


As long as we are not com-



The Squad

Bob Taylor. Manager Joe Jordan tracked the former Leeds United striker for months before landing his man just before the transfer deadline in March, 1989 for £175,000 plus Carl Shutt. City's leading goalscorer last term with 34 goals including three hat-tricks, although injury ended his season early.

Junior Bent. Junior was brought to Ashton Gate in March for £30,000. A speedy skilful winger, regarded as "one for the future". Previously at Huddersfield, he had a spell on loan at Burnley last season.

Nicky Morgan. City paid Stoke City £30,000 for this experienced forward and he soon repaid part of that fee with important goals in the promotion run in after City lost leading scorer Bob Taylor through injury. Previously with West Ham and Portsmouth.

Dave Rennie. Former Leicester City apprentice who later moved to Leeds United. A Scottish Youth International, Dave joined City in July 1989 and was used throughout the season in midfield. Can also play at the back.

Gary Shelton. A vastly experienced player who has now made well over 350 League appearances in a career which has taken in Walsall, Aston Villa, Sheffield Wednesday and Oxford. Joined City at the start of last season.

Andy Llewellyn. A local lad who was a Youth International and has come through the apprentice ranks. Andy was an ever present last season – his eighth year at City. A useful cricketer who had trials for Gloucestershire C.C.

Rob Newman. City's longest serving player after ten years with the club. He captained the promotion side and was ever present as a central defender after his former role as City's "Mr. Versatile", filling every outfield position.

John Bailey. Now in his third season with City having been signed on a free transfer from Newcastle United. Has also played for Blackburn Rovers and Everton as well as Newcastle. Now a regular in the City side.

Glen Humphries. A former England Youth International, Glenn regained a regular first team place last season after losing out the previous season through injury. He had five years at Doncaster Rovers, before signing for City in October.

Ronnie Sinclair. A free transfer signing from Leeds United last season, Ronnie began his professional career at Nottingham Forest. His League debut came whilst on loan at Wrexham. Made his debut for City last December.

Dave Smith. Dave made over 100 appearances for Gillingham after being signed from Welling United. A speedy winger with a powerful shot, he joined City at the start of last season for £75,000.

Mark Aizlewood. An experienced defender, Mark signed for City in August 1990, Bradford City receiving £110,000. A Welsh International, City is his sixth club, having played at Newport, Luton, Charlton Athletic, Leeds and Bradford City.

Andy May. A former Manchester City apprentice, Andy made 150 League appearances for them and won England Under-21 honours. Moved to Huddersfield where he appeared in midfield and at full back. A £90,000 signing in August, 1990.

Louie Donowa. Another former Under-21 International, Louie was signed from Ipswich Town for £50,000 at the start of the season. A speedy skilful winger, bought to replace Mrak Gavin, who began his career at Norwich.

Wayne Allison. Another close season signing Wayne came to Ashton Gate as part of the exchange deal that took Mark Gavin to Watford. A player City had tracked since his days at Halifax.

Murray Jones. A 21 year old striker who was released by Crystal Palace at the end of last season. Came to City originally on trial but soon impressed manager Joe Jordan and has now been signed up.

PAUL PLOWMAN continues his season by season look back at Swindon Town through the years.

1959/60


The 1959/60 season was very much a term of transition at the County Ground. As the decade clicked over, manager Bert Head was in the process of phasing out some of those who had served the club well in the 1950's, while introducing young blood to take Swindon Town into the 'sixties.

As some of the youngsters were not yet ready for League football, Mr Head had to seek some 'stop-gap' replacements. David Layne, a free transfer signing from Rotherham, was still only a teenager himself. Then the club record transfer fee was broken three days before the start of the season, on August 19. The 28 year old former Charlton and Everton forward Jimmy Gauld was signed from Plymouth for £6,500.

Gauld provided 14 goals, despite going twelve games without scoring mid-season. But Layne gave the better return, with twenty from just 27 appearances. After scoring seven goals in one Hellenic League game, David acquired the nickname 'Bronco'. During March, he hit hat-tricks in successive games against Shrewsbury and Southend.

Most of the fee paid for Gauld was recouped in December, when Bob Edwards and John Richards both signed for Norwich. Another popular figure to play his last game for the Town was George 'Garth' Hudson. The big centre-half retired with a neck injury after making 427 League and Cup appearances.

Three teenagers made their League debuts during 1959/60, joining three others in the side. Top scorer in the Football Combination, Roger Hunt – better known as 'Ernie' – was brought in during September and he was followed at Christmas by Mick Woolford and Mike Summerbee (father of present Town striker Nicky). Hunt and Summerbee were eventually transferred for considerable sums, but



Woolford appeared in just three League games.

Having begun the season as 1958/59 had ended - with a defeat at Queens Park Rangers -- inconsistency prevented Swindon from mounting any serious challenge on the promotion contenders. Typical of their of their form was a sequence of five consecutive wins, immediately followed by five consecutive defeats! The Town even conceded a League 'double' to Accrington Stanley, who won only four home games all season. And a First Round F.A. Cup defeat at home to Fourth Division Walsall (for led 3-0 at half-time) did not go down well either.

But perhaps the saddest note of the season came on April 30 with a 6-1 defeat at Port Vale, a result which was later described as having been 'fixed' by certain participants. One of the culprits, Jimmy Gauld, was not retained at the end of the season and was jailed in 1965.

Who was who on the transfer list

Value for money or paper money? How much is a footballer worth? Transfer fees have increased at a rapid rate over the years. Remember the milestones - the first fourfigure sum was paid back in 1905 when Alf Common went from Sunderland to Middlesbrough. He played three times for England. 28 vears later. David Jack joined Arsenal from Bolton for £10,000. It cost ten times that amount for Manchester United to bring Denis Law back from Torino in Italy, in 1962. World Cup winner Martin Peters, described as being ahead of his time by Sir Alf Ramsey, went across London from West Ham to Tottenham in 1970 for £200,000 and the half-million pound barrier was broken by Kevin Keegan, leaving Liverpool for Sv Hamburg in Germany in 1977.

Million pound players are now ten-a-penny (if you pardon the pun) but some are often forgotten and from the paying fans point of view. vastly over-rated. Steve Daley moved to Manchester City from Wolverhampton Wanderers in September 1979 for £2,437,500; Kevin Reeves was signed by Manchester City from Norwich in March 1980 for £11/4 million. The Main Road side was relegated within three years. The career of Coventry's Ian Wallace never

took off after he joined Nottingham Forest for £1,250,000 in the summer of 1980. I vaguely remember he wasn't even a regular in Brian Clough's starting line-up.

Swindon Town's record outlay is £250,000 to Huddersfield for Duncan Shearer 2 years ago. At Leeds Road he scored 38 in 83 League games. In contrast his striking partner with whom he shared 54 goals in 1989/90, Steve White, was picked up on a free from Bristol Rovers.

The most received at the County Ground is £450,000 for Phil King from Sheffield Wednesday at the start of last season. A third of that figure was passed on to Torquay, who had sold him to the Town.

Swindon manager Ossie
Ardiles says the Hillsborough
deal was a good all-round move
for his squad, because of Paul
Bodin's ability at left-back.
"The Gaffer" has spent wisely
himself. David Kerslake cost
£110,000 from Queens Park
Rangers, and has since
reportedly been linked with
Glasgow Rangers for five times
that value.

The signatures of Tony
Galvin and Shaun Close didn't
break the bank and some of
their current colleagues are
now put in the "millionpound" bracket.

and wasn't even in the regular Italy team for the recent World Cup tournament in his own country where "Gazza-mania" put Paul Gascoigne into the 5 or 6 million pound bracket, depending on which newspaper report you believe. Cynics would ask if an individual who kicks a piece of leather around for ninety minutes a week can justify such a price tag. Then of course there's the transfer tribunal system which allows an independent assessment of somebody's worth, and can give rise to many anomalies. Ultimately it seems there is no vardstick which applies across the board, but if player, buyer and vendor can agree then a deal will be struck. and that's their business.



GRAHAM CARTER meets the supp

His full name is Martin Tryczynski, but everybody calls him Martin T. "I've almost forgotten how to spell it myself," he jokes. But there's one thing he doesn't joke about - June 7.

"I was in the Great Western Hotel, enjoying a pint after work," said the 36 year-old Allied Dunbar marketing consultant, "when the news came through that the Football League had demoted us to the Third Division. I remember feeling very, very angry. We decided to do something about it straight away."

While a friend phoned his lawyer, Martin phoned every national newspaper and set up a meeting with John Latham of the Daily Telegraph, with whom he spoke until 3 am. The following day he spoke with Swindon's MP and the Mayor and set up a meeting which was to see the birth of the Swindon Supporters Action Group. It was the first time that Martin, who was born in Poland and came to Britain at the age of six, had felt emotional enough about any issue for it to stir him into such action.

The centrepiece of the Town's campaign to overturn the League's decision was the First Aid March, when 25,000 Swindonians – not all of them football fans – marched through the Town.

"We took a big chance on that rally," Martin recalls. "Nobody – not even Lloyds of London – would give us public indemnity insurance because football fans were involved, so we were liable for any damage." The gamble paid off. In Martin's own words: "The people of Swindon showed what they were made of and that people power works."

He could hardly have imagined where it would lead him, though, as he finds himself a Town director. Having a supporter on the board was an idea which came from within the club. Chairman Gary Herbert had talked about it long before the troubles at the club began.

When the time came, Martin admits that Supporters Club Chairman Chrit Scott was the leading candidate. But Chris had other commitments and Martin was asked to take the job. He is quick to underline what his role will be.

"I'm not a policeman," he says. "It is crucial that people don't see it that way. I'm not there to check up on the other directors and I don't want to rake up the past. I'm looking to the future and the fans can contribute."

Martin is keen for the fans' voice to be heard before decisions are made and is therefore anxious to hear their opinions. Meetings with a forum of supporters groups (Supporters Club, Travel Club, Junior Robins, London Supporters etc.) have already been held and more scheduled. Martin stresses, though, that no "elite" is being formed. Minutes of the meetings will be made available and he wants comments, complaints and

orters' new representative on the board

suggestions from all fans.
"Write to me at the County
Ground if you've got anything
to say," he appeals.

So how does he fit in at the club? It should be stressed that he will attend all board meetings, but not necessarily be present throughout. He won't, for example, be involved in discussions about contracts and transfer negotiations, but he will be there to listen to and speak about matters directly involving the fans.

But doesn't being a nonexecutive member with no voting rights tie his hands? The short answer is no. "Look at it this way," he says. "If the worst comes to the worst and I think

I'm not being taken seriously, I could resign. Then you'll know that it is a waste of time." But you don't detect that he thinks for a moment that it would ever come to this.

Putting a supporter on the board is a radical step and one that hasn't been taken in the League before. Martin says the important thing is that the club has opened itself up for public scrutiny. Though we cannot expect everything to change overnight, he is optimistic about the future – at Swindon anyway.

As for football in general, he says that it is a "wonderful game, run by amateurs" and doesn't mince his words about the men at the top. "Football is a cock-up," he says.

"The Swindon affair showed how much the authorities care for the ordinary person, who is the lifeblood of the game," he says, arguing that reform must come from the top down if football is to fully realise its huge commercial potential.

Martin is now committed to a very busy time, but sees his position as temporary. "I'll be there for maybe a season – two at the most. By then there could be plans for an election to find my successor."

And by then we could be in the First Division, but perhaps not if support doesn't improve. Martin is concerned that in twenty years, when Swindon's population has nearly doubled, County Ground attendances have nearly halved. "We only need to tap a small part of that Wembley spirit and we'll be OK," he says, though he points out that the noise level at the County Ground has fallen over

the years. In other words, TURN UP THE VOLUME! I asked him if he had a last word for the fans as he prepared for his first board meeting. "Yes. Wish me luck."

Reserves & Youths

Last season's mid-table place was no mean achievement for our reserve side, especially when you consider the strength of the opposition. We have to compete with the likes of Arsenal, Tottenham and Chelsea, for instance, who obviously have much larger playing squads at their disposal. With first team squads of around nineteen players, such teams can field maybe eight experienced players in the reserves.

Striking the right balance in the reserves is always a problem. Manager Andy Rowland considers the ideal balance to be three or four experienced players, three or four young professionals and three or four trainees. Getting this balance is difficult. There are now three triallists at the County Ground, for instance -Tony Clarke from Mansfield. Gary Costello from QPR and Raymond Lee from Arsenal and these need to be given their chance, as well as the most promising of the existing youth

The progress of young reserve team players last season was perhaps as much an indication of the reserve team's progress as its League position. Fitzroy Simpson, many people's man of the match in our win at Charlton, is the best example, but Paul Hunt, Nicky Summerbee and Paul Trollope are also ones to watch – not to mention Adrian Viveash, who figured in several first team friendlies.

With our home fixtures being evening kick-offs, there will be plenty more opportunities to see how the latest "home grown" talent is developing.

Safety and comfort for all spectators is the primary objective and substantial funds have been made available for the provision of seating at Football League grounds. At the same time the Trust's commitment to family and community initiatives will continue with the provision of more family enclosures, better toilet facilities, covered accommodation, artificial pitches for local use and the development of women's and junior football particularly through community programmes, plus a wide range of policing and crowd control measures.

Each year The Trust expects to receive £20 million from the reduction in Pool Betting Duty plus the £10 million continuing contribution from the Spotting-the-Ball competition organised by Little-woods, Vernons and Zetters. This money will be invested in projects which benefit football throughout the United Kingdom.
