

GOODBYE TO DARLINGTON

Darlington's battle for League survival ended with their 1-5 defeat at Scunthorpe last Saturday. After 68 years of League soccer, Darlington will revert to the non-League scene next season and everyone in football will be hoping they do not go the way of Newport County, who folded a few months after suffering a similar fate last year.

The match which really caused their downfall, however, was the one a week earlier when they played at home to Colchester, the other club involved in the scuffle for survival. They lost that critical game 1-2 and Colchester turned the screw when they won 4-0 at home to Exeter on Friday evening.

That meant Darlington needed to win both of their remaining matches to stand any chance.

Scunthorpe needed the points just as desperately to help their promotion cause. A hat-trick from Tony Daws put them on the way towards that objective — and sent Darlington into the GM Vauxhall Conference.

They will be replaced by Maidstone United, provided the Football League considers that the

club's ground is up to standard.

Steve Bull became the first player since the second world war to score 100 goals in two seasons. He netted his 50th of this season in Wolves' 3-2 win over Northampton which virtually assured them of the Third Division Championship. That may by now have been settled in their favour and, if that is the case, Wolves will have become the first club ever to win the Championships of the Fourth and the Third Divisions in successive seasons. Bull scored 52 times for Wolves last season.

Manchester United's misfortune continued at Q.P.R. on Monday when they were beaten 2-3 in spite of turning in a thrilling footballing display. Though United were without key men Bryan Robson, Norman Whiteside and Paul McGrath, their young team produced some sparkling football, creating enough chances to have won with ease. In the end, after leading 2-1 and controlling much of the game, they conceded two stunning goals to Andy Gray — the second in the last minute — to suffer an unlucky defeat.


Taken from an interview with Steve McIlwham of Latics Clubcall.

Many footballers find it difficult to fill the spare time that inevitably crops up with the way things are organised. But 28 year old Latics Skipper John Kelly has no trouble at all in occupying the hours away from Boundary Park. John is a partner in the Kelly family sports shop, with responsibilities for the mail order side of things. Kelly's Kits have offices in Liverpool and Manchester, and with a mail shot of some 18,000 catalogues he is very busy. "It's a good business to be in," says John, "we supply kits to all sorts of football clubs. We are not in the replica business but more towards providing high quality, long lasting, value for money strips to teams where obviously the finances are tight.

The shop, in Liverpool, has been established 25 years and was started by his father Noel, who many people will remember from his days at Arsenal, Nottingham Forest, Crystal Palace and as player manager at Tranmere Rovers, incidentally the same club that John started on the pro-road. Having such a well known football father was a help to John, as he explains, "Dad didn't interfere at all but obviously with so much experience behind him he could spot my mistakes." As we have already mentioned John started off at Tranmere who spotted him playing in the West Cheshire League for Cammell Lairds. Johnny King in his first spell at Prenton Park, invited him to pre-season training and then offered him the chance to turn pro. All this was despite the fact that between the ages of 15 and 17 John did not kick a football in anger. After Wrexham had rejected him as a schoolboy John turned to Rugby Union and played for two years at stand off, thoroughly enjoying himself in a game that certainly suited his prodigious kicking skills. But tempted back to soccer John stayed for three years at Tranmere. "It was a great place both

to play and to learn. We had Derek Mountfield and John Williams, now at Bournemouth, in the side, and I'm delighted to see Johnny King on the brink of promotion this season. I left Prenton Park to sign for Tommy Docherty at Preston, but in characteristic fashion the Doc was sacked seven weeks later, but he must have thought that I could play because three years later he came in for me again to go to Wolves," says John. But it was Harry McNally who took him to Chester, and in three years at Sealand Road they were promoted and reached the Northern Final of the Freight Rover Trophy. John's next move took him to today's visitors Swindon, although it did not work out at the County Ground and within five months he was on the move again. "It was a big disappointment that it didn't go well for me at Swindon, I bought a flat in the town but didn't actually manage to live in it, because four days after getting the keys, I was off to Latics." John arrived at Boundary Park in November 1987 and settled quickly. He has bought a house in Chester, which he shares with girlfriend Nicky, and like everyone at the club he is bitterly disappointed with the progress of the past season. "It has been frustrating with our injuries, because I know that with a full strength side we are as good as anybody in the Second Division. I think I'm the only player who hasn't been injured this season but I have missed four matches through suspension. But while that's annoying, the way I play makes it inevitable that I'll pick up the odd booking. But I'm certain that with an even amount of luck we'll be around next season. Finally as skipper of the side I'd like to thank the fans for their backing this year because it can't have been easy at times, but you've helped us enormously.

MORE TALK OF A SUPER LEAGUE

The season has scarcely ended but already we hear rumours once again of the so-called Big Five clubs pressing for a breakaway League. The idea is to corner the television market and the huge revenue available from this source.

There might be some merit in this argument if the men conducting it had the benefit of a long experience in the organisation of professional football behind them. Most of them, however, are fairly new to the game and, though probably very successful in their own business fields, are still amateurs when it comes to the business of football.

Last summer it is said that ten clubs had come close to agreeing to leave the Football League and take part in a new ITV Super League. If that had happened, those clubs would possibly have earned enormous sums of money from television for around five years. But, inevitably, the public tires of seeing the same old sides week after week on the box and, as commercial television is guided by its audience levels, it would at some point either sooner or later-lose interest in that type of professional football.

What would happen to those ten clubs then? Inevitably, their own attendances - the real flesh and blood who have actually been turning up at their grounds for years to keep the clubs in business - will have dropped alarmingly.

Would they expect to be invited back into the Football League? If so, at what level - Division Four, maybe?

Would the League want them back? None of these questions seems to have been considered at any depth.

This has been football's major problem in recent times. All energies have been channelled into getting us through next season. What it desperately needs is someone to chart its progress over the next 10, 20 and 50 years.

I personally doubt that, at the end of the day, any club would be foolish enough to resign from the League, particularly at this moment in time.

For if the big clubs were to drop out of the League this summer, I don't think it would be possible for them to be seen on television for at least three years.

ITV's current agreement is with the Football League Ltd. - not with individual clubs.

The League could insist that ITV honours the remaining three years of its contract with them. That would mean the £11 million annual fee being shared among the clubs still remaining under the League's umbrella.

Anyone wishing to delve seriously, and deeply, into this argument has available to him all the statistics from the past. It is quite easy to appreciate that your top ten teams of today will not be your top ten clubs next season - and certainly not in ten years time.

Given the stagnancy of a competition limited to ten clubs, complacent in the knowledge that they cannot be relegated, those "top" ten would rapidly deteriorate.

Since finance is at the root of the matter - the clubs earning most at the gate are consequently the most popular and would have the widest appeal to a television audience - let us take a look at the ten best supported clubs ten years ago. They were: Arsenal, Aston Villa, Derby, Leeds, Liverpool, Manchester City, Manchester United, Nottingham Forest, Tottenham and W.B.A.

Of those, Derby have since visited the Third Division, Leeds and W.B.A. have been struggling for some years and Manchester City have spent some time in Division Two.

Go back to 1969 and we find the ten clubs with best support were Arsenal, Chelsea, Coventry, Everton, Leeds, Liverpool, Manchester City, Manchester United, Newcastle and Tottenham.

In 1959 the leaders were Arsenal, Aston Villa, Bristol City, Bristol Rovers, Chelsea, Liverpool, Manchester City, Manchester United, Tottenham and W.B.A.

If a super League had been formed at any of those junctures, it could be seen how rapidly its status would have diminished.

The point that our negotiators seem to miss is that, if the break were to be made now, exactly the same process would follow. Only, if a breakaway League would be formed, there would be no natural healing process - through promotion and relegation - to enable it to retain its respectability.

Another way to look at this thing is that, within the present structure of the Football League, it is possible for ten clubs to enjoy the image of being highly successful. Ask anyone in football and they will tell you that any side managing to stay among the top ten in our First Division is to be much admired.

Yet in a ten-club competition, the bottom five would be seen as failures -not clubs that were particularly worth watching.

We have to beware of those who try to convince us of what is best for the game when they are, in reality, only considering what they hope will be best for their own club.

That's why I believe we should listen to people of vision, like Jimmy Hill and Bobby Charlton, who genuinely desire to put something back into the game. They know what the business of football is all about. They have a wealth of experience at several levels within the game.

Yes. We should listen to men like

One of the wisest decisions ever taken by the Swindon directors was to re-instate Lou Macari as manager in April 1985 - five days after they had sacked him. That first decision had caused such a shock in the town and led to a delegation from the players to have the boss returned to office.

Happily, the situation was soon normalised, Mr. Macari continued to lay his plans to see the club rise from their home at the time in the Fourth Division. These began to be realised when Swindon won the Championship of Division Four in 1986 and followed that with further promotion a year later. Now Swindon are on

the brink of promotion to Division One.

Mr. Macari spent his distinguished playing career with Celtic and Manchester United. He celebrated his first Celtic game with a goal in 1969 and, whilst with the Celts, he played in five Cup Finals.

One of the wisest twice at Under 23 level, ecisions ever taken by he made his debut for the full Scotland team as to re-instate Lou in 1972 and went on to

collect 24 caps for his country.

Manchester United signed him for £200,000 in 1973 and for more than a decade he starred in the United side, scoring regularly.

He was appointed player-manager of Swindon during the summer of 1984 and played on for one more season before retiring to concentrate fully upon the managerial side.

ONE TO WATCH

Duncan Shearer found himself surplus to requirements with his first club, Chelsea, and probably feels he made the best decision of his life when he left Stamford Bridge in 1986. For, since then, he has become one of the game's most successful strikers. He has been a top scorer for his club in all three of his full seasons.

Duncan scored on his League debut for Chelsea in February 1986 but he got only one more game in their League eleven. They had successful strikers Kerry Dixon and David Speedie on top form at that time.

He moved on to Huddersfield a month later - and scored a hat-trick in his first full game for them, plus two more goals in his next match.

In 1986/87 he was Huddersfield's top scorer with 25 goals - including four in one game against Bradford. He led the way with 16 at Huddersfield last season and then moved on to Swindon at the end of it.

Though he made a slow start at the County Ground, he has come good in the second part of the season and his two goals, which helped them clinch a place in the play-offs last Saturday, made him their top scorer with 16

SWINDON ON BRINK OF FIRST DIVISION

Swindon's 3-0 home victory over Stoke last Saturday secured them a place in the promotion play-offs and the opportunity to complete a remarkable rise from the Fourth Division to the First within the space of just three years!

The club's progress since Lou Macari took over as manager in July 1984 has been truly breath-taking. They were struggling in the Fourth Division when he arrived but in 1986 he led them to the Divisional Championship with a record number of 102 points.

A year later Swindon finished third in Division Three to qualify for the play-offs. After defeating Wigan 3-2 on aggregate, they came from behind to draw 2-2 with Gillingham in the final. Swindon then won the play-off by 2-0 at Selhurst Park. That took them into the Second Division.

Swindon have a good reputation in knockout football and, having succeeded once in a play-off series, they are not too daunted at the prospect of having to go in with Blackburn, Watford and either of Manchester City or Crystal Palace for another bout of play-off games this year.

If Swindon succeed, they will go into the First Division for the first time in their history. Swindon have a good away record, with away League victories to their credit at Watford (3-2), Shrewsbury T. (1-0), Portsmouth (2-0), Ipswich (2-1), Bournemouth (3-2), Birmingham (2-1) and Brighton (2-0).

They drew at Barnsley (1-1), Blackburn Rovers (0-0), Oxford (1-1), Leicester (3-3), Bradford City (2-2), Leeds U. (0-0) and Walsall (2-2).

Swindon were beaten at W. B. A. (1-3), Sunderland (0-4), Hull (0-1), Stoke (1-2), Crystal Palace (1-2), Chelsea (2-3), Plymouth (1-4) and Manchester City (1-2).

Swindon fans travelling to Boundary Park are hoping this is the last time, for the time being at least, that they will be watching them play in the Second Division. And that next term they will be competing in Division One.

The Swindon side is likely to be selected from:

FRASER DIGBY (Goalkeeper)

Fraser was a reserve player with Manchester United and he got his chance in League football soon after moving to Swindon in 1986. Within a short time he was in the England under-21 side, winning three caps at that level.

DAVID HOCKADAY (Defender)

David was a forward in his Blackpool days and now used his attacking instinct to back up the Swindon forwards. Blackpool blooded him in League football during the 1976/77 season and he was transferred to Swindon in 1983.

ROSS MacLAREN (Defender/Midfield) Ross was a junior player with Glasgow Rangers and it was

after moving on Shrewsbury that he got his chance in League soccer in 1981. He quickly established himself in their first-team and in 1985 he was transferred to Derby County. Steve became part of the Rams' side which won promotion from the Third to the First Division in successive seasons and he joined Swindon last summer for £150,000.

TIM PARIN (Defender)

Tim was signed from Bristol Rovers in 1986 and has hardly missed a game since his arrival. Blackburn launched his League career in 1977 but he got only limited opportunities at Ewood Park. He moved on to Swedish club Malmoe in 1980 and returned to English football a year later when Bristol Rovers signed him.

JON GITTENS (Defender)

Jon was playing for Paget Rovers when Southampton signed him. He made his First Division debut for the Saints in 1986 and made around 20 senior appearances prior to his transfer to Swindon in 1987.

PHIL KING

(Defender)

Phil got his League chance with Exeter in 1984/85 but he did not always hold his place in the side. Torquay signed him during the 1986 close-season but within a matter of weeks he was on the move to Swindon.

STEVE FOLEY (Midfield)

Steve developed in the junior teams at Liverpool and it was

while he was out on loan to Fulham that he first tasted League football in 1983/84. At the end of that season he was transferred to Grimsby where he quickly won a first-team place. Sheffield United signed him in 1985 and a further transfer took him to Swindon in 1987.

TOM JONES (Midfield)

Tom was signed from Aberdeen in September. He had spent just over a year in Scottish football after joining the Dons from GM Vauxhall Conference Club Weymouth.

COLIN CALDERWOOD (Midfield)

Colin started his League career with Mansfield in 1982. After three seasons as a regular with the Stags, he signed for Swindon in 1985.

ALAN McLOUGHLIN (Midfield)

Alan did not make the firstteam with Manchester United but got his chance after joining Swindon in 1976. He also spent a loan period with Torquay two seasons ago.

STEVE WHITE (Forward)

Steve quickly earned a reputation as a regular goalscorer after winning his place in the Bristol Rovers' side in 1978. Luton signed him for £175,000 in 1980 and he held his place in their senior side for just over two years before transferring to Charlton for £80,000. He returned to Bristol Rovers in 1983, remaining with them until signing for Swindon in 1986. He scored 14 goals last season.



MILLWALL AND PRESTON SHARE FOOTBALL TRUST COMMUNITY AWARD

Miliwall and Preston North End are the joint winners of the inaugural Football Trust Community Club of the Year Award. The two, deemed by the Trust to have contributed most to their local communities, were each presented with a cheque for £30,000 during a ceremony held at the Waldorf Hotel in London. The money will be used to introduce further community initiatives

at The Den and Deepdale.

The panel of judges were unable to separate the two clubs and unanimously agreed to divide the award. Miliwall, strongly commended for their extensive work with the elderly and women supporters, received particular praise for their positive endeavours to combat racism. Preston North End, who have approached their community role in a different but equally effective manner, gained high praise for the extensive use of their artificial playing surface at Deepdale. Prize-money totalling £100,000 was pledged by The Football Trust in recognition of efforts made by professional clubs to strengthen links with their

local community and to mark the Football League's Centenary.

The awards were presented on a divisional basis by Lord Aberdare KBE. Chairman of The Football Trust. Millwall and Preston North End, joint winners of the Community Club of the Year Award, won their respective Divisions, promotion challengers Manchester City and Watford shared the award in the Second and Crewe Alexandra collected the Fourth Division title. Prizes of £30,000 went to Millwall and Preston North End, £20,000 to Crewe Alexandra and £10,000 each to Manchester City and Watford. All prize-money will be spent by the clubs on further community initiatives. Millwall and Preston were also awarded a special Illuminated address and the divisional winners and commended clubs received commemorative plaques. Lord Aberdare commented: "There was an excellent response from the four divisions of the Football League. The submissions, all of which were extremely professional, have highlighted a more enlightened attitude within the game and one which deserves far greater recognition."

A total of 57 Football League clubs tendered applications for the Trust's Community Award Scheme displaying a varied range of initiatives. These include the introduction of sreches, programmes to counter racism and sexism and the extensive

provision of facilities for spectators with disabilities.

Clubs commended for their efforts were Arsenal (a Special Commendation), Aston Villa, Bradford City, Brentford, Colchester United, Derby County, Doncaster Rovers, Grimsby Town, Leeds United, Oldham Athletic, Reading, Sheffield United, Sheffield Wednesday, Southampton and Tranmers Rovers. Since 1979, The Football Trust, which is lunded entirely

by Littlewoods, Vernons and Zetters from their Spotting-the-Ball competition, has worked extensively to support and fund community initiatives in the professional and semi-professional game.

Almost £2.5 million is invested every year by the organisation in football and the community schemes throughout the United Kingdom. Initiatives include the allocation of funds for the PFA's Community Programme in Professional Football, the provision of hard surface play areas, full-sized artificial pitches, the development of women's football, the funding of Soccer As Family Entertainment, the building of numerous indoor sports facilities and an extensive programme of pitch and changing accommodation improvements in conjunction with local authorities.


