

TOWN AIMING FOR PLAY OFF PLACE AGAIN

Having finished eighth in the table last season, just five points off the play off zone, Swindon Manager Glenn Hoddle will be hoping his side can maintain their current position, sixth, to be involved this season.

Last Saturday's 3-0 home win over high flying Millwall, without the services of either Micky Hazard or Craig Maskell, underlined the potential at the County ground where Glenn Hoddle has received much publicity for his side's passing game. The departure of the prolific goalscoring talents of Duncan Shearer to Aberdeen last March, necessitated through financial difficulties at the Club, left doubts over the Robins ability to challenge at the top of the table this season. New arrival Craig Maskell has however taken over where Shearer left off and netted 17 times to date in League action. The average attendance at the County ground is 8,576 which is 15% down on last seasons average of 10,009.

Born Hayes, Middx. Joined the Town as playermanager in April 1991, and now normally operates as a 'sweeper'. Capped 53 times for England, Glenn spent 12 years at Tottenham, followed by another three with A C Monaco. He was out through injury for half of last season, but began the current campaign in style with a 30-yard winner against Sunderland.

DAVID KERSLAKE

(Age 26, Midfield/Defender)

Born Stepney, London. Signed for £110,000 from Queens Park Rangers in November 1989, David represented England at schoolboy, youth and Under-21 levels. He joined the Loftus Road Club as an apprentice, making his first team debut against Partizan Belgrade in a UEFA Cup tie in 1984. Most frequently seen for Swindon as an attacking right-back.

MARTIN LING

(Age 26, Midfield)

Born West Ham, London. Rejoined the Town a year ago, after almost five years with Southend. A former Exeter City apprentice, Martin was at the County Ground for just 93 days during 1986, making only two senior appearances. In and out of the side last season, the slightly-built midfielder will be hoping for an extended run this time round.

ROSS MacLAREN

(Age 30, Midfield/Defender)

Born Edinburgh, A £140,000 signing in 1988 from Derby County, where he won a Second Division championship medal, and previously with Shrewsbury Town. Ross is currently recovering from a hemia operation in the spring, having only played three hours pre-season football since. Now nearing his 450th League appearance since his debut in 1980.

NICKY SUMMERBEE

(Age 21, Defender)

Born Altrincham. Started a game for the first time in the final fixture of 1990/91 and made 20 full appearances last season. Began as a striker, but now attacks down the right-flank from the back. Has an excellent pedigree, as his father, ex-Swindon, Manchester City and England forward Mike Summerbee, his grandfather and great uncle all played League Football.

SHAUN TAYLOR

(Age 29, Defender)

Born Plymouth. A £200,000 signing from Exeter City a year ago, Shaun was voted Town's player of the year last season. He was also City's player of the year in their Fourth Division championship side of 1989/90. Came into League football late, signing for the Grecians from Western League Bideford Town at the age of 23.

PAUL BODIN

(Age 28, Defender)

Born Cardiff. Welsh international full-back signed for a bargain £25,000 from Newport County in March 1988 and previously with Bath City, where he was top scorer with 27 League and Cup goals in 1986/87. Joined Crystal Palace for £550,000 in March 1991 but returned to the County Ground just ten months later.

COLIN CALDERWOOD

(Age 27, Defender)

Born Glasgow. The club captain and currently the longest serving Town player, now in his eighth season at Swindon. The only surviving member of the Town's Fourth Division championship-winning side of 1985/86, Colin has made maximum appearances in four out of seven seasons. His six goals last term was his highest tally to date. Previously with Mansfield Town.

SHAUN CLOSE

(Age 26, Striker)

Born Islington, London. A £70,000 signing from AFC Bournemouth, Shaun has made just a dozen full appearances since coming to the County Ground in September 1989. Was top goalscorer for the Combination side last season, with 25, but has scored just one League goal for the club — after just 33 seconds at Oxford in March.

FRASER DIGBY

(Age 25, Goalkeeper)

Born Sheffield. For the first time since he arrived at Swindon, six years ago, the former England Under-21 'keeper has not been the club's automatic first choice, having had to share the number one spot with Nicky Hammond during 1991/92. The former Manchester United apprentice has now notched up over 270 appearances for the club.

DAVID MITCHELL

(Age 30, Striker)

Born Glasgow. Capped 17 times for Australia, David joined the Town a year ago from Chelsea for a nominal fee and found the net eight times in 28 full appearances. Much travelled goalscorer, having also seen service with Eintracht Frankfurt (Germany), Glasgow Rangers, Feyenoord (Holland) and Newcastle United on loan.

STEVE WHITE

(Age 33, Striker)

A free' transfer signing from Bristol Rovers six years ago, Steve reached a 100-goal milestone for the club last season, before being sidelined with a back injury. Despite playing only 28 games, he was still the club's second highest goalscorer with 15. Began his League career with Rovers in 1977, before 'big money' moves took him to Luton and Charlton.

Swindon had got off to a reasonable start to the season and were lying in eighth place. United disappointingly were strongling in sixteenth spot. The match was also of interest as three Northern Ireland internationals were on display — Finney and Morgan for United and Anderson for Town. Swindon started the match playing attractive football led by Moss and Kamara, but found it difficult to penetrate a defence that was well marshalled by Stringer. It was Cambridge who made the breakthrough however after 19 minutes. Streete did a near one-two with Biley and list a vacious shot from twenty yards which Allan couldn't get near. The next twenty minutes developed into a tussle to gain a factical advantage, and just before half-time filley noddled a cross into Finney's path and he flicked the ball home to give the Us a two-goal advantage. Before anyone could draw breath the Robins had pulled one back. Moss free kick flying in off the crossbar.

In the second half United showed their potential for the first time that season and tore Swindon apart. Five monutes had gone when Morgan's header was fumbled by Allan which allowed Biley to nip in to make it 3.1. After 65 minutes Streete latched onto a cross and scored with a spectacular 25 yard shot from a seemingly impossible angle. Just to nib in United's superiority even further, Finney and Biley combined to set up Silvester for number five.

With two minutes remaining Webster blundered in Cambridge's goal and Batson handled on the line. McHale scored from the penalty spot to make it 5-2. Interestingly, Batson wasn't even booked for the handball. Now it is an automatic sending-off offence.

Cambridge ended the season winning promotion to the Second, whilst Swindon finished tenth



I don't know why Raynor was sent off. Mick and him are the best of mates. I couldn't work out the Claridge booking either. No referee books you for that, but somehow he did today."






photo appeared. The orange cover changed to yellow with the Preston programme 2/10/85. All the necessary details of the match appeared on the front cover and there doesn't appear to be any errors on the front cover of the home programmes.

The teams lined up on the back cover. The club column was written by Chris Turner (1 page), In The Spotlight — Dave King (1 page), Welcome to Swindon (11/2 pages), Generally Speaking — Dave King (1 page), Abbey Network (1 page), and Statistics/fixtures (2 pages). Approximately 7 pages were taken up by adverts. In addition there was 2 pages used to promote the new Prize Lotto Scheme run by Camb Utd, Ipswich, Norwich, last and least Peterborough, 1 seem to remember it being a flop though.

On the whole the 85/6 programmes were nicely laid out with a good cover but there was a distinct lack of interesting club orientated articles. All the main articles were the ones you would expect to see in any programme.

Match v Swindon 85/6 Apr 5

This was a season I'd rather forget, the mighty U's applied for re-election to the league after finishing 3rd from bottom or 22nd from top in Div 4 (I don't know which sounds better!). We also crashed out of the F.A. Cup 1st round (Dagenham) and Milk Cup 1st round (Brentford). Cup "glory" however was reserved for the FRT where we progressed to the 2nd round!

Programmes for this season contained 16 pages (size was between A4 and A5) and sold for 50p. If my memory serves me correctly the printers were Newby from Peterborough but there is no advert for them in the programme. The editor was Phil Hough (club secretary) although he wasn't credited until the Exeter programme 20/9/85. The quality of paper used changed from the Preston programme 2/10/85 onwards although the style of layout remained virtually the same. The move from glossy to dull (cheaper!) paper was a result of a drop in crowds and programme sales. Crowds of 1,500 were not unusual.

An action photo appeared on the front cover until the Peterborough game 26/10/85 when a team

Player Profile

STEVE BUTLER

For many years Steve Butler had regarded Cambridge United as his bogey side, but having become manager Ian Atkins' first signing, he's already repaid much of his transfer fee. Last season Steve broke many United hearts when he headed a late goal that gave Watford a 1-nil win at the Abbey Stadium, and he admits it was the first time he had had any fortune in a series of matches against the U's. 'I played for Maidstone when Cambridge broke our hearts in the promotion play off semi finals - and they had knocked us out of the league cup earlier the same season. I also needed six stitches in a knee injury picked up in a game against Cambridge. After a career in the Army, during which he obtained his coaching certificate at Lillishall, Steve played for Brentford before moving to Maidstone. and then, in turn to Watford. Ironically Watford had just agreed to loan him to Bournemouth when lan Atkins moved in. 'The manager had tried to sign me before when he was at Colchester, and I was with Maidstone,' Steve recalls, 'and I did not need much persuading. It felt lovely to be wanted

With three goals already in eight appearances for us, a similar goalscoring record to the one at Maidstone would be very welcome indeed!



Newcastle's lead at the top of the Division has been cut back to only four points by West Ham following consecutive wins over Peterborough at Upton Park in midweek and at Watford last Saturday. Hammers boss Billy Bonds believes his side could challenge for the championship despite Newcastle being clear favourites for promotion: "although we have closed the gap to four points, it is still going to be very difficult to catch them. They still have a lot of home games left and, really they can win the league at home. The last time we were promoted though we were leading the Division as they are and got caught. at Sheffield Wednesday by the same score. Heaviest defeat though was incurred by Grimsby Town who lost four nil at Ipswich. All clubs will, however, welcome their 40% share of the gate receipts, with good attendances at all games.

Several First Division players were on International duty during the week. The Northern Ireland squad that played Albania in Tirana included seven players: Tommy Wright of Newcastle, Alan Fettis of Hull City, Gerry Taggart of Barnsley, Gary Fleming also of Barnsley, Kevin Wilson of Notts County, Jim Magilton of Oxford and Philip Gray of Luton.

Despite their Cup exit at Manchester City, Barnsley have enjoyed a relatively good season currently occupying a mid table position. Tykes boss Mel Machin, often referred to as one of the nice men of football has revealed his system of team selection at Oakwell. Explained Machin: "I allow them three poor performances on the trot and then I drop them." Barnsley have almost finished the redevelopment of a new grandstand at Oakwell.

Birmingham City, struggling near the foot of the table will be glad when they can call upon the services of former Manchester City youngster Jason Beckford. Sidelined for five months, Jason, who made twenty first team appearances at Maine Road is keen to get back into action: "The worst thing is seeing the lads on telly. I speak to my brother Darren almost every day. He's upset for me as well but this year will turn out nice for me if Norwich do well." City's home defeat to Portsmouth last Saturday leaves the Blues in real relegation trouble.


SOCCER FUN WEEKS

In this column of a couple of years back, I seem to remember pre-warning you about my fears that our games administrators would eventually bow, in one fell swoop, to the wishes of the next World Cup organisers, yes that well known football nation, the USA. ITV will show live coverage of both second leg ties beginning with the game at Highbury on Wednesday 10th March between Arsenal and Crystal Palace (k.o. 8.00pm). The series is concluded on Sunday 14th March when Sheffield Wednesday entertain Blackburn Rovers at Hillsborough (k.o. 3,00pm).



VIEW FROM AWAY END: Quite a good view from the away end, considering how high the terracing was.



This is the second part of 'Babbacombe' Rons story about the U's — where he also has a moan about the media's handling of our name — Dave Brown.

I have many fond memories of the Abbey Stadium and of four matches in particular which stand out. Firstly (though these are not in any special order), was the U's first ever Football League fixture against Lincoln City, when Colin Meldrum scored in the 1 1 Draw. Funnily enough, I met a Lincoln fan last Summer, whilst camping in France, he was next door (or flap) to me and he was at the match too. He virtually quoted me the line-ups of BOTH teams that day - a real fanatic! The Second match was the friendly against Chelsea after the Ian Hutchinson deal when I was one of the 14,000 who squeezed in - at the Corona End that day - to watch a pretty meaningless stroll between Chelsea, and their reserves in the Second half. We really were crammed in like Sardines in a tin. Older fans may remember the United Programme used to feature a picture, or photograph perhaps, of the brilliant Rodney Slack diving full length to his right to save a blistering drive from point-blank range. Well, I'm sure I was at that match, which ever it was, and that save was real! He regularly made the most breath-taking reaction saves on the goalline and must be the best keeper we've ever had. The final match was when United smashed five goals past our City rivals without reply in 1963 and my idol, Matt scored. Actually I must admit to being a City watcher in my youth, so addicted to the game was I, and in recent seasons I've seen them once or twice because my sister's boyfriend, Gary Grogan, has been playing for them.

Anyway they're not rivals any more, are they?!

I am a schoolteacher at a Secondary School in Torquay and the boys often give me a bit of stick when they see me on breaktime duty drinking from my United mug. Mind you, I get worst stick when I use my Arsenal mug! "Cambridge who?" they jeer. Which reminds me. Something which irks me is when I see the U's printed in the Press or on television and they omit the 'United' bit. Just 'Cambridge'. Don't they realise it's insulting and that there is another Cambridge team? The other night on the Oracle teletext I noticed in the League tables that they had Oxford United, Southend Utd, and Cambridge U, as though all three clubs had different name endings. Incidentally I have a long standing bet with a Gulls fan that Dion will play for England. What a tragedy about his leg.

Perhaps the worst aspect of being an 'exiled' U's fan is the lack of national press coverage about their matches, although there's plenty of scathing attacks on the way we used to play. Luckily, I have a wonderful Mum, who for 18 years has regularly posted to me every United article, cut from the CEN. Incidentally, she once worked for a certain Mr R.H. Smart before he was famous! (Who he? — Ed).

It always amazed me how some U's fans would criticise the success of United's former style in the press. Personally, I'd much rather watch the U's 'stuff' the likes of Swindon Town in Division 2(1) than see them 'playing football' against the likes of Torquay in Division 4(3) and getting pummelled 3-0, as they did in their last visit during the Play-Off season! Anyway, good luck lan, and up the U's!




