

What a relief, a 2-0 win against First Division opposition in Norwich City brought sanity back to a scene where all the talk had been about everything and anything that did not concern the actual playing of the game.

It would be irresponsible of me not to make some comment on the happenings of last weeks match at Shrewsbury. The main concern for myself is the image of Swindon Town Football Club.

It was **wrong** of Chris Kamara to react in the manner he is alleged to have done so at the final whistle. I did not personally see the incident and therefore I had to rely heavily on witnesses to the incident. At this stage there is a lot of conjecture about the final outcome and the player concerned knows where he stands in relation to the situation and Swindon Town Football Club.

I cannot condone such actions but I think it must be clearly stated that little has been said about the provocation that must have incited such an incident. That is the price those concerned must pay for with their conscience.

I felt immensely proud of the players who have put this Club into the Semi-Finals of the Simod Cup. To repeat that earlier 2-0 F.A. Cup win was a tremendous feat.

Unfortunately our skipper, Colin Calderwood, will miss todays match due to suspension, the first match he will have been absent from since he joined the Club from Mansfield Town. I have not decided who will replace Colin as skipper for todays match at the time of writing these notes, but whoever it is will now know what it is like to carry out instructions on the field of play. Not such an easy task as many believe.

We do not have a match next weekend and it gives the players the opportunity to relax for a short period. Light relief in a long season!





I missed our recent 3-0 win at Huddersfield due to scouting activities in
Scotland. My coaches Andy Rowland
and 'Chic' Bates were also similarly

Saturday. It is now the time of the season
where most Clubs are busy looking
towards strengthening their squads for

or to avoid relegation. More important is
that prospects for next season have to be
viewed and scrutinised. Every player
seen is filed in the memory and if they

To be regarded as a professional in any profession is an honour. You are paid to perform because of your undoubted skill, dedication is another word. We have to become utterly dedicated during March, April and May of 1988. Wembley and the First Division are just dreams, but we all know dreams do come true.





In recent weeks there have been several reports attributed to the recent comments made by Councillor Norris with regards to Swindon Town Football Club and a proposed Pay and Ride scheme to the Clubs home games, also the Clubs current finances.

This is not the first time that this particular gentleman has seen fit to pass comment on the Club. At the public debate on the proposed siting of flower beds in the car park, Mr. Norris made reference to the fat cats of the Football Club'.

The new structure is on the north side of the ground and has been constructed behind the old stand which has since been modified into uncovered seats. It provides seats for up to 5,238 spectators which raises the ground's capacity to 32,000, and on its three levels incorporates the almost completed 63 Club and accommodation for the administrative directors. staff. players and match officials.

Founded on 80 column bases the building is 80 metres long and 18 metres wide. The frame - of structural steel weighing 463 tons and encased in concrete - is clad with brick panels in the gables and wings of all staircases, and translucent sheeting to the rear and end gables. It is surmounted by a 25 metres wide canopy roof which slopes backwards at an angle of 10 degrees to a height of 15 metres. and which is clad with asbestos cement sheeting.

Eighteen raker beams, each approximately 20 metres long and cast on site, support 1,036 terracing and 287 step units to which are attached the seats.



sional eight years later. After using four different grounds they made the Den their home in 1910.

Millwall were original members of Division Three in 1920 and won their first League titles in 1927-28 lifting the Division Three (South) Championship.

Six years followed in Division Two before they were relegated back to the Third Division.

Four years later, in 1928, they lifted the Third Division South title again and remained a Second Division outfit

It was a further 18 years before they were to regain that place again. In the interim years the Lions tasted life in the Fourth Division on two occasions ending as Champions in season 1961/62 and runners-up in 1964/

They gained the rare distinction of going through two Leagues in two seasons, for after finishing as runners-up in Division Four, they did the same in the Third the next year, 1965/66.

The Lions then fluctuated between the Second and Third Divisions before regaining their present status by ending as Third Division runners-up in season 1984/85

In the F.A. Cup Millwall have been semi-finalists on three occasions - 1900, 1903 and 1937. On the last occasion, 1937, they became the first Division Three side to reach that stage of the competition

take over at Arsenal. Has also been Manager at both Brentford and Cambridge United. During his playing career made almost 350 League appearances for four Clubs - Brentford (three times), Sheffield United, Reading and Queens Park Rangers.

Les Briley (Midfielder). Now in his fourth season with Millwall, having arrived at The Den from Aldershot in the summer of 1984. His career started as an apprentice at Chelsea but it was at Hereford United, who he joined on a free transfer, where he made his League debut against Burnley on September 6, 1976. Moved back to London midway through the following season. when Wimbledon payed £18,000 but he was on his travels a couple of years later, Aldershot parting with £43,000 for his services.

David Byrne (Winger). Considering his lack of ex-perience, he had a very satisfactory first season for Millwall following his £5,000 transfer from Gillingham. A late arrival on the League scene, Byrne played for Kingstonian before signing for the Gills, making his debut against Darlington on August 24, 1985 (aged 24.) Jimmy Carter (Midfielder). A £15,000 signing from Q.P.R. during last season, despite no previous League experience at either of his previous two Chibs, Crystal Palace and Q.P.R. Tony Cascarino (Forward). When John Docherty signed Cascarino from Gillingham in June, 1987 for a Club record fee of £250,000, it disappointed a few other Managers who had made no secret of their interst in the highly rated Eire International Signed for Gillingham from Crockenhill in 1981, Cascarino has already hit over a century of League and Cup goals with last season being his best to date with 27 strikes in

58 outlings to his credit.

Nicky Coleman (Defender). An 'ever-present' last season, he came though Millwall's Youth ranks and has made great progress since making his League debut at Brentford on May 19th, 1985. Coleman has hit four League goals (including three penalties) oddly

enough all for Swindon Town, while on loan in 1985.

Brian Horne (Goalkeeper). At the start of the season he had not even made his League debut yet by the end of the campaign he was rated one of the finest young prospects in the country. Honoured by England at Youth and under 19 levels. During the close season he travelled to South America with the England under 19's, playing against Brazil. Home signed full professional forms in October 1985.

Terry Burlock (Midfielder). Although John Docherty's

major spending came during the summer months of 1987, his rebuilding started a few months earlier when he signed Terry from Reading (fee £95,000). The former Leytonstone and Illord player joined his first Club, Brentford, in 1980 and Docherty was at Criffin Park when Reading paid a Club record fee of £82,500 to secure Hurlock.

George Lawrence (Forward). If there were any lingering doubts as to Millwall's ambitions this season, they must surely have been dispelled in July 1987 when they paid Southampton £160,000 for Lawrence who last season enjoyed his most successful spell in the First Division in respect of both appearances (36) and goals (T). He came through Southampton's Youth ranks and made his First Division debut against Notts County on October 17, 1981. He joined Oxford United in November 1982 (fee £45,000) and assisted them during their meteoric rise to the First Division. Rejoined Southampton in January 1985 (fee £60,000) and won a regular place last season. The purchase of Lawrence brought Millwall's spending to around the £650,000 mark in only six months.

Alan McLeary (Defender). A very promising young defender, came through Millwall's apprentice ranks and has been 'capped' by England at Youth level Voted the suporters Player of the Year two seasons ago, he is equally at home at the centre of the defence, full back or in midfield. An 'ever-present' last season.

Darren Morgan (Midfielder). 'Capped' by Wales at Youth level, he is yet another young player who was 'blooded' by John Docherty last season and came through a testing time with much credit.

Kevin O'Callaghan (Forward). An established Eire International, he joined Millwall, the Club where he started his career, from Portsmouth in June 1987 (fee £85,000). O'Callaghan had only played 20 League matches for The Lions when Ipswich paid a record Club fee of £250,000 in January 1980 which still represents the highest fee paid for a Millwall player. He played regularly for the then very powerful Ipswich team before switching to Portsmouth in March 1985

Danis Salman (Defender/Midfielder). Capped by England at Youth level, Cyprus born Salman joined Millwall from Brentford during the summer of 1986, the £20,000 fee being decided by a League tribunal A utility player, Salmon had 11 seasons at Brentford. making his debut against Watford on November 15 1975 (aged 1514) and played in both full back positions, sweeper' as well as midfield for the Bees. Has made over 350 League appearances.

Paul Sansome (Goalkeeper). A former apprentice at Crystal Palace, he joined Millwall in 1979 and was first team choice until the emergence of Brian Horne last season. Millwall's 1985 Player-of-the-Year will provide hot competition to Brian this season - and vice versa -and it's indeed a healthy sign for The Lions to have two such fine young keepers on their books.

Teddy Sheringham (Forward). A former England Youth International who played his first full campaign for Millwall last season. He finished as an 'ever-present' and The Lions top scorer with 16 goals from 50 League and Cup outings.

Keith Stevens (Defender). A product of Millwall's Youth policy, he made his debut for The Lions against Oxford United on April 29 1981 (aged 16) and has been the Club's regular No. 2 for the past three seasons

Alan Walker (Defender). He joined Millwall from Lincoln City in July 1985, but a serious injury in a pre-season friendly meant he did not make his Lions debut until October 1985. Since that unlucky start Walker has made up for lost time with some sterling performances at the heart of the defence

Steve Wood (Defender). A highly rated young pros-pect. Steve joined Millwall from Reading in June 1987 for £80,000. Wood, who progressed through Reading's Youth ranks, made his debut for the Elm Park Club against Southend United on February 25 1980 (aged 17) and was an 'ever-present' in seasons 1984/85 and



ANDY ROWLAND

In a sport governed by omens, Andy Rowland's debut goal for Bury at the County Ground in 1974 surely pointed the way to his successful future in Swindon.

Born in one of the 'other' railway towns, Derby, in 1954 Andy initially found employment in the 'Works' but success for Derby County as an amateur and for England youths soon changed his career direction. Bury soon recognised his talents and drafted him into their opening game of the 1974/75 season at the County Ground. Bury won 2-0 with Andy's assistance and gave him another 34 opportunities that season, he responded with a further nine goals.

The next three campaigns saw Andy establish himself at Gigg Lane and lead the Clubs goalscoring list with 16, 17 and 14 goals.


Bobby Smiths efforts to build a successful Swindon Town side brought the signing of Andy Rowland in September 1978 for a fairly weighty £85,000. It was a reunion with a former Manager in Smith and the return to a happy hunting ground for Andy, his performances showed that he relished the move.

His 'second' debut at the County Ground came in the 1-0 defeat against Blackpool on September 23rd and brought him an early striking partnership with 'Chic' Bates, now of course in tandem again on the coaching side of the Club.

Andy's real success, though, came when paired with another striker the following season.

As the 'Town' so nearly reached Wembley Andy Rowland and the diminutive Alan Mayes scored 55 League and cup goals between them.

In that memorable season, League results were often spectacular too. Not least the fixture on December 8th 1979 against Roland's old Club Bury. Two goals from Rowland, Mayes and McHale with a goal apiece for Billy Tucker and Chris Kamara brought the 'Town' an incredible 8-0 win over the quaking shakers.

Later in the season Andy was up to it again as the 'Town' thumped Rotherham 6-2 with Andy netting four times, once again Alan Mayes netted one of the other goals.

The following year brought Andy the top goalscorers honours, with Mayes again in second place.

The relegation season of 1981/2 brought the emergence of Paul Rideout and only 27 appearances and 8 goals for Andy but the 'Towns' first campaign in Division 4 saw him miss only one League game.

Only eclipsed in the goalscoring stakes by 20 goal Paul Rideout, Andy weighed in with 16, scoring more than one only twice, emphasising his consistency.

As the 'Town' dropped to their lowest ever League position in 1983/84, Andy was restyled into a centre-defence partnership with Simon Gibson.

The Swindon back four, under the guidance of new Manager Lou Macari, also included Andy, but alongside Mike Graham, now of course with Bristol City vanquishers Mansfield Town.

It was Andy who appeared on T.V. in support of Lou when the Manager was sacked at Easter 1985 and also an Andy goal that inspired the side to glory the following incredible season. An away draw in the First Leg of the Milk Cup Second Round promised little, but Rowland's vital goal and Peter Coyne's penalty set up a stormy 3-1 victory at the County Ground two weeks later.

Andy's goal in the Second Leg completed his tally in a season which brought him only 12 League appearances but a drift towards a more secure future in the game.

Success for Swindon, and in turn Andy, has followed and now sees him as coach at a rapidly established Second Division Club.

Ironically Andy made his debut as a player at the County Ground just as Swindon Town had dropped out of Division 2, now his experience as a member of the backroom staff coincides with our return to the level of big-names and big gates.

Andy Rowland, a future League Manager? Andy Rowland a future Manager of Swindon Town? Only time will tell, but whatever the truth, loyalty and commitment will be ever-present in the same way as Andy's playing days when he served the 'Town' so well.



Northern Bias for Centenary Festival

When The Football League was formed in 1888, the 12 founder members comprised six Northern Clubs and six Clubs from the Midlands. There will be a distinct northern flavour, however, when 16 Clubs meet in the Mercantile Credit Centenary Festival at Wembley Stadium on 16th/17th April. to celebrate the League's 100th birthday.

Of the 12 Clubs who have so far definitely qualified for the League's Centenary showpiece event, eight of them - Everton, Liverpool, Manchester United, Sheffield Wednesday, Blackburn Rovers, Leeds United, Sunderland and Wigan Athletic - are from the North. Only two Midlands Clubs - Aston Villa and Wolverhampton Wanderers - have already qualified, together with two from the South, Luton Town and Wimbledon.

The qualifying period for the Festival closes at the end of February and Clubs who have not managed to complete 15 matches in the Barclays League since the beginning of November will have their points adjusted on a pro-rata basis. This effectively means that Nottingham Forest will next week be confirmed as one of the First Division qualifiers, together with Crystal Palace, in Division Two, and Tranmere Rovers in Division Four.

The only outstanding issue to be determined, therefore, is the final qualifying place from Division One which rests between Norwich City and Newcastle United. If Newcastle take a point from their last match against Chelsea today, it will be enough to ensure that the Geordies make the trip to Wembley after all, following last week's exit from the F.A. Cup.

The format of the Mercantile Credit Centenary Festival has been specifically designed to ensure a thrilling, action-packed weekend. On Saturday, 16th April, all 16 qualifying Clubs will compete on an outright knock-out basis with the eight successful Clubs progressing to the quarter-finals. The semi-finals and Final will be played on Sunday, 17th April, one hundred years to the day from the League's foundation. All matches will be short duration games – 20 minutes each way on Saturday and 30 minutes each way on Sunday. Drawn matches will be decided on penalties.

With all the Clubs committed to playing first team squads and prize money of £385,000 at stake, the football action is bound to be highly competitive. Sunday's action will also be supplemented by a wide range of supporting activity aimed at creating a festival occasion.

And as the League announced last week, there will be no fixture programme that weekend. So, the focus of attention will be firmly on the biggest sporting birthday party ever staged at Wembley.

Mobile CCTV to be used in European Championships

Closed circuit television cameras will be used to monitor English football supporters on their journey to the European Championships in West Germany this summer. British Transport Police, whose mobile CCTV and video equipment was partly funded by a £15,000 Football Trust grant, will provide intelligence and film of travelling supporters to the German authorities for use in ensuring good behaviour during the Championships.

Assistant Chief Constable Ian McGregor commented:
"A strong liaison has been established with the German Police and we will be holding many more meetings in the coming months. Our objectives are to develop strong and consistent lines of communication and provide one another with as much information as possible to ease planning for the Championships."


