


We are all looking forward to this evening's game, which is going out live on SKY Television. We are unbeaten in our last six home games and hope to add another victory to this run tonight.

Let me first thank you for your continued and loyal support in our first tough season in the FA Carling Premiership.

You will know from all of the recent press reports and speculation that, whatever our position in the League we aim to strenuously pursue our plans to improve all of the facilities at the County Ground in order to comply with not only the Taylor Report but also the level of comfort and service we offer to our supporters.

As you may be aware, the new Shrivenham Road stand, now to be call the Intel Stand, is due for completion before the start of next season. The Stratton Bank End, however, looks as if it will be closed to all supporters reducing the capacity to 14,000 all seated. To comply with the new League ruling on visiting supporters we are forced into a position of having less places available to home supporters than this season. Bearing this in mind we must take special care to accommodate all existing Season Ticket holders, particularly those who are losing their favourite spots. This requires a more structured and earlier sale of Season Tickets than in previous years. You will also be pleased to hear that we are introducing an instalment plan to help existing Season Ticket holders stagger payments if required. The price structure of seats has remained unchanged though we do reserve the right to increase matchday tickets if required.


An application form will soon be posted to all existing season ticket holders. For new applicants a form will be available from the Ticket Office later this month.

One point from a goalless home draw with Aston Villa was not quite the reward Sheffield Wednesday were hoping for from their opening two games in the Premiership.

The 'double' finalists from last season considerably strengthened their resources during the summer signing a new central defensive partnership in Des Walker and Andy Pearce and further boosted their squad with the introduction of England utility man Andy Sinton.

Wednesday equalled their transfer record with the Sinton signing - Des Walker cost £2.7-million from Sampdoria - and it brought Trevor Francis' spending money in two years at Hillsborough to £10.6-million!

After the Sinton deal Mr Francis said: "I'm pleased to have finally brought Sinton here. I've been wanting to do it for two seasons. I know him better than most. I signed him for QPR from Brentford for £350,000 in 1989. The fee we're paying for him proves how much he's improved."

Wednesday, beaten 2-0 at Anfield on the opening day of the season have failed to find the form that took them to two Wembley finals last year. Injuries to star men, in particular Chris Waddle, Hirst, and Woods, have hampered progress. Add to that the departure of Warhurst (to Blackburn) and USA International midfielder John Harkes to Derby County and you can see the squad has been somewhat depleted.

Even so Wednesday still remain respectably placed in the table with five wins and six draws in 17 away games have a record to respect.


MARK BRIGHT - Striker. Scored 20 goals in 44 games last season after a £1-million exchange deal - that involved Paul Williams -brought him from Crystal Palace in September 1992. Was in Palace's FA Cup Final team in 1990 and picked up another losers medal last season. Previously played for Leek Town, Port Vale and Leicester City before coming to prominence with Palace. Born: Stoke 6-2-62.

England - his last against France in February 1993 - David was really making his mark on the game until two serious injuries, a fractured ankle and a troublesome thigh strain, decimated last season. Had been Wednesday's top scorer in the previous four-seasons and his record for the club by the end of 1992-93 is impressive with 103 goals in 241 games. David played one season in Barnsley's League team before a £250,000 move to Wednesday in August 1986. Born: Barnsley 7-12-67.

GRAHAM HYDE - Midfield. Came up through the youth ranks turning professional in May 1988. Given his chance in a 2-1 win over Nottingham Forest in September 1991. Made 29 appearances last season. Born: Doncaster 10-11-70.

PHIL KING - Fullback. Was first choice left back at the start of last season but then injured a knee ligament and in the end made only 11 League appearances but managed the League Cup Final. Joined the club for £400,000 from Swindon Town, in November 1989, having previously played for Exeter City and Torquay United. A classy performer who is comfortable on the ball. Born: Bristol 28-12-67.

ROLAND NILSSON - Fullback. Swedish International with more than 50 caps he joined Wednesday from IFK Gothenburg in December 1989 for a fee of £375,000. Won a UEFA Cup winners' medal while with IFK helping them beat Dundee United in the final of 1987. Finished last season with 140 appearances for the Owls. Born: Helsingborg, Sweden 27-11-63.

CARLTON PALMER - Midfield/Defender. Carlton established himself as an England International during the 1992 European Championship finals in Sweden. His versatility as a midfielder, centrehalf or sweeper makes him ideal for such Championships. Has now collected 17 caps and made his 216th appearance for The Owls at Anfield on the opening day of this season. Unfortunately blotted his copy book by being sent-off in that game. Started his career with WBA in 1983 and six-years later moved to Hillsborough in a £750,000 move. Born: Rowley Regis 3-12-65.

ANDY PEARCE - Defender. A £500,000 signing from Coventry City in June 1993 he made his Wednesday debut in the 2-0 defeat at Anfield on the opening day of this season. At six-foot-four he is commanding in the air. Made 71 League appearances for the Sky Blues after arriving from Halesowen in 1990. Born: Bradford-on-Avon 20-4-66.

NIGEL PEARSON - Defender. Stands 6' 1" but missed Wednesday's two Cup Final appearances last season through injury. Skippered the side to a Rumbelows League Cup triumph in 1991. Spent seven years with Shrewsbury Town - making his League debut at Oldham, in August 1982 - and arrived at Hillsborough

in 1987 for £250,000. Had played 328 League games by the start of this season. Born: Nottingham 21-8-63.

KEVIN PRESSMAN

- Goalkeeper. Former England Under-21 International he joined The Owls as an apprentice in 1984. Made his League debut at Southampton in a 1-1 draw in September 1987 and by the end of last season had made 74 appearances in nine years with the club. Born: Fareham 6-11-67.



ANDY SINTON - Midfield. Completed his long protracted £2.7-million transfer from Queens Park Rangers on August 19th, just in time to make his Wednesday debut against Arsenal who had also hoped to sign the England International. Came into League football with Cambridge United and was only 16 when he made his debut in November 1982 against Wolves. Was transferred to Brentford during the 1985-86 season and QPR snapped him up for a bargain £350,000

Sheffield Wednesday

in 1989. Came to prominence as an International during the European Championship Finals in Sweden in 1992, and he now has 10 caps. Can play wide, in midfield, or at fullback and he scored 63 goals in 402 League games coming into this season. Born: Newcastle 19-3-66.

JOHN SHERIDAN - Midfield. Rated by his Republic of Ireland manager, Jack Charlton, as one of the most creative midfielders in British football. A free-kick specialist and penalty taker he had scored 140 goals in just over 420 games by the commencement of this season. Spent the first eight years of his career with Leeds United, making his League debut for them in November 1982 against Middlesbrough. Brian Clough paid £650,000 for his services yet played him but once in his three months with Forest; and in November 1989 John moved onto Wednesday for £500,000. Born: Stretford 1-10-64.

DES WALKER - Centre-half. It cost £2.7-million to bring Des back from Sampdoria after one season in Italian football. Had left Nottingham Forest a year earlier in a £1,5-million deal. Des, one of the quickest defenders in British football had made 264 League appearances for Forest and scored one goal. The first of those games was against Everton in March 1984. Won his first cap in 1989, as a sub against Denmark and has now played 58 times for England. Born: Hackney 26-11-65.

CHRIS BART-WILLIAMS - Midfield. Outstanding teenager who spent March 1993 in Australia helping England to third place in the World Youth Cup. Also capped at Under-21 level Chris scored the first hattrick of his career in Wednesday's 5-2 win over Southampton, in April 1993. Made his League debut for Leyton Orient at 16, in 1990, and cost Wednesday an initial £350,000 in November 1991 in an exchange deal involving goalkeeper Chris Turner. Born: Freetown, Sierra Leone 16-6-74.

CHRIS WOODS - Goalkeeper. Established himself as England's first choice goalkeeper following the International retirement of Peter Shilton after the 1990, World Cup Finals. Has now been capped 43 times. Chris starred in a League Cup Final at Wembley when he was 18, before he had made his League debut, and kept a clean sheet for Nottingham Forest against Liverpool. Moved on to QPR then Norwich before five

successful years with Rangers in which he won four Championship medals. Joined Wednesday in August 1991 for £1.2-million. Born: Boston 14-11-59.

NIGEL WORTHINGTON - Defender. This is his 11th season with Wednesday, making him the longest serving professional on the books. Dependable and consistent performer he was signed from Notts County, in February 1984, for £126,000, and had clocked up 382 appearances by the end of the 1992-93 campaign. Capped 44 times by Northern Ireland Nigel is also effective on the left-side of midfield. Born: Ballymena 4-11-61.

The Wednesday squad is completed by 25-year-old goalkeeper **Lance Key**, signed form Histon and yet to play; defenders **Simon Stewart** - who had six outings last season - and **Julian Watts**, a 22-year-old signed form Rotherham United in 1992 for £80,000.

Local lad **Ryan Jones** - 20 - showed promise in midfield in nine games last season while **Michael Williams**, previously with Maltby MW, excelled in his six appearances as a forward.

Striker **Nigel Jemson**, has struggled to find the form that impressed so many before his £800,000 transfer from Nottingham Forest in 1991. He has made only 33 appearances.

SPOTLIGHT

Chris Waddle - by Colin Benson

In an era when individual artists are all too rare Chris' mastery of the ball, his gliding grace across the turf, and tight control, does much to excite the watching fan.

Born in Hebburn in December 1960, Chris was spotted by Newcastle United playing for Tow Law Town. They signed him in 1980 and he made his League debut in a 1-0 home win over Shrewsbury Town in October 1980.

Scored 38 League goals in his five years at St James' Park and joined the Geordies Hall of Fame. Then in the summer of 1985 Tottenham

Hotspur persuaded him to leave his roots and become the idol of White Hart Lane.

Played for Spurs in their 1987 FA Cup Final defeat by Coventry and was on the losing side again last May.

When he left Tottenham for Marseille, in July 1989, the French club had to pay a British record £4.25-million for his services. Won French Championship and European Cup medals with them.

At the end of the first season back in English football Chris was voted the Football Writers Association 'Player of the Year' for 1993.

Came into this season with 98 goals scored in English football and 62 England caps.





Trevor Francis Manager

Was hailed a super-star when still only a teenager with Birmingham City. A player of exceptional skill he became the first £1-million player in British football when Brian Clough signed him. Immediately repaid the Forest boss by netting the only goal to beat Malmo in the 1979 European Cup Final.


Trevor's colourful career continued with Manchester City; Sampdoria, Atlanta (USA), Rangers and QPR. Joined Sheffield Wednesday on a free transfer in 1990 after a spell as player-manager at Loftus Road and became team manager in 1991 following the departure of Ron Atkinson...Still plays and came into this season with a record of 202 goals scored in 569 games in English football. Has been capped by England 52 times. Born: Plymouth 19-4-54.

OOH....AAH!!! CANTONA took on a new connotation for Town midfield star John Moncur recently with the emphasis definitely on the "aah!" as the Manchester United striker brutally stamped on his chest.

The only surprise after the game was that United manager Alex Ferguson dodged the press instead of making his usual attacks on the match officials for the Frenchman's demise; and of course now the obligatory denial suggesting that Moncur lifted his chest onto Cantona's studs.

There is no quibble United are by far the most enterprising and exciting team in English football at the moment. Unfortunately they are tarnishing their glorious game through their red-tinted perspective that culminates in continual bitching at match officials.

Paul Ince is emerging as the master referee-baiter; more mouth than magic, disputing from the first whistle every decision that goes against the Reds.

This is certainly not the image the old United under Sir Matt Busby created.

What it boils down to is blatant intimidation of referees and linesman. Even Brian Hill, an FA Cup Final referee and one of the most respected whistlers in the business, showed definite signs of this during the 2-2 draw with United here.

Brian was well positioned to see exactly what Cantona did to John Moncur. It was an atrocious, spiteful response to a quite common incident. Yet Mr Hill declined to show the French captain the red card until after he had consulted the linesman.


Could this hesitation, caution, call it what you will, have been prompted by Mr Ferguson's previous accusations against this referee? Surely not. No doubt Brian Hill will deny he was influenced by Mr Ferguson's previous request to the Premier League authorities that he never be allowed to referee a Manchester United game again.

I know Brian to be an honest conscientious official but he would be less than human if he had not been affected by those criticisms of his ability, No doubt deep in his subconscious there was an alarm bell ringing when Cantona over stepped the mark yet again. Some observers have offered excuses for United's lack of regard for authority suggesting that they are under so much pressure as they strive for the treble. What utter rubbish.

If they want pressure then come to Swindon Town. There is no greater pressure in the game than that affecting teams embroiled in the relegation zone. Yet you don't see John Gorman or David Hay lose their composure and blame all their problems on others. Decisions, and "luck" have certainly not favoured us this campaign and sure there have been frustrations which have triggered responses. But all in all they have kept their cool while on the field the lads plug away at trying to produce quality football.

The tragedy of Cantona, who of course was sent-off again four days later at Highbury, is that he is such a brilliant creative player. It was an open secret that he was in line for the coveted Football Writers Association Player of the Year award and he would certainly have got my vote if he stuck to football. But now a succession of spiteful mindless acts of stupidity have killed his chances.

If he does get the accolade it will be a kick in the teeth for quality players such as Peter Beardsley and Ray Wilkins who add a touch of sportsmanship to their flair and imagination.

April 4 1969: Crewe Alexandra I Swindon Town 2

This Good Friday fixture gave Swindon a first ever League visit to Gresty Road - and the appearance of the League Cup holders in the Cheshire town attracted the highest gate of the season, just over nine thousand. Both sides were desperate for points, with Crewe fighting a relegation battle and the Town looking to stay with the leaders. Honours were even in the first half with both keepers kept busy, but six minutes after the break Swindon broke the deadlock. Peter Noble was left unmarked on the far post as a left-wing cross floated in from John Trollope and he made no mistake with a close-range header. Alex spurned two good opportunities to equalise. Substitute Ivan Hollett looked certain to score but, with only Peter Downsborough to beat, lifted the ball over the crossbar. Then John Inglis went even closer, hitting the bar. But the home side were soon made to pay when a Roger Smart through ball found the late John Smith - and the burly midfielder calmly rounded keeper Willie Mailey to score the Town's second, twenty minutes from time.

Crewe were handed a lifeline in the 78th minute when Joe Butler upended their scorer Tommy Curley in the area. Kevin McHale sent Downsborough the wrong way from the spot, but defeat for the Cheshire side sent them the wrong way down the League.

April 6 1974: Aston Villa I Swindon Town I

Swindon, already relegated to the Third Division, came close to recording their first away victory for sixteen months. Four minutes from time John Trollope drilled home a free-kick, but it was mysteriously ruled out by referee Gordon Kew. Yet the official had twice waved aside Town's protests when keeper Jimmy Allan had been baulked by Irish striker Sammy Morgan. The first occasion saw a Brian Little shot blocked on the line by Ron Potter and the second resulted in a goal, Little again being the beneficiary. But Swindon battled back to snatch an equaliser when Peter Eastoe registered his first goal - a splendid diving header - since making his move from Wolves permanent three weeks earlier. For Town it was a considerable improvement on their last performance, when a certain John Gorman was an influential figure in a 5-1 drubbing at Carlisle.



It has been an incredible turn around for the striker who scored in all of our pre-season warm-up matches then failed to find the net in his opening 22 competitive outings.

It wasn't just the lack of goals that concerned most observers but his apparent unease at the physical edge of the English game. Manager John Gorman had been filled with admiration for the Norwegian striker having studied video clips of his scoring feats for both his country and Rapid Vienna; then witnessed the same authorative cutting edge on our pre-season tour. But

thrown into the competitive cauldron of Premiership action he found life all too frenzied and frenetic.

By mid-November Jan found himself out in the cold. There was talk of him leaving the homely confines of Wiltshire to return to either Rapid Vienna of Lillestrom on loan.

"It was all a matter of confidence I think," claims Jan. "I did have a problem adapting to English football and it didn't help that the team were not doing well either.

"As a striker you are judged on the goals you score. You are accountable to the figures in the goals for column and no one can cheat the goal chart.

"It was difficult. The game seemed so fast and was passing me by. I felt totally out of things. I wanted to go back home because this wasn't doing my World Cup hopes any good. I had to be seen to be doing well at Club level to maintain my International selection.

"Obviously the best boost I could get in this direction would be to do good in England. But at the time this seemed a really remote possibility."

A loan transfer was set up for the turn of the year but then fate took a hand. Jan was recalled to the front-line for the FA Cup Third Round replay with Ipswich Town on January 18 and scored!

It was a good goal too and came after he had missed an absolute sitter from five yards. We lost the tie but Jan had won his confidence back and followed this success a few days later with his first Premier League goal in a 2-1 win over Tottenham Hotspur here.

It was then that we were entertained to his now familiar fly-past around the ground, a celebration that was to be repeated three times in the next game against Coventry City when the Viking warrior hit all three in a 3-1 victory.

"I don't normally do that. I don't know why I did it," says Jan referring to his aeroplane impressions. "It was just a reaction at the time as I felt so happy. Now people expect me to do it after a goal. I think during the Coventry game I saw this little old lady on the terraces doing this aeroplane thing after I scored so I thought that's what they like to see."

As far as Town fans are concerned the more Aage fly-pasts the better as we strive to make a last ditch effort to maintain our status as a Premier League side.

"It is nice to score goals, that is my trade," says Jan. "But I can't be happy if we aren't getting the results.


"The football philosophy here is good but sometimes you have to concentrate less on playing your own game and more on disrupting the opponents.

"Results are the most important ingredient. They don't give us marks for style only for wins and draws and in our position now draws are not going to be enough.

"We still have a chance as long as there are enough points to play for and if we do our stuff it is possible. We have some good teams to play but then we have tended to do better against the likes of Manchester United than against Sheffield United so this is not a problem.

"The World Cup is two or three months away and anything can happen in that time. A loss of form. Injury. I am concentrating now on a bigger challenge. Helping to keep Swindon up. We will do all we can together. If we succeed it will be a great achievement."
