





I was extremely apprehensive about the law change, but what it has meant is that defenders are holding back a little bit more, because they don't want to be turned, and that has opened the game up in midfield. The outcome will probably be a lot more goals.

I thought it was the wrong way to try and stop time wasting, but, from a spectator point of view, I would say it's certainly going to make the game more entertaining – and that's what it's about. Incredibly, if that change was designed to prevent time wasting, we're now allowing goalkeepers to take goal kicks from either side of their area. The question is, how long do they get to do that? On Wednesday I saw a keeper booked for time wasting when, completely within the laws of the game, he jogged across from where the ball went

thought was a lack of appreciation of the situation by the linesman.



I saw Swindon play at Bristol Rovers on Wednesday and I was very impressed. Tiverton Park is always a difficult place to go to and win. Rovers, if nothing else, are always fired up and they work ever so hard. I saw Swindon open them up quite easily, go three goals ahead and lead 4-1. They did concede two late goals, but it looked almost academic. They've got that ability to pass the ball short, and then open up the game with long telling passes and that's something we'll have to be very wary of.

You've got to show sides respect, but we've got to worry about our own form and what we can do. From what I've seen so far I've been quite pleased. However, you've only got to look at the Premier League table to know that you have to keep your feet on the floor at this stage. I just hope that we can carry on and play the sort of exciting football we did against Leicester.

On the injury front, Mark Venus, Mark Rankine and Tim Steele will all be out for a while yet. Derek Mountfield's suspension ends after Saturday so we want to get him back fully fit as soon as possible. Lawrie Madden had ninety minutes against Aston Villa's reserves, while Tom Bennett played for an hour. They need some more football, but they're coming on.

We want them all fit as quickly as possible in order to exert some pressure on the lads in the side. They've started ever so well, but I want to keep the pressure on them so that they can't afford to relax, knowing that there's other people ready to take their places.

Finally, I must pay tribute to Steve Bull. 200 goals in 294 games is an incredible record. I'm sure he'd want to pay tribute to the players around him, but equally, the players who've played with him over the past six years would marvel at the way he puts his chances in the back of the net. His ratio has improved tremendously since he came here. He used to take six chances to score a goal, now you might see him have one chance and put it away.



**“** It has been a 'Beauty and the Beast' start to the season for Swindon Town, says player manager Glenn Hoddle.

Their opening match, at home to Sunderland last Saturday, was a neat footballing contest which Swindon won 1-0 thanks to a quite superb goal by Hoddle himself.

In sharp contrast, Wednesday evening's 4-3 victory at Bristol Rovers was a scrap from start to finish.

Though Hoddle is a master craftsman who will never betray his footballing principles, he was nevertheless satisfied that his team was able to come out on top in a tough battle as well as in the more refined atmosphere of the match against Sunderland.

He said: "Saturday was the beauty - and the beast came out at Bristol Rovers.

"We have already proved we can beat teams with fluid, creative football. Now we've shown we can mix it and still come up with three points, which bodes well for the rest of the campaign."

Hoddle is pleased with the way his side has shaped up in the opening games and particularly with the way in which new boys Craig Maskell and John Moncur have settled in.

Striker Maskell, signed from Reading in a £250,000 deal which saw Tom Jones moving in the opposite direction, was only denied his first Swindon goal by a crunching tackle which led to a penalty in the Bristol Rovers match.

Moncur, an £80,000 capture from Hoddle's old club Tottenham Hotspur on transfer deadline day last season, has looked very impressive in midfield.

He was so impressive against Sunderland, in fact, that Hoddle later said: "at £80,000 he could be one of the steals of the season."

Now the Swindon boss comes to Molineux aiming to maintain his team's 100% start to the season, in the process ruining Wolves' perfect start and avenging last season's 2-1 defeat here.

Hoddle's assistant manager, John Gorman, watched our 3-0 win against Leicester City on Tuesday evening and is looking forward with relish to this afternoon's encounter.

He said: "Molineux is always a great place to go, but it's even better now with the new stand. I really enjoyed the atmosphere on Tuesday night.

"The pitch looked great as well, and that should help us to produce a very exciting match."

## ON THE BOX

Wolves are set to hit the small screen in a big way in the coming weeks.

Four of our early-season matches are to be televised live as part of the new ITV contract to cover Football League matches.

The away game with Tuesday's opponents Leicester City starts the ball rolling on September 13 and Central TV will be present again for the local derby at Birmingham City a fortnight later.

The Birmingham-based station send their cameras to Molineux on October 4 when relegated West Ham United are our visitors and, finally for the time being, our game at Southend United a week later will be shown too - although maybe only in the south-east.

All four games have consequently been moved from Saturdays to Sundays, but, while recognising the prestige and financial benefit of attracting live coverage, the club do have some reservations.

Both chairman Jonathan Hayward and secretary-director Keith Pearson have expressed concern that the demands of TV should not override consideration for the paying Wolves fans. Clearly, they and their counterparts at other Football League clubs will pay close attention to ensuring there's no TV takeover of the long-established habits of loyal supporters.

And manager Graham Turner will second that after speaking out about the problems he could face in preparing the lads for a Tuesday night game if, because of TV, they have played only a couple of days previously.


It was interesting to hear that Birmingham officials estimate that the crowd of 10,614 at their televised game with Notts County last Sunday was about 5,000 down on what they would have expected on a normal first day.

As Blues manager Terry Cooper said: "Will the thousands who stayed away return when the cameras aren't here?" That might mean long after the club have spent the reported £24,000 they received for the live screening.



# WELCOME



**T**he County Ground at Swindon has certainly been an interesting place to be over the past few seasons. The Robins have rarely been out of the news.

Under Lou Macari, Town were promoted from Division Four to Division Two in successive seasons. When Ossie Ardiles took over he led them into the old First Division for the first time in their history, or so it was thought, by defeating Sunderland in a play-off final at Wembley. However, Swindon's joy was short-lived as the results of an inquiry into the club's finances became known. The irregularities which occurred during the reign of Chairman Brian Hillier and manager Lou Macari forced the club to remain in the Second Division with Sunderland gaining a place in the elite.

Ossie Ardiles eventually moved on to manage Newcastle United having introduced Robins' fans to the attractive passing game



which has been carried on by his successor and former colleague Glenn Hoddle.

Swindon is Hoddle's first job in management, after an illustrious playing career during which he represented Spurs and England with terrific style. From White Hart Lane he moved on to Monaco where towards the end of his stay there his career was threatened by serious injury. Fortunately, this has cleared sufficiently for him to resume his playing career with Swindon. Last season Hoddle led the Robins to the brink of the promotion play-offs and this term will be hoping to maintain their push towards the Premier League right up until the seasons' end.

There has not been much activity in the transfer market in the summer at the County Ground. The only major deal involves striker, Craig Maskell's move to the Robins from Reading, in a move that sent long-serving midfielder Tom Jones in the opposite direction.

The departure of Duncan Shearer will obviously prove a blow in the coming season. The burly striker had a prolific season in 1991-92 until his transfer to Blackburn Rovers just before the transfer deadline. Hoddle will be looking to Maskell to provide some of Shearer's missing goals. The experienced Steve White and former Chelsea man David

Mitchell were also in contention for places up front last season.


The midfield skills of ex-Spurs man Micky Hazard were very influential last year and were at the hub of Swindon's passing game. However, one of his midfield partners, the exciting Fitzroy Simpson was transferred to Manchester City for £500,000 towards the end of the season.

Defender Ross McLaren was another who showed great skill on the ball last season whether in midfield or in defence. Shaun Taylor proved an inspired signing from Exeter and earned great praise from his manager.


In goal Fraser Digby and Nicky Hammond both proved themselves excellent keepers during the season and it will be interesting to see who occupies the No 1 jersey at the start of the current campaign.

There is unlikely to be any real change in Swindon's approach to the game this season as they seek a place in the new Premier League. The departure of Duncan Shearer will be a major blow to their hopes. However, much could depend on whether Glenn Hoddle will be able to stay fit through the whole season and organise the side from the sweeper position. Only time will tell. One thing is sure though, Swindon will remain an attractive side to watch throughout the season.

## THE PLAYERS

### **Glenn Hoddle** (Manager)

Appointed at the beginning of April last year. In his playing career Glenn won F.A. Cup winners medals while at Tottenham Hotspur and helped Spurs with their UEFA Cup win in 1984. Glenn won fifty three England caps before a move to top French outfit Monaco. A serious knee injury threatened to wreck his career and he was subsequently released from his contract last December. Glenn admits that the chance to manage Swindon Town came at the right time for him.

### **Paul Bodin** (Defender)

Born Cardiff. Now in his second spell with the Club, Welsh International Bodin started his career with Newport County. Swindon signed Bodin in March 1988 and he played 93 League games before a £550,000 move took him to Crystal Palace. Unable to retain a first team place Bodin returned to Swindon just ten months later.

### **Colin Calderwood** (Defender)

Born Glasgow. The only surviving member of the Town's Fourth Division Championship-winning side of 1985-86. He was restricted to 23 games last season when he suffered a knee ligament injury in mid-September.

### **Shaun Close** (Striker)

Born Islington, London. Signed for £70,000 from AFC Bournemouth almost three years ago and has scored just once for the Club. Shaun went to Dean Court in March 1989 from Tottenham, where he began his career as a trainee.

### **Fraser Digby** (Goalkeeper)

Born Sheffield. The former England Under-21 keeper has missed just

a handful of games for Swindon in the last three seasons and passed the 200-appearance milestone in the Spring.

### **Ross McLaren** (Midfield/Defender)

Born Edinburgh. In his 12th season as a professional and his fourth at Swindon. Absent only once during the last two campaigns, through suspension, Ross normally plays just in front or just behind the back four.

### **David Mitchell** (Striker)

Born Glasgow. Capped 37 times for Australia, David was signed in July from Chelsea for a nominal fee. Made just one appearance last season for the London club, which he joined from Feyenoord for £200,000 in December 1988. Previously with Rangers.

### **John Moncur** (Midfield)

Born Stepney. An £80,000 signing from Tottenham Hotspur. He made his League debut for the White Hart Lane club in 1987. He played on loan for Doncaster Rovers, Cambridge, Portsmouth, Brentford and Ipswich.

### **Nicky Summerbee** (Striker)

Born Altrincham. Started a game for the first time in the Town's final fixture of 1990/91, at Port Vale and made seven earlier appearances as a substitute. Nicky has a good football pedigree, as his father, grandfather and great uncle all had careers in the Football League.

### **Shaun Taylor** (Defender)

Born Plymouth. A £200,000 signing from Exeter. Came into League Football late, being 23 when he arrived at St. James Park. Strong and durable defender who has missed just two games in the last three seasons.

### **Adrian Viveash** (Defender)

Born Swindon. Progressed through

the ranks at the County Ground, starting his career as a winger. He has slotted into a back four position and featured at left back in the latter part of last season.

### **Steve White** (Striker)

Born Chipping Sodbury, Glos. Now approaching the veteran stage, Steve was a free transfer signing five years ago from Bristol Rovers, where he began his League career in 1977.

### **Micky Hazard** (Midfield)

Born Sunderland. Signed from Portsmouth for £130,000 in September 1990. Made 38 League and Cup appearances, scoring 8 goals - his best tally since 1981/82 when he was at White Hart Lane. He won both F.A. Cup and UEFA Cup medals with Tottenham before joining Chelsea.

### **Craig Maskell** (Striker)

£195,000 Summer buy from Reading which took Tom Jones to Elm Park. Started his career as an apprentice at Southampton and spent a short time on loan at Swindon before moving to Huddersfield where in two years he scored 53 goals in 106 appearances.

### **David Kerslake** (Midfield/Defender)

Born Stepney, London. A £110,000 signing from QPR in November 1989. He made his first team debut there in a UEFA Cup tie against Partizan Belgrade in 1984. Gained England honours at Schoolboy, Youth and Under-21 levels.

### **Martin Ling** (Midfield)

Born West Ham, London. Slightly built midfielder now in his second spell at The County Ground, having rejoined the Town from Southend United for a small fee during the Summer. Began his career with Exeter.

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# COUNTRYWIDE

Wolves are one of only six First Division clubs to have completed two games. Having scored five goals, it is likely that we would still be heading the table had all the other clubs played this week. As it was, apart from our game with Leicester City on Tuesday evening, the only other matches were Cambridge v Charlton and Bristol Rovers v Swindon.

John Beck's much maligned Cambridge team slipped up at home when Pardew got a second half winner for Charlton to give the Londoners two wins out of two. United lie pointless and goalless at the foot of the table.

Joining Wolves and Charlton on six points are Glenn Hoddle's Swindon Town. They followed up their win over Sunderland last weekend with a 4-3 win over Bristol Rovers at Twerton Park. Town led 3-0 and then 4-1 before Rovers staged a late fightback with the Swindon goals coming from Bodin (pen), Mitchell (2) and Taylor.

The first round, first leg games, in the Coca Cola Cup, provided little in the way of shocks although Huddersfield's 3-2 victory at Roker Park deserves a mention. Starbuck, Parsley and Roberts were the scorers for the Terriers whilst former England star, and Coventry City


manager, Terry Butcher, got onto the scoresheet for Sunderland. Cardiff take a goal advantage to Ashton Gate after a Dale goal gave them victory over Bristol City and Carlisle must have surprised themselves when they hit Burnley for four. The newly promoted Clares could only respond once in the game at Brunton Park.

Doncaster Rovers look to be in for a bleak season. They lost in the league to Bury last Saturday then crashed again in Tuesday's cup tie with Lincoln. Both matches were at Doncaster's Belle Vue home and the Lincoln scorers in a 3-0 victory were Firney, Bressington and Carmichael. Brentford recovered from their defeat at our hands last weekend, when they travelled to neighbours Fulham and won 2-0 with Booker and Blissett the scorers.

Locally, West Bromwich Albion overcame Peter Shilton's Plymouth, although, they would have hoped for more than Bob Taylor's goal in the kitty for the trek to the south coast. Ian Hamilton's late penalty miss for the Baggies could prove costly.

Wayne Clarke beat another ex-Wolf at the Bescot Stadium when he poked the ball past Vince Bartram in Bournemouth's goal. But Walsall couldn't hold on to their advantage and Morris levelled things when he scored for the Cherries four minutes after the break.

In the Premier League the form book continues to be upset. Up at the top are Norwich City, who followed up their demolition of Arsenal with a 2-1 victory over Chelsea, who took the lead, at Carrow Road through Graham Stuart. Dave Phillips and Mark Robins got the second half goals that sent the Canaries flying to the top. Second, only on goal difference, are Coventry City. The Sky Blues travelled to



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



In this afternoon's column we will look forward to the games at Barnsley on September 1st and at home to Peterborough four days later.

Perhaps we should at this point publicly thank the Football League computer for giving us a nice trip such as Oakwell on a Tuesday night. It's just a pity that the computer couldn't have added the proverbial icing onto the cake by fixing the game for the middle of January. With long, awkward journeys such as Leicester and Birmingham originally scheduled for Saturdays, it just shows the degree of logic present in Lytham St Annes.

Following our game at Oxford on Saturday, Barnsley will be something of a contrast for those Wanderers Supporters who enjoy looking round town before the game. We first played at Oakwell on December 1st 1906 and managed to win 1-0. The ground remains a traditional, old style enclosure where you expect Woodbines to be sold in the club shop. On all our visits since 1906 we have failed to record a league victory and this seasons' game will not be easier as Mel Machin has assembled a useful side which could make a strong bid for promotion. Why not make the journey and see if we can ruin Michael Parkinson's night?

The following Saturday sees the visit of Peterborough United to Molineux for a First Division fixture:- now that's a statement that would have surprised our grandfathers. Elected to the league in 1960 the nearest Posh came to progressing beyond the Third Division was in 1978, when on the final day of the season they lost 4-3 at Chester and Preston drew 2-2 at home to Shrewsbury, which meant that the Lancashire side went up on goal difference. However under Chris Turner's management they climbed out of Division Four in 1991 and then last season beat Stockport in the play-off final at Wembley to reach the Second (or First) Division at long last.

# ONE WAY OUT

**G**ary Lineker has reservations, Mike Stowell definitely doesn't like it, nor does Graham Turner. It will give defenders palpitations and their managers a few more grey hairs but football is a-changing and no longer can defending teams resort to the back-pass as a reliable means of using up a few precious seconds.

FIFA, in their wisdom, have deemed it illegal for a goal-keeper to pick up a pass made with the boot of a team-mate - and defenders everywhere are coming to terms with what to do about it.

Lineker, now an articulate voice on BBC's revived Match of the Day and on Radio Five, expresses concern that the new law will encourage ugly 'route one' football, with teams pumping the ball forward and forcing defenders into less-than-subtle clearances into Row G of all-seater stands.

The view from the Molineux management is that the radical change wasn't necessary here because the worst excesses of time-wasting are confined to the Italian and Spanish leagues.

But 'the gaffer' recognised that the curbs on the back-pass would, as we saw in last weekend's televised matches, create more mistakes, more excitement and more goals.



*More problems for defenders*

And that is where the new law will gain much of its support from fans frustrated at the sight of defenders taking the easy option whenever there's a goal-hungry striker breathing down their neck.

It won't always be pretty, but, as spectators will already have

noticed, it will be an added dimension to the entertainment package. The game will be more 'live' simply because the ball will spend less time 'dead'.

I don't envy the goalkeepers, our own Mike Stowell included, who will sometimes find themselves kicking a ball under pressure when they would prefer to pick it up or dive on it.

But, for these so-called mad-men of the game, can it really be more dangerous than plunging at the studded size nines of someone who doesn't know the meaning of the word restraint?

One would think the rule change can only help Steve Bull and Andy Mutch - and England. Our hyper-active game has been nullified by the keep-ball Continentals over the years, so this could be seen as a slight tipping of the scales.

And, just maybe, future generations of defenders will try something other than to kick the skin off the ball when under pressure and with the route to their keeper cut off. Perhaps they will become educated to put their foot on it and 'football' their way out of trouble.

One thing's for sure - I bet Bruce Grobbelaar is licking his lips at the prospect of having even greater scope for his eccentric sorties outside the area!

Other significant law changes enable goalkeepers to take goal-kicks from either side of their six-yard area; referees can insist on walls retreating 10 yards immediately at free-kicks; and compel referees to show a red and a yellow card to a player being dismissed for two bookable offences.







# MATCH MEMORI

Wolves' first two matches of the 1972/3 campaign had both been away from home and had both resulted in defeats. The reverses, which took place at Newcastle and Arsenal, had supporters looking somewhat pessimistically at the season that lay ahead. But by the time Wolves faced Stoke on the last day of September, the team had gotten their act together, winning five out of eight games, and they lay just two points off the top of the table. Stoke, although unbeaten at home at this time, had failed to pick up a point from their five away trips and they had only managed to score one goal. The match did go to form, but few who attended that day could have expected to see such a tremendous game, one crammed full of action and goals.

Centre forward for City was England's hero of '66, Geoff Hurst, and in only the third minute he was facing Phil Parkes with the ball placed on the penalty spot. Hurst always hit his penalties with unerring power and few keepers stood any chance of saving them. Lofty Parkes was no exception, and Wolves were one down. This only served to sting Wolves into life and they started a bombardment of the Stoke goal which was rewarded ten minutes later when John Richards tapped in an easy goal. In the 24th minute, Derek Dougan, with a typical effort, gave Wolves a lead that was to last for only 60 seconds. A cross into the Wolves area was deflected to the feet of Jimmy

Greenhoff who had the easiest of tasks to slip the ball past Parkes. The rest of the half saw Wolves constantly attacking with Richards and Dougan giving Denis Smith and his defence a torrid time. Sir Alf Ramsey, much to the dismay of the Molineux faithful, had left Richards out of his squad for the International with Yugoslavia, but had he been at Molineux that afternoon he surely would have had to admit the error of his ways. Richards'

form in the first half of the match had been good, his showing in the second was of World class.


It wasn't until the 67th minute that Wolves gained the upper hand once more, when Richards hit a fine shot past John Farmer in the Stoke goal after good work from Dave Wagstaffe. But the Potteries side refused to lie down and soon levelled again, this time through Alan Bloor who scored with a spectacular volley which

easily beat Parkes. That was one of only two shots that City had on the Wolves goal in the second half such was the Molineux men's superiority. With Wagstaffe providing endless accurate crosses from the left, and Mike Bailey, Danny Hegan and Kenny Hibbit in total control of midfield, it was obvious that the scoring wasn't yet finished. With eight minutes left Danny Hegan put Wolves back in front and as the game entered the final sixty seconds it seemed that a one goal winning margin would be enough, although the scoreline gave a totally false reading of the control and possession that Wolves had had in the game. But John Richards wasn't to be denied his first hat trick for the club, although, when Wagstaffe's through ball found him, he was heavily marked and a goal looked most unlikely. But with skills that belied his tender years, he sent the experienced Stoke defensive pairing of Mike Pejic and John Marsh the wrong way, and hit a beauty between Farmer and his far post. The goal had come out of nothing and it oozed with the class which Richards was to use to good effect over the next decade for Wolves. It was his 13th goal in 14 league and cup games and the crowd gave him a tremendous ovation as he ran happily from the field.

## IN THE NEWS

Wolves were in fifth position in Division One after the game

and that was to be the position that they finished the season. The economic climate at the time, as it always seems to be, was pretty bleak and Ted Heath had imposed a £2 a week limit on pay rises which, amongst others, didn't please the miners who were holding out for £7. A series of crashes on the M6 were blamed by police on drivers going too fast and too close to the car in front. Again, sadly, little has changed there either. Wolves were negotiating with Ipswich that weekend for the signature of Derek Jefferson and he duly signed for Wolves on the following Monday afternoon for a fee of £88,000. His career at Wolves wasn't, to say the least, a successful one and he only took part in 52 games before moving on.

But for 21 year old John

Richards as he made his way home clutching the matchball that autumnal afternoon, it had been an unforgettable day, not only for him, but for the Wolves fans lucky enough to have been there.





**R**obbie Dennison has started the season well - so well, in fact, that some fans have been comparing him to our former winger Dave Wagstaffe.

Robbie could have no finer accolade - 'Waggy' was one of the all-time great heroes of Molineux, a wing wizard with a dazzling array of skills and the man who provided so much ammunition for the deadly duo of Derek Dougan and John Richards.

Dave, now Club Steward of the Old Wulfrunians Club in Castlecroft, is still an occasional spectator at Wolves matches and admires the talents of our Northern Ireland international.


But he reckons that those talents are largely wasted in present day football.

Dave says: "I feel sorry for the lad. He's got the quality alright, you can tell that straight away. But he's not allowed to express it - his natural talents aren't allowed to come out.

"I'm not blaming Graham Turner for that. It's just the way of the modern game. Wingers aren't true wingers any more; they have so many other jobs to do, like tracking back, covering and getting in tackles in defensive situations.

"The way the game has developed in terms of pace, fitness levels and all-round mobility, it's more about speed and filling space than ball skills and the ability to take on people in one-on-one situations.

"But just think how effective Robbie could be if he was allowed free rein to concen-


trate on the attacking side of the winger's game - taking on the full back, getting to the bye-line and sending crosses into the danger area.

"How many more goals would Steve Bull be scoring if he was getting that sort of service on a regular basis?

"As it is, Bully isn't that strong on sticking those sort of chances away simply because he doesn't get many of them.

"Steve and Andy Mutch have always had the ball knocked up to them or over the top of the defence, and those are the sort of balls Robbie is expected to provide.

"So he tends to play deeper than he would if he were an out-and-out winger like I used to be.



"If Robbie had been playing in my era he would have been a star. He would have been one of those 'character' players, the skilful guys who were given their head and allowed to go out and express themselves.

"The wingers were often the stars - you've only got to think of Jimmy Mullen and Johnny Hancocks at Wolves. And great footballers like George Best and Rodney Marsh weren't told they had to conform to a team pattern. Where are those players now?

"So much quality seems to have gone out of the English game. The saddest thing for me about the European Championships wasn't that we got knocked out so early, but that we were bottom of the skill league.

"The change of emphasis from skill to speed and graft was starting to happen towards the end of my playing career.

"When I was playing for Bill McGarry at Wolves I was really inhibited. I had more defensive jobs to do than attacking ones.

"So I was delighted, when I went to Blackburn Rovers, to be told by Jim Smith that he just wanted me to go out and play the game as I saw it - to play it off the cuff.

"It worked out brilliantly for me - I ended up being voted 'Player of the Year' and we finished in the top six, which was quite a feat.

"It would be great to think that Robbie Dennison might get that same chance some day. But sadly for him - and for football - I don't think it will happen."

Robbie himself has mixed feelings about what Dave sees as the dying art of the winger.

He never got the chance to see Dave in action and indeed, as a youngster in Ireland, saw very few of the old style wingers displaying their repertoire of skills.

Robbie says: "I watched a lot of football on TV and enjoyed seeing the top wingers in action. They certainly got a freer role than we get these days, but I just accept jobs like




# RESERVES & YOUTH
