Chairman's Chatter

I would like to welcome to the County Ground this afternoon the Directors, Officials, Players and Supporters of Aldershot Football Club.

This is the first opportunity that I have had, to explain to you all the recent negotiations which we have completed with Thamesdown Council, regarding

facilities here at the County Ground.

Our first approach to the Council concerned the feasability of whether the Club could purchase the freehold of the County Ground. Unfortunately the Council were unable to agree to our proposal.

With a debt of £91,000 incurred in Mortgage arrears, which because of our £48,000 per year payment schedule was tending to increase, we had a difficult situation to overcome. Therefore it became imperative that Swindon Town Football Club was able to live within its own means again.

An agreement has now been finalised with the Council, whereby they have purchased all of the North Stand for the debt outstanding and the Club will now rent the whole ground back for the sum of £25,000 per annum, except for the area that once housed the Squash Club.

The lease will run until the year 2012 and the £25,000 per year rent will be linked to inflation by us paying twenty per cent of the average increase in admission prices to the Council, also if the Club are experiencing better days we will pay an additional sum equivalent to twenty per cent of the net income above an average gate of 5,000.

On behalf of my fellow Directors I would like to thank Thamesdown Council for their assistance in helping the Club to overcome a difficult period in the Clubs history.







Home and Away-Swindon don't

Swindon Town are certainly out to more than satisfy their supporters this season. While their home form this season is the stuff potential champions are made of, the Town continue to be nothing short of terrific on their travels.

After 18 away days, Lou Macari's men have recorded ten away victories on foreign soil. For all the hundreds of miles clocked up on their team coach they have thirty-one points — the best record

of any team in the Fourth Division.

And when you consider that five of their away wins have all been achieved at the homes of five of the Clubs in the top half of the table — Chester City (1-0), Stockport County (2-0), Northampton Town (1-0), Burnley (2-0) and Wrexham (1-0) — it makes an impressive record.

At the County Ground, the Town have been almost invincible, the merest hic-cup on the opening day of the season against Wrexham, the only defeat.

Following our record breaking Saturday when we defeated Burnley 3-1 here at the County Ground, only Hartlepool United had collected more points from their home matches. That was by virtue of having played three matches more and then they were only one point superior to Swindon Town!

Interesting to note that Lou Macari's men have the best defensive record of all the Fourth Division Club's in away matches, having conceded just eighteen goals from the same total of matches!

We have won more matches at home and away than any other team in the Division, to prove that Swindon Town adopt the most positive attitude. Lou Macari is proving himself a freak among modern day managers, for he allows his team to play without fear. Lou knows that fans want to be entertained and his team have provided that. The former Scotland International's, philosophy is the correct one to have. If you cast your mind back to some of Lou's early remarks when he first joined the Club you will recall that on several interviews that he stressed 'Defenders are paid to defend, that is their job'. Swindon Town's record this season proves that Lou gets what he demands. The Town have a most impressive defensive record - but after all, Swindon Town are a most impressive team this season.

WITH ROBERT STEPHENSON THE TOWN'S MANAGING DIRECTOR



EDITOR: A few seasons ago, the Club held an open day for the supporters to view the Club facilities. Would it be possible to repeat that enjoyable day?

ROBERT: We have had an open photography day which was very successful and your suggestion regarding an open day will certainly receive consideration.

EDITOR: Rotherham United employ a De-Luxe double tier team coach for their away matches. Would it be possible for Swindon Town to do so and allow the top tier to be utilised by travelling supporters. Such a proposal could minimise the cost of travel to the Club. Would you envisage an exclusive club be founded with supporters booking for a complete season of away matches?

ROBERT: Clearly a novel idea, which we might consider but I would image that a number of practical problems concerned with this idea would emerge.

EDITOR: A spectator asked if it was not possible to have a turnstile solely for season ticket holders? Having paid for the whole season, he felt he should not have to queue in pouring rain with the fans who attend on a more casual basis. He felt that the purchase of a season ticket should be accorded more consideration. What are your comments?

ROBERT: Using the same turnstile for children and season ticket holders in the past, has been practical in view of the gates of less than 5,000. However, with increased gates of late and hopefully in the future, it may be feasible to possibly give season ticket holders a separate turnstile and this will be looked at.

EDITOR: With the area in front of the North Stand a seemingly under employed piece of ground, Would the Club consider and investigate the possibility of utilising the area with an all weather surface? This would obviously enable the playing staff to train whatever the weather conditions and with lighting accommodated on the wall of the North Stand, the cost could be reclaimed by allowing local amateur clubs to train on the surface during evening periods. In fact Bristol Rovers utilise their Hambrook Training facilities.

ROBERT: Because of capital cost such a surface would have to be funded by outside backing. Especially in view of the fact that the Football Grounds Football Trust are no longer allowing clubs a grant to assist in putting down such a surface. It is also expected that we will have to provide a number of fire exits into that area for the North Stand, to comply with the Ground Safety Act, which would limit the space available.



The Town Crier talks to

The recent speculation regarding a proposed £2 million transfer deal between Italian clubs Bari and Torino, for the coveted signature of Paul Rideout, our former striker and more recently of Aston Villa. Promoted the Town Crier to talk to Paul, of life in the land of Lira and sunshine.

Although the current England Under-21 International has now been settled for a year in the southern town of Bari. What does Paul miss most about life in England? 'Naturally, my family and friends, whever you are in the world, they are

constantly in your thoughts,'

We often hear and see reports of the comparisons between English and continental soccer. A subject on which Paul had some interesting thoughts. 'Yes, I would say that Italian soccer is of a higher standard than I have experienced in England. This is mainly due to the fact that we do more training with the ball. This enables the players here to be better with their first touch, so ball control is much tighter and therefore I have found the Italian defenders close down on you more.' Paul added a reservation to his admiration of the skills he had encountered, by saying, 'I would have to say though, that the game is not as exciting as in England, For instance, there is a much slower build up and a lot of conjestion develops around the penalty area'.

Italy now the home of some of the games greatest players, seems to be the haven of stars of all nationalities, ranging from Poland to Brazil and Argentina to West Germany. What impression have they made upon the former England Schoolboy

scoring sensation?

'I cannot fail to improve playing against the likes of Diego Maradonna to name but one. Michel Platini impresses me immensely, he really does stand out and in a country where there are so many outstanding players. You really do have to be something special to attract the type of attention that he does.' The names of the world stars that Paul now shares the same stage as, began to roll from his tongue like version of soccer's who's who. 'Karl-Heinz Rumminegge is not only very skilful but strong as well. While Boniek of Poland is also a very good player.' Paul paused, almost as if he was reminiscing of days gone by. Reality was present and yes it was true, he was in their midst, he continued. 'You cannot help but learn so much from all of them, television also helps out here. The Italians really do know how to capitalise on football. Each Sunday evening you can watch the goals, while the stars are put under the microscope, so it enables me to develop my own game.' Paul was to later enlarge on his admiration of Italian screening of their favourite

With several British players now part of the Latin scene, Trevor Francis and Graeme Souness with Sampdoria, Liam Brady at Inter Milan, Mark Hateley and Ray Wilkins with A.C. Milan, is there much contact between the British stars? Somewhat surprisingly Paul answered, 'Not really, only when we play against each other. Ray Wilkins has always gone out of his way to be very helpful but we are all very appreciative of one another.'

Appreciation seemed to be a common bond between players in italy, as Paul further pointed out. 'Even opponents appreciate your skill and say so. Although the general impression outside of Italy, is that Italian football is not so sporting. I can definitely assure everyone, it is more so. The type of play makes you that way, patience is needed to break teams down and patience makes you more tolerant.'

Skill and patience but was there one aspect of play that the talented striker felt had developed his game to a level that he had not been able to achieve

if he had stayed in the Canon League?

The reply was most definite. The quality of the Italian defensive system has made a marked improve-

ment in my own standard of play."

The obvious question was, if that was so, how could English football benefit from the Italian game. Amusingly Paul immediately referred to the favourite topic of all who inhabit the British Isles. 'No way really, except for the weather.' Paul quickly added, 'Italian football is not so exciting as English soccer but they have greater ability with the ball.' That remark brought Paul full circle, thoughts were of home and home to Paul is Swindon Town, 'Do you know, all players could benefit themselves and a manager like Lou Macari, he allows players to express themselves and to a player in modern football, that means so much.' Paul, who takes an avid interest in Town affairs from afar, was pleased with Swindon's progress this season, 'It must be great for the supporters, I feel pleased for them."

The reference to supporters caused Paul to mention the fanaticism of the Italians. 'They really do support their clubs but they are so very excitable and you can imagine the difference I noticed after

being used to the reserved English fans."

British football is of an insular nature and we view in the majority of situations other standards as foreign to our own expectancy. Would Italian refereeing be of lower standard? Bari's leading goal-scorer held no such view. 'They are about the same as in England, there are good and bad, like most things in life.'

With matchdays in Italy on a Sunday, there is obviously a different daily schedule to what Paul was accustomed to during his Swindon Town and Aston Villa playing days. But how much variation? I asked Paul to give me a typical seven day preparation in

the life of the Italian soccer player.

'We have Monday off, after playing the previous day. On Tuesday afternoons we report for stretching and various exercises. We train all day on Wednesday, practising running with and without the ball. Then again on Thursday we report for all day training which involves shooting and five-a-side, in the afternoon we also specialise in developing skills.' Two full days of training was different to anything Paul had encountered in England, except when he was an apprentice here at the County Ground.

Paul continued. 'On Friday mornings we practice passing and five-a-side. Saturday mornings we have a light warm up and that evening we have to report for an overnight stay, at a hotel whether we are

playing at home or away."



With the Italian language one of the more difficult to master, how does Paul cope with communication with his manager or even his own teammates? There was no problem there. 'We have an interpreter Johnny Palladini.' 'We' refers to Paul's former Aston Villa team-mate Gordon Cowans, who has happily recovered from his broken leg and since been recalled to the full England International squad. 'I can speak the basic phrases and obviously in football language can soon understand left and right which is important for tactics.' added Paul.

With the sun almost continually beating down, how did the constant heat affect a player who had spent most of his life previously shivering? 'We sometimes play in a temperature of 90°, this obviously accounts for the slow build up in play here, the ball is constantly played among the defenders and for someone like me to have to play a lone role up front, it can become very exasperating. As you can see, it is totally different to the English First Division,' stated the frustrated striker.


The excursions whether to England or to another continental country in an England shirt must be welcome relief to the bevy of British exiles currently parading their skill before the Neopolitans.


