

SOMEWHAT UNLUCKY? Once again we shall be thankful that


we have a strong enough squad of players with Steve Foley's suspension taking effect. Steve will be ab-



A DARK McKNIGHT!

With a defensive display direct from the Allen McKnight manual of confidence and cover, the 'Town' emerged pointless from an inhospitable Stamford Bridge last Saturday. NEARLY AS GOOD AS A RUTH RENDELL MYSTERY



GROUP MEETING

On Thursday, April 9th, along with Mr Cecil Green, one of my fellow directors and a former distinguished Chairman of this Club and Dave King the Club Secretary, we attended a meeting of the Football League, South West Group to discuss the Football Spectators Bill.

Before dealing in more detail with the Bill, may I take this opportunity to explain which Chubs are included in this Group. Along with Swindon Town are Bristol City, who were hosts to the meeting. Also in attendance were Bristol Rovers, Plymouth Argyle, Southampton and Oxford United. AFC Bournemouth, Swansea City, Cardiff City, Exeter City and Torquay United are also included in the Group.

Addressing the meeting were the new Football League President – Mr Jack Dunnett, who was accompanied by Football League representatives – Mr Chris Walley and Mr Jack Crawford.

REPRESENTATION

Despite what you may have read or heard, Swindon Town Football Club have made strong representation to the various members of Parliament and to the House of Lords.

In fact at our match with West Ham United in attendance was Lord Carter. Only yesterday, Friday, February 17th Mr Simon Coombs attended a meeting of the Board of Directors at the County Ground. I can assure you all that both

gentlemen were in no doubt as to the opposition this particular Club will express to the Bill. Of course we ask everyone to protest in a dignified and orderly fashion.

WHAT THE GOVERNMENT'S IDENTITY CARD SCHEME WILL MEAN TO YOU

The Government plans to introduce a Compulsory I.D. Card Scheme for football supporters in England and Wales.

You, the fans will have to buy an I.D. Card if you wish to attend football matches. You will have to fill in an application form and provide a photograph before you can be issued with a card. Your personal details will be stored on a computer and monitored. Football supporters will be the only people in the country who are made to have I.D. Cards.

On **match days** you will have to join a queue of people waiting to have their I.D. Cards checked before you enter the ground. If the computer breaks down there will be chaos. Even if the computers **are** working normally there is a good chance that somebody in the queue in front of you will have a card that will cause you delay.

If you are opposed to this scheme, please write to your local M.P. at: The House of Commons, London SN1A 0AA and ask him or her to oppose the Government's proposals.

In the next column are some of the points that you may like to make:



- * The I.D. Card will not stop hooliganism (away from grounds)
- * The scheme could cause serious delays at turnstiles
- * The bureaucracy and cost of the scheme will deter thousands from going to matches and could ruin some smaller Clubs.
- * Millions of law-abiding citizens including pensioners and season ticket holder are going to be inconvienienced by a scheme which will not benefit them, just to deal with a tiny minority of hooligans.

OUR NEXT OPPONENTS

Next Saturday we travel north to meet rejuvinated **Leeds United** at **Elland Road**. Since the appointment of former Sheffield Wednesday Manager, Howard Wilkinson, the fortunes of this famous Club have been on the up-grade.

Since the goal-less draw that took place at the County Ground last October, United have only lost two League matches, one of those at Elland Road. Before their visit to the County Ground, Leeds United had lost at Elland Road to Chelsea (0-2), and Watford (0-1).

The only victors at Elland Road since Howard Wiliknson's appointment have been, surprisingly, **Shrewsbury Town** who won (3-2). Apart from their (2-0) win against Barnsley, United had been forced to share the points with Oxford United, and Manchester City in 1-1 draws before the arrival of the former Sheffield Wednesday supremo.

Since that uncertain start, the following Clubs have found that Elland Road is now a much more difficult venue to visit Hull City were defeated (2-1). high flying West Bromwich Albion were defeated in identical fashion. Stoke City were trounced 4-0, the hiccup against Shrewsbury Town proved to be a minor set-back and both Blackburn Rovers and Plymouth Argyle left pointless following 2-0 defeats. Struggling Birmingham City provided sterner opposition in 1-0 defeat. Today's visitors Sunderland joined the growing list of vanquished in 2-0 set-back Can Swindon Town upset the form book?

The **Leeds United** defence has remained intact since their October visit

to the County Ground with Mervyn Day, Neil Aspin, Glyn Snodin, Mark Aizlewood, Noel Blake and David Rennie appearing in every game. Except for one appearance by the onloan Ian Andrews from Glasgow Celtic in the away match with Crystal Palace. Ian was once on loan here at the County Ground for Leicester City in our Fourth Division days.

Up front Ian Baird, Bobby Davison and Vince Hilaire have also appeared in every match since that October day here at the County Ground.

In midfield **John Sheridan** has missed one match since appearing in the goalless County Ground encounter. The combative **David Batty** has been replaced by **Mike Whitlow**.

Attendances at Elland Road are, as ever, the envy of most Second Division Clubs. The **Boxing Day** fixture against **Blackburn Rovers** attracted the seasons best of **31,622**.








TAKING THE OPPOSITE OF VIEW

Sunderland are a Club steeped in tradition who have produced many household names over the years and enjoyed considerable success.

During this decade though the proud North-Eastern side from Wearside hit an all-time low.

They were relegated from the First Division at the end of the 1984-85 season and also lost at Wembley to Norwich City 1-0 in the final of the Milk Cup.

Two seasons later they had plummeted into the Third Division for the first time in their history, a victim of the controversial play-offs introduced for the first time in May of 1987.

The Roker Park Directors looked for new blood immediately and appointed Denis Smith as Manager. In his first managerial position at York he had enjoyed tremendous success – the Sunderland Directors were hoping that he could be the one to revive the fortunes on Wearside. Smith repaid their faith immediately. Last season he led the Club to the Third Division title and this year Sunderland are handily placed in the Second Division to challenge for a place back in the top flight again.

Sunderland were formed in 1879 and turned professional in 1886. Four years later they were elected to the First Division and maintained that place for 68 years until dropping to the Second at the end of the 1957–58 season.

For the first two years of the Clubs existence they were known as Sunderland and District Teachers AFC and between 1879 and 1898 played on five different grounds

until moving to their present home at Roker Park.

In that first spell in the First Division that lasted 68 years, Sunderland won the League title on no fewer than six occasions. The first success was gained during 1891–92 and immediately followed up again the next season. The other four First Division titles were achieved in 1894–95, 1901–02, 1912–13 and 1935–36, and during this same spell they finished as runners-up five times.

Since 1958, when dropping to the Second Division for the first time, they have three times gained promotion back to the First by winning the Second Division crown, once in 1975–76 and ending up as runners-up twice in 1963–64 and 1979–80.

In the F.A. Cup Sunderland lost in their first appearance in the final in 1913. However, they made amends for this in 1937, defeating Preston 3-1.

The trophy returned again to Wearside in 1973 when, as a Second Division Club, they defied all the odds defeating the mighty Leeds side 1-0 thanks to a first-half goal from Ian Porterfield. Those of us who witnessed the game will never forget the scenes afterwards as goalkeeping hero Jim Montgomery and Manager Bob Stokoe danced and hugged in celebration on the hallowed Wembley turf.

Sunderland were to return to Wembley again in 1985 but this time there was no celebration. They missed a penalty and were beaten 1-0 by Norwich in the League Cup final. Less than two months later, to complete a dismal time, they were relegated as well from the First Division.

MEET THE PLAYERS AND MANAGER

Denis Smith (Manager). Formerly a strong centre-half with Stoke City for whom he played over four hundred times beginning in 1968. Denis represented the Football League and won a League Cup Winners Medal in 1972. He finished his career at York and on becoming Manager transformed a

struggling outfit into one which stormed to the Fourth Division Championship and enjoyed some famous cup exploits. Last season, Denis was the Third Division Manager of the Year, a reward for a well won Championship while making a profit in the transfer market.

Viv Busby (Chief Coach). Viv played for nine Clubs in his playing career. A good goal scorer he inspired Fulham to the 1975 F.A. Cup Final with half a dozen goals along the Cup trail. Busby ended his playing days at York and then worked as coach with Denis Smith, moving to Roker with him.

Tony Norman (Goalkeeper). Moved to Roker Park towards the latter part of 1988 from Hull City in a deal that saw Iain Hesford and Billy Whitehurst moving the other way. A vastly experienced goalkeeper, he celebrates his 31st birthday later this month. Began his career at Burnley during the 76–77 season but never broke into the League side. Moved onto Hull during 79–80 season making his League debut against Millwall on February 16 1980, and from then on virtually made the position his own. An ever-present between the posts in the last five seasons for Hull

Reuben Agboola (Defender). A Londoner, he made his League debut at Old Trafford in 1980 for Southampton, the Club where he began as an apprentice. Went on to make over one hundred appearances before moving to Roker in January 1985. Made the left back berth his own last season. Briefly loaned to Charlton Athletic in 1986.

Frank Gray (Defender). A vastly experienced Scottish International operating on a weekly contract. He is hoping for a break into management after a career that has seen him play in three major European Finals, one domestic final as well as being part of Championship winning sides in Division One and Three. Capped at full and Under-21 level. Frank played in the 1982 World Cup Finals. Previous Clubs are Leeds United twice and Notts Forest.

John Macphail (Defender). Third top scorer with sixteen goals last season including an excellent penalty taking record. Made his debut against Rangers at Ibrox for Dundee.

Later played for Sheffield United, York and Bristol City winning Division Four titles with both Yorkshire Clubs and playing at Wembley with Bristol City before joining Sunderland at the beginning of last season. He was the only ever present in all competitions last season and was voted top Sunderland player last year by North Eastern Sportswriters.



• Eric Gates

Gary Bennett (Defender). Club Captain and the only survivor of Sunderland's 1985 Milk Cup Final team. He began at Manchester City before establishing himself at Cardiff City. Scored against Peter Shilton within two minutes of his debut for Sunderland in 1984. His brother, Dave, plays for Coventry.

Richard Ord (Defender). Eighteen-year-old, who is considered by many to be the best defender unearthed by the Club since Colin Todd. His debut last season in the 7-0 win over Southend coincided with the Clubs biggest win in thirty-one years. A versatile athlete who has played in several positions for the junior sides including goalkeeper in an emergency. He is also a talented cricketer. Gordon Armstrong (Midfield). A bright

prospect who has clocked up over a century of League games although only twenty-one years of age. Began at Roker as an apprentice and appeared 37 times in last years Third Division Championship winning side.

Paul Lemon (Midfield). Although only twenty-two, he is Sunderland's longest serving player having joined the Club in 1982. As a fifteen-year-old he scored in the F.A. Youth Cup semi-finals against Manchester United and made his debut in the First Division at Aston Villa in December 1984. Had a brief spell on loan to Carlisle but is now a regular at Sunderland having made sixty-five League appearances in the previous two seasons.

John Cornforth (Midfield). A talented, creative player, he began to break into the League side again last season following a barren two year spell. Spent a loan period

with Doncaster in 1986, making seven appearances and scoring three goals.

Gary Owers (Midfield). A former apprentice, he enjoyed a tremendous first season last year making 37 League appearances and scoring four goals. He was called up by the England Youth Squad, an acknowledgement of his exciting attacking play and whole hearted endeavour.

Steve Doyle (Midfield). An experienced player who made his League bow in 1974 for Preston. After eight seasons at Deepdale, he moved to Huddersfield staying for five years before joining Sunderland. Has gained promotion with all of his Clubs and earned Welsh caps at Under-21 and Youth level. Born in Port Talbot, the 30-year-old had notched up 423 League games with his three Clubs prior to the start of this season.

Colin Pascoe (Forward). Signed from Swansea on transfer deadline day last season. He played in final nine League games and scored four times. A former apprentice at Swansea, made 174 League appearances for them in all four Divisions. Has represented Wales at Full, Under-21 and Youth level.

Eric Gates (Forward). The 33-year-old became the first Sunderland player to score two hat-tricks in a season for twenty years last season. A full England International, he won a U.E.F.A. Cup Winners medal with Ipswich in 1981 and was a vital part of their exciting team during the seventies and early eighties. Made a total of 298 League appearances for the East Anglian side before moving to Roker Park.

Marco Gabbiadini (Forward). Made a sensational start following his transfer from York in September 1987. The 21-year-old finished last season as top scorer in his first season at Sunderland with 21 goals in only 35 League appearances. Born in Nottingham, he was an apprentice at York and scored 14 goals for them in 60 appearances before signing for Sunderland.



GUILTY

We have been informed by Wiltshire Constabulary that Mark Rivers, Steven Truman and Jonathan Webber of 15, Eastcott Hill, Swindon appeared at Swindon Magistrates Court on 25th October 1988 and were found guilty and fined £100 each with regard to burglary of football kit from Swindon Town Football Club between 17th/18th September 1988.

Rivers was ordered to pay compensation.

CUP RECEIPTS

The various Cup competitions have shown the following net gain for Swindon Town this season. From the First Leg of the Littlewoods Cup against Crystal Palace at the County Ground we retained £10,019.83 as 45% of our share of a 7,064 attendance.

The Second Leg at Selhurst Park saw our share as £8,307.05 from the 6,023 present. Therefore our retention totalled £18,326.88 from the Littlewoods Cup.

The Simod Cup was really a nonevent for Swindon Town. Our visit to Carrow Road saw the Town take a miserly £1,299.70 as their 40% share from the 5,014 who watched the match with Norwich City.

Our longer run in the most illustrious of the Cup competitions, the F.A. Cup, netted £15,758.53 from the 10,403 who watched our Third Round match at Fratton Park against Portsmouth as our 45% of the gross receipts.

The percentage falls slightly in the case of a replay so our share of the gross receipts was 42½%. This gave the Club a net retention of £16,476.46 from the Third Round replay at the County Ground.

Our Fourth Round tie against West Ham United at the County Ground produced record receipts of £85,679.

92. Our 45% share of this figure pro-

duced net receipts of £30,421.34

Our visit to Upton Park for the Fourth Round replay saw our 421/2% of the gate receipts total £48,034.34.

The accrued share of receipts from the **F.A Cup** for **Swindon Town** therefore showed a total of £110,690.67.

UPS AND DOWNS

We have received a number of letters from supporters asking us to publish the detail surrounding the end-ofseason play-offs and how they will be decided.

Although the number of Clubs in each Division will not be reduced, the Football League agreed to keep the play-offs operational at the end of this season because of the great interest they have created since being introduced in 1986-87. Attendances have been magnificent and Clubs have certainly benefitted from the revenue gained from the vital and nail-biting contests.

This season the play-offs will operate as follows:

Three teams will automatically be relegated from the First Division, with the top two in the Second automatically winning promotion. But the next four teams will play-off to decide which will be the third Club to win a place in the top flight. The bottom three Clubs will be relegated from Division Two, with the champions and runners-up automatically coming from Division Three. Those Clubs placed 3rd, 4th, 5th and 6th will then play-off to decide who fills that other promotion spot. Down from Division Three will go four Clubs, and three will automatically win promotion from the Fourth Division. This will leave one place available in Division 3 and the Clubs finishing 4th, 5th, 6th and as low as seventh will fight it out for the right to gain a place one Division

Whoever finishes at the foot of the Fourth Division – 92nd in the Football League – will automatically lose their place and hand over to the champions of the GM Vauxhall Conference.

A good question for your Club statistician: Is this the only time that both Wembley finalists have appeared at the County Ground in consecutive matches? I expect it must be.







THANK YOU HAMMERS!




