



This evening we have great pleasure in welcoming to the County Ground, the team, directors, officials and supporters of Southampton Football Club. We know the difficult task before us, now is the time for all the pre-match conjecture to be pushed into the background and the action to begin.

We are privileged to see among the players on display in tonights match, the incomparable and evergreen Peter Shilton, along with England defender Mark Wright, the accomplished Mark Dennis and the reliable Kevin Bond the son of the present Birmingham City manager. Jimmy Case formerly of Liverpool will line up in midfield alongside David Armstrong who probably possesses the most accurate left foot in the game today. All of these players will grace the County Ground this evening.

I am sure tonights visit to the County Ground will stir many memories for former Town midfielder Glenn Cockerill. Glenn probably did not fulfill his potential until he left the County Ground. Our former manager Bob Smith brought Glenn to Swindon and at that time Glenn had to compete with Chris Kamara, Roy Carter, Ray McHale and Brian Williams for the midfield spots, what a formidable selection problem for any manager at the time. Although one which I am sure they would all say that they prefer.

There is a special atmosphere surrounding cup matches and although it is generally accepted the F.A. Cup has through tradition been known as the Cup of Cups. I am also equally convinced that since the conception of the League Cup, this particular competition has seen a growing popularity, for it continually attracts 90 to 100,000 fans to Wembly for the Final each year.



Although initially several clubs decided not to enter the competition, the Littlewoods Challenge Cup now sees the full complement of League Clubs entering each year.

Here at Swindon we have a record to be proud of in this Competition and like all minnows we cannot be disparaging of any contest. We are proud to be a past winner and if things do not progress as we all wish tonight we shall all be a little sadder, but we will immediately be looking towards next seasons Autumn evenings.

Whatever the outcome of tonights encounter we must not forget that it is our League position that has the biggest bearing on what the outcome of our season is likely to be in terms of revenue and interest. We have to be looking towards an improvement in our position and a situation where we can be among the challenges for promotion.



Good evening and welcome to you all for this evenings Littlewoods Challenge Cup match with Southampton. We are hoping that we will improve on our First Leg match and reduce the deficit against the First Division Club. If we can obtain a goal early on anything can happen. We will not have to hope this happens, it is purely a situation of getting the ball into their penalty area and making things happen, hope never wins a match, effort and commitment will.

Despite the fact that Southampton are three clear goals to the advantage, I believe we are still in with a chance. 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

Swindon Town's Honorary Chaplain and occasional contributor to our Programme, the Rev Nigel Sands, examines the League-Milk-Littlewoods Cup tradition of providing the occasional unsung winner or finalist. If the newly named Littlewood Challenge Cup runs true to the form established by its predecessors, the League Cup and the Milk Cup, then the chances are that during the period for which it is played (the initial contract is for three years) it will provide at least one surprise winner - or at least a finalist - from among the less favoured clubs and, perhaps, even one from outside the 1st Division.

Alright, when you glance down the chart we've provided of previous League/Milk Cup Final results all the great names are there among the winners: Aston Villa, who won it in

Telephone 1961 when it was first contested (although that first and two-legged final was actually held over till the following season) were also the first club to win the trophy three times, and Liverpool won it four times in succession; Manchester City, Spurs and Nottingham Forest have each been successful. twice Chelsea, Leeds and Wolves have all had the Cup in their Boardrooms. But take another, longer look at that list of Finalists because some other club names that are possibly unexpected and certainly unpretentious are there to be seen.

Queens Park Rangers were still a Third Division Club when they won the first League Cup Final to be played at Wembley in 1967 and our own plucky Swindon Town, also from Division Three, beat opponents of no less pedigree than Arsenal in 1969. Then there's Stoke City, losing finalists in 1964 and winners in 1972: it isn't widely known the The Potters are the Football League's second oldest club and yet this single League Cup triumph is their only major honour. Norwich City won it in 1962 and again in 1985, while Oxford United, the present holders, only joined the League and became eligible to contest the trophy in 1962! So, even though there is no question that the League-Milk-Littlewoods Cup has now gained a front-ranking status in English football, (as well as providing a short route to European competition when that is restored to English clubs) yet this is the tournament where the large number of clubs that jockey for position behind the glamourous, media-soaked ones can set out in the serious hope and expectation that this time it will again be the turn of one of the unfancied contenders to tread the Wembley turf next Spring and to bring home the coveted trophy.

There will be fewer matches this season where the memory of our last meeting is fresher. Though nobody from Swindon can draw particular pleasure from the result at the 'Dell', Kenny Allen will have a more painful recollection than any of our 3-0 defeat. In covering a Colin Clarke goal attempt in the very first minute, Kenny damaged ankle ligaments to severly hamper his mobility for the rest of the game, in true goalkeeping spirit though, the Geordie keeper bravely carried on.

Southampton soon capitalised on Swindon's misfortune, some very accurate passing brought the ball to Jimmy Case on the right, who fired in a low cross for George Lawrence to open the scoring. Seven minutes later, Bryan Wade shot wide to register Swindon's first attempt on Peter Shilton's goal.

Glenn Cockerill, seeming to relish the opportunity to shine against his old club shot just over in the 21st minute in an effort to increase his already impressive goal-scoring record with the "Saints".

Despite intense pressure and obvious pain, Kenny Allen still got down to push away a low shot from Lawrence and tip over another Clarke header from the resultant corner. With the interval fast approaching, Swindon appeared to be holding out well, particularly after David Armstrong had missed the easiest of chances. The match took on a whole new perspective moments later though, as Lawrence got on the end of a Jimmy Case corner to put the Saints 2-0 up in the 43rd minute.


To go in two goals down at half time would have been bad enough, but George Lawrence was instrumental once more in making the "Towns" position worse. His cross seemed to hypnotise Chris Ramsey and with the invalid Allen stranded, Joe Jordon ghosted in at the far post to put his 'comeback' into the headlines the next morning. Jordan's goal effectively ended the "Town's" chances of getting a result that they could build on in the second leg.

The next day "Saints" boss Chris Nicholl blasted his players for a second half which Swindon controlled for long periods and at times seemed to have their first division opponents very much on edge.

A 69th minute shot from Jimmy Gilligan was the best chance of the night but the invincible Shilton tipped the ball over.

When considering tonights second leg and the three goal deficit facing the "Town" it should be remembered that there are no lost causes in football (perhaps with the exception of Fulhams chances against Liverpool!) In the first leg at the Dell, Swindon learnt that lack of involvement does not break Peter Shiltons concentration tonight we will hopefully learn that constant pressure does.

Matches between Swindon and tonights visitors Southampton stretch way back to 1895 when both sides were members of the Southern League, And they fought out many a battle in that league upto 1920. Southampton, like Swindon became original members of Division 3 in 1920 and Division 3(s) in 1921. Champions in 1921-22, the Saints were promoted to Division 2 and retained that standing until 1953. Following relegation, it took Southampton seven years before they gained promotion again. In 1959-60 sixty-one points gave them the 3rd Division title and the beginning of a new era within the club was born. Consolidating their status in Division 2, the Saints finally achieved every clubs ambition to play in the top Division Runners up to Manchester City in 1965-66 they were promoted to Division 1, and enjoyed eight years in the top flight.

Relegation followed again in 74 but two years later whilst still a 2nd Division club. Southampton produced the shock of the season.

Managed by Lawrie McMenemy the Saints reached the F.A. Cup final, and then against all the odds defeated the mighty Manchester United. A certain player, namely Lou Macan well remebers the defeat.

A goal from Bobby Stokes brought the trophy back to the Hampshire area, where unbelievable scenes greated the heros.

Within two years Southampton had gained promotion again and have remained in the top flight ever since, finishing runners-up in the championship race three years ago.

A trip back to Wembley in 1979, unfortunately didn't prove as successful as three years earlier. Southampton being beaten 3-2 by Notts. Forest in the Football League Cup. Over the years Southampton have become one of the most respected clubs in the country. Unlike most others, the board of directors have backed their managers to the hilt even when the going has got tough. Thus only six men since the war have held the position - Bill Dodgin (Snr), Sid Cann, George Roughton, Ted Bates, Lawrie McMenemy and the present manager Chris Nicholl, appointed in July last year. Over the last twenty years

many seasoned international players have been members of the Saints including Alan Ball, Peter Osgood, Terry Paine. Ron Davies, Mike Channon, Mick Mills, Peter Rodrigues, and Jim McCalliog. And present day - Peter Shilton, Mark Wright, Joe Jordon and Cohn Clark.

Tommy Jenkins, David Peach and Glenn Cockerill have worn both Swindon and Southampton colours and Paul Gilchrist who played in that 1976 epic final with Manchester Utd and later signed for Swindon, has remained in the Wiltshire town running his own fitness centre.

Chris Nicholl (manager)

Returned to The Dell as Manager last season after previously being with the Club as a player. He is hoping to follow a successful playing career with success in his new Managerial role.

Peter Shilton (goalkeeper)

He smashed Gordon Bank's record when he won his 74th England cap against Turkey in the World Cup clash at Wembley. Has now played more than 900 games at top level and is challenging Pat Jennings all-time record of 1.084 matches. He played in two European Cup winning teams for Nottingham Forest and then signed for Southampton in 1982 for a fee of £325,000. Other clubs-Leicester City an Stoke.

Steve Baker (defender/midfield)

Has played most of his senior games in midfield but can also play at full-back. He was playing at Wallsend Boys' Club when he was spotted by the Saints North East Scout.

Gerry Forrest (defender)

Signed from Rotherham in December 1985 for a fee of £90,000. He had been with them since he was 20 and been a regular first-team player. Made over 350 league appearances for the Yorkshire side.

Mark Dennis (defender)

Mark won England Youth honours in his early days with Birmingham City and made his entry into League football in 1978. He later won three

A broken leg in last year's F.A. Cup semi-final against Liverpool shattered hopes of appearing in the World Cup Finals in Mexico. Will be hoping to regain his form during the season to ensure he is back defending the goal for Southampton and England. Signed from Oxford United in 1982, for a fee of £115,000.

Kevin Bond (defender)

Signed from Manchester City for £25,000. An apprentice with Bournemouth and Norwich, he was later transferred to Seattle for £4000,000, but returned to Manchester City for £350,000. Has represented England "B" International XI against New Zealand and Australia.

Nick Holmes (defender/midfield)

The last survivor of Southampton's F.A. Cup winning side in 1976. Also played in the 1979 League Cup Final when Saints lost to Nottingham Forest. An outstanding professional, Nick developed in the Junior teams and has been a consistent member of the senior side since his debut in 1974.

David Armstrong (midfield)

One of the most complete midfield players is as often found in his own penalty box as he is attacking the opponents. Specialises in left-foot shots from around the 25 yd mark. David began his career with Middlesbrough and in one spell he made 356 consecutive first-team appearances. Southampton signed him for £600,000 in 1981.

Jimmy Case (midfield)

Jimmy was signed from Brighton for £30,000 in March 1985. He originally made his name with

Liverpool, winning four League Championship medals and two European Cup Winners medals. He was capped at U-23 level for England. He moved on to Brighton for £350,000 in 1981 and played for them in the 1983 F.A. Cup Final.

Glenn Cockerill (midfield/forward)

Signed from Sheffield United for £200,000 in October 1985. He began his League career with Lincoln in 1977 and was transferred to Swindon for £110,000 in 1979. Subsequently sold back to Lincoln for £40,000 after failing to establish a regular place in the Swindon side.

Danny Wallace (forward)

A former apprentice, who hails from London after changing from a winger to a central striker, he made his full England debut last season after 12 appearances for the U-21 side.

George Lawrence (forward)

Returned to Southampton from Oxford for £60,000 in December 1984. He began his career with the Saints but, after a loan spell at Oxford he completed his transfer in 1982 to them for £45,000. Scored twice in the first-leg at the Dell.

Colin Clarke (forward)

Signed for a large fee in July, 1986 from Bournemouth. His previous Clubs have been Peterborough and Tranmere Rover, and he has come to The Dell with an impressive goalscoring record.

Joe Jordan (forward)

Southampton signed Joe from Verona for £50,000 in 1984. Capped 52 times for Scotland, he began his career in the Scotlish League with Morton and moved on to Leeds in 1970. He won a League Championship medal at Elland Road and played in a European Cup Final.

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
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Middlesbrough last week and although we returned with no reward. I am afraid it was another case of a point that somehow escaped us again. Usually we travel up North on the long journeys the day before, but on this occasion we left the County Ground at 8.30 am. Such a long distance obviously makes you stiff and tired. The 'Gaffer' had us out of the coach at Middlesbrough and on a run to loosen up, then it was off to bed and a rest. I am one of those players who find it difficult to sleep in the afternoon but as long as I am resting I suppose it is an adequate

The game itself soon provided us with a situation where we had our backs to the wall. Middlesbrough started off at a tremendous pace. They had one or two chances which gave Fraser Digby the chance to again show what a fine prospect he is. We managed to contain them into shooting from outside of the penalty box and also catch them offside several times. They were a fast moving side with a quick winger. The pitch is large at Ayresome Park and obviously suited their style of play. Archie Stephens proved himself a big and awkward customer, he always seemed to be backing into us and with the referee choosing to ignore these tactics he became a prob-

Middlesbrough were a difficult

proposition at corner kicks and set pieces and had obviously done a fair amount of work on them. They aimed their corners at the rear post for flick ons and we were able to cope most of the time. Inevitably we got caught out when we were racing out from a corner and unluckily a shot from their full back took a slight deflection and left Fraser with no chance. John and 'The Gaffer' thought that Middlesbrough might fade and our fitness would see us being able to get back into the game. We had a couple of chances and only a superb tackle by one of their defenders prevented Dave Bamber from putting us level.

I thought that Middlesbrough looked a good side and their younger players played with a lot of enthusiasm. At present they are playing with a lot of confidence, we shall have to wait and see what a couple of defeats may do to their progress. Grounds will become heavier and then they will have to adjust. We were unlucky on the night to have Jimmy Gilligan limping from a knock, although we did have Peter Coyne able to

come on and take Jim's place. Now to tonights match, the first half an hour will be important. Whatever the end result it is important that we put up a good show and at least earn some respect.

Southampton have some good players. One player that amazes me is Jimmy Case, he is a good passer of the ball besides being an excellent tackler. When you consider that it seemed ages ago that he left Anfield he seems to have lost very little edge from his game. Jimmy is now 32! and still full of running. Glenn Cockerill always impresses me and is a good player alongside Jimmy in the Southampton midfield section.

All of the players in the England First Division have to be of a high standard, they rarely give the ball away. If they decide to keep the ball they usually succeed.

I played against Colin Clarke when he was with Peterborough and Tranmere and Colin is a good example of how a player benefits from playing in a higher division. When he was in the lower divisions Colin would hold the ball, now he plays it off quickly and is heading for the far post. The quality of the cross is better, so he would benefit from that. Joe Jordan is a tough but fair competitor and knows what the game is all about. noticed Dave Bassett the Wimbledon manager was having a go about referees protecting Peter Shilton too much following last weeks match. I would not know whether that is true or not but it is noticable in the lower divisions that the better known players out on the field of play are usually trying to manouvre the referees to their way of thinking, it has influence on some occasions.

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Tommy Jenkins

In October 1972 a legend left the County Ground. Don Rogers departed for his rightful stage in the First Division with Crystal Palace, and a vold was created within Swindon Town that was nearly impossible to fill

The task of trying to take the great man's place fell to a willowy speedy winger from the East End of London - Tommy Jenkins. His career started not far from his birth place, short associations with Leyton Orient and West Ham were not successful, so he drifted into non-league football linking up with Margate in the Southern league.

It was during this spell with the Kent Club that Reading took notice and in 1969 he found himself at Elm Park for the princely sum of £1500. That amount was miniscule compared with his fee six months later, First Division Southampton – by coincidence our visitors tonight – invested £60,000 in Jenkins and he was on his way to the South Coast. The Saints were not exactly hitting the highspots at this time and were thrashed 7-0 at Elland Road. Leeds, a defeat which included one of the most famous passing sequences in football history.

The ultra-professional Yorkshire side notched up 20-30 passes before the final whistle blew, mickey taking at its worst. That one incident probably summed up the reason why United were so disliked outside the boundries of Leeds.

Jenkins played in that match but his transfer to Swindon took place on the 1st November 1972 for a then record Town fee of £50,000 following his failure to make his mark in Division One.

Due to injury he had to wait for his Swindon debut until November the 11th. The Town played Huddersfeld Town and drew 1-1, a Ray Treacy penalty giving Swindon the point before 9,673 fans. His appearances during that Campaign were somewhat restricted, fourteen full and two substitute were all that Jenkins managed. He also played in two F.A. Cup games including the memorable 2-0 win over First Division Birmingham City on January 13, 1973.

The goals that day were from the great Joe Butler and Ray Treacy with another penalty. In 1973-74 it was a much more consistent season for Jenkins, but for Swindon it was relegation to Division Three. His first league goal for the Town came in October at Kenilworth Road but it wasn't enough to prevent buton taking the points.

Tommy turned out 36 times in the league during that Campaign and scored three goals, one of them a superb run and shot in the home defeat of Blackpool. A brilliant goal and it summed up in one piece of action

all that was good about Tommy Jenkins.

Another goal was scored by Tommy in the incredible 3-3 draw at Portsmouth in the F.A. Cup, the Town lost the replay on a Tuesday afternoon during the three day week 1-0.

The next season was spent back in Division Three and was very nearly an immediate return back to the Second. The Team that year featured Will Dixon and Trevor Anderson the subjects of my first two articles in this series, and as you've probably gathered dear reader a team very close to my heart.

Jenkins made 29 more league appearances but scored only one goal, that came in the 3-2 home win over Aldershot on Tuesday, 17th September. This game was made memorable for me because I had a tannoy message telling me we're to meet my Dad after the game. Trivial I know but I was so stunned to hear my name read out at the County Ground I dropped my tea, a merciful release some would say!

Anyway enough of this gibberish, there was also another memorable Cup run by the Town that term. In Round One they defeated near neighbours Reading 4-0, non league Maidstone were beaten 3-1 in Round Two and Lincoln were knocked out in Round Three by two goals to nil. This set up a meeting in Round Four with the mighty West Ham.

Jenkins had not played in the previous three rounds but he did in this game, returning to one of his original clubs. Swindon drew 1-1 at Upton Park but lost 2-1 at home in the replay before 26.749 fans, Trevor Anderson scoring the Town goal.

The next season was to be Tommy Jenkins last at Swindon making only ten further appearances before leaving the Club, departing for the Seattle Sounders in the ill fated North American Soccer League. He wasn't really a star at the County Ground but he was always interesting to watch and lets face it, thats what makes a player memorable.

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INTERVIEW

The date is Thursday October 3rd and Town goalkeeper, Kenny Allen,

believes he is winning his race against time to be available for tonights match. Ken you will recall was injured in the First Leg match at Southampton. Ken related his thoughts on the incident that led to his indisposition. 'Well, really I was lucky. I have sprained my ankle and damaged my ligaments, not as severely as I first thought. I have tenderness, still, on the inside of the ankle, but the swelling is down.'

Ken continued, 'It all happened in the first minute from a Colin Clarke volley, the shot was to my right, but Tim Parkin got in the way of the shot, the ball flew to my left. I tried to change direction, my weight was on my left foot it caught in the ground and it would appear as though I fell over?

From the resultant corner Ken was in trouble, I really thought I had broken my ankle, I thought of attracting the referee, but left it, I went up and caught the ball on one leg. My weight on that one leg was absolutely excrutiating. I was in pain for the rest of the match and agony on the coach back to Swindon. A restless night was followed by a visit to the Princess Margaret Hospital, an X-ray followed which showed there was no break. Dr Nicholas confirmed there was damage to the ankle ligaments and tenderness at the base of the ankle.

The Town's giant 'Keeper' then told of his treatment, 'Kevin was instructed by Dr Nicholas to give me hot and cold water treatment. This was done with an ice bucket and then straight into hot water, it is really shock treatment, the hot water gets the blood flowing, something like they use to do years ago with players being in sea-water. I also had ultra-sonic treatment.'

How long did Ken expect to be out of action, 'Well initially I was told two weeks, but I have been making progress quicker than I or the médical folk thought. I can assure the Town fans that

by the time they read this article I may be

Was this the only injury Ken had sustained in his career? 'No, mind it is the only one since I have been at Swindon. Sadly a broken arm at Bournemouth blocked a £90,000 move for me to West Ham. At the time David Webb who was the Bournemouth manager advised me to stay at Dean Court, he said I would only be reserve to Phil Parkes. I cursed the following season when Phil was injured and Tom McCallister who was here at Swindon played virtually a whole season of First Division football.' Ken was restless being out of action.

'I am looking forward to playing again, the fans have been good to me here and I am sure I can gain my confidence following this injury.' Ken limped away, the handicap was not as serious as the week before, he was on his way back.


The long round trip of 450 miles to the North-East was made worthwhile by the "Town's" encouraging display against a promising Middlesbrough side.

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
IS FATHER TIME IN TOWN TONIGHT?

 Dave of course could well have made that 250th appearance against Wigan Athletic!










