Following this evening's game we will have already completed six Premiership games but will have to wait ten days before the next one as the League grinds to a halt because of International fixtures next week. Who would have thought last year that this break would effect us but now in addition to Paul Bodin lining up for Wales, we have Nicky Summerbee receiving England U21 honours and Jan Aage Fjortoft who next Wednesday plays his 42nd International game for Norway when they meet the United States of America in Oslo in a friendly fixture.

We resume action in the FA Carling Premiership on Saturday 11 September when we meet West Ham United at Upton Park kicking off at 3.00pm.

Magpies Next

Our next home game in the Premiership is against fellow new boys Newcastle United on Saturday 18 September kicking off at 3.00pm. This is another all ticket affair. 

Disappointed as we are at our opening results in the Premiership we are far from being downhearted.


Yes, we were walloped by Liverpool then by Southampton but in both games we produced some very attractive football that is thoroughly appreciated by our fans.

I have been amazed by your support. I have received sacks of letters for supporters and well wishers urging us not to abandon our style of play. Keep going, keep believing, and it will cone right is the message emanating from you.

We are not too far away from making the breakthrough I'm sure. We have a lot of inexperienced players at this level and it will take time for them to adjust. They are very young tactically.

But at the Dell last week we murdered Southampton for football, and created chances which we didn't take. But we are not defending yet the way we would like and this is something we are working on.

The main difference between us and Southampton was Matthew Le-Tissier. The Premier League is a bit like junior football with teams getting through on the individual contribution of one or two outstanding individuals.



Oldham Athletic proved the real killer for us. If we had managed the point we held at 90-minutes then I think it would have just provided the impetus we want.

Because of the score-lines everyone is trying too hard. Consequently when the chances do materialise we are snatching at them.

The heavy defeats we have suffered are no fault of the goalkeeper or any other individual player. It is a collective problem which we are striving to overcome. I don't want to keep making excuses. We are all in this together, players, management, supporters, the lot. We still have to believe we can do it. You can help with your undying support.

Against Oldham we didn't play as well as we would like but looked tighter at the back. We do need to make changes of course but in so doing we will not compensate our own standards of play.

We need to maintain confidence though. It is so easy for players to drift when results are not being achieved.

I would have liked to have had more time to work with the players in the week as well. Because of the fixture scheduling in this league it makes it very difficult. We played Sunday and though we had the players in on Monday we obviously couldn't work hard. Then it was off to Southampton, rest on Thursday, prepare of Norwich on Friday.

I liked Leeds United manager Howard Wilkinson's remark on this subject. He said: "We are not coaches and managers anymore. Just entertainers."

As you know we are looking to improve the team, as and when we can, and in this respect we have taken Terry Fenwick on trial. Terry is a very experienced defender with an England pedigree and once he is fit should be an asset to the team.

He hasn't been back to Tottenham Hotspur since the Terry Venables saga so is a bit short on training.

Finally, a big welcome to Tony Book, a personality from Maine Road in much the same mould as our own John Trollope.

Enjoy the game.

Manchester City - A rocky start - by John Nolan

The dramatic sacking last Thursday of City's player-manager Peter Reid, only four matches and three defeats into the season, highlights the frustrations felt at Maine Road as they strive for success.

The return to glory of Manchester United, down the road, has emphasised City's demise in recent years and Reid's contract, and that of his assistant Sam Ellis, were terminated on the recommendation of the club's new general manger, John Maddock.

The irony is Maddock was appointed, only a week earlier, ostensibly to heal the rift between Reid and chairman Peter Swales. The stark reality though was that City had taken just one point from four games and were third from bottom of the Premiership.

Maddock explained the position when he said: "We felt that with the poor start to the season there was a need for a change in management and we felt it was best to address the situation immediately.

Following Peter Reid's dismissal City coach Tony Book took charge for the I-I draw with Coventry City last Friday. However the football pundits were unable to forsee John Maddock's next move, the appointment of Oxford boss Brian Horton as the new manager at Maine Road, a move which suprised the most faithful of City supporters.

It was a 2-0 home defeat at the hands of Blackburn Rovers that virtually finished Perter Reid whose last selection was: Coton, Hill (D Brightwell 33), Vonk, Curle, Phelan, Groenendijk, Flitcroft, McMahon (Reid 67), Holden, Sheron, Quinn.

Manchester City ABC

David Brightwell - Central Defender. The younger brother of lan, though 3 inches taller at 6' 1", David joined City in 1988 but made his debut in the Football League for Chester while on loan in 1991. His first appearance for the City first team came away at Wimbledon as a substitute in February of 1992. Back at Maine Road he has had only occasional first team appearances. Born: Lutterworth 7-1-71.


lan Brightwell - Midfield. As his brother did 5 seasons later, lan made his debut for City against Wimbledon on the first day of the season in 1986. Before signing for the first team lan helped City's Youth Team to an FA Youth Cup success in 1986 and is also a former England Under-21 player. Born: Lutterworth 9-4-68.

Tony Coton - Goalkeeper. Tony made an impressive debut for Birmingham City in December 1980 saving a penalty just 54 seconds after the start.

In September 1984 a £300,000 move took him to Watford where Tony made nearly 300 senior appearances and took the "Hornet of the Year Award" three times. Moved to City for £1 million in pre season 1990 and has since made over 100 senior appearances and continued his good form gaining last seasons Blues "Player of the Year". Born: Tamworth 19-5-61.

Keith Curle - Defender. Appeared in the League wearing a Bristol Rovers shirt at the start of the 81/82 season before spells with Torquay United and Bristol City. Keith already has experience of Wembley appearing in successive finals of the Freight Rover Trophy in '86 and '87. In 1988 Keith moved to Reading and appeared at Wembley again, this time as a winner of the Simod Cup. Wimbledon paid £500,000 for Keith in October 1988 and in August 1991 signed for City for £2.5 million. Keith has also played for England on three occasions. Born: Bristol 14-11-63.

Andy Dibble - Goalkeeper. Andy, like Tony, made a famous penalty save, in this case for Luton in their victorious 1988 League Cup Final at Wembley. Andy made his debut for Cardiff City in May 1982 and after appearing 71 times for the Welsh side he moved to Luton Town in 1984. Andy had loan spells at Sunderland and Huddersfield and in July 1988 joined City for £240,000 and was City's first choice keeper in their 1988/89 quest for promotion. Born: Cwmbran 8-5-65.

Gary Flitcroft - Midfield. Gary came from the ranks of the FA's School of Excellence and then progressed through the junior ranks at Maine Road to gain a regular first team place at the start of the 1992/93 season. At the end of the previous season Gary had a spell on loan at Bury following the example of team mate Mike Sheron. An England Under-21 player, Gary showed great potential last season. Born: Bolton 6-11-72.

Alfons Groenendijk - Midfield. The Dutchman came to England, and City, during the summer costing £500,000. Started his career at FC Den Haag, playing over 150 games before moving to Roda Kerkrade where he made a further 129 appearances. Alfons went on to play for Ajax, and although making only 35 appearances, one was in last seasons UEFA Cup Final.

Andy Hill - Defender. While an apprentice at Old Trafford Andy represented England at Youth level but his only senior experience before joining City was at Bury where he played 317 games helping the Shakers to promotion to Division Three in 1985. Came to Maine Road on Ioan in December 1990, duly impressed, and became Peter Reid's first major signing for City when he paid £300,000 for him in March of the following year. Born: Maltby 20-1-65.

Rick Holden - Forward. Made his League debut while on trial with Burnley moving on to Halifax and then Watford, playing as an old-fashioned left winger. Rick moved on to Oldham and was a part of the side which reached the Littlewoods Cup Final at Wembley in 1990 and then were promoted as Division 2 champions in 1991. Rick signed for City this summer costing Peter Reid £900,000. Born: Skipton 9-9-64.

Paul Lake - Utility. Having gained a Youth Cup winners medal in 1986 and taking the Youth Team to the semi-final the following year as captain, Paul made his League debut in January of 1987 and continued to rise, debuting for the England Under-21's in September 1988. Disaster struck however, when Paul suffered a serious knee injury that put him out of action for

nearly two seasons. In his second comeback game in August 1992 he fell victim to a severed ligament and is now recovering after another operation.

Steve McMahon - Midfield. The Liverpudlian started his career at Goodison Park moving on to Aston Villa for £175,000 in 1983. Steve was Kenny Dalglish's first signing as manager of Liverpool when he paid £375,000 for him. In his six year spell at Anfield, Steve won three League Championship medals and two FA Cup Winner's medals. He has been capped 17 times by England and joined City for £900,000 on Christmas Eve, 1991. Born: Liverpool 20-8-61.

Martyn Margetson - Goalkeeper. With the likes of Tony Coton and Andy Dibble in the City squad competition has been fierce and Martyn has made just 6 league appearances since signing for City in July 1990. His debut was against Manchester United in a heated derby at Old Trafford in May 1991. Martyn has however been capped for Wales at Youth, Under-21 and 'B' level.

Adie Mike - Forward. Adie is another who has made his way up through City's Youth team. He rose to make his First Team debut against Notts County in April of 1992. In his second senior game he scored and travelled to Australia for the World Youth

Championships in March 1993. Adie went to Bury for a loan spell in March of last season to gain more experience before breaking through to the First Team at Maine Road.

Terry Phelan - Defender. Terry's career began at Leeds but at the age of 19 he moved on to Swansea. It was only one season, however, before he joined Wimbledon for £100,000 taking part in the Don's shock FA Cup Final success in 1988. In 1991 Terry was capped by the Republic of Ireland and in 1992 moved to City for £2.5 million. Born: Manchester 16-3-67.

Mike Quigley - Midfield. Yet another product of City's Youth scheme. Mike joined City as a trainee in 1987. Made his senior debut against Sheffield Wednesday in a Zenith Data Systems Cup tie in October 1991. He made a further ten appearances in the remainder of the 91/92 and the 92/93 season's. Born: Manchester 2-10-70.

Mike Sheron - Forward. Mike joined City at the age of sixteen and progressed through the junior ranks before going to Bury on loan. There he made his league debut and in September 1990 he made his City debut as a substitute against Everton. The next month at Notts County, in his first full game for City, he scored and continued last season - scoring 11 times, a season which saw Mike's England Under-21 debut. Born: Liverpool 11-1-72.

Fitzroy Simpson - Midfield. His Youth career started off at Bristol but Fitzroy moved to Swindon and worked his way up to a League debut in December 1988. He made 120 appearances for Swindon including the Division 2 play off's of 1990. In March 1992, he joined City for £500,000 and made 29 appearances last season. Born: Trowbridge 26-2-70.

Michael Vonk - Defender. The second Dutchman in the team, played for three years at 'AZ 67' before signing for SVV Dordrecht. Michael had a weeks trial period at Maine Road in March 1992 and signed for £500,000. Michael received caps at both Youth and 'B' level for Holland, Born: 28-10-68.

David White - Forward. Started at Maine Road on a YTS scheme in 1984 and his height and tremendous pace have taken him on from there. His debut was against Leicester City in 1986 and in November 1987 he won Barclays "Young Eagle of the Month Award" achieving the same honour once more in September 1989. He has been City's top scorer in the last two seasons, hitting the target on 16 occasions last season. Unfortunately David failed to hit the net on his International debut for England against Spain in September of last year.

The man in charge



Described by Manchester City's General Manager John Maddock as the "professionals professional", Brian Horton took over the Maine Road hot seat on Monday saying he had taken on a big job - "one of the biggest in the Country.

Brian Horton Manchester City Manager

As a player, Brian made his name with Port Vale, where he made 258 appearances (36 goals) between 1970 and the season of 1975-76 when he moved to Brighton for £30,000.

Until then it had been a struggle for after serving his apprenticeship with Walsall he found himself on the shelf playing part-time football with his home town Club, Hednesford.

At Brighton, Brian was to clock up another 252 games in a highly successful period during which he was the inspiration as the Seagulls soared from Division Three to Division One...

In 1981 Luton Town splashed out £100,000 for his transfer and immediately installed him as captain. With his prompting and encouragement he drove the Hatters to promotion to Division One.

Released in 1984 to take on the player - manager role with Hull City, he immediately steered the Tigers to promotion to Division Two. In his first full seasons, with Brighton, Luton and Hull, Brian Horton had finished with promotion!

In the summer of 1988 he arrived at The Manor as Assistant Manager and within three months was holding the reins following the departure of Mark Lawrenson.

At Oxford United Brian demonstrated superb managerial skills on a shoestring budget and left last week under no illusions as to the size of the new job before him.

Spotlight on Niall Quinn

A tall rangy beanstalk of a man whose airiel strength goes without saying.


Niall was maligned for his awkward style in his younger days with Arsenal yet he shrugged it all aside and went on to prove himself a striker of international repute.

Born in Dublin, in October 1966, he shone at schoolboy level in Rugby and football before making an impact as a soccer star. Was recruited by Arsenal in 1983 and worked his way through the youth ranks to make a scoring League debut against Liverpool in December 1985.

Found himself very much in the shadow of England's Alan Smith at Highbury but did enough to earn international selection for the Republic of Ireland, winning his first cap, as a substitute, against Iceland in 1986.

Played in Eire's 1990 World Cup Finals team and scored the crucial equaliser against Holland which sent Jack Charlton's men through to the second phase.

In March 1990 Manchester City signed him for £800,000. Niall had scored 14 goals in 67 League appearances for the Gunners and by the close of the 1992-93 season had added another 45 League goals for City, having netted 20 goals in the League in his first season at Maine Road.

There is no let up as life in the Premiership proves just as hectic as that in the Football League. Tonight Town embark on their sixth league game with the season just over two weeks old.

In other words when the final whistle is blown by Referee Keith Cooper tonight we will have completed one seventh of our Premier League schedule!

Seems like sheer lunacy, particularly as these games have been staged at the height of the holiday season when clubs are missing much of their regular support.

The first meaningful FA Carling Premiership League table didn't make happy reading for Swindon Fans. After four games played we were stuck on the bottom rung, the only side without a single point...The encouraging facts however showed that Sheffield Wednesday and Manchester City were just a point better off and that in all twelve clubs were within six points range.

The Champions Manchester United are setting the early pace and they are at home to West Ham United tonight. The Hammers, promoted in second place last season, also had a worrying start to their campaign in the top flight but a draw at Coventry City - Highfield Road is a lucky ground for them - and a 2-0 victory last week over Sheffield Wednesday, when Clive Allen scored twice, settled their apprehension.

Not that all Hammers fans are convinced. One asked Billy Bonds if he was going to field two goalkeepers at Old Trafford tonight.

The humour in football is priceless. One Swindon wag rang the Club the other day and asked the delightful Michelle what the difference was between a triangle and Swindon Town? "I don't know." replied a perplexed Michelle..."A triangle has got points," came the cheeky response.

Hopefully we can put that right this week. Fancied Sheffield Wednesday have a few problems too. Manger Trevor Francis has spent no less than £14 million on new players in two years, his latest capture, at a mere £2.7 million form QPR, being England winger Andy Sinton (once of Cambridge United hasn't he done well). Yet the Owls, going into last Saturday's programme, hadn't even scored a goal this

season. Their one point coming from a goalless draw with Villa.

Wednesday play host to Norwich City tonight while Queen's Park Rangers, whose manager Gerry Francis still feels bitter at losing Sinton, are home to Sheffield United in an important clash for points.

Glenn Hoddle was finally able to celebrate a first victory as player-manager of Chelsea, at the fourth attempt, when he re-shuffled his attack and dropped Robert Fleck. Midfielder Gavin Peacock, signed from Newcastle United, was pushed up to partner Tony Cascarino and both obliged with a goal each in a 2-0 win over QPR.

Talking of strikers, there is speculation that England hit-man Alan Shearer could be making his comeback after knee surgery in Blackburn's starting line this week. Rovers are home to Arsenal this evening and the Gunners, if not convincing, are picking up the points.

Mr Francis, justly upset by the turmoil, has suggested we should introduce an italian style transfer ban during the season.

He sees this as the only effective way to protect the smaller clubs from the cheque-book diplomacy of the wealthy and claims: "Players would be more settled, it would help managers and put a check on agents.

"I don't want to stop players bettering themselves and earning money but I have honoured all my contracts as a manager and that is important."

"If players honoured their contracts it would give clubs like ours a chance. Everyone would be happier and I wouldn't have to read every day in the newspaper that half my team were going.


Our New Norwegian star is the first to admit that he has still yet to pass his physical test.

Jan's initiation into English football has not been a smooth one. The gifted Viking, who has almost been a fixture in his national team for the past six years, has found the physical aspects of English football hard to acclimatise to.

"It is like changing to a new culture," he pleads. "I have a lot of work to do not only getting used to the body contact in English football but also the mentality.

"I need more information about English football. Though I had seen it on TV that is not the same as being involved.

"It is good to be with a side like Swindon. It is a really friendly family club and the environment should help me to settle down much quicker.



"The British are more open. It is good. You know where you stand."

The former Lillestom striker has spent the past three years in Austria with Rapid Vienna where life as a professional footballer is more relaxed than here.

Says Jan: "The game is played much faster here. There is no time at all to rest like I did in Austria. But football there is very sterile. The game at club level is suffering from the lack of success by their national team.

"Vienna is a lovely place to live of course but I am happy here."

Why choose Swindon when Europe was his oyster?

Jan smiles: "I could have gone to Spain and had an unbelievable offer from a club in Turkey. But I wanted to play in English football."

Not in Italy? Surely the strongest league in Europe.


"Yes," agrees Jan, who continue: "but I have to remain realistic. I'm a Norwegian. We have no big super-stars like Platt and Gascoigne. They are the sort of attraction the Italians thrive on."

So the Premiership is then, for the lad who has yet to reproduce his best form in this country.

He says: "You didn't find so many hard playing players in Austria. You have to battle for everything it isn't easy. You don't always get the free-kicks you deserve either."

One thing Jan has learned however is "to keep his mouth shut." A good start for a man who goes in where it hurts.
