



Aside from the fact that managerial contracts are being ripped up right, left and centre, a revolution has taken place amongst the League's leaders.



# THE CHAIRMAN Speaking

# **BRIAN HILLIER**

This week I am allowing my column to include a message to you all from our good friend Supt. Mike Rogers, who is in charge of police operations on matchdays at the County Ground. Before his message to you all is included I would like to make one or two comments concerning other matters.

You will have read and heard of the final outcome of the E.G.M. of the Football League. Events which occurred during the summer saw both Philip Carter of Everton and David Dein of Arsenal lose their positions on the Management Committee, events which sullied the name of our national game. Openness is the best policy and if the protagonists had adopted this attitude from the beginning most of the problem would not have arisen.

I would like to welcome all connected with Birmingham City for this afternoons match. City are experiencing a lean time in their search for points, but their draw at Manchester City last week shows that no Club can treat another lightly in this division. Our result at Sunderland last week was one of the more disappointing of recent seasons and one which we must quickly ensure was strictly a one-off.

The remainder of my column is now devoted to **Supt. Mike Rogers**, and I would like you all to take heed of his message. Thank you all for your attention.

### Good afternoon,

explain the policy of policing that you see at the County Ground Much is said about whether our presence is necessary or desirable and there is a multitude of opinion about that

My aim is to make the County Ground safe for anyone to come and enjoy football

Hooliganism in football is not as unique as is so often made out. Most of society realise it is simply the desire for violence and an unbridled contempt for decent standards and law enforcement.

The overall strategy is one of containment which is preventative and entails active police supervision with the segregation of opposing fans. This has been achieved but the cost is regular and sometimes means a massive police presence. It follows that because they are protected by the police one of the consequences of containment is that rival groups tend to be corralled together so that they can demonstrate their allegience and aggression, particularly with obscene or racial chantings and ritual taunting.

Since the introduction of CCTV most of the violence is outside the ground and often stems from behaviour demonstrated on the terraces. We cannot expect other than trouble if 'contained' supporters are allowed to scream hostilities at each other week in and week out without check.

policing, particularly on terraces near to the visitors. What has to be understood is that behaviour not acceptable



in the town centre is not acceptable in the County Ground.

The Criminal Law under the Public Order Act and the Ground Regulations allow me to charge and to put before a Magistrates Court or eject offenders. The message is quite clear - behave or risk arrest. It can only be provocative if vulgar gestures are shown to rival supporters. The courts have backed up that view with heavy fines and exclusion orders. Take time out and look at the Ground Regulations - non compliance may result in ejection. In addition to policemen being positive on the terraces I will also use CCTV to build up evidence of unacceptable behaviour and continue to enforce better standards on the terracing.

It is my view that we can only start to make progress by excluding the hooligan element from the ground so as to encourage family support back to football. In that way police presence and costs may ultimately be reduced

To the vast majority of supporters this message is purely academic – it is directed at the small minority of hooligans who constantly spoil it for the rest.

I am not suggesting anyone should not support the players on the field – quite the reverse – please put your energy into supporting the team rather than the taunting of visiting supporters




### A DUBIOUS PRIVILEGE

The last three years have seen the fortunes of Birmingham City slump to their lowest ebb.


After being relegated from Division One at the end of the 1985–86 season, the Blues have found life in Division Two extremely tough.

They have come perilously close in the last two seasons to making the drop to the Third for the very first time.

On both occasions they have finished in 19th position just two points away from having to take part in the play-offs to maintain a place in Division Two. And this season so far all the indications are that it could be another year of struggle for Manager Garry Pendrey, who took over the reigns from the flambouyant John Bond in May of last year.

At the time of penning these notes Birmingham had won only two and drawn one of their opening 11 League games and are currently sat at the foot of the table with Brighton on seven points.

Birmingham were elected to the Football League in 1892 and have, in the past 96 years, regularly fluctuated between the top two divisions.

Four times Birmingham have won the Second Division title and on another five occasions have finished as the runnersup.

Their highest place in Division One, sixth spot, came in the 1955-56 season, the same season as they were beaten in the F.A. Cup final 3-1 by Manchester City. And on their only other appearance at Wembley in the competition, 1931, they were also runners-up.

In the Football League Cup, the Blues were the third name to appear on the trophy as winners. In the two legged final in 1963 they won 3-1 at home and then drew 0-0 at local rivals Aston Villa to lift the cup.

And in the old European Fairs Cup, the Blues twice finished runners-up in 1960 and in the following year.

## MEET THE PLAYERS AND MANAGER

Garry Pendrey (Manager). Appointed the Manager of the Clues in May 1987 in succession to John Bond. Garry first joined the St. Andrew's Club as an apprentice 24 year ago. At 20, he was the Blues youngest captain. Later played for West Bromwich, Torquay, Bristol Rovers and Walsall. Had coaching spells at Walsall and Wolverhampton before joining the managerial ranks.

Tony Godden (Goalkeeper). Born Gillingham, Kent. Signed from Chelsea in July 1987. Made 25 appearances last season before injury prevented him playing after early January 1988. Joined Chelsea from West Bromwich Albion after making 327 first team appearances. Had loan spells with Luton Town and Walsall.

Ray Ranson (Fullback). Born St. Helens. Joined 'Blues' in 1984 from Manchester City. Played for England Under-21 team 11 times. Played for Manchester City in the 1981 Cup Final and re-play. Made over 200 appearances for City and has played 133 games for the 'Blues'.

Brian Roberts (Fullback). Born in Manchester. Started his career with Coventry City making 241 appearances for the Sky Blues. After a loan spell with Hereford United joined Birmingham City in March 1984. Has made 142 appearances for the 'Blues'.

Adrian Bird (Defender). Born in Bristol. Former Y.T.S. player - signed contract forms on 1st July 1987. Made first team debut on 29th December 1986 against Millwall away, Has made a total of 12 appearances and been substitute 5 times.

Vince Overson (Defender). Born Kettering. Signed from Burnley in 1986. Former England Youth International, helped Burnley win the Third Division title in 1982. Made 247 appearances for the 'Clarets' and has made 78 appearances for Birmingham City.

Dean Peer (Midfield). Former Y.T.S player. Born in Stourbridge. Made first team debut on 20th September 1986 against Hull City. Has made 1 first team appearance and been substitute 3 times prior to this season.

John Frain (Midfield). Local lad signed contract forms on 8th July 1985 and made League debut on 12th April 1986 at Newcastle United. Scored the 'Blues' only goal. Has made a total of 19 first team appearances and has been substitute 9 times.

Des Bremner (Midfield). Born Arbichidir, Scotland. Represented Scotland internationally at Schoolboy and Youth level. Won nine Under-23 caps and one full International cap. Joined 'Blues' from Aston Villa in October 1984. Made 280 appearances for Hibernian, 216 for Aston Villa and 119 for 'Blues' making total career appearances of 615. Won First Division Championship and European Cup Winners Medal with Aston Villa in 1981 and 1982.

Ian Atkins (Midfield). Born in Birmingham. Joined Shrewsbury Town as an apprentice making a total of 314 appearances and scoring 58 goals before his transfer to Sunderland. Made 88 appearances for Sunderland before moving to Everton. Transferred to Ipswich Town for whom he made 76 appearances. Joined the 'Blues' in April 1988 following a month on loan.

Martin Thomas (Goalkeeper). The Caerphilly keeper joined Birmingham on loan recently from Newcastle. Began as an apprentice at Bristol Rovers and went on to make 162 appearances. Then, following loan spells at Cardiff, Tottenham, Southend and Newcastle, finally joined Newcastle permanently in season 1983–84. Had a brief four game loan spell with Middlesbrough since then.

Carl Richards (Striker). Recently joined the 'Blues' from Bournemouth. Born in Jamaica the striker was snapped up by Bournemouth from Enfield for £10,000 during the summer of 1986. In the following two seasons made 63 appearances, scoring 16 goals and helped the Cherries to the Third Division title in 1986–87 season.

Kevin Langley (Midfield). Born St. Helens Commenced career with Wigan Athletic for whom he made 180 appearances. Transferred to Everton for £100,000, making 21 appearances and scoring three goals prior to his transfer to Manchester City for £150,000. Joined Birmingham City in March 1988 and has made 7 first team appearances.

Steve Wigley (Winger). Born Ashton-under-Lyne. Began League career with Nottingham Forest. Made 82 appearances before moving to Sheffield United, where he made a further 27 appearances. Joined 'Blues' in March 1987 and has made 60 appearances.

Gary Childs (Midfield). Birmingham born, commenced his career with West Bromwich Albion before moving to Walsall for whom he made 150 appearances. Signed by Blues' in July 1987 and has made 26 first team appearances.

Colin Robinson (Striker). Birmingham Born, began League career at Shrewsbury Town scoring 40 goals in 167 League appearances. Joined 'Blues' in January 1988 but injury curtailed his appearances.

Steve Whitton (Striker). Born East Ham. Started career as an apprentice at Coventry City making 72 appearances, scoring 21 goals. Moved to West Ham United for £175,000 and made 42 appearances scoring 8 goals. Joined the 'Blues' in August 1986 following a period of loan and has made 87 appearances and score 21 goals. 
hope we never see that expression again.

### **OUT IN THE RUSTICS**



### **Dear Dave**

It is perfectly obvious to all interested parties that the Government, headed by Sports Minister Colin Moynihan, has quite made up its mind to impose a compulsory card-membersip scheme upon Football League clubs with effect from next season. It is difficult to understand Mr Moynihan's insistence upon this matter, for, although he has offered several reasons for the compulsory card scheme, not one of them actually stands the test of reasoned scrutiny!

Football supporters know full well that there are hooligans who have attached themselves to a handful of clubs, but the FACT is that the vast majority of Football League matches pass off without a hint of violence. Last season there were major and well-publicised disturbances at two games in London – but all over 2,000 League and Cup matches were watched and enjoyed by rival fans without any trouble whatever.

Of course, some critics of football point to the happenings in Germany at the European Championships last summer. But it should be noted that there was gross misreporting there – although the Minister apparently believed everthing that he was told. The FACT is that most of the violence in Germany had nothing to do with Football! And the German police admitted that it was largely organised by German fascists!

Another FACT that should be obvious to anyone is that the compulsory card system will be totally incapable of checking the violence it is claimed it will prevent, and that other major sports are also plagued by loutish behaviour and vandalism yet have singularly failed to attract the attentions of the Minister.

However, perhaps the most disturbing FACT of all is that the Government scheme is to be imposed without any reference whatever to the people whom it will most affect – the football supporters! It is nothing short of a travesty that the Government of a democracy should act in such a manner. But perhaps the Minister realised that if he did consult with the ordinary fans he might learn the facts and that that might be rather inconvenient.



### **NO EXCUSES**

No excuses, our performance at Sunderland was not very good, in fact if we are honest with ourselves it was woeful.

We were second best to Sunderland in every department of the game. We sat back and let them attack us and, to be quite honest, we laid down without a fight. I am sure all the lads felt the same after the match. It was our worst performance since we gained promotion to the Second Division.

### ON A PERSONAL BASIS

Personally, I know I have not been playing as well as I did last season. Probably the best game I have played was on our visit to Blackburn where I faced Ian Miller, who was once on the books of Swindon Town.

Ian is the type of winger I like to face, direct and who relies on pace. I can combat that easier because that is one of the stronger points of my game, speed. What I do find a problem is when I stand off a winger and he starts to twist and turn. Ruel Fox of Norwich City was a player I enjoyed facing last season, now Ruel is a player who, I believe, could become an even better player.

I must admit, I have not really been able to put my finger on why I have not been playing as well. The 'Gaffer' says it's because I am not working hard enough. I don't think it's been as easy this season to knock long balls forward. Our play is slightly different because we don't have the big men up front to hold the ball up like last year, so our game has to be somewhat different.

# TWO, THREE, FOUR

I am often asked if I have found a difference in the standard between the three divisions I have played my career in.

Obviously in the Fourth Division there is not so much skill, more of a kick-and-

One player in our team who can make a lot of difference is Bobby Barnes Most wingers are regarded as a luxury in modern day play and some people probably look at Bob in this way. This season I have tried to play the ball to the feet of Bobby Barnes and make him play and hoping his influence would be to the teams advantage.

# FIVE OR FOUR AT THE BACK? Another question I am often asked is whether I prefer to play in a four or five man system in defence. I prefer a five man system because it allows me to get forward more.

When we play with a four man system I have to sit in the full back slot and purely defend. It is my belief that I am better playing moving forward, although the 'Gaffer' says that it is a bonus. He believes I should defend better and work hard. I am trying, and with his and your help perhaps I will regain my form of last season.






