



This afternoon we welcome the players, officials and supporters of *Millwall Football Club* to The County Ground for today's Barclays League fixture.

BARCLAYS LEAGUE

Next Saturday we visit The Abbey Stadium when we take on Cambridge United in the Barclays League kicking off at 3.00pm.

We have an allocation of seat tickets now available from the Advance Ticket Office for this game price £10 adults and £5 concessions. Admission to the terraces is via turnstiles 21,22 & 23 payment on the day.

Our next home game is the replay of the Tranmere Rovers game which was abandoned in December following the failure of floodlights. The game is now scheduled for Tuesday 23 February kicking off at 7.45pm.

For this game we will be charging reduced admission prices for holders of match ticket stubs or vouchers from the original game.

Adults in the seated areas will receive £3 off while terrace adult admission is reduced by £2.

North Stand juvenile admission is reduced by £1.50 with Town End juvenile admission at 50p.

On the terraces all juvenile admission is reduced by £2.

Seats and terrace tickets are now on sale from the Advance Ticket Office. Supporters with ticket stubs or vouchers must book in advance of the game for reductions as none will be offered at the turnstiles on the night. Season Ticket Holders will be admitted free of charge on production of Voucher 'N' from the season ticket book.



In both games the lads worked extremely hard and punished the opposition at the right time. Two clean sheets emphasised the work the whole team put in when we lost the ball.


Now we have to produce similar performances week in week out until the final kick of the season. You can only take one game at a time but consistency has got to be our objective.



DERBY COUNTY vs SWINDON TOWN Kick Off: 2.55pm

New Sunderland Boss Terry Butcher did not get his second stint at management off to the start he would have liked with a 1-0 defeat to Swindon Town at Roker Park, Butcher was appointed as the fifth Sunderland Manager in the last ten years following the dismissal of Malcolm Crosby and will be hard pressed to copy the success he enjoyed by his former England team mate Kevin Keegan at neighbours Newcastle. Butcher considers his approach at Roker Park will be different to that adopted at Highfield Road "I went in at Coventry with guns blazing and wanting to change the world but I have since learned that you have to be

Newcastle were without a game last weekend and the players enjoyed a break abroad in preparation for todays F.A. Cup clash with Blackburn. Keegan's right hand man at St James' Park is Terry McDermott, although he explains he is not at the Club in a technical capacity "I'm not here as coach and I don't profess to be a coach. I get on with the players though, and that's what I do.

more patient."

It's not my job to bawl them out. I think I'm here to bring a bit of life to the place, add a bit of bubble. I'm enjoying it but I'm only here as long as Kevin. If he goes you won't find me looking to take over. We knew we had good players but results have been even better than we hoped."

Bristol City, under the leadership of caretaker Manager Russell Osman who is standing in following the sacking of Denis Smith gained a surprise 3-2 win at Portsmouth. Osman is in charge at Ashton Gate until the end of the season and has been given Board backing to strengthen the City squad and has taken Ipswich Town midfielder Glenn Pennyfather on loan. Dismissed Smith meanwhile has been linked with several jobs and is keen to stay in the game "I'm more angry than anything else and determined to stay in the game and do other things."

Notts County have found a new lease of life following their parting with Manager Neil Warnock who had been in charge at Meadow Lane since January 1989. Caretaker Mick Walker saw his side beat Birmingham 3-1 on Saturday to continue their recent good form and striker

Tony Agana believes Walker is the man for the job "It's unbelievable. The whole Club has been given a lift. We are trying to play good football and trying to put the enjoyment back into our game. Neil Warnock's approach got us where we are now so we have nothing to lose."

Despite their home defeat to Tranmere last Saturday Cambridge are enjoying a good run of form under new Manager Ian Atkins who took over following the departure of John Beck in November. Atkins first signing at The Abbey was Watford's Steve Butler and he believes the team are better for the change in management "When John Beck was in charge the lads said they got in trouble if they didn't do set things. It is hard to change overnight but it is coming. We have freedom to play football under new boss Ian Atkins."

Milwall

Mick McCarthy's Millwall have made a stylish impression on the First Division this season emerging as serious promotion contenders on merit.

Last year the Lions earned a reputation as no nonsense competitors but their talentless long-ball game didn't win many admirers outside the confines of Cold Blow Lane.

This season however McCarthy has introduced a more constructive and imaginative approach to the game, re-styling the side with the introduction of one or two new players such as **Andy May** and the highly rated **Jamie Moralee**, whose goalscoring feats are only matched by his youthful exuberance.

Aidar Davison kicked off the season as the number one choice in goal but the Lions' Player of the Year was injured in the second game and his cover, Kasey Keller, has proved so good he has now firmly established himself.

With player-manager Mick McCarthy limited to just a couple of games following persistent calf injuries and England 'B' pivot, Alan McLeary, sidelined by injury as well, the central defensive partnership of former Middlesbrough fullback Colin Cooper and stalwart Keith Stevens has proved highly effective.

With Kenny Cunningham, an enterprising Dubliner, impressing

in the number two shirt and the reliable **Ian Dawes** at leftback, Millwall's defence has provided a sound foundation on which to launch their promotion charge.

Only Newcastle United have conceded fewer goals and the Lions goal difference at home of 41-11 indicates the emphasis played on attack. Yet away from home Millwall have not proved quite so fluent with just 11 goals netted in 14 away trips; a figure below that of all teams in the First Division apart from Birmingham City (8 goals), and Sunderland (9 goals).

Their recent 3-0 defeat at Oxford co-incided with the absence of three of the back line; Cunningham with a bruised foot; Stevens with calf problems and Cooper through suspension. All three were back last week for the impressive 5-2 demolition of Watford.

In the meantime McLeary and Tony McCarthy - a £100,000 signing from Irish champions Shelbourne last June - formed a makeshift partnership with Alex Rae at the back and were clearly out of touch.

They say that any successful side needs a spine and in the centre of the Lions midfield Andy May has been a revelation. Very experienced he acts as the anchor man just in front of the back-four. Ian Bogie provides the industry alongside Andy Roberts on the right and the stylish Phil Barber on the left.

Jamie Moralee and Jon Goodman present a talented front-line with pace and perception with Malcolm Allen, a neat little finisher providing an alternative when required.



They have been good enough to keep John Byrne, a £250,000 recruit from Sunderland, in the shadows. Last year Byrne was the scoring sensation of the Rokerites march to Wembley in the F.A. Cup but after injuring his thigh in the 1-1 draw with Southend he has been unable to get back in this side. His record shows one goal in six appearances.

Other players used this season include **Paul Holsgrove** and **Tony Dolby**, an extremely promising 18-year-old forward from Greenwich.

Malcolm Allen - Striker. Welsh international with a dozen caps, Malcolm commenced his career with Watford, making his League debut at West Ham in November 1985. Played four Second Division games on loan with Aston Villa in '86-87 before signing for Norwich City. Scored eight goals in 35 League appearances for the Canaries and scored his 20th League goal for the Lions v Bristol City last November. Born: Dioniolen 21-3-67.

Phil Barber - Left wing. Natural left sided player with good touch, vision and pace who crosses the ball well. Came into football with Aylesbury and in February 1984 made his League debut for Crystal Palace v Grimsby. 35 goals in 234 League games was his record before his £100,000 move to the Den in the

summer of 1981. Scored twice in a 4-1 win over Sunderland on his home debut, Born: Tring 10-6-65.

lan Bogie - Midfield.

Played in the same Newcastle United youth side as Paul Gascoigne and made the first of his 14 League appearances for them at Luton (30-8-86). Recorded 12 goals in 79 League games for Preston before joining Millwall in the summer of 1991. Born: Newcastle 6-12-67.

Colin Cooper - Defender.

A £300,000 signing from Middlesbrough in July 1991, Colin has been successfully converted from fullback to central defender by Mick McCarthy. Introduced to League football at Crystal Palace in March 1986, Colin made 188 League appearances for 'Boro (6 goals); and was capped by

England at Under-21 level. Born: Durham 28-2-67.

Kenny Cunningham - Rightback. Young Irishman who has really caught the eye after establishing himself in the side towards the close of last season. Capped by Eire at Under-21 and 'B' levels he is on the verge of a senior International appearance. Started his career with Tolka Rovers and made his Football League debut v Norwich City in March 1990. Born: Dublin: 28-6-71.

lan Dawes - Leftback. A regular since his £150,000 move from QPR in 1988. Played his first game for Rangers at Rotherham, in March 1982 and in eight seasons at Loftus Road clocked up 229 League games. Made his 150th League appearance for the Lions at Peterborough (15-9-92).

MILLWALL

Jon Goodman - Forward. Pacey front-runner who reached the Rumbelows Sprint Challenge final at Wembley last season. Cost just £30,000 from Bromley after starting his career with Leyton Wingate. Eight goals in 40 League appearances was his tally at the start of the season. Born: Walthamstow 2-6-71.

Kasey Keller - Goalkeeper. Hopes to be playing number one for the USA in the next World Cup Finals in the States. Arrived at the Den in January 1992 as the understudy to Tony Meola in the USA squad and made just appearance, League against Southend in May. But injury to Aidan Davison in the second game of this season opened the door and since then he has missed just one game. Born: Washington USA 29-11-69.

Alan McLeary - Central Defender. Millwall's second longest serving pro Alan made his debut for the club v Lincoln City in December 1982. Has now played in 301 games and has been capped by England at Under-21 (1) and 'B' (2) levels. Born: Lambeth 6-10-64.

Andy May - Midfield. Former team mate of Mick McCarthy's at Manchester City (he scored eight goals in 150 League appearances) he was swopped for David Thompson in an exchange deal with Bristol City last summer. Has stamped his authority on Millwall's midfield where he plays a holding role. Has also played for Huddersfield, Bolton on loan. Born: 26-2-64.

Jamie Moralee - Striker. Arrived as part of the deal that took £1.5 million Chris Armstrong to Crystal Palace earlier this season. Has responded well with nine goals in his first 16 League appearances for the Lions. Made his League debut for Palace last season v Coventry (1-2-92) and made six appearances in all in the old First Division. Born: Wandsworth 2-12-71.

Andy Roberts - Midfield/Fullback. Versatile performer, Andy broke into the side last April when he came on as a sub against Cambridge United. A member of the Lions F.A. Youth Cup winning side in 1991 he has earned a regular spot in the number seven shirt this season. Born: Dartford 20-3-74.

Keith Stevens - Midfield/Defender. Currently playing in the centre of the defence 'Rhino' has chalked up well over 300 appearances for the London Club. The longest serving player on the books he first wore the Millwall shirt at Oxford in April 1981.



THE MAN IN CHARGE



Mick McCarthy was elevated to the status of player-manager in April 1992 after a successful run as caretaker boss following the departure of Bruce Rioch.

Born and bred in Barnsley - he celebrated his 34th birthday on the 7th February. Mick joined the apprentice ranks of his local team upon leaving school and got his break in August 1977, when he made his debut in a 4-0 win over Rochdale.

Was an ever-present in his first two seasons with Barnsley and clocked up 272 League appearances in seven years at the Club.

A steady consistent performer he attracted the attentions of Manchester City who invested £200,000 in him on December 14th 1983. Mick strengthened City's defence considerably, adding 140 League games to his total in four years at Maine Road, helping them win promotion from Division Two in 1985.

From Maine Road he moved to Celtic in 1987, helping them clinch the Premier League Championship and the Scottish Cup in 1988. In the summer of 1990 Mick moved into Europe with Olympique Lyon the French Club.

A latecomer to International football, he was 25 when he made his debut for the Republic of Ireland against Poland in May 1983 but is the holder of a proud record as the Irish captain.

He skippered the side in the 1990 World Cup Finals in Italy and was in the side during last summer's tour of the USA but injury has prevented him adding to his 57 full caps this season.

Those were the days...

... looks back at previous connections with today's visitors

By the time the Town next face Millwall, the Londoners will have moved to a new home at Senegal Fields, not far from their present one. So perhaps this is an appropriate time to reflect on Swindon's days at Cold Blow Lane.

The Town were one of the first ever visitors there, back in November 1910. Just a fortnight after the ground opened, Millwall's 2-0 win ended Swindon's nine-match unbeaten start to the season. The new venue thus brought much the same fortune to the Town as the Lions' previous homes at East Ferry Road (seven games, seven defeats) and North Greenwich (one win in nine visits). But Swindon has the last laugh, going on to win Southern League Championship that season.

Two years later, the Town recorded their first win at The Den, Billy Batty scoring the only goal of the game. He was on target again in April 1914, when a 1-1 draw helped Swindon to a second championship win. They won both of the final Southern League encounters there, 2-1 in 1914/15 and 2-0 in 1919/20. But things were back to normal in the first Third Division clash at New Cross, when Millwall were 5-0 winners almost ten years to the day since that opening meeting.

Little changed in the period between the Wars, when the Town recorded just two wins in twelve trips to South London. In

1927/28, the Lions' won the Third Division South with Swindon being one of only two sides to take a point from The Den. Former Millwall man Harry Morris scored twice in a 3-3 scoreline. On the way to the Londoners' next championship win, ten years later, the Town won 2-0 there on Good Friday in front of the biggest gate of the season, 38,373. Millwall gained swift revenge with a 2-1 win at the County Ground on Easter Monday. Foster Hedley, later to join Swindon, hit both qoals.

The first four post-war encounters at The Den were all witnessed by 20,000 plus crowds, the highest being 23,390 in August 1949. Maurice Owen netted in a 3-1 defeat on Christmas Day 1948, but no Town player scored there again for five years. The next successful marksman was Mickey Bull, but sadly Swindon conceded six!

After picking up just three points from ten visits to Cold Blow Lane, the Town finally recorded their first - and only - post-war League success there in November 1962. A hat-trick from Cliff Jackson helped them to a 4-3 win and an eventful first-ever promotion to the Second Division, But a 3-1 reverse in April 1970 effectively put paid to a similar promotion bid, when Swindon missed out on a step to the First Division. In 1980, the Town has enjoyed Cup success but their League aspirations again suffered and a 6-2 defeat at Millwall in March did little for their cause. A new signing, full-back David Peach at a club record £135,000, made his debut.

Although failing to record a second away League victory since the last War, Swindon have fared better in the Cups. Only once in four outings have the Town slipped to defeat - in the Associate Members Cup in 1984. That came just four months after a Second Round F.A. Cup tie when, despite having central defender Simon Gibson sent off, Swindon went through 3-2. The first two legged League Cup First Round ties in 1975/76 brought Swindon a 1-0 victory in London and a 3-1 aggregate win. Then a Steve White 'double' there last season in a 2-2 draw set the Town up for a 5-3 aggregate success.







PLAYER PROFILE

There can be no greater hell for a professional athlete than a long recurring career threatening injury. The loneliness of the long distance runner pales into insignificance against the kind of nightmare Ross MacLaren has lived through these past ten months.

For Ross the end seemed nigh on several occasions as hopes for recovery were dashed by infection and breakdown. The sweat of physical endeavour matched by that of nervous tension.

That is why is return at Blundell Park on January 26th was so pleasing for all concerned with the club. It was his first appearance in the senior side since the 29th February 1992, when we lost 1-0 at home to Middlesbrough.

Says Ross: "I was very happy with the way things went in my comeback match. It was a great relief.

"This is the first time in my career that I have suffered a serious injury. It is something you next expect to happen. The first indication didn't seem serious. I had a pain in the region of the hamstring. I played, had treatment and played and it got worse and worse.

"That was the Christmas before last. When the specialist eventually diagnosed a hernia problem he was talking in terms of five weeks."

The five weeks stretched to five months then eleven in a depressing scenario.

Ross explains: "The first time the surgeon went in blind. He stretched

the tendons and thought he had cured the problem. But I picked up an infection. Again we thought it would be a quick repair job but it wasn't.

"My wife thought I was mucking about one morning when I was putting on agony. On the Wednesday I was on antibiotics and early Sunday woke up in some discomfort. A hole had opened up in the wound and was discharging poison. It took Nicola 40 minutes to bathe it.

"The medical consultants said I needed another operation. I was back to square one.

"Again my hopes were dashed. I thought it would be another two weeks before I could get down to work after they had drained it all out. But it took three months to heal then another five weeks before I could kick a ball!"

It's a bit like climbing a slippery pole and Ross admits it crossed his mind more than once that his footballing days may be over. He says: "I have to thank Nicola for keeping my spirits up when I was down. She and the children were great. It was harder work for her than for me. But I have a lot of good friends at the club and outside. Glenn was terrific. He has experienced the trauma of long-term injury himself of course and understands what we go through.

"Kevin Morris put in a lot of hours to help get me back. I can be a little impatient at times. I bought a mountain bike - it cost me an arm and a leg - because I thought it would help speed up the recovery. But they banned me from using it.

"I was okay on the rowing machine though. When I came to run for the first time it was frightening. It was like going backwards. Then it all clicked into place."


Ross played in three full reserve games and put in another hour at Luton on a rock hard surface. He was very sore afterwards but there were no serious side-effects.

"I wasn't at all nervous at Grimsby," claims Ross. It was nice to run out for an important game and the fans gave me a great reception. It was a bigger ordeal for the home game with Wolves because I needed to do well in front of the home fans.

"It will take a few weeks before I am back to my best but the boss is guiding me through carefully. I have never been a great trainer - I sometimes find it hard. But after all this I really appreciate it much more I can tell you.

"There were days when I would have done anything to be allowed to join in with the lads."

The return of Ross has been eagerly awaited. He is the one player who can slip back into Glenn's sweeper role and cover when the boss surges forward. Consequently his inclusion in the side means that Town now have more attacking options to call upon as we move into the decisive phase of the campaign.





The chance is there to do even better for Tranmere Rovers are back in Town for the re-arranged fixture on Tuesday 23rd February in what promises to be a real thriller.







"If I see players taking penalties on TV then I obviously take note in case I'm up against them in a similar situation. The way the




you an idea of what he is intending."

From Tyneside to Plymouth Hol Simon Garrett, his wife Nicola plus the father-in-law, trek across England every season following the fortunes of Swindon Town. It is a pilgrimage of passion that has even taken them as far as Holland in their quest to watch Town in action.

Simon was introduced to football by his Gramps, and says: "He was always talking of his schoolboy days in London when he played football at places like Upton Park and Tottenham. He followed Swindon and took me to Joe Butler's Testimonial. I think it was against Derby."

The youngster was smitten and has been an ardent Town supporter ever since. Hardly a Saturday passes by without the Garrett family shunting off to support Glenn Hoddle and his lads home and away.

"We get a lot of midweek games in as well if they are not too far away," says Simon who believes it was his grandfather's sheer enthusiasm for the sport that really made an impression on his youth.

"Gramps used to enjoy his football," says Simon. "He was always talking about it. When I was at school I played a bit but never bothered once I had left. I prefer watching Swindon."

There have been many great moments but two in particular stick in Simon's memory. He recalls: "The day we clinched promotion from the Fourth Division against Mansfield was one of the happiest. I had been at Newport County when we lost and so were relegated. So success was all the more sweeter."

Travelling as he does Simon's comments on the handling of away supporters are worth noting. He says: "At some towns we are treated like cattle by both the police and the Clubs. At Leicester we were made to feel like second-class citizens. Bristol Rovers is similar.

"It isn't like that everywhere. We were treated well at Newcastle and West Ham and there was a terrific atmosphere at Portsmouth too. You hear all these stories about Millwall but we found them very hospitable.

"It was a good day out at The Den even though we lost. Honestly they are the best footballing side I have seen in

Simon believes it is time to relax the security paranoia that surrounds the modern game. He insists: "I haven't seen any trouble for years and would like to see us returning more to the old conventions.


"Football has to come to terms with its market. It is a spectator sport - a business and should cater better for its customers. Away fans are usually tucked in some corner out of the way with inadequate toilet and refreshment facilities. We are then normally held back for 10-minutes or so after a game; then herded off like cattle.

"And we definitely don't want all-seater stadia. It will kill the atmosphere, strangle the game."

Yet when it all comes down to the nitty gritty Simon is prepared to accept all the imperfections just to be part of the Swindon scene. He enthuses; "Glenn Hoddle has given us flair and imagination that we have never seen here before.

"I'd walk a million miles to watch this team it is one of the best sides I have ever seen. Certainly the strongest X1 we have had at Swindon for years. They are a joy to watch."


