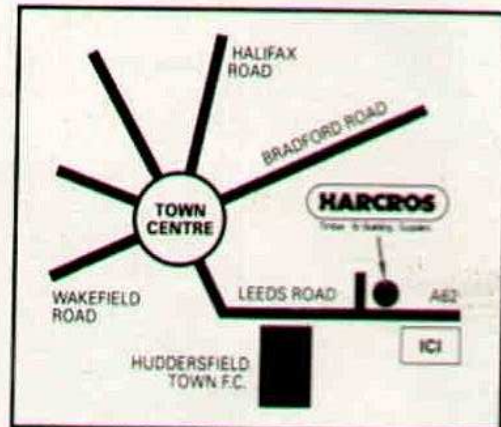

AROUND AND ABOUT

Chris Drake's Third Division Review

Huddersfield Town are one of only four clubs from the Barclays League Division Three who have made the third round of the Rumbelows League Cup following a comprehensive 6-1 aggregate victory over Second Division Sunderland.

Birmingham City progressed after two close encounters with Luton Town. The seeds of victory were sown at Kenilworth Road when the Hatters had to twice come from behind to force a 2-2 draw. Blues' top scorer Nigel Gleghorn netted twice as they ran out victors 5-4 on aggregate.

Peterborough United's reward for a 4-3 aggregate defeat of First Division Wimbledon is a home game against Newcastle United. Chris Turner's men stunned a paltry Don's crowd in the first leg with Ken Charlery and Worrell Sterling helping to produce a 2-1 advantage for the replay. Goals from Gary Kimble and David Riley were sufficient for the Posh to hold their visitors to a 2-2 draw.

Brentford's progression through to the third round of the competition appeared to be a formality following the second round, first leg game at Griffin Park. They overran a Brighton side with three first half goals from Kevin Godfrey, Richard Cadette and Dean Holdsworth. The Division's top striker, Holdsworth, increased the Bee's dominance with a further goal on the hour only for Robinson to score what happened to be a crucial consolation for the Seagulls. Roles were reversed in the return with the home team tying the scores with a similar 4-1 success. The irrepressible Holdsworth netted the all-important decider in extra-time and a visit to First Division Norwich City beckons.

AFC Bournemouth bowed out against Second Division pacesetters Middlesbrough but they took the North Eastern club all the way. Substitute George Lawrence was the first player this season to score at Ayresome Park, his injury-time equaliser ensuring a tight return in the Dean Court decider. John Hendrie had put Boro in front before the interval but Keith Rowland became hero when his floated cross was converted by Jimmy Quinn. With extra-time required and only three minutes remaining, Rowland turned villain as he nudged Hendrie off the ball in the area. Parkinson made no mistake with the penalty.

Lowly **Wigan Athletic** also gave First Division Sheffield United a fright before the Blades edged it 3-2 on aggregate. Twice the Latics had to come from behind to secure a 2-2 draw at Springfield Park. A finely worked goal from Hoyland was the highlight of a dour struggle against Bryan Hamilton's side at Bramall Lane, and winger Bryan Griffiths came close to sending the game into extra-time with a 25 yard shot whistling inches wide.

After holding Cup-holders Sheffield Wednesday to a 0-0 scoreline at Brisbane Road **Leyton Orient** finally succumbed 4-1 in the return. But it was left to Trevor Francis to settle the game, coming off the bench in the 33rd minute to replace the injured David Hirst and scoring two second half goals.

Any chance that **Bradford City** could clinch a shock result at West Ham disappeared when they were hammered 4-0. The game was the second of three in eight days during which they conceded four goals in each match, 4-1 away at **Stockport County** and 4-3 at home to **Fulham** being the other reverses.

PLAY SAFE . . .



. . . with bonfires and fireworks — that's the message from Leeds Road. For the Town players, led by skipper Peter Jackson, are helping West Yorkshire Fire Service to get over the "Play Safe" theme on the run-up to November 5th.

The team know all about playing safe on the football field and want to see West Yorkshire youngsters adopting the same safety first approach when they prepare their bonfire or handle fireworks.

On bonfires they say:

- ★ Don't build bonfires near buildings
- ★ Don't build a den inside a bonfire — you could be trapped
- ★ Don't use petrol to light a bonfire
- ★ Don't put aerosols or bottles on bonfires
- ★ Never throw fireworks on to a bonfire

On fireworks they say:

- ★ Keep fireworks in a box
- ★ Follow instructions on each firework carefully. Read them by torchlight, never by a naked flame
- ★ Light fireworks at arm's length
- ★ Stand well back
- ★ Never return to a firework once lit
- ★ Never throw fireworks
- ★ Never put fireworks in your pocket

Station Officer Peter Phillips, the Fire Prevention Publicity Officer said: "We hope that West Yorkshire youngsters will be on the ball when it comes to taking this good advice. Last year West Yorkshire firemen had to deal with 551 bonfire incidents and there were 61 injuries. We don't want a repeat.

"We would ask bonfire-builders not to set their fires up days in advance. Stacked bonfires are too much of a temptation for many people and organisers would do well to leave fire-building until the day of the event. That way they will avoid a lot of heartache and wasted effort".

Town players and fire chiefs are also backing Trading Standards watchdogs who have urged children not to wear shell suits on November 5th.

The Institute of Trading Standards Administration has said that shell suits could be ablaze in seconds after contact with a naked flame.

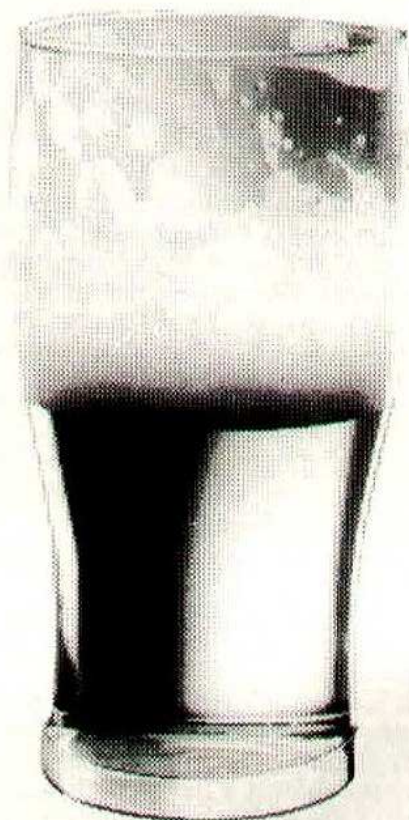

WELCOME TO . . .

Following the disappointment of near relegation last season, Swindon have started the season in fine style and are now firmly established as one of the Second Division's promotion favourites.

Although it took Swindon a little while to get going, Glenn Hoddle's men certainly mean business. They have already put three goals past Barnsley, Oxford and Millwall in the last round. Duncan Shearer picked up a four goal haul at Plymouth, Ipswich have been beaten 4-1 and Sunderland went down 5-1 at the County Ground.

Prior to Saturday's games only Barnet had scored more Barclays League goals and Duncan and Steve White are both comfortably into double figures.

Dave Bennett (midfield). Signed from Sheffield Wednesday last September, but played less than two hours football after a double fracture of his right leg five days later. Made his League debut for Man. City in 1979 and was an F.A. Cup winner with Coventry.

Colin Calderwood (defender). Born Glasgow. The only surviving member of Swindon's Fourth Division championship side of 1985-86, Colin has made over 250 League and Cup appearances since being signed from Mansfield Town.

Shaun Close (striker). Limited League appearances since a move from Bournemouth almost two years ago and has scored only once for the club. Went to Dean Court in March 1988 from Tottenham, where he began his career as a trainee.

Fraser Digby (goalkeeper). Born Sheffield. The former England Under 21 keeper has missed just a handful of games for Swindon in the last three seasons and passed the 200 appearance milestone in the spring. An ex-Manchester United apprentice, he arrived at the County Ground on a permanent basis in December 86.

Steve Foley (midfield). Born Liverpool. Last season saw Steve record his best appearance tally for Swindon since arriving from Sheffield United in 1987, being absent from the Town's starting line-up on just six occasions. He scored seven goals, including a career-first hat-trick against Leicester City.

Richard Green (defender). Released by Shrewsbury Town in the 1990 close season, Richard signed for Swindon in January 1991 following a successful trial. Began his career as an apprentice at Gay Meadow and went on to record almost 150 first team appearances for the Shropshire club.

Nicky Hammond (goalkeeper). The consistency of Fraser Digby has kept Nicky in the shadows for most of the four years since he arrived on a free transfer from Arsenal. An ex-apprentice at Highbury, Nicky made his League debut while on loan to Bristol Rovers.

Micky Hazard (midfield). Born Sunderland. Signed from Portsmouth last September. Made 38 League and Cup appearances, scoring eight goals. He won both F.A. Cup and U.E.F.A. Cup medals with Tottenham before joining Chelsea.

Paul Hunt (midfield). One of only two locally-born players in the current squad. A former club trainee, Paul signed full professional forms in July 1989 and made his League debut against Barnsley two months later.

Tom Jones (midfield). Born Aldershot. Has missed just five League games since arriving at the County Ground from Aberdeen in September 1988. Formerly an apprentice at Chelsea, he was released in 1983 and joined Farnborough Town, moving on to Weymouth in 1986.

David Kerlake (midfield/defender). Signed from QPR in November 1989, David had struggled to gain a regular first-team spot at Loftus Road. Gained England honours at schoolboy, youth and Under 21 levels. All his

Martin Ling (midfield). Born West Ham. Slightly-built midfielder now in his second spell at the County Ground, having rejoined the Town from Southend United for a small fee during the summer. Began his career with Exeter City before signing for Swindon in July 1986. Spent a month on loan with Mansfield Town last season.

Ross MacLaren (midfield/defender). Now in his 12th season as a professional and his fourth at Swindon. Absent only once during the last two campaigns, Ross normally plays just in front or just behind the back four. With Shrewsbury for five years, he joined Derby in 1985 and picked up a Second Division championship medal there.

David Mitchell (striker). Born Glasgow. Capped 17 times for Australia, David was signed in July from Chelsea for a nominal fee, whom he joined from Feyenoord in December 1988. Previously with Glasgow Rangers and played for Newcastle on loan during January.

Duncan Shearer (striker). Born Fort William. Has maintained an impressive 'goal every other game' average since making his Football League debut for Chelsea in February 1986. A club record signing from Huddersfield Town in June 1988, Duncan has recorded tallies of 16, 27 and 23 for Swindon. Arrived in London from Highland League club Inverness

Clachnacuddin in November 1983.

Fitzroy Simpson (midfield). Signed as a trainee in July 1987, making his League debut in December 1988. Has since struggled to show the potential that his early displays promised.

Nicky Summerbee (striker). Born Altrincham. Started a game for the first time in the Town's final fixture of 1990-91. Nicky has a bright future and a good football pedigree, as his father, grandfather and great uncle all had careers in the Football League.

Shaun Taylor (defender). Signed from Exeter in July, Shaun was City's captain and Player of the Year in their Fourth Division championship-winning side of 1989-90. Came into League football late when he arrived at St. James' Park from Western League club Bideford Town. Strong and durable central defender.

Adrian Viveash (defender). Born Swindon. Progressed through the ranks at the County Ground, starting his career as a winger. Has now slotted into a back-four position and featured at left back in the latter part of last season.

Steve White (striker). Now approaching the veteran stage, Steve was a free transfer signing five years ago from Bristol Rovers, where he began his League career in 1977. Moved to Luton and Charlton between his two spells in Bristol. Troubled by injury last season, but still claimed eleven goals.

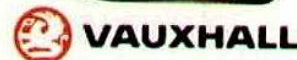

The Republic of Ireland international — Frank has made 70 appearances for his country — has arrived on non-contract terms, having left Blackburn Rovers during the summer. It's only a few weeks since Frank last played at Leeds Road when he was in Denis Law's XI for the Frank Worthington testimonial. His previous visit had been some years ago when he played a benefit game in aid of the Valley Parade disaster.

A native of Dublin, Frank is best remembered for his time at Arsenal and Manchester United. He notched up almost 450 First Division appearances for the two clubs and also appeared in five F.A. Cup Finals.

Prior to moving to Blackburn, Frank had spells at Ajax, Derby County and Le Havre. Last season saw him finish as Rovers' top scorer with 10 Barclays League goals, taking his League total past the 200 mark in domestic competitions. There have also been a further 20 at international level.

As well as being a significant addition to the playing squad, Frank is also keen to pass on his

knowledge to the Club's strikers. He is a fully qualified coach and intends to develop his off-the-field role during his stay at Leeds Road.

On the way out are Keith Edwards and Dudley Lewis. Keith came to Leeds Road in August '90 as the Football League's leading marksman but has been unable to rediscover the form that brought 250 League goals. His contract has been terminated by mutual agreement. Dudley is currently out of contract after completing two years following a move from Swansea City. So far this season, his football had been confined to the Pontin's League. On Thursday he made the relatively short trip to The Shay to link up with John McGrath's Halifax Town side. Initially, Dudley has moved on a month's loan, although the deal could become permanent. Dudley was in Halifax's side that lost narrowly at Rochdale on Saturday.

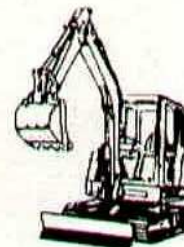

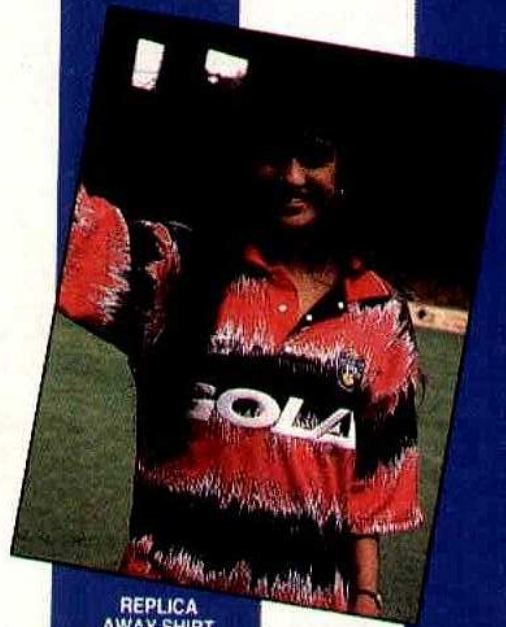

IT'S A DATE!

This day in Town's History — 29th October

1910 Div. 2 Wolves 0, Town 3

Attendance 12,000

Town's first visit to Molineux against an in form Wolves team — defeated only once in nine previous matches — proved successful. The Examiner wrote 'Saturday was the happiest day, all is merry and bright' — this in response to victories by both Town and Fartown. Town scored in the first minute when Hamilton 'executed a clever dribble' and found the net. 'The Babes', (at that time Town's nickname) made it two when McCubbin scored with a 'fast rising shot', to be followed by a third 5 minutes later, Bartlett converting a penalty awarded against a Wolves defender for handling the ball. Wolves missed a penalty in the second half, shooting straight at 'the brilliant Mutch'. So finished 'a fast and exciting match', the 1908 F.A. Cup winners defeated by a Town team, which included Macaulay and Wright, both Irish internationals from Belfast's Cliftonville, who had promised to assist the Town if business commitments allowed, both making their debuts in this match.

Having just lost to Newport County, their first defeat in 7 matches, Town set about restoring their promotion drive by visiting Chester (Town were lying 6th, 3 points behind leaders Chesterfield). Cowling, the man of the match, helped Town bounce back, two superbly delivered crosses in the 13th and 17th minutes were gleefully converted by Steve Kindon and Ian Robins to secure the points in front of 4,331, including a large Town following, Chester's biggest crowd of the

season at that time. Mick Buxton, Town's manager, said 'it was our organisation and spirit that carried us through.' Unfortunately Town finished 4th in Division Three behind Champions Rotherham and promoted Barnsley and Charlton.

1983 Div. 2 Sheffield Wed. 0, Town 0

'Wednesday on the way up — but not at Town's expense' read the headlines after Town had withstood 'a ferocious onslaught'. Sheffield-born and ex-Wednesday goalkeeper Brian Cox, emerged as Town's man of the match, ably supported by Dave Sutton and Paul Jones, both in 'excellent and uncompromising form'. Wednesday, the Football League's only unbeaten team at that time found Town's defensive wall impenetrable, indeed Town could have produced goals themselves as both Stanton and Cowling had come close to scoring in the first half. 27,824 fans witnessed this confrontation, the largest gate to see Town that season. Wednesday were promoted, being equal on points with Chelsea, who secured the championship by virtue of goal difference.

WE'VE MET BEFORE

Town 1, Swindon 2 — February 1st, 1913 (F.A.C. Rd 2)



Not many people realise that Swindon Town set an attendance record here at Leeds Road which was to stand for seven years. Even those who have read and digested the records in Breedon Books' "Huddersfield Town — A Complete Record" will be under the illusion that this was our second highest pre-World War 1 crowd. This is in fact, not the case as research shows that the 20,700 quoted by Breedon Books for the visit of West Brom on December 24th, 1910, should read 4,296!

The first meeting of the two Town's (and the only previous meeting in a cup competition) took place on Saturday, 1st February, 1913 and a 17,585 turn out (who paid £595) set a new Leeds Road attendance record which stood until January, 1920 for the visit of Tottenham. They witnessed a keen struggle in the Huddersfield mud for, although it was fine overhead, the conditions underfoot were very bad. The 'Examiner' reported that Swindon had a fairly large number of supporters who 'frequently gave vent to a war cry almost as weird as those made famous by the Colonial Rugby visitors'. The West Country men played 'a more convincing game than the home team, and deserved their success.

After 20 minutes a mix-up between goalkeeper Mutch and full-back Bullock resulted in the ball going loose to the visiting centre-forward Wheatcroft who had the simple task of scoring into an empty net.

'Mud', it was reported, 'was freely kicked up into the players' faces and several had to receive attention, causing temporary inconvenience.'

Ten minutes from time Swindon broke away and increased their lead, Brown, the visiting inside-left beat Dinnie and pushed the ball past Mutch a fraction of a second before the two collided, the scorer having to receive some attention.

Almost in the final minute the unexpected happened. The tide of battle was turned and Town attacked strongly, forcing a corner. The ball was well-placed from the corner flag and the result of a short struggle was 'favourable to the attackers, for whom Mann scored.'

The report concluded 'the end came almost immediately afterwards and Town had received their dismissal from the competition.' N.B. Some reports credit MaCauley with Town's goal. The 'Examiner' credited Mann with the effort.

It is interesting to note that this was Town's first defeat in the competition as a League club by a non-league outfit.

Swindon were then members of the powerful Southern League — at that time said to be at least the equal of the English Second Division and although the Wiltshire side did not enter the League until 1920 — as original members of Division Three — some perspective on their pedigree can be gained from the fact that they were F.A. Cup semi-finalists in 1910 and again in 1912. Indeed, they can rightly claim that this is the last occasion when a non-league side has reached this penultimate stage of the F.A. Cup competition.

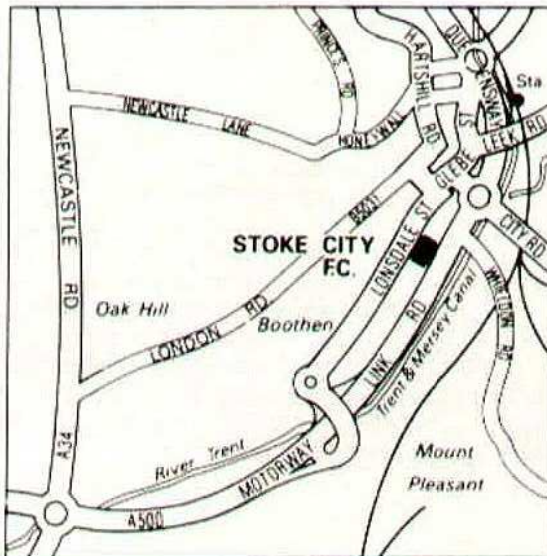

BARCLAYS NEWS



STRIKER'S PERESTROIKA

Newcastle United's assistant manager Tony Galvin made good use of his University degree recently when a group of visiting foreign youngsters were shown into the dressing room before the Magpies' home game with Leicester City.

The overseas guests of the club, aged between five and six years old, were feeling a little lost as their official interpreter had been sidelined through illness. The former All Saints' schoolboy took the initiative and started to chat, in fluent Russian, with the four young visitors from Chernobyl, who were being given a tour of the ground before the game kicked-off. As well as explaining the pre-match preparation and exchanging notes on Dynamo Kiev, Galvin also led his new fans in a Chorus of 'Howay the lads'.

DONOWA AT WEMBLEY

Birmingham City's flying winger Louie Donowa became the first player to win through to the Final of the Rumbelows Sprint Challenge when he streaked home ahead of his West Midlands rivals in the first heat held last week at Molineux. Donowa, signed from Bristol City in August, collects £500 for his efforts but more importantly qualifies for the Wembley decider to be held immediately prior to the Rumbelows League Cup Final on Sunday, 12th April, 1992. Walsall's Rod McDonald also booked a Wembley place after finishing second with Aston Villa's Dalian Atkinson having to wait to see if he qualifies as one of the regional heats' fastest losers.

Donowa's time for the 100 metres sprint, which is run on grass in full kit and football boots, was 11.96 seconds, with McDonald clocking 12.18 and Atkinson 12.29 seconds. The other contenders in the Central West heat were Stuart Rimmer (Chester City), Craig Hignett (Crewe Alexandra), Phil Gee (Derby County), Paul West (Port Vale), Mark Taylor (Shrewsbury Town), Paul Williams (Stockport County), Tony Kelly (Stoke City), Darren Rogers (West Bromwich Albion), Tim Steele (Wolves) and Lee Jones (Wrexham).

GIGG LANE FACELIFT

Third Division Bury have drawn up proposals for a £1 million refurbishment of their Gigg Lane ground. The facelift, which includes the installation of seats in the Manchester Road Stand will mean the Shakers can boast covered seating on three sides.

This is further evidence that Third and Fourth Division clubs are already making progress towards satisfying the requirements of the Taylor Report despite the 1999 deadline.

LEARNING THROUGH FOOTBALL

Last Thursday saw the national launch of the 'Learning through Football' project at Aston

Villa Football Club, where the concept of using the national game as a teaching aid for primary schoolchildren was first pioneered, with the backing of the Football Trust and British Gas, in 1989.

Teachers use football as a theme for cross-curricular topic work in junior schools and enhance this with class visits to football clubs. Along with Aston Villa, Huddersfield Town, Norwich City and Sunderland have already started similar schemes with a dozen other clubs also showing an interest in the project.

British Gas has now offered to sponsor a national scheme and a special 120-page book on the scheme is now available, together with professional advice from Jean Evans who has spent the last three years developing the Villa Park scheme.

Regular updates on the scheme at Leeds Road will appear in the programme.

ALBION SUCCEED

Liverpool, who were beaten 2-0 in the U.E.F.A. Cup this week by Auxerre, should note that Third Division leaders West Bromwich Albion succeeded where they failed. Albion defeated the French side 2-1 in a game played behind closed doors at the Hawthorns only three weeks ago.

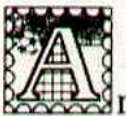

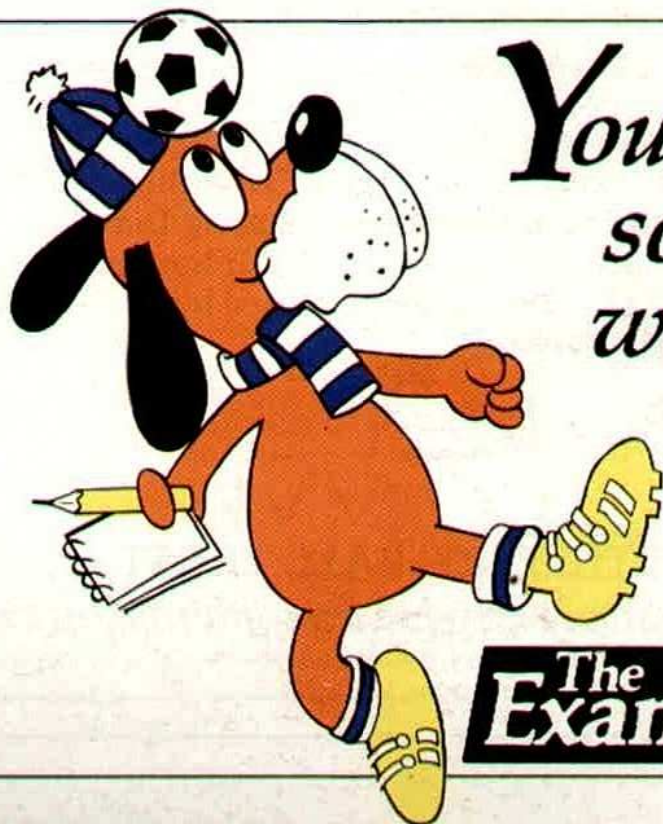
