Did You Know?

That Oxford United came into the League in 1962-63 in place of Accrington Stanley, who folded through financial difficulties.

That Oxford United's first League fixture was played at Barrow - on 18th August 1962. Barrow winning 3-2.

That our very first meeting with the U's in the League was here at the County Ground on 21st August, 1965. It ended 0-0 and was watched by a crowd of 20,409.

That the biggest attendance for a game between Town and Oxford United was set on 13th September 1969. It was at the County Ground and 21,903 saw another goaless draw in a Football league Division Two game.

That Town's first ever League goal against Oxford was netted by Tommy Henderson, at the Manor Ground, on 29th January 1966. Dennis Brown and Mel Nurse also scored in a 3-0 victory.

That Town's first goal against Oxford in a League match at the County Ground was netted by

Pat Terry on May 6th, 1967. It was one of 23 goals the former Reading centre-forward was to score for Swindon in 61 League appearances...Again this match ended 3-0 with Roger Smart and Don Rogers also on target.


That only two Town players have recorded hat-tricks against Oxford

United in the League...
The first was notched by Arthur Horsfield in a 4-0 win in February 1972. The second by David Moss - who scored 60 goals in 230 League games - in a 3-2

thriller in march 1978...Both games were at the County Ground.

That Oxford United rose to Division One from Division Three in successive seasons.

That Oxford United can claim fame as the first professional club in Britain to install floodlighting facilities at their ground. They did this in 1950.


This special offer applies only to the Town End Stand and tickets have to be booked at least 48 hours prior to each game.

Welcome to our first live televised match of the season. I think they have chosen well for our fixtures with Oxford United seem to bring the best out of both sides. It is always a good game of football.

I strongly believe that TV adds to the game, it injects a bit of spice to the occasion, and players react positively to that.

I remember playing in the very first live game between Nottingham Forrest and Spurs. The atmosphere was electric in the dressing room. We were all charged up. We won 2-1 after being a goal down. It was quite a game.

By enlarge I think you will find most games that are screened live produce good games. There is an obvious determination, be it subconscious or not, on behalf of the players involved to produce their best.

We are just hoping for a good day and a bumper gate because without your participation in the stands and on the terraces the game would be dead.

Because of the telecast we are playing

this game on Sunday. I wouldn't like to be in this position every week - playing a day behind the main programme, but every now and then it is not bad.

It is not so much playing on the Sunday that affects you. It is what happens on the back end of the game like this. If we had a fixture this coming Tuesday for instance it would cause problems. As it happens we have been able to avoid this situation.

But as I say every so often a change in routine can actually act as a stimulant. They say variety is the spice of life and this week we have made a few changes to our schedules in training to accommodate the revised timetable.

We have already played Oxford United once this season, at their place, in the Anglo Italian Cup. We had a few injuries for that game and put the kids in who did exceptionally well. It was a



tremendous performance to win 3-1 and very encouraging for us. It proved that we are on the right lines with our development programme at the County Ground.

Last week against Bristol Rovers we were denied the win we deserved when we conceded another last goal. It seems to be happening to us a lot recently and it is very difficult to put your finger on the cause. You can't very well put on a training session and wait till the 85th minute to start analysing the situation.

I thought we took some time to settle down against Bristol Rovers but once we had we seemed to be in control. In the dressing room after the game we were all very disappointed but having gone home and watched the tape of the match I realised just how good our overall play had been.

The way we play I suppose does leave us a little vulnerable. One bad ball turns into a horrific mistake which is likely to make one forget all the good play before it. There is a danger that our fans can get too carried away by the result

But at the moment with four wins, two draws and two defeats, I have to be happy with the way things are going. You know, no side had scored the opening goal against us until Wednesday when we lost to Brentford in the Anglo Italian Cup. Disappointed obviously to have lost our unbeaten home record but we hope to make amends this afternoon.

County manager Neil Warnock appears to be losing his battle to retain the services of talented players. Last week central defender Craig Short ended speculation with a £2½m move across the Midlands to Derby County, 24 year old Bridlington born Short was signed from Scarborough for £100,000 having previously been with non-League Pickering Town. The man who is now British football's costliest defender was orginally a forward when playing in the Reserves at Scarborough. "I was scared stiff of heading the ball in those days" he admits. "Neil Warnock. then Scarborough manager, was stuck for a defender in a game against Peterborough Reserves and he decided to put me in the back four." Blackburn Rovers and Liverpool were also keen to sign Short who is said to

Newcastle United maintained their remarkable start

to the season with a 3-1 home win over Portsmouth with Pompey old boy Mick Quinn scoring on his first full appearance of the season replacing the injured Gavin Peacock. Magpies, Captain Brian Kilcline explains that a good start may be the key to success "It was crucial that we did well right from the first whistle. The good results in the early games will be a springboard for us. We've got to feel optimistic now about our chances but we have got to remain consistent."

Despite Newcastle's success it was joint management team Steve Gritt and Alan Curbishley at Charlton who won the Manager of the Month Award for August. Top of the table until last weekend Charlton have made an impressive start to the season despite extreme financial restrictions surrounding their impending return to the Valley. Director Martin Simons explains the Club's precarious position "Now we are top of the First Division letters have been pouring in pleading with us not to sell players. The answer though is very simple ... if we do not raise more cash we will be bankrupt. So, no player sales, no club,"

Brian Little has bought well. Bobby Davidson was superb at Derby when he was on loan there last season, we played well together during our two months in the Derby strike force. The other signings. David Lowe and Colin Hill are both excellent players as well."

Attendances in the First Division are showing a small decrease from the average of 10,504 achieved last season, so far this campaign the average attendance at First Division grounds has been 10.303. The biggest drop in average is in the Premier League with an average 19,920 fans attending each game compared to nearly 22,000 last season.



Neil Warnock Losing a battle?

A 1-0 home defeat by Sunderland last weekend, dropped Oxford United to 21st place in the First Division table. This setback, after successive draws with Wolves and Grimsby Town had raised hopes of a more promising campaign, suggests that this is going to be another worrying season for all at The Manor.

Yet the season had started so brightly with a comfortable 2-1 home win over Bristol Rovers; David Penney shooting them ahead from a 16th minute penalty, Joey Beauchamp asserting their command with a brilliantly struck half-volley in the 27th minute.

The Coca-Cola Cup produced more inspiration, this time from 19 year-old winger Chris Allen, who came on as a substitute against Swansea City and scored twice in a 3-0 first leg victory over the Welsh Club. But he couldn't make the starting line at Millwall in their first away fixture.

The youngster was brought on again at The Den but thus was a lack-lustre performance from Oxford, their 3-1 defeat drawing a public rebuke from manager Brian Horton who stuck with the original line-up of; Paul Kee in goal with Garry Smart and Mike Ford flanking Ceri Evans and Andrew Melville in defence. A midfield of Beauchamp, David Collins, Les Phillips and David Penney with Nick Cusack and John Durnin up front.

Mickey Lewis was brought in for Collins and Jim Magilton for Phillips aganist Wolves, Oxford taming the much reveered Bull-Mutch threat comfortably to record their first clean sheet in Division One in a goal-less draw.

At Grimsby Brian Horton's team were outplayed until Chris Allen was introduced in the second half. Once again he transformed the situation creating panic in The Mariners defence with his penetrative runs. It was his cross, turned back by Nick Cusack, that set up ace poacher John Durnin to crack in the equaliser.

That performance undoubtedly earned Allen his first League start of the season against Sunderland, David Penney moving to the subs bench to make way.

Mr Horton's permutations are extremely limited for Oxford, like so many small provincial clubs, have survived by selling their greatest assets. Players such as John Aldridge, Dean Saunders, Ray Houghton and Paul Simpson have all graduated through the Club's academy to be sold for big money.

The next to go they reckon will be Jim Magilton, who, since his arrival from the shadow of Liverpool's reserves, has established himself as an International star with Northern Ireland. The asking price for him is likely to be £1 million!

Whether any income will be given to the manager to strengthen the squad is not known but if recent practice is anything to go by then it will scarcely be enough. In the last four years Mr Horton has raised over £3 million in sales to



realise a £2 million profit. Yet in the last 18 months only £150,000 has been spent on new recruits - £100,000 of that on Darlington striker **Nick Cusack** this summer.

That money was found by BIOMAS - a Staffordshire based recycling company - which took over the Club last summer following the aftermath of the Maxwell scandal that left United on the brink of closure. They also found £65,000 to buy midfielder Jon Narbett, a 23-year-old Birmingham lad, who scored eight goals in 32 Fourth Division appearances for Hereford United last season. He made his Oxford debut in the Coca-Cola Cup tie at Swansea.

Despite all the problems, and it was only a winning goal from Joey Beauchamp at Tranmere on the last day of the season that kept Oxford up, manager Brian Horton has stayed with his principles and continued to play good football. Oxford are a passing side and this is probably why games against us in recent times have always been fast flowing exciting encounters.

We won 3-1 at The Manor earlier this month in the Anglo Italian Cup but there is no room at all for complacency against a side whose position does not truly represent their strength.

Chris Allen - Winger. Pacey youngster developed through the ranks, establishing himself in the first team last season when he made 13 League appearances, scoring one goal. Has made three sub appearances this season. Born: 18-11-72.

Joey Beauchamp - Midfield. Another local product of the YTS, he made his League debut, as a sub, v Watford in the last game of the 1989-90 campaign. Established himself in the side last season and made his 36th League appearance against Sunderland last Saturday (8 goals). Had a loan spell with Swansea and has been capped by England U-18. Born: Oxford 13-3-71.

David Collins - Midfield.
Signed in the summer from Liverpool on a free transfer, David came straight into the Oxford side against Bristol Rovers on the opening day of the season.

Nick Cusack - Striker. Second leading scorer at Darlington last season with 6 goals, he joined Oxford in the summer for £95,000. Started his career with Alvechurch and was introduced to League football in August 1987 by Leicester City v Shrewsbury. Picked up some European experience with Motherwell after helping them win the Scottish Cup. Born: Rotherham 24-12-65.

John Durnin - Forward. Was playing for Waterloo Dock when

Liverpool recognised some potential and signed him in 1985. In three-and-a-half years at Anfield, he remained in the shadows and made his League debut for West Bromwich while on loan. Joined Oxford for £250,000 in Feb 1988 and he had scored 33 goals by the close of last season. Born: Liverpool 18-8-65.

Ceri Evans - Central Defender. A New Zealander studying at Oxford University when United spotted him and gave him his chance. Made his League bow at Leicester in April 1989 and is now the defence. established in Capped over 60 times by New Zealand, he played twice against England in 1991. Born: Christchurch, NZ 2-10-63.

Mike Ford - Defender, Was on Leicester City's books in 1983-84 but failed to impress and signed for Devizes Town. Cardiff City spotted him and he made the first of his 162 appearances for them at Leeds United (29-12-84). A versatile player - he scored 7 goals in 45 League games in 87/88 - he cost Oxford £150,000 in the summer of '88. Born: Bristol 9-2-66.

Paul Kee - Goalkeeper. Still only 22, this £15,000 acquisition from Ards is once more enthroned as United's first choice. Made his debut in November 1989. Had played himself into the Northern Ireland side a year later, making his International debut against Norway. Lost his way after injury and made only 8 League appearances last season. Born: Belfast 8-11-69. He is 6'4".

Mickey Lewis - Midfield. Joined WBA from school making the first of his 24 League appearances at Coventry (26-12-81). In 1985 he joined Derby County for £25,000 and three years later moved to Oxford in a partexchange deal. A regular in the Oxford side since December 1988. England Youth cap. Born: Birmingham 15-2-65.

Jim Magilton - Midfield. Made a scoring debut for Northern Ireland, against Poland, before making his League bow at West Ham (3-1-90). Was on Liverpool's books at the time but got his League chance after moving to Oxford, for £14,000, in October 1990. Grabbed his second International goal last week in Ireland's 3-0 win over Albania. Born: Belfast 6-5-69.

Andrew Melville - Central Defender. Was 17 when he made his League debut for Swansea v Bristol City in November 1985. Gained honours for Wales at Under-21 and full levels before joining Oxford for £275,000 in July 1990 and

was on the bench last week for the win over the Faroe Isles. Born: Swansea 29-11-68. (8 full caps.)

David Penney

Forward/Midfield. Tidy passer who started his career with Pontefract before being introduced to League football by Derby. Made his Rams debut v Hull (11-10-86). In May '89 he transferred to Oxford (£175,000), after 19 League appearances no goals. Helped Swansea win the Welsh Cup while on loan in 1991. Born: Wakefield 17-8-64.


Les Phillips - Midfield. The longest serving player on the books, Les was a member of the Milk Cup winning team in 1986. Served his apprenticeship with Birmingham City, making the first of his 44 League appearances at West Ham in Feb 1982. Oxford paid £12,000 for him in 1984. Made his 170th League appearance for United at Millwall in August. Born: Lambeth 7-1-63.

Garry Smart - Fullback. Signed from Wokingham Town in the summer of 1988, this former teacher made his debut at Bournemouth in September 1988. Established himself in the side last season when he played in 39 League fixtures. Born: Totnes 29-4-64.

THE MAN IN CHARGE



Brian Horton arrived at The Manor in the summer of 1988 as assistant manager and within three months he was holding the reins following the departure of Mark Lawrenson.

It has not been an easy road but Brian has demonstrated superb managerial skills on a shoestring budget after learning his trade with Hull City where he was appointed player manager in 1984.

As a player, Brian had made his name with Port Vale, where he made 258 appearances (36 goals) between 1970 and the season of 1975-76 when he moved to Brighton for £30,000.

Until then it had been a struggle for after serving his apprenticeship with Walsall he found himself on the shelf playing part-time football with his home-town Club, Hednesford.

At Brighton, Brian was to clock up another 252 games in a highly successful period during which he was the inspiration as the Seagulls soared from Division Three to Division One.

Then in 1981 Luton Town splashed out £100,000 for his transfer and immediately installed him as their captain. He once again became the hub of the side, with his prompting and encouragement from midfield driving the Hatters to promotion to Division One.

Released in '84 to take on that player-boss role with the Tigers, he immediately steered Hull to promotion to Division Two. In his first full seasons with Brighton, Luton and Hull, Brian Horton had finished with promotion!

Those were the days.

... looks back at previous connections with today's visitors

Today we return to the 1950's, a decade that promised much for Swindon Town early on, produced nothing in the middle years, but finally bore fruit towards the end. For our neighbours at Oxford, professionalism was still in its infancy as they battled for Southern League honours as Headington United.

The Town, then in the Third Division South, enjoyed a great F.A. Cup run in 1951/52, playing nine games before succumbing to Luton Town in the Fifth Round. But, as the lean years followed, a number of players -including both wingers ever-present in that Cup side - were released and found themselves making the short journey up to the Manor Ground.

Liverpudlian winger Johnnie Thomas left the County Ground to join Headington in July 1952 after struggling for three years to keep a place in the Town side. United went on to lift the championship, on goal average, from Methyr Tydfil, and Thomas found his way back into League Football with Third Division North Chester. The man clinched the title for Headington, with the second goal in a 2-0 win over Hastings United, was also a former Swindon striker. Bobby Peart, an ex-Wilts County and Pinehurst Y.C. player, hit five goals in 13 League appearances for the Town.

The wingers in that Cup side of 1951/52 were Scotsman Jimmy

Ban and Irishman Harry Lunn. Both left to join Headington in July 1954. Bain, by then 35, had been with Swindon for seven seasons, accounting for over 40 goals in 250 appearances. Lunn was at the County Ground for six years, having been signed from Portsmouth for £6,500 in May 1948. His last season at Swindon proved to be his most fruitful for goals, being second highest scorer for the club with ten.

Three Town players departed for Oxford in the 1957 close season. Alan Gibbs and Gordon Pembery each spent just twelve months at the County Ground. Gibbs arrived from Cardiff in May 1956, but lost his place midway through the season following a 7-3 humbling at Shrewsbury. Pembery also served Cardiff, his birthplace, in addition to Norwich and Torquay before joining Swindon from Charlton Athletic in June 1956. The third member of the trio was ex-Evertonian David Gibson. who signed for the Town after being loaned out for nine months.

The end of 1957/58 also saw the end of the regionalised Third Divisions. Swindon turned the form books upside down by following two seasons of re-election pleas with a fourth place, thus avoiding the new Fourth Division. And Town boss Bert Head sent two more on their way to the Manor Ground, fellow 'five-foot sixers' Jimmy Cross and Gordon McDonald.

Cross, another former Everton man, came to the County Ground in May 1953, making more than 150 League appearances. But McDonald made just ten, having arrived from Crystal Palace in July 1957.

In February 1959, Swindon signed Chelsea 'keeper Owen Medlock as cover for the ageing Sam Burton. He was called upon for just three League games shortly before being released to join United in the December. At the end of that season, the name of Oxford United appeared for the first time.

They soon celebrated with another Southern League title, Medlock being their only everpresent. He was still there when Oxford took Accrington Stanley's place in the Fourth Division, lining-up for their historic first Football League fixture at Barrow in August 1962.

Town goalkeeper Fraser Digby is absolutely entralled by the football the lads are producing this season and says; "It is so enjoyable to be involved in a team that play this way. It is absolutely exhilarating."

Being the last line of defence Fraser, perhaps more than anyone else, has the opportunity to stand back and admire some of the intriguing patterns that are painted by those master artists Glenn Hoddle and Micky Hazard, and there is no doubt that the magic that captivates the crowd also has a great influence in the overall picture.

Fraser makes no secret of the fact that he is excited by what is going on in this corner of Wiltshire. He points out: "li is not only in the first team but in the reserve and youth sides as well. Everyone is encouraged to play in the same positive manner.

We saw the benefit of this in the Anglo Italian Cup tie at Oxford. We had one or two injury problems and had to draft some young lads in. They just slotted into the overall pattern as if they had played it all their lives.

"Oggy has been involved in the first team before but for Wayne O'Sullivan and Austin Berkley it was a new experience and they coped magnificently. You would not have known we had several key players missing.

"We are taking this competition very seriously too. The prospect of competing in Europe gets the adrenalin pumping and gives it an added edge over say the ZDS Cup which we played in last season.

"In that competition there was the thrill of course of taking on the top teams, who are now in the Premier League, but it wasn't a Cup that really caught the imagination of the public and gates were low. There was the carrot of playing the Final at Wembley but that is still there for the Final of the Anglo Italian Cup is going to be staged there this season."

"I think the format as it is, with one game against each of our opponents in this opening group, is fair enough. If we played home and away it would be overdoing things really. These one-off's just tie nicely into the fixture schedules.


Goalkeepers this season have been under pressure with the new back-pass law that has thrown the game into confusion and Fraser became the victim of the new ruling in our 4-3 win at Bristol Rovers.

"It was very unfortunate," reflects the six-foot-one Yorkshireman. "Our defenders were under pressure and as the ball was knocked to me I tried to get my body in the way to stop it. Unfortunately it brushed my arm and they were given a free kick which led to a goal. But there was no intent on my part to pick up or handle the ball, in tight situations like that there is not much you can do.

"I think it is right to try and cut out back passes from the half-way line which are nothing short of time wasting. But in genuine defensive moves it is totally without foundation.

"What it will encourage is a lot of aimless booting the ball into the stand tactics and this will waste more time than before.

"The key, as far as goalkeepers are concerned, is to get the outfield players to knock the ball back to you as early as possible. You can then assess whether there is time to stop the ball and play it out or whether you need to put the boot through it straight away ...But I'm sure we are in for a few hairy moments before this season is complete."


and something we must overcome in the games themselves.





Well, well. The Premier League is not even a month into operation and it is already in cri-

sis. How sad.

I forecast that the new venture would choke on its own greed but never envisaged such an early attempt at suicide. As expected it is all over money. The 'Platinum Eight', as Crystal Palace Chairman, Ron Noades, has dubbed them, simply caring not a jot about the welfare of the League itself.

This latest bust-up is all about perimeter advertising boards. The big eight having done a deal with a Swedish advertising company that cuts across an agreement the Premier League as a whole had with another group.

The eight in question are the big six - Arsenal, Aston Villa, Everton, Leeds, Liverpool and Manchester United, together with Nottingham Forest and QPR. But why Forest and Rangers? There's no way they could be construed as being in the big bracket in terms of commercial clout.

Perhaps it is to do with Spurs, Manchester City and Sheffield Wednesday rejecting the overtures of the gang of six. By embracing two other clubs - in this case Forest and Rangers - the break-away bandits now have the voting power to block the necessary two-thirds majority that is needed to institute any major decisions.

The conflict of interests is brazenly bared. The big clubs, still not satisfied after breaking up the Football League, are turning on their own in their clamour to siphon off the dosh for themselves.

I hear on the grapevine that the remaining 14 clubs in the Premier League are intending to put sanctions on their rebellious members by agreeing not to sell any players to the Platinum Eight...Mind you, agreements in football tend to have as much credence as a ceasefire treaty between the Serbs and the Muslims in Bosnia-Hercegovina.

The introduction of the Premier League was an ideal opportunity for the member clubs to strengthen their financial standing by corporate planning and negotiation. Alas, there are those within who are more than a little venal.



Craig Maskell left the County Ground clutching the match ball after having nonchantly swept in a hattrick against hapless Cambridge United.

Craig's threesome was the first from a Town player since Duncan Shearer shattered Plymouth Argyle with a four-goal salvo last October and the former Reading hit-man was naturally delighted.

Said Craig: "You always need time to find your feet when you join a new club. It is important to impress the fans that you are good enough to contribute something extra to the side and for a striker that means scoring goals."

There can be no complaints in this direction for three days later Craig was hitting the net again, with the opening goal in our 3-1 victory at Oxford United, in the Anglo Italian Cup. That took his tally to five goals in five games.

A goal at Millwall and last weeks strike against Bristol Rovers puts Craig at the top of our scorers with seven goals in as many games. "It's a nice feeling," agrees Craig. "I hope it continues."

That was the fourth hat-trick of his professional career which started Birmingham's St Andrews ground in April 1986 when he made his League debut Southampton. Since then he notched four at Cardiff and three against Bury while playing Huddersfield Town and last February claimed another hat-trick at Darlington while on duty with Reading.

"It gives you a special buzz to get three in one game," says Craig. "Not only do you get the ball as a permanent memento but it gives you a lot more confidence."

Three goals at any level is a great achievement and Craig takes us through his first hat-trick for Town:

"The first was just a simple tap in. Martin Ling had played a great ball into the box which Shaun Taylor challenged for and as the ball broke on the six yard line all I had to do was knock it in.

"John Moncur set up the second with a perfect through ball. It was one against one and I could have taken it around the


'keeper. But I had tried that at Bristol and been brought down so I hit this one earlier to the left of the goalkeeper. He got a hand to it, quite a good hand actually, but the ball went in by the post.


"The third was a penalty. John Vaughan had already made a super save from Paul's spot kick but I asked Glenn if I could take it. there wasn't any pressure really. The game was already won, we were three up at the time and I had scored two. I used to take the penalties at Huddersfield and Reading so I felt quite comfortable about it.

"Actually the goal I got at Oxford was the best. I received the ball from Adrian Viveash, did a half-turn and moved to the right of the box before cutting in and curling a shot on goal. The 'keeper got a hand to this one also so I have been a bit fortunate.

"The credit should not just go to the scorer though. There are a lot of other players involved. Dave Mitchell for instance does a lot of positive running to pull defenders out and create gaps. But things have been going well so far.

"You can almost rely on at least two or three chances being created for you during the course of a match whereas at Reading you could go through a game without a single opportunity arising.




Two games last week against Tottenham Hotspur, both resulting in defeat, followed the same pattern conceding one goal-then falling apart.


