



'Of course there were two spells with The second was Danny as the Manager. likened to the 'Return of the Prodigal Son'. It was hoped that he would be able to rekindle fires and boilers and repeat 1969 again. But the players he inherited like Tommy Jenkins, Ray Treacy, Ray Clarke, Alan Sprateley, Mick McGovern had no character and little skill. The players he had brought to the Club had departed. He stood little chance the second time.

'Everybody loves Danny, I have never heard a bad word said against him. He is the nicest of men. As a manager he exercised little or no discipline, his strong point was in getting good players and getting the best out of them. If you went to Danny today and asked him to find you the best full back in the Fourth Division, you would get the best full back'.

'He was funny and cavalier, everybody loved him, you could rightly call him the 'Arthur Daley' of football. A man who you could quote the sum of £100,000 if he wanted to buy your player. You would end up by selling the player for one third of the price. He was that persuasive. He was wonderful for Swindon Town and football in general, but this was his club without a doubt. One of the last characters in the game, they all seem to have drifted away in recent years'.

'I envy John, I wanted to be a player like John but unfortunately our playing | careers were worlds apart. I just was not in his class, no one should mistake that John was a great player. It was a pity and a tragedy that he was not born in Wales or Northern Ireland, if he had he would have collected a hundred and fifty caps with no bother. John always talks with a lot of He was not typical of a lot of the 'Jack the Lad' brigade that have inherited todays modern game. John would never be seen with bracelets and necklaces'.



LOU: His month's loan is now over and I want to sign him for a further period. Millwall agree Nick could stay at the County Ground for the rest of this season, after all Millwall could always call him back at any stage if they wanted to, so it would not bother them if he remains here.

Q: Has the teams form now deterred you from looking for any further signings?

LOU: No, I am still searching for players in certain positions. Whether you are top of a League or in a challenging position in the League you can always improve a team.

Backtrack

A LOOK AT GAMES SWINDON HAVE PLAYED ON OCTOBER 22nd

Tonight sees us embark on our eleventh Football League game played on this date, and chasing our fifth win. So far six have been played at Home, resulting in four wins, one draw, and only one defeat. However, our record away on this date is less promising as of the four played one has resulted in a draw, the others being defeats.

The last occasion we staged a match on date was two years ago, when Colchester were the visitors. After being one down at half-time. Swindon came back through David Hockaday and Andy Rowland to snatch the three points from This game also fourth placed United. marked the debut of Simon Gibson, signed on loan from Chelsea the day before, who promptly got his name in the book to mar the occasion. But it had been a different story some five years earlier, with the Town making the trip to Chester, where they lost by the only goal of the game in front of That defeat left us in seventeenth 3,539. spot in the Third Division, our lowest during the season. Two of our present squad played in that match, being David Moss and Chris Kamara.

Back through the records of 1966, and Swindon were home to the then Swansea Twenty-third in the Third Division, Swindon showed what they could do by knocking four past bottom placed Swansea. Don Rogers opened the account after nine minutes, with Mel Nurse getting the second twenty-two minutes later, and Dennis Brown adding the third before half-time, a higher score was anticipated. However, Swindon could only manage another one, Bruce Walker, making one of only 26 League appearances for Swindon, doing the honours. A crowd of 8,638 saw Swindon climb one place as a result of this win. Six years earlier a trip to Valley Parade, Bradford, proved fruit-less. A 2-1 defeat

was incurred, Cliff Jackson getting our consolation with just six minutes left on the clock.

October 22nd 1955 saw us play hosts to Colchester, and this time it was a 3-1 win. Well and truely bottom, Swindon steered to only their second win of the season when, first-half, goal-less Micklewright broke the deadlock in the 52nd minute. He added his second seven minutes later, interjected by Maurice Owen's 55th minute effort. The win did nothing for our League position, but at least the 6,373 went home happy for once. had years previously it Six Bournemouth who had come here to lose by Maurice Owen again the same score. scored, but this time it was Joe Simner who bagged two with 15,084 present.

Back to before the War, and October 1938 saw Mansfield inflict our only home defeat on this date so far, by two goals to one, Ben Morton netting our consolation. It was only our third defeat of a season that eventually saw us finish in ninth place. However, back in 1932 we suffered a heavy defeat at the hands of Norwich City, who were then playing at the Nest in Rosary Road. Although Jack Starsmore netted twice it was of little significance as 'keeper Les Berry retrieved the ball from his net on five occasions.

A further five years back in time saw Swindon turn out at The Den, home of Millwall, to participate in an entertaining three-all draw. Again only two names on the Swindon score sheet, Harry Morris being the one to net twice, with Les Roberts getting the odd one. Six years earlier had seen us play our debut League game on this date, when on 22nd October 1921 Exeter City paid us a visit at the County Ground. A goal from Bill Batty giving us a share of the points in the one-all draw.

A Storey and a Tail



There are some moments which transcend parochialism, opinion or immediate impact and are forever national legend. The four minute mile by Roger Bannister was one such event; so was England's World Cup victory in 1966. But it is improbable if any single occasion has ever compared with the 1923 F.A. Cup Final.

The match was the inaugural event in the gleaming new Wembley Stadium. At that time the largest and most imposing area anywhere in the world. No one knows how many were there that day, the official attendance? A mere 126,047! There were estimates that 250,000 crowded into the vast bowl. No one really knows. There were certainly traffic jams that make Gorse Hill look like an Irish country lane.

The contestants and players were almost irrelevant, Bolton Wanderers and West Ham United were part players in a drama that had only one star, a white horse called 'Billy' and his rider Police Constable George Storey.

Until 1923 all Finals had been played at a woefully inadequate Stamford Bridge and Crystal Palace. The F.A. decided that the Empire Stadium Wembley would house more adequately the vast crowds attending the ritual of the F.A. Cup.

Wembley was only one part of a vast circus that went under the name of the British Empire Exhibition. The exhibition and it's exotic sideshows came and went, but Wembley stayed.

The Stadium was built on a site known as 'Watkins' Folly - London's answer to the leaning Tower of Pisa - it was then in open country. In fact a sober crow could fly from Marble Arch in a straight flight for six miles. Without wings the patrons relied on Metropolitan Railway, calling at Wembley Park. Incidentally Sir Edward Watkins, the ex Chairman of the Metropolitan Railway had built the Folly as a supposedly lasting monument.

The Stadium was built in 300 working days, at a cost that a quarter of the receipts

taken at a modern day Cup Final would cover!

A Battalion of Infantry were marched round and round the Stadium to test the strength of the 25,000 tons of concrete and 25,000 steel rivets before it was declared open.

The preparation complete, everyone thought all precautions were adequate! They were all in for shock.

Around lunchtime on Saturday 28th April 1923, something like four times the maximum capacity were heading towards Wembley. The turnstiles were opened at 11.30 a.m. By 1.00 p.m. the Stadium was three quarters full. At 1.45 p.m. instructions were issued for the gates to be closed.

People still continued to arrive and converge on the entrances. At 2.00 p.m. Scotland Yard was asked for a large amount of Police. At 2.15 p.m. the crowd outside the Stadium broke through the barriers and an estimated further 100,000 obtained entrance into the Stadium. There were now 200,000 in the Stadium!

On reflection it was remarkable no one was hurt and very few were hurt. At 2.45 p.m. there seemed no way that the match would start. There were thousands on the pitch at that time. The Irish and Grenadier Guard's Bands were surrounded, it was suggested to King IV that he should leave, but he refused.

It would appear the late King displayed remarkable foresight, for it was then that the legendary White Horse Billy appeared to play a part that was to earn him equine immortality. Whether it was his colour that commanded attention no one will ever know, but gently both horse and rider eased the crowd back step by step until the game was able to start forty minutes later.

MANAGER COLIN MURPHY

The Edgeley Park Club come to the County Ground this evening beset by early season problems. Unable to use their ground due to safety regulations, they were forced to play their first five matches of the season away! Stockport have recorded away wins at Burnley, Crewe and Preston to date, while losing at Colchester (3-1), Rochdale (4-1), Northampton (3-1) and Torquay (4-3).

Included in the squad of players available to Colin Murphy the former Lincoln City Manager are: - Twenty-oneyear-old MICK SALMON who is now in his third season with Stockport. The former Blackburn Goalkeeper was signed on a free transfer in August 1983. Thirty-threeyear-old JOHN RUTTER is now in his tenth season with the Edgeley Park Club. He began his career as an apprentice with Wolverhampton Wanderers but never made the First Team and went on to play for A.F.C. Bournemouth and Exeter City before joining County in the summer of 1976. 




