Early pace setters in the First Division are Charlton Athletic with three straight wins over Grimsby. Cambridge and last Saturday West Ham United. Close behind are Wolves and Swindon Town who drew two all at Molineux. Manager Glenn Hoddle, who scored our winning goal over Sunderland on the opening day of the season, has emphasised to the players that this is going to be a squad effort this season. "I have learned a lot from last season's experience and, looking back, realised that changes should have been made. There is a tendency to wait until an individual has played badly before dropping him but this can work against you in a long hard season. Our system will not change although there are one or two tactical variations we have introduced which are so subtle I doubt whether the opposition will pick them up."

Newcastle maintained their 100 per cent start with an impressive 2-0 win over favourites Derby County at the Baseball Ground. Magpies boss Kevin Keegan is pleased the way summer signing Paul Bracewell has settled in but jokes over his requirement to put ice packs on his ankle which has suffered six operations over the years "I think he costs us £50,000 on


The defeat left Derby County languishing near the bottom of the table without a point from the opening two games. Much is expected from Arthur Cox's side which has cost over £7 million to assemble but defender Simon Coleman believes success will be difficult to achieve "The manager has pointed out that everybody will want to put one over on us this season. There are going to be big crowds wherever we play and for a lot of teams playing us will be like a Cup Final."

Portsmouth's Guy Whitting-ham, who suggests he has "made himself more aware in the area", scored his fourth goal in two games with his sides winner over Barnsley at Fratton Park on Saturday. A former soldier who bought his way out of the services to play professional football, Whittingham has made a big impact at Pompey scoring 50 League goals in only 116 appearances for the South Coast club.

West Ham United boss Billy Bonds, disappointed by the home defeat by Charlton last week, is investing part of the £1.5 million received from Celtic for Stuart Slatter. The Hammers, have agreed a £225,000 fee with Partizan Belgrade for central defender Budimir Vujacic. Bonds, how-

ever, is characteristically cautious over his latest signing "He will be a very useful asset to the squad and, at that price, it is not really a gamble." Bond will be looking for Clive Allen to reproduce the touch which has brought him goals wherever he has played. Allen opened his account with a winning goal at Barnsley on the opening day of the season but Bonds is looking for more "He has shown that if we create the chances he can put them away. His goal at Barnsley was superb."

Watford manager Steve Perryman will have been disappointed with last week's 3-2 defeat at Grimsby as he was particularly looking for a good start to the season. Despite a win over Millwall on the opening day, Perryman says he was keen to keep a good run of results following on from last season "We lost only one of our last 12 games and I want to recreate that form and atmosphere. We've started badly in the last two seasons and I think it is essential we make a good start this time."

The power and precision that put the frighteners on the Second Division last season seems to be missing from Cambridge United's game if the early indications are a true reflection.

Manager John Beck has had his problems this summer with seven players out-of-contract all unsettled and ace striker **Dion Dublin** departed to Manchester United.

The players reluctant to sign were Michael Cheetham, Andy Fensome, Richard Wilkins, Steve Claridge, Chris Leadbitter, Gary Clayton and Colin Bailie. Of those Claridge, who scored 12 goals in 29 games last season, including six in the final six matches, signed for Luton Town. Valued by United at £750,000, the club were furious when a Football League tribunal set the fee of £160,000 with a further payment of £50,000 after 50 appearances for the Hatters.

Claridge had been critical of the long-ball strategy adopted by the U's while Bailie did not report back for pre-season training, claiming he would rather quit the game. It has all been very unsettling, yet John Beck refuses to be deflected from his policy vowing the method goes on.

Mr Beck acknowledges that losing top class players will make it much more difficult to attain success but stresses: "If the players apply themselves to our method, we can consolidate and have a good season."

He points out that new players will take time to learn to play their

disciplines and one who has found the transition difficult to adjust to is giant striker **Devon White**.

White, a £400,000 signing from Bristol Rovers five months ago, made only his first League start for Cambridge in last week's home game with Charlton Athletic, but was withdrawn at the interval. The former Rovers favourite, nicknamed "Bruno" by the Twerton Park fans, has not been making the kind of runs that Dion Dublin and John Taylor used to stretch defences. "I'm Devon White, not Dion," he stresses. "I'll be aiming to do the same job, but my way."

Whether his way will fit into Beck's blueprint only time will tell. But in the opening games neither Devon nor summer signing **John Francis** have offered much threat to opposing defences.

There have been problems in midfield too. Firstly **Tony Dennis**, who started his career with Plymouth Argyle and had a run with Exeter, was flown back from the pre-season tour of **Sweden** with an Achilles injury that is expected to rule him out of action for two months. Then on the opening day of the season, **Richard Wilkins**, a key figure in midfield, was stretchered off in the 26th minute with a broken thigh. The influential Wilkins will be out for ten-weeks.

For the game against Charlton, Mr. Beck sprung a surprise by pushing defender Mick Heathcote into Wilkins' ball-winning role in the middle and he did a good job defensively but lacks the attacking instincts of a natural midfielder.



Andy Fensome was recalled at fullback to partner Liam Daish, Alan Kimble and Danny O'Shea in defence but O'Shea, sent-off for two bookings against Charlton, is expected to be banned for the games against Brentford and Oxford.

Wingers Michael Cheetham and Lee Philpott came in for some scathing criticism from Beck after the 2-0 defeat at Tranmere Rovers on the opening day and teenager Gary Rowett, who made a scoring debut for Millwall last September, is pressing to add to his 11 appearances; while John Fowler, who made his debut as Wilkins' sub at Tranmere is another candidate.

The experienced Chris Leadbitter, who seemed to be out in the cold, was brought back into contention for a midfield role when he played the last 12 minutes against Charlton but could not inspire a win as United crashed, rather unfortunately, to an 89th minute winner from Alan Pardew.

It left United pointless, goaless, and bottom of Division One. But Mr Beck, who offered Burnley £50,000 for striker John Francis - the Turf Moor club rate him at £150,000 - still has some of the £1 million recouped from Old Trafford for the sale of Dublin available to invest.

Cambridge United tried to recapture that winning formula, last Saturday against Birmingham City but lost 3-0 to the newly-promoted outfit.

Phil Chapple - Central Defender. Joined his home-town Norwich on the YTS but made his League debut with Cambridge, at Rochdale in April 1988. Had scored 16 goals in 168 League appearances by the close of last season and captained Cambridge in the play-off final in 1990.

Born: Norwich 26-11-66.

Michael Cheetham - Winger. Ipswich Town bought Michael out of the army in 1988 after spotting him with the Signals Regiment team. But he made just 4 League appearances after his debut v Blackburn in the last game of the 1988-89 season. Represented the Combined Services and had scored 21 goals in 102 League games Cambridge prior to this campaign.

Born: Holland 30-6-67.

Liam Daish - Central Defender. Earned praise from Jack Charlton when he starred for a Republic of Ireland XI v Manchester United in pre-season. Capped by Eire at Under-21 and 'B' levels Liam served his apprenticeship with Portsmouth then had a brief spell with Barnet in the GM Vauxhall Conference.

Born: Portsmouth 23-9-68.

Andy Fensome - Rightback.

After serving his apprenticeship with Norwich Andy had a month with Newcastle United (1988-89) before joining Bury St. Edmunds. Cambridge brought him back into League soccer in December 1989 and he started this season with 95 League appearances.

Born: Northampton 18-2-69.

John Francis - Striker. Scored within 10 minutes of his debut in the friendly with Sheffield United after signing from Burnley in August. Brought in to replace Dion Dublin he made his League bow for United at Tranmere (15-8-92). Started his career with Emley before joining Sheffield United. Made 99 League appearances for Burnley - winning a 4th Division Championship medal with them last season.

Born: Leeds 21-11-63.

Michael Heathcote - Fullback. Was a club record signing at £150,000 from Shrewsbury and scored on his debut against Leicester in September 1991. Came into football with Middlesbrough but made League debut for Sunderland v Southend (3-11-87), after they had seen him with Spennymoor United. Born: Kellowe Co. Durham 10-9-65.

CAMBRIDGE UTD

Alan Kimble - Defender.
Joined United in 1986 and had made 253 League appearances (19 goals) by the close of last season. Made his League bow with Charlton (16-4-85) in a 0-0 draw with Sheffield United but made only five more appearances and one on loan with Exeter before moving to the Abbey. Born: Poole 6-8-66.

Michael Norbury - Striker. Left sided player signed in February 1992 from Bridlington Town. Scored once in four appearances last season and is looking to establish himself.

O'Shea Danny Defender/Midfield. Former Arsenal apprentice he made 6 League appearances for the Gunners - his debut being in October 1982 in a goaless draw with Birmingham. Played 9 games for Charlton, on loan, before joining Exeter City in '84. A year later he signed for Southend (£5,000), winning a promotional medal before arriving at the Abbey on a free in 1989. Made his 96th League appearance for Cambridge at Tranmere on the opening day. Born: Kensington 23-3-63.

Lee Philpott - Midfield. Taken on a free transfer from Peterborough United in August 1989 he had clocked up 105 League appearances (14 goals) by the end of last season for the U's. A good crosser of the ball he plays on the wing. In three years with Posh he started only one League game and made three sub appearances. Born: Barnet 2-2-70.

Paul Raynor - Midfield.
Served his apprenticeship with Nottingham Forest making the first of his three League appearances for them at Southampton (3-11-84). Played 8 games for Bristol Rovers on loan before signing for Huddersfield Town in 1985. Two years later he moved to Swansea City and played for Wrexham - on loan - before arriv-

ing at the Abbey on a free transfer in March 1992. Born: Nottingham 29-4-66.

John Vaughan - Goalkeeper. Won an FA Youth Cup winners' medal with West Ham in 1981 but his first team opportunities were limited to a loan spell with Charlton, his League debut for them being against Crystal Palace (6-4-85). Had further loan spells with Bristol Rovers, Wrexham and Bristol City before joining Fulham for £20,000 in '86. Joined United on a free in August 1988 and had made 155 League appearances for them by the start of this season. Born: Isleworth 26-6-64.

Devon White -Tall rangy striker who made his name with Bristol Rovers, scoring 55 goals in 167 League games. Started his career with Arnold Town and was introduced to League football by Lincoln City (4 goals in 29 League games). Moved to Cambridge in an exchange deal last March which saw John Taylor go the opposite direction but made just one League appearance for the U's last season. Born: Nottingham 2-3-64.

Richard Wilkins - Midfield. Skilfull ball-winner who is unsettled at the Abbey. Started his career with Haverhill Rovers and in 1986 was brought into the league game by Colchester United - making his debut v Preston (13-12-86). Cost Cambridge £65,000 in 1990. Long-throw expert. Born: London 28-5-65.

THE MAN IN CHARGE



John Beck's unorthodox, often bizarre, training and preparation routines, not to mention his method of playing the game, have been controversial to say the least. Yet since he took charge of Cambridge United, in January 1990, the U's have reached the quarter-final of the FA Cup in consecutive seasons and gained successive promotions to the Third and Second Divisions (now the First Division).

It has been a phenomenally successful reign for this quiet, almost shy man who claims: "A lot of people label me as an introvert but I think that is basically because I am quite a shy person. But all that shyness goes as soon as I get out onto a football field . . . It is amazing."

Mr Beck believes his main quality is "enthusiasm" which he tries to transmit to his players, but he has a shrewd tactical brain and some very rigid ideas on his team's method of play.

As a manager Beck has adopted a long-ball game which has stretched even the perimeters of such a system. It is a stark contrast to the neat short-passing game he was so good at as a player with Queens Park Rangers - he made his debut, as a sub, in a goaless home draw with Sheffield United 8-12-73 - Coventry City (1976-78), Fulham and Bournemouth.

In all he made over 450 appearances, moving to Cambridge in 1986, and eventually taking over as chief when Chris Turner called it a day. Still only 36 Beck's methods have been highly criticised yet there is no doubting his success. Cambridge United were never out of the top seven last season.

Those were the days...

... looks back at previous connections with today's visitors

With Cambridge having been members of the Football League for just 22 years, the links between today's combatants are in short supply. The opportunity therefore arises to catch up on the whereabouts of a Town hero of old.

Today, we remember Bruce Walker, the left-winger who made the head-lines 25 years ago by grabbing a sensational last-minute goal for Third Division Town in a Fifth Round FA Cup tie against First Division Nottingham Forest.

Many a youngster has been snapped up by a League scout, whose original intention was to watch another playerand this was how Bruce first came to the County Ground. He recalls, "I was in the Hungerford Town side at 15 and was told that Swindon came to watch us three weeks running. The lad they were watching had three stinkers. I scored four goals!"

So Bruce came for a trial and was soon a member of the Town side that went all the way to the FA Youth Cup Final, in 1964. In a two-legged Final, they faced a Manchester United side brimming with future stars in Jimmy Rimmer, Willie Anderson, David Sadler, John Aston and George Best. Swindon held United to a 1-1 draw, but were beaten 4-1 in the second leg. Bruce had the honour of getting that goal at Old Trafford. "Yes, 1 did", he said, "and with me right-foot!"

Bruce had to wait another twenty months before getting a first-team chance. He was due to make his League debut at the County Ground a week before Christmas 1965, against Millwall. But that was called off and it was the delights of Grimsby's Blundell Park that provided Bruce's first taste of the Third Division. A further ten months passed before his home League debut eventually came, on October 22, 1966.

Bruce celebrated with a goal in a 4-0 win over Swansea Town.

The epic FA Cup encounter with Forest came later that season. Swindon had already demolished West Ham - who included three England World Cup winners - in the Third Round, but Bruce had to sit that one out. More than sixty League places divided the sides when the Town arrived in front of 46,000 in Nottingham, but no goals could separate them.


Then a near capacity 28,000 stormed the County Ground for the replay. But their hopes looked to be tatters - until Bruce rammed home a 90th-minute equaliser to force extratime and then a third game. He reflected on that moment of glory. "Donald made a good run down the right and did a couple of his shimmles. Then he cut in, ran across the 18-yard box and clipped it inside a defender. I ran on to it and bolted it. And in it flew!"

By this time, however, Danny Williams had already signed another winger in ex-Bristol Rover Bobby Jones, who was cup-tied, but took Bruce's place in the League side. And, so, with Don Rogers and Eric Weaver, there were now four wingers to contend two places. "We were always inundated with wingers", said Bruce, "but I was always the verge player. And when Bob, who was a big Rovers star, came we all thought Donald was on his way".

In the event, Rogers stayed and it was Bruce who moved on. In March 1968, he joined Bradford City, where he linked up with former Town players Wilf Shergold and Tommy Hallett. Fifteen months later, he returned south, to Exeter City, where

his Football League career came to an end in 1970. Bruce then served Southern League Clubs Hereford, Nuneaton Borough and Margate before coming back to Berkshire to join Newbury Town. He coached Kintbury Rangers and then became their first player-manager as they progressed from Newbury District League standard, through the North Berks, to the Hellenic.

Nowadays Bruce, who was 46 on Thursday, has his own painting and decorating business in Newbury and with three daughters, aged 20, 18 and 13, his mode of sport has changed from football to badminton and athletics.



It was Craig's first for Town since his summer signing from Reading and it gave the former Southampton striker a great deal of satisfaction.

Says Craig: "It is always nice to get the first goal on the board. I had a good chance to score against Sunderland but failed to take it so I had to make sure this time.

"I was clued up to look out for them playing it around at the back because they aren't too clever at it. The centreback miss-controlled the ball and I was able to make for the penalty box and slot my shot to the left side of the 'keeper."

Craig, of course, is no stranger to the County Ground. He was here on loan in 1987 when we were in Division Three. "That was five years ago. The club has changed a lot since then," notes Craig.

"Lou Macari brought me but didn't give me a game...There are still one or two familiar faces around though. Colin Caulderwood, Fraser Digby, John Trollope and Andy Rowland, so I have been made very welcome."

It was as a midfielder that Craig first came into football with Southampton. The Aldershot born youngster joining the Saints as an eleven-year-old, coming up through the ranks with the likes of Dennis Wise and Matthew Le Tissier.

"We were well schooled in good football," claims Craig who makes no secret of his difficulty to adjust to Reading's long-ball strategy. He says: "I left Southampton when I was 20 because of the limited opportunities to play in the first team and joining Huddersfield was a good move for me. But for the last two years I have been with Reading where I was unable to secure a regular place.

"Even so I still finished last season as their top scorer with 16 goals. That was good for me because it brought me to the attention of other managers." When did he realise that Swindon was interested?

"The week before pre-season started. I had read that Tom Jones was going to Elm Park but didn't dream that I would be involved in a swap deal.

"I had no hesitation when asked. This is a good club and the style of play is great. It suits me. I was watching Liverpool play Arsenal on TV last week and to be honest I felt Swindon play better football than either of those two did that night...It is good to be part of it. I was a bit nervous against Sunderland and was a little inhibited, but felt more relaxed last week at Wolves and hopefully will get better and better."


the back with confidence. We obviously work on this at training and it's starting to pay dividends.





So all is set for another great feast. For the very best in entertainment make a date with us on Saturday, September 12th at 3-00pm for Swindon Town v Bristol Rovers.



Alas, it seems Saturday is no more. Perhaps the cardboard




cut-outs that now loom behind the goal at Highbury's North Bank are a foretaste of what is to come as television takes over the game.

"We have used the 'keeper in the past when trying to switch the play. It hasn't been time-wasting or against the principles of the game. Surely good passing build-up does far more for the game's reputation than a big welly up front.

"The change should certainly favour the direct sides like Cambridge United. They had a couple of good results against us last season though we turned them over


in the cup. We are looking forward to this one and it will be nice to face up to Devon White again. He's a real giant.

"But we are very confident. We had two good wins over Sunderland and Rovers and deserved what we got. It could have been more than one goal against Sunderland and if you score four goals away from home you have surely earned the points.





The first half performance was poor, not playing our game, getting caught up in the Rovers way of playing and we were always second best. Too many players did not show any appreciation of what they were supposed to do or of what was happening away from the ball. A dubious penalty early in the game did not help, but we showed few signs of ever pulling the game back in our favour.

Although we improved in the second half we were three goals down before we started to play our way and showed that playing the right game can bring rewards. A lesson to be learnt- must look to play our way whatever the state of the game or how the other team plays. Better appreciation of what the individual should be doing and what others are doing matched with the necessary application. Of the two games played, only an hour's play has been up to the standard required. Players must look at themselves and set themselves higher standards.
