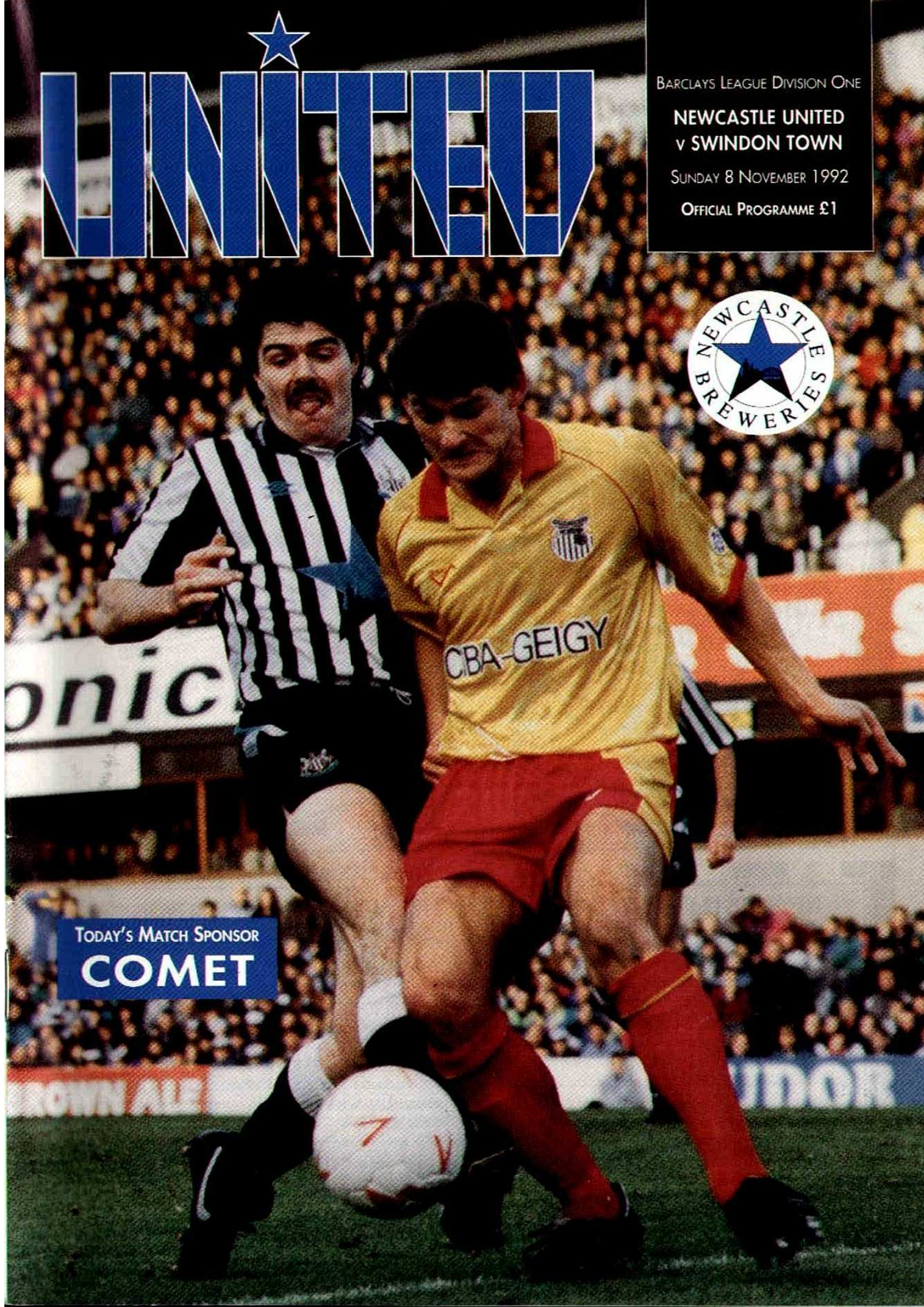

I HAVE TO admit that losing our unbeaten run against Grimsby was a bitter disappointment and we have tried to take it on the chin.

Since then of course we were beaten by Chelsea in the Coca-Cola Cup and Leicester in the League.

But I like to think that out of adversity there is always some good. As painful as defeat can be there are still lessons to be learned.

Let's take the Grimsby result first.

We were out to make history but in the end we were historied.

The dream was shattered after we had worked so hard and well together. And before the game everything looked right for us to keep the run going.

But I knew within the first ten minutes that it was not going to be our day. The vibes were wrong. There was plenty of effort but we were not ourselves.

And that was the thing which hurt most. We lost playing badly. There is no shame in losing. It happens to everybody at some time.

But we just did not get it together and that is taking no credit away from Grimsby. On the day they deserved to win.

Afterwards we knew we had to go

The dream was shattered after we had worked so hard

back to the drawing board and regroup. Start again.

As far as the history books are concerned let us not forget that many records were broken during our run and all of the players can be proud of their achievements. They were, and are, a great credit to the club.

This is going to be a long season which will bring high spots and low spots. As long as there are more highs than lows we will all be reasonably content at the end.

My only criticisms of the English season are that it is too long and too congested. There is so very little time to regroup.

After Grimsby we were off to London to face Chelsea and after that we had to go to Leicester... all in a week.

We then had to go to Birmingham and then back home for today's game against Swindon.

Total: five games in 14 days and a lot of travelling which gives very little time to repair physical damages, loss of confidence or loss of form.

But on the other side of the coin all the other clubs are in the same boat facing the same problems.

Against Chelsea we came out of the experience knowing that we have nothing to fear from any side in the Premier League.

Our hardest job might be getting into the Premier League but once there we know that even now we are in a strong position to cope with it.

It was clear very early on against Chelsea that they were going to

cause us problems from set-pieces and they did exactly that.

But apart from that, I thought we were as good as Chelsea, although in the end they had a slight edge because they won... with home advantage.

At Leicester we caused our own problems. Giving them a two goal start gave us a mountain to climb. No matter who you are, to concede two goals, especially away from home, is just too much to pull back.

In the second half we did put up a fight and had a lot of possession, but in the end didn't do too much.

For the first 11 games of the season we proved we are good winners and after three defeats in a row I think we showed that we are not bad losers.

Give credit where it is due. And another thing - you cannot have too many games when everything is going well. But it is hard work with injuries etc.

As a manager I need to have consistency which was the situation at the start of the season.

The important thing is that I know we have a good team playing good football in the First Division and there aren't many of those about.

That certainly doesn't apply to today's opponents, Swindon, who are right behind us in second place.

Glenn Hoddle has his team playing the way he did... with polish and panache which is going to make for a great game of football.

I hope you all enjoy it, and thanks for your support.



TALKING POINT

The Chairman's Pride

AFTER NEWCASTLE'S second defeat of the season which saw them go out of the Coca-Cola Cup with a 2-1 reverse at Chelsea, there was praise for the Magpies by Chairman Sir John Hall.

He said: "After the defeat by Grimsby all I wanted was for us to bounce back and we did.

"I thought we were tremendous and the likes of David Mellor in the director's box told me that this was one of the hardest games Chelsea have had all season.

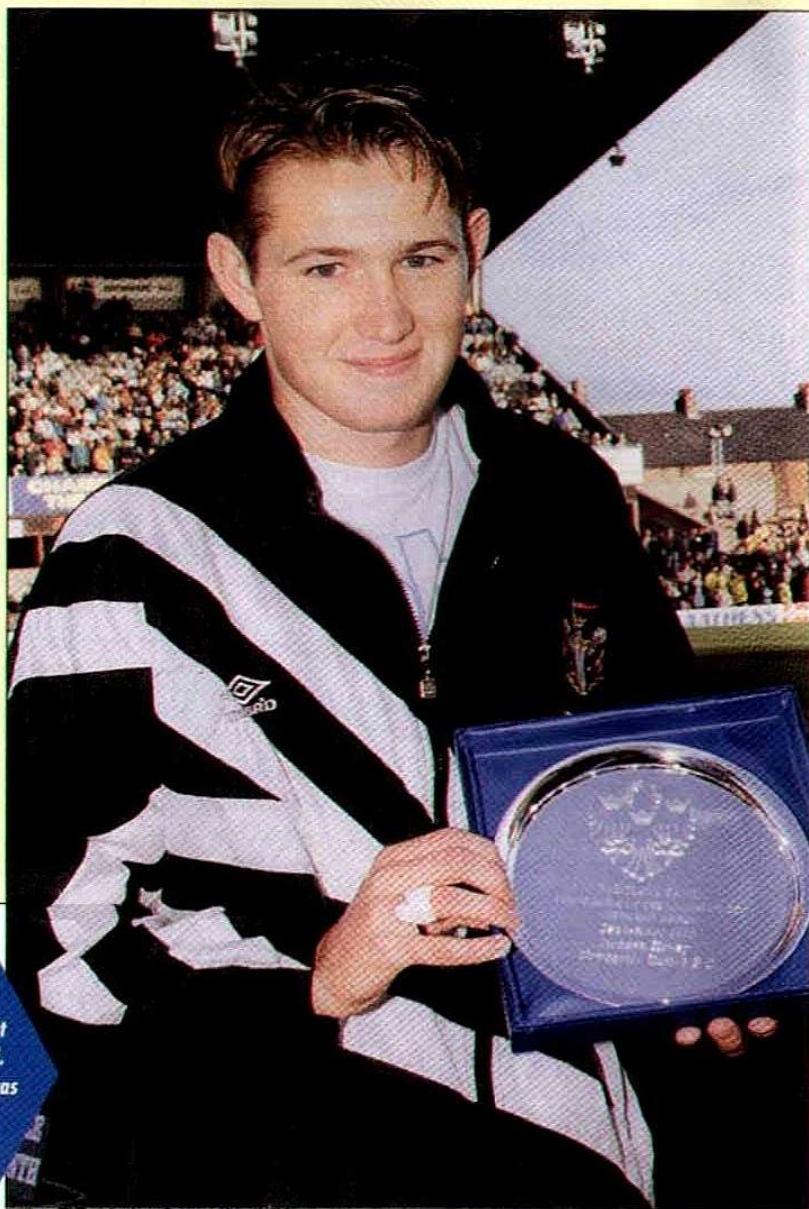
"We went out of the Coca-Cola Cup with honour," he added,

Clearly the game gave the United lads a chance to see what they could do against a Premier League side. After the dramatic success against Middlesbrough their showing against Chelsea proved conclusively that they have nothing to fear from the bigger boys.

There was also considerable mystery about Chelsea's first goal which came from a free-kick adjudged to have been conceded by John Beresford.

The full-back said: "Robert Fleck's legs just went from under him. I never touched him. And to be fair Robert actually apologised to me afterwards when the referee awarded a free kick.

"I told the ref that if he or the linesman had thought I fouled Fleck then it should have been a penalty because the incident was inside the area."



A very mixed day for Steve Howey... the youngster received his Barclays Young Eagle award before the Grimsby game, but later was disappointed to finish on the losing side. The 1-0 defeat brought Newcastle's wonderful run of 11 successive League wins to an end.

Ironically Steve reckons that his favourite goal for Newcastle was scored against Grimsby last season when the Magpies won 2-0.

Steve headed in at the far post on that occasion and could have done with a repeat performance this year.



WAITING IN THE WINGS

IT HAS BEEN desperately hard to get into the Newcastle side so far this season because of their wonderful start. There is a lot of talent on the bench or in the reserves every week.

Take the case of Steve Watson who is good enough for a place in the England Under-21 side but cannot get a spot in Kevin Keegan's super outfit.

Steve played in the first game of the season but has not been back in since. He does however, take an understanding point of view.

He said: "It is frustrating not being in the team, but after all how can you change perfection? Our start to the season has been fantastic and I am delighted for the fans. But I reckon I am in good company with the likes of skipper Brian Kilcline and Mick Quinn also finding it hard to break through.

"The spirit throughout the club is superb and those not in the first team need to keep on playing as well as possible in order to be ready when a chance does come along."

Joy and despair for full-back John

LEFT BACK JOHN BERESFORD was the man of the match against Grimsby, but it was still a sad day for him. United were beaten 1-0 and with it went their superb run of 11 successive League wins from the start of the season.

The super talent signed from Portsmouth during the close season said: "We were unprofessional. When we realised we were not going to win and stay in the chase for the record number of wins we should have shut up shop.

"We should never have been beaten. Winning a point was more valuable to us than any records. At the end of the season a point could be invaluable.

"I have to say that we would not have scored had we played until Sunday night and at the end we should have been happy with a goalless draw.

"We prepared well for the game, but we did not relax and had to force everything. The boss gave us a rocket at half-time but we still couldn't get things right in the second half.

"It is not unusual for three or even four players to have an off day but against Grimsby not one of us was really on song."

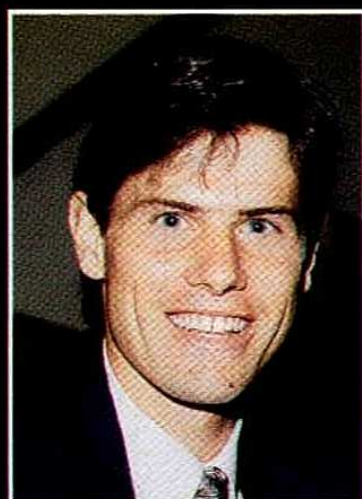
The £700,000 signing from Charlton said: "It is always nice to get off the mark for a new club although I have not been under any pressure to score.

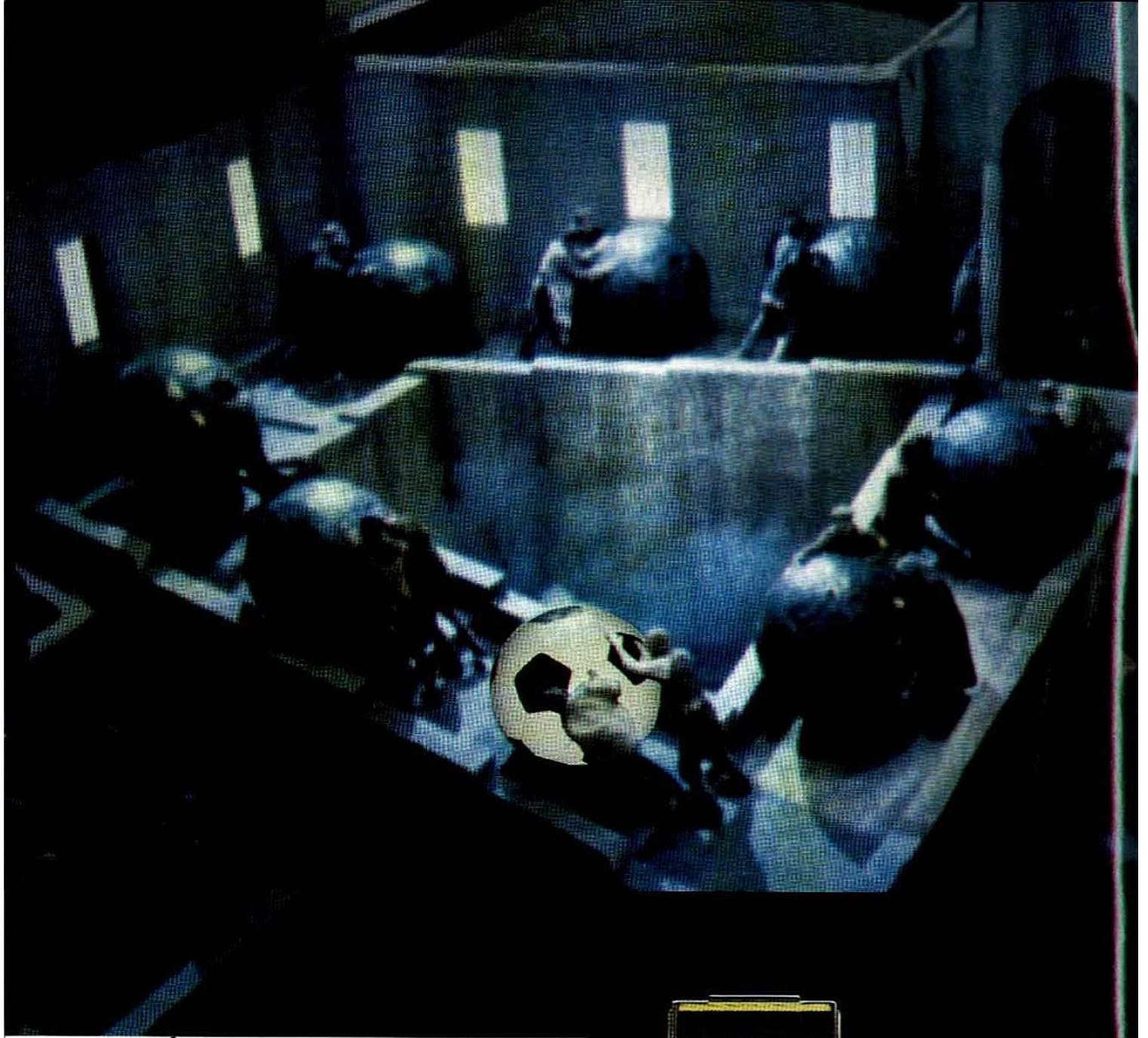
"For me this one was even better because I do not get many with my head. The goal was good but the result was disappointing."

It is just a pity that Lee was not fit for the Leicester game at Filbert Street on Saturday when United played well enough to win but after giving away two goals, found it just beyond them.

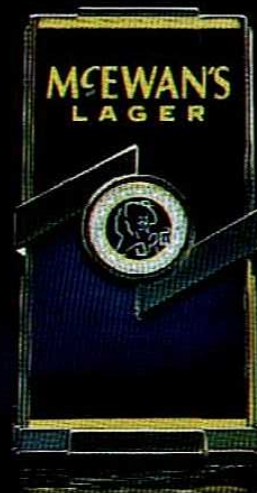
But what a cracker from Liam O'Brien. United had a free kick just outside the area in the first half and his swerving goal-bound shot was only just headed wide for a corner.

But the big Irishman didn't make any mistakes with the second similar chance with about ten minutes to go.



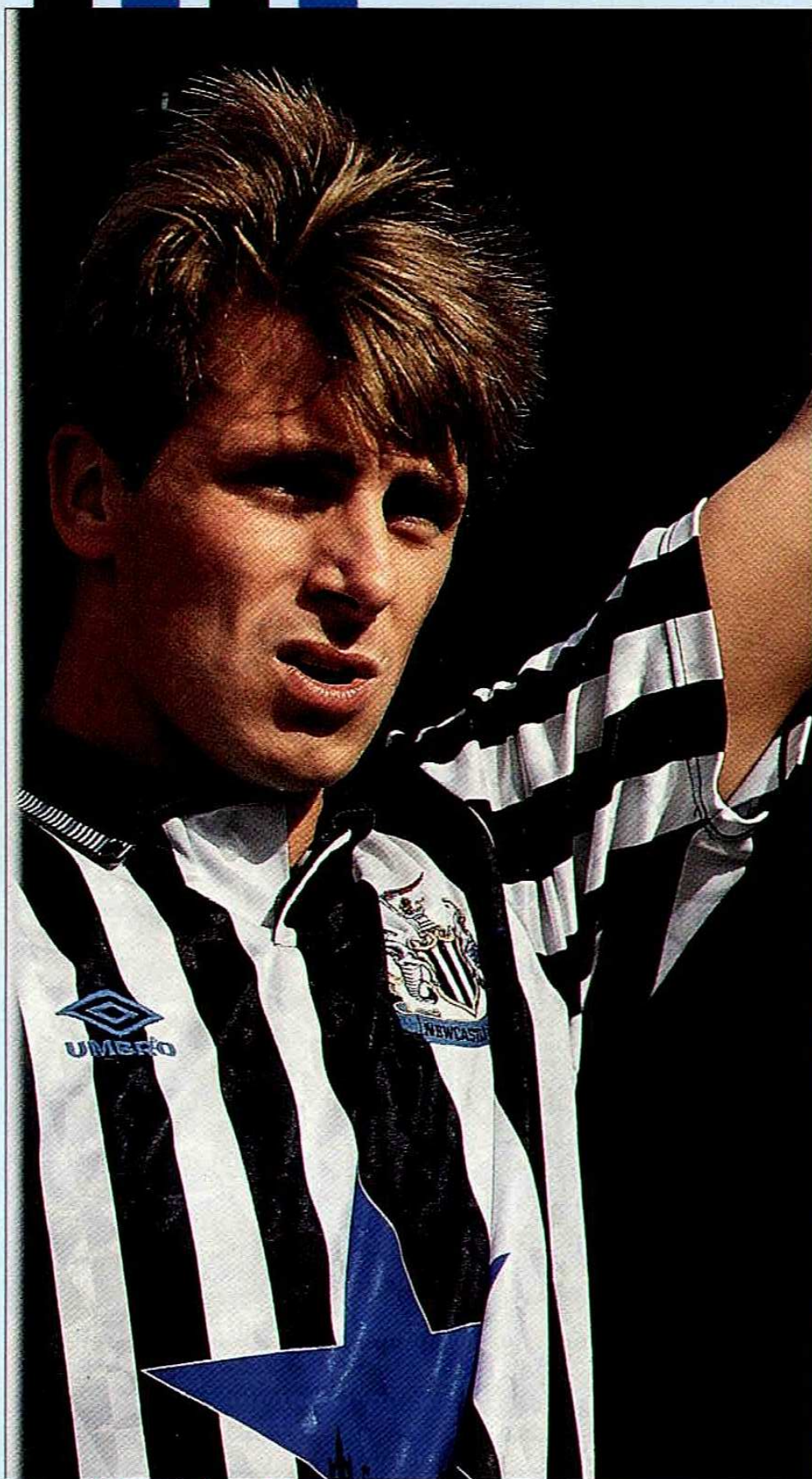

Robins flying high in pursuit of Magpies

THE RESTRUCTURING of league football in England has technically given Swindon Town the First Division status that was taken away from them after winning the play-offs two years ago.

But no-one in the Wiltshire town will be satisfied until the club is truly at the top level, and that means a place in the new Premier League - preferably next season.

Optimism was running high after a surge of five wins in six games - including success at West Ham on their last travelling mission - hoisted an attractive side into second place behind Newcastle.

If the League table were to stay that way, a Magpies-Robins promotion double would be a fitting tribute to the management skills of two of England's outstanding players of the Seventies and Eighties.

Some ten years ago Kevin Keegan and Swindon's 35-year-old player-manager, **GLENN HODDLE**, were team-mates at the World Cup finals in Spain. In effect, one international adventure was drawing to a close as another gathered momentum.

The bulk of Mr Hoddle's 53 caps were still to come as he applied a silky touch to the fortunes of Tottenham Hotspur and later Monaco. He made his last England appearance in 1988 but within a year his top-flight career closed because of a serious knee injury.

Out for 20 months, he had only just resumed playing - in Chelsea's reserves - when he was appointed by Swindon in April 1991. An opening, incidentally, that was created by Ossie Ardiles' move to St James' Park.

After skirting the relegation zone in his first weeks as manager, Mr Hoddle re-registered as a player last season and made 22 League appearances, broken by a five-month recovery from a thigh muscle injury.

Swindon finished eighth after raising £1.25m from the sales of midfielder Fitzroy Simpson to Manchester City and prolific scorer Duncan Shearer to Blackburn Rovers.

Shearer netted 32 league and cup goals prior to his departure in March, but without him, the side managed only seven in the last nine games and missed the play-offs by five points.

In hindsight, however, a £750,000 fee for a striker approaching his 30th birthday appeared to be good business, especially when Mr Hoddle pulled off an inspired deal

to sign **CRAIG MASKELL** from Reading in a swap for midfielder Tom Jones in the summer.

A former Southampton apprentice who later scored 54 goals in two years with Huddersfield, Maskell went to Reading for £250,000 in 1990. Reasonably successful with 26 League goals in two seasons at Elm Park, he moved up a gear with 13 in his first 18 outings for Swindon.

The 24-year-old striker added to his reputation with two more goals for the Barclays League side in their recent win against their Italian Serie B counterparts.

A strong Swindon representation also included **DAVID KERSLAKE** (£110,000 from QPR in 1989) and **COLIN CALDERWOOD**, who has played in nearly 400 club games since his £30,000 transfer from Mansfield in 1985.

Mr Hoddle managed the English side for a second time and put himself on the bench along with goalkeeper **NICKY HAMMOND**, a former Arsenal apprentice who competes for the No 1 spot at the County Ground with **FRASER DIGBY**. The latter cost £32,000 from Manchester United and won five England Under-21 caps after joining Swindon.

Digby, Calderwood and striker **STEVE WHITE**, a free signing from Bristol Rovers, were in the side which came out of the old Third Division in 1987. White scored the 200th goal of his career in a cup game with Torquay this season, but, at 33, he is more likely to be listed among the substitutes nowadays.

This is due in no small way to the success of Maskell's partnership with **DAVID MITCHELL**, a £30,000 signing from Chelsea last season. Glasgow-born Mitchell has played international football for Australia in a career which also took him to clubs in Germany and Holland.

Swindon's third highest scorer - with six goals up to last Saturday - is a defender. **SHAUN TAYLOR**, a former Western League player with Bideford Town, was bought from Exeter City for £200,000 in July 1991.

As last season developed, Mr Hoddle further adjusted the squad by paying £225,000 for Welsh international **PAUL BODIN**, who returned to the West Country less than a year after going to Crystal Palace for £550,000. During his short time with the Londoners, he spent a month

on loan here at St James' Park, playing in six League games.

Another Swindon

newcomer last season

was midfielder **JOHN MONCUR**, who cost £80,000 from Spurs, where he made his League debut in 1987 in the No 10 shirt normally worn by one Glenn Hoddle! Reserve striker **SHAUN CLOSE** also started at White Hart Lane, then went to Bournemouth before signing on at Swindon in a £70,000 deal in 1989.

The Tottenham connection spreads to **MICKY HAZARD**, who partnered Mr Hoddle in Spurs' midfield in the 1982 FA Cup Final win against QPR. Sunderland-born Hazard also played for Chelsea and Portsmouth before joining Swindon for £130,000 in September 1990.

Wide player **MARTIN LING** is in his second spell at the County Ground. He went to Southend in 1988 and returned three years later - a £15,000 fee changing hands on each occasion.

Two summer signings scored on debuts this season: **AUSTIN BERKLEY** (free from Gillingham) in an Anglo-Italian game and **KEVIN HORLOCK** (ex-West Ham) in his first full League game against Notts County.

Of the younger home-produced players, **NICKY SUMMERBEE**, son of the ex-Manchester City and England winger, has established a foothold in the senior squad, while **ADRIAN VIVEASH** clocked up 35 League outings in the last two seasons.



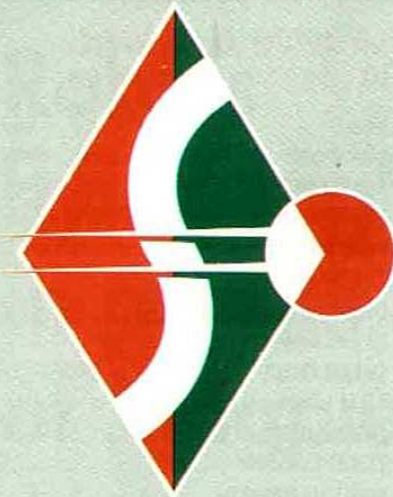

IN BOTH COLOURS

Peter Noble

Born in Sunderland, Peter Noble joined United from Consett in November 1964 after impressing club scouts in local leagues. Noble developed through the Magpie ranks alongside a host of talent - Bobby Moncur and Pop Robson included - and made his debut at Chelsea in September 1965.

Always second choice at St James Park as a front runner, Peter however had a good scoring spell towards the end of the 1966/67 season when he teamed up with Wyn Davies. The Wearsider grabbed several important goals as United struggled to avoid the drop from Division One. But the emergence of Bryan Robson as striking partner to Davies saw Noble back in Newcastle's Central League side.

Peter though found regular first team action with Swindon Town joining the Robins in January 1968 for £10,000 - a deal which proved a real bargain to the Wiltshire club. He linked well alongside Don Rogers in Division Three and in a famous League Cup run, with Peter netting the goal that sent Swindon to Wembley for the first time.

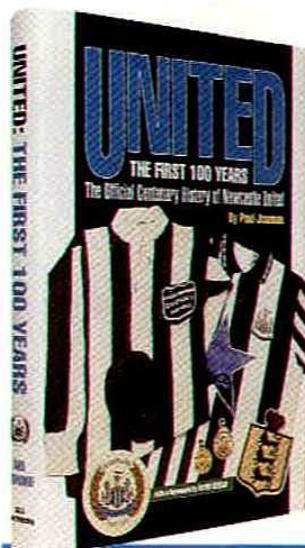
Noble showed a great touch up front with deft flicks and possessed a great spirit. He also helped steer Swindon to promotion and to FA Cup exploits. After five years he moved to Burnley where he became a noted midfielder, appearing 300 times for the Claret & Blues. Noble finished his career with Blackpool and recently ran a sports shop in Burnley.

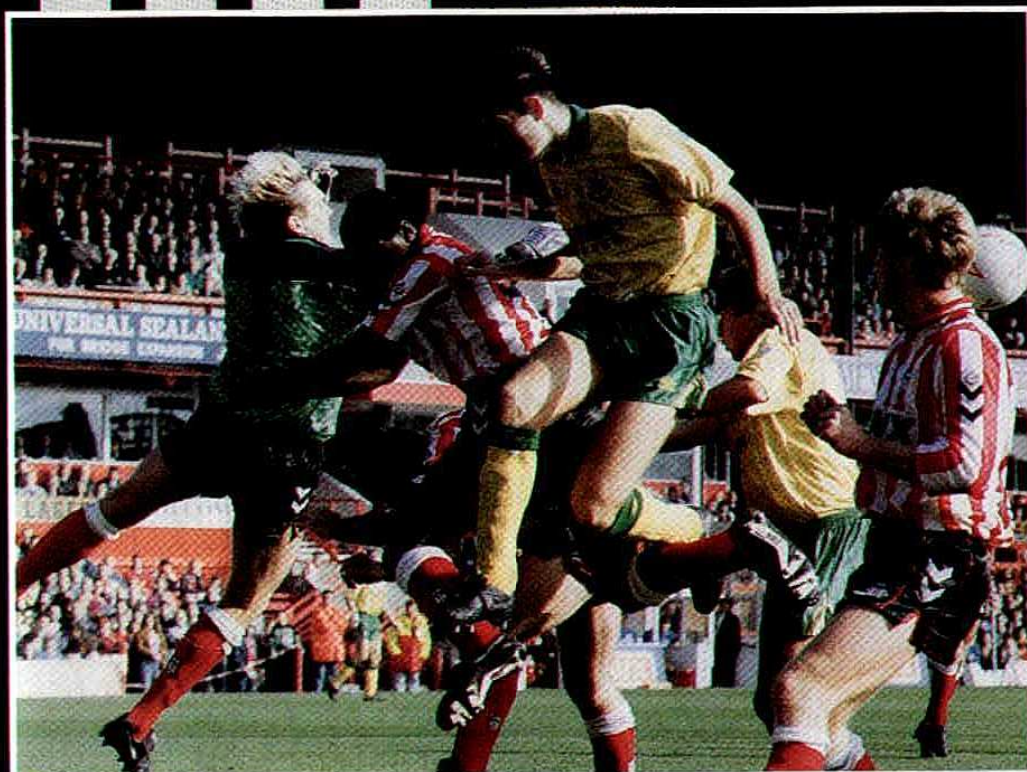

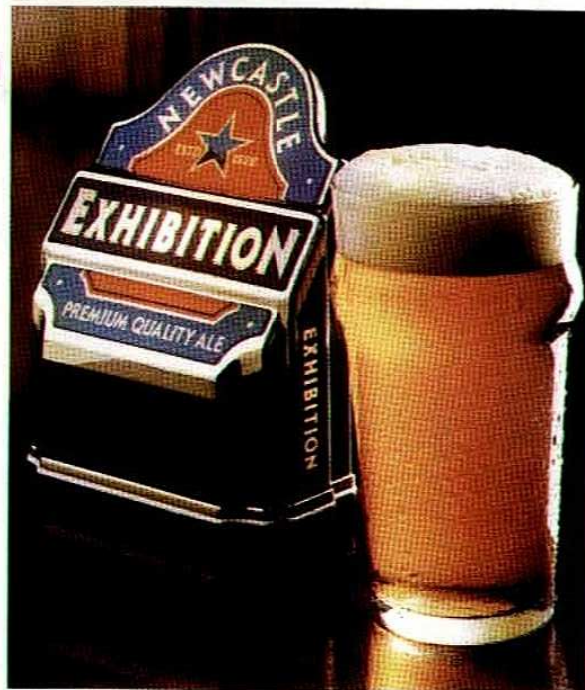

PAUL JOANNOU EXPLORES THE CLUB MUSEUM

The Club Museum contains many items on show from before the turn of this century, ranging from medals, caps, minute-books, programmes and old season-tickets.

Perhaps the most interesting of the lot, though, is an original player rule booklet dated 1898, as published by Club officials to their staff - all of 94 years ago.

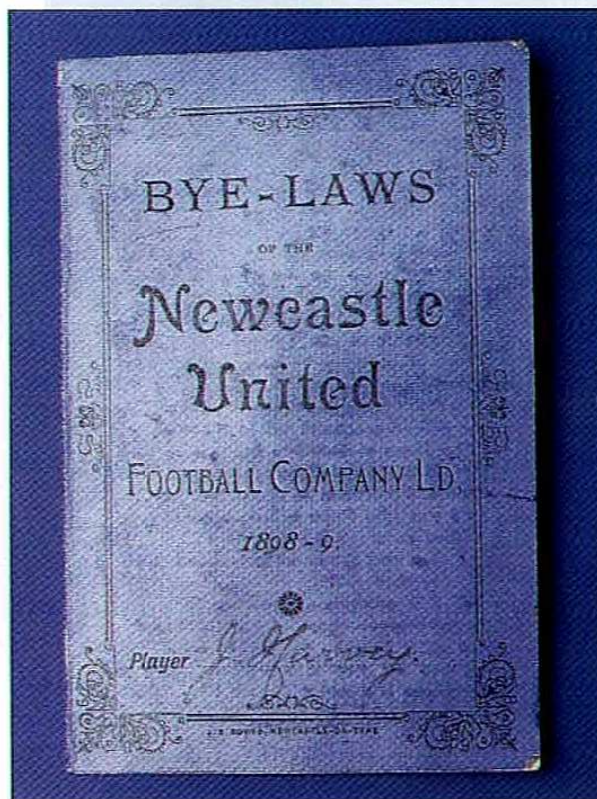
Issued by secretary Frank Watt to all Newcastle's players at the start of the 1898/99 season, United's first ever in Division One, the prize exhibit is in virtual pristine condition considering its age and belonged to inside-forward Johnny Harvey. Just note some of the Bye-laws players had to obey:

- On the field of play, all commands of the captain must be promptly obeyed.
- All articles for the use of players are the property of the Co, and the players will be held responsible for loss or damage.
- A bonus of 5s for every win will be paid to each player of the first team.
- Players not signing the Attendance Book by 10.15am or 3.15pm will be counted as absent and incur a penalty of 2s 6d.

I wonder how the likes of Kevin Sheedy, Brian Kilcline or John Beresford would take to those conditions if Kevin Keegan imposed them as part of his current day do's and don'ts!

Apart from the Club's Bye-laws of the time, one very interesting historical fact emerges from the booklet - that Newcastle United's colours of the era featured 'Blue Knickers' and not black. In fact, United did not wear their now traditional black shorts to match the black and white shirts until the First World War approached - a surprise, no doubt, to many.

Johnny Harvey had signed for the Magpies from neighbours Sunderland in May 1897 as somewhat of a veteran after beginning his career in his native Scotland with the famed Renton club. The deal that brought Harvey to St James' Park included another Sunderland player - John Campbell - and all for £40. Both men were established stars from the



United's players rule book from 1898.

Wearsiders noted 'Team of all the Talent' and had won Championship medals with the Reds.

Harvey's considerable experience helped the Magpies to promotion in 1897/98. Known as the 'Little 'un' - he was only 5'4" tall - Johnny became a favourite with Newcastle supporters and was a regular in that promotion year, including appearing in every game of a controversial Test Match series - the forerunner of the current-day Play-off system for promotion.

The Scot played 35 times and netted 10 goals for the Magpies. He later coached United's Alliance side.

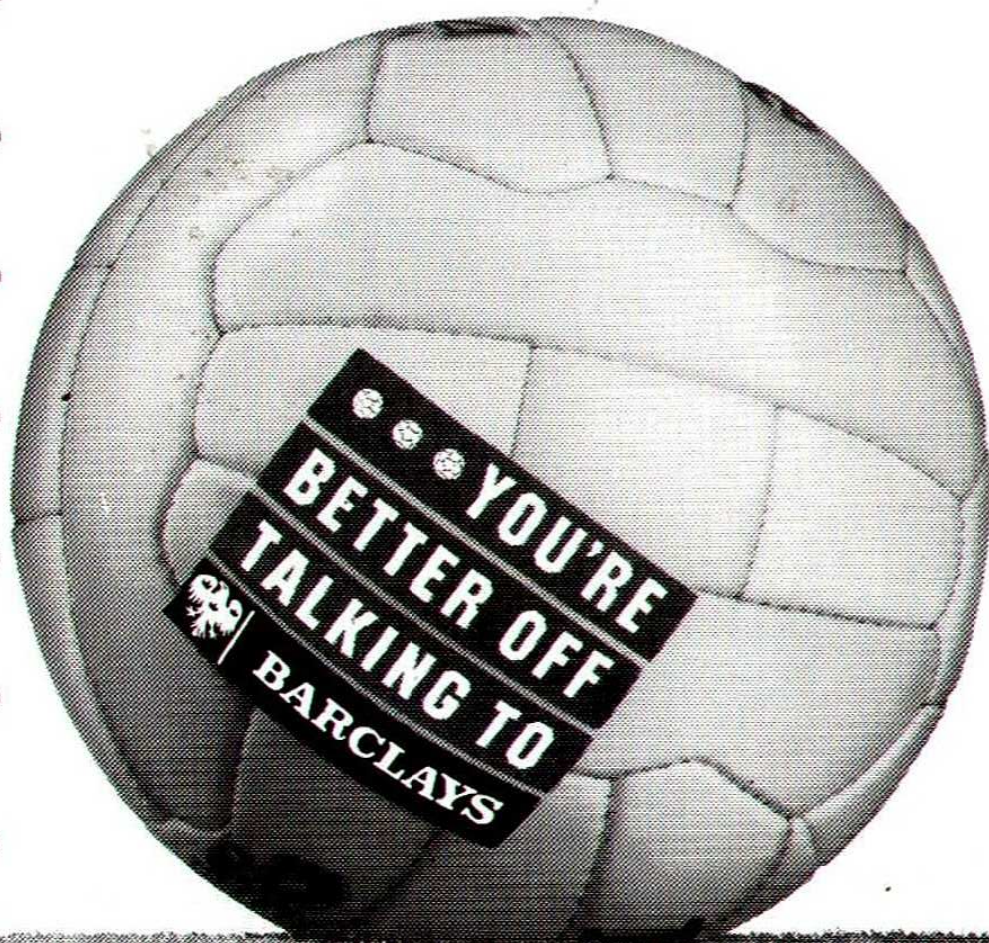
Other player contract documents are also on show in the Museum. Charlie Crowe's 1948 agreement is there. He earned £8 per week, increased to £12 when he was in the first-team.

Jimmy Scoular and Frank Houghton have also loaned contracts. Houghton received £12 per week during the 1950/51 season and earned £10 in the summer. Also on display is his benefit statement, Frank received £417 18s 0d. Even an old wage packet from wartime player Eddie Copeland is on display. He got all of £3 11s 0d for appearing in the match against Doncaster Rovers.

STARS IN STRIPES

No 10 Kevin Sheedy

THERE AREN'T many players who leave Everton and consider that they have moved to a bigger club. But Kevin Sheedy does.

He said: "Moving to Newcastle from Goodison Park has taken me from one hot-bed of football to another and there is no doubt in my mind that Newcastle is a bigger club."

The Irish international with the delicate left foot started football life, in fact, at Hereford under the eagle eye of manager John Sillett, who is now back at Edgar Street.

Kevin was born in Wales at Builth Wells of an Irish dad and a Welsh mum.

That gave him dual nationality in football terms and it was very quickly into his football career that he had to make up his mind which country he wanted to represent.

He discussed the problem with his parents shortly after joining the Hereford Bulls because his talents made him a wanted youngster at international Youth level.

It was a tough decision. One parent would have to be disappointed and in the end he chose Ireland.

Johnny Giles had a big effect on the decision which pleased Kevin's dad and his mum was also happy because she felt that it was in his best interests.

Before he reached his teens Kevin was a goalkeeper and then a striker before settling down with the Hereford Lads Club and it wasn't long before he was training and being coached two nights a week at Edgar Street.

The day he reached his sixteenth birthday he was signed as an apprentice. And still at that tender age he made his Football League debut.

It was the last game of the season against Preston at Edgar Street and the victory won the Third Division championship in 1976.

He remembers that Dixie McNeil needed three goals to equal the



League scoring record for a season and did it.

The following season the club were in the Second Division and young Sheedy regained his first team place mid-way through.

But the club were relegated and then relegated again the year after that but Kevin's own international career as a youth and then under 21 player was taking off.

At that level he was high profile and the target of many of the top clubs.

Then out of the blue he received a phone call at home at 9am and was told to go to Liverpool because the clubs had agreed a fee of £80,000.

Kevin said: "I was a bit stunned but felt at the time that I didn't want to go because it would mean nothing but reserve team football."

"But just at that time I had watched Liverpool win the European Cup with a goal from Kenny Dalglish. So in the end I decided I wanted to be part of that scene."

"And the next thing I knew was that instead of watching Kenny, I was sitting next to him in the changing rooms."

"I was in tremendous awe of him and of the other players and the

club itself. But Terry McDermott was also there at the time and he helped me to settle down."

"Even so I played only four first team games in four seasons so my first thoughts had been correct."

"In the end it was an unhappy experience. Very frustrating although I obviously learned a lot being around so many talented players every day."

"But when my contract was up I was desperate for a move and so in 1982 Howard Kendall signed me for Everton."

"I had ten wonderful years at Goodison winning everything but an FA Cup winners medal - two championships, the European Cup winners Cup, the Milk Cup the Charity Shield, etc."

"But it all started to go wrong for me when Howard Kendall left to go to Spain. Under Colin Harvey the team and my own form suffered and it was not until Howard returned that I started playing well again."

"But ten years is a long time with any club and it became clear that a move would be in the best interests of the club and myself."

"I was given a free transfer and here I am at St James' where everything is going well this season. It is certainly better than last season when we just managed to avoid relegation."

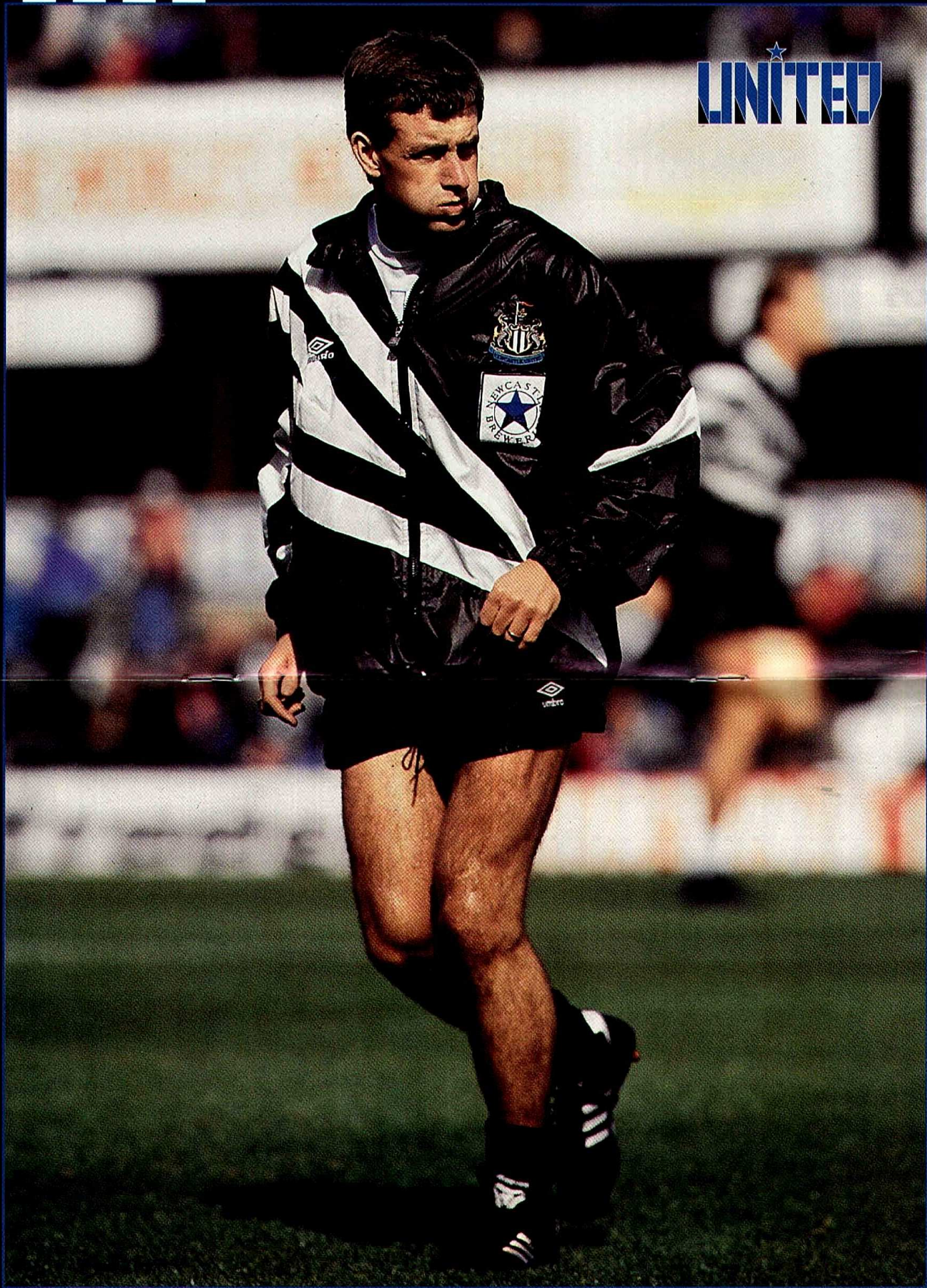
"The pressure of being at the top is a lot more comfortable than the pressure of battling against relegation."

"I am glad to say that I am well settled with my wife Debbie and children Mark, Lucy and Maria."

"From a football point of view my ambitions are to help Newcastle get into the Premier Division and to help Ireland qualify for the World Cup in America... and then of course to play in it," he added.

Kevin has always enjoyed a successful international career even though his club form has not always been at its peak. But there is no doubt that he will be adding to the 45 caps he has already collected.

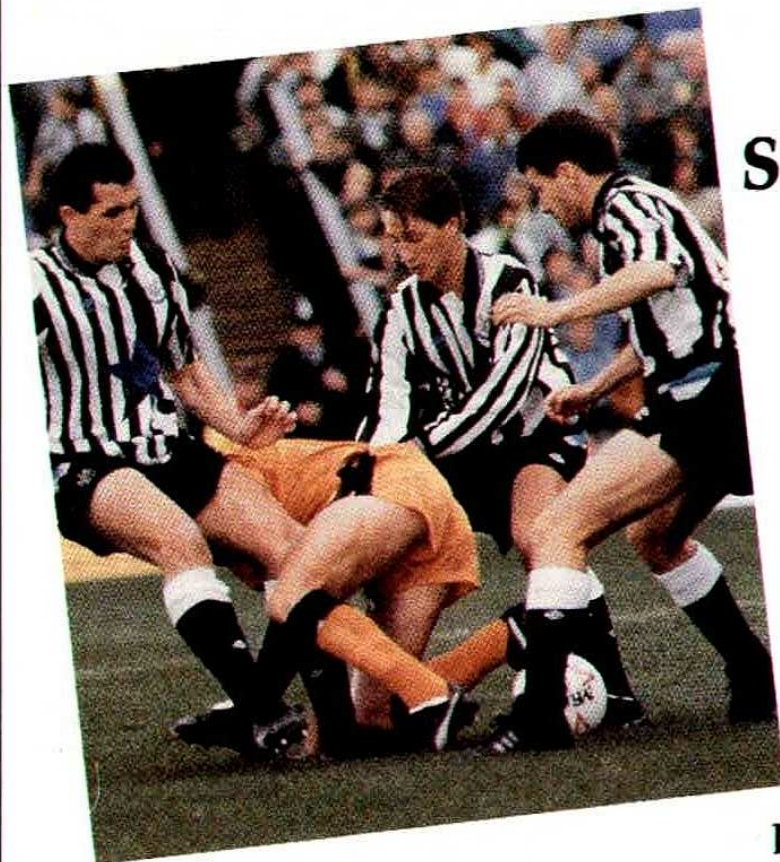

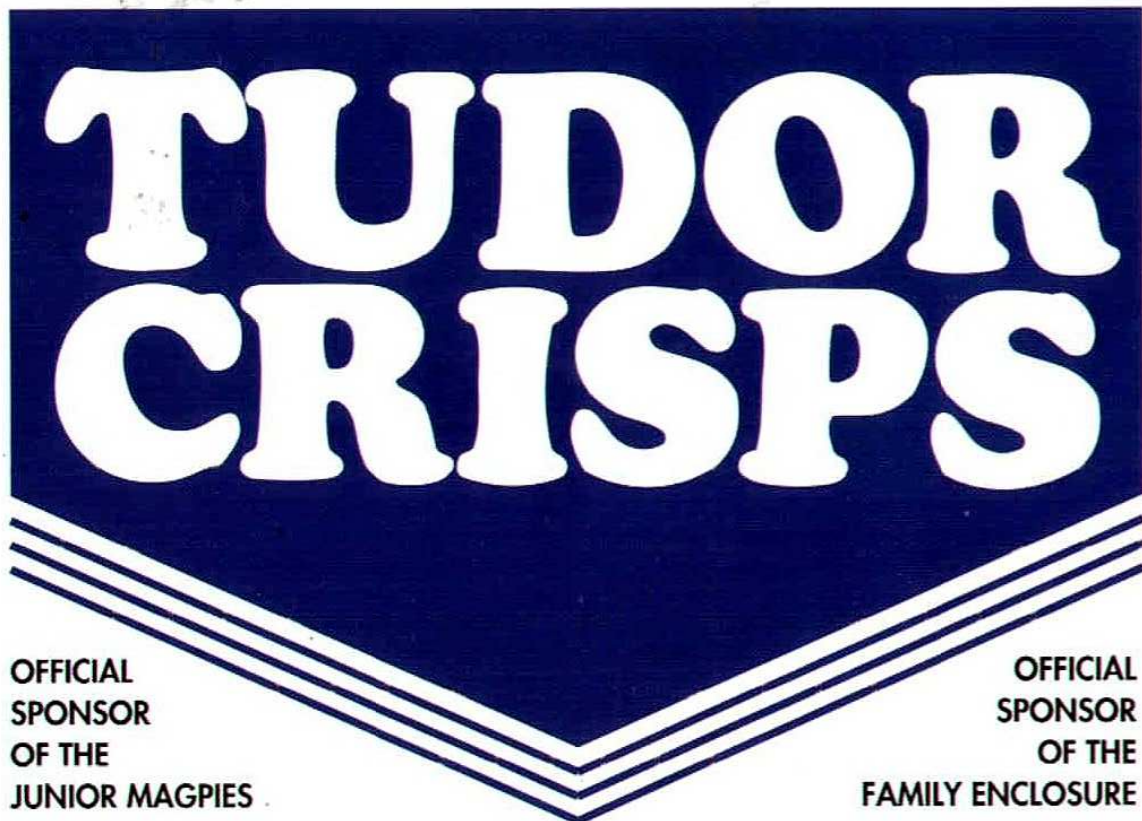

There has been a rush for tickets for United's Anglo-Italian Cup trip next week to Luccese, near Pisa.

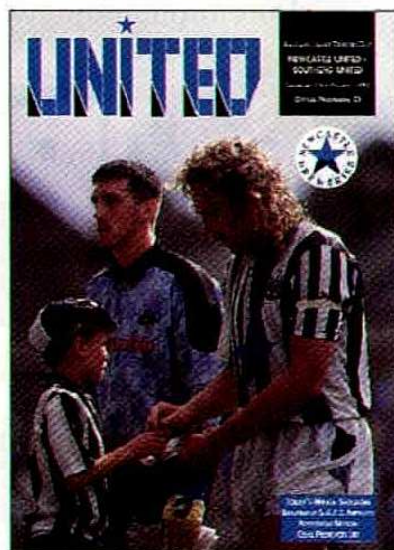

The match kicks off at 2.30 enabling the charter flight to get their and back in a day for an inclusive cost of £239.

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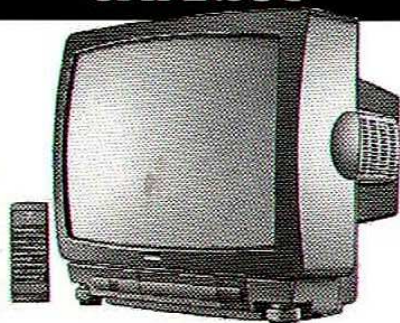

YOUNG Scot Peter Cormack has a long way to go before emulating his famous father - but he's learning fast at Newcastle.

Peter Cormack senior achieved international fame with Nottingham Forest, Liverpool and Scotland in the 1970s.

And when 18-year-old Peter junior joined United from Meadowbank Thistle for £10,000 this summer, Kevin Keegan wouldn't have objected if he had invested in a chip off the old block.

However, modest Peter says: "Oh I don't know about that. I'm still learning the game and I've a long way to go to match dad!"

Peter is currently out of action with a badly twisted ankle, but before that he made a string of appearances in both the reserve and junior sides.

And he is quick to pay tribute to the help he is getting at St James' Park.

"The coaches have taught me such a lot," he says. "And being at a big club like Newcastle with full-time training, you don't stop learning."

"On the pitch, too, players like Alan Neilson, Matty Appleby, Bjorn Kristensen and Darron McDonough have helped me along superbly."

Peter's dad is in Cyprus managing Aris of Limassol but plans a trip to Newcastle when he gets home to see how his son is getting on.

"I lived with the family in Cyprus for two years but they're in Edinburgh now, though my dad will be in Cyprus for a while longer," adds Peter.

"But he says he'll be down to watch me when he can."

Peter was missing from the reserves' last two games - the 1-0 home win over Stoke on October 21, and the 2-1 defeat at Sheffield United eight days later.

Stoke full back Tony Gallimore's second half own goal propelled United into fourth spot in the Pontins League before Sheffield United put a spoke in the wheel at Bramall Lane.

Blades carved up as Magpies bounce back

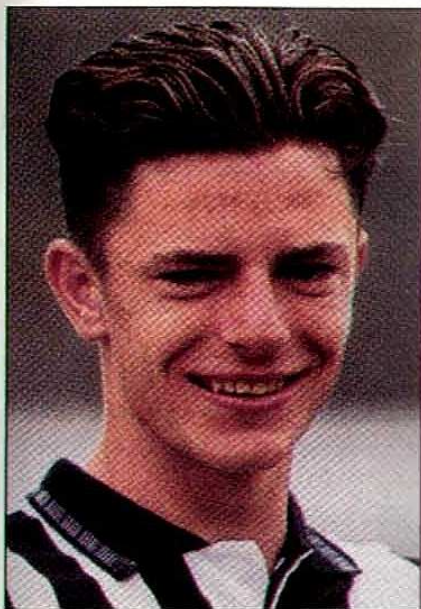
UNITED'S juniors seem to be more at home away... and the latest evidence came in last week's super victory at Sheffield United.

Colin Suggett's lads thumped the Yorkshire Club's young Blades 3-0 with goals from Alun Armstrong, John Watson and Richie Appleby, to move to within two points of third-placed Darlington.

And the result left us with the bizarre record of five away victories from seven Northern Intermediate League games - but only one win in four home League games! However, with a surfeit of home matches to make up, starting yesterday with the visit of Bradford City to Benwell, the youngsters are well placed for a tilt at the top.

If United hadn't lost to Scunthorpe, Darlington and leaders Barnsley at Benwell before breaking the jinx three weeks ago against Scarborough, they could have been on Barnsley's tail.

"Then John Watson scored a smashing individual goal, beating three or four players with skill and pace and scoring from the edge of the box.

"That took the pressure off us a bit, and we took better control with Richie Appleby scoring a tremendous goal to round it off."

United will be hoping to take their excellent away form into next Saturday's big match at second-placed Leeds. And they already have the psychological advantage of a League Cup first round victory over the Yorkshire side.

"If we can keep winning at Benwell to go with the good away form, we can get a run going," added Nelson, who said of the Middlesbrough game: "It was one of those matches where neither side deserved anything.

"It looked like it would be goalless until they snatched a couple in the second half. It was a disappointing performance at Middlesbrough because we know we can do better than that.

"Middlesbrough isn't our happiest hunting ground, for we also lost 4-0 there in the Youth Cup last season.

"But we have an early chance to bury the Boro bogey, for the draw for the League Cup quarter-final has paired us with... Middlesbrough away!"

way we have devised to encourage that ideal.

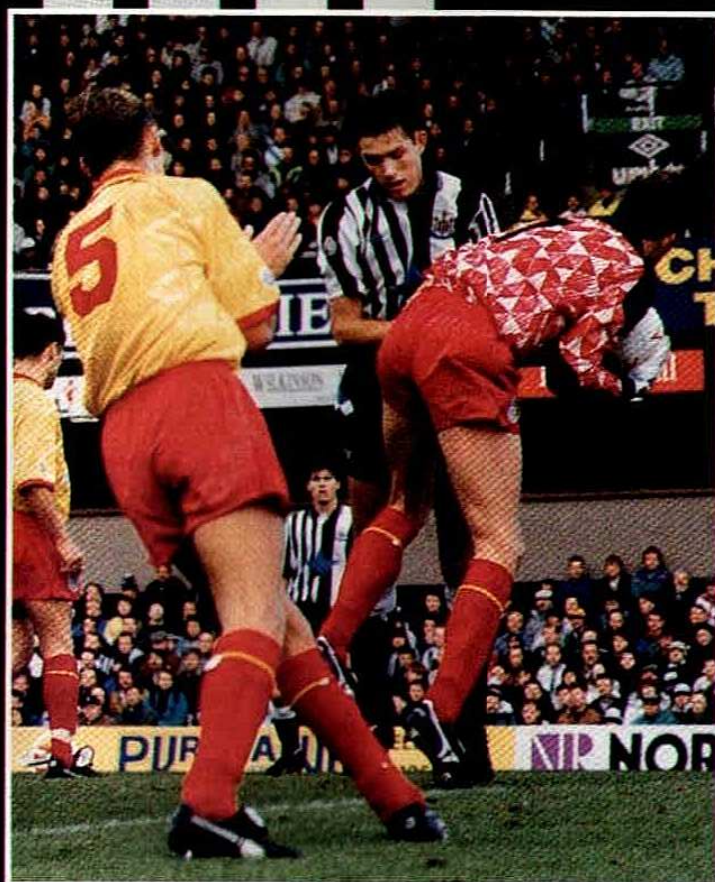
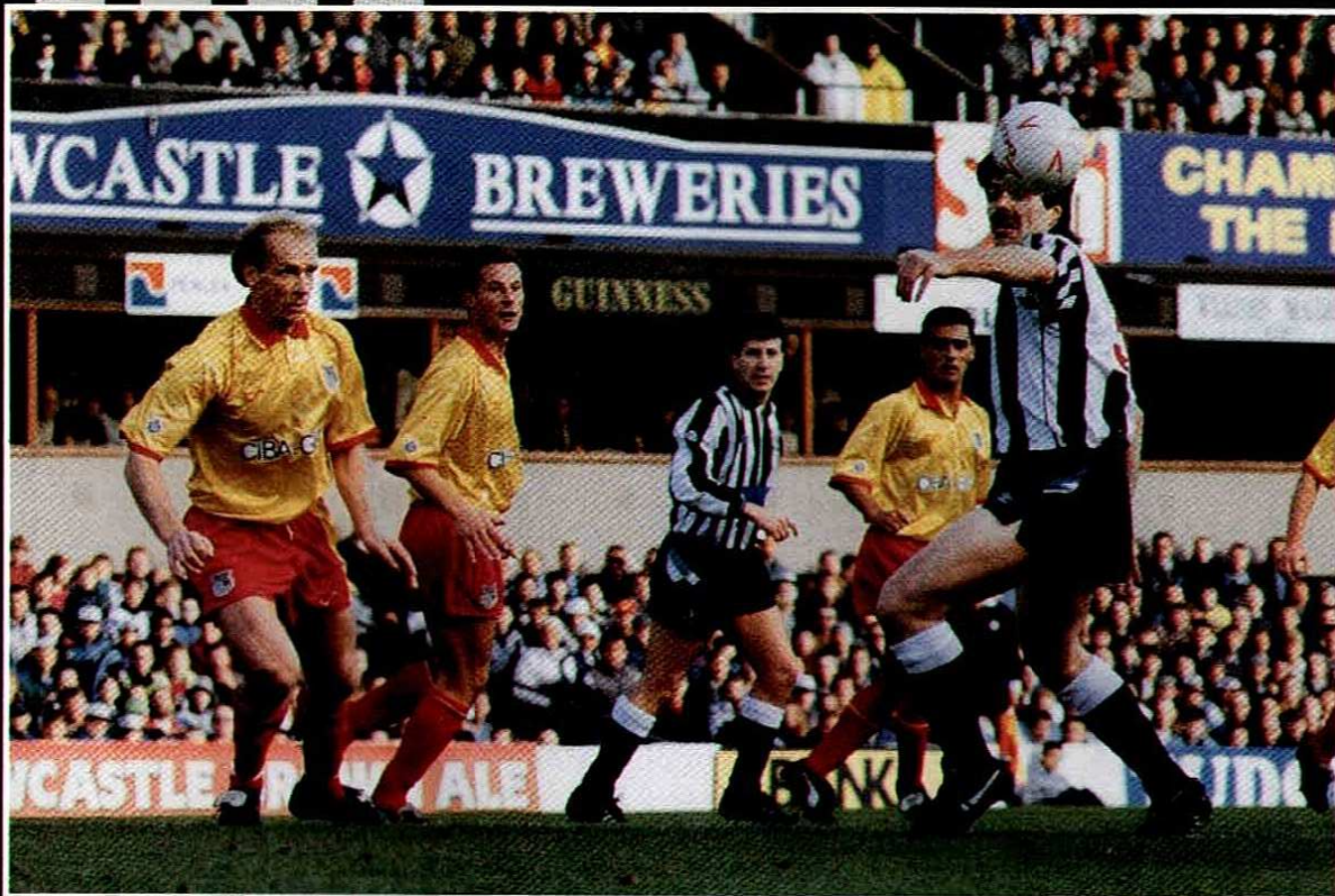
