-1, Blackpool lost 0-1, Northampton lost 0-4, Scunthorpe lost 1-2.

With Ron Harris taking control for the first time last Saturday the Shots continued their Cup exploits of this season with a well earned 1-1 draw with Third Division Newport County in the first round of the F.A. Cup.

With Glen Burvill in a three match ban, former England International Club/Coach Ian Gillard currently absent with a groin injury, and on loan Wimbledon defender Mark Smith's loan period expiring last weekend, Ron Harris fielded the following players for his first selection at Somerton Park last Saturday.

Former Birmingham apprentice DAVID COLES signed in the summer of 1983 was in goal, ever present this season the former Mansfield player only missed the opening day League fixture with Hereford United during the 1983/84 season. The 20 year old keeper has now made 60 consecutive League appearances.

Signed from West London Club Fulham in the summer of 1983, 23 year old CLIVE DAY played only ten League matches for Fulham, he did spend a loan period with Mansfield playing in the twelve League matches scoring his only League goal in an away match with Crewe, although he found the net this season in the 70th minute of the 4-0 home first leg victory over Bournemouth.

Central defenders at Newport were GARY PETERS and DON SOUTER, 30 year old Gary is the Club Skipper, he began his career as an apprentice with Aldershot, later joining Guilford City. He started his League career with Reading playing in 156 League matches scoring 8 goals for the Elm Park Club, before joining Fulham. With the Craven Cottage Club he made 64 League appearances scoring twice. Gary moved to Wimbledon in 1982 and led the Club to promotion in 83/84, made 83 League appearances scoring 7 goals before joining

Former Ipswich Town defender Don Souter was signed from Barnsley in the summer of 1983, after 21 League matches with the Yorkshire Club. Has now made 41 League appearances for Aldershot, suffered from a broken nose, illness and injury that has restricted Don to the first two League matches of this season, he will be 23 next Saturday, as yet to score in League matches.

Although wearing the No.11 shirt, 24 year old GIORGIO MAZZON played at Full Back last Saturday.

Another former Fulham apprentice is PAUL SHRUBB, 29 year old Paul played in only one League match in three seasons at Craven Cottage, after a spell with the Hellenic Club in South Africa, he joined Brentford making his debut for the Bees in 1976/77.

Midfield player ANDY MASSEY joined Aldershot from Millwall in the summer in an exchange deal for Les Briley, 23 year old Andy made 88 League appearances at the Den. He spent a loan period with Port Vale last season playing in four matches. Played in ten League matches this season and come on as a substitute in two, he has yet to score for his new Club.

Scoring from the penalty spot in the 43rd minute of the Cup Tie at Newport when he scored with a hard and low shot to Mark Kendales' left hand was the vastly experienced IAN McDONALD. For 31 year old Ian today should see him make his 140th consecutive League appearance, he has not missed a League match for the Club since making his debut in a 2-1 home win over Tranmere Rovers on November 28th 1981.

The ever dangerous DALE BANTON joined the Club in 1982, ironically our away match at the Recreation Ground on April 4th 1982 is the only League match Dale has missed out of 107 appearances! Today sees his 69th consecutive League appearance. This quick moving striker has scored 47 League goals for the Club after his move from West Ham, where he made five appearances. Scored eight goals in a two

week period in April last year, with five in a 6-1 home win over Halifax, and a Hat-Trick against Rochdale. Scored the only goal of the match in Shots last League match with Port Vale.

Former Southampton forward 21 year old MARTIN FOYLE made 12 League appearances for the Saints in four seasons, scoring only once in an away match with Manchester United on April 9th 1983, signed in the close season for £20,000, he has been ever present scoring four League goals.

Signed this season after a spell in Hong Kong is former Oxford United player PETER FOLEY who scored 70 goals from two hundred and seventy five League matches at the Manor Ground, he has scored two League goals this season, at Halifax and Rochdale.

Former England Youth International 22 year old PAUL STAFF joined Aldershot from Hartlepcol in the close season after scoring 14 goals in 98 League appearances, scored twice in the 6-2 home win over Southend United on October 27th, his only goals to date.

Winchester born COLIN FIELDER, former Club apprentice was the non playing substitute last Saturday, 20 year old Colin has made ten League appearances in three seasons and has yet to score in League Soccer.

Our defender Nigel Gray spent a four match loan period with Aldershot earlier this season.

The Right Attitude

The gradual introduction of three of last years apprentices into our first team squad and eventual elevation to league soccer prompts the question of do they appreciate how lucky or fortunate they are? In the case of our three marks, Gardiner, Hughes and Payne, the attitude and appraisal from Lou Macari and John Trollope in their respective positions which have dealt with the transition from junior to a more senior status show that they have been pleased with their attitude and progress to date.

The opportunities before an apprentice with a Fourth Division club are no less than with a First Division club and in many cases are greater, Paul Rideout late of the County Ground and now a First Division regular and England under 21 International will testify to that.

While not every, if many have the undoubted skill of Paul, By no means is he the only young player to be lifted to a higher status and not all is sweetness and light when, your are with a First Division Club, the overworked phrase 'Its all down attitude.' Nevertheless cannot be underestimated and this was given no more vivid an illustration than by Everton manager Howard Kendall early this season when he placed five young professionals plus a sixth for an unconnected reason, on the transfer list following a central league match with Sheffield United, he was at the game in question and outlined the circumstances leading to his decision, 'We were leading 2-0 at half time and it seemed a case of now many more we might half. Instead in the second Sheffield started putting pressure on, scored a couple of goals and went onto win

'In a number of young players I did not see the attitude which would have put things right.

By the following morning, five players were placed on the transfer list: Darren Hughes, Ian Bishop, John Morrissey, Stuart Rimmer, and Rob Wakenshaw. Ian Macbwat was the sixth for what Howard Kendall described as, 'something else which disappointed me in his play.'

'It was important that we showed the players concerned how serious we were in our assessment of the game,' said the manager.

'Attitude in young players is so important. These lads would not be here if we didn't think they have skill or we thought they would not have a chance of becoming First Division players.

'At some time, however, they must come to learn that football is not always a comfortable life style. There are times when the only course of action is to roll up your sleeves and battle for yourself, your team mates and your club.'


Howard Kendall was obviously not satisfied that had been the case at Bramall Lane, of course his response did not mean that those players were banished from the club, only Ian Bishop who was transferred to Carlisle United left, the rest played in subsequent 'A' Team and reserve fixtures.

But what it did mean, he said 'is that we shall be watching them very carefully over the next few months to see whether they have the right attitude in them - because it is a must.'

The initial action bemused some of the club followers but when explained they could understand the reasoning behind what may have appeared to be drastic action.

To most spectators not to have the correct attitude to want to give 100% is criminal, one of the most apalling phrases used in modern football phraseology is 'we won because all the lads gave 100% today.' Is it really too much to ask that once a week that may happen? It infers that at other times less than full commitment is given and there is no more disillusioning remark to the man on the terrace.

He is not naive, he demands genuine will in most cases forgive mistakes if he sees a player try to it is for an error. So recompense important that young players begin with the right attitude, the situation is rare and concerning at a club like Everton. For in most reserve matches the spectator who watches reserve team football is more than likely to be watchful of senior players in this grade of soccer who have become disillusioned, cynical and taking life comfortably. The majority of young players have a point to prove and effort is usually the least of any deficiencies they may display

Torquay United manager David Webb came out of retirement for their away match at Chester due to an injury crisis and proceeded to score the only goal of the match in the eighty fourth minute, not bad

for a 38 year old!

Darlington lead the Fourth Division for the first time this season a brace of goals from Carl Airey in their 2-1 home win over Wrexham before their second highest crowd of the season put the Feethams Club in a position few could envisage last season. We are due to visit Cyril Knowles' team for our sternest test of the season next week, this is a match that little motivation should be required from Lou Macari, mountains are to climb and the players should relish this challenge.

The solitary goal defeat Mansfield suffered at Halifax was the first goal they had conceded in seven matches, but they have only scored four in the same

sequence.

By scoring the only goal of their home match with Hartlepool in the seventy seventh minute, Colchester Uniteds' Tony Adcock took his total of League goals to fifteen to continue as the division's

leading goalscorer.

Kevin Baddeley rejected the clubs offer of a further months contract and has signed for Gola Alliance Club Wealdstone. He joined us in the summer of 1981 and played in a total of 96 league matches for the club, and fifteen Cup appearances in the F.A. Cup, Milk Cup and Associate Member Cup. Although born in Swindon, Kevins' first league club was Bristol City but he only made a solitary appearance for the Ashton Gate Club in a First Division match with West Ham.

Welcome to Colin Gordon who has signed a two year contract. After signing from Olbury United the Southern League Midland Division Club, twenty one year old Colin had a dream debut by earning us three points in atrocious conditions at Rochdale. Other transfer moves... Wrexham have signed Steve Charles from Second Division Sheffield United for a fee of £10,000..... making his debut for Northampton in their recent home match with us was on loan goalkeeper Kevin Poole from Aston Villa ... Hereford United have signed former Cheltwinger Paul Tester from Town Shrewsbury Town on a months loan, also on two months trial at Edgar Street is Mark Hatcher from Western league club Paulton Rovers.... our next opponents Darlington have signed York City defender Steve Senior on loan... while Rochdale have signed John Seasman on a months loan form Second Division Cardiff City.

Moves that failed.... Third Division Plymouth Argyles' attempt to woo their former player John Newman away from Hereford United as their new manager, finally settling on former Southend United manager David Smith... Bury manager Martin Dobson's attempt to sign Bristol Rovers striker on a months loan.... Jim Iley of Exeter City in his attempt to sign Bruce Halliday from Third Division Bristol City, the two were at one time at Bury but Halliday stated he was not impressed with Jim Ileys' style of play at Bury. Bruce is one of several players on offer from last seasons promotion squad at Ashton Gate. Full back Ian Davies from Carlisle United recently released by the Cumbrian club has been interesting several Fourth Division clubs, Bristol born Ian has played for Norwich City, Newcastle United and Manchester City.

A total of six players in three matches have now been sent off in matches at Hereford United, Paul Henorie and Steve Buxton of Stockport, Colin Calderwood of Mansfield, and Steve Tupling of Darlington along with Chris Price and Ian Dalziel of the home club.

Peterborough United have a 100% home record after eight matches, while Colchester, Scunthorpe and Southend have scored in every home match.

Hereford United must have the most travelled management duo in football league, for manager John Newman commutes daily from his home in Derby, while his assist-



ant former Carlisle United and West Bromwich manager Alan Ashman makes a likewise daily journey from his Walsall home.

Hartlepool had expected to have former Arsenal and Liverpool star Ray Kennedy as player coach this season. He was a leading figure in their re-election campaign at the end of last season, but is now playing

in Cyprus. "I was a little disappointed with Ray" said Chairman John Smart. "We offered him a good wage, but he put the screw on me as Chairman. Looking back his departure was for the better."

Former Preston and Newcastle defender John Bird took Kennedy's position and Smart said: "His enthusiasm is tremendous. He has made all the difference on the coaching side."

Another reason for Hartlepools' revival so far this season is the form of long term loan signing former England under 23 goalkeeper Alan Stevenson.

It all adds up to a bright new dawning for Hartlepool, but the season is long and

there is still two thirds of it left, and consistency is the key.

New Rochdale manager Vic Halom in his first season says "there's more to being a manager than merely picking a team, every manager has got to teach them to take pride in putting on their club shirt. In ten years, the game has moved to a situation where money is more important than playing. You used to get well rewarded if you showed commitment, a good attitude and could play."

"Now players expect to get well rewarded in the hope they will show the right attributes. Great players have earned what they get. No professional begrudges Bryan Robson getting £lm. But too many young players want the good things of football without earning them."

In a poll for the most consistent players in the Fourth Division during October, Ian McDonald of our visitors today Aldershot came second with 7.66 marks from ten, Errington Kelly of Peterborough United was the winner, with goalkeeper Fred Barber of Darlington in third place.

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

JOHN WARD TALKS TO HARRY GREGG

The first time I saw Harry Gregg in action was towards the end of the first home game of the season against Wrexham. With a few minutes to go and a final extra effort needed to ensure maximum points for Swindon, Garry Nelson was tripped and sent hurtling over the touchline to fall flat on his face on the hard track running alongside the pitch. He lay motionless and one feared, at the very least, concussion, if not more serious injury. Seconds later a grey tracksuited figure erupted from the dugout and in a few strides was standing over Garry's prostrate form. With one hand he picked him up by the scruff of the neck, with the other by the seat of the pants and, so it seemed from the stand, hurled him unceremoniously back on the pitch. Garry shook his head in a dazed sort of way and pursued by a stream of verbal encouragement staggered back into position where Swindon duly proceeded to their first win.

It was with some trepidation therefore that I waited to talk to Harry, not entirely reassured by Andy Rowland's insistance that I had no need to worry. "He has this reputation for always being the sergeant major", Andy acknowledged, "but he's not always like that. At times he can be a real softie." Andy was right. I was soon to find out that one of the key points in Harry's technique in getting the best out of players is to adapt his and the to the individual approach circumstances.

GLAMOUR AND HONESTY

"I started my career at Doncaster under Peter Doherty", Harry told me, choosing his words carefully, as he was to do throughout the interview. "He was the greatest player ever". He paused to make sure I realised he really meant it and had not just tossed it off for effect. "What's more, he was an intelligent man. He would laugh with you, cry with you.... and walk all over you if the need arose. It was only a modest Club but he kept it in the top half of the Second Division. After him it tumbled. So I served my apprenticeship with a good craftsman. I was determined to copy him. Above all he talked about the good things; the other things were kept inside.

"I worked with, and I mean with, not for, good players, Harry continued, "and exceptionally good administration, managers and coaches. The most famous was Matt Busby: his flair for public relations was his greatest asset. He made his own side feel better. On the outside at Manchester United there was glamour, on the inside,

honesty; and he was matched by a great Chairman.

"I can't stand all this nonsense about flamboyant managers. I like people who win medals as opposed to buying them. The new breed of managers and directors have a lot to answer for. I remember later on, when I was coaching at Old Trafford, begging the Chairman not to scrap the "B" team. He said the Manager had been told there must be economies; the recession meant they had to cut their expenditure. I said they should not scrap the "B" team: it was vital for the strength in depth which was the heritage of Manchester United and their supporters. Instead they should do without air travel to away games and free cigars for the Directors.

BISCUIT TIN FOR BRAINS

If Peter Doherty and Matt Busby are his role models Harry also has a textbook, and an unlikely one at that. After the Munich air disaster, whenever Manchester United played in Germany, Harry was in demand for German television. He appeared with one Dr Willy Misiel from whose book "Soccer Revolution" he has become inseperable out of print and copies are (It's virtually unobtainable, but it's no use asking Harry to borrow his, he's far too afraid of never seeing it again.)

"He forecast everything that has come to pass", Harry claimed, "He was the one who backed the horse before it ran. As Willy Misiel predicted, the game has fallen at the alter of speed. Too often the manager is the man who stands at the dressing room door as the players run out, holding the biscuit tin for them to leave their brains in; they are allowed to collect them again after the game, having made the manager's mistakes and not their own."

I thought this sounded all very well if you were lucky enough to have a squad of outstanding players. But surely, I ventured to suggest, if you were a Fourth Division Club you couldn't leave all to natural ability, a little coaching might not come amiss.

"Who said I didn't believe in coaching?", asked Harry indignantly, "I am a coach. That means I can help people. I don't try to change them from what they are into something else. My aim is to make each play to the best of their ability. If I can teach him to appre- ciate and therefore use his gifts, then I have helped. I can get to know a player in between a week and a month. He must believe in me, I believe in him and most of all, he must believe in himself. It all starts will respect."



10 YEARS AGO - NOVEMBER 1974

The signing of Trevor Anderson for £25,000 from Manchester Utd. on the 1st came to late for him to be included in the side that faced Grimsby the next day. An own goal and one from John McLaughlin saw a 2-2 interval score, David Syrett getting the winner with one minute to go. Three days later, a Tuesday night, Anderson made his debut against Chesterfield at Home, and scored the only goal of the game to push the Town into 2nd place. The following Saturday a trip to Brighton produced a point in a 1-1 draw, Frank Burrows scoring in the 35th minute.

The visit of Gillingham seven days later produced another single goal victory, Peter Eastoe doing the honours in front of 8,847. A week later the crowd was boosted to 13,365 for the F.A. Cup first round when Reading were convincingly beaten 4-0, Anderson, Eastoe, an own goal and David Moss did the damage, and it was Moss who scored a hat-trick when Colchester were the visitors on the 30th. Eastoe scored the other in a 4-1 win to keep the Town in 2nd place.

20 YEARS AGO - NOVEMBER 1964

November 1964 will not go down as one of Swindon's best months as all four games were lost, with a goal difference of 4-15. It started on Saturday the 7th with a trip to Plymouth where Peter Leggett gave the town the lead in front of 16,215, but despite having the better of the play in the first-half Argyle equalised and grabbed a second-half winner. The following Saturday Bolton were the visitors to the County Ground, meeting with little resistance in running up a 3-1 win, John Trollope getting the consolation with a penalty after 56 minutes.

The trip to Ayresome Park seven days later saw three team changes with Dennis Brown, a £15,000 signing from Chelsea the previous day, making his debut at inside

left, Keith East at Centre-Forward and Norman Oakley back in goal. East scored after 35 minutes to make it 1-1 at the interval, but a further three Middles-brough goals sank the Town. Worse was to come as when Newcastle came to Wiltshire on the 28th the Town conceded six for the second time that season - John Trollope getting a consolation with a penalty. Willie Penman, later to join Swindon, scored twice for 2nd place United.

30 YEARS AGO - NOVEMBER 1954

The 3rd of the month saw Swindon journey to Poole Town to play a friendly arranged by ex-Town star Jimmy Ithell, now in charge at the Dorset club. Maurice Owen scored 10 minutes from the end to give the Town a single goal victory, but the following Saturday, a Home game with Brighton, Swindon's forwards failed to come up with the goods as the visitors ran in 2-0 winners in front of 8,864. Six days later, due to an October injury to Bob Hunter, 22 year old David Gibson was signed on loan from Everton, making his debut the follow-Brentford. Unfortunatly, at despite goals from Owen and Matt Gemmell, Sam Burton had to pick the ball out of the net on four occasions.

Meanwhile, some 200 miles away at Plymouth, the Town's youth team were making their first ever appearance in the F.A. Youth Cup, but came off 6-3 losers. The following week it was the turn of the seniors as Crystal Palace were the visitors for the F.A. Cup 1st round. 11,359 saw the Town unable to recover from the two first-half Palace goals to make an early exit from the competition. Some credit was restored seven days later however when Swindon were unlucky to come away from the Dell with just a point. Jimmy Cross gave the Town a 1-0 half-time lead and only a late penalty save prevented the Town from getting both points.



BEHIND THE SCENES

The Smiths Cup begins its 1984/85 season with another record-breaking entry of nearly 8,000 schools now embarking on the road to Wembly.

The six-a-side tournament, open to all ESFA affiliated schools for under 11 year old boys, has attracted praise from many famous names in the world of football including that of England Manager, Bobby Robson, who last year endorsed the importance of the small sided game and complimented the organisation of the tournament which culminates with the finals at Wembly Stadium — an ambition sought by many famous players but often not fulfilled.

This competition cannot be praised too highly as it not only gives youngsters the unique opportunity of playing at Wembly but encourages them to play six-a-side football which is vital to the development

of skills.

As you may be aware we have, for a number of years, had a family ticket scheme whereby Mums and/or Dads can bring their children to our games and sit anywhere in the stands at very considerably reduced charges. We have also recently introduced the Junior Supporters club scheme and members can come to the County Ground with or without their parents and watch the games in seating accomodation for just 50p.

We hope that those availing themselves of these concessions appreciate the offer so much so that they will nominate the Club for the Family Award Scheme which is part of the Canon League Sponsorship. A part of the overall sponsorship programme provides for cash awards for Clubs who do most to stimulate family attendances at matches. The programme has been developed in conjunction with the Radio Times who will be devoting a full page to the launch and providing regular monthly features in the magazine throughout this season.

The prizes, not only the the Club but also for the winning reader's nomination, are very impressive. Each monthly prize winning nomination will go forward to a special judging for three end-of-season awards the first prize being a trip for a family of four to see England play in Mexico during summer 1985 or £3,000 in cash.

Neither this Club or any of it's supporters will benifit unless nominations are made so please keep your eye open for the entry details and nominate the Swindon Town Football Club.

When the Football League conceived their three points for a win "experiment" four years ago they hoped that more enterprising football could follow naturally.

"Those expectations have been fully justified", said Graham Kelly, Secretary of The Football League. "If the present goalscoring rate is maintained, the Canon League will achieve its highest scoring level for 18 years."

Four seasons ago, the 1980-81 League programme yielded 5,002 from 2,028 matches. In 1981-82, the first three-points-for-a-win season, the figure increased to 5,277. It rose again in 1982-83 to 5,672. Though last season's total dropped slightly to 5,574 it was, significantly, 572 more that that of 1980-81.

So far this season 623 Canon League fixtures have yielded 1,793 goals at an average of 2.88 a match. At the current rate therefore the seasonal total could be more than 5,800 for the first time since 1966-67.


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
