

Monday October 28th seemed to be a day for whetting the appetites of West Country sports enthusiasts. The announcement that we were drawn at home to Bristol set the pulse racing throughout Wiltshire, Avon and Somerset. As if that was not enough it was then announced that Gloucester had been drawn at home to Bristol in Rugby's equivalent of the F.A. Cup, the John Player.

It is the round ball that is our game, although the Town players have been seen with the oval version in training! The prospect of a nerve tingling Saturday afternoon against the Ashton Gate Club in the most illustrious of all football's competitions will be welcomed with fever pitch excitement. It will be the first meeting between the two clubs in the F.A. Cup.

What of City this season? Although widely predicted to be one of the forerunners in the Third Division promotion they have struggled to find consistency. Despite the addition of Keith Waugh from Sheffield United in goal, the aggression of Brian Williams in defence and the height of former Cambridge United central defender David Moyes. The brief introduction of our former midfield player Gary Emmanuel and the re-introduction to League soccer of David Tong, none of which has yet brought the consistency that Manager Terry Cooper was seeking.

Yet, let no one be under any false illusions, the Ashton Gate Club are capable of producing the most fluent brand of soccer that can be witnessed in Division

Three. Whatever problems they have encountered, will be put to rest in the steely atmosphere that will be generated here at the County Ground.

While we wait with baited breadth for the excitment that only the F.A. Cup can bring. The anticipation will be no less within the confines of Ashton Gate and it's supporting rural areas. One can almost anticipate the relish with which former Town players Howard Pritchard and Brian Williams will look forward to November 16th.

The Ashton Gate Club regained some composure at home following defeat in their first two matches when they lost 3-2 to Walsall and then 2-1 to Gillingham. Since August they have defeated Wigan Athletic (1-0), Blackpool (2-1), Darlington (1-0) and Wolves by 3-0.

While in away matches their only success was at struggling Cardiff City in a 3-1 win. They have suffered heavy defeats at Bournemouth (0-5), Notts County (0-4) and at Bury (3-6). They also lost 2-0 at Rotherham and have shared the points in 1-1 draws at York City and Newport County.


Another heavy away defeat came when they visited Hereford United in the First Leg of the First Round in the Milk Cup losing 5-1. They gained a little self respect in the Second Leg at Ashton Gate winning 2-0. It should not be forgotten that we conceded four goals on our visit to Edgar Street earlier this season, so no clear guideline there.

What of Lou Macari, he witnessed the City debacle at Hereford and will no doubt be paying further attention to the Ashton Gate Club before the F.A. Cup tie.

It will be a day that Chris Ramsey will look forward to, for Chris was rejected by the Ashton Gate Club without a League opportunity. Their loss, our gain, via Brighton of course. Former Darlington striker Alan Walsh is Bristol City's leading goalscorer with six goals, while Steve Neville and Howard Pritchard has scored four goals each. Both Glynn Riley and Steve Johnson have struggled with their form this season. Having only scored twice before last Saturday's match at Doncaster and this evening's encounter at Lincoln.



There are no prizes if you have heard any of the following, but it helps to show that soccer is a game to be enjoyed and it has it's lighter moments.

A book could be written of the jokes and humour associated with the late Bill Shankly and his Scottish good humour. Any Liverpool supporter will tell you of the time when a hairdresser asked Bill if he wanted anything off the top. Quick as a flash came the reply, 'Aye Everton!'.

Somewhere up there Bill must have been pulling his hair out in handfuls last season as Howard Kendall took Everton to League and Cup Honours.

Did you know that there are no photographic records of the earliest England Internationals? At the first, in 1872 players refused to say whether they would buy prints or not, so the photographer refused to take any pictures! At the second they all pulled faces, so no prints were ever made!

No names mentioned but there was a classic example last season where a Swindon Town player shouted at the Referee, 'You know nothing about the game, Ref!' He was promptly told, 'Maybe, but that is what comes from watching players like you'. Sorry.....

During the 1927 Cup Final, Arsenal's goalkeeper Dan Lewis was very unfortunate and kept dropping more than the fair amount of shots that came his way. After the match he blamed that on the grease in his new jersey. Even to this day Arsenal wash all their keepers new jerseys before they are worn.

Back in the fifties a centre half was faced with the task of outwitting the fleetfooted Preston forward Tom Finney. As Tom sailed past him, he shouted, 'Off side', 'Play on' said the ref. 'You must be blind!' retorted the frustrated player. 'What did you say?' enquired the ref very slowly 'Aha!' Deaf as well as blind!' came the reply.

A man walked into a doctors surgery (no not Dr. J. Nicholas) and the doctor says, 'Now then what's the matter with you?'. 'Well I've got a bad back, doctor' replies the man. 'That's nothing' said the doctor,

'My team's got two!'.

Jimmy Rooney who was a Scot, was not allowed to celebrate his hundredth appearance for Australia by captaining the team, as the Team Manager Rudi Gutendorf, a German, thought it was wrong for a foreigner to be a captain!'.

Why is it that all goalkeepers, are regarded to be mad? It was a question once asked of a famous England keeper, hardly surprising he answered, 'When you think that they spend most of their time watching some of the idiots in front of them trying to play football'.

A story that relates to one of football's finest centre forwards of the 1930's is when Everton's Dixie Dean who was said to be walking down a street in Liverpool and coming in the opposite direction was Liverpool goalie Elisha Scott. He spotted Dixie and shouted to him. Dixie nodded his head. Elisha's immmediate reaction was to dive sideways into the gutter to save the goal!

At the turn of the century, there were sheep grazing on the Morton pitch at Cappielow Park. One was adopted by centre forward, Tommy Gracie, it was christened Toby and for many years he acted as the team mascot.

Unfortunately fun and soccer don't go together so much in the modern day and most tales refer to a bygone age. Although you can be sure that in sixty years from now they will be telling tales of the eighties. Some of you may be around then and relating stories of the present day.

Backtrack

Our meetings with Cambridge United have been very limited to date. In fact, tonight sees only their second visit to the County Ground! The first occasion was for a Third Division match on April 4th 1978, a game that the Town needed to win to stay in with a (slight) chance of promotion. However, with United in second place, it was always going to be a struggle, and it was no real surprise that it ended goal-less. Swindon started well with Chris Guthrie shooting wide from a David Moss nod-on, and Ray McHale had his powerful shot well saved by 'keeper Malcolm Webster. But this opening zest soon disappeared as United began to exert themselves on the game.

And, having contained the home side in the first-half, United came out for the second looking for the win. But with our defence holding strong we gradualy began to force our way back into the game. With Moss and David Cunningham inspiring from the wings in the last 20 minutes, McHale came close with an 8 yard shot that came off the underside of the bar before bouncing out. John McLaughlin followed up with a powerful drive, only to see Webster smother it. At the other end Tom Finney came close for United, but with only Jimmy Allan to beat he shot over. all it was a poor game, and although the Town still have a mathmatical chance of promotion, it would hardly be deserved if this performance was anything to go by. The away game the previous September saw us go down by five goals to two when Floyd Streete (2), Tom Finney, Alan Biley and Peter Silvester netted for the home side. David Moss and a Ray McHale penalty reduced the arrears, but to no

avail, with 4,423 in attendance.

Some three years earlier, on August 6th 1974, we travelled to the Abbey Stadium as part of our build up to the 1974-75 campaign, but again with little joy. Going under 2-0, Swindon never managed to get to grips with the United midfield, and were lucky not to lose by more. Defending for most of the game, Jimmy Barron made some vital saves, namely from Dave Lill, Pat Kane and Kevin Tully. One attempt, from Gordon Howell, did get past Barron, but luckily came back out off the post.

After losing striker Dave Smith with a twisted ankle, Cambridge's pressure finally paid off in the 29th minute when a 30 yard shot from Ray Sealey had Barron beaten all the way. Swindon, though, were making little impression up front, their best chances coming in the second-half when Ray Clarke headed over, and Wilf Dixon shot wide. In fact the Town didn't have a single shot on the target during the whole of the 90 minutes! David Cassidy got United's second with just a few minutes remaining, leaving Town manager Danny Williams with a few problems to solve, with just over a week left before the start of the League season.





WHO WAS HE? - AND THANK YOU!

Few players can have made such a dramatic entry into their first appearance for any League Club as 29-year old Richard Key did when he played in last Tuesday evening's Milk Cup tie with Sheffield Wednesday.

Many of you were asking yourself who is he? Well a little information on Richard will help fill that void.

Richard was born in Coventry and joined his home town club from amateur football. He failed to make the Highfield Road Club's first team moving to Exeter City in 1975. After making his League debut in a 1-0 defeat against Torquay United in a 'Devon Derby' match at Plainmoor. The six foot 'keeper quickly established his postion in the St. James Park line-up making 109 League appearances in three seasons with the Devon Club.

He moved to Cambridge United in 1979 appearing in one League match at Oldham at the end of the 1978-79 season. It was not until October 11th 1980 that Richard appeared again in the Abbey Stadium line-up. Who were the opponents? Yes, it was

Oldham Athletic. That match signalled the first of thirty consecutive appearances for Richard that season. His appearances were limited to twenty-one during the following two seasons. He spent a two match loan period with Northampton Town in November 1982.

Richard moved to Orient in 1983 making 42 League appearances in the Brisbane Road Club's Third Division campaign of the 83-84 season. After missing only four League matches that season he was surprisingly given a free transfer.

After joining Sunderland last season, he failed to make the Roker Park line-up and Richard was released to appear again for Cambridge United in their bid to avoid relegation, appearing in their final thirteen League matches.

The manager who took Richard to Cambridge originally was the former Abbey Stadium chief John Docherty, who is now assistant to Frank McLintock at Third Division Brentford.

When Lou Macari found himself in dire straits following the walk out by Scott Endersby.....Well you know the rest!

In Town Tonight

Cambridge United who were relegated from the Third Division last season have been finding that life is just as uncomfortable in the Fourth.

A heavy defeat at Tranmere in their first away match of the season was the fore-runner of a further 6-2 defeat at Wrexham last month. Two 4-1 scorelines inflicted by Port Vale and Colchester United have also sent the Cambridge team back to the Fen Land in disgruntled mood. Their only consolation prior to last Friday evening's match at Stockport was obtained from drawn matches with Halifax (1-1) and Scunthorpe United (0-0).

At home the Abbey Stadium Club have recorded three wins in their last four matches to indicate that they may have begun to stabilise their results at home after suffering early season home defeats to Southend United and Aldershot.

The squad of players available to manager Ken Shellito includes:-Goalkeeper ROGER HANSBURY who is now in his second spell with the club. Roger who began his career with Norwich City spent two years with the Carrow Road Club before moving to Burnley. At the end of last season he was given a free transfer and joined Cambridge United in June. Thirty year old Roger made 78 League appearances for Norwich and eighty three for the Turf Moor Club.

Former Stoke City defender GEOFF SCOTT joined United this summer after being given a free transfer by Northampton Town. After making his League debut for Stoke in October 1977, he stayed with 'The Potteries' Club until February 1980 making 76 League appearances and scoring 3 goals. Geoff then moved to Leicester, after 39 matches for the Filbert Street Club, he moved to Birmingham City. Nineteen League matches and eight months later he moved to Charlton before joining Northampton Town.

Twenty-seven year old STEVE DOWMAN is another former Charlton player who was given a free transfer at the

end of last season. Steve began his career with Colchester United for whom he made 154 League appearances scoring 21 goals. The London born defender joined Wrexham playing 87 League matches for the North Wales Club before returning south to appear in 61 League matches for Charlton.

Since joining United on loan from West Ham, twenty-two year old KEITH McPHERSON has had the joy of scoring his first League goal against Preston and the misery of conceding an own goal to Orient. The former Upton Park apprentice made his League debut in the final match of last season when West Ham lost 3-0 to mighty Liverpool.

England Youth International MICK BENNETT began his career with Bolton Wanderers where he made 65 appearances. Mick joined Wolves at the start of the 1983/84 season moving to United in March 1984. The twenty-two year old defender made 34 League appearances last season.

Newcastle born, 19 year old ANDY SINTON, is a product of United's youth scheme. With over 80 League appearances to his credit Andy made his League debut as a 16 year old against Wolves in November 1982.

Twenty-nine year old STEVE SPRIGGS who has made over 400 first team appearances for United is one of the smallest players in the Canon League at 5' 3". The former Huddersfield apprentice joined United in 1975.

Fellow midfield player STEVE PYLE is a product of United's youth team. The 22 year old North Shields born player scored an eleven minute, second half, hat-trick in the opening day match with Hartlepool United this season!

Midfield player TOM FINNEY is a Northern Ireland International who entered the Football League with Luton, who signed him from Crusaders for £17,000 in 1973. A year later he moved to Sunderland for £70,000. He moved to United in 1976, after 268 League matches in which he scored 56 goals he joined

Cambridge United

Brentford for a short spell before returning to Abbey Stadium last season.

ALAN COMFORT is a England Youth International who joined United from Q.P.R. in September 1984 as a loan player before signing full time in October. The former Q.P.R. apprentice made 31 League appearances last season.

Free scoring DAVID CROWN is United's leading marksman this season with 8 goals. The former Brentford winger who figured in an exchange deal with Portsmouth for our injured midfield player Chris Kamara, joined United from Reading this summer. The 27 year old former

Walthamstow player made 88 League appearances for the Elm Park Club scoring 14 goals.

The much travelled STEVE MASSEY was a player who once interested our former manager Ken Beamish. The 27 year old striker joined United from Hull City during the close season. The Abbey Stadium Club is his sixth club. Steve has made the following appearances, Stockport 101 - 20 goals, Bournemouth 97 - 19, Peterborough United 18 - 2, Northampton Town 60 - 26, Hull City 42 - 9. Steve scored twice here at the County Ground in Northampton's 5-1 win on Sunday May 8th 1983.

Youth on our side






