Face to Face A NEW PROGRAMME FEATURE WHERE LOU ANSWERS QUESTIONS FROM DAVE KING -



Q: How do you account for the Teams poor start to the season?

LOU: There is a combination of events that have been the reason. lack of confidence and commitment by some players. Also some of the opposing Teams know the County Ground better than some of my players. We are fielding a lot of newcomers.



I accept that, but our form has left a lot to be desired though, and some fans were expecting promotion this season.

LOU: They have a right to that opinion. but I never promised anyone that. It will take time to improve matters. I have only been here one year and just eight matches have been played this season.

Why do we have so many injured players this season?

LOU: It would be easy to say that is bad luck, but all Clubs experience that. Some players have injury records and some have not, you have to look at that, sometimes to see whether the player is unfortunate or injury prone.

Q: Have you been satisfied or dissatisfied with the application shown?

LOU: I am obviously dissatisfied because I know that the players can play a lot

letting themselves better. Some are down.

Q: Do you believe after one year at Swindon that you can lift this Club to better days.

LOU: Yes, I would not be at the Club if I did not believe in that.

Q: We hear so much about the potential at Swindon but in 64 years of League soccer only two Managers have gained promotion. Any comment?

LOU: When people talk of potential they are talking of the area and the Town. players have been the asset of this Club. The sale of Don Rogers, Paul Rideout, Alan Mayes, etc., have realised sizeable transfer fees in past years. Whether the money for those players has been wisely used is another matter. All I know is that I wish some of that had been available for me.

Reflections of you PHYSIOTHERAPIST ON

A NEW SERIES IN WHICH THE TOWN PHYSIOTHERAPIST REVEALS HIS THOUGHTS ON PLAYERS AND MANAGERS OF PAST DECADES



Kevin Morris the Town Physiotherapist airs his views on the succession of managers that he has served with and under during nearly thirty years of devoted service to a club he joined in 1956.

FRED FORD

'Fred was the best manager that I have worked for, he was also a nice man, with what I would call an uncanny knowledge of the game. That knowledge may have come second only to Dave Sexton, the former Chelsea and Manchester United Manager'.

'Despite his kindly exterior, I will always remember one incident that occured during training out on the car park one morning, not long after Fred had taken over here at the County Ground. Stan Harland gave Fred some cheek to try him out, that provided an insight into Fred that surprised me. He left Stan in no doubt as to who was the manager and told Stan so in no mean terms!.

Kevin pausing to relight that familiar pipe which is almost part his characteristic repertoire added. You never heard Fred make a derogatory remark of any one and wherever you go in football nothing but good will be spoken of the late Fred Ford. A man who bore no malice when there had been a disagreement. often forgotten that Fred worked with England Teams which included players like current England Manager Bobby Robson. He also spent a period in South Africa coaching. All the players who were at this club at the same time as Fred, such as Don Rogers, Rod Thomas or Frank Burrows would always speak highly of Fred. Everyone connected with Oxford United, Fred's last League Club would re-iterate those comments. The highest tribute and respect I can pay to the late Fred Ford is that if he had been a road sweeper in the Town. His street would have been the cleanest and tidiest. He had pride in himself and everything he did. I always like to think some of Fred's philosphy in that respect had some effect on me as well'.

'Fred had been awarded the Military Medal and was a Regimental Sergent Major. He would emphasise all the aspects that are required in life today.

DAVE MACKAY

'I liked Dave, he always treated me with respect. He always liked and appreciated what I did. As a manager he could not portray the image he created as a player of agression and flambouyant leadership. Dave did not do as well here as I thought he would. Whether he thought the Club was wealthy and solvent after the League Cup win of 1969 is not for me to say. Whether financial pressure from within, or the politics of the club forced him to sell Don Rogers and Stan Harland, I do not know. But their leaving was the start of the decline of this club'.

'I could not always agree with some of the decisions that he made, but he was the Club Manager. There was a sad aspect to his arrival for he was brought to the club while Fred Ford was still the Manager. Fred knew that Dave would replace him, but Fred never once complained, but it was not a move that worked for the benefit of the club'.

Mention of Don Rogers immediately prompted the question of why is that measure of skill and ability not so obvious today? 'Don was a great player and I do not use that word lightly, it is an overworked cliche among the media, ability is no guarantee for success, players have to work hard within the framework of the team and for each other, that is a vital ingredient that the modern player needs'.

Our first encounter with Exeter came almost 77 years ago when, on 7th October 1908, we played hosts for a Southern League Division I game. A 2-1 victory, plus a 4-1 success in the return, helped us to the runners-up spot that season. Swindon again achieved the 'double' over City the following season, and again finishing in that second spot. However, in 1910-11 City gained their first win over us, winning here by one goal to nil on Christmas Eve, and followed it up by scoring the odd goal in three in Devon in April. In fact, that Christmas defeat was our only home set-back in the season we won our first Championship. The highest Exeter achieved in their short Southern League membership was seventh, in 1912-13, when we took three points off them.

With the Football League having adopted the Southern League Division I as their new Third Division in 1920, the first League meeting between the two clubs came on 23rd October 1920. The 1-0 reversal at Exeter was only slightly improved on seven days later when a Bill Batty goal gave us a share of the points. The following season we gained our first League win, with a 4-1 score-line away from home. But it wasn't until 16th February 1924 that we suffered the ignominy of a home defeat to City, by the single goal of the game. Swindon then won the next eight meetings at the County Ground, before City forced a 2-2 draw on Boxing Day 1932 - Syd Brooks and Eddie Munnings getting ours that day. Twentyfour hours later Exeter inflicted their biggest victory to date over us, scoring five without reply. Revenge of sorts came three years later when Swindon won by the same margin, but with a 6-1 result. Frank Peters, with a hat-trick, Alan Fowler (2),

and Tommy Armstrong getting the goals. With Swindon having drawn 3-3 at Exeter in November, there was no shortage of goals that season!

Following a five year close-season for the War, Exeter provided us with our first opposition for the resumption of League football, on 25th August 1945. Although a further regionalised version of the Third Division South, they did us no favours by winning 4-1. With the League back to normal the following season, a crowd of 20,831 saw Alf and Bill Stephens score to give us a 2-0 success. Three seasons later, on 3rd December 1949, Swindon chalked up their largest victory over City to date, winning by seven goals to one. Maurice Owen, Jimmy Bain and Harry Lunn got two apiece, Joe Simner getting the odd one, watched by 10,785.

In 1957-58 Exeter failed to qualify for the new national Third Division, becoming founder members of the Fourth. They were 'helped' on their way by the Town who won 5-1 in January at home, and 1-0 away, thanks to Andy Micklewright's 36th minute goal. During the next twenty years our paths were to cross just the once, in 1965-66, when goals from Keith East and Dennis Brown gave us a home point on 28th May, and Jimmy Lawton's effort gave us share in the 1-1 draw away.

Following City's promotion, we met again on 29th October 1977, winning 4-0 here in front of 7,021. David Moss, Ray McHale and Trevor Anderson (2), gave us victory. However, after five seasons together we were relegated, and didn't meet again until last season when Colin Gordon's two goals gave us a 2-0 win with 2,696 present.


Hit Man Paul

In Town Tonight

The task of Colin Appleton the former Hull City and Swansea Manager is similar to that of Lou Macari's. Trying to find a successful blend which will give the St. James Park Club a return to the Third Division.

There have been several changes in the Club's playing staff since the start of this season. The departure of striker Trevor Morgan to Bristol Rovers recently for £15,000 being the most prominent. The 'Grecians' have drawn their last two away matches at Wrexham and Cambridge United, having lost their first away match of the season at Aldershot by four clear goals! City have a balanced record at home with two home wins over Port Vale and Scunthorpe United while conceding defeat to Northampton and League leaders Southend United at St. James Park.

The following players have appeared in City's line up since the start of the season. Goalkeeper JOHN SHAW (31) was a player that interested Lou Macari during the close season. The former Bristol City 'keeper opted for Exeter City and he has appeared in all of City's early season matches. The Stirling born keeper who entered League soccer as an apprentice with Leeds United was surprisingly released by the Ashton Gate Club after missing only five League matches during the last three seasons!

Bristol born PHIL KING made seventeen League appearances last season, his first in the Canon League. The St. James Park Club have three players available who all are capable of filling any of the central defensive positions.

Local born JOHN IMPEY (31), joined City recently after appearing here at the County Ground, for our Reserve Team against Oxford United on trial. After joining Cardiff City as an apprentice for whom he made just 21 League appearances, John later played 284 League matches for Bournemouth. He has appeared in seventy two for Torquay United during the last two seasons.

The former Brentford defender JIM

McNICHOL (27) made 41 League appearances last season for Exeter City, his first with the Devon Club. Jim who has been capped at Under-21 level for Scotland, was a former Ipswich Town apprentice who played in one-hundred and fity League matches for Brentford.

Local born NICK MARKER (20) missed only one League match last season. During four seasons with City he has made

108 League appearances.

Full back KEITH VINEY (28) joined Exeter City from his home town club Portsmouth. The former Fratton Park Club apprentice appeared in 166 League matches for 'Pompey'. Since joining City he has missed just seven League matches in the last three seasons.

Welsh Under-21 International midfield player, DARREN GALE (21) joined the Club from Swansea City. The Port Talbot born player joined The Vetch Field Club as an apprentice making 37 League appearances for the South Wales Club before moving to St. James Park. He scored his first goal for the Club in the recent 1-1 draw at Cambridge United.

Exeter born STEVE HARROWER (23) joined the Club from nearby Western League Club Dawlish Town. He is now in his third season with Exeter. Steve has doubled his goal tally this season by scoring in the away match at Wrexham on September 14th and again three days later at Home to Scunthorpe in a 2-0 win at St. James Park. Former Manchester City apprentice GARY JACKSON made his League debut for the Maine Road Club in a 2-0 defeat at Tottenham on February 20th 1981. 



Insight

Yesterday the first of the inspections under the Safety of Sports Grounds Act, 1975 took place in response to our application for a Safety Certificate. At the time of writing this article we are unaware of the outcome but perhaps I can take this opportunity to write a few words on the subject.

The Football League have always believed that grounds should be as safe as possible for spectators. It is the expense involved as compared with the low income of the lower clubs which had hitherto prevented the fullest implementation of designation by H.M. Government.

We think it right that all Clubs be made safe as soon as possible but we feel that Government should at least help to meet the cost.

It is true, for example, that cinemas and theatres do not receive grants or subsidies for these purposes but art does receive Neither of grants for general purposes. them yield revenue to the Government. The Clubs on the other hand produce a VAT revenue on football activities alone of £6 and a half million. More to the point, if Clubs in any number were to go out of business through being unable to meet the requirements of the police and the local Safety Licensing Authorities the Pools Promoters would not have an adequate coupon to issue which would in turn lead to a loss of their revenue and in turn to a loss of revenue to H.M. Government whose Pool Betting Duty at a rate of forty two and a half percent will this year yield £212 million. Should the Government not take steps to preserve the revenue and to avoid killing the goose that lays the golden eggs? In passing, can the Government say why betting on horses on course carries a tax of only four percent and off course of eight percent and with much of this going back to racing whereas professional football, which yields so much in revenue, is not considered in its time of need.


There has been a Law and Order problem. It exists on the Continent, e.g., in Holland, Italy and West Germany but mitigated because in these countries the police and courts take urgent and severe action. Here in England there is an organised element determined to cause chaos and disruption and to incite others to do the same. We need:-

More police at grounds, these to be provided at Government's expense. It seems wrong that Clubs should have to pay for the preservation of Law and Order, something which every other citizen takes as a normal service. Clubs pay their taxes and are entitled to protection. Government meets the costs of the police eveywhere else and during the miners' strike, as an example, provided an ample police presence to safeguard wishing to continue to work who were, in the unlawfully view being Government's restrained by pickets. The same should apply to grounds just as it does in the areas around the grounds and away from the grounds.

Greater assistance for the police by use of close circuit television coupled with video recorders. Consideration should also be given to greater use of police dogs something which the Home Office discourages but which on the Continent has been found to be the greatest deterrent of all.

This season we have seen a marked improvement and, for the good of the game, let us pray that this problem is well on it's way to being a piece of football history.

I am sure we all wish to congratulate the players for their display at Sunderland in achieving a result that will give them every opportunity in their home tie to go forward into the next round of the Competition.
