Team Call

After a patchy start to the season Swindon, under Manager **LOU MACARI**, have really put their act together and now look near certainties for promotion.

Though Macari is still registered as a player he has more or less hung up his boots after an illustrious playing career that brought him 24 caps for Scotland. Started his career with Celtic but really made his name with Manchester United for whom he made well over 300 league appearances.

There were problems with the goalkeeping early in the season and SCOTT ENDERSBY who was the custodian elect when the campaign started found himself at odds with the management. JAKE FINDLAY the former Luton keeper and RICHARD KEY on loan from Brentford filled in for a while. But when the experience KENNY ALLEN was freed by Torquay, Swindon snapped him up. Now 35 Allen has been the regular keeper for most of the season. The club have also a promising young apprentice keeper in ALAN CHURCHYARD. The right-back position belongs to coloured player CHRIS RAMSAY. Was originally on Bristol City's books but went to Brighton where he made a number of first team appearances. Arrived at Swindon on loan, but was eventually bought from "The Seagulls".

On the other flank **NICKY COLEMAN**, on loan from Millwall, made a number of appearances. In recent times however, **PAUL ROBERTS**, who was signed on non-contract forms last September, has been in the No. 3 shirt. Now 23 he was in the Millwall team for around 150 matches, then had a spell with Brentford.

Central defender COLIN CALDERWOOD, who was 21 in January, was a close season signing from promotion rivals Mansfield Town. While another young player DAVID COLE — secured from Cardiff City last season — is the other usual member of the back four. CHARLIE HENRY, now in his sixth season with the club, was an apprentice at the County Ground. Can play either in defence or in a midfield role and is a regular

in the team. In midfield LEIGH BARNARD, who spent five seasons with Portsmouth as a youngster, joined Swindon at the start of the 1982/83 season. Just before that he had a loan spell with Peterborough. CHRIS KAMARA, who like Barnard started his career at Portsmouth, is now in his second spell at Swindon. He first appeared for the Wiltshire club back in 1977, but four years later Portsmouth took him back. He then moved to Brentford for two seasons before returning to the club last August. DAVE HOCKADAY who joined Swindon on a free transfer in the summer of 1983, spent eight seasons with Blackpool before moving south. Likes to play wide on the right, 28 years of age. Discovered playing for Oldbury Town in the Birmingham area COLIN GORDON has made a big impression up front. Together with BRYAN WADE, a stonemason by trade, signed from Southern League club Trowbridge Town, Gordon was among the finds of last season.

PETER COYNE in a goal studded career as a youngster in Manchester United's youth and reserve team sides was hailed as a fine prospect. But things turned sour for him at Old Trafford and he drifted into non-league football. One of Macari's first signings and has repaid by getting among the goals. Latest signing is striker DAVE BAMBER from Portsmouth. Had a loan spell earlier in the season with the club, but they refused to pay Pompey's asking price of £25,000 for the player. Now signed for a much reduced fee. Started his career with Blackpool.

ANDY WOLLEN is a 19 year-old midfield player signed pro. after being an apprentice at the club. Forward MARK PAYNE also a former apprentice has made a handful of first team appearances as has another 19 year-old MARK GARDINER.

DAVID MOSS who was with Swindon from 1969 to 1978 before moving to Luton rejoined Swindon last July. While MARK HUGHES and JAMES REYNOLDS are two former apprentices who were awarded full contracts earlier this season.

News on Four

A quick glance at current form suggests that tonight's visitors Swindon Town, and our last opponents at Layer Road, Mansfield Town, are as good as home and dry in the promotion stakes. But is also emphasises how Chester and Hartlepool, who were the other two front runners have faltered in recent games.

Chester, just one victory in their last six matches, (bear in mind these notes are being written on March 20th), and Hartlepool with a similar record have jeopardised their chances.

STILL WIDE OPEN

Luckily for them their closest pursuers Port Vale, Stockport and Orient have also suffered hiccups so the third and fourth positions are still wide open.

The form book also reveals that Torquay, under Stuart Morgan, have staged a late revival, 14 points from their last six matches has lifted them off the foot of the table. While Crewe Alexandra and Halifax Town who were recently rooted in the bottom four have also been putting results together and are pulling away from danger. As a result neighbours Cambridge United and Preston North End are now in serious trouble.

While our next opponents Peterborough, will have an added urgency when we meet at London Road. They need points to clear the re-election zone although they have a cushion of games in hand after their good cup run. Certainly interest at both ends of the table looks certain to be maintained

right up to the end of the season.

It will have been interesting to see in the week leading up to tonight's match how many new signings are made before the transfer deadline arrived.

BARRETT SIGNS

Chester, whose promotion push has shown signs of flagging, have borrowed teenage midfielder Earl Barrett from Manchester City. City seem to have a policy of loaning out young players to lower division clubs to gain league experience. Darren Beckford, Geoff Lomax, Steve Kinsey and Steve Redmond have all had loan spells away from Maine Road.

NOW AT CREWE

When Lincoln City released 24 year-old defender Mark McCarrick, Dario Gradi was quick to move in to take him to Crewe. McCarrick attracted Crewe's attention as a youngster when he was with neighbouring Witton Albion. But he signed for Birmingham who after 15 games let him go to Lincoln.

HALIFAX SIGNING

Halifax have now completed the signing of 20 year-old Mick Galloway from Mansfield Town. The young defender was previously on loan at The Shay. Meantime Preston's bad luck continues with goalkeeper Phil Harrington, who was on loan at Deepdale from Blackpool, breaking his leg. While John Durham who was with Torquay has moved up the road to struggling Exeter.

It has been quite a season so far for Charlie Henry, Swindon Town's play anywhere man. Up to this season Charlie had played in every position except left wing and goal for the club. He had scored just three goals in 140 games. Out through injury for a long spell early in this campaign he returned in the subs role against Cambridge United. After just four seconds on the field he scored direct from a free kick. He got another goal in the next game against Scunthorpe and then came his big day. Playing at Deepdale he scored a hat-trick against Preston North End.

He joined Swindon as a boy seven years ago and soon established himself in the team and has now featured — mainly as a defender — in the squad for the past six seasons.

Leeds born Tony Kenworthy, who was capped by England at Youth Level, has joined Mansfield on loan. Kenworthy now 28, joined Sheffield United as an apprentice in 1974.

Signed as a full pro. two years later and this is his testimonial year. Made close on 300 league appearances in the Blades back four and scored 34 goals.

His signing comes at an opportune time for The Stags as Field Mill defender Mark Kearney is out for the rest of the season through injury.

TWO THREES

Two hat-tricks — one for either side — were a feature of the recent Eastern Counties League v Essex & Suffolk Border League Anniversary match at Sudbury.

Dave Hubbick, the popular Colchester United Reserve team striker was the man of target for the E.C.L. He could have had four but missed a penalty.

The other goals in the E.C.L.'s 5-3 win were netted by Braintree's Chris Guy and Nigel Barton of Stowmarket.




News in Reserve

Four more points from our last two games, both away, keeps us right up there in the table. But we face a hectic run in to the end of the season. John Reeves and Hubbick got their names on the scoresheet, but I am told Sean Norman's header was the best of the four goals. Good to see Sean getting his name on the scoresheet, not that I mind who gets them as long as we keep knocking them in.

Jason Burman, who of course, prefers to play in the middle of the defence, came in at right back and as usual the youth team did a good job for the side. Dave Hubbick and Graham Arnold earlier in the week both played in the B.S.E.L. side in the anniversary match at Sudbury and Dave scored a hat-trick. It could have been four — he missed a penalty. I am also pleased to report that Mick Payne has signed for the club on non-contract forms. Mick first played for us last season, and this time round had a long spell out with injury. Since his return he has done extremely well and should have a good future in the game.

Youth Team

You cannot miss chances and still hope to win games. That is the lesson to be learned from the 1-1 draw against Bournemouth at Spring Lane. We could and should have scored at least five five goals. Our visitors had just two opportunities in the whole 90 minutes and they scored from one of them. We had at least eight good chances and only put one away.

In the opening half Mark Jarmyn was virtually unemployed in our goal, while his opposite number Coombes had a busy time. But a lack of quality in and around the Bournemouth penalty area meant a goalless 45 minutes. Scott Young uncharacteristically missed an open goal, Gary Higgins just outside the six vard box scooped his shot over the bar, Neil Dakin had a couple of far post chances, while Andy Springett contrived to miss a sitter. Young was however, unlucky when his 25 yarder beat the keeper but went tantalisingly wide.

The second half was almost a repeat story. There were two or three near misses before we finally scored a long overdue goal. Young with a clever lay-off put Richard Walker clear, and the trialist from Canvey Island obliged with a good goal. Just when it seemed that score would be good enough to secure the two points, Bournemouth equalised. John Ray had all the time in the world to clear, hesitated, and Tate won the ball and ran through to stroke the ball past Jarmyn.

Considering Bournemouth were sitting in third position in the table, this was a good performance. But it should have been even better, and there lies the rub. Failing to put chances away and conceding a daft goal cost us a point.

With eight games left and occupying a mid-table position it could be said that for a first season in the South Eastern Counties League we have not done too badly. Quite apart from the actual results however, there is no doubt the standard needed is much higher than it was in the Border League.

At the time of writing we were due to travel to Hitchin to play the Eastern Junior Cup semi-final tie. Hopefully a full squad available - with Jason Burman and Stephen Miles making their mark in the reserves we have rarely had a full squad to call on.

The next few weeks, quite apart from the remaining league commitments, are going to be really busy. The plans for the Holland trip have to be finalised, while thoughts are already turning to next season. Some of the present squad will be over-age by August so the search is on for players for the 1986/87 campaign. By the time these notes appear we shall have had three teams out at Shotley in trials at Under-18, Under-16 and Under-14 levels. While at Spring Lane an Under-16 tournament with four teams taking part, including two teams of trialists will have taken place.


Supporters Club News



League Tables and Facts

THEY SERVED BOTH

Five players — four since Colchester were elected to the Football League in 1950 - have worn the colours of the U's and of Swindon Town. The first was in the U's Southern League days. In the 1945/46 season Stan Titcombe - when serving with the 15th I.T.C. at Colchester - played at Layer Road as a wartime loan player. Stan also played for Ipswich Town, and before the war for Swindon. John McClelland though born in Colchester joined West Ham. Returning to Layer Road he played for the U's Reserves before moving to Stoke City then Swindon, Fourteen games and one goal for them and that was against Colchester on December 18th, 1974. Wilf Dixon joined Colchester on trial from Reading. Played in one game but left after three weeks and joined Swindon and figured in 140 league games in their colours. Then in December 1973 Ray Bunkell moved from Swindon to Colchester in part-exchange for John McLaughlin. Bunkell had 56 league games for Swindon and 129 for the U's.





Watching a football match in order to report it is not to be compared with viewing from the terraces. The dictates of journalism ensure that a reporter's view of the game is likely to be less extreme than that of the average paying fan. The real task of the pressman is to report as fairly and accurately as he can what he sees. A lot of critics, put in that position, would find the job extremely difficult.

At the same time the scribes who cover their local team week in, week out understand that those critical of their team's play are not necessarily attempting to "knock" the club. Some of the most critical do it because of the measure of affinity they feel. It is often an expression of sheer frustration felt by supporters for the team they love when they have not fared as well as they think they should have done. When someone cares deeply it is easy to panic unduly at signs of weeknesses imaginary or otherwise. Emotional reactions however, are not for the pressbox. That is why so often press reports come under fire from the man who pays at the turnstiles. The reporters job is to record what he sees, not what he would like to see. Or what the spectators or indeed, the Manager imagines he should see.




The Tenner Start


When Swindon Town became a professional club in 1894 their total wages bill was just £10 a week. That was the year they became founder members of the Southern League. That season they finished bottom of that league. The following campaign they did better finishing fourth, but money was so scarce four of their best players left to join Nottingham Forest.

By 1902 things were so bad that the club almost went under but thanks to still remembered Sam Allen and a few friends the problems were overcome. By 1906 Swindon fought their way into the first round of the F.A. Cup. In 1908 they got as far as the third round and by 1910 were good enough to reach the semifinal. En route they won 3-1 at Crystal Palace, beat Burnley 2-0 at home, before accounting for Spurs 3-2 in the Third Round. Another home draw saw Manchester City sent packing 2-0 and so to a semi-final tie with Newcastle. After a dour struggle at White Hart Lane the North Easterners won 2-0 and went on to win the cup. They reached the quarter-finals again in 1910-11 finally bowing out 3-1 at Chelsea. But the following year saw them in the last four once again beating West Ham and Everton on the way. There they fought out a 0-0 draw with Barnsley at Stamford Bridge before going down 1-0 in the replay at Meadow Lane. Nottingham.

For good measure between 1907 and 1914 they

won the Southern League championship twice and were never lower than fifth in the table. When football resumed after World War One, they became founder members of Division Three South and between them and season 1963/64 were never out of Division Three. Twice since then they have had a brief sojourn in Division Two, but by 1982 dropped into Division Four for the first time. A situation they look like remedying this season. Their cup record in these years continued to be quite impressive reaching the Third Round or better on 15 occasions. Their biggest triumph however, in post Second War years was winning the League Cup in the 1968-69 season. They also won the Anglo-Italian Cup in 1970. Founded as long ago as 1881 by a clergyman the Rev. W. Pitt as an amateur club, Swindon have produced a number of well known players. Perhaps the best known was Harold Fleming an inside-forward who won nine England caps. He would never play on a Sunday and despite many attractive offers could never be tempted to leave his home town club. All his playing career was spent in the Southern League. Grenville Morris was capped by Wales 21 times. John Walker nine times by Scotland. In more recent times, Rod Thomas was a regular in the Welsh side winning 50 caps, while John Trollope (still with the club on the staff) played a record 770 matches between 1960 and 1980.





250 Club

Ignoring a few men who figured in only the odd game for Colchester United, 250 players have won the club colours since Football League status was acquired in 1950. During this season the programme will feature an A to Z of the 250, a sort of "Where are they now?" with perhaps the odd reference to those who gave good service in the reserves without ever quite making the big time.

GEORGE WRIGHT George now a pensioner living in his native Plymouth was the U's first keeper when they entered the league. Played for Plymouth Argyle as a youngster pre-war but joined the U's from non-league football. Made 160 league appearances for Colchester before retiring at the age of 36. Managed several non-league clubs and applied for job at Layer Road when Benny Fenton left and Neil Franklin was appointed. Was a qualified carpenter.

JOHN WRIGHT Was the U's Reserve Team keeper for seven or eight seasons. Made just five league appearances. Later joined police force, worked as a moulder and electricity board employee

in Clacton.

PETER WRIGHT Was on Colchester's books for 14 seasons. A fast-tricky winger who had several chances to move to top league club. But as he once said, "I play football for enjoyment". That he did very successfully as a part-timer. Made well over 450 league and cup appearances for the club—and held the club record until Micky Cook passed his total in the 1980's. A local man who has for many years now been the genial host at Woods Sports Club. Besides his outstanding service to the U's he also helped Haverhill Rovers, Halstead and Long Melford before finally hanging up his boots.

STEVE WRIGHT Peter's son, who will be 27 in June. Played 127 games in the centre of the U's defence after graduating through the reserve side. Moved to HJK Helsinki and played for them in European Cup football against Liverpool. Later joined Bobby Roberts at Wrexham and played 76 league games for them before joining Torquay

United.

This concludes the 250 Club although we are always pleased to have news of former players.

Before finishing our brief sketches of favourites of yesteryear, we thought it appropriate to mention a few other players who gave the club good service without ever establishing a first team place.

DENNIS BARRETT As far as we can trace Dennis, a local lad, was the club's first apprentice during Neil Franklin's reign as the manager. A regular in the reserves. He was picked as substitute

for one first team game but never come on.

DAVID BUCK Brother of goalkeeper Allan, gave sterling service as a wing-half in the reserves. Considered at the time unlucky not to get a first team opportunity. Was chosen twice in the substitutes role but had to sit it out on the bench.

ANDY GOODING A local lad who was an apprentice at Layer Road in the early seventies. Played in the back four and again was substitute on one occasion for the senior side without getting on the field.

DES KELLY A goalkeeper signed from Norwich City in June 1972. One league appearance. Hailed from Limerick in Ireland. Reserve team keeper for two seasons.

DAVID LAITT Another local player who was a second team regular in the half-back line for some time. Again chosen once as substitute without getting a kick.

DAVE LAMONT Dave who will be 45 next week — April 4th, was another stalwart at reserve team level for several seasons and later figured prominently in local football. An aggressive wing-half yet another who many fans felt never got a real opportunity back in the 60's.

COLIN LUNDSTROM A forward signed from Ipswich Town in July 1961. Made just one first team appearance. Later played for Clacton, Sudbury and Halstead and coached Donyland Swifts.

JOHN O'DONNELL A defender who appeared in one first team game while on loan from Cambridge United in 1975. After leaving Layer Road played for Hartlepool United and Carlisle United.

KEN O'ROURKE Played in one league game and in an F.A. Cup tie against Chesham United after signing from Ipswich in October 1968. Later played for the now defunct Bedford Town before joining the Metropolitan Police.

BILLY TELFORD Played in one match while on loan from Peterborough United in January 1976.

IVAN THOROGOOD Ivan had the misfortune to be at Layer Road at a time when the club were well off for back four men. A local man he was an outstanding performer in the reserve team and must count as the unluckiest player never to get a league outing. Was chosen for first team three times but each time the game was postponed.
