WITH the new format for the play-offs, I can definitely say that this is my last column of 1989-90 for the Ewood programme in what has been a very eventful season.

There have been a lot of good games, a lot of bad ones and some indifferent ones — a usual football season, in fact — with, at the end, a certain amount of achievement.

But, hopefully, this afternoon we will build on that by taking a reasonable lead against Swindon for next Wednesday's second leg.

It's only a few weeks since I was writing a warm welcome to Ossie Ardiles and his team and here we go again.

It was a cracker of a game, as was our previous encounter at Swindon. This afternoon it's a different type of pressure for the two teams and, while some people have made much of the fact that this is our third appearance in the play-offs, they tend to forget that it is Swindon's third too.

They succeeded once from the Third Division and failed in the other, in the Second Division last season, so they too are no strangers to this situation. And they will be doing their utmost to make it this time. The same, naturally, goes for Blackburn Rovers.

As this is the last home programme of the season, I would like to thank not only our supporters here today but all the fans of both teams who have given continued good support to English football.

The media and some of the powers-that-be would have us believe that only hooligans follow the game in this country. It was a sad reflection last weekend again to read headlines of trouble at English football grounds.

Without going too deeply into the matter, I am concerned that no one has come up with one theory — how do these troublemakers get there in the first place?

They can't walk from Leeds to Bournemouth. So not only are some alleged football supporters behaving irresponsibly, what about those who transport them there in the first place?

The police seem to be blaming everyone but themselves. They had the ultimate power. They could have refused to police the game if they felt there was going to be trouble.

In saying that, the relationship we have with the police here at Ewood is first class. Everything is



done in co-operation with each other to try to ensure there are no problems either inside or outside the ground.

Another point is whether the people who caused the trouble were actual Leeds supporters or were they just hooligans? It's not very long ago that trouble was a feature of Bank Holidays at seaside resorts, and this was unconnected with the game.

I found it particularly sad that Leeds should be involved, as I have made a point of championing their cause after seeing their impeccable behaviour first hand, despite the bitter disappointment of defeat by Charlton in the playoffs. But I still wonder if many of those involved last weekend were genuine Leeds fans.

Anyway, back to today, and the most important thing, our attempt to progress to the First Division. The play-offs have many critics but they do produce excitement — yes depression too — and I, personally, have experienced both from the greatest game in the world. The play-offs simply enhance it in terms of thrills and excitement. Let's hope that today's game does football proud.

Thanks once again to YOU, the most important people in football. Without spectators and supporters there wouldn't be professional football, so thanks and, remember, whatever the results of our meetings with Swindon let's be prepared on the field and on the terraces to shake hands at the end.



John Docherty has managed Millwall and Bradford City in the past season and both have been relegated. Mick Mills has managed Stoke City and Colchester United — and both have been relegated!

It could so easily have been a treble, Bruce Rioch has managed both Middlesbrough and Millwall. The Londoners went down while Boro escaped by the skin of their teeth, beating Newcastle to climb above Bournemouth on the very last day.

Welcome to ...



OSSIE ARDILES (above) was appointed manager of Swindon Town on July 20, 1989. An Argentinian international, he earned fame during their World Cup triumph of 1978 in Rio De Janeiro when, along with Mario Kempes, he was the star of the Argentinian line-up.

With fellow Argentinian Ricky Villa he signed for Tottenham Hotspur in 1978 and during his ten years there he collected an F.A. Cup winners medal in 1987 and a U.E.F.A. Cup winners medal in 1984.

Ossie played five games for Blackburn Rovers while on loan during his final season at Tottenham and then moved to Queens Park Rangers at the end of the 1987/88 season.

He had the misfortune to break a leg while with QPR last season and after a period of recovery he spent the summer playing for Fort Lauderdale in America prior to joining Swindon Town.

FRASER DIGBY. Goalkeeper. The former England Under-21 international was the only player to make the maximum number of league appearances last season. Fraser began his career with Manchester United as an apprentice and following a period on loan at the County Ground, the Sheffield-born goalkeeper moved to Swindon Town for a fee of £12,500 in December, 1987.

NICKY HAMMOND. Goalkeeper. Nick, who commenced his career with Arsenal as a trainee, actually made his League debut with Bristol Rovers. Given a free transfer by the Highbury club at the end of the 1986-87 season, he has proved an able understudy to Fraser Digby.

DAVE HOCKADAY. Defender, Joined Swindon Town from Blackpool on a free transfer in August, 1983. He is capable of playing in several positions. In fact, Dave originally joined the club as a winger and was successfully converted to a full back role.

TIM PARKÍN. Defender. Joined Swindon Town in July, 1986, after a Football Appeals Committee had set the compensation fee of £27,500 to be made payable to his former club. Bristol Rovers. Tim, who had previously played here at Ewood and for Malmo (Sweden) proved to be a shrewd signing, and he played a major part in helping the club to establish a springboard for promotion from the Third Division and gain a place in last season's Second Division play-offs.

ROSS MACLAREN. Defender. Ross moved to the County Ground In July, 1988, from Derby County and the Scottish-born defender quickly settled into a sweeper role. He entered the Football League with Shrewsbury Town in 1980 after being released on a free transfer by Glasgow Rangers. After five years there he moved to Derby County.

colin calderwood. Defender. Colin, the Club Captain, is widely regarded as one of the Second Division's strongest central defenders. Signed from Mansfield Town in June 1985.

PHIL KING. Defender. The former Exeter City and Torquay United full back joined Swindon Town after an initial loan period for a fee of £12,500 in March, 1987. Regarded by many clubs as one of the most promising young defenders in the Second Division.

PAUL BODIN. Defender, Paul Joined Swindon Town from the now defunct Newport County in March, 1988. The Welsh-born utility player commenced his career in the Football League with the former Somerton Park club without making a senior appearance. It was after Joining fellow Welsh club Cardiff City that he made his league debut. After three seasons he drifted into non-league football with Bath City. Newport County eventually paid the Southern League club £15,000 for his return in January, 1988.

JON GITTENS. Defender. Jon joined Swindon Town in July, 1987, with a Football League tribunal committee setting the fee at £40,000 following his move from Southampton. The Birmingham born central defender was signed by the Saints from Paget Rovers, the Midland Combination Club, in October, 1985.

TOM JONES. Midfielder. After being discarded by Chelsea as a youngster he drifted into non-league circles with Famborough Town and Weymouth. He was signed by Aberdeen in 1987 and stayed just over a year before joining Swindon.

STEVE FOLEY. Midfielder. The former Liverpool apprentice made his League debut while on loan to Fulham. He joined Grimsby Town in 1984 and moved to Sheffield United a year later before moving to Swindon in July, 1987.

ALAN McLOUGHLIN. Midfielder. The former Manchester United apprentice moved to Swindon Town on a free transfer in August, 1986. Originally a full back, Alan was converted to a midfield role and he relished the transition. Last season he established a regular position in the Town's Second Division promotion drive.

FITZROY SIMPSON. Midfielder. Former Swindon apprentice who made his League debut last season. A mainly left-sided player.

JOHN CORNWELL. Midfielder. John can perform equally well in midfield or defence. A former Leyton Orient apprentice, he moved to Newcastle in July, 1987, for £50,000 and joined Swindon in December, 1988 for a £60,000 fee.

MARK JONES. Midfielder. After seven years with Oxford United, during which he helped them win the Second Division Championship in 1984-85, Mark signed for Swindon in October, 1986, after a period on loan.

STEVE WHITE. Forward. Joined Swindon in a free transfer from Bristol Rovers in July, 1986, and in the past three seasons he has never falled to score into double figures. His League career began at Bristol Rovers and he also played for Luton, Charlton and Lincoln before returning to Bristol Rovers.

SWINDON TOWN



DUNCAN SHEARER. Forward. Leading scorer for Swindon in the League last season with 14 goals. The Scot entered League football with Chelsea and later moved to Huddersfield from where Swindon signed him for £250,000 in June, 1988.

DAVID GEDDIS. Forward. A former Ipswich Town apprentice who moved to Aston Villa in 1979 and later played for Barnsley, Birmingham City and Shrewsbury from where he was signed in October, 1988.

ADRIAN VIVEASH. Forward. A product of the club's youth scheme and now in his second year as a full-time professional. Although primarily regarded as a striker the local born player is capable of performing in several roles.

PAUL HUNT. Forward. Another of the club's youth team players of last season to be elevated to the senior ranks. This diminutive striker was a consistent goalscorer in his two seasons at Youth Team level. **NICKY SUMMERBEE.** Forward. Son of the former Town, Manchester City

and England International, Mike Summerbee. Nicky joined the club as a trainee, and after progressing through the club's youth ranks he was expected to establish a regular position in the club's Reserve team this season.

PAUL O'DRISCOLL. Forward. The former Southampton player joined the club for a trial period when pre-season training commenced after being given a free transfer by the First Division club.

NEIL TOMLISON. Forward. The former Shrewsbury Town non-contract player is in his second season at the County Ground. A regular member of the Town's Reserve team in the Football Combination last season.

LITTLE in the game of football has no precedence. The recently introduced play offs were originally part of the arrangement for deciding promotion and relegation before the turn of the century.

Unfortunately the format used was capable of manipulation, as was found in 1898. Basically the two clubs finishing bottom of the First Division played for their place against the two clubs who had finished top of the Second Division. Having slogged through a successful season these clubs found they still has to survive four games before they could earn a place in Division One.

The format of the test matches, as they were known, was a league system, decided on the results of four games, in which each of the erstwhile First Division clubs played both of the Second Division clubs, home and away, but not each other.

Blackburn were not used to finishing in such an ignominious position, but the team was in the process of rebuilding. Newcomers failed to make their mark and, as the season grew to a climax, the permutations of possible candidates for relegation grew astronomic. From the Rovers point of view, a fixture congestion led to them playing five games in the space of fifteen days, with the added disadvantage that most were against clubs involved in the relegation dispute.

Crucial

On April 2nd they lost to Wolves by three goals to two. On the eighth they drew one all with Stoke. The significance of this lost home point was that Stoke then had 22 points from 29 games, while the Rovers had 22 points from 27 games. Also involved were Bury who had 22 points from 29 games, Notts County with 22 points from 29 games and Preston with 22 points from 29 games.

On the final Saturday of the regular season (April 9th) a weary Blackburn side lost to Notts County by the only goal, and suffered the other results to go against them as Preston beat Derby and Stoke beat Everton. Blackburn and Bury were now bottom with 22 points each, but the Rovers had two games to play and Bury one (against the Rovers). Notts County, Preston and Stoke had completed their fixtures with 24 points, goal average looking certain to save the latter two.

On April 14th Blackburn hauled themselves to 24 points by beating Bolton and, with a better goal average than Stoke needed only to draw at Bury to stay out of the test matches. Two days later a single goal by Plant reversed the situation and condemned the club to the test matches.

The bottom five had all finished on the same points, but goal average proved crucial. The top sides in the Second Division were Burnley and Newcastle.

It had been obvious for some time that the Rovers needed new blood, but the recruitment towards the end of the season was positively bizarre. For reasons not unconnected with finance they proceeded to recruit players who had been with the club and left. All had gone outside the league, so no transfer fees were involved in any direction. At the begining of March the old international winger Fred Blackburn returned. In April, in the space of six days, Geordie Anderson, Harry Marshall, Josh Hargreaves and Tommy Tierney re-emerged. Anderson, Harry Marshall, losh Hargreaves and Tommy Tierney re-emerged. Anderson had been sacked for failing to keep in condition, Marshall's career had apparently ended with a serious injury and Tierney and Hargreaves had failed to make the grade. They also introduced Moreland, who shortly afterwards was sacked when he failed to turn up until halfway through the first half of a game.

Curious

The team was a curious mixture. Promising young men like Tom Booth and Kelly Houlker, who were to become internationals, played alongside some curiously controversial characters.

The goalkeeper, Carter from Preston, was rated highly but his desire was questioned and he eventually left the club a year later in a weird pay dispute that was both prolonged and curious. At least two of the side were to find themselves in court for neglect and abandonment of their families. Numbers 9 to 11 in the side were all signed virtually en bloc from Partick Thistle, with reputations that proved flattering. There were also seasoned veterans like the renowned Tom Brandon and Teddy Killean, something of a Continued on Page 13

Club Connections

WE have already featured two former Swindon players, Jimmy Quinn and Ken Beamish, in this series while Ian Miller has figured in the Who Is It? quiz. We therefore look today at a former Rovers man with connections with the other two play-off teams, Newcastle United and Sunderland.

We refer to Viv Busby, a much-travelled striker who was born in Slough in 1949 and played for Wycombe Wanderers before linking up with Luton Town in 1970. He was loaned to Newcastle midway through 1971/72, but though scoring twice in the course of four games for them he was released after an F.A. Cup defeat to Hereford.

By the time he moved to Fulham, in August 1973, he had scored 16 goals in 77 games. Highlight of his time at Craven Cottage was the F.A. Cup win at Everton when he netted twice and helped his side in a spectacular F.A. Cup run that finally ended in a defeat by West Ham at Wembley in May, 1975.

He moved to Norwich for £50,000 in September, 1976, got 11 goals in 22 games

in just over a year and then moved on to Stoke. He spent three and a half seasons at the Victoria Ground in the course of which he had a month on loan to Sheffield United in January, 1980, and had two summers with Tulsa Roughnecks in the USA.

He was nearly 32 when we signed him in February, 1981, and he played in eight games as we battled unsuccessfully for promotion to Division One, being pipped on goal difference by Swansea City. Viv's one goal for us was in a 3-1 win over Sheffield Wednesday. He then moved to York City in August, 1982, played for them for a couple of seasons and then, after hanging up his boots, was assistant to manager Dennis Smith, whom he had first linked up with as a player at Stoke.

When Dennis moved to Sunderland as manager in 1987 Viv went with him and they have taken the Rokerites from Division Three to the gates of Division One.

In his day Viv was a fast, exciting striker who always looked capable of scoring more goals than he actually got, his full tally being 83 in 311 games.

character who was once cautioned for dancing the hornpipe on the field. Such eccentricity might have been excused if he had not been in possession of the ball at the time. This curate's egg of a side went in to battle to prevent the unthinkable, Blackburn Rovers in the Second Division.

It was now the club's last chance. Booth returned for the visit of Newcastle with wholesale changes in the forward line. Hargreaves, the Partick pair of Wilkie and Campbell, as well as Briercliffe were all omitted. Geordie Anderson was a shock right winger. Fred Blackburn played at inside left with J.T. Jackson at centre forward and Dan Hurst, a Cumbrian winger, partnering Blackburn. It was an unusual combination but they had passion on their side. Sailing to a half time lead of two goals, they barely held on but at least they had given themselves a chance. Unfortunately Ted Killean broke his leg and so was out of the final game.

Avalanche

This proved completely theoretical. Before the final game Blackburn and Newcastle had two points and Burnley and Stoke four points. The fixtures pitted the leading sides together. It scarcely needed a Mensa IQ to work out that they only had to contrive a draw to both gain a First Division place.

As it happened the Rovers had no grounds for complaint. At Newcastle they were playing their ninth game of the month, and a few of the players were known to be less than assiduous about training. Their depth of cover was so slight that Killean's replacement was Andy Mills, who had to be summoned back from Wales, where he had returned after one unsuccessful early season trial. Foot-weary and lacking spirit they were unable to quell a Geordie avalanche and had resigned themselves to the Second Division well before the final whistle.

Equally unhappy were Newcastle. After their heroics they left the field to find, surprise surprise,

that Stoke and Burnley had played a goalless draw. The whole morality of the test match system was cast into doubt. Salvation came from a legislative change. Burnley raised a motion to extend the First Division by two clubs, not in recognition of any misbehaviour on their part but prompted by the fact that they had lost two huge pay days against Blackburn. The motion was carried and votes were cast for the election of two clubs to the First Division. Most were agreed that the formula was an attempt to save face for a club as illustrious as the Rovers and it was no surprise when they were elected with 27 votes.

Newcastle deservedly joined them with 18 votes, comfortably ahead of Manchester City (third in Division 2) with ten votes, Small Heath (sixth) four votes, Newton Heath (fourth) three votes and Woolwich Arsenal (fifth) one vote. The manouevre served to salve the Rovers embarrassment for some thirty-five years.

Profile

Here we go again! Ron Kennedy applies a trembling pen to the Rovers' hat-trick of appearances in the play-offs.



HAVING consumed vast quantities of tranquilisers since Saturday's game against Brighton — not to mention a couple of dates with the psychiatrist's couch — the nerves are back to normal.

Well, almost, at any rate!

By any standards a treble appearance in the play-offs is a truly remarkable achievement, more so for a club without the rich rescources of many of their contemporaries.

It is one for the record books, for sure. And who knows, one perhaps never to be topped. I don't doubt that sometime in the future it will pop up in many a sports quiz.

Meanwhile, it's on with the motley for the third successive season as the club prepares for a two-legged meeting with Ossie Ardiles's Swindon Town who themselves, it should be remembered, are making a second showing in the play-offs.

Precious

I prefer to erase the Brighton game from the memory, apart from the fact that it yielded the single, oh-so precious point the Rovers were seeking to pursue the goal which has stayed infuriatingly just out of their reach in seasons past.

If you are like me the spirit of optimism lies buried deep, but a feeling is welling up inside that it could be a case of third time lucky.

I hesitate to use the word "lucky" since luck hardly comes into the frame when a team has toiled through three successive campaigns to finish in fifth place each time at the end of the normal schedule.

It is only natural that along the way performances, both individually and collectively, have ranged from the breathtakingly brilliant to the downright unacceptable.

But then, isn't life itself like that? All ups and downs, Good days and bad days?

Two factors have been a source of aggravation when the prospect of promotion began to

assume realistic proportions . . . the continuing relatively poor attendances at Ewood, and the belief in some quarters among alleged supporters that the Rovers really do not want to go up.

Take the Brighton game as an example. A crowd of just over 9,000 on a glorious day and the attraction of the play-off clincher. It does make a man wonder, and I was not in the least surprised when the manager this week expressed his disappointment at the gate when he spoke to me.

On the second count, the sceptical attitude of some folk leaves me baffled. Let me repeat the information already made public by Chairman William Fox that a bonus of £250,000 awaited the players if they had won the Second Division championship, and in the region of £200,000 had they finished in the runner-up spot.

Don't try to convince me that a professional footballer would not respond to carrots of that size!

Chance

As Mr Fox put it again this week: "That fully demonstrated how serious we were about our ambition to bring First Division football back to Ewood for the first time in 24 years. Of that there is no doubt.

"Obviously we are disappointed not to have claimed one of the two top positions, but we have made the play-offs yet again and the chance is there to be taken.

"We are all geared up for the First Division. We have far and away the best ground outside local cities.

"During the close season the pitch drainage problem will be solved and the surface relaid. Having covered the Walkersteel Stand, we will go ahead with seating there for 5,000."

But first, there is the little matter of Swindon Town. Altogether now Earwiggol


