



Next Monday evening Swindon Town will become one of the few Football League clubs to appear live during the season not only on I.T.V. but also on satellite television when our F.A. Cup third round tie with Queens Park Rangers will be beamed live throughout the British Isles on BSkyB's SKY SPORTS channel.

SKY are presenting their live shows in a way which is revolutionising football on television.

Never before have viewers been able to feel part of the management team in the dug outs on matchday. Now with SKY's space-age gadgetry armchair viewers are able to hear every appeal and instruction yelled by the manager.

State of the art cameras ensure that the viewer enjoys the matchday atmosphere with improved shots of the action from new viewing angles.

SKY have their own team of strikers - a disco dance team who perform on the pitch prior to evening kick offs and have certainly sent many temperatures rising waiting for the teams to appear!

When the game is over supporters can expect sparks to fly irrespective of the result with SKY's firework finale.

Top journalist Martin Tyler is SKY's number one match commentator. A one time striker with Corinthian Casuals, Martin began working as a soccer journalist in the hope of extending his playing career. He was initially offered a job with I.T.V. and has not looked back!

Martin is now in his 19th season as a commentator and says "It is a great way to earn a living. For me every game is like crossing a minefield. The final whistle goes and you look to see how many limbs you have left. Anything can go wrong during the game but what makes it

particularly satisfying is when everything comes together and you find the right words to go with the right pictures."


Martin devotes a full day's research to each game and anticipates that this season he will travel at least 50,000 miles throughout Europe covering games. We are pleased to welcome Martin and his colleagues from SKY to this evening's game who are here getting the low down on the Club in preparation for Monday night's clash.

Joining Martin on the gantry at Loftus Road will be former Scottish International Andy Gray. He began commentating on games in Scotland and a producer invited him to join the old BSB in 1989. He defends his style by saying "Football is the most passionate sport in the world and contains every conceivable emotion. If you do not display that something is missing."

It means all those unable to travel to the game can look forward to Swindon Town joining the SKY revolution on satellite or indeed here in Wiltshire on Swindon Cable next week.

As Tyler agrees "Both sides know how to play football and while we have been able to show some excellent football to date on SKY this game will show that there are some great sides outside of the Premier League".



Our last game before Christmas was very disappointing in terms of


the result. We gifted Leicester two

We are still very much involved in the promotion race so there is no major crisis. The way things are balanced a couple of wins can move you into the top three.



Newcastle United manager Kevin Keegan sold striker Mick Quinn to Coventry City and promptly went scouting for a replacement by watching a video. For while Keegan was watching the Geordies draw 2-2 with Cesena in the Anglo Italian Cup a possible replacement for Quinn, Dutch International Eric Viscaal was in action for Holland in their 3-1 World Cup qualifying win over Turkey. Keegan videotaped the Dutch game to see Viscaal put in a good performance for his country. Says Keegan "Eric is number one on my list but that does not mean will automatically come here. Dealing with agents foreign players is difficult. But there are precious few strikers available in this country".

Bobby Ferguson has thrown down the gauntlet to Sunderland's Welsh International Colin Pascoe. He has told Goodman to get more goals! Pascoe is back on Wearside after a loan period with Swansea City and the Roker No. 2 has said that Pascoe should be knocking the door down to get into the first team. Said Ferguson "Colin has not had the best of luck with injuries but technically he is an excellent player." Still smarting from

their 4-0 defeat in the local derby with neighbours Rovers, Bristol City went to Italy to earn their first point in the Anglo Italian Cup with a 2-2 draw at Cremonese. Striker Leroy Rosenior equalised in the 88th minute providing the climax to a four goal blitz in the final 13 minutes. Andy Cole gave City the lead after 78 minutes in the mist shrouded Giovanni Zini Stadium. However, three minutes later their joy was iolted when Cremonese striker Marco Bruzzano levelled the scores. Disaster struck soon after when keeper Keith Welch brought down Matius Florianic who scored from the spot.

Birmingham City boss Terry Cooper blasted his players after they crashed out of the Cup going down 3-0 at Lucchese, the game played in front of a mere 139 spectators. Cooper, who saw striker John Gavle sent off after an off the ball clash with Daniel Delicari fumed "With a chance to qualify for the semi-finals I would have thought the players would have really gone for it. Footballers get paid well and it makes you wonder about the standard of the players at the moment. Birmingham fell behind to a 7th minute Searo Bettarini goal after captain David Rennie gave the ball away in midfield. Goals from Roberto Paci and a penalty from Macimo Rastelli compounded Birmingham's agony.

The Managers Association want talks with senior police officers after Bobby Gould pulled out of BSkyB's commentary team for the F.A. Cup second round replay between his

former club West Bromwich Albion and Wycombe Wanderers on police advice. Recently John Bond had to stay away from Shrewsbury's Cup match at Burnley. The Association's new Chief Executive Frank Clark said "We say we will not give into the I.R.A. and yet the police say they cannot guarantee the safety of a manager at a football match "Clark himself was advised by police in May 1987 to lose agame at Burnley. He said "It was after John Bond had left and Leyton Orient had to play at Turf Moor on the last Saturday of the season. We had to win to get into the playoffs and Burnley needed to win to stay in the League. As it was Burnley won and are still here today but we cannot give into these yobs".

Birmingham City up for sale and the doldrums following promotion last season, really are feeling the blues at the moment. Defeat at Derby County earlier this month extending a slump to six successive League defeats.

The first shock came when Chairman Samesh Kumar's business bit the dust. It was his financial input that had kept the Club afloat but the Official Receiver gave clearance for City to continue trading, and the block on transfer deals was lifted.

Good news indeed for a club that started the season so brightly with wins over Notts County, Cambridge United. Grimsby Town and Southend United but then lost its way when finances dictated the sale of Nigel Gleghorn to Stoke City and Mark Cooper - the son of manager Terry - to Fulham.

It could have been worse too had not the projected £350,000 transfer of star midfielder John Frain to Sunderland not fallen through.

Further problems evolved when both goalkeepers, Martin Thomas and Andy Gosney, were ruled out by injuries. It was Aston Villa who came to their aid, agreeing to let Les Sealey move

to St Andrews on loan.

Indeed, the worrying financial position dictated that manager Terry Cooper could strengthen his side by recruiting players on loan and he seemed to have pulled off a real steal when he persuaded Southampton to release David Speedie for such a move.

But the fiery Scot does not seem to have ignited the Blues' touch paper as yet. Birmingham City, who were neck and neck with Newcastle United in September. entered the Christmas programme too close to the relegation zone for comfort.

Speedie and John Gayle are the City danger men but they rely on the service provided by winger Ian Rodgerson. Simon Sturridge, the young forward who contributed 10 goals in the promotion campaign, is another who might be a contender for a place. The 23-year-old broke into the team in the 1988-89 season and at his best is absolutely superb. But he lacks consistency and has found himself on the fringe.

In front of Les Sealey, Graham Potter, Trevor Matthewson and Darren Rogers have featured prominently with John Frain, who can also operate in midfield, and Paul Homes. the former Doncaster and Torquay United fullback now in his first season at St Andrews. Terry Fenwick,




signed on a non-contract basis last month, is adding much needed class and experience. Martin Hicks, once of Charlton Reading's Player of the Year last season, has also staked his claim, as has Paul Mardon who has won promotion with both Bristol City and Birmingham.

In midfield, Paul Tait has been rated at £1 million, while David Rennie provides the industry and Louie Donowa the width. The introduction of Paul Peschiusolido signed from Toronto Blizzards is an interesting development.

IAN CLARKSON - Fullback. Won a regular place in the Blues side in 1990-91 having worked his way through the junior ranks. Had clocked up 108 League appearances by the start of this season. Born: Birmingham 4.12.70.

LOUIE DONOWA - Forward. Much-travelled player who won England Under-21 honours while playing First Division football with Norwich City. Well balanced with good control, he loves to take defenders on. Played on loan for Stoke before venturing abroad where he performed with Coruna then Willem II, before returning to join Ipswich. Made 23 League appearances for Town and 24 for Bristol City. Born: Ipswich 24.9.64.

TERRY FENWICK - Defender. Recently signed from Tottenham Hotspur for whom he has made 88 League appearances. Served his apprenticeship with Crystal Palace, making his League bow in December 1977 in a 2-2 draw at White Hart Lane. In 1981 he moved to QPR (256 League games) where he spent eight years. Won 20 England caps. Born: Camden, Co Durham 17.11.59.

JOHN FRAIN - Midfield/Defender. Local lad who has developed through the Club's youth scheme. Made his League debut at Newcastle United in April 1986 and had scored 15 goals in 172 League outings by the close of last season. Born: Birmingham 8.10.68.

JOHN GAYLE - Striker. Wimbledon picked John up from Burton Albion but he scored just two goals in 20 League games for the Dons and joined the Blues in

November 1990. Six months later he scored twice at Wembley in the Leyland DAF Cup Final win over Tranmere. Born: Birmingham 30.7.64.

TREVOR MATTHEWSON

-Defender. Strong in the air Trevor was an apprentice with Sheffield Wednesday but made just three League appearances. Established himself at Newport County and had spells with Stockport County and Lincoln City before arriving at St Andrews in 1989. Scored 6 League goals last season. Born: Sheffield 12.2.63.

DEAN PEER - Midfield. Started this season on 107 League games having missed much of last season's campaign through injury. Made his League debut at Hull in September 1986 after joining City on the YTS. Born: Dudley 8.8.69.

BIRMINGHAM CITY

DAVID RENNIE - Midfield. Joined the Blues midway through last season from Bristol City with whom he played 104 times in the League. Had chalked up 101 games for Leeds United before that and 21 with Leicester City who he joined as an apprentice in 1982. Made his debut at WBA 3.9.83. Born: Edinburgh 29.8.64.

IAN RODGERSON - Midfield. Scoring midfielder who joined Birmingham from Cardiff City where he was deployed in a more defensive role. Began his career with Hereford United in 1984 after they signed him from Pegasus Juniors; and made his League debut at Crewe in August '85. The Blues third top scorer behind Gleghorn and Sturridge last season with 12. Born: Hereford 9.4.66.

DARREN ROGERS

-Defender. A trainee at The Hawthorns, he made just 14 League appearances for the Albion. Was released by Ossie Ardiles on a free transfer this year and has already made more appearances for the Blues. Born: Birmingham 9.4.71

LES SEALEY - Goalkeeper. On loan from Aston Villa he is much respected and experienced professional. Les made his League debut for Coventry at QPR in April 1977 and in eight years added another 157 games. Became a Luton player in 1983 (207 League appearances) and went on loan to Plymouth and Manchester United. While at Old Trafford he was thrust into the United side for the FA Cup Final replay against Crystal Palace in 1990. His Wembley winning display earning him a

contract and 31 League outings with United, plus a European Cup Winners' Cup Medal in 1991. Joined Aston Villa on a free in July 1991. Played 2 games on loan with Coventry last season. Born: Bethnal Green 29.9.57.

DAVID SPEEDIE - Striker. Currently on loan from Southampton who he joined this season from Blackburn Rovers. Came into football with Barnsley in October 1978 Wigan). (V Moved Darlington in 1980 and to Chelsea for £70,000 in '82. Won Second Division winners medal in 1984 and 3 years later signed with Coventry. In January 1991 Kenny Dalglish paid £675,000 to take him to Liverpool. Moved to Blackburn for £500,000 in 1991 and created the goal that won them the play-off final at Wembley, Capped 10 times by Scotland. Born: Glenrothes 20.2.62.

PAUL TAIT - Midfield.
Returned to first team action in late 1991 after ten months out with a broken leg. A trainee with the Blues, he started this season with 54 League games to his name (5 goals). Stands 6'1". Born: Sutton Coldfield 31.7.71.

THE MAN IN CHARGE



TERRY COOPER will be remembered as an attacking leftback who shared some of Leeds United's greatest moments.

Born in Castleford on 12 July 1944, Terry's playing career embraced Leeds United, Middlesbrough, Bristol City and Bristol Rovers as well as Doncaster Rovers.

Terry scored a memorable winning goal for Leeds United against Arsenal in the 1968 League Cup Final at Wembley and also, won UEFA Cup winners medals with the Yorkshire side in 1968 and 1971 as well as a League championship in 1968 and runners-up awards in the FA Cup of 1970.

In 1980-81 Terry became a player-manager with Bristol Rovers and amongst his achievements as a manager he helped Bristol City to promotion to Division Three and Exeter City to the Fourth Division Championship in 1990.

Played for Bristol City between 1982 and 1988 becoming the oldest player to represent the Club at 40 years 86 days in October 1984. Was then appointed assistant manager before eventually taking over from Joe Jordan.

Capped 20 times by England, Terry was installed as Birmingham City's manager in August 1991 leading the Blues to promotion in his first season in which he twice won the Barclays Manager of the Month

Those were the days...

... looks back at previous connections with today's visitors

Our visitors have changed names twice since the time of the first transfer between the two clubs, just before the turn of the century. In those far off days, our opponents were known as Small Heath - and that first player was a winger named Jack Kirton.

Jack signed for Small Heath from bottom-of-the-League Lincoln City in May 1897. He had been top goalscorer at Sincil Bank and so the fee was £100! He scored on his debut - a 3-1 away win at Burton Swifts - and again in his second game, but could manage only two more for the season. Jack came to the County Ground for 1898/99 and hit seven goals in 20 appearances, a figure which no Town player could better. He was on his travels again a year later, deciding to try his luck in the north east with Sunderland. But he failed to make a League appearance there and returned to Swindon in the summer of 1900. Again he stayed just one term before moving on, this time to Millwall Athletic.

There was an even earlier connection between the clubs in Billy Rose, an England goalkeeper in the 1890's. Professionalism had yet to be born when he assisted both Small Heath and Swindon Town in their early years. Billy was a member of the famous amateur club Swifts before helping out at Preston, Stoke and Wolves - where he collected an F.A. Cup winners medal in 1893.

Small Heath had given way to Birmingham (City was added later) by the time Johnny Kidd arrived at St Andrews in October 1910, from former Scottish League club Third Lanark, An inside-forward, Kidd also spent two seasons with the Town, sandwiched between two spells at Cathkin Park. He signed for Swindon in June 1906 and is said to have been instrumental in the club gaining the services of Jock Walker - a future Scotland international - a year

Birmingham born George Travers was another to assist the Town in their Southern League days. George, real name James, served ten clubs in as many seasons either side of the Great War. Birmingham signed him from Bilston United and gave him his Football League debut at Leeds City in October 1908. But he was released without making a furfher appearance

and moved across the city to join Aston Villa. There he hit a hat-trick on his debut in a 3-0 Boxing Day win over Bury. Again, his stay was brief, linking up with Queens Park Rangers at the end of the season.

Subsequent moves took George to Leicester Fosse, Barnsley and Manchester United before he enlisted for Swindon after the hostilities in 1919. Fourteen goals made him second highest goal scorer in the Town's final season in the Southern League. He was on his way again before they had kicked a ball in the new Third Division, moving to Millwall in June 1920. Within four months, a further move had taken him to Norwich, where he ended 1920/21 as leading scorer. His final League club was Gillingham, Reading being the venue for his last League appearance February 1922.



PLAYER PROFILE

Colin Calderwood has a burning ambition to lead Swindon Town to the promised land. He's been there before of course, our victorious skipper in the Wembley Play-Off Final that saw Swindon Town win through to the old Division One. But the dream, though achieved, suddenly turned to a nightmare as the Football League relegated the club, before a ball was kicked, for off the field irregularities.

Sunderland were the benefactors of this injustice that penalised not only the players but the fans as well; and as time passes by Colin admits the pain becomes more acute.

He says: "The more you think about it the more it gets under your skin. We earned the right to play in the top division but were not allowed ... I think if I never get to play in the Premier League then this will be one to kick the dog over."

It's not the first time Colin has missed out on the big one either. When he was a young starlet with the Ayr United Boys Club, he was taken out of the Under-15 side to do a special marking job on a Kilmarnock forward in the U-18 semi-final of the Scottish FA Youth Cup. So effective was he that he helped his team win through to the final. Alas, it was a final that was never played for opponents St Mirren were tossed out of the competition after fielding an ineligible player in their semi-final and Ayr were awarded the Cup by default.

"We got our medals but it was a bit of a blow because the final was to be played at Hampden Park," reflects Colin.

At 15 a Scout recommended the Glaswegian to Ipswich Town and it was arranged for him to travel to Suffolk for a trial run in the school holidays. But his hope was shattered by a telephone call from Portman Road cancelling the intended trip. He says: "I never even got out of Stranraer.

Mansfield Town got wind of the exciting young Scot and duly forwarded an invitation. "There were just ten lads on trial," says Colin, "which was much better. You felt you had a real chance to impress."

Impress he did, Mick Jones - now assistant manager at Notts County - taking him on. Soon afterwards Jones was sacked and for a little while Mansfield were guided by Stuart Boam.

Says Colin: "When Ian Greaves arrived as manager we really took off. Ian was very professional and organised the side well. He sorted things out. We had a run of eight games in which we conceded just one goal.

"I enjoyed my football under him but when my contract ran out I took the advice of Steve Whitworth and refused to sign a new one without a signing-on fee. Steve said whatever they offered turn it down."

"It wasn't the best advice. I found myself back in Scotland twiddling my fingers. Then out of the blue I received a phone call from Lou Macari. Dave Caldwell - on loan at Swindon - had recommended me.

"The clubs couldn't agree a fee and it went to a tribunal. Ian wouldn't speak to me and hasn't since. He was furious about the outcome. But I felt I had done the right thing for myself. Being a Scot Lou's name was a big incentive to come.

"My move here was an introduction to fitness Lou's pre-season programme was about equal to that at Mansfield but he never eased up. It wasn't unusual for us to put in a seven-mile run on a Thursday morning. We hardly ever won on a Saturday after one of those. "To be honest it was all I knew and to be fair we did reasonably well under him. But I felt a lot of the time we got results despite Lou and his punishing training sessions.


"When Ossie came it was revelation such a contrast. Glenn has continued the good work and made everyone here better individual players than they were when he arrived. He is a better organiser too yet we are conceding far too many goals.

"Under Ossie we used to go away and win. I'm positive this present team can do the same. We played open attacking football then and we do now. but we need another three or four away victories to measure up to our achievements when we won the play-offs.

"It is very enjoyable working here. As I say I have become a better footballer because of it. I don't know about being more skilled but I'm definitely more comfortable on the ball

"What is a skilful player anyway? According to the FA doctrine as presented by Charles Hughes it is a player who uses the right technique in the right circumstances ... You can make what you want out of that."

In the meantime Colin has gained his full FA Coaching badge and intends to go into that side of the game when his playing days are over ... First there is a little matter of promotion to address.





I must confess to being somewhat surprised when I realised that we meet Birmingham City for the 11th time in

the League tonight. The Blues seem synonymous with the name of League football and indeed they have participated in this competition since 1894. Yet our paths did not cross until November 1969.

City might not boast a glittering assortment of silverware to reflect their past which is perhaps best remembered through the galaxy of great names who have graced their famous shirt.

Though our association with the St Andrews Club is relatively modern, Town fans most definitely have good cause to remember probably the greatest player ever to represent Birmingham City.

Trevor Francis was a mere strippling of 16 when he took the field at the County Ground on the 27th February 1971. It was only his 11th League appearance yet he already had 10 goals to his name, including all four in a 4-0 eclipse of Bolton Wanderers the week before.

Against Town he was to demonstrate again just why he was being hailed as a teenage prodigy.

A phenomenal talent. Trevor's sharpness was unmatchable. His speed, control and superb turning

there were few more deadly in front of goal.

Ask Roy Jones, our goalkeeper that afternoon. He was beaten twice by the Mercurial Francis as Birmingham beat Swindon 2-1, to wipe out Chris Porter's strike.

Francis had demonstrated again the lost art of dribbling. He was only 19 when he clocked up his 100th League game, against Everton, in October 1973. In February 1979 he became the first £1 million player in English football when Brian Clough paid what was then nearly twice the British record fee to take him to Nottingham Forest.

Trevor had netted 118 goals in 280 League games for the Blues before scoring the winner for Forest in the European Cup Final. He still makes a telling contribution now when he comes on for Sheffield Wednesday where he is player-manager.

If Francis was the pearl of all Birmingham City's players he certainly has not been the only charismatic figure. When it comes to names few can rival that of Caesar Augustus Llewellyn Jenkvns!

With a monicker like that Jenkyns needed to be a big lad and he most certainly was. Described at the time as a 'man mountain' he was a centre-half of enormous physique and power. Feared for his body-crunching shoulder charges one story recalls an opponent hit by him in the centre of the field flying some 30-yards before coming to rest by the wire rope surrounding the playing area.

It was said he could head a ball half the length of a football field and kick a 'dead' ball from one end of the pitch to the other.

The moustachio'd Jenkyns earned undying fame as the captain who led Small Heath into the Football League. A formidable sight and inspirational leader he also skippered Wales and later Woolwich Arsenal, Newton Heath and Walsall.

City's illustrious history is littered with characters and tales like these. Cyril Trigg, a debutant at 17, who though noted as a fullback turned in his finest display at centre-forward when the 'Blues' beat Manchester City 5-0 in the Cup in 1947 ... Goalkeeper "Pouncer" Will Edden - the original "Gil Merrick". Clean shaven in an era of whiskers he was as sharp as his razor when it came to reflexes.

In more recent times Jimmy Bloomfield, Trevor Hockey, Barry Bridges, Bob Latchford, Kenny Burns and Howard Kendall have all played their part in City's history. not to mention David Seaman who became the most expensive goalkeeper in the world when Arsenal paid QPR £1.25 million for his services.

The Tranmere Rovers game ended in smoke and confusion as overheated cables in the floodlight switch room forced our electricians to cut the power and black out the County Ground.

It was a dramatic chapter for us all, but Stadium manager Mike Hughes has the biggest headache. On a match day Mike dons the hat of the Club's Safety Officer. As the title suggests Mike is responsible for the safety and well being of all of us here in the stadium; a responsibility that in the wake of the Hillsborough disaster is not taken lightly.

Mike explains: "We had three electricians on duty that day. Our normal match-day man plus two lighting engineers who are working on the installation of our new floodlighting system.

"Before the game it was spotted that the PVC sleeve on the main cable was heating. We advised the referee of the problem and he was quite happy for us to leave it as late as possible before switching on the floodlights.

"Just to make sure there were no major scares we stationed two stewards, who are trained fire marshalls, to keep an eye on things in the switch room. Everything seemed to be going fine until the second half when smoke was emitted from the cable. We had no alternative but to cut the power to prevent a fire.

"Attempts to rectify the problem proved negative. They pulled the thing apart and found the cables were welded together. The referee could only abandon the game.

"Suggestions that the system was overloaded by the new installation are false. The problem was deeper seated than this. It was just waiting to happen. It could have occurred at any time."

Quite a day then for Mike and the rest of the Stadium Staff as well as for referee Norman Ludlow who arrived at the ground as the senior linesman but was thrust into the middle to take charge of his first League game when the appointed official, Howard King, fell ill before the kick-off.

Regretable as the whole episode was it did prove a genuine test of the Club's safety precautions which stood the examination well. The efficient manner in which Jon Pollard and his staff reacted in issuing vouchers to all the supporters in attendance is worthy praise and a testament to the professional way the Club is now run.

Mike, 39, has supported the club since 1963 - when we were promoted - and was recruited to the staff as a maintenance engineer in 1984. His brief was somewhat broadened

with Colin Benson

after the Taylor Report advised clubs to appoint their own safety officers.

Says Mike: "The police were blamed for the Hillsborough tragedy and since then have begun to put the onus back on the clubs. I am the liaison between Swindon Town and the Wiltshire Constabulary and have a great understanding with Glen Symes and 'Ernie' Wise who do all they can to accommodate our wishes.


"I am responsible for the stewarding and represent the club on the Safety Committee which comprises the County and Borough Council Officials as well as members of the three emergency services.

"I must mention Barry Crewe, Stan Fryer, Peter Smith and Rob Richens who get the less glamorous jobs but are essential to the running of the stadium. They do a tremendous job.

"We are always looking to develop the ground where possible. The extension to the North Stand seating is an example and the new floodlight system ... we will see hopefully tonight

"I recall when Glenn first took over as manager he came out for an evening match and told me to put the lights on full power ... I said 'they are'. He just couldn't believe it."

The new floodlights are costing £38,000 and replace the existing system which was installed in 1975. When fully operational we know that Glenn and the lads will be able to see their way to goal.

Fifteen minutes from time the home side equalised to send the crowd home well pleased having kept their record intact.


We looked a little bit rusty on the night and were certainly thankful for the fixture.

The South East Counties League game at Brighton ended in a 2-1 defeat, but as in many games this season the scoreline did not reflect the balance of play as we dominated for long periods.






