Bristol Rovers have revealed plans for a new 35,000 seat stadium to be built close to the new Severn Bridge crossing. Rovers, who have rented non-League Bath City's Twerton Park ground for the past six years have linked up with Bristol City council who will provide the land and development company Sportsworld. A 12,000 seat indoor arena and conference centre are also planned. Meanwhile Rovers' England U21 striker Marcus Stewart faces a five week lay-off with a groin injury. The eight goal leading scorer is due to have a pelvic operation this week.

Sunderland manager Malcolm Crosby looks set to clinch the £350,000 signing off Birmingham City defender John Frain, Frain travelled to Roker Park last week for talks with Crosby who said that he was very optimistic in signing Frain. "He's a very good defender, but also likes to get forward and join the attack. That's something that we have lacked a bit this season." The fee from the deal would enable Birmingham boss Terry Cooper to make a firm bid for striker David Speedie when he completes his

from Southampton.

This evening's visitors to the County Ground, Brentford have agreed a fee of around £100,000 with Wolverhampton Wanderers for central defender Shane Westley who joined Wolves from Southend United in the summer of 1989. Westley returned to first team action at Molineux at the start of this season after two years out through injury but lost his place with the signing of Paul Blades from Norwich City last month.

Portsmouth are counting themselves lucky not to be losing the services of their England U21 international defender Andy Awford for a few games under suspension after Bristol referee Roger Milford failed to dismiss Awford for what both sides thought was a professional foul in the Coca-Cola Cup tie with Ipswich Town at Fratton Park, Even Awford was convinced that he was destined for an early bath when he ended Ipswich striker Chris Kiwomya's dash for goal with a trip. However. Mr Milford defended his leniency by saying "The key to any so-called professional foul is intent, and in my opinion there was none. In attempting to play the ball, Awford inadvertently caught the Ipswich player's heel and I do not believe he meant it. In those circumstances you must either produce a red card or do nothing about it. Nobody complained that Awford should have gone which leads me to think that I was right."

Cambridge United Chairman Reg Smart has apologised to other Club's over claims of excessive gamesmanship carried out by ex-manager John Beck and assistant Gary Peters. "My feelings after reading in the newspapers what is claimed to have gone on is one of utter disbelief" said Mr Smart. Former Cambridge coach Graham Scarff, dismissed by Beck at the end of last season was quoted as saying "The treatment given to visitors was terrible. It was psychological warfare."



Andy Awford -No early bath!

Brentford realised a long held ambition when they won the Third Division Championship last May, for only the second time in their history. It awarded them First Division status for the first time in 45 years.

It was a nail-biting finish too with the Championship only clinched on the final day of the season at Peterborough. Just reward though, for the Bees had fluttered on top of the pack for three months of the long campaign.

Certainly this success highlighted **Phil Holder's** managerial career, which had commenced the year before, when he led Brentford to sixth place, which at the time was their highest finish for 26 years. It had earned them a tilt at the play-offs but they lost out eventually to Tranmere Rovers.

Holder has been ably Mr supported by assistant manager Wilf Rostron, who combined his duties with that of playing. Wilf clocked-up over 600 appearances with Arsenal, Sunderland, Watford. Sheffield United. Sheffield Wednesday and Brentford and last season he made 18 appearances in the Championship winning team.

The real strength of Brentford's success was their goal scoring power. Dean Holdsworth set the club's post-war record with 38 goals - 24 of them in the League; while **Gary Blissett** contributed 18.

In 16 Division Three fixtures they plundered 81 goals and their defensive record wasn't bad either conceding just two in the final seven crucial games - a decisive factor undoubtedly in their final triumph.

After 14 successive years in Division Three promotion has set the Bees buzzing again. Life though in the higher league has not proved that easy. In their opening dozen First Division games Brentford have scored just 13 goals and conceded 16!!

Prior to last Saturday's home date with Bristol City, Brentford were anchored in 21st place with 10 points from a possible 30; and they come here this evening looking for their first away League win of the season.

They don't see this as an impossible task either having arrived last September to inflict our first home defeat in a frantic Anglo Italian Cup tie ... They had a rookie Ashley Bayes in goal that night for the injured **Graham Benstead**, but now have the services of the much experienced **Gerry Peyton**, who was drafted into the side at Leicester where he played his part in a 0-0 draw.

Benstead, tore ligaments when he twisted his knee in the 2-1 win over Southend and the arrival of Gerry Peyton on Ioan



from Everton has bridged the gap quite nicely.

Since that win over us in the Anglo Italian Cup the Bees have failed to force a winning margin away from home with draws at Leicester and Peterborough and defeats at Spurs - in the Coca-Cola Cup - and Barnsley.

But they eased us out of Italy by scoring a late home win over Oxford United - Simon Ratcliffe, breaking the deadlock after 73 minutes with his second goal in two games and Gary Blissett making sure of their qualification for the European section two minutes from time.

At Oakwell last time away Phil Holder introduced a 4-3-3 system with Marcus Gavle playing a wide role. Other players used of late have included 21 year old Paul Buckle, who was only 16 when he made his debut striker and Lee Luscombe the Channel Islander signed from Southampton last season - who scored within four minutes of his Bees debut.

Grant Chalmers, like Luscombe hails from Guernsey, and is so highly rated by a business man over there that he has sponsored his wages until Christmas.

Jamie Bates - Defender. Versatile performer who has filled every defensive position. A product of the youth team he made his debut at Carlisle in September 1986. Has been operating in the centre of defence recently. Born: London 24-2-68.

Micky Bennett -Winger. Right-sided player who can operate as a front runner or in midfield. Served his apprenticeship with Charlton, making his League debut v West Ham (7-3-87), his pace and control persuading Wimbledon to invest £250,000 for his services. Signed this summer Kruszvnski for a with £120,000. combined Born: London 27-7-69.

Graham Benstead -Goalkeeper. Signed from Sheffield United for £70,000 in the summer of 1990. An apprentice with QPR he made his debut (8-1-83), in an FA Cup third round tie at West Brom. An England Youth cap he moved to Norwich City in '84 and made 20 First Division appearances for them. Played 20 games for Colchester on loan before signing for the Blades in July 1988 after a loan spell. Born: Aldershot 20-8-63.

Gary Blissett - Striker. Now in his sixth full season with Brentford he scored the winner at Peterborough to clinch the Third Division Championship last season. Started his career with Altrincham and was introduced to League football by Crewe, at Rochdale, in August 1983. Scored 38 goals in 122 League appearances before moving to Griffin Park in March 1987. Born: Manchester 29-6-64.

Marcus Gayle - Striker. Tall rangy centre-forward who graduated through the YTS. Won England honours at under-19 level and established himself in the Bees front-line last season scoring six goals in 38 League appearances. Born: Hammersmith 27-9-70. Kevin Godfrey - Midfield. Most experienced with over 400 League games behind him in a career that started with Levton Orient in 1976 - made his League bow v Oldham in January '78 - and continued with Plymouth. This is his fifth season with the Bees - scored three goals in 31 League games last season. Born: Kennington 24-2-60.

BRENTFORD

Chris Hughton - Fullback. Came to prominence with Spurs after joining them from amateur football in 1977. Opened his account v Man City (1-9-79) and went on to make over 300 appearances: collecting 52 caps for Eire, and FA and UEFA Cup winners' medals. Joined West Ham in 1991 and arrived at Brentford in March 1992. Born: West Ham 11-12-58.

Billy Manuel -Defender/Midfield. Another who learned his trade at White Hart Lane, first as a schoolboy, in 1983, then on the YTS. Was given his head by Gillingham and cost the Bees £60,000 in the summer of '91. Born: Hackney 28-6-69.

Keith Millen - Defender. Outstanding captain with over 300 games behind him. The longest serving player on the books he joined the club from school making his League debut in March 1985 at York City. The players Player of the Year last season. Born: Croydon 26-9-66.

Simon Ratcliffe - Midfield. Spent three years with Manchester United but made his League debut for Norwich against Newcastle in September 1987. Became Brentford's first six-figure signing, in January 1989, though he had made only nine League appearances for the Canaries. Born: Manchester 8-2-67.

Wilf Rostron - Midfield. Has now clocked up over 600 games since making his debut for Arsenal v Newcastle in March 1975. After four years at Highbury (17 appearances) he spent three with Sunderland (76) before enjoying a long stint with Watford (317). Sheffield Wednesday then United were the next two stops before he was appointed Player-Assistant Manager by Phil Holder in January 1991.Born:Sunderland 29-9-56 Neil Smillie - Forward. Came into top class football with Crystal Palace v Oxford in October 1976 and has enjoyed spells with Brighton, Watford, Reading and in the USA. Made three appearances in Division Four for Brentford on loan in 1976-77. Born: Barnsley 19-7-58.

Brian Statham - Fullback. Fast attacking defender who was born in Zimbabwe and later lived in Saudi Arabia before his family settled in Brentwood 20 years ago. Joined Spurs in '85 and made his First Division bow at Southampton in December '87. Capped by England at Under-21 level he cost Brentford £70,000. Born: Zimbabwe 21-5-69.

Gerry Peyton - Goalkeeper. Currently on loan from Everton the former Atherstone Town 'keeper made his League debut for Burnley (6-12-75), and kept a clean sheet in a 0-0 draw with Liverpool. Spent 10-years with Fulham and played 10 games for Southend on loan ('83-84) before signing for Bournemouth in 1986. Won the first of his 26 caps for Eire in 1977. Born: Birmingham 20-5-56.

THE MAN IN CHARGE



Phil Ho;der's early thoughts on football were shaped at White Hart Lane where he developed through the Youth ranks. Made his League debut at Anfield, in a 0-0 draw when he came on as a substitute for Jimmy Pearce on November 18th, 1971, and made his first full appearance at Nottingham Forest the following month.

Those were the days of Ralph Coates, Steve Perryman and Martin Peters, and Phil found it hard to make a first team shirt his own. He finished that first season with just six appearances - two as a sub - and didn't get a single game the following season.

In February 1975 Phil moved to Crystal Palace, slotting into their midfield against Aldershot (15-2-75). It was the first of 94 League appearances he had to make for the Selhurst Park Club before moving on to Bournemouth and adding another 58 games in the Third Division to his tally.

Phil played his last game in the final match of 1979-80 season in a 1-0 win at Darlington. He spent another year at Dean Court but injury prevented him from adding to his record.

In all Phil made 155 appearances (10 goals) before turning his hand to coaching.

He joined Brentford in February 1987 as manager Steve Perryman's assistant and when the former Spurs captain quit in 1990 Phil resumed managerial responsability.

In his first season in charge Phil took the Bees to the play-offs. A year later Griffin Park was celebrating the winning of the Third Division Championship. Phil consequently collecting the Barclays Third Division Manager of the Year award.

Those were the days...

... looks back at previous connections with today's visitors

Having looked at post-war servants of both the Town and the Bees when Brentford came to the County Ground in September, we do what we normally do at this time of the year and put the clocks back on this occasion to pre-war days.

Back in 1930-31, there were no less than five players on the Londoners books who had either previously assisted Swindon, or were to move to Swindon at a later date. Goalkeeper Teddy Nash, released by the Town in the summer of 1930, had been at the County Ground for half of his 28 years and was an ex-Wiltshire County wicketkeeper. He was the second former cricketer to make the switch, Archie Ling having made the same journey to Brentford back in 1909.

Inside-forward Leslie Roberts left Swindon at the same time as Nash, but stayed at Griffin Park only seven months before moving on to Manchester City. His travels took him to fourteen clubs in sixteen years!

Cecil Blakemore, Ted Ware and Les Wilkins all came to Wiltshire after their stints with Brentford, the latter moving direct in August 1932. Ware did not arrive until 1936, via Clapton Orient. A wing-half, he had been at Griffin Park for five years having signed from his home-town club of Chatham. Blakemore, a six-foot forward, came to Swindon in July 1933 when another former Bees player, Harry Morris, departed.

Morris had been a bargain £110 signing for the Town in June 1926. He was top scorer for the club in all of his seven season here, the first two yielding 92 goals! He joined Brentford in 1921 from Fulham and was leading scorer for the Bees in both 1921/22 and 1922/23, although he was sold to Millwall in February 1923. His last goal for Brentford was against the Town, after which they went five games without scoring.

During Harry's long reign as Swindon's chief goal-getter two other former Brentford men lined-up alongside him, albeit only briefly. Percy Whipp, a Glaswegian, made a handful of appearances for the Bees before coming to the County Ground. He scored in five out of nine games - during which the Town hit nineteen goals but was soon released, and joined Bath City in July 1931. Herbert Young went to Griffin Park from Aberdare Athletic in February 1925, but did not arrive at Swindon until June 1932.

In the following summer, he and Harry were considered to be getting too old and they were amongst the many discarded when new manager Ted Vizard took over. Harry Morris returned to the capital to enlist for Clapton Orient. Ironically, Blakemore, of those signed in his place, was no youngster at 35! Harry was soon back in the area, joining Cheltenham Town in 1934.

Orient signed another former Brentford and Swindon player in July 1935, full-back Baden Herod. He spent just eight months at Griffin Park after nearly seven years with Charlton. Further moves took him to Tottenham and Chester, newly-elected to the League in 1931. After two season at the County Ground, Herod's move to Clapton Orient, his last, took him almost home to his birthplace at llford.

PLAYER PROFILE

This week's star will hardly be twinkling this evening, for John Moncur finds himself on the sidelines - the victim of strained stomach muscles.

"It's nothing serious," he insists. "No worse than pulling a hamstring really. It is just such a nuisance that it has happened when things were going well for me.

"I'm not too sure when it happened. I obviously over-stretched in one of the games. The thing is I am not going to make the mistake I did last time and come back too quickly. I shouldn't have played at West Ham.

"I feel I have played well throughout the season and have settled in well. It helped of course having Micky Hazard in midfield, He and Glenn are such inspirations.

"At Tottenham I played quite often alongside Micky in the reserves. But even before I signed apprentice forms - when I was there as a schoolboy -I used to admire him. Micky of course was only an apprentice himself at that time but he oozed class.

"It is always good to be around players of quality because the more you watch the more good ideas you pick up yourself. Glenn and Micky always had a tremendous amount of skill but what has struck me most about Micky is the confidence he shows. "He's always had it; even as a youngster. Micky was never afraid to put his talent to the test no matter what grade of football he was playing. If you can do that in the old First Division then you are something."

It is one thing watching and admiring skilful technicians at work of course but another thing reproducing them - particularly if you are following a unique genius - as in the case of Glenn Hoddle. But John has no fears.

He says: "I have always considered myself a player of ability as well. I'm probably a better player with the ball than as a defender. My leaning has always been in this direction. That is why I always watched how Glenn and Micky did things rather than Graham Roberts for instance.

"No disrespect to Graham but you are always interested in things you can do."

John joined Spurs from school. What did the club do for him?

"I don't know," he paused ... "I'm not sure. I don't know if it made me a player or held me back. Who knows? I was there for nearly seven years and didn't really get the chance I deserved.

"When I was 20 I had chances to move on. Doncaster, Ipswich and Plymouth were all after me but I turned them down. I thought I could make it at White Hart Lane."

What made John change his mind and come to Swindon?

"Time was running out," he confesses frankly. "At 25 I had to get away. When I realised Glenn was interested I jumped at it. Who wouldn't. He's got Swindon playing the way we all want to play."

Does John then regret those 'wasted' years at White Hart Lane?

"I do to be honest," is the blunt retort. "I believe I was good enough to play in the first team at Spurs ... It was difficult to break in because from Glenn to Gascoigne there was always top quality midfield players on the books. They thought nothing of paying enormous fees for star names ... Some would say I wasn't good enough. That's their opinion.

"Personally I think I am good enough to play in the Premier League, same as all the players here. All of us believe we could handle it. The higher you go the greater the pressure. But it is an enjoyable pressure and the incentive, as always, is to do well."

Sure the utter confusion and uncertainty which spread through defenders in the early weeks did create some goal scoring opportunities. But has FIFA's tonic really worked?

It would seem not going on the latest statistics on the Premier and Football Leagues. These show that, in all but the new Third Division, fewer goals are being scored than before the introduction of the new back-pass rule.

The overall scoring rate in the top two Leagues is down from an average of 2.77 goals a game last season to 2.74 this. Not the greatest difference we agree but a significant one none the less.

Take the current First Division. The records show the average this season is 2.69 goals a game compared to 2.86 when we were labelled the Second Division. While in the Premier League the stats show a similar trend with a 2.72 as against 2.84 last season in the old First Division.

Mind you Swindon fans haven't missed out. Over the first 17 games of this season Town have hammered in 39 goals - with Craig Maskell and David Mitchell spearheading the strike rate. This equals exactly our haul over the first 17 fixtures of last season.

Ironically, the goals against tally is also identical. Last season we conceded 24 goals over this sequence. This year it is also 24.

So Glenn Hoddle's heroes have proved remarkably consistent and above average when it comes to scoring goals. It would certainly seem that Craig Maskell has adequately replaced Duncan Shearer.

But what about FIFA's lame attempt to put more sparkle into the game? I mean, there was a suggestion, and it was a serious one at that, to make the goals bigger!

What a pantomime that would have created ... All this tinkering with the laws on back passes and goalkeepers'



steps etc. is nothing after this sheer cosmetic treatment. It doesn't address the real problems.

If the game's administrators truly believe that more goals is the answer to lift the game then the solution is plain and simple. Do away with offside.

What is the offside rule designed to do other than stop goals being scored. It is a rule totally dedicated to the union of defenders. It is the killjoy of many a great move; the spark of countless heated disagreements on the field and off it and is probably the hardest law to get right.

So why endure it? Why let it stiffle the adventurous attacking nature of the game?

They did try it once without any offside. Many years ago in the Watney Cup. But it was a pre-season tournament and the participants were reluctant to change their game.

The 20 yard line is probably a more popular alternative but that would be just transferring the current problems to a smaller defined area. If FIFA are honestly worried about falling goal averages they could do worse than abolish with the back-pass law.

Firstly he was thrilled by Town's 2-1 victory. But his heart was slightly saddened at not getting on.

It means so much to Mark and four other second year YTS lads. Because now is when they have to impress the management if they want to be offered a professional contract at the end of the season.

Mark, like many of our youngsters is a local lad who was spotted by John Trollope and invited here as a schoolboy. He has worked his way up through the ranks and now has to prove himself at reserve team level.

This then is his -make or break season. "Hopefully 'make it" chips in Mark, who made his Reserve team debut, as a sub, against Millwall last year.

"You have to establish yourself in the Reserves to stand any chance," claims the youngster raised just a few blocks down the road from the County Ground.

The fans might not turn out to see the stiffs but for the kids on trial there is nothing more stimulating. Says Mark: "It is so exciting being on the same field as famous players like Mick McCarthy and Nayim. You can learn a lot from them."

Mark's elder brother, Paul, was an apprentice with Southampton and spent a year with Swindon before drifting into the Helenic League. Paul's failure to make the grade is a potent reminder to Mark that it is not easy to become a professional in the top League in the country.

Does the thought of failure weigh heavy?

"Yes," says Mark. "As with most lads in this position I haven't really thought about what I would do if I wasn't offered a contract. When you have been serious about making football your career for many years you don't think of the negative side.

"It is a big gamble but I go to Filton College in Bristol one day a week to study Leisure and Recreation for a City and Guilds award. It is quite enjoyable. But no way would a job in a sports centre com-

pensate for not making it as a footballer."

These lads are literally playing for their future and with the stakes so high one can excuse the trace of nervousness that creeps into their game.

In the meantime it is on with the daily routine that starts at 9.00 am cleaning and polishing the senior players boots and checking equipment. By 10.30am the lads are at the training ground to go through their routines with the youth squad. Then it is time to clean up after the pros and return to the County Ground to tidy up here.

"Nobody likes sweeping out the dressing rooms and cleaning," says Mark, "but it is all worthwhile once you are out on the pitch. We are lucky to be in this position there are hundreds of boys who never get this far. But once you are here you will do anything you can to make it continue."

The word is that Mark is in with a good chance and he will certainly be one for big Jack Charlton to keep tabs on. For with grandparents from Cork we could have another budding Eire International in the making.

All that is a long way off just now. At the moment Mark and his colleagues have just one ambition. To impress Glenn and his management team enough to win them professional contracts next April.
