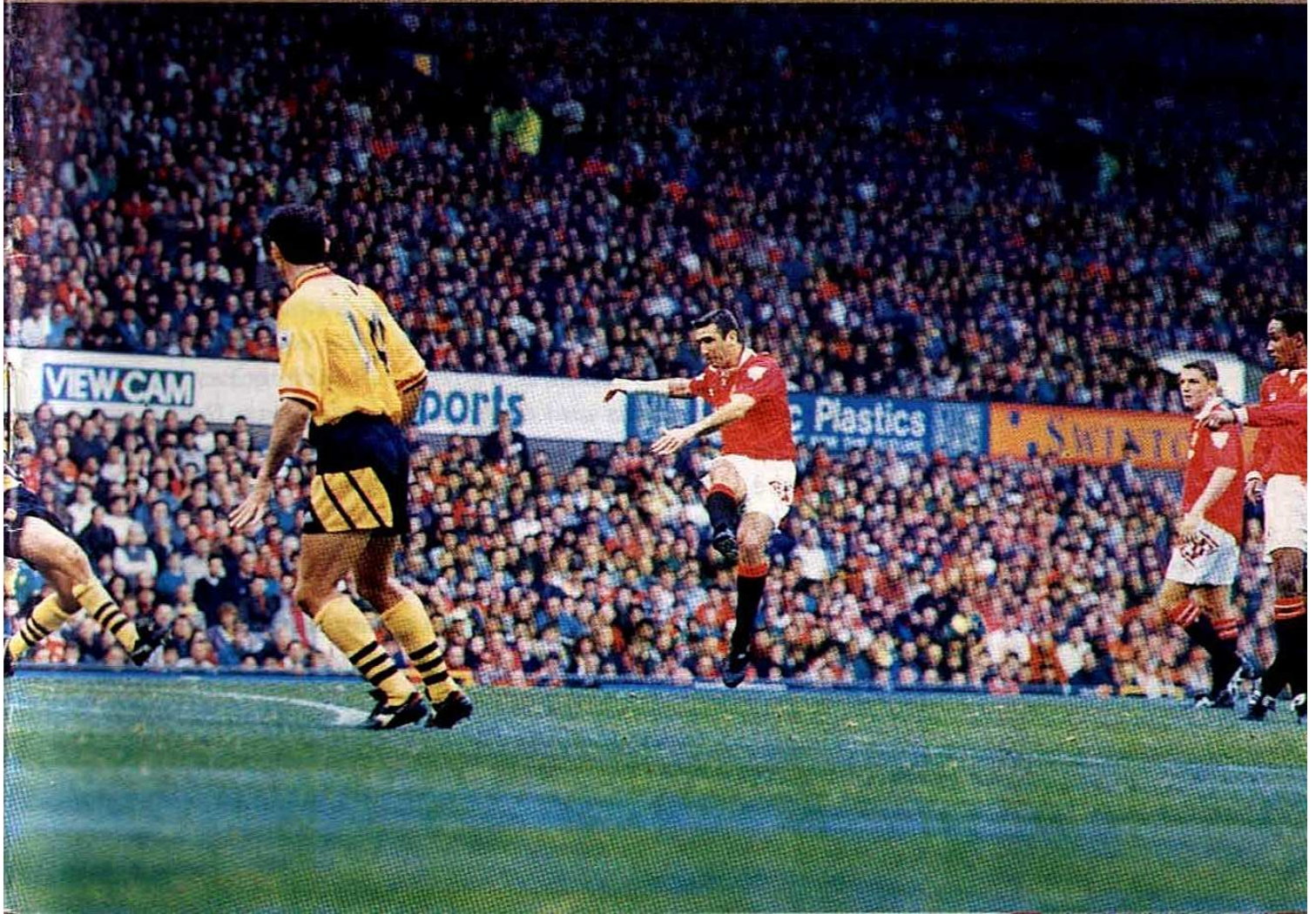

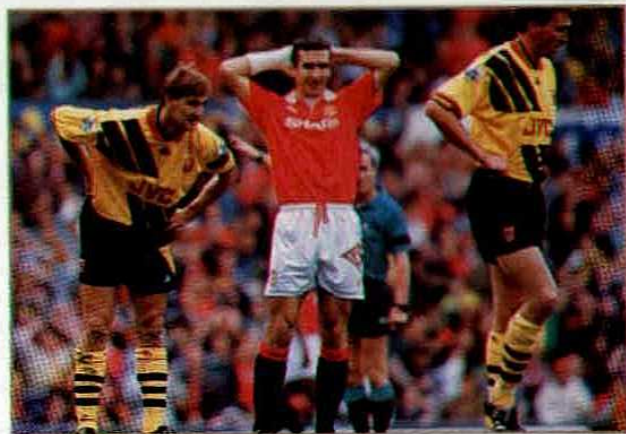

The F.A. Premier League has recently announced a slight change to the way that half-time substitutions are carried out. From now on any team which makes an interval change shall return to the field with just

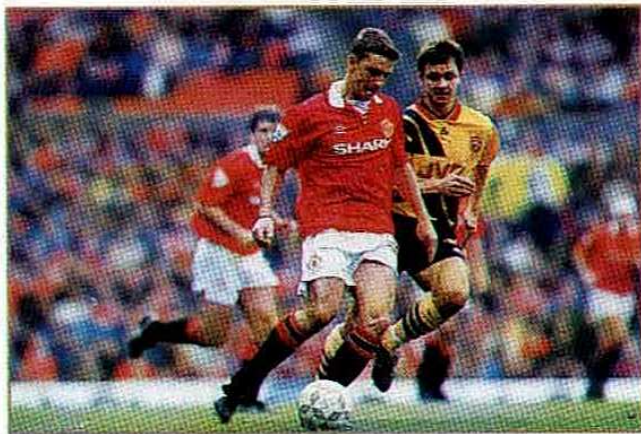

# The Manager

Swindon reached the top by playing creative and open football. It was something Lou Macari instilled and, as you might expect from their own playing records, it was the gospel preached by Ossie Ardiles and Glenn Hoddle.

Now John Gorman is the manager and I know he will also be putting the accent on playing skills.

As far as management is concerned there is something of an 'Old Firm' reunion today. John was a young reserve with Celtic when I was playing for Rangers and I played against his assistant, Davie Hay, several times at Ibrox and Parkhead.

John went on to play for Carlisle and then Spurs where I think he formed his friendship with Glenn Hoddle, later becoming his assistant at Swindon.

Now with Hoddle at Chelsea, John is in at the deep end. It's a new life for both Swindon and their manager in the Premier League and they are clearly having a hard time at the moment. They lost their opening games, though I see now that they are digging in with a draw here and there. Good football is still their hallmark though and I wish them well. I think we all like to see footballing teams and, while we have our own ambitions, I hope they do well enough to stay in the Premiership.

I would imagine that their objective this season is to make sure they survive and, if football is the criterion, they will and rightly so.

But there my kind thoughts will have to stop. Our own desires are different and our target must be points to make sure we keep our noses in front at the top of the table.

I was delighted with the response after suffering our first defeat of the season at Chelsea. We promptly had what I consider a very good week, winning the away leg in Europe and then beating Arsenal, our closest rivals.



We must make sure we don't take Swindon for granted and relax like we did against Newcastle who came off a poor run to take a point out of Old Trafford.

It's all about commitment and concentration. That way you get the kind of consistency I am looking for as we take on a third competition with the Coca-Cola Cup.

Games are coming thick and fast. I made changes for the tie at Stoke

in midweek after picking up some niggling injuries which keep troubling various players.

I think our supporters have got to take a long-term view when they assess my team changes from now on and realise that I am planning to keep the players as fresh as possible right through to next May when hopefully we are in for honours and performance is critical.

I don't want them burned out by March and I want people to understand that when I tinker with the team it is not for tinkering's sake but as part of a design for the whole season.

There are a number of factors to bear in mind. The obvious one is injuries and tiredness, but there is also the matter of keeping everyone in the squad not just happy, but tuned up ready to come into the team when needed. We have a large pool and when everyone is fit my selection is a real dilemma. The point to remember is that, while we have been reasonably lucky so far this season, the reality is that injuries strike sooner or later.

There will be plenty of games for all our squad, but they need to be involved and prepared. You saw a few fresh faces at Stoke and that is very often how it will be for midweek games and meeting the demands of changing the team for the European Cup.

In the meantime welcome to Swindon and enjoy the game. I think it will be entertaining.

# The Captain

**T**here are few clubs in the Football League that don't have a connection with Manchester United. Lou Macari is undoubtedly the manager who began the revival that saw Swindon clamber into the Carling Premiership last season. The influence of Ossie Ardiles and Glenn Hoddle saw them play football of high quality and now John Gorman has toughest test of all - to keep his team in the Premiership.

It will not be easy to establish a position strong enough to guarantee survival as Newcastle United and West Ham are also finding out. Make no mistake - it is tough at the top and despite being members of the League since 1920, Swindon did not reach Division Two until 43 years later.

To lose a successful manager after promotion is a considerable setback for any club. When the best player in the team goes as well the complications multiply. The departure of Glenn Hoddle, a superb passer of the ball as we were reminded at Chelsea recently, left a huge hole at Swindon. It will be a battle all season to achieve a survival target of points.

Apart from Lou Macari, there is another fascinating Manchester link with Swindon. I refer, of course, to Nick Summerbee, born 22 years ago in Altrincham, when the career of his father Mike with Manchester City was at its height.

Nick, encouraged at Swindon by Lou, is



the third generation of the Summerbee family to play top League football and I believe that is a record.

The Summerbee story began with George, born in Winchester. After Aldershot, he played for Preston and was the reserve when George Mutch's last gasp penalty in extra time beat Huddersfield

Town in the dramatic 1938 F.A. Cup Final.

We talk about pressure in the game today. I can't imagine anything more dramatic than having to take that penalty.

Mike Summerbee's career began at Swindon before he joined City and won eight England caps. There is football in the Robson family and my brother Gary now plays for Bradford City after several years with my former club West Brom.

I doubt if Gary or I will ever equal the family record of playing in the League with a son as did Alex Herd, formerly of City, and David, the ex-United forward, with Stockport County.

I make no apologies for repeating my appeal and asking the fans to stump up £1 a head for the Bryan Robson Scanner Appeal today. If every fan was able to do that, the Appeal would hover on the target of £1,500,000. I know money is tight, but some small sacrifice would help to finance a costly piece of modern technology that can detect serious illness at an early stage and save a child's life. It could be YOUR child's life. Thank you.

## ROADWORKS

Major Highway Maintenance has recently been undertaken to the east of Greater Manchester.

The work in question on the A57 Hyde Road/Mottram Moor, Mottram, Tameside was due to be completed by the end of this month.

The roadworks involved week-end closures of the M67 East-bound at Junction 1 (Hyde) and a section of the A57 in both directions between M67

Eastern Terminal Roundabout and its junction with the A6018. A diversion via Asbton-under-Lyne and Stalybridge has been utilised to minimise delays.

When we last spoke with the Engineering Department at Tameside they were confident that the end of September target for completion would be met. However, with our match against Sheffield Wednesday at Hillsborough next Saturday in mind supporters are advised to keep an eye open in the press for latest developments.

# Signing On Signing Off Transfers

## Football News & Views

**B**est result of the season so far has to be Newcastle's 4-2 defeat of Sheffield Wednesday. 2-1 down with only 14 minutes remaining the Premiership's new boys put on a finish to match any St James' Park has seen in decades. Wednesday's new £2,750,000 million signing Andy Sinton bit a couple before Alex Mathie, a close season signing by Kevin Keegan from Morton, came on in the second half to make his debut and inspire a famous Newcastle victory, scoring one spectacular goal and making another.

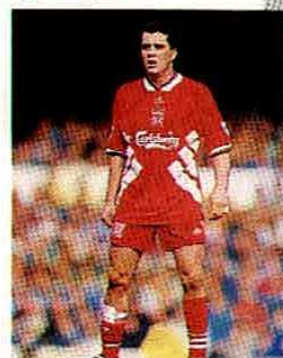
- United's defeat at Chelsea was their first in seventeen league games. It also ended a run of seven consecutive away league wins. Leeds United's victory at Southampton was the first win on their travels since the day they clinched they championship in May, 1992, twenty five away games ago.
- Attendances in the Premiership continue to rise, up by 11% on last season. Top crowd so far is the 44,613 who watched United beat West Ham while the lowest was 6,038 for what was dubbed the first relegation clash of the season, Wimbledon against Southampton.
- Big money still changes hands. Last week Liverpool paid West Ham £1,500,000 plus defender David Burrows and midfielder Mike Marsh for Hammers' defender Julian Dicks. West Ham then spent some of that money into recruiting Portsmouth's Lee Chapman to their ranks for £250,000. The EastEnders' three new boys seemed to do the trick as they pulled off a surprise win at

Blackburn. Chapman took just thirty three minutes to get himself on the scoresheet with his new club. Liverpool, giving Dicks his debut, slumped to a 2-0 defeat at Everton, their fourth in five games.

- Manchester City might have appeased a few of their fans with their latest signing - Republic of Ireland international Alan Kernaghan cost them £1,500,000 from Middlesbrough. In the same week Paul Allen joined Southampton from Spurs for £550,000.

● Alan Harper, formerly with Liverpool, Everton, Manchester City and Sheffield Wednesday has now joined Luton Town on a free transfer but will not want to remember his latest debut. A loose clearance out of defence from him let in Tranmere's Ian Muir to strike Rovers' first of the night. Tranmere eventually won 4-1.

- Up in Scotland it's turning out to be something of a topsy-turvey season. Champions Rangers have now played five league games without tasting victory and have been thrust into mid-table anonymity. Celtic haven't performed much better either. Hibernian and Motherwell now top the table in what could be the most interesting season in years.

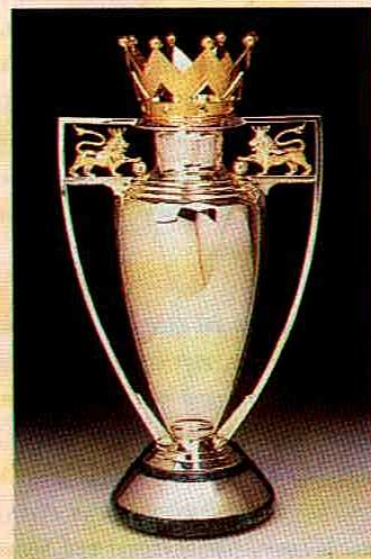

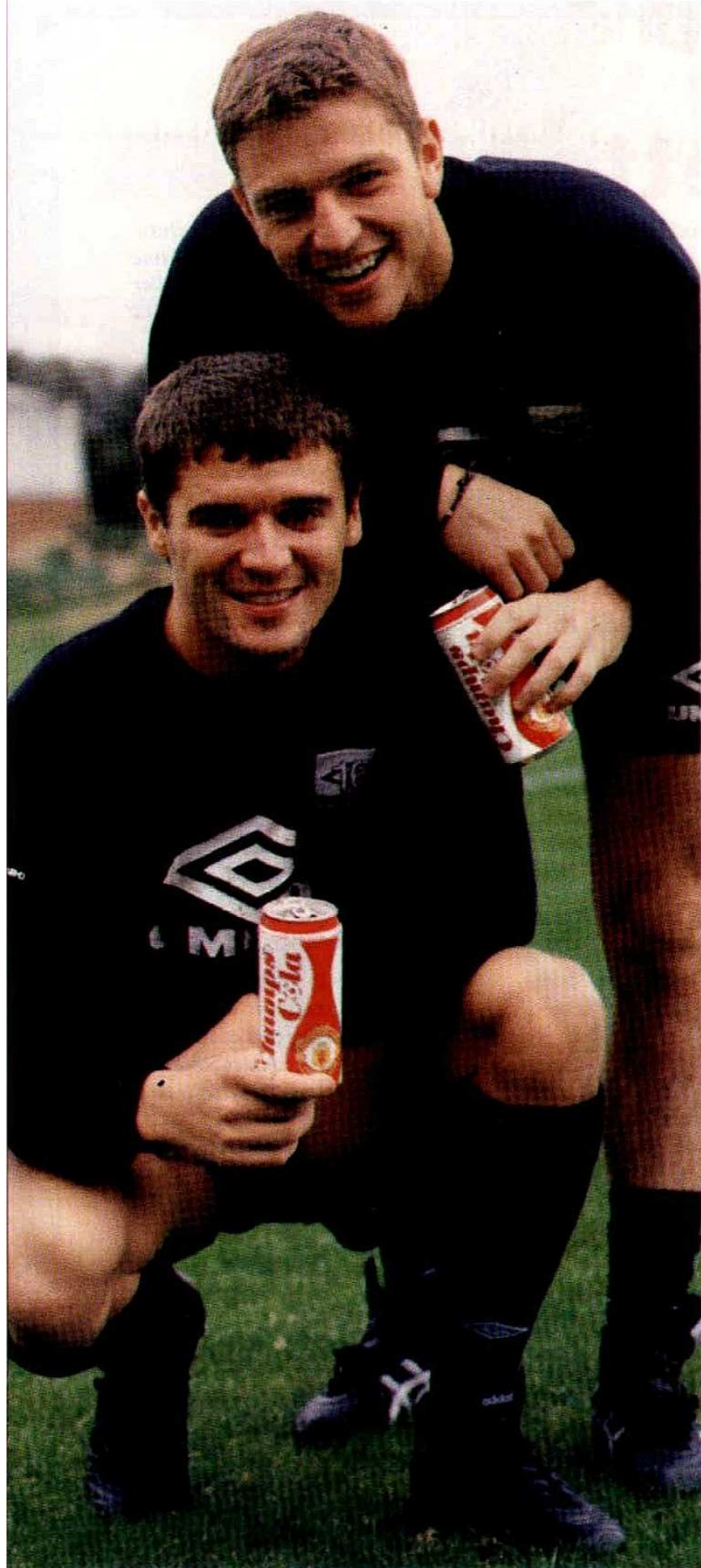

# European Profile

A new 'Ivan the Terrible' is extending his reign of terror - over all manner of defenders - across Europe.

**IVANO ZAMORANO** is providing Chilean football with a sense of pride at a time when the national team is in the doldrums after missing the World Cup qualifiers through suspension.

The great days of Chilean football are well in the past, more than 30 years to be exact, since they finished third as hosts in the 1962 World Cup. Great players who have earned worldwide reputations have been few and far between - from wing half Eladio Rojas and temperamental left winger Leonel Sanchez in the 1960s to marksman-cum-political-revolutionary Carlos Caszely in the 1980s. Now, in Zamorano, Chilean football has raised a marksman on whom no less a club than Real Madrid are relying to emulate the goal grabbing feats of Hugo Sanchez, the spectacular Mexican who was top scorer in the Spanish league for five years.

Madrid kicked out Sanchez more than 18 months ago, intimating that he had become too big for his shooting boots. Quickly, Madrid agreed terms with Spanish rivals Sevilla for Zamorano and, come the end of the season, a four year contract and the £4,000,000 deal was signed and sealed.

Zamorano was Madrid's leading scorer last season with 26 goals. He cracked a superb effort in the 2-1 defeat of old rivals Barcelona and, after a slow start, finished runner-up in the league scoring charts.

Surprisingly, Zamorano credits his success to a spell in the shadows of the Swiss alps, with St Gallen, the oldest club in Switzerland.

He says: "Without the two years I spent at St Gallen I would not be at Madrid today. It's like this: when I left my Chilean club to come to Europe I had a trial in Italy with Bologna. But I didn't impress them and so I had to settle for Switzerland. I thought that was second best. Now I know different. when I was playing at St Gallen we had, I think, only six full-time professionals and the size of the crowds meant the club's financial standing was very much on the borderline. But, looking back, that was good for me. I was, if you like, as a footballer a blank page. I had the opportunity to write my own story as a professional footballer. I had



to work - to start at the bottom. There was no excuse to take on any airs and graces.

"Also, I was very aware of my responsibilities to my family back in Chile. My father had died when I was 13. It was a terrible blow for us all. As the eldest child, the only son, I had to grow up very fast and learn about working for the right to live. That lesson also helped me as a footballer. "The only thing which surprises me, looking back, is quite how quickly everything took off in my career."

After two years at St Gallen, in which Zamorano became Swiss league top scorer with 23 goals in 1989-90, he was sold to Sevilla for £1,500,000. Sevilla sold him to Madrid last year for £4,000,000 and put their £2,500,000 profit towards the controversial and short-lived purchase of Diego Maradona.

Zamorano's high profile in Spanish soccer helped him, no doubt, to earn selection as Chilean Sportsman of the Year. But, still, Zamorano has kept his feet on the ground.

For example Madrid offered him, last summer, a choice of luxury villas such as those in which team-mates Michel and Emilio Butragueno live. But Zamorano politely declined.

What should he do with all that space? He needed enough only for himself and his mother, who looks after him. So Zamorano lives in a

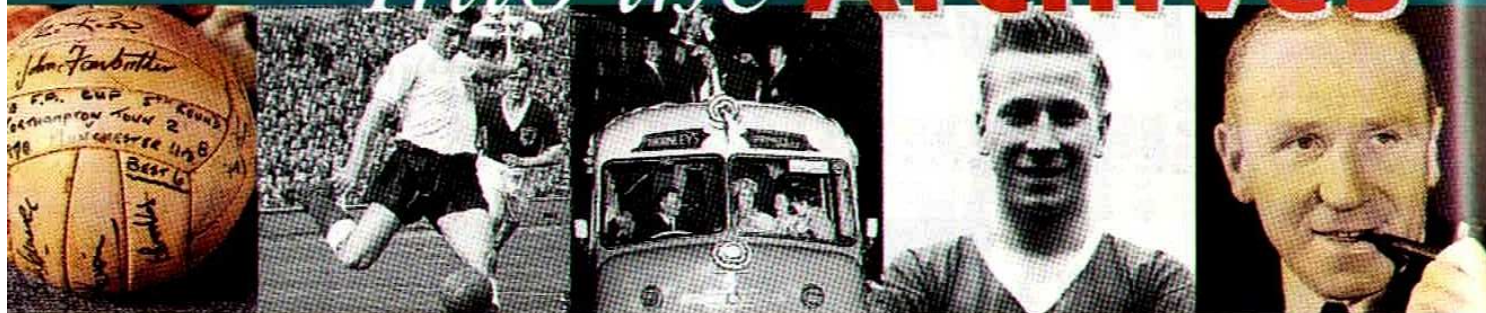
modern apartment block, perfectly happily. As he says: "It's important in every facet of life to keep your feet on the ground. Look at me: I'm healthy and I'm happy. To ask for anything more would be impertinent!"

# Into the Archives



**O**ver the years United's players and supporters have developed a special bond of friendship with those of Real Madrid. This great Spanish club, six times winners of the European Cup, including the first five competitions, stood head and shoulders above almost every other club in Europe. United themselves had played Real in the 1956 European Cup semi-final, losing 5-3 on aggregate after two tightly contested matches. It was to be after the Munich Air Disaster in 1958 that a bond of friendship was struck up between the two clubs.



Between 1959 and 1962 United played Real Madrid five times in friendly matches - a quite astonishing number considering that Real were at the height of their fame and in constant demand for appearances all over the world. This was especially so after their 7-3 demolition of Eintracht Frankfurt in the 1960 European Cup Final at Hampden Park. The first match against Real was on October 1st 1959 at Old Trafford. The Spanish visitors raced into a 4-0 lead by half-time eventually winning 6-1. Warren Bradley scored United's solitary goal. Six weeks later and the Santiago Bernabeu Stadium in Madrid was the venue for an eleven goal thriller. Eighty thousand fans saw United take a shock 3-0 lead after only thirteen minutes as Quixall, Bradley and Viollet scored. Di Stefano pulled a goal back to set up a revival by Madrid.

Despite Charlton and Dawson adding to United's tally, Real ran out 6-5 winners. In 1960 Madrid were again back at Old Trafford winning 3-2 in front of 51,506 spectators. Di Stefano opened the scoring for Madrid, Pearson equalised for United before Vidal and Rial added to the Spaniards' score. A late goal from Nicholson



*finished the scoring. To commemorate this match Real presented United with this silver ornamental bowl supported by four cherubs. Also pictured is the shirt worn by Madrid's goalkeeper, Dominquez, swapped after the match by United's keeper Harry Gregg. The following year United eventually gained their first victory over the Spanish giants winning 3-1 at Old Trafford. Pictured is the pennant presented to United before the match. Phil Chisnall and David Herd(2) scored for United in this historic match.*

*As a Testimonial for Jose Zarraga, Real's long serving wing-half and captain, United were chosen as the opponents for his benefit match. The trophy pictured here is from this match, played in Madrid on September 19th, 1962. United came out on top scoring twice without reply to again turn the tables on their old friends.*

*Apart from 1968 when United and Real clashed at the semi-final stage of the European Cup, this was to be the last match between the clubs until 1978. As a curtain raiser to United's Centenary Season, United defeated Real 4-0 at Old Trafford in front of a crowd allowed in free to celebrate the occasion. Sammy McIlroy and Jimmy Greenhoff with two apiece were United's scorers. This ornamental jug was Madrid's gift to United to*

*commemorate both the match and the club's centenary.*

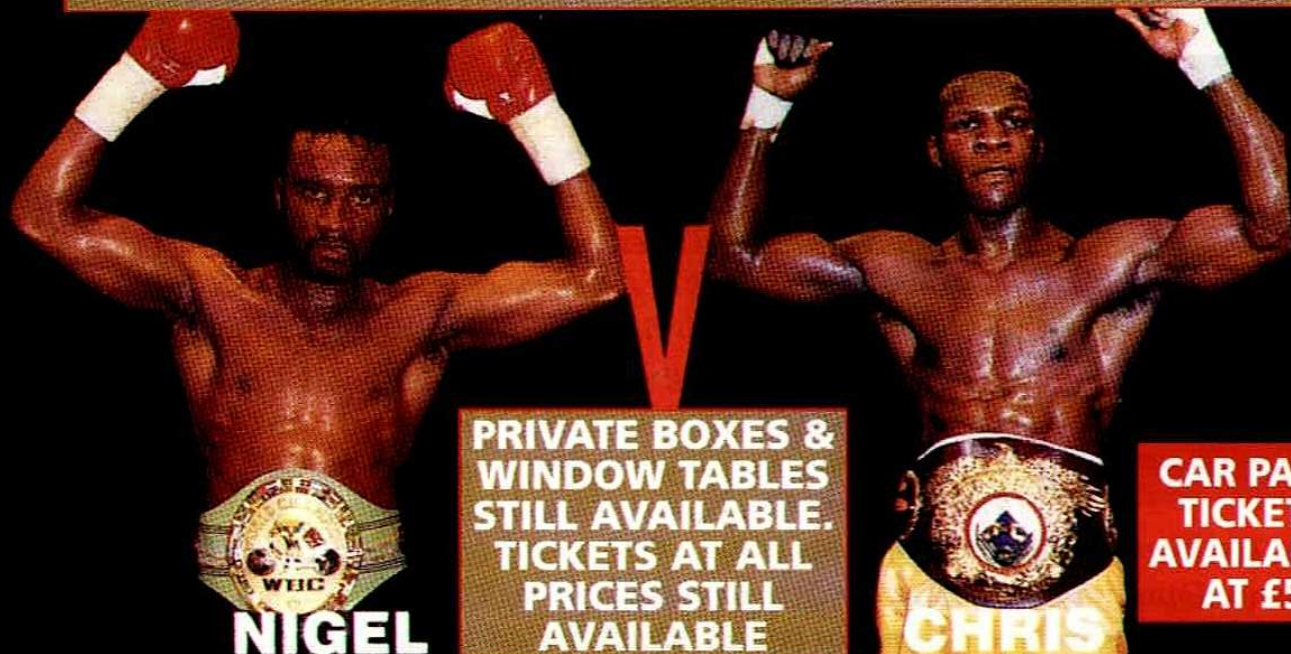

# Intercontinental News

## ARGENTINA:

As reported in the 'United Review' against Arsenal, Diego Maradona is planning a comeback with Newell's Old Boys of Rosario. He will receive a £2,500,000 signing-on fee and £15,000 a month.

## BELGIUM:

Albert Roossens, the so-called "Father of Belgian football", has died aged 77. Roossens was secretary of the Belgian federation from 1951 to 1988. He was given a six-month suspended jail sentence in 1989 for contributory negligence in the wake of the 1985 Heysel disaster.

## ITALY:

Inter midfielder Nicola Berti is out for the rest of the season after damaging knee ligaments in a 2-1 win over Cremonese. Lazio president Sergio Cragnotti says Paul Gascoigne should end his media silence. Cragnotti says: "If he was upset because the papers wrote he was overweight after the summer holidays then the answer lay with him. He really was overweight. If anyone should have been upset it was the club."



## NIGERIA:

Thousands of fans turned out to welcome home the new World under-17 champions after their 2-0 defeat of Ghana in the Final in Tokyo. The government gave the players a bonus of £2,000 each.

## BOLIVIA:

State President Gonzalo Sanchez de Lozada protested to FIFA over the refereeing of the 2-1 World Cup defeat by Uruguay in Montevideo. The Bolivian ambassador in Bogota was also ordered to complain to the Colombian Referees' Association about the performance of Colombian referee Armando Perez Hoyos.

## AUSTRALIA:

National boss Eddie Thomson wants Aston Villa - and former United - goalkeeper Mark Bosnich to end his international retirement and return to national duty for the World Cup qualifying play-offs against Argentina.



## BRAZIL:

Brazil finally made it to the finals of the 1994 World Cup. After a poor start in their qualifying campaign, the three times world champions secured their place at USA '94 thanks to a 2-0 victory over old rivals Uruguay in Rio de Janeiro. Barcelona striker Romario, recalled by Brazil after a year in the international wilderness, scored both goals. Going with them for the first time will be Bolivia. The Uruguayans, rugged as ever will, to the relief of many, miss the party.

*There isn't much that Steve Bruce hasn't achieved during his six-year stint as a tower of strength in the centre of United's defence. He has played his part to the full in each and every triumph to have come United's way in that time.*

*But even for someone who has gathered in pretty well every honour possible in a career which spans fourteen years and well over 650 senior appearances, he is still fired with ambition and boundless enthusiasm for the game.*

*Like everybody in the United camp, Steve will be dreaming of the night when the European Cup returns to Old Trafford. There's a long way to go before that can be fulfilled but at least the first step up the ladder was negotiated successfully in Budapest last week. Steve also harbours the hope that it is still possible that he could get the call to represent his country on the international stage. He would be the first to admit that he is no spring chicken, but where quality is concerned, age knows no barriers.*

*There was talk recently that Jack Charlton was about to ask Steve to pledge his allegiance to the Republic of Ireland in readiness for next summer's USA World Cup. Should that proposition be taken any further it would no doubt give Steve plenty to think about and a very tricky decision to make.*

*Should he not make that step into the international arena then he will end up being grouped with players like United's Jimmy Greenhoff, Joe Shaw (Sheffield United) and Bryan 'Pop' Robson of Newcastle United, West Ham United and Sunderland (now a member of our coaching staff) as 'the best never to get a full cap'. Steve was born in Newcastle-upon-Tyne in December 1960 and he made his name with the famed Wallsend Boys' Club before taking up an apprenticeship with Gillingham.*

*He later became a fixture in their first team and it was only a matter of time before the bigger clubs started to take notice - as they do. In Steve's case it was Norwich City and he was transferred to Carrow Road in the summer of 1984.*

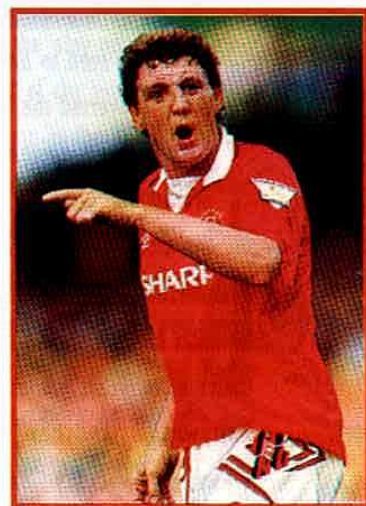
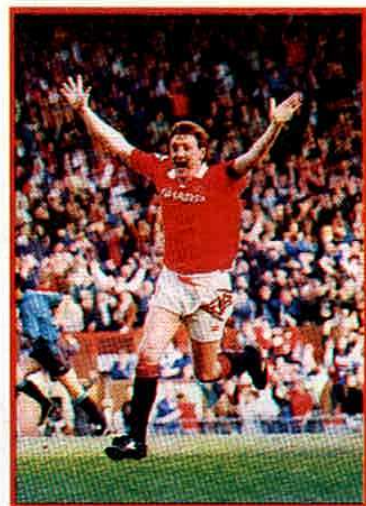

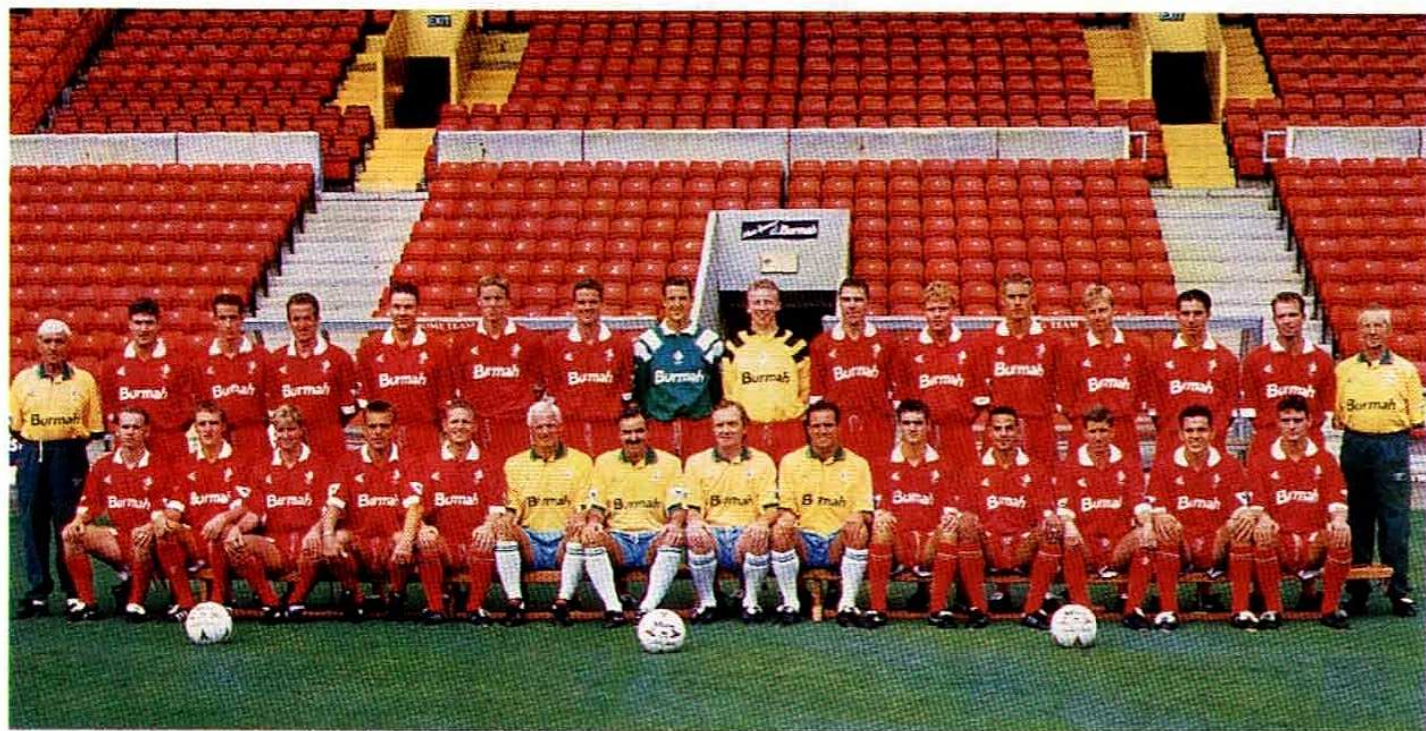

Justice was seen to have been done for Swindon when Paul Bodin converted the late Wembley penalty that gave them victory over Leicester in the final of last season's promotion play-offs. It took the club into the F.A. Carling Premiership, a prize that every Swindon fan felt should have been theirs three years earlier.

Following another famous Wembley victory in 1990, Swindon's supporters had travelled home in celebratory mood in the belief that the club had made it to the old First Division for the first time in their history.

It was later decreed that, due to alleged financial irregularities, Swindon would not be promoted and Sunderland went up in their place.

Now Swindon have, indeed, proudly taken their place at the top for the first time in club

history and for four of their players in particular it has been an experience to be savoured.

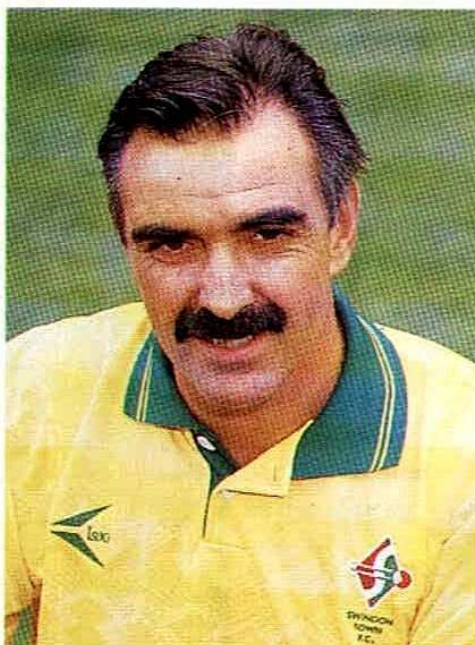
Goalkeeper Fraser Digby, defender Paul Bodin, defender Ross

Maclaren and striker Steve White remain from the team that defeated Sunderland on that poignant occasion at Wembley in 1990. Bodin, in fact, did leave the club but after spells with Crystal Palace and Newcastle, he returned two seasons ago. Unfortunately, he missed the opening games in the Premiership due to injury.

Manager John Gorman, who took over from Glenn Hoddle during the summer, appreciated that the task facing his side would be enormous. The biggest void he had to fill was that left by Hoddle's influence on the field.

Mr Gorman was also forced to seek replacements for Colin Calderwood (sold to Tottenham) and David

Mitchell (moved to Izmir in Turkey).

Norwegian striker Jan Aage Fjortoft arrived from Rapid Vienna for £650,000, Dutch utility player Luc Nijholt signed from Motherwell and Adrian Whitbread made the journey to Wiltshire from Leyton Orient.

With the attack lacking punch in the Robins' opening two games, Mr Gorman again went into the transfer market signing Andy Mutch from Wolves for £250,000. Andy scored well over 100 goals during his seven years as a Wolves' first-teamer though his fine efforts tended to be over-shadowed by the extraordinary scoring feats of Steve Bull.

With most other clubs, Mutch would have been a perpetual leading scorer and it is hoped that, once he has settled at the County Ground, the goals will start to flow for him again. Swindon's introduction to the Premiership was quite traumatic. They lost their opening four games and that included a 0-5 home defeat by Liverpool and a 1-5 hiding at struggling Southampton.

Yet the short, sharp shocks experienced from those defeats succeeded in spurring the players to go out and prove they are good enough for this level of football.

From then on performances, if not necessarily results, have improved considerably. Swindon travelled to Norwich and held them to a goalless draw. Although they then lost 1-3 at home to Manchester City, another valuable away point was collected with a 0-0 draw against West Ham.

"The encouraging thing for me is that the team is playing well now" says Mr Gorman. "If performances had continued to be poor I would have been very



worried. I think it is really a question of the players gaining a belief in themselves. I know we are worthy of Premiership status".

In recent weeks the two new strikers - Fjortoft and Mutch - have been given the opportunity to find some accord though the manager has had the considerable shooting talents of Craig Maskell, last season's top scorer, and the veteran Steve White on hand to increase his options up front.

The Robins certainly achieved their success the hard way last season. They lost Craig Maskell and Mick Hazard through injury in a game against Wolves at the end of January and, although both were out for several weeks, six of the next seven games were successfully overcome. Although the two guaranteed promotion places were beyond their grasp they were always fancied to qualify for the play-offs, which they duly achieved a week before the end of the season. Tranmere Rovers were defeated 5-4 on aggregate in the semi-finals and Leicester went down 4-3 in a cracking final. Leading 3-0 after 53 minutes, Swindon appeared to be home and dry. Three goals in the space of 13 minutes drew Leicester level until Swindon were awarded a penalty with 6 minutes remaining

on the clock. Paul Bodin kept calm to slot the ball home and Swindon had finally made it into the top flight.

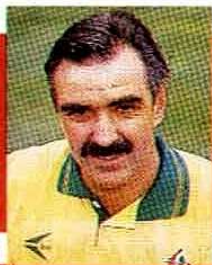

# POST



The first cover featured today is, in fact, the last cover produced for the 1992-93 season. It was issued for the Play-Off Final in which Swindon Town met Leicester City at Wembley on 31st May for a place in The FA Carling Premiership. The match was a seven goal thriller which Swindon won 4-3. Another cover has been issued this season to commemorate Swindon's first home game in the Premiership. That cover shows the fourth goal being scored by Swindon and the Wembley electronic scoreboard can be seen with the score still at 3-3. Both covers are currently selling at £3 each and form a significant part of the postal history of Swindon Town.

Talking about plenty of goals, the other cover featured is the Manchester United v Porto cover, issued on 2nd November 1977, when the two clubs met in the European Cup Winners' Cup. Once again seven goals were scored in the match which United won by 5-2, although they lost 6-5 on aggregate! This cover is currently available and priced at just £3.

Most covers issued will have the match result overprinted with details of scorers and any other relevant information if considered of special interest. This does delay the issue date of the covers because there is normally a small waiting period to receive the covers back from the Royal Mail where they are postmarked. They then have to be over-printed carefully with the match details. It is, therefore, usual to wait some 14 days or more before the covers are to hand and they then have to be distributed.

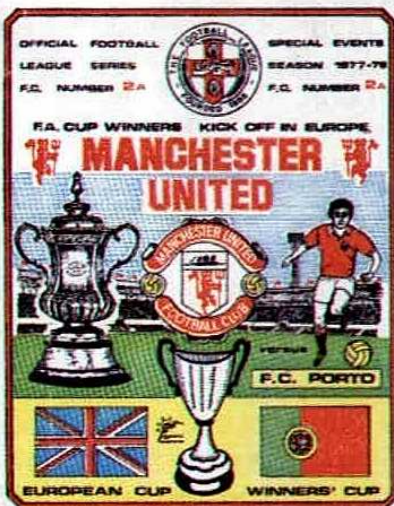

### HAROLD'S HALF-DOZEN

United and Swindon Town have never met in a League game before today. Our dealings with the Wiltshire club have been restricted to a couple of FA Cup ties in 1914 and 1930, and a quite remarkable FA Charity Shield match on 25th September 1911 - exactly 82 years ago to the day.

United had qualified to participate in the Shield game by virtue of winning the Football League Championship the previous season whilst Swindon Town had booked their place as Southern League Champions.

The teams met at Stamford Bridge - Chelsea's home ground - on a day that newspapers reported that Italy and Turkey were on course for war over claims to Tripoli in North Africa. News also of a maritime tragedy in France where the battleship *Liberte* had sunk, following an explosion in Toulon harbour with a loss of over 400 lives, and the Halle Orchestra had announced their conductors for the season - a list which included such illustrious names as Sir Henry Wood and Mr (later Sir) Thomas Beecham.

As one of the country's top clubs, having won the title in 1908 and 1911, and the FA Cup two years earlier in 1909, United were always making the news. Meanwhile Swindon had headed the Southern League with a five point advantage over Northampton Town. So the stage was set for the Monday afternoon showdown in West London. The attendance totalled 8,000 and they had paid £229 for the privilege.

United started the game with the wind at their backs and almost immediately were disadvantaged when defensive stalwart Charlie Roberts was injured and forced to sit out the next few minutes. This was quickly followed by another blow when Swindon's Harold Fleming shot past United goalkeeper Hugh Edmonds to record the game's first goal. It was to be Town's only moment to savour, for moments later Sandy Turnbull had equalised for United.

'Then came some remarkable football', as the Manchester

Guardian reported it the following morning, from United's centre-forward Harold Halse. He was in unstoppable form as he crashed home three goals in a fifteen minute spell. One of these goals was said to have been a 'really brilliant effort' as he went past Frank Handley and Harry Kay before rounding 'keeper Len Skiller to put the ball in the net.

Freddie Wheatcroft had claimed Swindon's second goal when United were leading 3-1 and, just before the interval, a foul by Leslie Hofton gave Billy Tout the chance to score from the penalty spot. Half-time United 4, Swindon Town 3.

The second half was only fifteen minutes old when Halse completely baffled the Town defence with a delightful rising shot which gave Skiller no chance. Halse was buzzing and he quickly added another couple of goals to raise his personal haul to six. United were now leading 7-3 and there was a noticeable change of pace about the game, but that didn't prevent George Wall from racing into the Swindon area to hit home the eighth goal.

Five minutes from time saw Bob Jefferson hit a high shot over Edmonds' shoulders to take the total of goals scored to a round dozen.

Billy Meredith, who was injured and less effective in the second half, was brilliant earlier in the game. United's full-backs Stacey and Hofton held complete mastery over the Swindon forwards whilst Jefferson was said to be Swindon's outstanding player. Fleming also 'did many clever things', but nobody could take the accolades away from Halse who'd enjoyed a once-in-a-career afternoon. His six goals helped United to lift the FA Charity Shield for the second time with a scoreline which still stands as a record to this day.

## Evacuation Procedure

Both Manchester United and the Greater Manchester Police have a very detailed evacuation procedure in place should the need arise. Regular supporters will, no doubt, know that we frequently test our emergency tone. In the event that this tone should be sounded in a real situation, spectators should remain in their position and listen carefully to the announcement which will follow. For this reason loud speakers are located not only on the stand but in all concourse areas, toilets and even outside the stadium. Depending upon the severity of the incident, whole stands, part stands or even the entire stadium may be evacuated. Again, depending on the nature of the incident, egress may take place on to the playing area and out of the stadium. In any event, please listen carefully and follow the instructions given. Before such an announcement is made, both the police and the club will be aware of what is happening and will take the necessary action. Our PA System can be made to operate on a zone by zone basis. It may be, therefore, that certain zones are affected but not others. In such an event our main attention will be focused on the zone concerned. If you do not hear an announcement but one which is broadcast in an area other than your own, you should ignore that announcement and respond only to messages directed at your section. In the event of partial or full evacuation, all spectators are asked to respond calmly but as quickly as possible. Part of our emergency evacuation policy is to make spectators aware of what is happening and to update this information as frequently as necessary.

## Help us to combat thugs and keep them on the run

As the new season gets under way, everyone hopes it will be trouble free, off the pitch as well as on. Over recent years, police and clubs, with valuable help from The Football Association, The Football League and you the fans, have made great strides in cutting down on organised hooliganism in and outside grounds. Better stewarding, closed circuit TV and other initiatives have all contributed, but a critically important factor has been better intelligence about what likely trouble makers are up to. This is where we in NCIS come in, along with you. For three years now, we have been quietly building up intelligence about the small number of hard core thugs and their hangers on. Most of them are known to us, and together with your local police, we put a lot of effort into targeting them and frustrating their plans, by arrest wherever possible. But we also rely on information from the genuine fans, the overwhelming majority. Our national 24 hour confidential hotline has also been running for two years and has produced a surprising amount of high quality tips.

### So if you:

See or hear of any plans for organised hooliganism, at grounds or elsewhere. If you have witnessed any unlawful activity, a quiet call to the hotline, or your local police, could make all the difference. Naturally we like to know who you are, but that isn't vital.

It's our game, don't let a tiny minority drag it's reputation through the mud.

*We have contained the problem, but despite what you may read or hear in some quarters, it has not, repeat not gone away.*

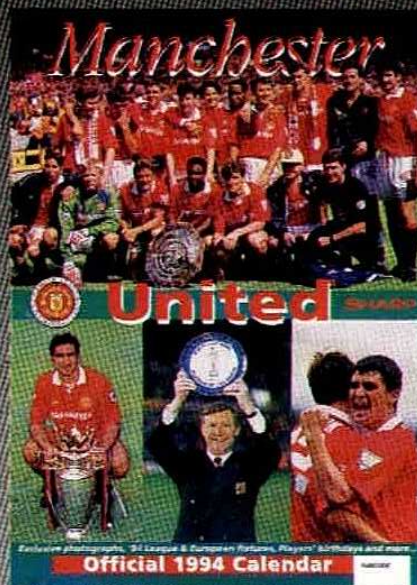
