Remember **Brian Hughes**, the former Town midfield player who played for the Club from 1979 to 1983. Brian now plays for Gloucester City in the Beazer Homes Premier Division and, talking to a local reporter, he described his full time career before disappearing from the full time scene.

The player who "can't head a ball contackle and can't shoot with his left foot how Gloucester City skipper Brown Hughes sums up his contribution to country's National sport!

Despite these apparent handicaps
27 year old glazier has not fared
badly on the football field.

He became the first Gloucester Cocaptain to lift a major non-League sociatitle last season when The Tigers stome to the Beazer League Midland Division Championship and it was not the fittine that Hughes has had a Souther League soccer trophy in his clutches

He was part of Cheltenham Town Premier Division Championship side II

But it is not only at non-League soccer level that Hughes has sparkled After serving an apprenticeship with Swindon Town he went on to sign full professional forms with the Wiltshire Club in 1980.

Hughes made 80 first team appearances during his stay at the County Ground, among them a memorable night at Anfield in the League Cup.

"Graeme Souness, Ian Rush and Kenny Dalglish were in the Liverpool side at the time, so not surprisingly we hard touched the ball all night!" recall-

"There wasn't even a financial consolation. Our Manager had promised us £5 per player that season for every thousand customers above the 15,000 barrier

"When the draw was announced the lads were all rubbing their hands with delight, expecting a bumper crowd for the game Instead. Anfield had their lowest gate of the season, 16,500 and we made a miserable fiver each!"

While Hughes was at the County Ground, Swindon had one of their most successful spells ever.

"It was an exciting time to be with Swindon and even reserve team games brought you into contact with top notch : players. I played against Glenn Hoddle three times and also faced people like Terry Butcher and Neil Webb "

From Swindon, Hughes moved to Torquay, a decision he describes as "the worst I ever made."

Former Aston Villa ace Bruce Rioch was then taking his first managerial steps at Torquay.

Hughes admits that he was not overly impressed by Rioch's brand of management though he still made 38 League appearances for the Devon Club before leaving to join Cheltenham Town.





Our historian takes a look at some previous meetings with today's opponents.

OUR TWENTY-NINTH MEETING

Today is the 29th meeting between Swindon Town and Ipswich Town in the Football League. Twenty of them came between the end of the War and 1957, when Ipswich last said goodbye to the Third Division.

Swindon Town first said 'hello' to our visitors from Suffolk in the final full season prior to the War. Cliff Francis scored for Swindon in both games, his effort in a 1-1 draw at the County Ground coming from the penalty spot.

A DAY TO REMEMBER FOR ROY

Swindon's visit to Ipswich on November 8th 1947, was a memorable day for 19-year old Roy Onslow. The former Sanford YC forward, one of three footballing brothers, was making his League debut for Swindon. Jackie Dryden made his day with a winning goal a minute from time. Three weeks later, Ipswich came to the County Ground in the First Round of the F.A. Cup.

Stan Parker, who with Tim (no relation), always seemed to score against Swindon, gave Ipswich the lead inside a minute. But Morris Jones, who had scored on his debut for Swindon a week earlier, at Reading, popped in two goals and visiting full-back David Bell had conceded a third by half-time. Billy Lucas added a fourth in the 73rd minute before Tom Parker made the final score 4-2. Jones grabbed another couple a week later at Leyton Orient.

MORRIS AND TOMMY ON THE MARK

Both Clubs registered four goals in their respective home games in 1948/49. Morris Jones and Tommy Dawson scored on both occasions for Swindon. At the County Ground, on November 6, Swindon led by a Maurice Owen goal with just ten minutes left. But Jones crashed home a penalty and Dawson added two more in the final seven minutes.

FOUR OF THE BEST

Swindon's next four-goal victory over Ipswich came at Portman Road, in October 1951. Mick Betteridge and Maurice Owen each scored twice and a fifth was provided by home defender Doug Rees. Sam McCrory replied with a penalty. The Irishman, who had scored twice against Swindon a year earlier, repeated the trick in a 2-1 Ipswich victory at the County Ground in March 1952.

Willie Millar found the net in both encounters with Ipswich in 1952/53, which came within ten days in April Swindon gained a creditable 1-1 draw in Suffolk and then Millar's 86th minute goal put the seal on a 2-0 victory at the County Ground.

THE TOWN LOST ALL FOUR!

Swindon were less fortunate in 1953/54 and 1955/56, losing all four games. The Clubs did not meet in the intervening season as Ipswich were then experiencing their first brief taste of Second Division football. They returned to the Third South with a vengeance, scoring 106 goals. Unfortunately, Swindon were on the receiving end of six of them at Portman Road early in September. The men from Wiltshire were 5-0 down before Bob Edwards found the net in the 70th minute. Tom Garvey, Tom Parker (completing a hat-trick) and Bill Reed had all scored in a crazy three minute spell. Wilf Grant, for Ipswich, and Maurice Owen made the final score 6-2.

ANOTHER FOUR

Ipswich put another four past Sam Burton in January 1957, but not before Swindon had recorded a fine 3-1 victory over the eventual champions on September 15. Bob Edwards added two to Owen's opener at the County Ground. At Portman Road, Reed and Jimmy Leadbetter shared the spoils, with John Richards getting a consolation for Swindon.

TOWN TRIO

RECORD BOOV

By the time the two Club met again, in 1964/65, Ipswich had won the First Division championship. Two goals in as many minutes, from big Bill Atkins and an own goal by Mick McNeil, set Swindon on the way to victory. Mike Summerbee added a third on the hour before John Colrain pulled a goal back two minutes before the end. Ipswich also visited the County Ground on F.A. Cup business that season.

Frank Brogan put the visitors ahead in the 55th minute and finished Swindon's interest in the competition with a second strike three minutes from time. Dennis Brown replied almost immediately, but it was too little, too late.

It was 1987 before Ipswich made a return to Wiltshire and Swindon saw that it was an unhappy one, scoring twice in each half, through Ian Cranson (own goal), Jimmy Quinn, Phil King and Dave Bamber. David Lowe and Mark Brennan made it 4-2.





We are due to meet Porstmouth in a Barclays Division Two fixture on the previous Sunday.

MIDWEEK - A PROBLEM?

The Management Committee of the Football Combination were due to meet on Wednesday last to discuss the problems of mid-week afternoon kick-offs.

In this competition referees and linesmen have to take a days annual holiday, which is not always possible, or lose a days pay of say £40–£50 to officiate mid-week afternoons, for which they receive a £20 fee if they are the referee or £10 if they are the linesmen. Not an economical situation, I am sure you will agree.

There is a line of thought that the Football Combination should follow the Central League and play all mid-week matches between 7.00 and 7.30 p.m. or a Saturday with a 2 p.m. start. This would allow more local officials to be appointed and considerably reduce the cost of travelling which would help to defray some of the cost of the floodlights. The cost of this is considerably less after 7 p.m.

Another suggestion is to form two Divisions with 15/16 teams in each and curtail the expenses by reducing the number of matches to around thirty per season. The present number is thirty-eight

There are thirty-six weeks in a season and by leaving Christmas, the New Year and Easter clear it would still give Clubs a match nearly every week.

Ipswich Town has been a professional Club for little more than fifty years, but links with Swindon Town extend the whole of that period.

SMALL FEES COMPARED WITH TODAY!

Fred Houldsworth, a goalkeeper who cost Ipswich £150 back in June 1936, was a Swindon Town discovery. Fred had been spotted playing for the Army at Tidworth and was in the Third Division side within three months. He played just 30 games for Swindon before joining Stoke City early in April 1935. Swindon received a £700 transfer fee. Fred spent two years in the Southern League at Portman Road before going to Reading on a free transfer when Ipswich was elected to the Football League in May 1938. He finished his career at Elm Park at the end of the War, but spent much of it on the south coast, at Southampton.

'DAI'

Welshman David Edwards spent a season either side of the hostilities with the Suffolk Club. Signed from Gloucester City in June 1939, the inside-forward moved on to Swindon in May 1946. He was given a free transfer and joined Bath City after just three League appearances.

BAT AND BALL

The end of the War also saw the start of the career of full-back Geoff Fox. In Suffolk whilst serving his country, Geoff played cricket for the county and played 26 games for Ipswich Town before returning to his home town, Bristol, in June 1947. He spent eight years at Eastville and then came to the County Ground as player-manager in October 1955. But, after failing to take Swindon out of a re-election place, his contract was terminated thirteen months

SHORT STAY FOR DAVE

Former Millwall and England Youth International wing-half Dave Harper spent two years at Ipswich before moving to Swindon in July 1967. The Londoner's stay at the

Ground, before going to Tranmere Rovers as player-manager in September 1980.

'THE YOUNGEST EVER'

One of Bryan's signings at Prenton Park, in July 1981, was Ipswich goalkeeper Scott Endersby. The ex-apprentice failed to make a League appearance at Portman Road, but had already made his mark in the record books by virtue of having been the youngest ever participant in the F.A. Cup for his previous Club, Kettering Town Tranmere gave him a free transfer County Ground was all too brief in May 1983 and Scott came to

Within three months, he was back Swindon. He was 'ever-present' at in the capital with Orient.

ULSTER PLAYER OF THE YEAR'

In 1971, Ipswich signed the 24 year old 'Ulster Player of the Year', Bryan Hamilton, from Linfield Already a Northern Ireland International, Bryan went on to get 50 daps for his country and was leading goalscorer at Portman Road in 1972/73. 1973/74 and 1974/75. Moves took him to Everton and Millwall before he arrived at Swindon in November 1978. Currently at Wigan, he started out on the managerial road by looking after the reserve side at the County the County Ground in 1984/85 but lost his place to Kenny Allen early in the following season and was soon on his way to Carlisle.

DAVID GEDDIS

Another former apprentice at Portman Road is David Geddis, still on the County Ground staff David made his League debut while on loan from Ipswich to Luton in February 1977 and, just over a year later, was in the F.A. Cup winning side at Wembley. Apart from fifteen months at Barnsley, David has spent the remainder of his career in the midlands, with Aston Villa, Birmingham city and Shrewsbury.

The commencement of October brought no joy for Ipswich, a 1-0 defeat at Transere Rovers in the Second Leg of their Second Round Littlewood's Cup tie ensured their eclipse.

On Saturday last the East Anglian Club entertained Newcastle United at Portman Road and recorded their first win since August 22nd, the Tyneside Club being defeated 2-1.

Goalkeepers - Town Manager. Ossie Ardiles. accompanied by Chairman, Brian Hillier, were interested onlookers at the East Anglian Clubs recent away League fixture at Brighton. It was a match where they witnessed Craig Forrest, (22) injured in the fiftieth minute of the match. The injury to the Canadian born 'keeper, who made his League debut on loan to Colchester United, prompted Manager John Duncan into seeking a replacement. With the departure of reserve team goalkeeper Ron Fearon, to the United States the former Chesterfield Manager was in a dilemma. The problem was resolved with the loan signing of Sheffield Wednesday's Marlon Beresford, (20)

His hopes of an extended run in the Ipswich line-up were halted when the Canadian International recovered from his knock. The injury at Brighton needed six minutes of treatment before he was replaced by substitute David Hill.

Defenders - Manager John Duncan has fielded a regular back four in the early part of this season with the experienced Frank Yallop, (25), and Neil Thompson, (26), filling the full back positions. While Frank was a product of the Ipswich Town nursery system. Neil joined the East Anglian Club from Scarborough for £100,000 in the close season. Both full backs have an attacking tendency, in fact Neil scored twelve goals for Scarborough last season. The central defenders are Tony Humes, (23), and David Linghan, (24) David is the Club's record signing, joining Ipswich Town from Shrewsbury in June 1988 for £300,000. The former Hartlepool United and Derby County defender has proved to be a sound investment Versatile Tony Humes is capable of slotting into any defensive role. The tough tackling defender had the misfortune to break his leg twice early in his career. Tony is equally adept in a midfield role and is approaching a century of appearances for the East Anglian Club. Graham Harbey, (25), joined Ipswich Town from Derby County in June 1987 for £65,000. Graham is another of Ipswich's versatile players who can also play in a midfield position. The return of John Wark, (32), from Liverpool in January 1988 for £100,000 for his second spell with the Club has seen the Scottish International prefer a defensive role. A product of Ipswich's youth system he collected an F.A. Cup medal

in 1978 and a U.E.F.A. Cup-winners medal before joining the Anfield Club for \$450.000 in 1984. Sergei Baltatcha, (31) made football history when he became the first Russian to sign for an English Club. Sergei has 46 International caps to his credit and is the holder of a European Cup-winners medal with Dynamo Kiev. Steve Palmer, (21), was a Cambridge University student who has signed full time for the East Anglian Chub. Made his League debut as a 30th minute substitute in the 2-2 draw at Oxford United on September 23rd in place of Neil Thompson

Midfield - Ipswich Town rely heavily upon the experience and skill of midfield player Romeo Zondervan, (30), who joined the East Anglian Club from West Bromwich Albion for a £70,000 fee in 1984. The Dutch International had moved to the Midland Club from Twente Enschede for £200,000, now approaching 200 appearances for the Portman Road Club. Simon Milton, (26). is an all action midfield player with a goalscoring talent. After joining Ipswich Town from Beazer League side, Bury Town, he made his debut for the Portman Road Club against us in December 1987 David Hill, (23), who scored in our recent 3-0 Football Combination defeat. joined Ipswich Town from Scunthorpe United for £80,000 in June 1988. David is expected to be out of action for the rest of this season after breaking a leg in a recent reserve match with Norwich City Mick Stockwell, (24) has made over a century of appearances for Ipswich Suffered a broken leg last season but fought his way back into contention for a first team place Mick, who was an amateur with Leyton Orient. prefers to play on the right hand side of midfield Ian Redford, (29) is a former Scotland Under-21 International who was signed from Dundee United for £200,000 in November 1988 Gavin Johnson, (19) made four first team appearances last season and is predicted to have a bright future. Jason Dozzell, (21) is equally at home in midfield or attack. Jason was the youngest ever player to score in First Division Football when he scored against Coventry City at Portman Road in 1984. A late call-up for the England Under-21 party in Poland in midweek Unfortunately he had to withdraw with injury last Saturday

The highest attendance for a match between Swindon Town and Ipswich Town was for the F.A. Cup tie on November 29th 1947 when 20,382 watched the Town defeat the Portman Road Club 4-2 with Morris Jones (2), Billy Lucas and an own goal making up the Town tally.

Forwards - David Lowe, (24), made nearly 300 League appearances for Wigan Athletic before becoming Manager, John Duncan 's first signing in June 1987 for £80,000. The England Under-21 International is a hard working player South African born Mich D'Avray, (27), is the Club's longest serving player Capped by England at Under-21 level he joined the East Anglian Club from school, now approaching two hundred and fifty senior appearances Former Norwich City winger Louie Donowa, (25), joined Ipswich Town on a free transfer from Dutch team Willel II. The former England Under-21 International also had a spell in Spain. Made his debut against Wolverhampton Wanderers as a substitute in a 3-1 home defeat on September 16th Chris Kiwomya, (19), was a prolific goalscorer at youth team level and he is regarded as one of the Club's brights young prospects. Chris has made over 30 senior appearances for Ipswich Neil Woods, (23) has made one full appearance this season. The former Doncaster Rovers and Glasgow Rangers striker has found the going difficult at Portman Road Scored one of the goals in our recent 3-0 Football Combination defeat by Ipswich Town recently.





FORM CHECK

Leicester City and their Manager, David Pleat have experienced a torrid time this season. This has been due to the injury list at Filbert Street which has reached alarming proportions. The Filbert Street Chib have won only one of their six home matches up to now.

They lost by a single goal to Blackburn Rovers on August 23rd when a goal in the 77th minute, by the prolific goalscoring Simon Garner settled the issue Three days later Newcastle United were the visitors and they took a point back to the North-East from a 2-2 draw, after Kevin McAllister had given City a 27th minute lead Mick Quinn, five minutes before half time, and John Gallacher, in the fifth-fifth minute, gave the visitors the lead Tony Spearing rescued a point for Lescester four minutes later with a 25 yard shot.

On September 9th the Filbert Street Chib had to relinquish all three points to a rampant West Bromwich Albion Injury hit City took the lead thirty minutes into the game through Paul Reid Within two minutes Albion were level through Colin West Former Arsenal defender Chris Whyte put Albion further ahead on the stroke of half time. Don Goodman took advantage of a weak Simon Morgan back pass in the 74th minute

Relief came on September 23rd when a goal from Lee Glover, four minutes from the final whistle, deprived visitors Brighton and Hove Albion of a point.

Sunderland were the visitors to Filbert Street four days later and they increased the furrows in David Pleat's worried brow, with a 3-2 win Paul Williams gave City the lead in the twenty ninth minute but Gordon Armstrong equalised for the Roker Park Club five minutes later. Four minutes after the interval break Paul Bardyman put the visitors ahead from the penalty spot.

Alan Paris appeared to have given his Chib a point with a fifty-fifth minute equaliser. All thoughts of a second home win of the season evaporated when Gary Owers scored Sunderland's winner twenty minutes later.

 When Gary Shaw and Darren Hall made their debuts in the Reserve team match with Millwall it brought the total number of players we have used this season to twenty-six.


'CHERRIES' ARE BITTEN BY SPENCE TRIO!
