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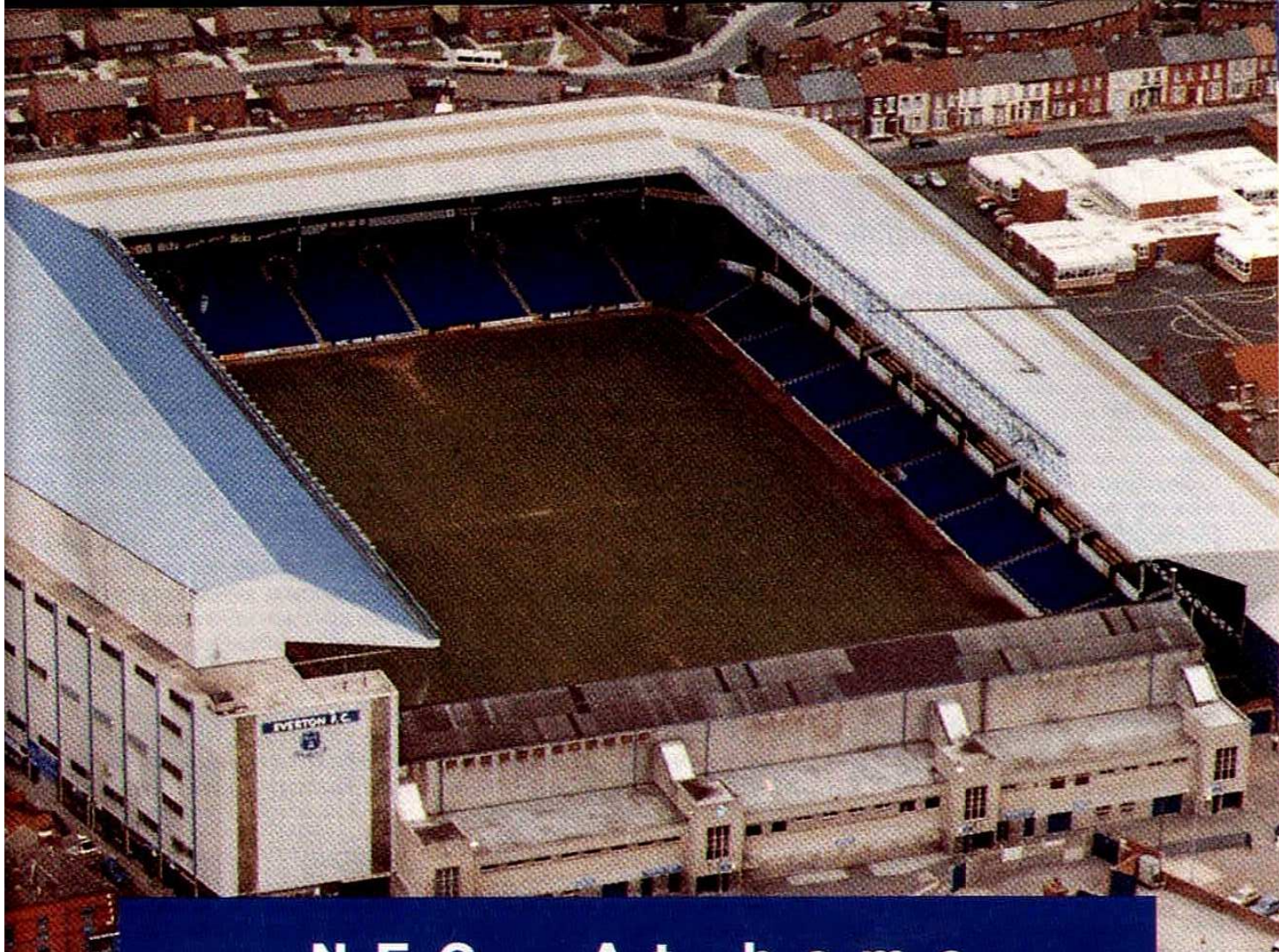

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MIKE WALKER

MIKE WALKER never played at Goodison Park and it was only a year ago that he set foot in the ground for the first time in his life.

Probably the best chance he had of correcting that omission during 21 years as a professional player was in September 1979 when Colchester United played a League Cup-tie with Aston Villa.

The winners were drawn to meet Everton in the next round, but, in his own words, that opportunity finished "six rows back in the stand" - from a penalty that he missed in a shoot-out.

"I should mention that two outfield players hadn't taken one," he pointed out, "but they didn't want to know when we got to the ninth kick. So it was down to me and I put it over the bar."

Goodison was one of only four grounds that he did not play at. Anfield was another, and the list was completed by West Brom and West Ham.

When he finally made it to Everton, as manager of Norwich City, results went pretty well for him. "Last season," he says, "we won 1-0, and this season we beat Everton 5-1 - if I may rub it in! So it's a lucky ground for me and hopefully it will stay that way now I'm here."

The new Blues manager has devoted a lifetime to football - and so far it has gone more-or-less as he planned way back in the 1970s.

"It was in my mind that when I finished playing, I would stay in the game in some capacity. Some people just finish and move to something else, but I was always of the opinion that I would carry on in football, if

possible because it is very hard to get into the coaching side initially. "I was lucky to get an opportunity straightaway. Cyril Lea was the manager at Colchester and though we'd had a difference of opinion on one or two things, he appointed me as coach."

That was to lead to his first spell in management with the Essex club, and when he left Layer Road, he was quickly offered the reserve team job at Norwich by Ken Brown. But there was an anxious time before he actually started work at Carrow Road.

"I'd agreed everything and next thing I knew Ken had got the sack. It was a weekend and I hadn't heard anything from him, but fortunately the club stuck to the arrangement. It's gone on from there, really.

"I did alright with the reserve team, and then Dave Stringer resigned. Obviously, there were a few people in the reckoning, but I was given the job, appointed John Deehan to work with me and John Faulkner from Luton as reserve manager.

"We had 18 months of reasonable success and then, as you know, it ended with me having to make a decision. Whilst it was very difficult from the family point of view, and that I'd been at Norwich for quite a while, the thing that wasn't hard for me was the club that was involved, i.e. Everton.

"They have not been doing too well, but there wasn't any competition in that sense. It's a big club and everybody knows that everything is right in terms of facilities. Okay, they are a little bit run-down, but that didn't deter me in any way. Once Everton made it clear they wanted me, there wasn't a lot to think about."

IN BRIEF . . .

- ◆ Played schoolboy representative football for Reading Boys and the county side, Berks, Bucks and Oxon. Also had England trials before joining Reading as an apprentice in 1961.
- ◆ After one season as a professional with Reading, made Football League debut with Shrewsbury Town in a 2-1 away win against Bristol Rovers, at the age of 19.
- ◆ Tough times in the early days with York City. The club successfully applied for re-election to Division Four after finishing 21st and 22nd in his two full seasons there.
- ◆ Succeeded former Liverpool 'keeper Bert Slater at Watford and became a League ever-present for two-and-a-half years - a total of 108 games from debut in a 0-0 draw with Swindon Town.
- ◆ Played in all five games as Watford reached the FA Cup semi-final for the first time in 1970. The run started at Bolton (2-1), continued with home wins against Stoke (1-0), Gillingham (2-1) and Liverpool (1-0) and ended with a 5-1 defeat by Chelsea.
- ◆ Missed only nine League games out of 460 in ten seasons with Colchester and made 310 consecutive appearances in all competitions from February 1977 to January 1983.

◆ Reached the last eight in the League Cup in 1974-75, losing 2-1 at home to Aston Villa, who went on to land a promotion and Wembley double.

◆ Played his last Football League game, at the age of 37, in a 4-1 win for Colchester at Hartlepool in May 1983.

◆ Served under 16 managers and coaches during his playing days and made early preparations for the future when passing his an FA coaching badge a full ten years before finishing as a player.

◆ At his last two League clubs he was succeeded by goalkeepers with Everton connections - Andy Rankin, who joined Watford from the Blues in November 1971, and Alec Chamberlain, who left Colchester for Everton in an £80,000 deal when Mr Walker was manager at Layer Road in July 1987.

◆ Colchester reached the play-offs by finishing fifth in the Fourth Division in his first season as manager. They were beaten 2-0 on aggregate by Wolves.

◆ Resigned in November 1987 after "a difference of opinion" - and had already left the club when he was named Manager of the Month for October! Of his last seven League games in charge, Colchester won six and drew the other.

◆ Appointed Reserve Team coach by Norwich manager Ken Brown less than a

week after parting company with Colchester.

◆ In April 1991 his son, Ian, then 19, made a First Division debut for Tottenham - against Norwich at Carrow Road. Ian had already played two games on loan to Oxford as well as winning a first England Under-21 cap against Wales at Prenton Park.

◆ The call to Premier League management arrived in the summer of 1992 when Mr Walker was chosen from a short list of three to succeed Dave Stringer. One of the other front-runners, John Deehan, was appointed assistant.

◆ Norwich opened the season with a 4-2 win against Arsenal at Highbury and the first-ever Premier League Manager of the Month award went to Carrow Road after the Canaries had taken 13 points from six games.

◆ Norwich finished third, beating their previous highest placing of fourth in the old First Division in 1988-89 - the season in which they lost to Everton in the FA Cup semi-final.

◆ Further Manager of the Month awards were won by Mr Walker in November 1992 and October 1993 - the latter after the outstanding away win against Bayern Munich in the club's debut season in European competition.



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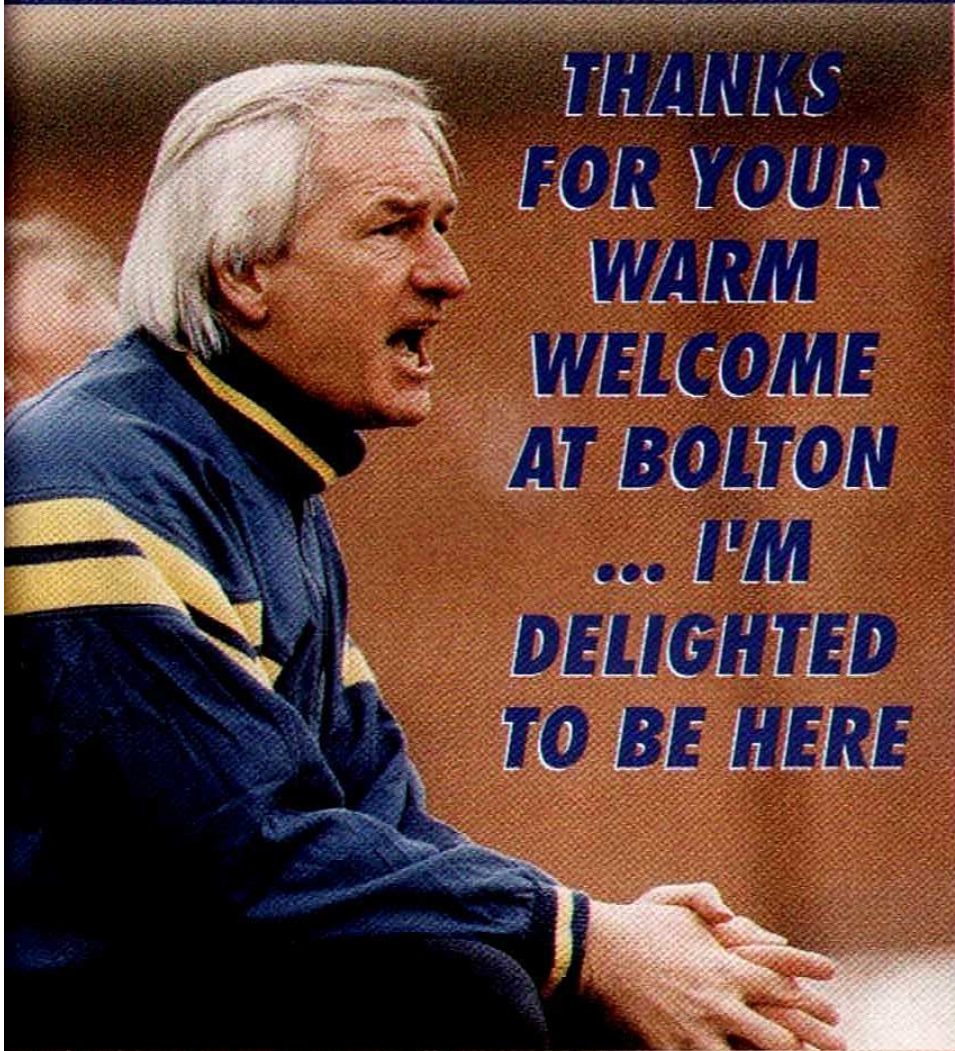

we will have to go out and get better players into the club.

The way we play is another matter for consideration.

Certainly I wouldn't be against using systems that I've been successful with. My philosophy is that good players can play most systems.

Again, that's something within this evaluation process. If I think we have enough players to adopt a certain system, or maybe play a sweeper, then I would not be frightened to do it.

I wasn't that unhappy about playing 4-4-2 at Bolton. There were certain things within the formation that I would like to see changed. No, not like to see... but WILL change.

That might make us a bit more potent.

Compared with taking the Norwich job, when I already knew all the players at the club, there is a difference here in that I have got to get know an entire playing staff, from first team down to juniors.

It's going to take time to settle in, and I don't think anyone should make decisions when you are not familiar with the players or the way the team is run. It's sensible to take stock, even if it does take a little longer that way.

It's the same with the backroom side of the club. I need to see whether the coaches work the way I want them to, and again, I will make decisions after that. I've certainly not come in with any preconceived ideas that people are going to go or this is not the way to do things.

A change for me, of course, is that Everton are a big-city club whereas previously I was in a rural area. Norwich is a city, but significantly smaller and much quieter in a lot of respects.

Coming to a big place doesn't bother me. I lived in London for a fair bit of time and I enjoyed that. All I've got to do here is find my way back to the hotel... I think that's going to be the biggest problem!

OBVIOUSLY, I'm looking forward to my first home first home match in charge and I'd like to offer a warm welcome to our visitors, Swindon Town.

They won a lot of friends with the type of football they played in winning promotion, and their new manager, John Gorman, has worked hard to maintain good principles.

Their results have been picking up away from home, and I know from personal experience what they can do. Back in August they came to Norwich and got their first point in the Premiership.

THIS IS MY first opportunity to talk directly to the supporters and obviously the first thing to say is that I am delighted to be here.

The reception the travelling fans gave me at Bolton was tremendous. That shows how much people here want success - and want it to be done in the right way.

Of course you've got to win, but I like to see football as an attractive game. That was another thing that brought me to Everton: the fact that they do try and play football, or the way I think the game should be played.

And it must have been vice-versa. The Board must have thought that Norwich play good football and that I would make a half-decent manager. So it is a two-way thing...

Once the offer was made, there was no question of me not coming to the club. Maybe they are not doing too well at the moment, but there is potential.

What I would ask of the supporters is that you bear with us for a little while because it's not going to change overnight in terms of results, though I don't see why it shouldn't change over a couple of weeks. I'm sure the players can get themselves into

a decent position in the League, which is the first priority.

It's only human nature that supporters expect to see new faces with a new manager, but I've made the point in the Press and I'll say it again in the programme: I don't think it's good management to come in and start tipping people out or bringing people in, and generally throwing your weight around.

What I will be doing is evaluating the club over the next two or three weeks, and then I'll make decisions on what we are going to do. It's vital that the players here are given an opportunity to prove themselves.

What can work for one person doesn't always work for the other. At Norwich there were three or four players that I thought I would clear out when I took over, but it turned out that I handled them differently to the other manager and I actually got 50 per cent more out of them. They are still at the club and playing in the first team.

On that principle, I know that it's well worth watching and waiting, but if players are not of the standard that's required, then

LET'S HEAR IT FOR THE BOSS!

◆ In this special article a well-known Everton fan makes a plea for a return of the Goodison Roar with which to celebrate the home debut of our new manager. He knows something about it as he has both contributed to the famous roar and has also benefited from it.

Brian Labone (pictured right) is an unashamed Everton True Blue and can be found in the main stand at most home fixtures after years on the other side of the touchline helping us win League championships and the FA Cup. Here he reveals his thoughts on the current situation at the club and what our supporters can do to convince Mike Walker he has made the right decision.



IT'S NOT as if Mike Walker didn't already know - otherwise he wouldn't have taken the job - but he has been left in no doubt by the media that he has taken on one of the biggest clubs in the country.

Now our fans can play their part by showing him that he is about to enjoy support as big as any in the country as well.

As a player I appreciated the value of the Goodison Roar on two counts - how encouraging it was to the boys in blue and how intimidating to the opposition.

When a team is not scoring goals and is losing its home games it is going the wrong way and heading for trouble.

Like most Evertonians I felt that after the derby match win over Liverpool our team were going places.

Then it all started to go wrong. No goals, home defeats and gates dropping below 20,000 in a stadium that can hold twice that many.

Then Howard Kendall departs and the club have no manager.

When players are on the pitch they have only one thing on their mind and that is playing well for their team. But when they have no permanent manager there is an air of uncertainty. The team becomes a ship without a rudder.

I went through the same thing just over 30 years ago before Harry Catterick took

over and I learned something from it.

While players are convinced they are giving 100 per cent, the arrival of a new manager and all that that means - new jobs, playing for places - can add an extra 10 per cent to your performance.

I am now appealing for a similar response from our fans.

The atmosphere at Goodison recently has been like a morgue. The support has not been ecstatic because there has been nothing to get ecstatic about.

But the crowd have been tolerant. They have not been having a go at the players and that is important.

Now let's step that up a gear and show Mike Walker that for starters the team he has taken over has fantastic support. That will convince him he has made the right decision and help inject confidence into the team.

EX-PLAYERS tend to look back at their careers and remember only the good things. But I can recall playing for Everton when Gordon West and I would joke about who might grab us a goal. I've been through it as well.

Then John Moores moved into the club and we started buying forwards like Bobby Collins and Alex Young.

Recently Everton have been going through a spell typical of when a team is struggling. You miss a scoring

opportunity at one end and the other lot immediately break away and put one in.

Instead of being deservedly one up you are undeservedly one down. This in turn puts extra pressure on the defence who know that to concede a goal is to lose the game.

The men I have felt sorry for at Goodison are our wingers. I am well aware of the club's tradition for playing the ball on the ground but occasionally it has to be lifted into the air.

Wingers have to find players with crosses but when they have only got Tony Cottee at 5ft 7ins to aim at it does make life difficult and we clearly need a big centre-forward to help solve this problem.

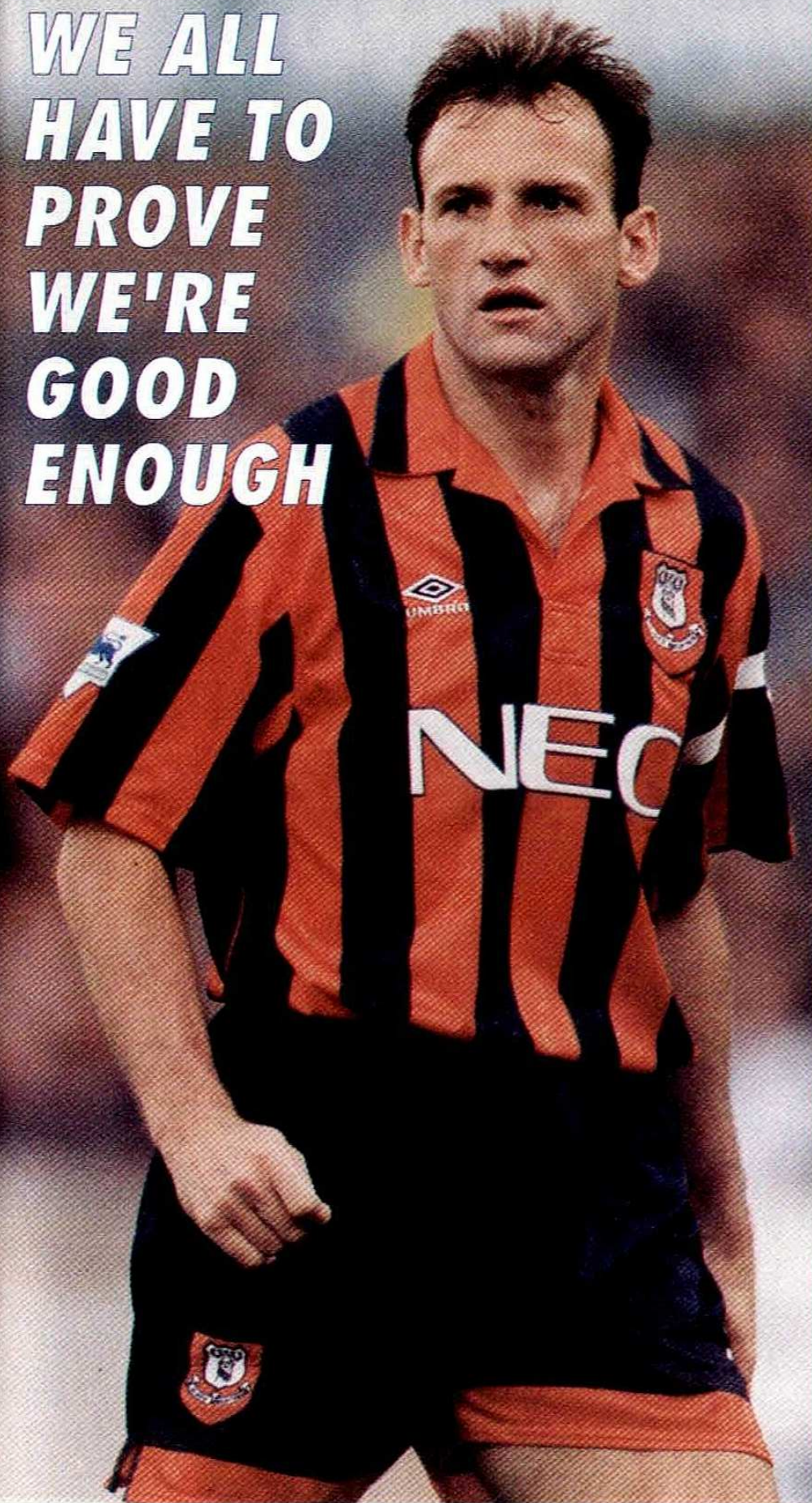
The club have also been unlucky with injuries, particularly to Dave Watson who is our linchpin and is currently enduring his second lengthy spell out of action.

We had similar problems in my day but the fact that we could rely on crowds of 50,000 and even bigger helped us overcome them.

The club are not going to enjoy attendances like that again but its supporters can help recapture a similar atmosphere by reviving the Goodison Roar.

Here's hoping that is the first change of what we all hope will be many under our new manager.

DAVE WATSON, the club skipper, mirrored the thoughts of everybody at Goodison Park when he expressed his delight at the appointment of Mike Walker as manager.

"All the players were pleased to hear the news," he said. "In fact, the affair went on a month too long as far as we were concerned."

While results have been disappointing the mood at the training ground has not been one of despair for as Dave points out, "We don't feel the team needs a big upheaval to turn things round. It's not as if we need five or six new faces."

"I believe three players could make the difference. When we got off to a good start in August we could have done with a new signing to give us a boost."

"I know the club tried but you can't always get the player you want at the time you need him."

"Now we have a new manager who will have a look at us and make his decisions."

"We all have to prove to him that we are good enough to stay here otherwise other players will be moved in while some will move on. That's football and we all accept that."

Our new manager has taken the same route here as Dave who also arrived from Norwich where he still has many friends.

"The Boss will certainly find a difference between the clubs," said Dave. "For a start the expectations are higher at Goodison. People just take it for granted that we should be up there alongside the Liverpools and Manchester Uniteds chasing the main honours."

"No disrespect to Norwich but Everton are a bigger club all round."



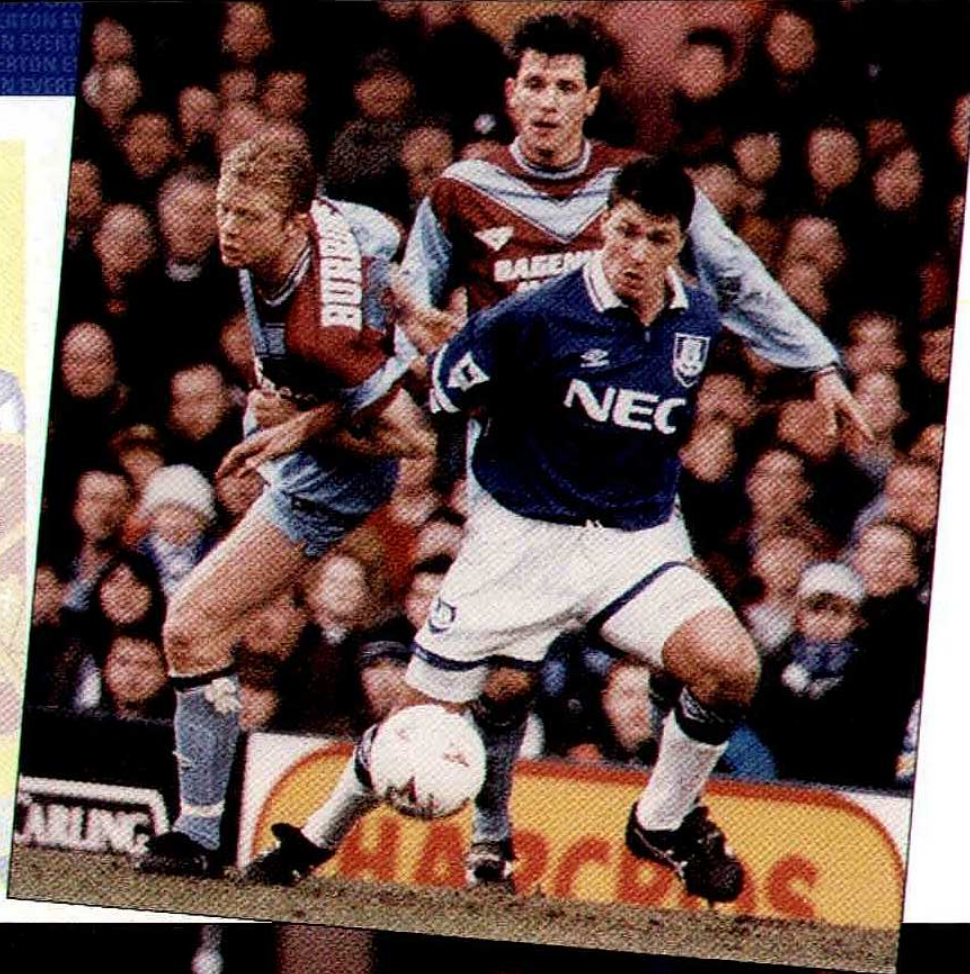

Below and right: Back from his recent injury Paul Rideout is kept under close observation by the West Ham defence.



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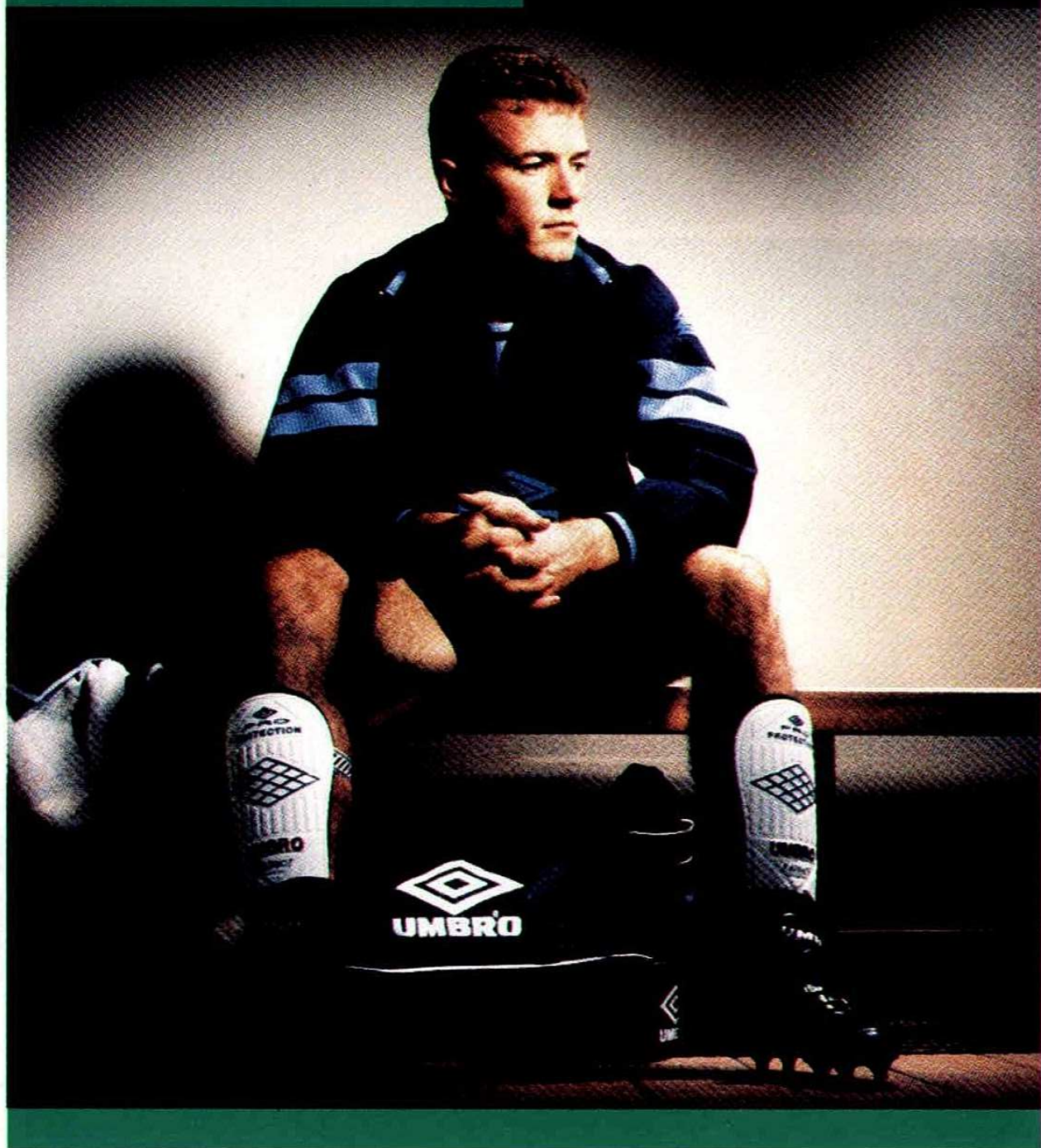
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FORM GUIDE

There's an obvious message to be drawn from Swindon Town's away results over the past two months - don't rush off before the final whistle! ***FIRST**, there was the curse of late goals . . . Three in the last ten minutes by Leeds, an 84th minute winner for Oldham, Mark Wright's last-gasp point-saver for Liverpool.

◆ NEXT, there was the relief of late goals . . . Last-minute equalisers at Sheffield Wednesday and Coventry City adding to earlier draws at Liverpool, Tottenham, West Ham and Norwich.

The general improvement in away performances has justifiably raised hopes that they can pull out of trouble after being backmarkers since August.

Promoted after a play-off victory over Leicester City, Swindon had to wait until the 16th game for the first-ever win in top-level football. It arrived against QPR - only four days after the Londoners had gone into fourth place with a 3-0 success at Goodison Park.

Moving into December, the Wiltshire club made it four home games without defeat after a 2-1 win against Southampton. At that stage they were cut off from a safe place by only three points - the smallest margin in three months.

The run-up to Christmas underlined that they were coming to terms with the

Premiership. They took five points from meetings with clubs who scored 14 goals against them in four consecutive defeats at the start of the season.

Unfortunately, home results lapsed - with Holiday defeats by Arsenal and Chelsea - just as they were beginning to pick up points on their travels. Yet the pleasing aspect for County Ground fans is that even when things were going against them, Swindon stuck to the quality brand of football which got them into the higher level.

Members of the Fourth Division only eight years ago, they reached Division Two in 1987 and won a play-off final in 1990, only to be demoted straightaway because of alleged financial

irregularities. It was shattering blow to the club - and the spin-off might have been worse. They slipped into relegation trouble a year later but eventually stayed up with two points to spare.

A solid season in 1991-92 got them moving in the right direction again and last year they clinched promotion after finishing fifth.

The play-off games were perhaps typical of a highly-entertaining side. Three matches produced 16 goals as the Robins overcame Tranmere Rovers (5-4 on aggregate) and then beat Leicester 4-3 at Wembley thanks to a late penalty by Paul Bodin.

SWINDON

TRANSFERS

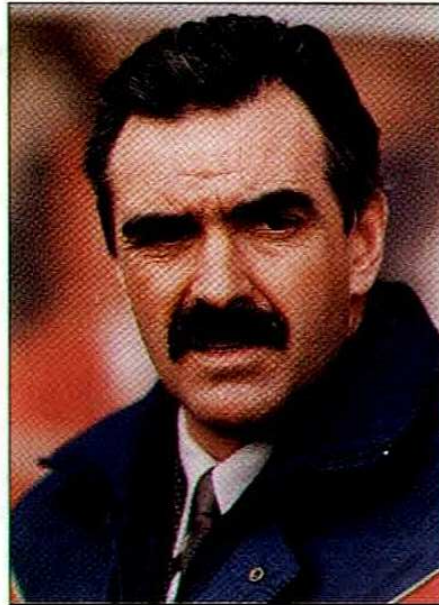
The squad has been assembled - almost entirely through the transfer market - since Swindon went into Division Three in 1986.

There are two survivors from that promotion campaign: goalkeeper Fraser Digby and striker Steve White. Digby came from Manchester United for £32,000 in December 1986 and White's first season after a free transfer from Bristol Rovers ended with two goals in a play-off replay against Gillingham.

Stepping into the Second Division, Swindon signed understudy goalkeeper Nicky Hammond on his release by Arsenal and later bought Paul Bodin from Newport County for £30,000 and Ross MacLaren from Derby for £165,000.

Bodin has certainly represented good business for the club. He went to Crystal Palace in March 1991 for £550,000 and Swindon got him back for less than half of that fee within a year.

Another promotion-winning side was developed in Glenn Hoddle's two years as manager. In July 1991, midfield man Martin Ling began a second spell at the club, on a £15,000 return ticket from Southend, and defender Shaun Taylor - a dangerous marksman from set-plays - arrived from Exeter City for £200,000.

Former Spurs midfielder John Moncur cost £80,000 in March 1992 and in the following summer, full back Kevin Horlock left West Ham on a "free" and striker Craig Maskell was taken from Reading in an exchange deal.

Maskell proved to be a great success with 19 League goals in the regular League season and then delivered a goal-a-game return in the three play-off matches. His total was 24 in all competitions.

With a Premiership place secured, Swindon invested a seven-figure sum in three players last summer. Striker Jan Aage Fjortoft (Rapid Vienna) and centre back Adrian Whitbread (Leyton Orient) were both priced at around £500,000. Another defender, Luc Nijholt, was signed from Motherwell for £175,000.

With only one point gained in the first six games, there was further strengthening in September. Defender Terry Fenwick moved from Spurs on a free transfer and striker Andy Mutch came from Wolves for £250,000 - a percentage of which went to his old Merseyside club, Southport.

The search for goals resulted in another deal in October for the Wycombe Wanderers striker, Keith Scott, after he had scored 14 goals in a successful League debut by last year's Vauxhall Conference champions.

A 26-year-old Londoner, he did the non-League rounds in the East Midlands, had a brief spell in the Fourth Division with Lincoln City in 1990, then played for Gateshead and Boston United on loan before joining Wycombe for £10,000.

In his first season there, he scored at Wembley in the FA Trophy Final and last year he was top scorer with 20 goals in the Conference.

Swindon broke the last link with their 1986 Fourth Division championship side last summer when defender Colin Calderwood joined Spurs for £1.25m. Tottenham also paid £50,000 this season for experienced midfielder Micky Hazard.

IN BRIEF...

- ◆ The Robins are one of only two clubs to have amassed 100 points or more in a League season. Their total of 102 in Division Four in 1985-86 is an all-time record, pipping the 101 totalled by York City in the same division two years earlier.
- ◆ John Trollope, with 770 games (1960-80), holds the record for the most League appearances for one club. He was in the side which landed a double in 1968-69 - promotion from Division Three and a League Cup win against Arsenal at Wembley.
- ◆ Swindon's most capped player was Rod Thomas, who made 30 of his 50 appearances for Wales during nine years at the County Ground. He later played for Derby, Cardiff and Newport.
- ◆ A tribunal ordered Chelsea to pay £75,000 for Glenn Hoddle's playing registration. Additional payments were set at £2,000 a game up to a maximum of 50.
- ◆ Swindon's first goal in top-level football was scored by John Moncur in a 3-1 defeat by Sheffield United at Bramall Lane on the opening day of the season.
- ◆ Their first winning goal in the Premiership was registered by Keith Scott - scoring for the second home game in succession after his move from Wycombe.
- ◆ Swindon had three League ever-presents up to the halfway stage in the Premiership - Fraser Digby, Shaun Taylor and John Moncur. Digby later lost his 100 per cent record after dislocating a shoulder against Sheffield Wednesday. Midfielder Adrian Viveash was also out after breaking a leg.

INTERNATIONALS

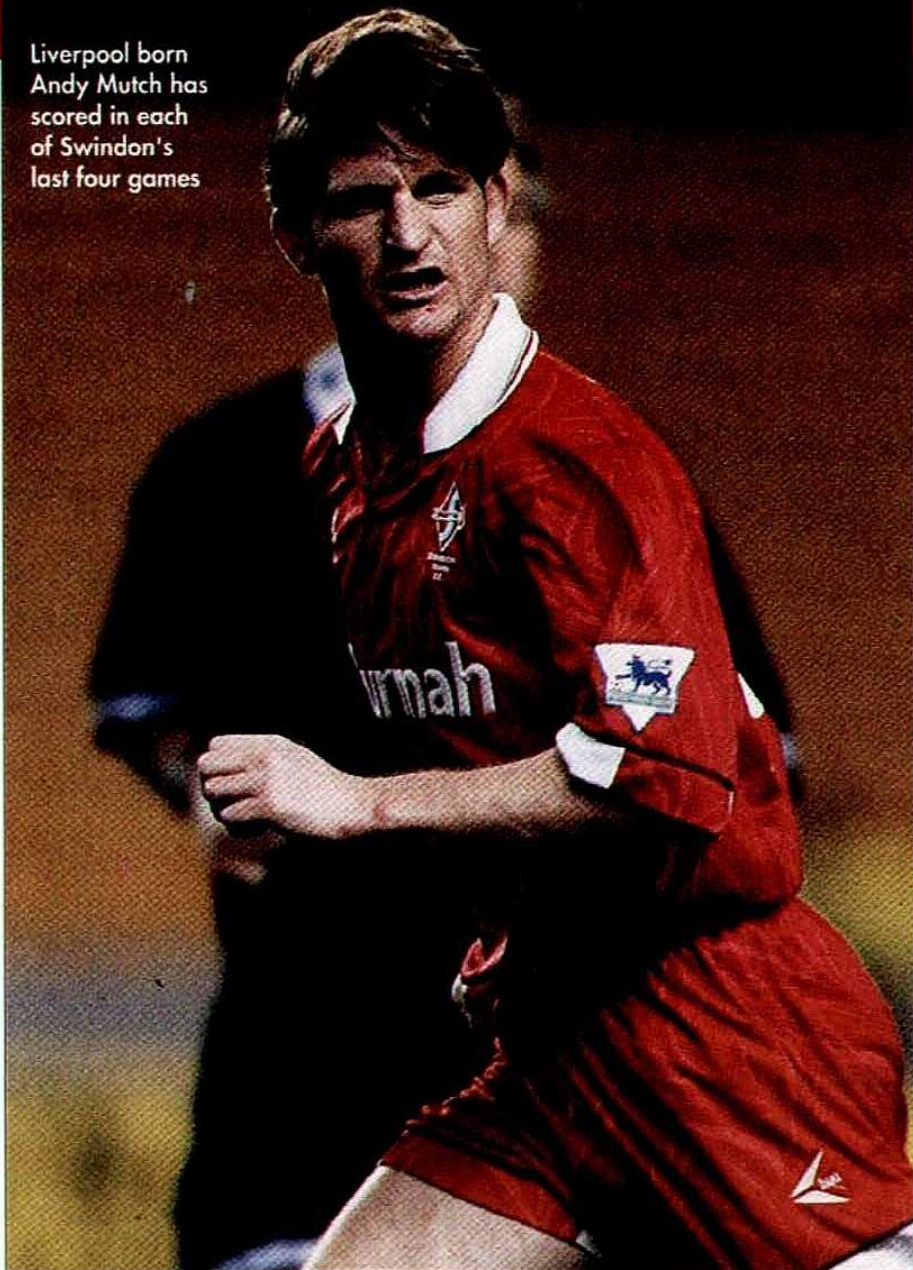
The signing of Jan Aage Fjortoft gave Swindon a ready-made World Cup player - and a key man in Norway's qualification for the finals next summer.

Capped nearly 50 times but still without a Premiership goal up to the New Year, the former Rapid Vienna striker netted in England's defeat in Oslo last summer and also scored in this season's win against Poland.

Paul Bodin has played for Wales in 20 full internationals and Terry Fenwick was a World Cup finalist in Mexico during his England career.

Nicky Summerbee, the only YTS discovery in the regular first team, helped England to success in the Toulon

Under-21 Tournament last summer. The son of a former England and Manchester City winger, he scored the winning goal in the semi-final against Scotland.

Fraser Digby (England) and Luc Nijholt (Holland) are former Under-21 internationals, while Andy Mutch appeared for England in 'B' and Under-21 teams while forming a prolific partnership with Steve Bull at Wolverhampton.

MANAGEMENT

Scotsman John Gorman was given the task of guiding Swindon into the Premiership within hours of Glenn Hoddle's departure to Chelsea.

The assistant manager's post - held by Mr Gorman for two years - was quickly

filled with the appointment of former Scottish international David Hay.

The new management duo were clubmates when Mr Gorman began his professional career at Celtic. He first moved to England with Carlisle United in September 1970 and was a member of the Cumbrians' side which won promotion to the old First Division in 1974.

In 1976 he joined Tottenham for £60,000 and spent two-and-a-half years at White Hart Lane before heading for the States and the top American club, Tampa Bay Rowdies.

Back in England in 1985, he became youth coach and then assistant manager at Gillingham. From there, he went to Leyton Orient, working as youth and reserve coach until linking up with Swindon in April 1991.

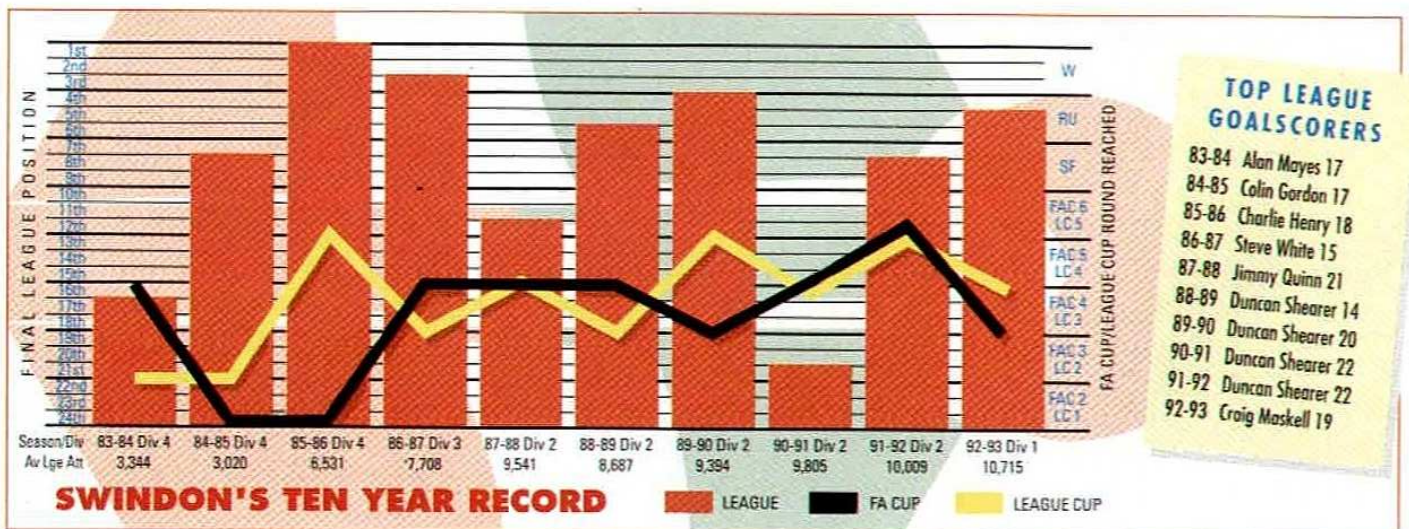

COCKY BLUES COME UNSTUCK AT SWINDON SANDS

◆ Today we welcome the popular Duncan McKenzie to the series in which one of our former players takes us back to a previous match with our visitors. In this case we look at two games as, after drawing a fourth round FA Cup-tie 2-2 at the County Ground on January 29 1977, we won a replay three days later on our way to the semi-finals.

Coincidentally, that second game with Swindon marked the takeover of a new Everton manager in Gordon Lee. Today of course is the home debut of Mike Walker.

These two ties were sandwiched between a two-legged League Cup semi-final with Bolton Wanderers that we won to take us to Wembley. Bolton were our hosts last week less than 24 hours after our new manager had taken over.

WHEN the Cup draw was made that took us to Swindon 17 years ago we travelled as favourites against the Third Division club only to discover that sand is a great leveller.

As Horace Yates reported in the Daily Post: 'The endless stretches of golden sand were made for buckets and spades but hardly for football.'

Duncan remembers the match well and told us, "While the pitch was sandy Everton dominated the match and led

twice. We felt the game went according to plan and we were in pretty good form.

"What did us was a fantastic strike by a lad called Kenny Stroud who from nearly 40 yards out lashed the ball into our net with such force that it stuck behind the stanchion."

We had led first through Duncan and then Bob Latchford. "My goal came midway through the first half," says Duncan. "Terry Darracott pumped the ball upfield and it bounced over my head before I flicked it over the goalkeeper.

"Their keeper nearly pulled my head off while their centre-half was pulling and pushing me all over the place.

"Apparently our fans were screaming for a penalty but when you see a chance to score you just go on and do it."

Dave Syrett equalised when a free-kick deflected off our defensive wall and, instead of running through to goalkeeper Dave Lawson, sat up in the sand for the Swindon player.

Five minutes into the second half Ronnie Goodlass' corner-kick was touched on by Mike Lyons for Latchford to put us ahead again and Duncan says, "We were playing well and the only thing we were guilty of was not going for a third goal.

"Perhaps we were a bit too cocky. A 2-1 scoreline was a good result for us and Swindon never looked like getting near our penalty area let alone scoring.

"But as the saying goes, it takes only one kick and Stroud produced it. The Swindon lads were delighted to get a replay back at Goodison."

DUNCAN recalls Gordon Lee being introduced to the crowd and receiving a great reception but adds, "I have to admit we were rather fortunate to enable him to kick off his Goodison career with a win"

was 0-0, then came a flurry of three goals and the dramatic climax.

Swindon must have thought they had won the tie as they broke the deadlock when Dave Moss' centre was headed across goal by John McLaughlin to Trevor Anderson and he lashed it into the net.

"That was a real shaker," Duncan told us. "After dominating the first game and playing with such style we must have thought that a replay at Goodison would be a piece of cake. Perhaps we thought it was just a matter of turning up to turn Swindon over. It didn't work out like that.

"Swindon came at us in a very spirited way and played a lot of good football. In fact, over the 90 minutes they were

probably the better side. We ended up mugging them as they had mugged us in the first game."

Five minutes after Swindon took the lead Everton equalised when Kenny McNaught's free-kick fell to Martin Dobson and he put the ball into the net. The winner could hardly have been any later as Duncan explains. "I heard afterwards that David Jones' goal came in the 93rd minute. I was aware the game was running late and I couldn't think of why it had gone on so long. I could only recall a couple of niggling injuries that required treatment."

It was Jones' first goal of the season and the Daily Post described it thus: 'There was little more than a minute left when Jones gained possession near the halfway line.

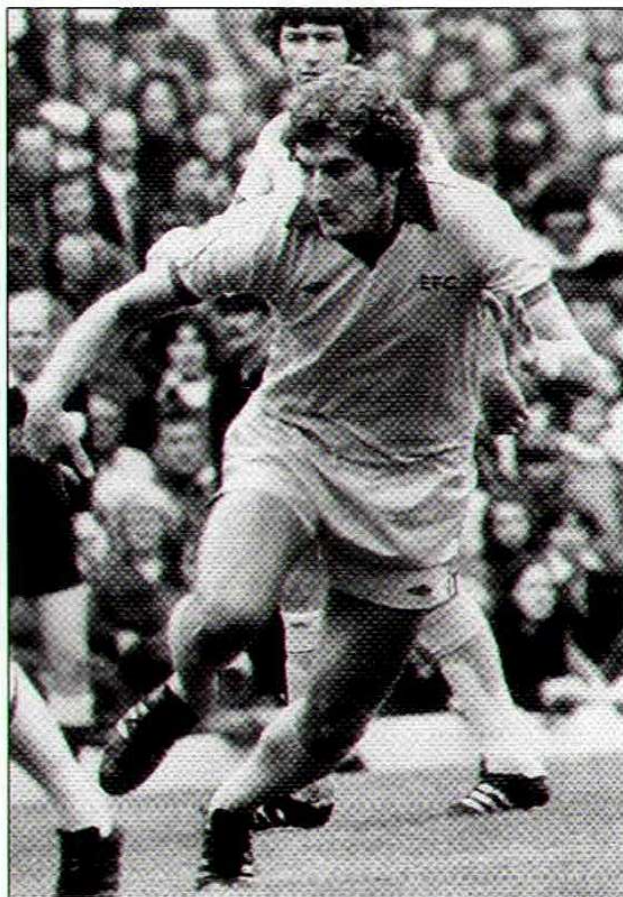
'When he made his bid the defence opened up before him and on he went until he was left with only the goalkeeper to beat. He did his best but was struck as he dived by the ball which bounced over him into goal.

'Goodison erupted and there was a crowd invasion which clearly showed both relief and delight.'

Says Duncan, "Over the two games Everton probably deserved to win but I have to admit we were lucky."

DUNCAN still lives on Merseyside and has made a reputation as an entertaining after-dinner speaker over recent years.

He is about to put that experience to good use when he launches his own corporate hospitality business.

"I feel there is a need in the North West for somebody to take the headaches away from businessmen who wish to entertain clients and say thank you to employees with a good meal and an after-dinner speaker," he told us.

"That is what I aim to do. I shall do the organising for them and I have arranged my first date at Haydock Racecourse on April 15 when Kevin Keegan is the speaker."

Everton fans who remember Duncan for his ability to entertain on the pitch will have no doubts about him succeeding in his new field.

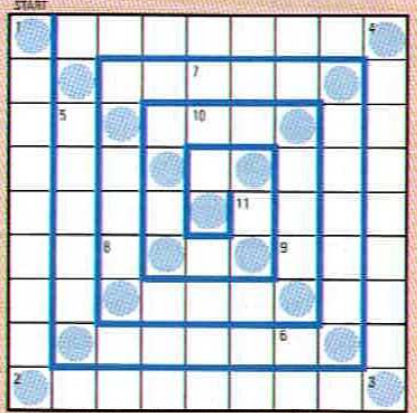

THEY HAD A DREAM...

When Paul Rideout began his career with Swindon Town as an England schoolboy international some 14 years ago the club and their supporters had a dream.

It was that one day they would play at the highest level of the game which then was the First Division and now is the Premiership.

Looking back Paul (pictured below in action at Swindon earlier this season) says, "It was an impossible dream really. The club were in the Third Division with no chance of acquiring the money they would need to bridge the gap."

This season that dream has become reality and today Swindon Town are at Goodison Park in a Premiership match with their ambitious young centre-forward of yesteryear in the opposite camp.

Paul admits, "I was delighted to see Swindon promoted because I felt they were unlucky to be denied the chance in 1990 following charges over irregular payments.

"Their manager, John Gorman, was coach when I was there a couple of years ago on loan from Southampton and he impressed me a lot. Glenn Hoddle did a superb job but I feel John deserves just as much credit.

"Since I left the club to join Aston Villa Swindon have obviously had some excellent managers.

"First there was Lou Macari who set the whole thing rolling and he was followed by Ossie Ardiles and Hoddle.



JOHN'S RUN IS OVER...

After being an ever-present all season John Ebbrell has missed our last two games with a knee injury.

He collected it in the game against West Ham and it ended a run of 37 successive League and Cup outings which showed he had fully recovered from the stomach operation he had last season.

John was back in training this week and told us, "I just thought it was a normal bang on the knee but then we discovered the bone was bruised and it took longer than expected to recover."



"It is through these men that the club have not only enjoyed promotion from the Third Division but have established a reputation for good football.

"They had a slow start to this season which may have been expected.

"Like Everton they have been hit by injuries to key players and they have also discovered you need money in the Premiership.

"In order to withstand injuries a club must have a big squad, as Manchester United have proved recently."

Although born in Bournemouth Paul moved to Swindon at 13 with his family and was always going to join them when he left school.

"I had been training with them since I was 11," he says. "They had looked after me well, they were a friendly club and when it was time to decide where I should start my career there was no reason why I shouldn't stay with Swindon."

Paul's decision was soon justified because he made his debut within months of joining them. In fact, he is still the youngest-ever to turn out for Swindon having played against Hull City at the age of 16 years and 107 days on November 29 1980.

"I wouldn't have played in League football at such an age if I had gone to a bigger club," says Paul.

He fully justified Swindon's confidence in him with 38 goals in 95 League games plus another three in six cup matches.

Paul also expects to be much nearer full fitness for the meeting. After missing 10 games because of his stomach muscle operation he returned for the visit of West Ham.

When he was taken off after half an hour at Chelsea there were fears of more injury problems but he explained, "I went off because of stiffness in the legs due to lack of match practice. I had had only one five-a-side match in six weeks and it just wasn't enough."

Paul showed he is on the path to full fitness again with his goal at Bolton last week that earned us an FA Cup replay.

QUICK RECOVERY...

Everybody at the club was relieved to see how well Matt Jackson recovered from the injury he received at Chelsea and that it didn't affect his contribution to our draw at Bolton.

Matt received a nasty bang in the face which for half an hour meant he had difficulty in seeing.

"My sight was sensitive to light for a time and I couldn't open my eyes," he told us. "That was the problem. And I admit it was a bit worrying.
