

Our fortunes in the past couple of weeks have fluctuated starkly. Obviously the home defeat by Brentford knocked the wind out of our sails but though very disappointed with the result I was not so unhappy with the overall performance.

The lads played better in that game than they did against Barnsley when we won all three points. But then that's football.

The saddest thing for me was that Brentford punctured our home record. The way we have played here I was expecting us to go through the season unbeaten in the League at home.

That is not to be and it was nice to see that the lads did not let this hiccup get them down. The measure of any side, I believe, is how they respond after defeat. The way we played at Newcastle last Sunday was the perfect answer.

We couldn't have had a tougher examination than a trip to St James' Park. We met it head on and produced some of our best football of the year.

After looking a little brittle away from

home we are beginning to show a tighter side to our game. In successive away trips, at West Ham and Newcastle, we maintained clean sheets which is terrific. If we can establish this pattern then we are clearly in with a good chance of making progress.

We have people who can create and people who can score goals. So if we can also present a solid rearguard as well we are going to be a formidable force.

It is interesting to note that we have already played five of the top seven sides away from home - Millwall, Charlton, Wolves, West Ham and Newcastle - and are well situated in second place. We have to play them again but at home. So we are nicely set.

I believe that mentally we have broken a barrier we couldn't overcome last season when there is no doubt our away form cost us dearly. But if we are to capitalise on our



success away we must also be positive and ruthless at home. It is important for us to bounce back with three points this afternoon.

Everyone played exceptionally well at Newcastle but I must mention Micky Hazard who was a revelation. He played one of the best games I have ever seen him produce and rightly won the man of the match award.

Micky, Lingy and Nicky Summerbee controlled midfield and I think on the balance of play we just shaded the game. But it was a stimulating experience for some of the younger players like Kevin Horlock who will have benefited from the game. We made three mistakes which gave Newcastle opportunities but they didn't really create any clear-cut openings on their own.

That was a high-profile game but whether it is 30,000 or 3,000 people we are playing in front of we are still going for three points and this has to be the message this afternoon.

There are signs that we can keep churning out good performances and we must ensure that we do. Consistency is now the key word. Fingers crossed we will not be troubled by injuries for there are one or two positions for which we lack cover.

Finally, I am very pleased with the Barclays Division 1 Manager of the Month Award. It is my first and reflects the progress we have made this season. The focus is on me as I am the manager but this is as much a recognition of the work of John Gorman and Andy Rowland and all of the players to whom I express my grateful thanks.



good position to pounce on the promotion pacesetters and the way we're playing we always look like scoring goals."

Bristol Rovers, who currently find themselves at the foot of the table, have made a double swoop at Queens Park Rangers both Gary signing Waddock and Andrew Tilson from former Pirates boss Gerry Francis. Waddock has played over 200 games for the R's and a further 60 at Millwall and together with a spell on the continent at Charleroi and his experience should invaluable as prove Rovers fight off the threat of relegation. Both players had an unhappy debut as Rovers went down 5-1 at Wolves last Saturday.

Brentford beat fellow Londoners Charlton 2-0 at Griffin Park last week to lift them away from the bottom pack. Last season's promotion success was largely due to the striking partnership of Gary Blissett and the now departed Dean Holdsworth, who hit a creditable 51 goals between them. Bees' manager, Phil Holder, is pleased that Blissett has retained his-scoring touch, having already hit nine League goals this season, but says he is on the look out for a fresh face upfront. "Gary has taken

over where Holdsworth left off last season. Now that Dean has gone, we are struggling a bit because the rest of the team are not chipping in with enough goals. I'm definitely on the look out for someone new to partner Gary upfront."

Barnsley's inconsistent season continues with the Tykes struggling to climb away from the relegation zone. Barnsley followed a 5-1 win at Bristol Rovers last Wednesday with a 1-0 home defeat at the hands of Watford - themselves not able to string a series of results together. boss, Barnsley Mel Machin, has made the former Aston Villa reserve 'keeper, Lee Butler, the Yorkshire side's skipper, saying he has the qualities the side needs to lead them out of trouble. "From his position he can see everything happening on the field. He is a great character - the crowd love him - and he is brilliant in the dressing room."

The millionaire Wrublewski Brothers, who own the Bullets, are said to be putting together an International consortium to bid for control of City. Derby County were expected to continue their good form of late but slipped up at the Baseball Ground to high flying Millwall who stole all three points in a 2-1 win. Recent £2.5 million defender Craig Short explained why he thinks The Rams have now lost four out of six home games "If all our games were away we would win promotion. We are much more relaxed away from home as if the pressure is off us. In fact we haven't been beaten away from Derby since the end of August. 'We are still in a

These are troubled times for Southend United whose last victory in the First Division was recorded at Bristol City on September 12th.

Failure to take chances is the root cause of the Shrimpers demise according to manager Colin Murphy. In their opening 18 League and Cup games this season Southend have netted just 13 goals.

As Mr Murphy concedes. "Winning in football requires goals", but with last season's hot-shot, Brett Angell out with injury, they do not seem to have found an effective replacement.

Andy Ansah, second highest scorer last term with ten goals, has not provided the answer this season - three goals being his contribution so far. While lan Benjamin has had a slightly better time with six strikes to his name.

It all adds up to a difficult puzzle for Mr Murphy to sort out. For in general the Shrimpers collective play has been as good as most of their opponents and in Ansah and Benjamin they possess two exceptional talents.

Adam Locke is rated one of the best crossers in the business and with former Republic of Ireland winger. Kevin O'Callaghan, also on hand to supply the attack one would think they would be well served. But consistency is not really their hallmark and getting the best out of his gifted players remains one of Mr Murphy's headaches.

The line-up for the opening game at Newcastle. last August, featured: Sansome, Cornwell, Powell. Jones. Scully, Prior, Ansah, Locke, Martin, Benjamin and Sussex and most of them form the backbone of the current side.

Keith Jones was expected to be a key man but the former Brentford midfielder lost his place after three games and has only featured since on the substitutes' bench.

It has been a similar experience for Andy Sussex, a former Orient striker who joined Southend from Crewe, Andy will be 28 later this month and was hoping to establish himself this season in midfield.

Steve Brown, a prolific scorer in youth team football, is also on the fringe of selection. A centre forward of the traditional mould, he was given a starting role at Bristol Rovers in the Anglo Italian Cup, but at 18 this six- footer might have to bide his time before making the League line-up.

If fortune has not favoured the



Joined Crystal Palace from school but was released on a free and signed for Brentford, making his League debut for them as a sub v Fulham (24-3-89). Moved to Roots Hall in 1990 and scored goals in 82 League his appearances in two seasons. Born: Lewisham 19-3-69.

IAN BENJAMIN - Striker. A great character who took on the skipper's band when David Martin was injured last season. A former apprentice with Sheffield United he was introduced to League football at Cardiff in April 1979.

JOHN CORNWELL - Midfield. No stranger to the County Ground, John made 6 appearances for Town in 1988-89 season before transferring Southend for £45,000. Served his apprenticeship with Orient playing 202 League games for the O's following his debut at (8-5-82). Norwich summer of 1987 he moved

Newcastle United. Stands 6' 4". Born: Bethnal Green 13-10-64.

Central ANDY EDWARDS -Defender. - Enjoying his best getting just season after seven starts and two sub appearances in the League last season. Joined the Club from school and is seen as a tremendous prospect. Chiqwell 17-9-71.

ADAM LOCKE - Midfield. Signed on a free transfer from Crystal Palace, he is more of a wingman than conventional midfield player. Made only 10 League appearances last season - five as sub - which was disappointing after making 30 games the previous year. Born: Croydon 20-8-70.

SOUTHEND UTD

DAVID MARTIN - Central Defender. An East Ham lad who served his apprenticeship at Millwall, making his League debut at Rotherham in March 1980. Made 140 League appearances for the Lions in just over five years and spent two seasons with Wimbledon before moving to Southend in 1986. Captained the England Youth team and Southend. His loan spell with Colchester last season culminated with a Wembley appearance. Born: East Ham 25-4-63.

KEVIN O'CALLAGHAN - Winger. A teenage sensation when he made his League bow for Millwall at Charlton in March 1979, 'Cally' had played only 20 games, in Divisions Two and Three, when Ipswich invested £220,000 for his services in January 1980. Made over 140 senior appearances before moving on to Portsmouth for £90,000 in February '85. In June 1987, £80,000 took him back to the Den but he was unable to recapture his former magic. Joined Southend in the summer of 1991. Capped by Eire at Full (20), Under-21 (1) and Youth levels. Won FAYG Winners' medal with Millwall in 1979 and Division Two Championship in '88. Born: London 19-10-61.

GARY PARKINSON - Fullback. Currently on loan Middlesbrough, his home town Club - Gary has been drafted in to help strengthen the defence. On Everton's books as an amateur, Gary arrived at Ayresome Park in the summer of 1986 and made his League debut in the home game v Port Vale - which was played at Hartlepool - 28-8-86. Has now clocked up 198 League and 56 Cup games for 'Boro but has made just one appearance this season - against Ipswich. Born: Middlesbrough 10-1-68. -

CHRIS POWELL - Fullback. Left-sided player, established himself in the No 3 shirt the season before last. Started his career at Crystal Palace as a YTS lad and made the first of his three appearances for the Eagles against Barnsley on November 5th, 1988. Born: Lambeth 8-9-69.

SPENCER PRIOR - Central Defender. The fastest thing on two legs at Roots Hall over 100 metres, 'Spinner' has courted the attention of several big clubs. Still only 21 he is an ever-present this season. Born: Hockley 22-4-71.

PAUL SANSOME - Goalkeeper. Former Millwall apprentice who made his League debut for the Lions in a goal-less draw with Swindon at the Den in March 1982. Played 156 League games for Millwall before transferring to Southend in 1987-88 after a loan spell. Has been a consistent performer ever since and has signed a new three-year contract. Makes his 359th League appearance today. Born: N Addington 6-10-61.

PATRICK SCULLY - Central Defender. Another young Dubliner introduced to England by Arsenal - he joined the Gunners as a trainee in 1986. Won an FA Youth Cup Winners' medal. Played Gaelic games but skippered the Eire Schoolboy soccer team and has been capped at Under-21 level as well. Arrived at Southend in March 1991 after loan spells with Preston, Northampton and the Shrimpers. Born: Dublin 23-6-70.

STEVE TILSON - Midfield. Signed from Witham Town, Steve registered 19 goals in his first two seasons of League football. Not bad for a left-sided midfielder restricted by an internal injury. Comfortable on the ball, he is a classy performer. Born: Wickford 27-7-66.

THE MAN IN CHARGE



COLIN MURPHY has had a difficult introduction to his period as manager of Southend United - the team he inherited from Dave Webb at the end of last season.

But if it is down to experience then Colin can boast a wealth of it. As a player he served Cork Hibs, Wimbledon, Hastings United and Crystal Palace.

He went into coaching when his playing days were finished and held posts with Derby County, Nottingham Forest and Notts County.

At the Baseball Ground, Colin was installed as assistant manager and when manager Dave Mackay was axed in 1976, he took charge of the First Division side. His managerial reign lasted but a year - Tommy Docherty being drafted in as his replacement.

By then Colin was a well respected coach and it was no surprise when he landed the manager's chair at Lincoln City. There he laid the foundations for success taking the Imps into Division Three as runners-up in Division Four in 1981.

A spell in charge of Stockport County was followed by a return to Sincil Bank where he created another chapter in their history in 1988 by engineering their return to the Football League a year after the Club's shock exit on the last day of the 1986-87

At Southend he is ably assisted by Bob Houghton, the former Bristol City boss, who coached Malmo to the European Cup Final and has had experience in South Africa and North America as well.

Those were the days...

... looks back at previous connections with today's visitors

Southend were visitors to the County Ground thirty years ago this weekend, on November 17, 1962. On that day a youngster, just 17 years and 23 days old, was making his League debut for the Town. His name was Donald Rogers.

Donald was just one of many talented young players unearthed by Bert Head and his scouts in the late 1950s and early 60s. Bert gradually transformed a bunch of no-hopers - forced to apply for re-election to the old Third Division South two years in succession - into a side that took the Second Division by storm in the autumn of 1963. Swindon were second in the table when Southend visited the County Ground for a Third Round League Cup tie, Rogers opening the scoring in a 3-0 win.

The tide had begun to turn in 1957/58, when the Town put two abysmal seasons behind them and finished fourth in the new Third Division. They faced Southend twice within a week early that season and recorded a 'double', the first against the Shrimpers for nine years. United's Jim Duffy scored for both sides in a 3-2 defeat at Roots Hall and John Richards scored both goals as Swindon won 2-0 at the County Ground.

League doubles also followed for the Town in both 1958/59 and 1959/60. Richards grabbed another brace, this time at Southend in April 1959 and, in March 1960, David 'Bronco' Layne hit a hat-trick there as Swindon ran out 3-1 winners. The Town made it five wins in succession at Roots Hall in April 1962, when Cliff Jackson hit both goals in a 2-0 win, replicating the score and scorer of a season earlier.

But it wasn't always that easy for Swindon on their visits to the Essex resort. On the previous 11 trips since the war - most of which were to Southend Stadium they suffered eight defeats. The only victory was in a sevengoal thriller in January 1949. The Town raced into a 2-0 lead in 12 minutes, through Maurice Owen and Morris Jones, then conceded three goals in five minutes! Jimmy Bain then levelled the scores before Owen popped up again five minutes after the interval.

On November 5 that year, there were fireworks at the County Ground as the referee ruled out no less than four Swindon 'goals' for offside. Scores from Bain and Owen counted, but two from Joe Simner, and one each from Tommy Dawson and Owen did not. The game ended in a 2-2 draw.

Then, in February 1951, a quite amazing scoreline occurred at the Stadium. Roy Onslow and Owen again put the Town into an early two-goal lead, but the Shrimpers hit back with three goals in four minutes. Worse was to come - with another two conceded before half-time.

Tommy Tippett then then grabbed two more in three minutes to complete a hat-trick and send Swindon home on the end of an 8-2 hammering!

We finish where we started - on that November day 30 years ago. Southend did Swindon's promotion prospects no harm at all. Jack Smith, one of the senior players in the Town side that day, scored twice in the first ten minutes. Mike Summerbee and Jackson added two more for a 4-1 final score-line.

Two days later, the Shrimpers decided to strengthen their defence by signing former Swindon full-back John Neal from Aston Villa. John went on to make 99 League appearances before leaving Roots Hall in 1966. He quit the game to take a job at the Ford factory in Dagenham, but later returned to enjoy a successful spell in management with Wrexham, Middlesbrough and Chelsea.









ROFILE PLAYER

Martin Ling is no stranger to Southend United fans. He spent, what he described as "three fairly happy years" at Roots Hall after just three months on Swindon's books.

Says Martin: "Lou Macari brought me here but it did not take long to realise that I was not really his type of player. I think I made only four or five appearances and didn't really see eye to eye with his concept of the game. So when David Webb came in for me I was more than happy to move.

"Lou was satisfied. He got the £25,000 he had paid for me back. There was no real problem between us. I just didn't suit his style of play. They didn't play to feet, which is the way I like it. I'm not the sort of player that can feed off the bits ...

"It was strange. Lou had watched me for a year with Exeter City before he bought me so he must have known my game. But having got here he then tried to change me from my natural style to an up and down winger.

"Although I didn't request a transfer, the fact that I moved on after such a short time at the Club put, I'm sure, a question mark above my head. People at other clubs suspected my character. It took some time to overcome that and prove that I'm not a trouble maker.

"I could have stayed here and fought for a place in the team. The move to Southend although it came out of the blue was a great surprise and was in the end as much my decision as it was Lou's."

With the Shrimpers, Martin found his style was utilised well. He says: "We had some good times. David Webb was very strong on man-management and handled all the players very well. He was a great motivator; didn't worry too much about the tactical side of things but could get the best out of you.

"He never settled on a side. He kept everyone on their toes by bringing players in. You knew you had to perform to keep your place.

"When I joined the Club they were in the Fourth Division and when I left they were in the Second. So he must have done a good job. My role was usually as a right-winger but sometimes I played just behind the front two...l was second top scorer when we were promoted from the Fourth.

"My problems started when I felt the new contract I was offered fell short. I refused the terms and spent my last very unhappy season there on a week to week contract."

It may seem strange that after his previous experience at Swindon, Martin should decide to return to the County Ground in 1991.

He grins: "It wasn't the same Swindon. Ossie was in charge and he put my mind at ease. It was like coming to a totally different club."

Yet any assurances Martin had been given were quickly thrown into uncertainty as he explains: "I signed for Ossie on the Thursday deadline day and was looking forward to the new challenge. You can imagine the horror when I picked up a paper on Sunday morning to read the headlines - Bye Bye Ossie - I thought knowing my luck Lou would be back!

"But it has all blossomed from then on. I had six weeks to try and prove that I could play in the Second Division. I played a few games with Glenn in the reserve team and slowly won him over."

"Glenn's idea is total football but he does not try to achieve this without planning. From the first day he arrived he set out a system he wanted to follow. Every member of the team has a job to do within that framework. He encourages us to be expressive and we change our tactics for individual games. But we all know what is expected of us in our particular jobs.

"I have been used in midfield and prefer this role. On the wing you rely so much on the others for supply. In the middle you can be more influential and make things happen.

"I think we have a better chance for promotion this year than we had last. Craig has come in for Duncan and done the same job scoring goals - and the rest of us learned a lot from last season's

"All games are important to us but this is a big one for me. I was injured and missed both games against Southend last season so this, hopefully, will be my first game against Southend since I left them...I owe them one for that last terrible year at Roots Hall."





Everybody complimented us


after the game on how comfortable the lads were on the ball and it must have made our travelling fans really happy after they had made the long trek north. Their support as always was great and appreciated by all.

The 'Posh' have not had a happy home record this season but last Saturday they ran Sunderland ragged with a moral boosting 5-2 victory.


It was a three-goal burst in a four minute spell in the secondhalf that took the wind out of Sunderland's sail. But we will be looking to achieve better things on our first visit there for

Micky Hazard -Scored well against the Rams.





"It's a funny old game." There we were poised to narrow the gap between ourselves and Newcastle

United to three points when WHAM! The hoped for, nay, expected victory over Brentford evaporated into tears of defeat.

While Newcastle had shown great passion Swindon, we were told, looked the classier side.

A share of the points in the Magpies den was a moral victory for the Robins...In just under a week the mood had changed from flatness to a high octane expectation. Swindon Town were back in business and looking like champions.


At this moment in time today's game is the most important of the season. To maintain our


Glenn Hoddle - Picks up his first Division 1 Manager's award.

They say behind every great man is a woman. Likewise behind every great football manager is a top-rate number two.

Here at the County Ground, the Glenn Hoddle/John Gorman partnership is proving highly successful - the two men exploiting a long and deep friendship that dates back to 1976 when they first met up as players at Tottenham Hotspur.

What is so intriguing about this duo is their likeness. Other famous managerial combinations, such as Clough and Taylor, pair chalk with cheese; both men playing off each other's strengths to produce a united front. But for Hoddle and Gorman it is very much a case of two men on the same wavelength strengthening each others resolve by supportive gesture.

Glenn of course is a big star in his own right and as such maintains a high profile not matched by John. But to suggest that Glenn provides the inspiration and John the organisation and grit is way off the beam. It is a common misconception none the less.

Indeed, John gets rightly frustrated when he is not given credit for his artistic input. For it seems that even as a leftback in his playing days he always put the emphasis on attack.

I was quite rightly put straight when I suggested to John that he had been a terrier type fullback... "There you are, " he shouted across to Glenn. "They all think I was a hard-man.

"I never was. Never crunched anybody in my career...! was more of a stealer. Jockeyed opponents then nipped the ball from them. I was brought up at Celtic one way. That was to attack and play short little balls into colleagues."

At Parkhead, John, who hails from Winchburgh in West Lothian, was on the groundstaff alongside Lou Macari, Kenny Dalglish and David Hay. "There were some great players there then," he recalls. "They called us the 'Quality Street Gang'. We'd get 15,000 fans along to watch a reserve game against Rangers."

John was 21 when he arrived at Carlisle in a £20,000 transfer in 1970. He helped the 'Cumbrians' to promotion in 1974 and claim First Division status a year later and recalls well that famous win at Stamford Bridge which shot Carlisle to the top of the old First Division after six games.

"Les O'Neill scored our winner at Chelsea," says John. "He's now scouting for us.

"I thoroughly enjoyed my first three years with Carlisle but then I wanted to improve my position. It took time and I regret that I was 27 when I arrived at Tottenham Hotspur."

John had played in 229 League games for the Brunton Park side. He was to make only 30 appearances for Spurs before his contract was cancelled in March 1979.

Two major knee operations had spiked his ambitions but not his heart. Having made yet another comeback in the opening game of the 1978-79 season, when Ardiles and Villa made their debuts, John broke down again. But hard work and the faith shown by Gordon Jago, who took him to Tampa Bay Rowdies, added another four-and-

a-half years to his playing career. Towards the end of his time in the USA, John ran his own soccer camps and when Keith Peacock returned to England to take charge of Gillingham, John was the man he brought back to coach the youth and reserve sides.

After a similar post with Leyton Orient, John felt it was time to take charge himself and applied for the manager's chair at Carlisle. Glenn had given him a reference and he had just attended an interview when Glenn rang and said forget it. I want you with me at Swindon.

So began the partnership of the unlikely lads, a double act that threatens to top the bill in years to come.


"We just feel the same way about football," says John. "We appreciate the same aspects, want to play the game the same way. Glenn is the boss but he allows me to contribute my own ideas."


John, of course, takes control of training as Glenn has to work as a player. But is he a hard task master?

"Not really..! shout a lot more than Glenn but my bark is worse than my bite. We demand full commitment from the lads in training and on match days. That is only right.

"We have some really great pros too. They really love their work and take pride in their jobs...We spend a lot of time on basics; control, passing and touch because if you master these the rest becomes easier. We are going to keep working at it. This is the foundation of good football and good footballers."

John might shun publicity and dismiss the media interest with the observation that they have not won anything yet. But I'm sure we are privileged to be at the start of what could blossom into one of the most exciting management teams of the next decade.
