Town Youths Victory in France

Swindon Town U17's have returned from France victorious in the 12th International Youth Tournament in Montereau at Easter.

Eleven other teams competed in the tournament and were allocated into four groups of three playing in a league format.

They were: Amager (Denmark); Kozani (Greece); Moutier (Switzerland); Naples (Italy); Paris FC (France); Red Star (France); Reval (Estonia); Tournal (Belgium); Wasquehal (France) and the host club Montereau.

Town were in the same group as Kozani and Red Star.

In the first game against Red Star, a second division club from Paris we ran out 3-0 winners with goals from Andrew Kearns and Ben Worrall.

The second game against Kozani also saw a 3-0 scoreline in our favour with Jamie Pitman, Jamie Walters and an own goal taking us through to the quarter finals.

This was against the home side Montereau and was watched by a large crowd but goals from Jim Fraser secured our two-nil win to send the partizan French crowd home disappointed.

In the first of the semi-finals we were pitched against the favourites Budapest who had won the tournament on the previous two occasions. The only goal of the game came from Jamie Walters to see us through to the final. The other semi-final resulted in a 1-0 win for Paris FC over rivals Red Star.

The final saw Swindon Town start hesitantly but after five minutes we began to play as we know we could. We could have taken an early lead but for a well saved penalty kick by the Budapest keeper. This did not deter the players who continued to play well.

Shortly before the break we took the lead through Mark Walters which seemed to end the dominance of Swindon's football.

In the second half we defended well but it came as no surprise when the Hungarians equalised with just eight minutes remaining.

A penalty shoot out followed with Swindon winning 5-4 leaving the final score of 6-5.

At the presentation ceremony we were awarded the prestigious Gaz de France Trophy. Individual trophies went to Stuart James (Fair Play Award) and his fellow defenders for the Best Defence, Ben Worrall for the Best Player of the Tournament and not to be left out the strikers were awarded the Second Best Attack Trophy.

Seven of our players are still only sixteen years old and gained a great deal from the tournament which was made possible by the generous support of **Courtaulds Films** of Swindon.

Each Club's programmes were judged on presentation, pictures, use of colour, editorial content and value for money.


STANDING ROOM ONLY





We are getting close but so far there is no sense of achievement to celebrate at the end of the day. Maybe that will come at the end of May. Who knows?


Meanwhile we must try and break our duck on TV. Everytime the cameras have been here we have played well but lost. Hopefully we can put that right this afternoon.

The first promotion/ relegation issue decided last weekend with Bristol Rovers returning to the Second Division following their 2-1 defeat at West Ham. The victory keeps West Ham tucked in behind Portsmouth and providing the Hammers pick up maximum points today and at home to Cambridge next Saturday they will be hoping Pompey slip up. Portsmouth's remaining game is at Fratton next Saturday against Grimsby Town.

West Ham have maintained their good form this season with the help recently of on loan Scottish International striker David Speedie. The firey Southampton striker netted vital goals against Leicester and Bristol Rovers last Saturday but it is unlikely he will be at Upton Park next season: "I'd love to sign for West Ham but my future is no longer in my hands. Contracts these days are not worth the paper they're written on.' Manager Bonds also considers a permanent move unlikely: "I haven't the dough to buy David".

Portsmouth continued their amazing form against Wolves at Fratton Park with a 2-0 win in front of over twenty-three thousand

fans. Pompey
boss Jim Smith says
he hopes his side will
continue the form which has
brought eleven wins in the
last twelve games: "We
don't fancy the play-offs one
bit. There are three teams
battling it out for those two
automatic places but I feel
sure Newcastle will be
champions. We've got to
keep the momentum going
until we've made absolutely
sure."

At the other end of the table its any two from Cambridge. Brentford, Sunderland, Birmingham, Notts County Southend to join Bristol Rovers for the drop. Southend continued their revival last Friday night with a 1-0 home win over Grimsby at Roots Hall. New Shrimpers boss Barry Fry had 'Stan the Man' Collymore to thank for yet another goal and he doesn't hold back when making his sales pitch for the striker: "If someone wants him they won't get him for less than £2 million. He's a bit special. Now I've seen him in action, I think he'll go all the way to the top and play International football.

Leicester City came unstuck last Saturday losing 3-0 at neighbours Peterborough despite having over eight thousand travelling fans to cheer them on. Almost guaranteed a place in the play-offs the Foxes have relied on defender turned striker Steve Walsh for goals recently. Walsh says he enjoys it up front: "I've

heard all the comparisons with Paul Warhurst but, unlike him, I've got no desire to go back into defence. There is no better feeling in the game than scoring goals and I'm hearing about it all the time."

Osman, Russell out with a hamstring injury, watched Bristol City hold fellow strugglers Cambridge United to a goalless draw Ashton Gate last Saturday. While this ensured at least one First Division club playing in Bristol next season, it leaves Cambridge United struggling to avoid the drop. Said Osman: "It was not a good game to watch but neither side could afford to lose. "The City Board have now offered Osman a long term contract as reward for saving the club from relegation following the sacking of Denis Smith in January.

West Han

Just one win separated West Ham United from Portsmouth, who came from nowhere to oust the Londoners from the second automatic promotion spot they have occupied for most of the season. Though assured of a place in the play-offs Billy Bonds would naturally rather avoid the lottery and gain straight promotion.

There are few who doubted the Hammers capability of bouncing straight back after last year's disappointing relegation from the top sphere. Always well supported they have one of the most talented squads in the First Division; a team able to outclass many of its opponents at this level.

The arrival of former Upton Park hero Harry Redknapp, as assistant manager to Billy Bonds, has had a profound effect on the preparation of a team that on its day has looked one of the most exciting in the Football League. Mr Bonds' greatest problem has been overcoming injuries and suspensions so that he could field his strongest side.

Veteran centre-half Alvin Martin, who was enjoying a great season, has not featured since early January and still has his calf muscle in plaster. The former England pivot will now have to wait until next season to make his 425th League appearance.

Colin Foster, then Tony Gale, took over his role alongside the ever-present Steve Potts in a defence that has also been without the services, at time, of influential leftback Julian Dicks. Dicks' absence has been due to his own indiscipline than anything else. His sending off at Derby, on January 10th, being his third dismissal this season!

Mitchell Thomas, the former Luton and Tottenham leftback, George Parris - who is now with Birmingham City and Kenny Brown have all provided cover. Brown, a Barking lad and son of former West Ham centreback, Ken Brown who was in the Hammers' FA Cup and European Cup Winners' Cup winning sides of the 60's, was signed from Plymouth Argyle for £170,000 down in 1991.

Injuries and suspensions have also cost midfield ball-winner Martin Allen dearly. Martin collected his 13th booking of the season during the 4-0 win over Brentford. It was only his second game back after a four-match ban and a fine of £1,000.

Robson, Allen, Butler and Keen provide the midfield combination when available with Bishop and Holmes pushing for selection.

Up front much was expected from Clive Allen, the former England striker who arrived at Upton Park, from Chelsea for £250,000 in March 1992. He scored on his debut for the Hammers - at Stamford Bridge - and started well this season with 4 goals in the opening seven games. In fact Clive, who started his career with QPR, went through the front door and out the back at Highbury without playing a game; and has seen service also with Crystal Palace, Spurs, Bordeaux and Manchester City, had accumulated an impressive 16 goals in 34 league and cup games this season before he became yet another calf muscle victim.

Clive's problem meant Steve Jones and Alex Bunbury were both given opportunities as cover.

With Mike Small, a £400,000 capture from Brighton, limited to just two starts and four sub appearances because of injury the Hammers' strike force has been severely blunted. Small had made a good impression in his first season in the top flight with 18 goals.

Mike, rejected by Luton as a youngster, had also failed to make the grade with Peterborough. He then spent several seasons in Holland, Belgium and Greece playing with PAOK; Standard Liege, Twente and Go Ahead Eagles, before returning to join Brighton.



With so many injuries West Ham United's continued challenge for a place in the Premier League emphasises their strength in depth, a factor that will stand them in good stead should they achieve promotion. Even so Billy Bonds has hinted he would love to sign that bundle of infectious energy called David Speedie but hasn't got the cash to make the loan move a permanent one.

The Hammers need to win their last two games to have a chance of overhauling in form Portsmouth. They stretched their unbeaten home run to 19 games last Saturday with victory over Bristol Rovers. This afternoon they come in search of a 10th away win.

Martin Allen - Midfield.

Tigerish tackler dubbed the "Mad Dog" by Hammers tans. Arrived at Upton Park from QPR in August 1989 for £660,000 to add bite to the middle line. Impressed with some spectacular goals in his first season but has not been able to match the 11 he netted that year. Martin, a cousin of striker Clive Allen, came into football with QPR, making his League debut at Luton, in March 1985. Was in their 1986 Milk Cup final side beaten by Oxford. Born: Reading 18-8-65.

Midfield. Bishop Creative play-maker whose experience spans all four divisions of the old Football League. Served his apprenticeship with Everton but made only one League appearance - v Manchester United 5-5-84 - before being loaned to Crewe. Eventually signed for Carlisle United when he was 19 and went with them from Division Two to Division Four. In 1988 Harry Redknapp took him to Bournemouth where he was so impressive Mel Machin splashed out £700,000 to take him to Maine Road, in June 1989. Became a firm favourite with Manchester City fans who were shocked when new manager Howard Kendall transferred him (for the second time); in December 1989 as part of a £1 million exchange deal set up by then Hammers' manager, Lou Macari. Mark Ward going north, Bishop and Morley, to the East End. Capped by England 'B' v Switzerland in May 1991. Born: Liverpool 29-5-65.

Tim Breacker - Fullback. Became Billy Bonds' first signing when he joined West Ham from Luton' Town in October 1990 for £600,000. Made his Hammers debut here at the County Ground (30-10-90), when he came on as a sub. Tim joined Luton Town from school making his League debut, at Ipswich, in March 1984. Played in successive League Cup finals for the Hatters, gaining a winners' medal in 1988, v Arsenal and a runners-up medal a year later v Forest. A quiet man off the field his strength and running power on it makes him a valuable asset. Was sent-off, at Everton in December 1991, for the first time in his career. Bom: Bioester 2-7-65.

Peter Butler Midfield. Tenacious central midfielder who is keeping 'Bish' on the sidelines. Picked up for a bargain £170,000 from Southend United last summer - the fee set by a tribunal he made his Hammers League bow at Bamsley and is playing the best football of his career. Came into the game with Huddersfield in 1984 but failed to establish himself. Had loan spells with Cambridge United and Bury before returning to establish himself at the Abbey Stadium. Made 55 League appearances for Cambridge over two seasons before joining Southend United in 1988. Played in the same side as Martin Ling - winning promotion in consecutive years with the Shrimpers. Missed most of last season with a knee injury and came back on loan with Huddersfield. Born: Halifax 27-8-66.

Julian Dicks - Leftback.

Has gained a fearsome reputation for his physical commitment which has earned him too many suspensions, and consequently the captaincy. A Bristol lad, Julian was introduced to pro football as a

midfielder with Birmingham City. Made his League debut for the Blues at Chelsea in August 1985. It was Ron Saunders who persuaded him that fullback was his natural position and he showed enough promise to prompt West Ham to part with £300,000 for his services in March 1988. It was Lou Macari who appointed the outstanding youngster skipper. There has never been any question about Julian's ability. A former Barclays Young Eagle of the Month winner he is a superb tackler, good passer arid has a tremendous shot, which has earned him 30 goals for the Hammers. Capped by England his transfer at Under-21 and 'B' levels he would surely have made the senior national side had his temperament not been so fiery. Born: Bristol 8-8-68.

Central Defender. Currently unsettled at Upton Park, Colin was recruited from Nottingham Forest in September 1989 at a cost of £750,000. A son of Kent, he had served his soccer apprenticeship at nearby Leyton Orient, making his League debut at Grimsby (9-1-82), while still an apprentice. Played rightback in those days. Scored his first goal - against Huddersfield - on the day he became a professional and in May 1987 was signed by Brian Clough for £50,000. Now a centre-half Colin established a good partnership with Des Walker until serious injury, sustained at Christmas 1988, cost him his place. Big 'Fozzie' was thrown in to spearhead the Hammers' attack in a recent game at Southend, his 6' 4" frame making him a handful in the air. Born: Chislehurst, Kent 16-7-64.

WEST HAM UNITED

Central Defender. Classy footballing defender who has been playing League football since August 1984, when he made his debut for Fulham v Charlton. Signed apprentice for the Cottagers in 1977 and was captain of the senior side at 18. He helped Fulham gain promotion to Div Two in 1982 and looked set to join Liverpool but Fulham would not let him go. Moved to Upton Park at the end of his contract, in July 1984 for £150,000. Gained England Under-21 recognition but has failed to fulfil his big ambition to play at Wembley in a major cup final. Born: Victoria London 19-11-59.

Keen Enjoying an outstanding season, this quietly spoken unassuming young man, has not received the public recognition his talents deserve. Raised through the youth ranks he made his senior debut in the 75th minute v Liverpool in September 1986. Well balanced, with tight control, he loves to run at defenders. Has an eye and the delivery to make the telling pass. Can operate on either flank and is a tireless worker. Has a good pedigree, his father Mike was a stalwart with QPR, and Kevin himself was a member of the ESFA Gillette Cup winning side in 1983. Played three games for Wycombe Wanderers in 1982-83 before signing apprentice with West Ham. Has played for England at Schools and Youth levels. Born: Amersham 25-2-67.

Ludek Miklosko Goalkeeper. Czechoslovakian international signed from Banik Ostrava for £266,430 in February 1990. Made his debut (18-2-90) here at Swindon, on the same day that Lou Macari - who had signed him - walked out on the Hammers. Raised in the mining town of Ostrava, Ludek joined Banik at 16 and spent 12 years with the club, apart from a two-year stint in Western Bohemia while on national service. Won League Championship medal in 1989 and played in the European Cup the following season. Was also good at ice hockey and played right back for the local team. At over 6' 4" he is an enormous man yet very agile with razor-sharp reflexes and a safe pair of hands. Equalled a club record, set by Phil Parkes, two seasons ago when he kept 22 clean sheets and has already surpassed that total this season. Born: Protesov 9-12-61.

Trevor Morley - Striker. Spearheaded the Hammers' successful promotion drive in 1991 with 17 goals. But last season he produced just five in 32 league and cup outings, and ended the campaign on loan to Norwegian club Brann. Arrived at Upton Park with Bishop in December '89. Was on Derby County's books as a youngster but was released and played for Corby Town then Nuneaton Borough with whom he claimed a Southern League championship medal. In 1985 Northampton Town paid £20,000 for his transfer and he made his League debut at transfer and he made his League debut at Burnley. 39 goals in 107 League games tempted Mel Machin to invest £175,000 to take him to Maine Road in January 1988. Trevor contributed 12 goals to Manchester City's promotion run from Division Two but failed to impress new boss Howard Kendall. Is back to his best form this season however, topping the Hammers' goal-chart with 21. Born: Nottingham 20-3-62

Potts Worked his way through the ranks skippering the Hammers' youth team to the SECL Championship in 1985 then the reserves to the Football Combination title a year later. Made his senior bow, at fullback, on New Year's Day 1985, v QPR and registered his 150th League appearance on the opening day of this season at Barnsley. Is 5' 8" yet performs well in the

centre of the defence where his anticipation and timing makes up for his lack of height. Can also operate in midfield but is no goalscorer having notched just once, at senior level, in almost nine seasons. Capped by England at Schoolboy and Youth (15) levels. Born: Hartford Connecticut, USA 7-5-67 - his family returned to England when he was very

Mark Robson Right-wing. Coming to the end of his first season with West Ham after joining them on a free transfer from Spurs, after a brief trial, in the summer. A Hammers' fan as a kid, when he trained with the club, he slipped through the net and joined Exeter City in 1986. Scored 7 goals in 26 League games before Tottenham took him back to London. Those were the days...

... looks back at previous connections with today's visitors

If the Town take all three points at stake this afternoon, they will have completed their first League 'double' over West Ham since 1913!

The victories helped Swindon on the way to a second Southern League championship. Upton Park was the first port of call that season. on September 6, when a record League crowd of 25,000 saw the Town recover from a 2-1 half-time deficit to win 3-2. Alf Leafe scored twice for the Hammers, but Freddy Wheatcroft, Billy Tout (from a penalty) and Harold Fleming were the successful marksmen on the day. Swindon went on to win all their next eight games before dropping their first point of the season, on November 8, when Northampton Town came to Wiltshire.

West Ham's visit, December 27, was the Town's third game on successive days! Without Fleming on Christmas Day - the International always declined to play on religious holidays they went down 5-2 to Bristol Rovers at Eastville, but immediately bounced back on Boxing Day to knock five past the Rovers without reply. On that occasion, each member of the forward line put his name on the scoresheet. Swindon still had enough steam left to put four past

Hammers keeper Tommy Lonsdale, with those who had secured the points at the Boleyn Ground again doing the trick. Fleming grabbed a brace. Syd Puddefoot collected a consolation for the Londoners. A week later, he hit a hat-trick in a 6-1 win - over luckless Bristolians!

Two seasons earlier, the Town recorded a 'treble' over our visitors today. On November 25 1911 they inflicted a 2-0 home defeat on the Hammers, Tout - from another penalty and Archie Brown netting. The clubs then met at Upton Park in the third round of the F A Cup in February. George Butcher opened the scoring for West Ham with Fleming equalising. The issue had to be settled in a replay at the County Ground. where Hammers defender Vic Glover scored twice in the first half-hour. Unfortunately for the visitors, both goals came at the wrong end! Bob Jefferson and Wheatcroft added two more as Swindon cruised to 4-0 victory. The Town's third success of the campaign came on April 22. Harold Fleming was missing for the last third of the season through injury, but his replacement - Alex McCulloch continued to haunt the Londoners, scoring twice in a 3-0 win. Bown netted the other, with Jack Mackesy collecting a consolation for the Hammers.

But that victory was only one of four for Swindon in their last fifteen League fixtures following the injury to their England star, and, after leading the table for four months, they could only finish fourth. Their F A Cup aspirations also went with Fleming, as they lost in a semi-final replay to next week's opponents, Barnsley, at last week's venue, Meadow Lane!

The Town's first, and only other, double over West Ham came back in 1903/04. A single Arthur Beadsworth goal gave Swindon the points at the County Ground on March 12. The return was in the final fixture of the season and the last to be played at the Hammers' Memorial Ground home at Canning Town. There, 89 years ago this week, Emie Toombs scored his only League goal for the Town and the only goal of the game.



When Glenn Hoddle turned to Exeter City for their big stopper centre-half, a couple of years ago, he little envisaged the considerable bonus Shaun Taylor would deliver in respect of his impressive goal-scoring contribution.

That equaliser, here against Leicester City, was his 12th strike of the season; and a really special one for this popular son of Plymouth whose presence in the air has proved a thorn in the side of many opposing defenders.

Laughs Shaun: "It was one to savour I suppose. It was a bit unusual for me. It is not often I chest the ball down and flick it past the goalkeeper in that fashion. It was a great thrill.

"I prefer headed goals I think. The ones I scored against Derby County and Wolves are probably my own favourites from this season. I'm not usually asked question like this.

"Getting on the scoresheet is an added bonus for me. I have never considered myself in this role before. My priority is defending but the way the lads have been playing this season has been tremendous and because of the pressure they have put on opponents I have had more opportunity to get forward and have a go at goal.

"It has gone well. When I played for Bideford I scored 12 goals in one season but never got anywhere near this figure before at this level. It is all very exciting."

Just what a great influence Shaun is proving at both ends of the field was never more graphically illustrated than in that sensational game at Birmingham on Easter Monday.

Forced off the field to have stitches inserted in a head wound the Blues took full advantage to score twice while he was receiving attention. Yet once back it was Shaun who sparked one of the great comebacks of all time with an absolutely super goal.

Shaun recalls the drama: "A cross came in which I headed out comfortably but the Birmingham player, who had mistimed his leap, came onto me and hit me on the side of the eye. I knew it was split right away.

"They took me off to get stitched up. I could hear the cheers in the dressing room so realised Birmingham had scored. The nurse was very good. She seemed to be taking a bit of time to put them in-probably my impatience more that anything else. But when I heard the second goal roar I was desperate to get back."

When he did return, some eight minutes later, Town were trailing 2-0 and looking a troubled side. Then Micky Hazard slung over a perfect free-kick which Shaun thudded into the net with powerful precision.

Says Shaun: "It was a great ball from Micky and thankfully I got a good connection with my head."

But what about that damaged eye?

"During the game you don't feel it." claims Shaun. "It is afterwards you feel the pain."

The former Bideford defender, who came late into League football when he was 23, shys away from acclaim about his scoring feats this season.

Explains Shaun: "It's just about being in the right place at the right time; the quality of the ball in; and a touch of luck.

"Paul Bodin has had a good run in the scoring stakes as well. I think it is just a reflection of our style of play. There is no pressure on us of course in these situations like there is on the recognised strikers. Our job is to stop goals and any we do hit at the other end is purely a bonus.


"We are encouraged to get forward and of course it helps when you have the confidence to do these things in the right areas.

"This is the most exciting time of my career. We have a realistic chance to play in the Premier League next season and that has to be the dream of every professional in the game.

"I don't feel we are under pressure. We have had a good run and are confident we can do well in the play-offs. We could even be facing West Ham which would be a thriller."

The former plumber will be hoping to plug any leaks at the back as Town go for broke in one of the most exciting climaxes to any season.

Says Shaun: "I don't know what it is like to play at the very top but there are no fears. This is due to the quality around me. West Ham have recent experience at the top but we can match them. I find the more quality you are up against the better you play...They are a good side but I think we can beat them."



For a while after Christmas Andy Gray joined us on loan from Spurs displaying his skills.





However, for once, FIFA bowed on the side of reason accepting that having made their decision the F.A.W. couldn't then move the goalposts. So Paul was able to turn out for us in the important game at Meadow Lane.

I must say it was refreshing to see Portsmouth knock Newcastle off the top even if it was for barely 24-hours. There would be a subtle kind of justice imparted, I feel, if Jim Smith, who was so poorly treated at St James' Park, was to get one over on his former masters in the final reckoning.

No doubt Hammers' fans will not share this viewpoint for it is the remarkable run by Portsmouth which has edged them out of the automatic promotion position they have looked like securing all season.

West Ham could still make it of course. If they win both their last games they will be on 88 points - three more than Pompey have now. Come to that Millwall could still mathematically catch us. But we would have to lose today and at Barnsley while Millwall not only need to beat both Wolves and Bristol Rovers but beat them by nine goals more than we score! That seems a tall order for a side that has managed just two goals in their previous fives games before yesterday.

The menu for the play-offs could hardly be more appetizing with the prospect of West Ham or Portsmouth, ourselves, Leicester and Tranmere Rovers the ingredients.

Those of you who listen to the 606 show on Saturday radio will know that the current host, David Mellor M.P., is dead against the play-offs. But then his judgements in politics have never been too bright so why should we take notice of his deliberations on football.

Mellor's argument is that it is not fair that a team finishing third in the League programme can be beaten to promotion by a side that finished sixth.

I can sympathise with that logic to some extent but we all know the rules before the season starts. The top two go up, the next four battle for the privilege.

It is not so long ago that it was a question of two up and two down in all divisions. In those days, when



admittedly you only collected two points for a win, the season used to be over for two-thirds of the competitors in early March. This consequently led to a surfeit of negative passionless matches that meant absolutely nothing to the players or fans alike.

Contrast that with the current situation. Last Saturday in the First Division there were only fou clubs - Charlton, Wolves, Peterborough and Barnsley who could not reach the play-offs or become involved in the relegation scramble. The season is still alive for most of us.

Let us not forget either that it was Blackburn who finished sixth last season ... They won the playoffs and haven't done too badly in the Premier League have they? Certainly much better than on the way down Middlesbrough who were one of the automatic promotions ... So who knows?

There is no question of the grass growing greener on the other side for Geoff Warren. Town's well respected groundsman is only interested in the area before you.

"If anyone gets near it I get jealous." grins Geoff, who has been tendering the Swindon pitch with loving care for seven years now.

There is no need to enquire where Geoff hails from. His Birmingham brogue is as distinctive as it was when he left school and joined the Birmingham Parks department as an apprentice.

He recalls: "I worked for them on all aspects of the job for five years then someone from Birmingham City Football Club came to me and asked for my help. I was tending mainly cricket pitches at the time and was not too anxious to leave but they persuaded me in the end.

"It was a long while ago, back in the 1970's. Freddie Goodwin was the manager at the time. Then we had Alf Ramsey and later Jim Smith...Jim is a smashing bloke but he's got a shorter fuse.

"I stayed there nine years and wouldn't have moved but for the fact that I was made a much better offer by Bristol City. I felt I had to accept for my own good."

Geoff could well have been at Ashton Gate now had it not been for the Club's traumatic financial problems. Geoff says: "It was 1982 and they just tore up all existing contracts. We were made redundant. I said then I wouldn't bother again with football clubs and went to work for the Weston-Super-Mare Council.

"I don't know exactly why I changed my mind but when Swindon approached me I said yes.

"They tell me they had been having problems and had suffered a few bad press reports as well. When I arrived it wasn't good I must admit."

What then is the first step to overcoming a surface problem?

"Not to panic," quips Geoff with the speed of lightning. "We got plenty of fertiliser down to encourage grass growth. Once you have established the roots you can work from there."

Modesty forbids Geoff confirming the transition that took place but the pristine fashion of the playing top for today's big game says it all.

He says it takes a couple of days to prepare but he starts work as soon as the previous game is finished.

"This is a difficult pitch to handle when it gets wet," Geoff points out. "The problem is it is soil based. Most modern pitches are sand based which helps the water drain through. When we have heavy rain here it just doesn't clear quick enough.

"On the positive side it will grow grass...

"It must be four or five years though since we lost a game through rain. Frost has been our worst enemy."

Ironically it was our home game with Birmingham City that nearly fell foul of the water and Geoff laughs: "Terry Cooper couldn't understand why I was so desperate to get that one played.

"Despite the claims of a drought last January was one of the wettest month's I can remember. In contrast February was too dry. The problem is if the ground dries out too quickly then it becomes uneven and that won't do.

"My job is to prepare a smooth surface for Glenn and the boys to play football on and that is what we try to achieve."

You know from St James' Park to Home Park groundsmen have a

reputation of being, well, shall we say, perhaps a little eccentric.

"I don't think there is any doubt about it," roars Geoff warmly, "We are a funny breed. But you know you can get very attached to your piece of grass.

"We can be a little over protective at times I know. What is irritating is if people storm on the pitch without asking. But I have mellowed in my old age you know. It is no good getting upset over these things particularly as in most cases they don't do any damage.

"But I love my work here. They leave me to get on with the job and Glenn and John are as good as gold.


"It is a seven day a week exercise though. I can never switch off. When I go home I am always watching the weather and this is even more difficult for me as I live in Clevedon. It can be pouring down there and nice and sunny at the ground."

A groundsman of 40-years standing they don't come much better than Geoff, who has willing voluntary help on a match day from sons Stephen and lan.

The club tractor has now joined the Dodo as a relic of the past and Geoff is hopeful that in the next budget there will be an allowance for new equipment. Who knows?

The weather though is his true master. He says: "frost is always a problem on the side of the old stand. It blocks the sun, the wind and the light. Hopefully any plans for a new structure will allow for this. It is the height of the roof that is the crucial factor. If the new stand is set back further and they include see-through glass panels in the overhang it will help."

There is a sign on one League ground which states: "Grass grows by the inch but is killed by the foot." It is probably true that most groundsmen would prefer it if we kept the players off their hallowed baize. Yet they are a practical fraternity and in truth I suspect there is nothing gives Geoff and his colleagues more satisfaction than a few kind words about the state of the pitch.


