



Front Cover: Steve White watches Duncan Shearer challenge for the ball against Brighton & Hove Albion last Saturday.

BARCLAYS LEAGUE

This Monday afternoon we meet West Bromwich Albion at The Hawthorns in the Barclays League where the kick-off is at 3.00pm.

We are at home again next Saturday in the League when we entertain Watford who, like us, are in need of the points. Kick-off for this crunch match is at 3.00pm.

SEASON BY SEASON

We continue our look back at Swindon Town through the years . . .

1979/80

THE CUP TRAIL

Swindon were left smarting at the start of the season by the loss of John McLauglin and Steve Aizlewood who exercised their right to move under the freedom of contract system and joined Portsmouth. Town officials were disappointed that a League tribunal awarded them only £45,000 for each, roughly half the amount the Town had requested. The First Round League Cup victory over Pompey by 3-1 on aggregate must have been even sweeter as a result but little did anyone dream it was the start of a Cup run which was to take Swindon within ninety minutes of Wembley. Round Two produced a 2-1 aggregate victory over Chester but a trip to First Division Stoke in Round Three looked a daunting prospect. The Potters took a two goal lead but Alan Mayes pulled one back before half time and Andy Rowland shot home an equaliser four minutes from time. This brought the Midland side back to the County Ground where they were defeated 2-1. Swindon earned a place in the last eight with a victory at Wimbledon's Plough Lane. Substitute Chic Bates scored from a knock down by Alan Mayes five minutes from time to give Swindon another 2-1 win.

ARSENAL OUTGUNNED

Swindon produced some of their best football of the season in the quarter final match at Highbury. Alas, it all appeared to be in vain. The Gunners were leading through a first half Alan Sunderland penalty and it looked that Swindon would be left with only the professional pride of a good performance to take away with them. Then substitute Billy Tucker headed home a Ken Stroud corner with just five minutes remaining. The replay at the County Ground was watched by a 26,000 capacity crowd and had everything a great Cup tie should: goals, swaying fortunes and, of course, a Swindon victory! Swindon led 3-1 with less than twenty minutes left when a Liam Brady inspired fight back brought the Londoners level. Once again a late goal showed Swindon's staying power. Rowland forcing the ball home in a goalmouth scramble minutes from the end of extra time.

SO, NEARLY AT WEMBLEY

Swindon faced a two leg semi-final with Wolves, but bad weather delayed the first leg at the County Ground. When it was played it was the combination of Mayes and Rowlands that gave Swindon a 2-1 advantage to take to Molineux. Alan 'He's here, he's there, he's every * where' Mayes and 'Handy' Andy Rowland enjoyed a great season. Alan Mayes had become an instant favourite with Town fans thanks to a debut hat-trick against Rotherham, Andy Rowlands had taken a little longer to win their admiration but his determined style and heading ability soon made him a long term favourite. In the League they produced 39 goals between them with Andy just finishing top scorer by one. Sadly neither of Swindon's deadly duo could find the net at Molineux as Swindon went down 3-1. Two goals in five minutes early in the second half blitzed Swindon's hopes. The Town responded quickly, Mayes was bundled down by goalkeeper Bradshaw with a challenge that might well have warranted a sending off in todays climate and McHale netted from the spot but it was John Richards, with his second goal, that ensured Wolves and not the Robins went to Wembley.

OSSIE ON TARGET

Swindon also enjoyed a good run in the F.A. Cup, reaching Round Four and leaving Manchester United and Tottenham to fight for the honour of a trip to the County Ground. A goal by a certain Osvaldo Ardiles in the 118th minutes of the Old Trafford replay earned Spurs the trip. A fierce fought Cup tie saw Tottenham fans burn down a programme but the game itself produced fewer fireworks ending 0-0. McHale gave Swindon the lead from the penalty spot in the replay but two goals in the last ten minutes again wrecked the dreams of Swindon fans.

MEANWHILE, BACK IN THE LEAGUE

Promotion rather than Cup glory has to be the main aim of any lower Division side. The first half of the season went well and in between the two Arsenal Cup ties Swindon produced an 8-0 victory over manager Smith's old side, Bury. It was Swindon's biggest win in the League since World War Two and left them just two points behind leaders Sheffield United and Colchester with a game in hand. After the defeat by Wolves Swindon lost 2-0 at Grimsby. During this match the sort of thing that occurs when the tide of luck turns happened. Kenny Stroud punched a ball over the bar, the ref failed to spot it and awarded a corner from which - you guessed it - Grimsby scored. Swindon went off to Spain for a mid-season break, eight points behind leaders Grimsby and Colchester with five games in hand not a hopeless position but, as so often happens when teams are under pressure, points in the bag prove more valuable than games in hand.

TRANSFER GAMBLES

There was no lack of ambition at the County Ground at this time. In December £110,000 had been spent on Lincoln City midfielder Glen Cockerill but he did not make a first team appearance until March and then managed only eight full appearances before the end of the season. Even worse was the £150,000 signing of David Peach. Andy Rowland was probably right when he said what we needed was the best Third Division full back not the best First Division one. Peach suffered the misfortune to make his debut in a 6-2 drubbing at Millwall which left Swindon's promotion hopes in tatters. They ended the season in tenth position, having averaged exactly a point a game.

FOOTBALLERS OF THE YEAR

Swindon fans selected Chris Kamara, who had been transfer-listed for lack of effort after the first game of the season, as their Footballer of the Year while the award for the most promising youngster went to Charlie Henry. Both were to play a part in future seasons which brought greater rewards than the 1979–80 one which promised so much yet resulted in so little.

Reflections . . .

It's that time of the year to be reflecting on the previous twelve months or so, with the annual series of awards ceremonies: the Oscars, BAFTA, etc.

Footballers have just voted for their favourites within the soccer profession for the P.F.A. Honours. I remember staying up late on a Sunday night to see the first ceremony 17 years ago. Norman Hunter was the main winner in 1974. He was followed by Colin Todd, the only other defender to take the title. The achievements of goalkeepers Pat Jennings and Peter Shilton have been recognised. Star strikers to make acceptance speeches: Andy Gray, Kevin Keegan, Kenny Dalglish, Ian Rush, Gary Lineker, Clive Allen, John Barnes and Mark Hughes. Midfield maestros: Liam Brady, Terry McDermott, John Wark and Peter Reid. Andy Gray, Ian Rush and Mark Hughes have also claimed the 'Young Player of the

Year' accolade. But whatever happened to Peter Barnes, Tony Woodcock or Steve Moran?

Recipients of the merit award make up a hall of fame of our national game. They include John Trollope MBE in 1981 as well as Bobby Charlton and Billy Bonds who are both still involved with the sport.

Away from the luxurious setting of the Hilton or Grosvenor House Hotel, there's the Footballer of the Year, judged by the Football Writers
Association which more often than not agrees with the other ballot. That 'competition' has been shared only once between Tony Book and Dave MacKay in 1969.

On the continent, Europe's number one is chosen by a poll carried out by France Football Magazine. Football League stars who've shone in this ballot include Stanley Matthews in 1956, Denis Law eight years later,



Bobby Charlton in England's World Cup winning season, George Best when Manchester United took the champions cup and Kevin Keegan in 1978 and 1979 when signed to SV Hamburg after an illustrious spell at Liverpool.

Who's to say who should win a 'Worlds Greatest' award, Maradona, Guillit, Gascoigne or Beckenbauer Cruyff, Pele in their generation?

Finally, congratulations to David Kerslake, the Second Divisions top 'number two' according to his contemporaries.

HELPING THE GAME




The Football Trust 1990 has been created to help the game at all levels and to assist clubs meet the requirements of Lord Justice Taylor's Final Report.

Safety and comfort for all spectators is the primary objective and substantial funds have been made available for the provision of seating at Football League grounds. At the same time the Trust's commitment to family and community initiatives will continue with the provision of more family enclosures, better toilet facilities, covered accommodation, artificial pitches for local use and the development of women's and junior football particularly through community programmes, plus a wide range of policing and crowd control measures.

Each year The Trust expects to receive £20 million from the reduction in Pool Betting Duty plus the £10 million continuing contribution from the Spotting-the-Ball competition organised by Little-woods, Vernons and Zetters. This money will be invested in projects which benefit football throughout the United Kingdom.







Some of football's soccer greats have worn with pride the famous black and white stripes of the Magpies, names such as Hughie Gallacher who holds United's scoring record for a season with 36 goals in 38 games back in 1926–27. Jackie Milburn scored the quickest goal ever in an F.A. Cup Final after just 45 seconds in 1955.

More recently Malcolm MacDonald, who cost the Club £185,000 when signed from Luton Town in 1971, scored 95 goals in 187 Newcastle appearances and in 14 England appearances "Supermac" scored 6 goals which included five against Cyprus in one match.

In temporary charge, following Jim Smith's resignation last week, is Bobby Saxton who joined the staff at St. James' Park in December 1988 after managing York City for eighteen months. Saxton played for Derby County, Plymouth Argyle and was player/manager at Exeter City. As well as York City, Mr. Saxton was also in charge of Plymouth Argyle when they won promotion to Division Two in 1975 and at Exeter City when promoted to the Third Division two years later.

38 year old keeper John Burridge is a man of many clubs, United being his ninth, in a career that started in his native Workington and taking in Blackpool, Aston Villa, Crystal Palace, Q.P.R., Wolverhampton Wanderers, Sheffield United and Southampton along the way. He moved to the North East in December 1989 and his career appearances so far exceeds well over 700.

Steve Watson is a 17 year old Youth Trainee player who has made a huge impact since making his Football League debut at Wolverhampton Wanderers back in November.

Full back John Anderson is the longest serving member of the team who arrived at St. James' Park in 1982 on a free transfer from Preston North End. Born in Dublin he began his career with West Bromwich Albion before leaving them for Deepdale in November 1977. An Eire International, John had trials with Manchester United, Wolverhampton Wanderers and Coventry City while at school, Johnny Giles eventually winning the chase for his services and taking him to the Hawthorns.


31 year old Roy Aitken is a stylish but aggressive midfielder or defender who captained Scotland in the 1990 World Cup Finals in Italy and was made skipper on his move to Newcastle United from Celtic. The move across the border was made in January 1990 for a fee of £½m. He captained Celtic to the League and Cup double in their Centenary Year in 1988 and made 465 appearances for the Parkhead outfit.

Kevin Scott was a victim of Middlesborough's falling on hard times and having to cut down on their wage bill. The County Durham-born 17 year old's year long YTS scheme

It was while playing for Eppleton Colliery the tall centre half was picked up for United and signed professional forms at St. James' on his 18th birthday. A member of United's F.A. Youth Cup winning side he made his full League debut in 1986.

Bjorn Kristensen, 'Benny' to his team mates has nine U-18 caps for Denmark, 14 U-21 and 17 full international appearances to his credit. He made over 300 appearances for Aarhus before moving to England and St. James' Park.

Born just a few miles away at neighbouring Sunderland, Kevin Dillion's career began where he served his footballing apprenticeship, at Birmingham City, for whom he played nearly 200 games before joining Portsmouth in 1982. He scored 60 goals while at Fratton park but has found the net more clusive since his return to the North East.

Midfielder Gavin Peacock moved to Newcastle in December 1990 in a player plus cash deal which took Wayne Ferreday to AFC Bournemouth, He made 41 League appearances at Dean Court, having previously been with Gillingham and Queens Park Rangers.

Micky Quinn has formed a deadly striking partnership with Mark McGhee since moving to the Club from Portsmouth in July 1989. A tribunal settled the fee at £650,000 after being asked for £1½m by Portsmouth.

Liverpool born, Quinn scored 35 times last season and has previously had spells with Wigan Athletic, Stockport County and Oldham Athletic. He is the Clubs leading scorer having found the back of the net so far this season on 17 occasions.

Eire International Liam O'Brien was signed from Manchester United for a fee of £300,000 in November 1988. Was spotted playing for Shamrock Rovers by Ron Atkinson when playing a friendly against Manchester United.

Kevin Brock was previously with Jim Smith while at Oxford United and Queens Park Rangers. An England U-21 International, Brock was Jim Smith's first signing, a deal in which Q.P.R. received £300,000 for his services.

Mark McGhee is in his second spell with United who initially signed him in January 1978 from Morton a fee of £150,000. After just two seasons he left Tyneside to join Aberdeen with whom he spent six years before a further move which took him to SV Hamburg. His travels then took him to Celtic before the return to St. James' Park in July 1989 for a fee of £250,000. McGhee is a widely experienced striker who has won almost every honour in the game and was United's second top scorer last term.

Scott Sloan recently scored his first goal for Newcastle in the home 2–1 win over Leicester City, Wallsend born Sloan was a close season signing from Berwick Rangers for an initial fee of £40,000.

FROM THE TREATMENT ROOM


The most common footballing injury is known in medical terms as a 'haematoma'. This is simply where a player has received a knock which causes bleeding into the affected tissues, usually muscle. This 'knock' can be administered by an opponent's (indeed even a team mate's) boot, knee, arm, head etc., and if of sufficient force, will cause blood vessels to rupture and create a haematoma. One of the most common examples being to the muscle at the front of the thigh usually caused by an opponent's knee generally referred to as a 'Dead Leg'. The resulting bleeding will cause pressure, pain and restrict mobility of the knee.

The majority of these injuries tend to be of a minor nature and can usually be 'run off'. In more serious cases care must be taken in their management. The initial treatment (first 48 hours) is similar to that outlined in a previous article. The physiotherapy treatment from that point on for a haematoma of the thigh is as follows:

- Heat treatment to relieve pain and stimulate the underlying circulation to aid dispersal of the haematoma.
- Graduated contraction exercises for the thigh muscles will also aid dispersal of the haematoma and help to strengthen the weakened area.
- 3. Mobility exercises of the knee to gradually regain normal movement.
- 4. Activities such as swimming in the early stages and cycling later, will help to restore normality.

COMPLICATIONS: Care must be taken not to treat this injury too vigorously in the early stages, either by exercise or massage. These can cause bone cells to invade the area causing muscle tissue literally to be turned to bone!

Always remember that if you are in any doubt about any injury, you must seek specialist medical advice.


