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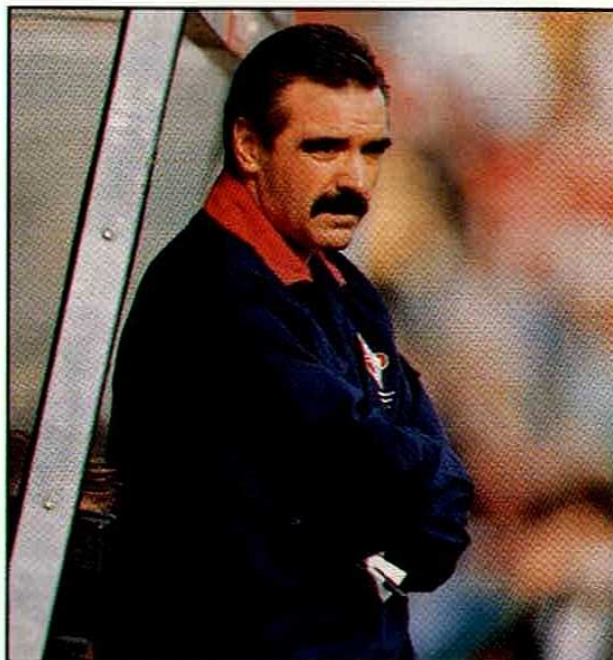

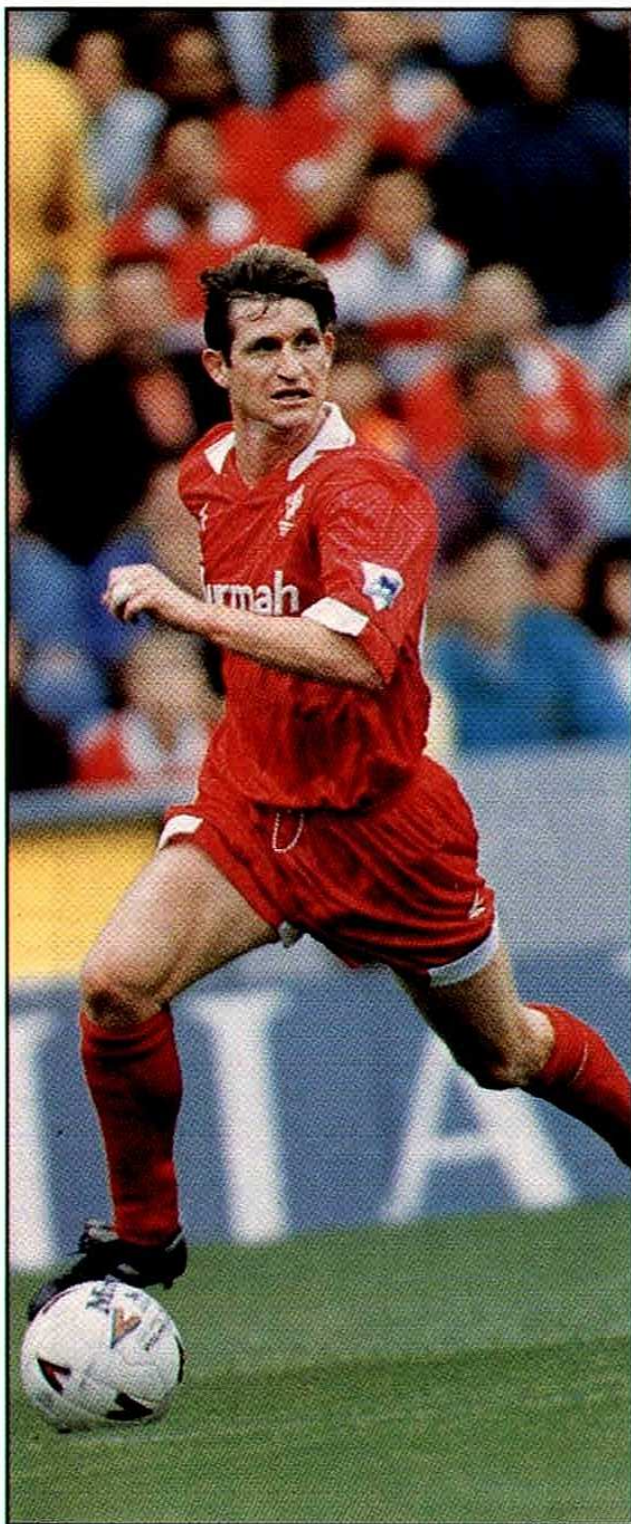
Today we can forget Premiership problems for a while and concentrate on the Cup.

Even when Fraser had to go off and Nicky hardly had time to handle the ball we found ourselves further behind but the lads fought back magnificently to pull it back again and force a well deserved draw.

It was a great night with 30,000 people in a wonderful stadium and lots of atmosphere. It is the kind of experience we all want to continue enjoying and the only way we can do this is by making sure we are still in the Premiership next season.

This was proved last Monday evening at Coventry City when although losing we continued right up to the final whistle and through our positive thinking and the marvellous support of our travelling fans we battled back to earn a share of the points.

We improved defensively against another in form team in the game which was shown live on SKY.

So to this afternoon's tie. Luc Nijholt is back in contention after his illness but we are without Keith Scott who is Cup-tied.

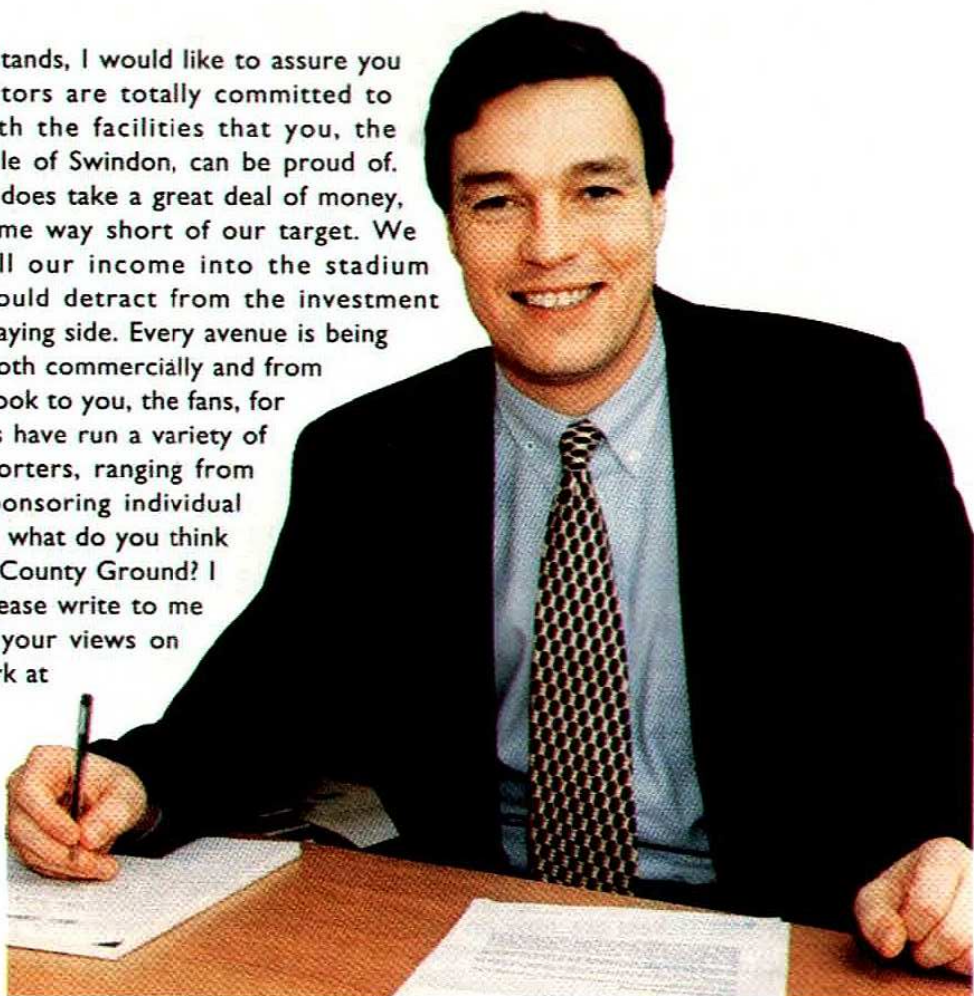

Ipswich turn the corner here - by John Nolan

When Ipswich Town rolled into the County Ground last November they were looking to halt a run of three successive defeats having been tipped out of the Coca-Cola Cup by Liverpool then suffering home defeats in the Premiership by Everton and Sheffield Wednesday.

Two goals from veteran midfielder John Wark, which took his total for the Suffolk club to 171, secured them a point in an entertaining draw and set Town on their way to an impressive run of eight games without defeat to the end of the year.

Following the draw here Mick McGiven's team covered themselves in glory by holding Manchester United 0-0 at Old Trafford. It was a backs to the wall effort yet emphasised the quality of a defence which conceded just three goals in the next seven games after letting in two against us.

Blackburn Rovers were beaten 1-0 by an Eddie Youds goal; a significant victory, being Ipswich's first at Portman Road in the Premiership since August 21, when they beat Chelsea by the same scoreline.

If Suffolk fans were disappointed with a goalless draw against Oldham they were quickly cheered by the 1-0 win at Southampton. Chris Kiwomya netting his first goal in over two months.

The out of form striker was quick to follow that up with the point saver at Chelsea three days later; then was very much involved in Town's opening goal against Norwich when he was brought down in the box to win a penalty which John Wark quickly converted.

Norwich equalised but in the closing minute Eddie Youds forced an own-goal to give Ipswich some early Christmas cheer.

So at the halfway stage of the Premiership programme Ipswich were in the top ten and looking comfortable as they come back to Swindon in search of further glory.

It's 16 years since Suffolk celebrated the winning of the FA Cup and guess who was in that Wembley winning side? Yes, John Wark, the man who blasted our Premiership ambitions in November; the man who steps out today for his 127th Cup game in Ipswich Town's colours.

Ipswich Town ABC

CLIVE BAKER - Goalkeeper. The former Norwich keeper had made just one appearance for Coventry City in 1991-92 and after seven glorious years with Barnsley he thought his first-class career was ended. But Forrest was sent off in the 5th minute of the game with Sheffield United in September 1992 and Clive was rushed on as a substitute (the first instance of it's kind under the new Premier rules). It was the first of 40 appearances last season. At 5' 8" Clive is the smallest custodian in top-class football but when it comes to figures he is the tops having achieved an honours degree in mathematics through the Open University. Born: North Walsham 14-3-59.

CRAIG FORREST - Goalkeeper. Craig has been with Ipswich since 1984 when he signed as an apprentice, but had to wait until August 1988 to make his League debut

for Ipswich Town against Stoke City. Had played for Colchester United on loan in the Fourth Division, making his League bow against Wrexham (4-3-88). Improved impressively under the guidance of former West Ham star Phil Parkes and played an influential role in Town's Second Division Championship winning side in 1992. Hails from Vancouver and was a keen ice hockey player as a schoolboy but is now recognised as Canada's number one goalkeeper after being capped 22 times. Born: Vancouver 20-9-67.

GAVIN JOHNSON - Defender/Midfield. Has worked his way through the ranks at Portman Road. Made his debut against Barnsley (12-2-89). Did not establish himself in the team until the season of 1991-92, when he won a Second Division champions medal. Though essentially a defensive operator he has demonstrated great all-round ability in midfield. Born: Eye 10-10-70.

CHRIS KIWOMYA - Striker. Live wire attacker who relies a great deal on his phenomenal pace. Has been the leading scorer in the past three seasons in fact. Followed his brother, Andy, the former Barnsley player into League football when he joined Ipswich as a trainee in 1986. Came on as a sub for his first League game against Bradford City 24-9-88, and established himself in the side in 1990-91. Registered his first hat-trick against Wigan in the Coca-Cola Cup in 1992-93. Scored 44 goals in 185 League games. Born Huddersfield 2-12-69.

DAVID LINIGHAN

Central Defender. Commanding pivot and skipper who has now played over 250 senior games for Town. Started with home-town club Hartlepool United, making the first of his 91 League appearances for them against Bradford City (27-3-82). Had a short spell on loan with Leeds United before Arthur Cox signed him for Derby County in 1986. Didn't get a game in four months with the Rams and



moved on to Shrewsbury Town, who splashed out a then Club record £300,000 for David in June 1988...Brother Andy plays for Arsenal, father Brian was a centre-half with Darlington. Born: Hartlepool 9-1-65.

PAUL MASON - Midfield. Recruited from Aberdeen in the summer of 1993 for £400,000 after five years in the Scottish League Paul was a schoolboy with Everton but they didn't offer him an apprenticeship. Joined Tranmere Rovers but fared no better and drifted into non-League circles before taking a job in Holland. It was while playing for his works side that Groningen FC spotted him in 1983 and during his five years with the club he became an influential figure in midfield. Aberdeen paid £250,000 for his transfer in 1988 and Paul claimed a Skol Cup winners' medal in 1989 - scoring both goals in the Dons 2-1 victory over Rangers -and a Scottish FA Cup winners' medal in 1990 when Celtic were the victims. Born: Liverpool 3-9-63.

STEVE PALMER - Midfield. Strong central midfielder spotted by Ipswich when they played a friendly against Cambridge University. Steve was a graduate obtaining a degree in Electrical and Information Engineering. Started his career with home-town club Brighton where he played at youth and reserve levels. Made his League debut at Oxford United (23-9-89). Born: Brighton 31-3-68.

Ipswich Town

STUART SLATER - Midfield. Arrived from Celtic in September 1993 in a deal which eventually will cost Town a Club record of £800,000. Born in Sudbury he used to stand on the terraces as a schoolboy but was snapped up by West Ham United and developed through the youth ranks. Was a prolific scorer at youth and reserve levels but has failed to reproduce that form in senior football. Young Hammer of the Year in 1988 Stuart's debut v Derby County in October 1987 was made in the 89th minute. Capped by England at Under-21 (3) and "B" levels while at Upton Park. Stuart commanded a fee of £1.5million in August 1992 when Celtic snapped him up. Enjoyed a good first season in Scotland but then lost his place. Born: Sudbury 27-3-69.

MICK STOCKWELL - Utility. Enjoying a great run of form Mick is equally at home rightback or in midfield, and has also impressed as a scoring striker. Was on Schoolboy forms with Leyton Orient but joined the apprentice ranks at Portman Road in 1981. Made his League debut in a 1-0 win at Coventry (26-12-85). Voted Player of the Year by the fans in 1993 Micky has now chalked up over 500 senior appearances. Born: Chelmsford 14-2-65.

NEIL THOMPSON - Leftback. Was on Nottingham Forest's books as an apprentice but was not taken on and signed for Hull City in 1981. Made his League debut for the Tigers at Tranmere (13-2-82). After injury problems he was released in 1983 becoming a salesman. Linked up with Scarborough who were then in the Alliance Premier League. Four years later helped Scarborough win the Vauxhall Conference to become the first club promoted to the Football League. Operated on the left wing for a while before Ipswich paid £100,000 for his signature in the summer of 1989. Born: Beverley 2-10-63.

JOHN WARK - Defender/Midfield. First signed for Ipswich in September 1973 as an apprentice after having been turned down by Manchester City. Made his Football League debut against Leicester City on 29 March 1975 but did not establish himself until season 1976/77. Scored ten goals in 33 League games the following season and was unlucky to see a shot hit the post in the FA Cup Final against Arsenal. The following season he scored 35 goals including 14 in Town's UEFA Cup winning run. In March 1984 he was transferred to Liverpool where in his first full season he was top scorer. Injuries restricted his appearances and after four years he returned to Portman Road. Scored twice on his 600th appearance for Town here at the County Ground in November. Born: Glasgow 4-8-57.

PHIL WHELAN - Central Defender. Joined from school in 1980 and gained his first senior experience in the Zenith Data Systems Cup in season 1991-92. In April of that campaign he made a scoring League debut

in a 2-1 win at Southend. At 6' 4" he is commanding in the air. Made 41 appearances last season but was played mostly out of position at fullback. Also found time last year to complete his degree in accountancy. Born: Stockport 7-3-72.

GERAINT WILLIAMS Midfield. Welsh International (12 caps). Geraint came into football as an apprentice with Bristol Rovers in 1978. Made his League bow against Sheffield Wednesday (18-10-80), and in March 1985 was snapped up by Derby County for a modest fee. Established himself as a ball-winning midfielder and was the anchor man in successive promotion winning sides in 1986 and '87. "George" made over 250 appearances for the Rams before Town paid £650,000 for him in 1992. Gained his first cap in Czechoslovakia in November 1987. Born: Treordy 5-1-62.



EDDIE YOUDS - Central Defender. Has not enjoyed the best of luck since his £250,000 move from Everton in 1991. His Town debut, at Derby County, was ended by a broken leg in the 57th minute and he has continued to suffer in this respect, making only his 18th League appearance as a sub v Everton at the end of October. Was a trainee at Goodison Park but in five years with the club made but 8 League appearances for the "Toffees" having been blooded while on loan to Cardiff (at Bolton 20-1-90). also had a spell on loan with Wrexham. Born: Liverpool 3-5-70.

Also on the fringe of senior selection is Canadian International Frank Yallop, a fullback or central defender who has been with the club for ten years...and David Gregory, a former apprentice who in his 42 appearances has operated at fullback, in midfield and attack.

The man in charge

Manager

A native of Newcastle-upon-Tyne, played for the St James' Park club and Northumberland County at schoolboy level.

Came into professional football with Sunderland as a halfback, making his League debut against Coventry City on 9th August 1969, and maintaining his position throughout that season.

Capped by England at Under-23 level, against Scotland, Mick went on to make 113 League appearances for Sunderland (9 goals) before moving south to sign for the Hammers in December 1973 after a month's trial.

Made his debut for West Ham in the number five shirt at Liverpool (1-12-73), and participated in 21 League games that season. In all Mick played in 48 League matches (2 as sub) and seven Cup ties before being appointed player-coach to the Reserve team in 1979.

Shortly after John Lyall left Upton Park in 1989 Mick quit to become Youth Team coach at Chelsea and when John was appointed manager of Ipswich Town in May 1990 Mick was one of his first signings.

Acted as John's coach until the summer of 1992 when he was given control of first team playing matters and is responsible for coaching and team selection.

Ian Marshall - by Colin Benson

Became Town's record signing in August 1993, when he moved from Oldham Athletic for a £750,000 fee.

Ian, given the front-line role he wanted at Ipswich celebrated his debut for them with a goal against his former colleagues at Boundary Park on the opening day of the season. Followed that up with goals against Southampton and Chelsea as Ipswich opened the campaign with three straight wins.



It was at Goodison Park where Ian came into football. Everton took him on as an apprentice in 1982 and he made his League debut at centre half against WBA (20-8-85). Added another 14 appearances before joining Oldham on loan as cover for the injured Andy Linighan, brother of Ipswich skipper David. Within two weeks Joe Royle had signed him!

Strong and powerful in the air he prefers to play a chasing role up front rather than a stopper role at the back. Was successful as a striker during the Latics double Cup runs in 1989-90. The following season he netted 17 goals in 26 League appearances to help steer Oldham to the Second Division Championship. But Joe Royle always saw him foremost as a central defender and Ian jumped at the chance to lead the Ipswich attack.

Born at Liverpool in March 1966, Ian comes here as Ipswich Town's leading scorer this season with nine goals, having returned to action over Christmas following three weeks out with chicken-pox.

After the disappointment of our New Year's Day defeat by Chelsea we could do with the lift of a run in the F.A. Cup.

The first thing you look for in a Cup tie is home advantage. We have got that so let's make sure we make full use of it.

We have had Ipswich here before and drew 2-2. On the day we felt we could possibly have edged it but you can forget that. This is a Cup tie and Ipswich will come here totally committed to get to the next round.

One thing you learn about Cup football is that you have to be committed on the day. You don't get second chances in the Cup if you don't play well. So we are looking for a performance from our lads that can get us through to the next round.

In the League there is always another chance for you to rectify a poor performance but in the Cup you must be totally committed and make sure that you play well.

So Fash "the bash" was absolved of his responsibility in the infamous Gary Mabbutt case. Yet another example of sweet FA!

The game's governing body hid behind a cloak, claiming it was impossible to prove "intent".

Of course it was. John Fashanu didn't go in intending to spatter poor Gary Mabbutt's face. I doubt if there is a professional player in the League who goes out to maim another. That is not the question that should be addressed.

Foul play is the issue. It is clear and simple.

You didn't have to be an expert to spot that Fashanu went into the challenge behind his forearm, which was extended in front of him to protect himself like a battering ram. It was as clear a foul as you are likely to see.

Now the PFA have recognised that. For heavens sake the whole country, apart from some blinkered Wimbledon supporters - recognised that and quite rightly expected the Football Association to act accordingly.

The fact that they haven't has been a let down for the whole game. It has given the biff bash merchants a license to kill; free reign to continue exploiting their physical intimidation.

It is all right saying leave it to the referee but if the officials in charge of the Spurs vs Wimbledon game is an example what chance have we got. Even after watching slow-motion replays of the incident he was typically not man enough to hold his hands up and admit he got it wrong.

Now football is a physical contact sport and we know that there will be clashes and injuries as players challenge each other for the ball. This is inevitable. But it still does not excuse cheating.

The tackle from behind was eventually hounded out of our game through strict application of the red card. I think all will agree the game in general is much better for this. So why oh why isn't Lancaster Gate taking a similar stance over the use of the elbow or arm, a matter far more serious in its implications than tripping someone from behind?

Indeed, I would like to go further. I would like to see

the FA charge players who are caught on TV committing such fouls irrespective of whether the referee or linesman have spotted the infringements during the game.

There was a good example the other day from the telecast of the Norwich City vs Aston Villa game. Cox not only went into Bryan Gunn with his bent arm first but it seemed that as they made contact he actually dug it downward across the goalkeeper's face.

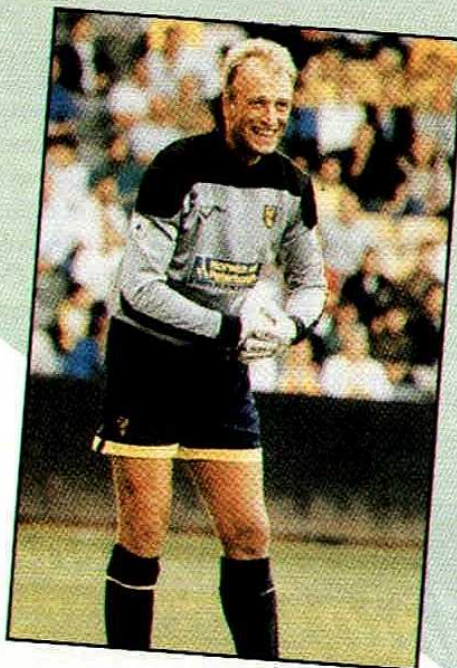
Nasty, and quite unnecessary. Certainly the sort of thing we need to stamp out.

January 7 1984: Carlisle United 1 Swindon Town 1

For the third successive round, Fourth Division Town were drawn away - this time to Second Division Carlisle United. Jackie Ashurst put the Cumbrians ahead in the 17th minute, but Swindon forced a replay with a goal midway through the second half from Andy Rowland - now converted to central defender. Town finished off the job at the County Ground with Jimmy Quinn, Paul Batty and Rowland getting on the scoresheet in a 3-1 victory - Carlisle's first reverse in 14 games.

20 Years Ago

January 5 1974: Portsmouth 3 Swindon Town 3

Struggling Town took on big-spending Pompey at Fratton Park and silenced the home crowd by taking a second-minute lead. Tommy Jenkins went on a solo run, skipped past two defenders and saw his shot go in off a post. Ron Davies forced an equaliser after twenty minutes, but Swindon quickly put that set back behind them when Will Dixon charged down the right flank and his cross was headed home by David Moss. John Trollope added to Portsmouth's woe just before half-time when he slid in to force home a Joe Butler free-kick. That should have killed off the Pompey challenge, but they hit back through centre-half Paul Went in the 78th minute. Then deep into injury time, Brian Lewis was adjudged to have been fouled in the area and Bobby Kellard slotted home the penalty. With the nation gripped by a power crisis, floodlit football was prohibited and the replay took place on Wednesday afternoon, surprisingly witnessed by a 10,000 crowd. Kellard was once again a key figure, popping up in the 57th minute to end Town's interest in the competition for another season.

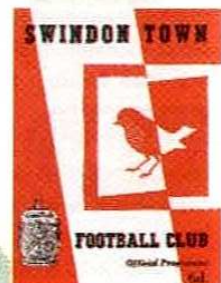

30 Years Ago

January 4 1964: Swindon Town 2 Manchester City 1

Swindon met Second Division rivals Manchester City having already taken three points out of four from them early in the season. An early strike by Roger Smart paved the way for only the second win in the Town's last eleven games. Alan Oakes - who went on to clock up a record number of League appearances for the Maine Road club - hit the 57th minute equaliser, but Smart booked a Fourth Round ticket when he grabbed the winner with a quarter of an hour to go. Swindon's last F.A. Cup encounter with Ipswich came a year later, on January 9 1965. Two goals from Frank Brogan sent Town to a 2-1 home defeat, Dennis Brown netting a late consolation.

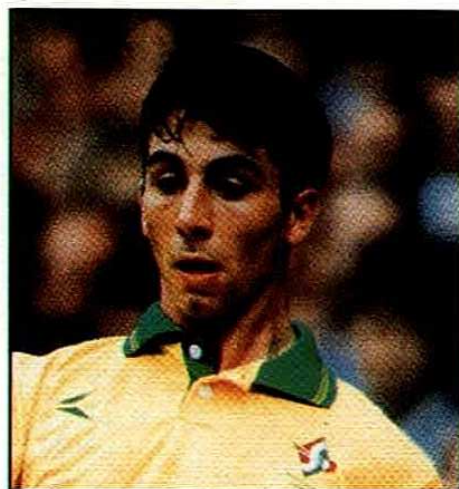
Kevin Horlock

Prior to his arrival here Kevin's first team experience was non-existent but he played in 14 League games for us last season when he showed great promise.

As for the FA Cup this is a new experience. Says Kevin: "It is all new to me. The whole season really has been a good experience for me.



"I played in the FA Cup tie at QPR last season which was really exciting. I was thrown-in at the deep-end to play centre midfield. We were beaten having possibly played the better football. It was the same story as it is now. We couldn't score enough goals and let too many in. Hopefully we can put that right.

"Perhaps a little Cup run might give us the spur. It is important that we do stick with the League and avoid relegation of course. This is more important than winning the Cup. But a good win in the Cup should provide the stimulus for this".

There was a lot made of the game against Chelsea. Does Kevin think that maybe too much emphasis was put on that game by the public and media?

"I don't know. It was an important game. All the lads realised that. We did feel confident before the game. There was a good spirit in the dressing room, everyone was relaxed; the music was playing and we carried it out on the pitch. But then we let ourselves down and everyone else down.

"Personally I thought we played well going forward but just didn't create good enough openings to score. Then obviously we were hit by two soccer-punches when they scored and the heads went down.

"Timing of their second goal, just before the break, was a killer. That gave us a mountain to climb. But again I thought we tackled it well. We came out in a positive way and pushed on and could have scored. But didn't. And they got a third which made us look silly."

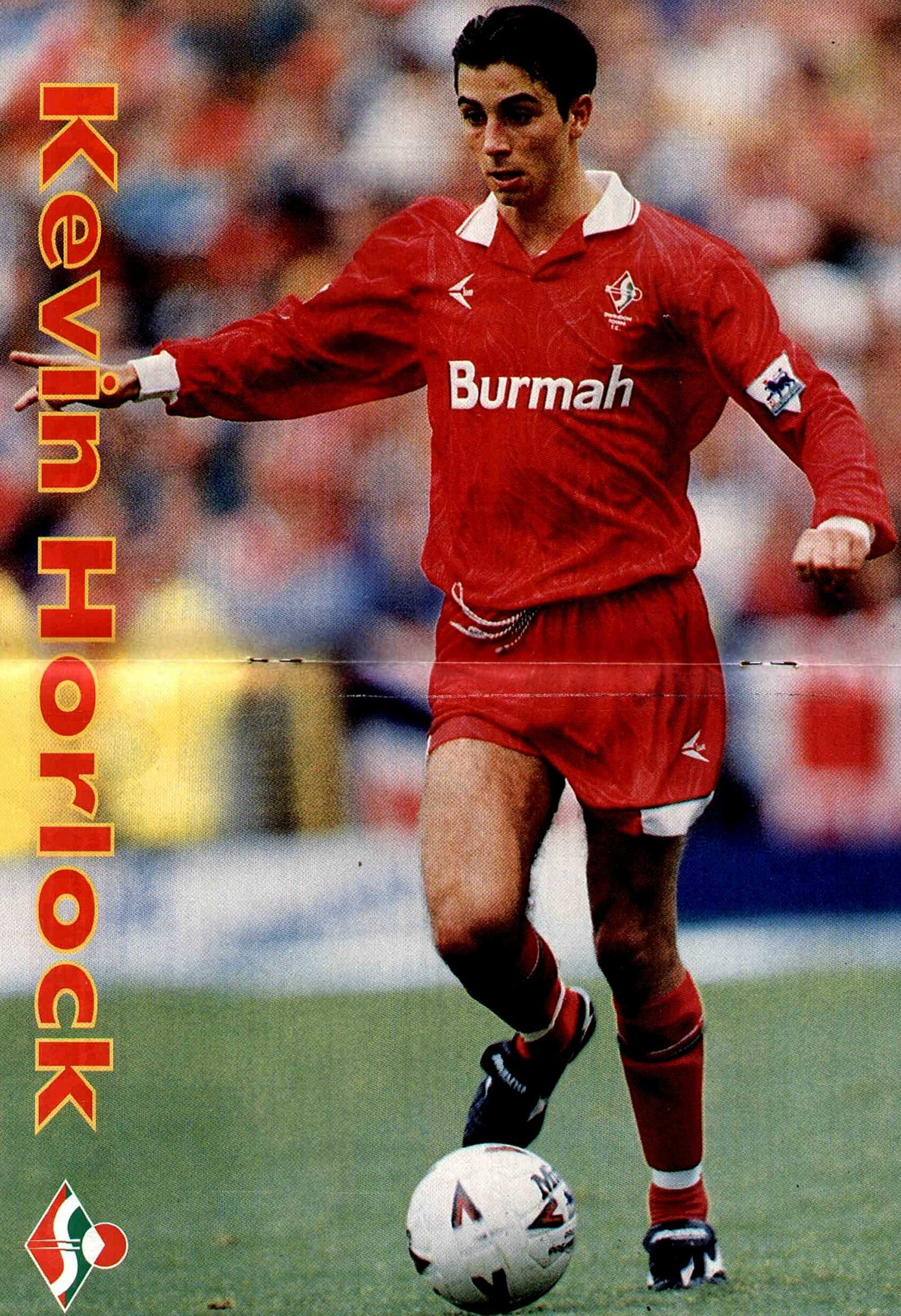
The first two goals were give-aways weren't they?

"Yes. they were the sort of goals we have been letting in all season. Scrambles. It was a silly goal from a corner. There things are going against us and it is very hard when the breaks seem to keep going against us like that.

"We have got to be strong now. We are into the second-half of the season and must pick up some points. I think we can pull through it. I don't think we will need that many points to stay up this year. All the bottom teams keep losing so if we dig in you never know."

Though the results haven't matched the football we have played, the spirit and confidence has still shone through.

FINNISHING

Finland has never been in the forefront of world soccer though they have been competing on the International stage since the early 1900's.

An indication of their standing can be judged from this banner headline which greeted Finnish readers as they unfolded their national morning papers one icy May morning in 1985: "Unbelievable but True".

It referred to Finland's shock 3-1 eclipse of an England side, including David Seaman and Des Walker, in the Under-21 European Championship.

It was certainly a moment for them to savour over the traditional breakfast dish of semolina. The Finns recorded only one previous win over England - a 4-3 triumph in Helsinki in 1957 - in an amateur international. A game, I hasten to add, which is still vividly recalled with nostalgic pride in those parts.

Truth is, Finland's only real success on the world stage was achieved way back in the Stockholm Olympics of 1912. Then they beat Italy 3-2 and Russia 2-1 before losing 4-0 to England.

Suffice to say that their game has remained strictly amateur in this pleasant land of forest and lakes and not surprisingly they have remained in the third division in terms of International status. Yet there is a real desire to improve their standing and in the mid 1980's they laid the foundations for a positive and determined attempt to do just that.

Although there was no question of them turning professional the Finnish Football Association appreciated that if they were to compete at the highest level then their players must play regularly at the highest level. Thus, they embarked on a futuristic scheme geared to producing young players who will be good enough to earn a living playing professional football abroad.

At the time there were less than a handful of Finns enjoying such privileges. Kari Ukkonen was with Cercle Brugge; Pasi Rautiainen with Armenia Bielefeld in the Bundesliga and Aki Lahtinen was four years with Notts County. Add to that a couple of lads with Swedish

second division clubs and that was the experience they had to build on.

The Finnish FA's scheme had one drawback. Finance. They came up with the bright idea of organising sponsorship for young players, asking industry and commerce to allow any promising young players in their employ a half-day a week leave to train with their local club.

Mauri Miettinen, a member of the Finnish FA and a government minister, was at the heart of the project which had its teething problems. He explained: "It's all a question of money. The response from local industry was disappointing. Mainly because our results at International level have not been good."

International success in athletics and particularly in winter sports has meant that national attention has been focused in their directions more than towards football but though the Association could only afford to cover the cost of ten players for their first national training camp for senior players they have worked extremely hard at setting up football coaching schools all over the country - the results of which have been quite startling.

As you know we embarked on a pre-season tour of Finland last summer and were very impressed by the hospitality accorded us and the passionate enthusiasm of the clubs involved. They expressed a desire to foster links with us to increase their awareness of football at the top level and as a result of this we have linked up with TP55 from Seinajoki.

Club representatives Jon Pollard and Jonathan Trigg - our Football Community Officer - recently returned to Seinajoki to help TP55 set up their own Community Scheme and both were very impressed by what they saw.

Says Jon: "Despite the heavy snow and 18 hours of darkness a day the local council have provided excellent indoor facilities for the youngsters to train in. The club have the lads from the age of eight and what they can do with a ball is quite amazing."

Jonathan, who helped coach a group of nine-year-olds, was equally impressed and noted that the ability of the youngsters at both academic and sporting levels was far

greater than what he encounters here in the UK.

Such observations are gratifying for the likes of Mauri Miettinen who back in the summer of 1985 told me: "We don't think of boys as just football players but as people. Personalities which we have to develop, educationally, morally and physically."

In a country where the temperature can drop to minus 30 degrees it is impossible to work outside. But the combined efforts of the Government, the Ministry of Culture and Sports, and local council's has set up a network of indoor facilities across the country.

The Finns are very conscious of the successes of their Nordic neighbours, Denmark, who are the current European Champions; Sweden whose record in the World Cup is very impressive; and most recently Norway, who comfortably headed England's World Cup qualifying group.

The Norwegian's currently have ten of their World Cup squad playing in English football, our own Jan Fjortoft being one of them, and the Finns are looking to achieve a similar situation.

Explains Mr Miettinen: "We are realistic about the situation. We are too small a nation, in terms of population, to support professional football. There are only 4.8 million so it is not surprising that our top teams only average gates of 3,000 in domestic competition.

"Our objective is to get our players installed in top grade football abroad. Broaden their horizons. If we can get a nucleus of some 30 players in this system then we should benefit at International level.

We see Denmark and Norway as good examples of what can be achieved with minimum resources. Their success is spurring us on."

Meanwhile Finland have not fared so well in the current World Cup qualifying competition finishing bottom of Group 6 with just one win to rejoice, 3-1 over Austria. But take heed. The foundations at youth level have been firmly cemented and in the next five years we can expect to see them make a similar impression on the world game as have Norway.

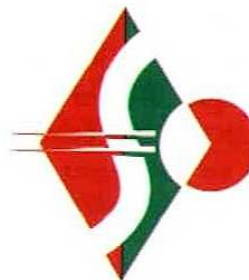
