TREVOR AYLOTT (Striker) Ht. 6.1, Wt. 14, age 32. Born London. The first of many injured players in the Dean Court camp, Trevor's season, his fourth with AFC, has been badly affected by a foot injury. After making a gradual comeback to the First Team, he has since started three games.

LUTHER BLISSETT (Striker) Ht. 5.11, Wt. 12, age 32. Born Jamaica. Strangely has hit a bad patch going 11 outings without a goal, came so close in ending the drought last Saturday at Portsmouth. Luther's strike rate for 'The Cherries' is still one in two, and more goals are surely on the way.

KEVIN BOND (Defender) Ht. 6.0, Wt. 12, age 32. Born London. Having just recently recovered from a facial injury due to a clash of heads, the team captain is now out again following an ankle injury picked up at Portsmouth. Scored his first and only AFC goal in the 3-1 defeat at Swindon last season.

SHAUN BROOKS (Midfield) Ht. 5.7, Wt. 11, age 27. Born London. Scorer of 4 League goals this season, the fourth opening the scoring at Portsmouth last Saturday. Has started the last six games.

RICHARD CADETTE (Forward) Ht. 5.7, Wt. 10.10, age 25. Born London. Loan signing from Brentford, came on as substitute in the previous home game with Watford, and started the game at Portsmouth. Has gone very close to scoring in both outings.

DAVID COLEMAN (Defender) Ht. 5.7, Wt. 10.8, age 22. Born Salisbury. A former Youth and Reserve player who actually made his AFC League debut over four years ago, now enjoying his best run in the First Team. Also made 10 League appearances last season for Colchester United to gain further experience.

MATTHEW HOLMES (Midfield) Ht. 5.5, Wt. 10.2, age 20. Born Luton. Another young player enjoying a good season of League football, although it has not gone without a couple of nasty injuries.

PHIL KITE (Goalkeeper) Ht. 6.1, Wt. 14, age 27. Born Bristol. Made his fifth League appearance of the season at Portsmouth last Saturday. Joined 'The Cherries' last summer from Gillingham, previously with Bristol Rovers.

GEORGE LAWRENCE (Forward) Ht. 5.10, Wt. 10.2, age 26. Born London. Summer signing from Millwall, George has also been sidelined with various injuries during the season.

PAUL MILLER (Central Defender) Ht. 6.1, Wt. 13, age 30. Born London. Also joined 'The Cherries' last summer costing £50,000 from Watford. Missed the Wolves game due to suspension.

PAUL MORRELL (Defender) Ht. 5.11, Wt. 13.5, age 29. Born Poole. AFC's only locally born player and the club's longest serving player. Unfortunately now 'Mozy' is one of three long term injury casualties due to a stomach muscle tear.

DENNY MUNDEE (Defender) Ht. 5.10, Wt. 11, age 21. Born Swindon. Formerly an apprentice with Swindon his home club. Denny made his full League debut in the final game of last season against Plymouth at Dean Court. Has started a couple of League games this season.

SEAN O'DRISCOLL (Midfield) Ht. 5.8, Wt. 11.3, age 32. Born Wolverhampton. Over 260 full League appearances in Bournemouth's colours since his debut six years ago. Previously with Fulham and non-League Alvechurch.

GAVIN PEACOCK (Midfield) Ht. 5.8, Wt. 11.8, age 21. Born Barnehurst. Hoping to reclaim his place in the First Team following a groin strain ended his run of 17 consecutive League appearances. Arrived from Gillingham last summer for a club record £210,000.

GERRY PEYTON (Goalkeeper) Ht. 6.2, Wt. 13.11, age 33. Born Birmingham. A thigh injury prevented Gerry from winning his 27th Cap for the Republic of Ireland against Wales, and also ruled him out of action last Saturday at Portsmouth.

PETER SHEARER (Utility) Ht. 6.1, Wt. 13, age 23. Born Coventry. In his second spell of League football. Peter joined 'The Cherries' from Cheltenham Town and made his debut in the game at Shrewsbury twelve months ago.

NEIL SLATTER (Defender) Ht. 5.11, Wt. 10.10, age 25. Born Cardiff. The second of our two loan signings, Neil from Oxford United, is a Welsh International and is hoping to establish himself in regular League action again. Began as an apprentice with Bristol Rovers.

SHAUN TEALE (Defender) Ht. 6.0, Wt. 13.7, age 25. Born Southport. A freak accident in training causing ligament damage in his left knee is to say the least a cruel blow for Shaun, who until a month ago was ever present for AFC since his £80,000 arrival from Weymouth last February.

JOHN WILLIAMS (Defender) Ht. 6.1, Wt. 13.2, age 29. Born Liverpool. Like Shaun, 'Willo' will also be out for the remaining games of the season due to a dislocated shoulder. The second time his injury has occurred this season.

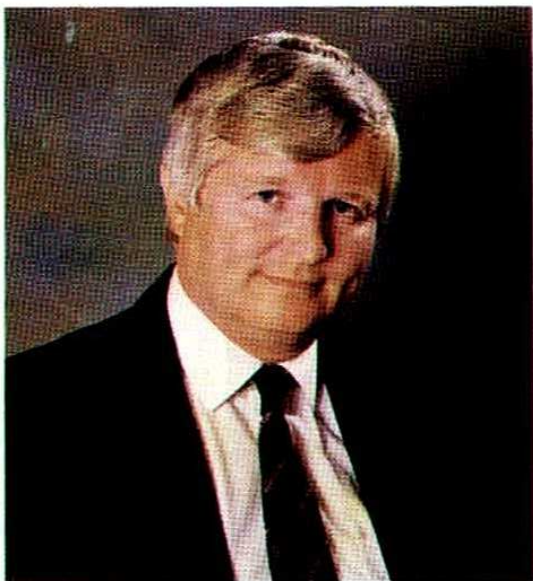

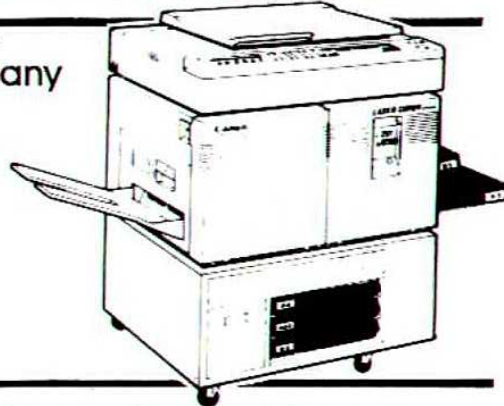

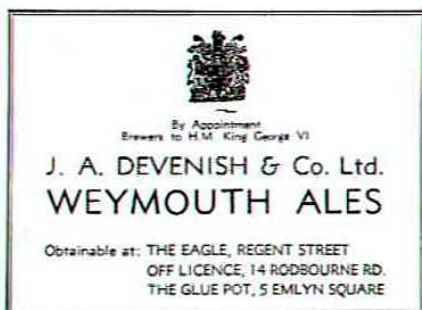

Simner's shock goals for Swindon upset Boscombe

SWINDON TOWN 3 - 1 BOURNEMOUTH & BOSCOMBE
Saturday 22nd October, 1949

For the first time since the resumption of normal League football, Boscombe were defeated by Swindon on Saturday.

Boscombe have often shown their ability to fight back but it was not forthcoming in this game. Two goals down within seven minutes, they never recovered from these early shocks and at no time did their play inspire a great deal of confidence.

Much encouraged by their early successes, Swindon maintained a firm grip of the game and never permitted Boscombe to settle down as an organised side. They were much quicker to the ball, moved it with first-time passes into the open spaces and showed much more power in finishing off their quick, thrustful movements.

CLEVER HEADER

In Owen they had a clever centre forward who found a way to elude the attentions of Stirling by methods which the centre half could not counter. Owen never attempted to hold the ball and force a way through the middle. He kept it on the move with many fine passes to the inside forwards and also moved about himself with the result that Stirling never knew where he was going to pop up from one minute to another.

SIMNER'S SUCCESS

Best response to Owen's skillful ball distribution came from the left wing pair, Jones and Simner. Secured from Chelsea with the reputation of being a utility forward, Simner was introduced to Swindon's attack as an emergency outside left owing to an injury to Bain. He has fully justified his choice by scoring three goals in two matches.

He obtained two against Boscombe in opportunist fashion, but owed his first success to Owen for a well-placed ball down the middle which had both Cunningham and Stirling guessing. Simner was quick to seize his chance to run on to the ball and gave Duke no opportunity of stopping a hard-hit ball from 10 yards.

Two minutes later when Duke failed to hold a ball which rolled out of his arms. Simner, who has a smart turn of speed was on the spot before the goalkeeper could regain possession and had the easiest of tasks to tap the ball over the line. As Simner returned the compliment to Owen by making the opening for the centre forward to score Swindon's third goal he had a big share in his side's well deserved victory.

BEST WING FORWARD

Simner was the best wing forward on view although Cunningham found a way to curb his activities more often in the second half than the first.

Wheeler, too, was a speedy outside right, but he generally found his match in Drummond whose quick strong and determined tackling was an outstanding feature of Boscombe's defensive play. He also kicked a good length ball and frequently went up in support of the attack. Seldom in a game have I seen two opposing backs come to grips, but it happened more than once at Swindon when Drummond and Cowie, a fellow countryman of the Boscombe back, were concerned in fierce tussles for the ball.

BOSCOMBE SHORTCOMINGS

One of Boscombe's shortcomings in this game was the failure of wing half backs and inside forwards to establish mutual understanding and contact. Woodward and Roberts were indefatigable workers, but little was seen of the left half as a constructive player and although Woodward was more successful in this respect co-operation between him and Blair so often broke down that Cunningham was frequently left alone to cope with Swindon's left wing pair. A clever ball player, Jones held it just long enough to place the Boscombe right back in the awkward position of not knowing what his next move was to be. As a result Simner often received the ball when Cunningham was just out of tackling distance.

CHANGE OF TACTICS

Another Boscombe mistake was the change of tactics in the second half. They started off by making the ball do the work with well flung passes to the wings and the fact that several chances were created, though missed, showed that this style was likely to be profitable.

But in the second half, when heavy rain made the ball greasy and conditions difficult underfoot, they altered this style to close passing, the forwards almost invariably converging into the middle thus playing into the hands of the strong Swindon defence.

PENALTY INCIDENT

Cowie and Young, the backs, and pivot Hudson were all very dependable, none making a serious mistake until the centre half brought down Billy Lunn, Boscombe's most thrustful forward, in the penalty area. This led to an arguable incident! When McGibbon took the kick Boulton, Swindon's reliable goalkeeper saved but play went on and Cheney shot into the net.

It transpired, however, that the whistle had gone and the referee again pointed to the 12 yard spot for the kick to be retaken. The explanation was that Boulton had moved. McGibbon made a better attempt with his second shot and beat Boulton. Swindon players protested hotly both before and after the penalty was retaken.

Whether this goal, his 11th of the season, will put an end to McGibbon's bad run remains to be seen. He showed occasional glimpses of better form but found Hudson a formidable obstacle. After starting well Cross did not maintain his form of the previous two matches. Cheney, who made several good scoring attempts, and Lunn were the better wing.

There must have been much confidence in the 'Boscombe' Camp at the start of the season as The Cherries finished third and second respectively in the previous two seasons.

The signs were looking good after seven games with only one defeat, full back Ian Drummond a new signing from Portsmouth made his debut in the opening game at Ipswich.

The first player to leave during the season was Jimmy Blair, a crowd favourite who joined Leyton Orient, a few weeks after Jack Lewis made his first appearance for Boscombe against Crystal Palace.

One player who had well and truly worn Bournemouth's colours was goalkeeper Ken Bird who in the last game of the year celebrated his 200th League appearance.

Notts County were the visitors for this being Ken's benefit match which attracted over 20,000. Despite County fielding one of England's greatest centre forwards, the eventual champions lost by three goals.

Following the Notts County game, Bournemouth failed to win any of the next eight outings which resulted in Manager Harry Lowe being dismissed.

Jack Bruton formerly in charge at Blackburn took over, and brought with him Arthur Cunliffe who was appointed Chief Trainer, a position he was to hold for the next twenty years.

Hopes of another challenge for promotion had long disappeared and in the end a disappointing season.

IN MEMORY

Last Monday morning marked the sad death of Peter Jones, 60, one of B.B.C. Radio's top commentators. Only on the Saturday before he was commentating on the boat race when suddenly he was taken ill.

I have a personal reason for the inclusion of this article as Mr Jones was a neighbour of mine where I previously lived in Buckinghamshire.

I first met him in 1978 and for the next nine years, until when I moved to Dorset, he would pass on to me football programmes on matches which were featured on the radio.

Many of the programmes along with other souvenirs were autographed, and to a young teenager that meant a lot.

Last February Mr Jones provided second half commentary on Radio 2 for Manchester United's visit to Dean Court in the F.A. Cup.

He was actually broadcasting 'live' complete with headphones and microphone from one of the seats in the Centre Stand amongst the supporters.

After the match we both met up for the first time since I became editor of the AFC Programme, it seemed unusual for me not to have to ask him for a programme!

Apart from covering five Olympic games, five world cups and every F.A. Cup Final since 1968, Mr Jones also fronted B.B.C. Radio's Wimbledon Tennis Coverage, second half commentary on a top football match every Saturday afternoon and besides sport also many state occasions such as the Royal Wedding in 1981.

He gave me a great interest for football, his knowledge on this and all sports was quite superb. I shall always remember his kindness and all our friendly discussions on my favourite game, I am sure those in the media here today join me in sending our deepest condolences to his wife and family.

This afternoon will be the 84th League game between AFC Bournemouth and Swindon Town, dating back to 1923, when The Cherries first joined the football League.

A table below shows all the results of which Bournemouth have just the edge.

Both sides have met in both major cup competitions, in the League Cup The Robins remain unbeaten, winning 2-1 in a first round tie of 1966, then in 1980 taking a 3-1 aggregate win as the opening round was played over two legs.

In the F.A. Cup the situation is reversed, in 1926 at Dean Court a replay was forced following a 1-1 draw, then Bournemouth won 4-3 at the County Ground.

In December 1956 'Boscombe' recorded another victory at Swindon before a crowd of almost 17,500. Reg Cutler's goal at the start of the second half won the tie, although Swindon's Bob Edwards could have equalized in the closing minutes, as he missed a penalty.

CLOSED CIRCUIT TELEVISION

The Football Trust has installed Closed Circuit Television systems at more than 110 British grounds. The cameras have a range of 150 metres and immediate close-up prints can be produced. Within minutes of an incident offenders can be identified and arrested with film made available as evidence in court. CCTV is the most effective anti-hooligan measure inside football grounds and the programme has been extended to include portable systems.

CCTV is only one of The Football Trust's many initiatives. Each year it receives over £9.5 million from the Spotting-the-Ball competition run by Littlewoods, Vernons and Zettlers and spends it on projects that benefit all levels of the game throughout the United Kingdom.

MEET THE MANAGER – OSSIE ARDILES

Ossie was appointed to the post as Manager of Swindon Town on Thursday 20th July 1989.

In his prime, Ossie was an outstanding player who liked to come forward and support other players from his midfield role. A fighter who battled hard and was particularly adept at playing balls wide. A two footed player who always makes himself available for the ball.

Ossie joined Tottenham from Huracan, the Argentinian Club in 1978, and during ten years with the White Hart Lane Club, he collected an F.A. Cup winners medal in 1987 against Manchester City, and a U.E.F.A. Cup winners medal in 1984 when the North London Club defeated Anderlecht in the Final. Ossie joined Spurs along with fellow Argentinian, Ricky Villa in a £750,000 transfer deal.

Ossie spent last season with Queens Park Rangers, and he had the misfortune to break a leg in mid season. After a period of recuperation he spent the summer playing for Fort Lauderdale in America prior to joining Swindon Town.

Outlook on Opponents



FRASER DIGBY. Born 23.4.67, Sheffield. Height 6' 0". The former England Under 21 International was the only Player to make the maximum number of League appearances last season. Fraser, who has attracted the attention of many of the leading clubs in the First Division, began his career with Manchester United as an apprentice. Following an initial period on loan at the County Ground, the Sheffield born goalkeeper moved to Swindon Town, for a fee of £12,500 in December 1986. Manchester United insisted on retaining fifty per cent of any profit, in the event of the player being transferred to another club.

Ever present to date in his fourth season with the club.

DAVID KERSLAKE. Born 19.6.66, London. Height 5' 8". David is also a former England Under 21 International following an apprenticeship with Queens Park Rangers he signed professional forms in the summer of 1983.

He went on to make over 40 full League appearances, and half that figure as substitute.

Joined Swindon last November.

Ever present since making his debut against Portsmouth.

PAUL BODIN. Born 13.9.66, Cardiff. Height 5' 10". Paul joined Swindon Town from the now defunct Newport County in March 1988. The Welsh born utility player commenced his career in the Football League with the former Somerton Park Club without making a senior appearance. It was after joining fellow Welsh Club Cardiff City that he made his League debut. After three seasons with the South Wales Club he drifted into non-League football with Bath City after being given a free transfer by the Ninian Park Club. Newport County eventually paid the Southern League Club £15,000 for his return in January 1988 after Paul had been attracting the attention of several clubs with his consistent performances.

Last season the versatile Paul, proved he was adept in a full back or midfield role with Swindon Town.

Has started each game since November, scored in the recent draw at Oxford and during the 3-2 home defeat by The Cherries.

ALAN McLOUGHLIN. Born 20.4.67, Manchester. Height 5' 7". The former Manchester United apprentice moved to Swindon Town on a free transfer in August 1986. Originally a full back, Alan was converted to a midfield role and he relished the transition. Last season he established a regular position in the Town's Second Division promotion drive. Alan spent two periods on loan with Torquay United during the 1986-87 and 1987-88 season.

Has only been absent from the League Cup Game against Shrewsbury in October, scorer of 13 League goals.

COLIN CALDERWOOD. Born 20.1.65, Glasgow. Height 6'. Colin, who is the Club Captain, returned to the form last season, that made him an attraction in previous seasons, for several of the country's leading clubs. Colin, who is widely regarded as one of the Second Division's strongest central defenders, was signed from Mansfield Town with a Football League Appeals Committee setting the transfer fee at £27,500 in June 1986, with the added stipulation that in the event of the player being transferred to another club for a fee in excess of £27,500 then Swindon Town will pay Mansfield Town 50% of such an excess.

Another ever present member of the First Team this season who takes his total number of League appearances to over 200.

JON GITTENS. Born 22.1.64, Moseley. Height 5' 11". Jon joined Swindon Town in July 1987 with a Football League tribunal committee setting the fee at £40,000, following his move from Southampton. The Birmingham born central defender was signed by The Saints from Page's Rovers, the Midland Combination Club in October 1985 for an initial fee of £6,000. The First Division Club having to pay the non-League Club a further sum of £16,000 on completion of a set number of First Team appearances. Jon's appearances last season were limited due to disciplinary suspensions. Jon was suspended for the first two matches of this season following an F.A. ruling for passing 51 disciplinary points for last season.

Apart from missing the opening couple of games of the season he has since only been absent from four outings.

TOM JONES. Born 7.10.64, Aldershot. Height 5' 9". After being discarded by Chelsea as a youngster, the skillful midfield player drifted into non-League circles with Farborough Town and Weymouth. It was while he was with The Terras, that Tom attracted the attention of several Football League Clubs. Surprisingly it was Scottish League Club, Aberdeen, who eventually signed the former Chelsea apprentice in 1987 for a fee of £35,000.

Tom's spell with the Pittodrie Club came to an end after just over a year when he returned to the South of England with Swindon Town. The fine form he had displayed in his early games with the club deteriorated with his disillusionment with the long ball tactics The Town adopted. Tom's frustration resulted in a transfer request, which he eventually withdrew following Manager Ossie Ardiles' appointment. Tom was forced to miss the early pre-season and

League matches due to a cartilage operation just after pre-season training commenced, although the injury had flared up in the play off matches with Crystal Palace last season.

Scored during his first game of the season against visitors Wolves in September, a First Team starter since October.

DUNCAN SHEARER. Born 28.8.62, Fort William. Height 5' 10". The Scots born striker is the club's record buy, joining the County Ground staff from Huddersfield Town in June 1988 for £250,000. Duncan was the leading goalscorer for the club in League matches last season, with 14 goals. The Scot entered League soccer with Chelsea from Inverness Clachnacuddin. After three seasons with the Stamford Bridge Club, he found that his First Team appearances were limited, and he moved to Huddersfield Town on March 1986, for a nominal fee. Duncan's goalscoring record with the Northern Club attracted Swindon Town's interest and he returned South to prove his fee was an investment well spent.

Club's leading League scorer with 18 goals. This season, has only missed four games.

STEVEN WHITE. Born 2.1.59, Chipping Sodbury. Height 5' 10". Steve has proved to be one of the best free transfer signings in the history of the club. A consistent goalscoring record has made the experienced Steve one of the most feared strikers in the Football League.

He joined his first club, Bristol Rovers from Mangotsfield United, and after nearly three seasons with The Pirates, he moved to Luton Town in a £200,000 transfer in December 1979. After three seasons at the Kenilworth Road Club, during which he helped The Hatters to the Second Division championship, Steve moved to Charlton Athletic in July 1982 for a fee of £150,000. During his only season with the London Club, he spent brief loan periods with Lincoln City and amazingly Luton Town!

Steve returned to his native West Country roots with Bristol Rovers in August 1983, for a fee of £35,000. After three seasons with the then Eastville Club, he was surprisingly given a free transfer! Swindon Town stepped in quickly to take the experienced striker to the County Ground in July 1986, and in three seasons he has never failed to reach double figures in the goalscoring charts. During this period, Steve has helped the Club to promotion from Third Division and a play off position in last season's Second Division.

Another leading scorer having netted 13 goals this season, scored against AFC during the 3-2 defeat in December.

ROSS MACLAREN. Born 14.4.62, Edinburgh. Height 5' 10". Ross moved to the County Ground in July 1986 from Derby County, after a Football League Tribunal had set the fee at £150,000. The Scottish born defender settled into a sweeper role with the club last season. Ross entered Football League with Shrewsbury Town in August 1980 after being released on a free transfer by Glasgow Rangers. After five years with the Gay Meadow Club he moved to Derby County in July 1985 after a Football League Appeals Committee set the transfer fee at £67,500. Ross made the maximum number of League appearances at the Baseball Ground in the 1986-87 Second Division Championship triumph.

Scorer of 3 League goals and a couple of cup goals, one of which was during the Littlewoods Cup Tie with Bolton, which resulted in a further three ties before Swindon settled the issue.

FITZROY SIMPSON. born 26.2.70, Bradford-on-Avon. Height 5' 8". The former club apprentice made his League debut for the club last season and is expected to challenge for a First Team position on a regular basis this season. A predominantly left sided player with the ability to make the grade this term, his progress will be monitored closely by those who expect the talented teenager to advance. Fitzroy, a regular goalscorer at Youth and Reserve team level, still awaits his first goal at senior level as the 1989-90 season commences. He made his debut in a 30 second appearance!

Has started the last five matches in the Number 11 shirt.

DAVE HOCKADAY. Born 9.11.57, Billingham. Height 5' 10". Dave has given the club sterling service since he joined Swindon Town from Blackpool on a free transfer in August 1983.

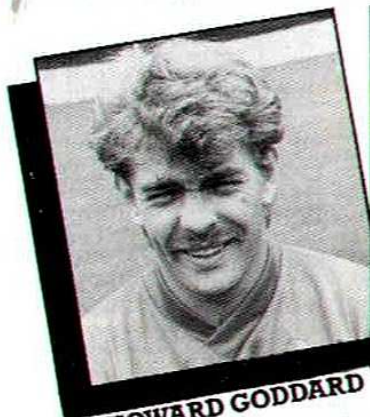
A professional who can be described as a true utility player capable of playing in several positions. In fact, Dave originally joined the club as a winger and was successfully converted to a full back role. During the club's rise from the Fourth Division to the Second he proved to be one of the club's most consistent performers, and he has given the club excellent service for six seasons.

Dave should make his 450th senior appearance in the early part of this season in a career spent with two clubs.

Made 11 League appearances in the earlier part of the season, since then has been on and off the subs bench.

HOWARD GODDARD

Former apprentice, Howard turned professional in July 1974 and went on to make 64 League appearances, during that time this forward scored 18 League goals. In June 1976 Howard moved to Swindon Town where he only made 10 League appearances. Howard later had spells with Newport County, Blackburn Rovers, Aldershot and returned to AFC in 1981 to make only a further 6 League appearances.



JIMMY GABRIEL

Scottish International, Jimmy moved to Everton in 1959 having previously served his home club Dundee. Following 255 League appearances for the Merseysiders, he joined Southampton in 1967. Jimmy, a wing half appeared in almost 200 League games for the Saints before joining AFC in July 1972. Playing 53 League games for Bournemouth, Jimmy later had spells with Swindon and Brentford in 1973 making 6 and 9 League appearances respectively. After 12 years playing and coaching in America Jimmy took up his present position as AFC's Assistant Manager in December 1986.



SHAUN CLOSE

London Born Shaun had not made more than 9 League appearances for Tottenham, his first club, before he was on a £90,000 move to Dean Court in February 1988 having impressed during his loan spell from Spurs. Shaun made 28 full League appearances, scoring 8 League goals. In September earlier this season he moved to Swindon.

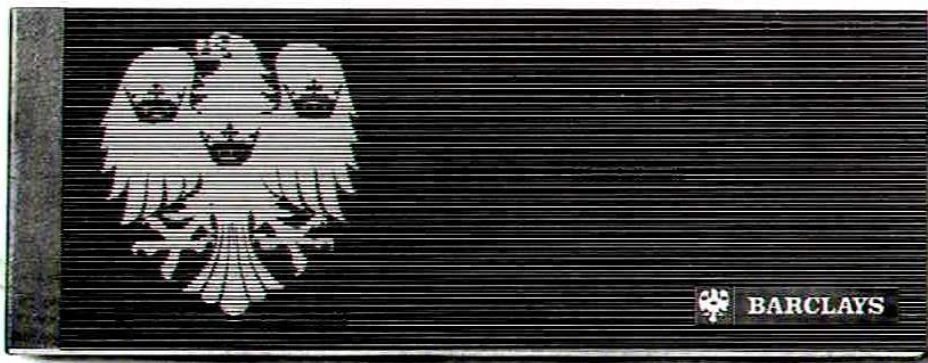

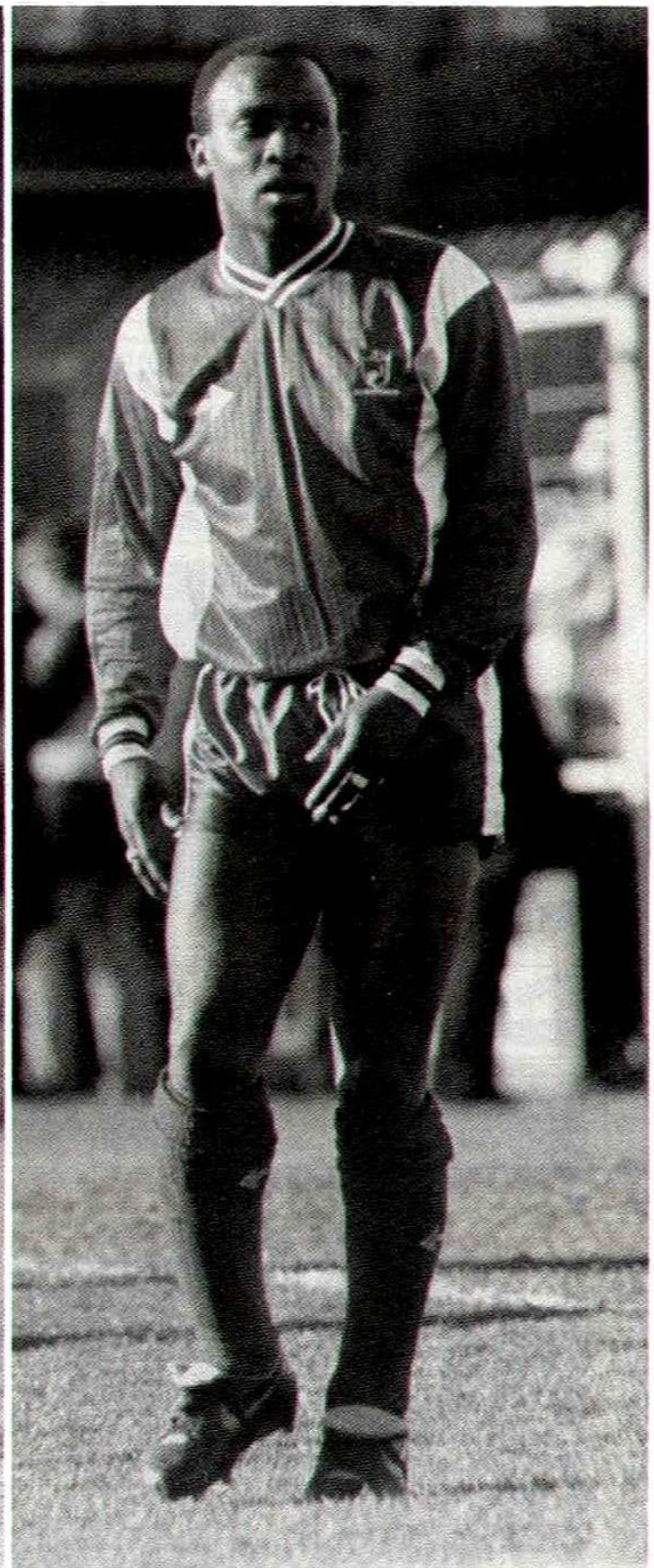

"In Conversation With"

Shaun Brooks



Shaun Brooks joined AFC Bournemouth in the summer of 1987 before the start of the new adventure of the Second Division.

The former Leyton Orient player marked his League debut for The Cherries with an 84th minute winning goal in the game at Sheffield United. In doing so he became the first AFC player to score a Second Division goal for the club.

Almost three years later Shaun has completed just over 100 League appearances in Bournemouth's colours, only injury has denied the midfielder a larger number.

"I learnt the game at Crystal Palace who spotted me playing for my County Hertfordshire. They invited me along to the ground to do some training, the likes of Vince Hillaire and Billy Gilbert were in the Youth Team then.

I liked the set up at Palace and had no hesitation in joining them straight from school.

Terry Venables was Manager at the time, one of six in fact who were in charge while I was with The Eagles.

Names included Alan Mullery, Dario Gradi, Steve Kember and Ernie Walley.

The other was the popular figure of Malcolm Allison who along with Terry were the two Managers of the six who had the better ideas and a good knowledge of the game.

I made my full League debut in the game at Middlesbrough, we lost the match 2-0, had a couple of players sent off, other than that it was a good day for me personally.

I felt confident and enjoyed the match, I remember Clive Allen having numerous chances to score that afternoon, but as is always the way when the team are struggling to avoid relegation, nothing seems to go right.

Another familiar name in the team, albeit in his latter days as a player was George Graham.

There were some very experienced people associated with Palace in those days.

My Youth Team Coach, John Cartwright, was also the England Youth Team Manager, who helped me through. In 1981 came relegation to the Second Division, that particular season I was unable to break into the team.

It was not the most enjoyable of times having experienced more defeats than victories during my stay at Selhurst Park.

I did work my way into the England Youth Teams, playing for the Under 15 schoolboys, for whom I won 8 caps, and capped 4 times in the Under 18 team. In 1978 I recall playing here at Dean Court for England against Northern Ireland in an Under 15 schoolboy international.

A couple of years later I was part of the team that won the European Championship in Germany.

Returning to my League career I later joined Leyton Orient in October 1983.

My first year went very well and was proud to be voted 'Player of the Year'.

I settled in the East End having previously lived in Croydon.

Orient were a good team and had the board had more courage in putting their money towards new signings, the club could have challenged for Second Division football. As it was, in my third season there, we were relegated to the Fourth.

Manager Frank Clark did all he could, the board lacked ambition and never gave the team the push which was needed.

Although I have not had many memorable League games, I have played in some good F.A. Cup matches, which ironically link all my three League clubs.

With Palace we defeated Orient at Brisbane Road in a 5th Round Tie in 1982, then in a 2nd Round Tie playing for the "O's" we came to Bournemouth and won 1-0, which was during the season AFC won promotion to Division Two.

Our reward for this surprising cup win was a home tie with 'close' neighbours West Ham.

Following a 1-1 draw thanks to a last minute penalty by my team mate Steve Castle, we went to Upton Park and put on another first class display. Despite going down to a first half goal, we battled back and yours truly equalized on the hour. Our luck though was not in, Chris Jones hit the bar, and following that came three goals in the last 10 minutes to give United a flattering 4-1 win.

The biggest disappointment of my career came last February when I was forced to miss the game with Manchester United due to a hamstring strain. I am quite fortunate not to have suffered any bad injuries in my career, only picking a few knocks without too much damaging effect."

When Shaun left Leyton Orient in June 1987 to join Bournemouth it was the first time he moved away from the capital.

Many people find moving to a completely different area quite difficult to settle down and adjust. A point I made to Shaun.

"I adapted to the change immediately, as a footballer you have to, I was out of contract with Orient and really prepared to travel anywhere to play. Most importantly any player has got to feel happy and prepared to give it a go.

Lorraine, my girlfriend at the time, who I married last summer was a little bit more reluctant about moving South.

But Bournemouth is a lovely place to live and is only a couple of hours drive from London, so we can frequently travel back to the 'Old Roots' and meet up with our friends.

Lorraine now loves this area, she has stood by me through my career having to cope with changes, and I am very grateful for that.

The changes I noticed were between the clubs, coming into the Second Division I noticed a different atmosphere and a far better playing standard. The Bournemouth team were naturally full of confidence following promotion.

It was nice to be part of the set up even though the championship celebrations had faded down.

Having been relegated twice and also experiencing a few scrapes, I would love to be in a promotion winning team. Although in this

business you take it as it comes and just look forward to playing the next game.

Away from football I like to spend as much time with my family, I have two boys, Callun who is 5 and Dean who is 2 years old.

They love it down on the beach which is not far from where we live; it gives them a chance to run off their energy and during the summer I do a spot of jogging along the sea-front.

Back home I enjoy watching videos of continental football matches, their style of play is so exciting and a joy to watch.

I also enjoy reading most books, anything ranging from thrillers to auto-biographies. After a hard day's training, reading is a nice way to relax and unwind."
