
This is why we need Craig back to full fitness as quickly as possible. However we have an excellent striker in Shaun Close who when he came on very nearly won us the game at Cambridge United.



DERBY COUNTY vs SWINDON TOWN Kick Off: 2.55pm

The battle continues avoid relegation with only twelve points separating the clubs in the bottom half of the table. Following their 3-0 defeat at fellow strugglers Notts County on Saturday Bristol Rovers find themselves rooted to the foot of the table. Caretaker manager at Rovers, Malcolm Allison, has been temporally relieved of his duties due to ill health.

Across the Westcountry neighbours Bristol City also find themselves in deep trouble losing 3-1 at home to Tranmere to leave them fourth from bottom. Stand in player-manager Russell Osman will be keen to hang on to the services of his highly rated striker Andrew Cole who has been attracting the attention of several top clubs including Newcastle United who reportedly had a sizeable bid recently rejected.

Birmingham City gave their new owner, David Sullivan, also proprietor of The Daily Sport, the perfect start with a 1-0 home win over Oxford United. The Blues winner was scored by Canadian international Paul Peschisolido but this was only Birmingham's twenty ninth goal of the season, the lowest tally in the division. City

Southend United remain in the relegation zone despite the goal rate of Stan Collymore who has hit eight times since his move from Crystal Palace just before Christmas. Having become an instant hit with the Roots Hall crowd there is talk already of a big money move although manager Colin Murphy will not be giving him away to the first offer: "Collymore will move if a club comes in with a £1.5 million offer as that would set the club up." Murphy also has the option of selling Brett Angel who rejected a £1 million move to Blackburn.

At the other end of the table Newcastle took another step towards the Premier League with a convincing 5-1 win over Brentford at St James' Park. Despite being top Newcastle have been under some pressure of late however manager Keegan says a loss of form was bound to come: "We have only lost one game in the League this year but our performances were being questioned. Even the great

Liverpool side went off the boil in two or three games. It's inevitable."

The defeat at Newcastle has left Brentford hovering above the relegation zone. The Bees have not won at home since the New Year and are now in danger of returning to the Second Division at the first attempt. Manager Phil Holder believes he needs to spend to strengthen his side particularly on one side: "My main priorities are a left back and a left winger."

Chartton's win at Southend has kept alive their hopes of a place in the play offs. Joint manager Alan Curbishley has however been plagued by injuries: "From a short time ago when we played Leeds we have five of that team out of action. Nevertheless we will keep battling on and we know that the results will turn around."

Tawcasile United

The arrival of Kevin Keegan as manager just over a year ago sent a wave of optimism through Tyneside. Keegan had been recruited to lift the morale of a giant that was not only sleeping but virtually on the brink of humiliation.

Newcastle United had slumped to one place from the foot of the Second Division table following a 5-2 defeat at Oxford United when Keegan was introduced to turn things around.

Even his charisma was questioned when disagreements with the Board over the injection of new talent, threatened to end the partnership before it had begun. But the differences were ironed out and victories in their last two games prevented the Magpies from falling through the trap door to Division Three.

Given the resources and the fanatical support United can call upon they opened this campaign as firm favourites to contest the Championship. The backing proved well founded as the Magpies flew to their best ever start to a season.

Eleven straight League wins saw them soar to the top of the First Division chart and it seemed odds on that Keegan's marvels would smash the League record of 13 straight wins - set by Reading at the start of the 1985-86 season.

It was Grimsby Town who dashed those hopes with a surprise victory at St James' Park. When Newcastle then crashed out of the Coca-Cola Cup and lost at Leicester as well it seemed the bubble had burst. But they were soon back on the winning trail to eventually forge a massive 15 point lead at the head of the First Division ladder.

A recent slump has seen that lead whittled down by the chasing pack yet normal service was resumed when Newcastle proved just too strong for Tranmere Rovers, securing a fine 3-0 win at Prenton Park.

Keegan had inherited a fine crop of youngsters when he returned to the North East but it has been his astute dealings in the transfer market that have really helped the club turn from despair to optimism.

The signings of experienced players such as former Liverpool fullback Barry Venison; Kevin Sheedy the Republic of Ireland midfielder, John Beresford and winger Robert Lee, have given Newcastle United stability and penetration.

Success has generated confidence and Newcastle's fluent style has provided a great springboard for top-shot David Kelly whose scoring instincts have produced goals this season.

The win over Tranmere had halted an alarming run of six League games without a win,

including an untidy 0-0 draw at home to bottom club Bristol Rovers. But last Saturday they confirmed their recovery with an emphatic 5-1 win over Brentford.

The First Division leaders are back in business and having absolutely



dominated the first half of the season they intend to enhance their position with a flourish in the closing months.


Keegan's determination to clinch promotion was emphasised on Tuesday when he splashed out £1.1 million to sign winger Scott Sellars from Leeds United for £700,000; and Bamsley's Mark Robinson for £400,000.

Robinson was expected to take over from the injured Barry Venison in the home game with Charlton on Wednesday.

John Beresford - Fullback.

After an outstanding season with Portsmouth, John was set to join Liverpool in the summer but the deal fell through on medical grounds. Keegan stepped in to snap him up for £650,000. A stylish overlapping defender, John came into the pro game with Manchester City but did not play in the League until he joined Barnsley in 1986. Moved to Portsmouth for £300,000 three years later. An England Youth cap. Born: Sheffield 4-9-66.

Paul Bracewell - Midfield. The first of Kevin Keegan's summer signings, Paul was out of contract with Sunderland and cost a tribunal set fee of £250,000. Made his fourth FA Cup Final appearance with the Rokerites last May. A play-maker of the highest class his career has covered over 380 League games with Stoke City, Sunderland (twice) and Everton. While at Goodison Park he won League Championship and European Cup Winners' Cup medals as well. Capped 3 times by England in 1985-86. Born: Stoke 19-7-62.

Lee Clark - Midfield.

A former England Schoolboy's captain Lee made his international Under-21 debut for the Magpies at Bristol City in September 1990. Opened this season with 7 goals in 48 League appearances. Born: Wallsend 10-10-72.

Stephen Howey - Central Defender. Another young star groomed through the YTS. A prolific scorer in the youth and reserve sides he made his League debut, as a sub, at Manchester United in May 1989. It wasn't until he was switched to central defence last season that he really established himself. Born: Sunderland 26-11-71.

David Kelly - Striker. Has suddenly realised his potential in Keegan's revamped side to establish himself as one of the First Division's top scorers. Started his career with Alvechurch and was brought into League football, in April 1984, by Walsall at Millwall. After scoring 28 goals

for The Saddlers in 1987-88 he had a trial with Bayern Munich but chose West Ham United who paid £600,000 for his services. Failed to impress at Upton Park - his return of 7 goals in 41 games prompting his transfer to Leicester City. Netted 22 goals in 66 League outings for the Filberts who sold him to Newcastle for £250,000 in December 1991. Current Eire international David notched a hat-trick for them on his debut v Israel (10-11-87). Born: Birmingham 25-11-65.

Brian Kilcline - Central Defender. Made his entry into League football with Notts County at Bristol Rovers in October 1979. A giant of a man in stature and leadership qualities he became the first County player ever to win England Under-21 honours. In 1984 he joined Coventry and skippered them to FA Cup Final victory over Spurs in 1987. Made 8 appearances for Oldham last season and joined Newcastle for £300,000 in March 1992. Born: Nottingham 7-5-62.

NEWCASTLE UNITED

Robert Lee - Forward.

Two goals against Tranmere Rovers took his tally to 8 since his £700,000 transfer from Charlton Athletic in September. Had played in excess of 350 games for the Valiants having made his debut in March 1984 v Grimsby. A former turnstile operator at the Valley he wasplaying for ABTA when Charlton spotted him. An England Under-21 International. Born: West Ham 1-2-66.

Liam O'Brien - Midfield.

Acquired from Manchester United for £300,000 in November 1988 Liam's graceful style and penetrating runs have endeared him to the Newcastle fans. A Dubliner he started his career with Bohemians and was with Shamrock Rovers when United brought him to the UK in 1986. Made his debut for the Red Devils v Leicester in December 1986 and made 31 League appearances in all. Bom: Dublin 5-9-64.

Gavin Peacock - Midfield. Was outstanding last season scoring 22 goals including a hat-trick against Crewe in the Rumbelows Cup. Gavin arrived from Portsmouth in a £350,000 deal in November 1990. Formerly with QPR nad Gillingham he has won England recognition at Schoolboy, Youth and U-19 levels. The son of former Charlton star Keith Peacock. Born: Welling 18-11-67.

Mark Robinson - Midfield/Defence.
Right sided player signed from Barnsley for £400,000 on Tuesday. Came into the game with West Brom on the YTS in 1985 and made his League debut vs Sheffield Wednesday in April 1986. Moved to Barnsley in 1987. A versatile performer equally at home at fullback or in midfield. Born: Manchester 21-11-68.

Scott Sellars - Midfield. Beautifully balanced player who can go either way but is possibly most effective on the left wing. Served his apprenticeship with Leeds United, making his debut for them at Shrewsbury in May 1983. It was after his move to Blackburn Rovers in 1986 that he really made his name and the Elland Road Club re-signed him for £1 million last summer. Injuries have since hampered his progress and he joined Newcastle on Tuesday for £700,000. Born: Sheffield 27-11-65

Kevin Scott - Central Defender.
Commanding stopper who has chalked up almost 200 League appearances since making his debut in a First Division defeat by Sheffield Wednesday in September 1986. Now Club captain, he was released as a teenager by Middlesbrough and was spotted playing for Easington Juniors. Was in the Magpies FA Youth Cup winning side in 1985. Born: Easington 17-12-66

Kevin Sheedy - Midfield. Was surprisingly given a free transfer midway through last season by Everton after 274 League appearances (67 goals) for the Toffeemen. The Republic of Ireland international served his apprenticeship with Hereford then spent four years at Anfield but made only three League appearances for Liverpool before moving up the road to Goodison. Has a cultured left-foot. Born: Builth Wells 21-10-59.

Pavel Srnicek - Goalkeeper.

A Czechoslovakian Under-21 International signed from Banik Ostrava in January 1991 for £350,000. Made his English debut in April 1991 and conceded 15 goals in his opening 7 games. Stands at 6'3' and has lightning reflexes. Hails from the northern mining town of Ostrava where he was born 10-3-68.

Barry Venison - Fullback. Signed from Liverpool in the summer for £250,000 after 110 League appearances for the Anfield club. Became the youngest captain in a Wembley final when he led Sunderland against Norwich in the 1985 Milk Cup Final. Moved to Liverpool in July 1986 for £250,000 and won two Championships - 1988 & '90 - and an FA Cup runners-up medal in '89. Born: Consett 16-8-64.

Tommy Wright - Goalkeeper. First choice for club and Northern Ireland until injury ruled him out. Cost only £30,000 when signed from Linfield six years ago. A former cross country champion and part-time barman. Had a spell on loan with Hull City, Born: Belfast 29-8-63.

THE MAN IN



The return of **Kevin Keegan** to St. James' Park in February 1992 sparked a revival that even this most famous England star could little have anticipated.

Keegan, born at Armthorpe, Yorkshire, on St Valentine's Day 1951, emerged as one of the country's most loved footballers in a career that started in the apprentice ranks of Scunthorpe United in December 1968.

In May 1971 the relatively unknown star transfered to Liverpool for a mere £35,000. His tremendous verve and commitment, not to mention his prolific scoring rate, helped establish the Anfield club as the greatest in English football.

The soccer world was stunned when in the summer of 1977, Kevin turned his back on Liverpool and signed for SV Hamburg for half a million!

In Germany he was a great success but three years later he was back. Southampton investing £420,000 in his services. After two years at The Dell he arrived at St.James' Park for £100,000. Proved the inspiration of Arthur Cox's side finishing his playing career on a glorious note as he led Newcastle back to Division One.

Keegan collected three League Championship medals; winners' medals in the FA Cup, the European Cup; UEFA Cup (twice). He was crowned Footballer of the Year in 1976; European Footballer of the Year in 1978 and again in '79 as well as PFA Player of the Year in '82.

First capped by England against Wales in 1972 he played his 63rd and final game in the goalless draw with Spain in the World Cup Finals... Kevin had scored 21 goals for his country.

Those were the days...

... looks back at previous connections with today's visitors

It is only in recent years that Newcastle and Swindon have confronted each other in League action and it was not until two years ago this month that the Town recorded their first League win over today's visitors.

But back in 1929, Swindon notched a famous FA Cup victory over the Tynesiders. The Town had enjoyed relative success in the 1920's, only once finishing out of the top six in the Third Division South. Their progress from the First to the Fourth Round of the Cup during 1927/28 - in which star goal-getter Harry Morris had scored all six of the club's goals in the competition - gave them a 'bye' to the Third Round in the following season. Morris had hit hat-tricks in the two previous games, taking his tally for the current season to twenty.

Newcastle had their own goals machine in Scottish international Hughie Gallacher. Both he and Morris had notched a record number of goals for their clubs two seasons previously - Gallacher 39 for United and Morris 48 for the Town, so it appeared to be a case of which marksman would hit the target most. However, the key to the outcome of the ties was at centre-half, where the visitors came without the injured Hill, while Swindon's Danny Bew played the game of his life, keeping Gallacher 'in his back pocket' all afternoon.

Earlier in his career, Bew had played as an amateur for Newcastle's great rivals Sunderland - his home-town - and so the confrontation was one which he probably relished. But the entire Town defence that day gave heroic performances. Goalkeeper Teddy Nash and left-half Archie Archer were the only Swindonians in the side. Nash was something of a veteran at 27. He had made his debut in the first team back in 1916, at the tender age of 14!

Archer would have had fond memories of Newcastle. In 1913. he gained his second England schoolboy cap in a 6-0 victory over Scotland at St James' Park. Coincidentally, in the England side that day was Tom Phillipson, who signed for Newcastle in December 1919 and came to the County Ground in May 1921, soon after the arrival of Archer. A third member of the Town's side at that time also had links with the Magpies. Arthur Metcalf had begun his League career on Tyneside on

In front of Nash were the full-backs Wally Dickenson and Tommy Wylie. Dickenson was a dour Yorkshireman and the Town's penalty expert. Wylie, being a Scot, gave little away and had many similarities to his more renowned predecessor Jack Walker.

The tie was decided by two goals, both coming from the boots of Morris, in the 32nd and 61st minutes. The majority of the 17,689 crowd - a figure that should not be too far away from today's gathering - thus went home happy.

Swindon went on to defeat another First Division side in the Fourth Round. A few minutes in conversation with Nicky Summerbee will convince you that this Swindon Town side is destined for Glory. After helping Town dispatch promotion rivals Tranmere Rovers and Portsmouth in successive games he was fair and brimming over with youthful enthusiasm expressing a conviction that will be hard to deny.

"I think we are going to pull something off - I really do," enthused the 21-year-old midfielder who prior to last week's departure for Vicarage Road told me: "I really fancy us to win at Watford. It has been a lucky ground for us and the way we are playing at the moment we could beat any side."

We didn't just beat them of course we thrashed them to claim third place in the First Division and add credence to Nicky's belief.

There is no disguising the thrill this young star feels within to be part of the success story that is gradually unfolding. For though he is not short on confidence, or talent, Nicky has found it difficult to establish his credentials.

He had a run of six games in October
November 1991 and another spell
between last October and December
before this current series of games
which has coincided with our best
sequence of results this season.

"A lot of people ask me why I can't establish myself as a first choice," claims Nicky. "I always think I deserve to play and that I deserve a regular place... The thing is that most of the time I have been in for others and when they are fit to return they come straight back.

"I'm sure I deserve to be in on my own account. I don't want to be in and out of the side. I need regular first team football and am doing all I can to make sure I keep my shirt.

"If someone else does well and takes my place I'll say nothing. But if I am just dropped to make way for another name I shall have to contemplate my future."

Nicky has proved a very versatile performer occupying fullback, midfield and forward roles. Is there then the possibility of falling between these roles. Of Nicky becoming the Jack of all trades and master of none?

"I don't think so," he replies dismissively. "The experience can only do me the world of good. I'm essentially a winger and as the system does not actually feature wingers I have to be able to adapt. The fullbacks fill this role in our game so it is still an attacking position.

The role I have got now, on the right of midfield, really suits me. It allows me to break wide if I want and enables me to play on the wing. I think I have more going for me going forward than as a defender but all-round experience can only make me a better player.

"It is going well at the moment. You just can't wait for the next game.

"There is a different feeling within the side now. I think we are more together. When we lose the ball we all defend as a unit and work for each other. We are looking more solid in defence because of this without detracting from attacking play.

The confidence within the team is terrific. I think we have been playing well for six or seven games now. Even at Cambridge we were the better side and should have taken a point. We were punished for one error and that can happen to anyone.

"The collective feeling is really contagious and when you are involved in something like this you just want to get out there and play every minute of the day.

"Newcastle had a good win last week but that has not knocked our confidence. We played them off the park at St James' and I think they will be more worried about us than we are about them. We have nothing to fear.

"You can't really attach too much importance on the performances of teams against other opposition. We have found that most sides, such as Portsmouth and so on, seem to change their tactical approach when they play us. It shows how much respect we are commanding. They fear our ability on the ball.

"We know we are in for a hard afternoon but we are used to that. This will be a great game to play in. The bigger the crowd, the greater the excitement, the better the enjoyment for everyone.

"We will try and play our football and take the game to them.

"I'm very happy with my game though I would like to score a few goals. I had a couple of chances against Portsmouth that I should really have taken. I keep kicking the ground instead of the ball."

No doubt a word or two from dad, Mike - the former Town, Manchester City and England star - will help.

Says Nicholas: "We have little chats now and again but his business commitments have prevented him from coming recently. I haven't tried to copy his style or anything I've done it all myself. Dad has helped by supporting everything I've done.

"When I joined the club it was as a centre-forward but then I was moved back. But I would like to get a few more goals and one against Newcastle would be fantastic."

Congratulations again to Glenn Hoddle who for the second time this season has been awarded the Barclays Bank Division

One Manager of the Month award.

Glenn led the side to four victories in February, including wins over promotion rivals Millwall, Tranmere Rovers and Portsmouth; and it is worth pointing out that unlike many of our rivals in the chase for a place in the Premier League, he has achieved this success without spending money.

Because of financial restrictions there has been no cheque-book building of this Swindon team. Instead Glenn and John Gorman have persevered by developing the players in their charge. Good coaching and understanding has been the backbone of Town's rise. The fact that there is not one player here who has not improved his technique since the arrival of this management team is testament indeed to their quality.

In my book I have always respected more the men who have achieved success on limited resources. People like Jim Smith, the current Portsmouth boss, who performed miracles at places like Colchester United and Oxford without the backing of financial clout.

To some extent the current England manager Graham Taylor came into the same category when he dragged ailing Watford from the lower reaches to establish them in the top division.

Ron Atkinson achieved great things with Cambridge United on a shoe-string budget before he broke into the big time with West Brom then Manchester United.

To my mind these are the people who should be crowned manager of the year. Not the Kenny Dalglish's, George Graham's of this world who have the financial muscle to buy almost whom they please when it suits.

Success is the achievement of something desired, planned or attempted, Sadly in this materialistic world we confine our heroes to absolute winners. But success should be relative to means and in this respect Glenn and others like him are true heroes.

Prior to the kick-off this afternoon Glenn will receive his prize, an inscribed plate and jeroboam of champagne, from Tony Eves, the Business Manager of Barclays Bank Swindon.

While on the subject of achievement lets not forget 'Chalkie' White's great hat-trick at Watford last Saturday. It was Steve's first in four years and took his tally for Swindon Town to 81 goals in 233 League appearances.

Some striking record this for the 34-year-old who during his career, which has spanned Bristol Rovers, Luton Town, Charlton and Lincoln City as well as Town, has amassed 162 goals in the Football League.

Not bad eh for a lad who started out with Mangotsfield United. Mangotsfield who? Exactly. It's almost 15 years since Steve made his League debut for Bristol Rovers in a 3-1 defeat at Southampton in the Second Division. His first goal was struck on April 1st 1978, in a 3-1 win at Millwall. Paul Randall and Bobby Gould, from a penalty, were the other scorers.

No doubt many of you enjoyed the live Cup tie between Manchester City and Tottenham Hotspur last Sunday. It was nice to see little Fitzroy Simpson playing so well.

Fitz was a product of our youth enterprise and his achievements in the Premier League with the Maine Road club underline the difficulties Glenn Hoddle has had to overcome. Unlike Mr Keegan who has been able to splash out on experienced campaigners, such as Barry Venison and John Beresford, Glenn has been forced to sell Fitz and striker Duncan Shearer who has since been included in the Scotland squad.

The smile that filled Andy Rowland's face at 3.40pm on Monday afternoon would have lit up the whole of Wiltshire. He had just seen his reserve side beat Bristol City 2-0 to record our first home win in the Neville Ovenden Football Combination since October.

Two goals from Chris Hamon sealed the victory after Town were reduced to ten-men just before the interval, when goalkeeper Nicky Hammond was red-carded for a professional foul.

A delighted Andy reflected: "I don't know why our home record has been so poor. Our overall performances have not been bad. Playing here in the afternoon could be a reason. There is just no atmosphere when the ground is empty. Under lights attention is focused on the field. It is a psychological thing.

"We also have an extremely young team. They are very inexperienced.

"The pleasing thing is that we are seeing some progress from them. Obviously most of them are still learning but there are one or two lads who are suggesting they might develop into first team players.

"Eddie Murray is one. He has come on in leaps and bounds after wasting most of his first year through injury.

"Another is Andy Thomson, who at times has shown that he can do it. Again, the consistency factor is missing from his game. There aren't many teenagers who can turn it on week in week out. "We have a couple more that on their day look accomplished footballers. I know what they have got inside them. The difficulty is getting it out of them on the field.

"It can be frustrating at times. One day a lad will really look the business and make you think he is something special. Then three days later the same player, on the same pitch, in the same team, will look as if he has never played before.

"What we are looking for is someone who is able, to put in 10, 12, 15 solid appearances a season. Produce, both mentally and physically, a steady pattern of performance.

"It is all part of the learning process. If they pick up the good habits and repeat them then we are getting somewhere."

Andy, who made over 450 League appearances during a career which started at Derby County, continued with Bury and ended here, is a most respected figure. But what differences has he noted from his days as a young man trying to establish himself as a professional player?

"I don't think there is a great deal of difference," he claims. "Attitudes are possibly a little different. Some lads today think if they get in the reserve side they have made it as a professional for the rest of their life.

"As soon as they are offered a professional contract they think they have cracked it. They believe it is then just a natural progression into the first team.

"This is possibly why so many young players fail to make the grade. A pro contract is only the second rung on the ladder. Once

you have achieved it there is still a long way to go to the top. It requires a lot of hard work, a lot of dedication.

"Possibly it is a little too easy for them at this stage. Because of the big cutbacks on playing staffs it means the opportunities come quicker. Some just don't realise how lucky they are.

"I joined Derby County on a professional contract as a youngster and in my first 18 months made only 20 reserve team appearances. This was because of the numbers available for selection. You had to bide your time. It made you realise that once the opportunity arose you had to take it.

"Contrast that with the situation here now. All our trainees have played in the reserve side this season."

As you are possibly aware Glenn has introduced the same system of play throughout the whole club. But how does Andy go about finding someone to fill Glenn's role in the reserves?

He laughs: "It isn't easy. Very difficult in fact. But we have a lad, Lee Middleton, who came here from Coventry City. He isn't a Glenn Hoddle - who is? - but he is a great passer of the ball.

"We are not rigid anyway. We tailor the system to suit the players available. Otherwise the system would look silly. You don't put square pegs into round holes.

"The main purpose is to play good football and produce one or two players who will enhance the first team. If we can do that then we will have achieved our objective.

"Glenn and John Gorman really make us feel part of the whole thing so there is a common commitment. I certainly feel more a part of the club than I have ever done before."






