
Don't forget if you have views or thoughts you want the Board to give consideration to please do not hesitate to write into the Club, if necessary for my attention, I guarantee a reply.



YOUTHS AT BOURNEMOUTH



I must confess that when I first heard of the Anglo Italian Cup I was very sceptical, and my immediate reaction was that we wanted no part of it.


Our priority, unequivocally, this season is to win promotion. It seemed to me that by becoming involved in Europe we could be torn two ways and eventually lose out on the big one.

Bristol City manager Denis Smith appears to have picked up one of the bargains of the summer when he signed striker Andy Cole from Arsenal for £500,000. After netting eight goals in twelve appearances at Ashton Gate whilst on loan last season Cole is again off the mark following his two goals in the opening four games this term. Cole's driving force is his release from Highbury: "I was scoring goals in the reserves but not getting anywhere, and when they bought lan Wright I knew the writing was on the walls. Quitting seemed the only way out. George Graham did not do me any favours so every goal I score is one in the eve for Arsenal."

All is not well at Roker Park as Cup finalists Sunderland continued their dismal start to the season with a home defeat to League leaders Charlton last Saturday. The Roker fans vented their disappointment at Chairman Bob Murray who is under pressure to fund an injection of new talent. However, manager Malcom Crosby says there is no need to panic: "The fans are out of order as it is not the Chairman who is to blame. Things haven't gone sour yet. We've just had an indifferent start but we've only played a handful of games. "Things were not helped by both the visitors goals being scored by Sunderland players in their own net.

Paul Walsh has finally opened his account with Pompey with his first goal for the Club coming in their 4-0 thrashing of previously unbeaten Birmingham at Fratton Park. Walsh, who was signed from Spurs in the summer had been under some pressure from his team mates explains Martin Kuhl: "He was taking a bit of stick from the lads but he has silenced us all now. It was a quality finish from a quality player. He is just different class."

There were a couple of big money moves involving London Clubs recently. Charlton have sold defender Barness to Chelsea for £350,000 whilst Millwall's Chris Armstrong has joined neighbours Crystal Palace for £1 million.

Bertsford

Brentford clinched the Third Division Championship at Peterborough on the last day of the season when hot-shot Gary Blissett blasted the winner - his 18th goal of the season. But at the higher level the Bees are experiencing mixed fortunes following a disastrous start against injury hit Wolves.

The men from Molineux forced two goals early in the second-half at Griffin Park which was a shock to the Brentford system and when Gary Blissett had a 66th minute penalty saved by Mike Stowell the Londoners fate was sealed.

Another blow was a knee injury sustained by **Terry Evans**, who at sixfoot-four is a tower of strength in the heart of the defence. Terry captained the side to the Championship last season and was included in the PFA Divisional selection. But he has not played since limping off on the opening day.

The resourceful Jamie Bates has filled the vacancy alongside 25-year-old Keith Millen who has taken on the captain's armband in a back four in which the speedy Brian Stratham on the right is balanced by 33-year-old Chris Hughton's enormous experience on the left.

The disappointment of the opening day was compounded at Twerton Park a week later when after trailing 2-0 Gary Blissett did reply from a 51st minute penalty after Hardyman, the Rovers defender, had been sent-off for instinctively saving a goal with his hand. But despite having the extra man for nearly 40 minutes the Bees were unable to haul in the deficit, and lost 2-1.

Detzi Kruszynski, the Polish midfielder once with Hamburg, who was signed from Wimbledon just prior to the opening of this season after a loan spell at the end of last season, was drafted on for Godfrey but has still to make the starting line in their First Division selections this term.

But if the Bees League form was not so good there were no complaints in the Coca-Cola Cup; Bob Booker scoring in the fifth minute of the first leg against Fulham at Craven Cottage and Blissett adding a second without reply.

The return leg at Griffin Park ended in a frenzy, flaring up in the closing five minutes when **Gary Blissett** scored again to make it 2-0 on the night, 4-0 on aggregate.

Brentford's Brian Statham and Bob Booker were booked, and Fulham's Jeff Eckhardt sent-off after appearing to elbow Jamie Bates, who had scored the opening goal.

Brentford's reward is a lucrative tilt at Tottenham Hotspur in the second round, but the victory was not without cost. Booker, now in his second spell with the Bees after helping Sheffield United rise from Division Three to One, sustaining a knee injury which was to keep him out of the next three games.

His replacement against Southend United was Billy Manuel but again injury was to strike, the Bees losing goalkeeper Graham Benstead at half-time with suspected torn knee ligaments.

Gary Blissett went in goal with the score at 1-1; Micky Bennett having giving Brentford a seventh minute lead - Ian Benjamin levelling the game after 26 minutes. And the striker kept a clean sheet as Keith Millen snatched



the goal that earned them their first victory in Division One.

Ashley Bayes came in, for his first full game since the opening day of last season, as Benstead's replacement against Portsmouth and played his part in a 4-1 victory.

All four Brentford goals came from corners but it was their second, a looping header by Smillie from Statham's cross, that really unhinged Pompey. It seemed to turn and lift wickedly past goalkeeper Knight's shoulder and was described by Bees boss Phil Holder as "A googlie like Mushtaq Ahmed's."

Benstead was back for the next game at Cambridge where Brentford were looking to record a third successive League win against the bottom club. But having buzzed into the Abbey in confident style their sting was sadly missing against a revitalised Cambridge.

Benstead, the hero in the opening minutes with a couple of spectacular blocks, proved the villain of the piece when he mis-timed a corner - the ball skidding off his knuckles into the path of Francis who scored the only goal.

With last season's top scorer, Dean Holdsworth, sold to Wimbledon for £720,000 in the summer the Bees attack is not so potent as it was. Yet it is in defence where we could see a new face this evening following the arrival of Dubliner David McDonald on loan from Spurs.

Billy Manuel Defender/Midfield. Another who learned his trade at White Hart Lane, first as a schoolboy, in 1983, then on the YTS. Was given his head by Gillingham and cost the Bees £60,000 in the summer of '91. Born: Hackney 28-6-69.

Keith Millen - Defender.
Outstanding captain with over 300 games behind him. The longest serving player on the books he joined the Club from school making his League debut in March 1985 at York City. The players' Player of the Year last season.
Born: Croydon 26-9-66.

Simon Ratcliffe - Midfield.

Spent three years with

Manchester United but made his

League debut for Norwich against Newcastle in September 1987. Became Brentford's first six-figure signing, in January 1989, though he had made only 19 League appearances for the Canaries. Born: Manchester 8-2-67.

Wilf Rostron - Midfield, Has now clocked up well over 600 games since making his debut for Arsenal v Newcastle in March 1975. After 4 years at Highbury (17 appearances) he spent three with Sunderland (76) before enjoying a long stint with Watford (317). Sheffield Wednesday then United were the next two stops before he was appointed Player-Assistant Manager by Phil Holder 1991. Born: in January Sunderland 29-9-56.

Neil Smillie - Forward. Came into top class football with Crystal Palace v Oxford in October 1976 and has enjoyed spells with Brighton, Watford, Reading and in the USA. Made 3 appearances in Division 4 for Brentford on loan in 1976-77. Born: Barnsley 19-7-58.

Brian Statham - Fullback. Fast attacking defender who was born in Zimbabwe and later lived in Saudi Arabia before his family settled in Brentwood 20 years ago. Joined Spurs in '85 and made his First Division bow at Southampton in December '87. Capped by England at Under-21 level he cost Brentford £70,000. Born: Zimbabwe 21-5-69.

BRENTFORD

Jamie Bates - Defender. Versatile performer who has filled every defensive position. A product of the youth team he made his debut at Carlisle in September 1986. Has been operating in the centre of defence recently. Born: London 24-2-68.

Micky Bennett - Winger. Right-sided player who can operate as a front runner or in midfield. Served his apprenticeship with Charlton, making his League debut v West Ham (7-3-87), his pace and control persuading Wimbledon to invest £250,000 for his services. Signed this summer with Kruszynski for a combined £120,000. Born: London 27-7-69.

Graham Benstead

Goalkeeper. Signed from Sheffield United for £70,000 in the summer of 1990. An apprentice with QPR he made his debut (8-1-83), in an FA Cup third round tie at West Brom. An England Youth cap he moved to Norwich City in '84 and made 20 1st Division appearances for them. Played 20 games for Colchester on loan before signing for the Blades in July 1988 after a loan spell. Born: Aldershot 20-8-63.

Gary Blissett - Striker. Now in his sixth full season with Brentford he scored the winner at Peterborough to clinch the 3rd Division Championship last season. Started his career with Altrincham and was introduced to League football by Crewe, at Rochdale, in August 1983. Scored 38 goals in 122 League appearances before moving to Griffin Park in March 1987. Born: Manchester 29-6-64.

Marcus Gayle - Striker. Tall rangy centre-forward who graduated through the YTS. Won England honours at under-19 level and established himself in the Bees front-line last season scoring six goals in 38 league appearances. Born: Hammersmith 27-9-70.

Kevin Godfrey - Midfield. Most experienced with over 400 League games behind him in a career that started with Leyton Orient in 1976 - made his League bow v Oldham in January '78 - and continued with Plymouth. This is his fifth season with the Bees - scored 3 goals in 31 League games last season. Born: Kennington 24-2-60.

Chris Hughton - Fullback. Came to prominence with Spurs after joining them from amateur football in 1977. Opened his account v Manchester City (1-9-79) and went on to make over 300 appearances; collecting 52 caps for Eire, and FA and UEFA winners' medals. Joined West Ham in 1991 and arrived at Brentford in March 1992, Born: West Ham 11-12-58.

THE MAN IN CHARGE



Phil Holder's early thoughts on football were shaped at White Hart Lane where he developed through the youth ranks. Made his League debut at Anfield, in a 0-0 draw when he came on as a substitute for Jimmy Pearce on November 18th, 1971, and made his first full appearance at Nottingham Forest the following month.

Those were the days of Ralph Coates, Steve Perryman and Martin Peters, and Phil found it hard to make a first team shirt his own. He finished that first season with just six appearances - two as sub - and didn't get a single game the following season.

In February 1975 Phil moved to Crystal Palace, slotting into their midfield against Aldershot (15-2-75). It was the first of 94 League appearances he was to make for the Selhurst Park club before moving on to Bournemouth and adding another 58 games in the Third Division to his tally.

Phil played his last game in the final match of the 1979-80 season in a 1-0 win at Darlington. He spent another year at Dean Court but injury prevented him from adding to his record.

In all Phil made 155 League appearances (10 goals) before turning his hand to coaching.

He joined Brentford in February 1987 as manager Steve Perryman's assistant and when the former Spurs captain quit in 1990 Phil resumed managerial responsibility.

In his first season in charge Phil took the Bees to the play-offs. A year later Griffin Park was celebrating the winning of the Third Division Championship.

Those were the days...

... looks back at previous connections with today's visitors

Tonight we welcome Brentford to the County Ground for the first time in almost six years. John Moncur spent a month with the Bees nearly three years ago, which is an appropriate point to begin our look back. Since the last War, a further ten players have served both the Bees and the Town.

Tommy Dawson had one season at Griffin Park and two at Swindon towards the end of his career. Brentford signed him from London neighbours Charlton for £5,000 in 1947 and the Town had to pay £7,000 for him nine months later. He left to assist Chippenham Town at Easter 1950 and then returned to his native north-east before emigrating to Australia.

Mickey Bull was in the Bees' junior side during Dawson's brief stay at Griffin Park. Bull was born at nearby Twickenham and was a professional at the club for five years, but made just three League appearances in that time. He came to Swindon in May 1953 and was an almost instant hit with twelve goals from the leftwing, making him the Town's top scorer for the following season. He moved to Hastings United in 1955 and on to Bedford Town a year later, winning a Southern League Championship medal there in 1959.

Swindon and Brentford were also the final two stops in the League career of Pat Terry, who served nine clubs, none of

which was further north than Northampton. He began with Charlton in 1954 and subsequently moved to Newport County, Swansea Town, Gillingham, Millwall and Reading before pausing at the County Ground in February 1967. In the April, Swindon won seven successive games, with Terry scoring in five of them. And in a 4-0 win over Bournemouth in October, he hit a hat-trick in the first ten minutes! He moved to West London in May 1968 before going 'part-time' with Hillingdon Borough and driving a taxi.

Former Queens Park Rangers apprentice Mickey French made his League debut while at Brentford, in February 1975. He was then on loan from Loftus Road and scored after coming on as a substitute in a 3-0 win over Barnsley. The Bees signed him a month later, for £2,000. Mickey came to Swindon in February 1977, for £5,500, but started only five League games for the Town. In July 1978, he joined Doncaster Rovers in an exchange deal which saw winger lan Miller come to the County Ground. French's final season in League football was as Rochdale's top scorer in 1982/83, after which he returned to his county of birth. Sussex to assist Lewes.

A player-exchange also took midfielder Chris Kamara to Brentford, in October 1981. Kamara began his career at Portsmouth, then spent four years at Swindon before returning to Fratton Park. But after just 55 days, he was on the move to Griffin Park, with David Crown going in the opposite direction. In August 1985, he was back at the County Ground, as the Town launched their assault on the Fourth Division championship. After seeing them safely into the Second Division, Chris moved on to Stoke City before, at the age of 32, joining Leeds United for £150,000.

Another member of the Town's successful 1985/86 squad was Paul Roberts, who spent almost two years at Brentford. After four-and-a-half years at Millwall, he scored his first senior goal while with the Bees. But after amassing over 350 appearances, Paul still had not registered a League goal by 1990!

Richard Key also gave the Town a hand, or two, in the Milk Cup. With one keeper refusing to play and another Cup-tied, Key played in a memorable Town victory over Sheffield Wednesday in October 1985. He also assisted Brentford on a non-contract basis, as did centre-half Andy Rollings, who made a dozen appearances for Swindon in 1980/81.

Another centre-half, Nigel Gray, was at the County Ground for two years, during which he spent three months on loan to the Bees and David Geddis also completed a loan spell there before joining the Town in 1988.



The Anglo Italian Cup will always remain a treasured memory for Wayne O'Sullivan, for it was in this competition at Oxford that he made a surprise senior debut a

fortnight ago.

"Magic, magic," was what he kept repeating after a baptism that confirmed, not only to himself, but to all who saw that this young man is good enough to make the grade as a professional footballer.

When Glenn Hoddle posted Wayne's name on the team sheet the 18-year-old thought he was just going along for the ride. He got the shock of his life when, as the team bus was approaching the Manor Ground, Glenn sidled up alongside him and asked if he was "all right."

"Yes," came the tentative reply.

"Good" smiled Glenn. "I want you to play right back tonight."

"I couldn't believe it," says Wayne.
"I think I went dead with shock.
The bus pulled up to the ground
and suddenly everything was happening. There was no time for
nerves. The adrenalin was pumping as we changed. I was really
hyped up by the time we took the
field.

"I was a little apprehensive when the whistle went to start the game but everything seemed to go quite well, I was very surprised.

"It was all made easier by Colin Calderwood, Adrian Viveash and Paul Bodin. Nicky Summerbee was playing in front of me as well so I had plenty of support and advice."

He says: "It was only towards the end of last season that I moved to rightback mainly to cover as we had nobody else to fill the position. I'm not really sure whether it is my best position. During the pre-season tour to Holland I came on as a substitute for the first team in midfield and really enjoyed that.

"At the moment I don't even know what I prefer. Playing centre-forward is very enjoyable but I don't see myself as a goalscorer as such. I like rightback when there is a sweeper playing and there is plenty of room and opportunity to get forward a lot. And I like midfield because you are always involved in the action.

"I suppose at the moment you would label me as a utility player. I know that to be a Jack of all trades is not always the best approach but at the moment I think it is probably to my benefit to be adaptable.

"Things have happened very quickly for me this season and

with a bit of luck it will not be long before I get another chance. There were 4,000 people at Oxford and that is the first time I have played in front of a crowd as big as that. It was stimulating.

"You can hear them encouraging you on and know they are singing without being totally aware if you know what I mean. It is really exciting."

"Within 24-hours of his big day Wayne was brought straight back down to earth before a handful of fans at The County Ground as he came out of a Football Combination game with West Ham United. I suggested to him this must have been a great anticlimax after the euphoria of Oxford?

"No, not at all," responded Wayne. "I'm young and enjoy reserve team football. This is my proving ground. It is where I have the opportunity to show what I can do."

Wayne was born in Cyprus while his father was serving in the RAF and it was while he was at a funweek at Brize Norton that he was spotted by Town and asked to join our School of Excellence. Since then he has thought about nothing more than being a footballer.

Hopefully last week's operation will have cured the problem and that it will not be too long before Ross is back in action again.





The arrival here next Sunday of Oxford United completes our third successive home game; and we are doing it in style with the match being beamed live by Central TV.

Don't let that deter you from turning up for there is nothing like being at the game and if recent history is any guide we could be in for a bit of a treat.

The past five encounters with Oxford United here in the League have produced no less than 14 goals with 11 of them netted by Town. Indeed, a Swindon-Oxford confrontation seems to inspire the attacking instincts of both sides, Oxford winning 5-3 in the League game at the Manor Ground last March - Town winning there 3-1 in the Anglo Italian Cup just a couple of weeks ago; not to mention the 3-3 draw here in the ZDS Cup last year which ended with a penalty shoot-out win for us.



We are on the verge of a new era for Town fans for victory over Brentford tonight will provide us with a ticket to Ascoli, Bari or maybe even Pisa in the second phase of the

re-vamped Anglo Italian Cup.

Don't pack your bags just yet however for first we have to overcome the Brentford Bees who no doubt wouldn't mind a touch of the Italian sun themselves in November.

It is all very exciting for us on the side lines as the Football League looks to promote and elevate its status following the walk-out of the big boys last summer.

The Anglo Italian Cup has been revived for the first time since Newcastle United beat Fiorentina 2-1 in the 1973 final and of course Town's pedigree in this competition is not bad either. Swindon winning with a super football show in the Final of the inaugural competition.

All 24 First Division clubs from the Football League are involved in this latest competition; drawn in groups of three with the eight winners progressing to the international round which will be played in November and December.

Amongst the clubs awaiting English qualifiers are Bari - with whom David Platt played last season and Cremonese. where Anders Limpar made his name in Italy. In addition Ascoli, Pisa and Cesena, have all played at Serie 'A' level within the last two years and they are joined by Reggiana, Cosenza and Lucchese.

The eight English qualifiers together with the eight Serie 'B' clubs will be divided into two leagues of eight, both featuring four teams from each country. Every English side then plays the four Italian representatives in its group, with two games at home and two games in Italy.

Winners will be awarded three points with one for a draw and the semi-finals, which will be two-legged, will feature the two highest placed English teams from the respective groups against each other and likewise the top two Italian sides. This will provide a true Anglo-Italian final to be played at Wembley in March.

So victory tonight will provide us with at least four games against Italian opposition and a chance to repeat the feats of Stan Harland, Don Rogers and company ... Heady days!

The Football League has developed close links with the Italians through a series of representative matches and Glenn Hoddle was very much involved in paving the way for this competition when he managed a Second Division select side that lost 2-1 in Caserta last March ... Colin Calderwood skippered the side which included David Kerslake.



Even an experienced campaigner like Micky Hazard admits he is excited by the prospects of the Anglo Italian Cup competition which has been introduced this season to replace the Zenith Data Systems Cup.

Says Micky: "It is a great chance for a club like ours to get into Europe. Obviously we are not at that stage yet but a win tonight over Brentford will see us qualify and that is all the incentive we need.

"It would be a great challenge for the lads and one I feel we can handle impressively. If we get there I'm sure the football would suit Swindon Town down to the ground.

"I remember playing in Europe with Spurs and I knew at that time that the Continental game would suit Tottenham. It is the same here. Our passing game will work well against foreign opposition and possibly we can go on and achieve something here."

When it comes to Europe Micky has a fine pedigree. He was in Tottenham's UEFA Cup winning team of 1984, which beat Anderlecht in a dramatic penalty shootout at White Hart Lane after both legs had finished 1-1.

The memory of that magical night still brings a warm glow to Micky's face and he would dearly love another taste of European glory. But it is a hard road to travel before one reaches the glamour.

"Of course," says Micky "We knew it would not be easy at Oxford and injuries depleted our side to make the task even harder. But the young lads came in and did a marvellous job to set us up for tonight's tie with Brentford.

"Again it will be hard. There's no easy games these days no matter who you play. But we can get there and if we do we can look forward to having a good little run in the competition."

This Anglo Italian Cup has a different format to those others in Europe with no return legs meaning that you face some opponents away without the cushion of a homeleg to come.

Observes Micky: "We all play home and away but against different sides which

is a new slant. Some teams are better at home than away and others seem to get better results away so in a way it is a little but unfair and puts more emphasis on the luck of the draw. But it is the same for all sides so you can't really have any complaints."

Can the players take it seriously when it comes at such a busy time on the football calendar?

"Yes," says Micky firmly. "Every competition we take seriously because we want to win everything and the longer you stay in the longer it keeps your season alive. We are not here to make up the numbers. Of course we will be taking it seriously."

Has Micky any recollections of Italian teams? "In all my years in Europe, and I was involved for about six years, No! I have never played against an Italian side. I have played against them in pre-season friendlies on tour and things like that but never ever come up against them in competition.

"They are obviously very good technically, very strong, very fit, and if we get through it will be a very good experience, not so much for players of my age but for the younger boys. It is an education to pit your skills against those from other countries."




On Saturday 5 September we faced our longest trip of the season in the South East Counties League when we travelled to Essex to take on Colchester United at Layer Road.
