




# FROM THE TORIN



I was asked if I had anything special to say to the players before tonight's game. All I can say if the lads don't know how important this match is they shouldn't be here.

It shouldn't even be necessary for the them to talk. All I should have to do is name the side. If they

want it bad enough they will go for it. A place in the semi-finals of any competition is surely incentive enough.

Millwall have not crossed my path too many times in my career but teams change so quickly in this business that is no problem. All we need to know is how they are doing and we have had them watched. They are a good side in a good vein form.

People don't tend to remember quarter-finals so readily. The highs and lows all stem from semi-final experiences, and we are a million miles from that moment, though I do recall when I was playing for Liverpool in a tie against Watford which we looked to be losing until we got a penalty late in the game to force a replay which we then won comfortably.

As I say Millwall are enjoying a good run of results at the moment while fortune has not been so kind to us in this respect but we hope to improve things at home.

When you are away you don't have to force the play too much, you can consolidate and frustrate the opposition. At home of course the onus is on you to make the running and force the play. That was how it was here against Sheffield United. They just sat back absorbed the pressure until we ran out of ideas and hit us on the break.

This is something we need to come to terms with as soon as possible. But first tonight's Coca-Cola Cup tie. We are counting on you to give us the encouragement to win through too the semi-final.

There have been some changes in the Millwall side since we last met here in the First Division. The double sale of the highly talented fullback Kenny Cunningham and striker Jon Goodman to Crystal Palace brought in much needed capital but ripped a hole in a Millwall side already depleted by summer sales.

Two months ago the Lions promotion bid was floundering close to the rocks of the relegation zone after a depressing run of results. Then six weeks ago Millwall knocked Nottingham Forest out of the Coca-Cola Cup with a sensational 2-0 win at the City Ground.

Greg Berry was the hero. The stand-in striker, starting his first game this season for Millwall, left the then Premiership high-flyers reeling with two golden goals. They were good enough to smash Forest's proud 18-year unbeaten home run in the League Cup.

The 23-year-old, signed from Wimbledon for £200,000, in March 1994, was drifted in at the last minute, when Richard Cadette went down with flu symptoms, and it took him just 18-minutes to glance in the first goal with a neat header from Dave Savages's free-kick. His second, four minutes before the break, was a firmly struck shot from 12-yards.

It was a turning point victory, given the circumstances, and proved to be the turning point of the season for Mick McCarthy's team who went into last Saturday's FA Cup Third Round tie against Arsenal, at the New Den, unbeaten since that triumph on the last day of November.

That's impressive, so too is the goal against record which is just three over that period. The improvement on the field which has lifted Millwall to 11th place in the First Division, and to within five points of the Play-Off places, has been due to the return, after a long injury, of Keith "Rhino" Stevens, the experienced lan Dawes and the form of goalkeeper Kasey Keller and the ever improving Andy Roberts and Ben Thatcher.

Stevens is a tough no-nonsense individual, always fully committed to the cause, who has been around the Millwall scene since 1980. The fans adore him, he is the team's spiritual leader, the man who epitomises the way the Dockland people like to see their football played.

This is Millwall's first quarter-final appearance in this competition in 16 years and you can bet they will be fighting tooth and claw to make it the semi-final.

# MILWALLABG

**MARK BEARD** • Full-back. Brought up through the ranks at the Den. Mark made his debut against Watford last season and made such an impression that he became an essential member of the squad. A right-sided player, who is strong in the tackle, he scored his first League goal in a 2-2 draw at Bristol City in November 1993, London 8-10-74.

**RICHARD CADETTE** = Striker. Big strong attacker secured a permanent transfer from Falkirk (£125,000) this season after a spell on loan. Scored 27 goals for "Bairns" last season, helping them win promotion. Started his career with Leyton Orient in 1984, making his League debut at Brentford in August that year; then scored 49 goals in 90 Fourth Division games for Southend United before being snapped up by Sheffield United in 1987. Born: Hammersmith 21-3-65.

**CARTER** • Goalkeeper. Initially spent three months on loan from Hartlepool last season, as cover for Keller, before joining Millwall on a free transfer in March 1994. Made to League appearances last season - winning the Man of the Match award v Bolton - and has had a few outings this term following the sending-off of the first choice custodian against Sunderland. Ironically, he was understudy to Tony Norman at Sunderland for the 1992 FA Cup Final, Born: Bristol 5-10-67.

IAN DAWES - Full-back. A left sided player of considerable ability and consistency. A former England Schoolboy International, he started his career with QPR with whom he collected a League Cup runners-up medal against Oxford in 1986. Made his League debut at Rotherham in March 1982. Joined The Lions in 1988 for £150,000 and has been a model pro, though injuries have restricted his appearances. Born: Croydon 22-2-63.

**MARK KENNEDY** - Forward. Became Millwall's fourth youngest debutante when he made a sub appearance against Charlton at the age of 16 years 344 days, in April 1993. Scored 49 goals for the Reserves and Youth sides that season - a Millwall record - and netted over 30 in 1993-94 including 4 in 12 first team appearances. Won a runners-up medal in the FA Cup in 1994 and is an Eire Youth International. Born: Dublin 15-5-76.

JOHN KERR - Forward. Canadian born of Scottish parents he scored Millwall's first goal at "The New Den" and his first League goal against Southend. A full International with the USA he was left out of the World Cup Final squad. Previously with Wycombe Wanderers. Portsmouth and Peterborough. Born: Toronto 6-3-65.

**DAVID MITCHELL** = Striker. Born in Glasgow but raised in Adelaide, Australia, he was a regular in the Adelaide City side at 17 and an Aussie International at 18. Played for Sydney City then Rangers. A period back in Australia with the World Cup squad was followed by spells with Eintracht Frankfurt, Feyenoord and Chelsea (Newcastle on loan) before signing for Swindon in 1991. Was in the winning side at the Wembley Play-Off Final in 1993 then moved to Turkish club Altay Spor Kuluba. Millwall recruited "Mitch" in October 1993. Born: Glasgow 13-6-62.



**ALEX RAE** 

**ALEX RAE** - Midfield. Former Scottish Under-21 International he is an attacking midfielder with an eye for goal. The Club's top shot in 1993-94 with 13 League goals. Was a junior with Rangers then joined Falkirk where he played nearly a 100 Scottish League games. It cost Millwall £100,000 to bring him south and he made his 150th League appearance for The Lions v Burnley 14-9-94. Born: 30-6-69.

**ANDY ROBERTS** - Midfield. Was in Millwall's FA Youth Cup winning team and was already an established first-team regular at 18. A strong determined competitor with all round ability. Andy has performed at the back and in the centre of defence as well as midfield. Has been on the subs bench for the England Under-21 squad. Born:Dartford 20-3-74.

**DAVE SAVAGE** = Midfield. Signed in the summer of '94 from Irish club Longford Town after impressing as a trialist in the Reserves. Had previously had brief spells with Brighton and Raith Rovers. Has good skill and pace and great confidence in his ability. Made his debut against Southend United on August 13, 1994. Born: Dublin 30-7-73.

Made his League bow at Leicester as a centre-back but also plays left-back. Born: Swindon 30-11-75.

**KEITH STEVENS** - Defender. A Millwall legend - only Barry Kitchener has made more appearances. Was 16 when he made his debut in April 1981 at Oxford United and commenced this season on 389 games. Has featured in promotion sides from the Third and Second Divisions. The skipper has missed

JASON VAN DEN BLERK - Fullback. Signed in August 1994 from Dutch club Go Ahead Eagles, for £300,000, Jason is Australian by birth and an Australian International. Played local football in Sydney before coming to Europe and made his League debut, a substitute, at Tranmere (17-9-94), and his full debut at Sunderland in the Coca-Cola Cup. Essentially a fullback but has been playing in midfield recently. He is 26.



BEN THATCHER

PAT VAN DEN HAUWE - Defender. Vastly experienced Welsh International. Commenced his career with Birmingham City before enjoying real success with Everton in the mid-eighties, then Tottenham Hotspur. Picked up a League Championship medal and has since added FA Cup and ECWC trophies to his collection. Arrived at Millwall in September 1993 and operates in

the centre of defence after playing most of his career at fullback. Born: Dundermonde 16-12-60.

DAMIAN WEBBER - Central Defender. Is expected to play tonight as Witter is suspended. The 26-year-old centre-half has been around the non-League circuit, playing for Crawley and Worthing Town. Had spells with Barnet and Brighton but never made the breakthrough and joined Millwall this season from Bognor Regis for a nominal fee. Made his League debut at home to Barnsley 19-11-94.

TONY WITTER - Central Defender. Signed from QPR for £75,000 after a loan spell. Saw service with Yeading and Uxbridge before being spotted with Grays Athletic in the Vauxhall Opel League and signed by Crystal Palace in October 1990, for £10,000. Ten months later, having not played for the first team, he was transferred to QPR for £125,000, a strange signing as Rangers already had six experienced centrebacks. Joined Millwall on loan in November 1991 but did not get a game and made his League debut for Plymouth (on loan), in January 1992, v Leicester and scored within two minutes! Born: London 12-8-65.

## THE MAN IN CHARGE



Manager Mick McCarthy

Was elevated to the status of player-manager in April 1992 after a successful run as caretaker boss following the departure of Bruce Rioch.

Born and bred in Barnsley - he celebrates his 35th birthday on the 7th February - Mick joined the apprentice ranks of his local team upon leaving school and got his break in August 1977 when he made his debut in a 4-0 win over Rochdale.

Was an ever-present in his first two seasons with Barnsley and clocked up 272 League appearances in seven years at the club.

A steady consistent performer he attracted the attentions of Manchester City who invested £200,000 in him on December 14th 1983. Mick strengthened City's defence considerably adding 140 League games to his total in four years at Maine Road; helping them win promotion from Division Two in 1985.

From Maine Road he moved to Celtic in 1987 helping them clinch the Premier League Championship and the Scottish Cup in 1988. In the summer of 1990 Mick moved into Europe with Olympique Lyon the French club.

A latecomer to International football, he was 25 when he made his debut for the Republic of Ireland against Poland in May 1983, but is the holder of a proud record as the Irish captain.

He skippered the side in the 1990 World Cup Finals in Italy and was in the side during its tour of the USA in 1992 but injury prevented him from adding to his 57 full caps.

## UNDER THE SPOTLICHT

## Goalkeeper Kasey Keller

Many experienced observers thought that Kasey Keller should have been in America's World Cup finals team last summer yet he never even made the squad, which was a great surprise as he had been understudy to Tony Meola in 1990. It proved to be the USA's loss for Meola was out of his depth while Keller has proved himself a more than competent performer in the big league.

Born in Washington DC on the 29th November 1969 he played soccer at High School and for Portland University before coming to England to try his luck with Millwall whom he joined in season 1991-92.

Already an International with the USA Kasey made his Lions debut in the last game of the season, against Southend United in May 1992, in place of Aidan Davison. He celebrated the occasion with a clean-sheet in a 2-0 victory.

Kasey won the Millwall Player of the Year title in his first full season at The Den and made his 100th League appearance at Bristol City on October 8th 1994. At six-foot-one he looks the part and manager Mick McCarthy says "he is now playing out of his boots."

There is certainly plenty to back up this claim for Keller went 523 minutes without conceding a goal until he was beaten by Watford on December 27th, a game in which he saved a penalty - his second penalty save of the season, the other was against Middlesbrough.





## Things go better with Coke we are told and this will be the case for the four winners who emerge from this Quarter Final of the Coca-Cola Cup.

Just eight clubs now and the Endsleigh League is represented by three contenders, one of which must make it through to the semi-final, as we take on Millwall. The third, Bolton Wanderers, have home advantage against Norwich City.

Bolton's impressive victory at West Ham United in the previous round suggests that the Lancashire club have lost none of their famous giant-killing qualities; they have won through to the fifth round of the FA Cup in each of the past three seasons even though they set out in the first round on each occasion.

Liverpool, at Anfield, Everton at Goodison Park, Arsenal at Highbury - all replays these - as well as Aston Villa at Burnden Park, have been amongst their victims in this time yet Bruce Rioch's squad have not been able to reproduce the same swashbuckling success in the Coca-Cola Cup.

Until this season that is. Now they play hosts to Norwich City after wins over Premiership clubs Ipswich Town (3-0 at Portman Road 4-0 on aggregate), and West Ham (3-1 at Upton Park). They also beat Sheffield United 2-1 at Bramall Lane in the Third Round.

Incidentally, this is the first time that Bolton have been as far as the fourth round even since 1977, but can they make it through to the semi-final? Certainly in strikers John McGinlay, who had a spell with Millwall, and Mixu Paatelainen, the Finnish hit-man signed from Aberdeen last summer, they have scoring potential to worry a Canaries side that were 2-0 down to Tranmere Rovers before a remarkable recovery in the last round.

Without a doubt the Liverpool v Arsenal tie is the game of the round. Liverpool, who reeled off four straight wins over the Christmas holiday to climb to third place in the Premiership are the men in form. Contrast this record with that of Arsenal who after their 1-0 defeat at Spurs had won but two out of a dozen Premiership League matches - leaving them ten places and 13 points behind Liverpool.

The Gunners manager, George Graham, has laughed off his side's worrying slump by pointing out that they are still very much involved in the Cups. Yet even this comfort could well be denied them on the Anfield pitch, the stage upon which they clinched one of their greatest League Championships.

Arsenal will provide the sweat and perspiration no doubt but Liverpool can match them in this respect and also display imagination for which Highbury so yearns, Common sense and reason tells us it must be Liverpool but then the beauty of this game is that it has no respect for odds.

So to the Crystal Palace v Manchester City tie at Selhurst Park. Crystal Palace cut another groove in a most unwanted record in their New Year holiday fixture at Nottingham Forest. It was their ninth successive game without a goal - just two short of Coventry City's all-time long player of 75 years ago.

This despite the fact that Palace have one of the countries most sought after strikers in former Millwall man Chris Armstrong. But while Palace can't find the net - they might have solved this problem against Lincoln City on Saturday - they remain pretty sound themselves at the back where England goalkeeper Nigel Martyn is in tremendous form.

Manchester City were not expected to beat Newcastle United in the last round but their win at St lames' Park was well deserved and their manager, former Oxford United chief Brian Horton, must be confident that despite his injury problems, City have too much quality for Alan Smith's young side.

With the likes of Walsh, Rosler and Quinn, in the front line City should have the fire power to reach the last four. Two former Town stars, Nicky Summerbee, who is a regular and, Fitzroy Simpson, who is beginning to regain some recognition, could well be included in the City midfield.

# TOWNTALK

This evening lan Culverhouse talks to Colin Benson.

Q. lan, now that your transfer from Norwich City has been finalised do you feel any different?

A. Yes. I now know where I am, what direction I am going in, whereas before everything was uncertain. When you are on a loan you know that it might be a temporary situation so now that the clubs have sorted out a transfer I feel more secure.

I can settle down now and concentrate on football.

Q. You had been at Carrow Road since October 1985 and must have been expecting to end your playing days with Norwich City?

A. That's right. When we started talking terms for a new agreement last season it looked that way and I would certainly have been happy to stay.

## Q. So what went wrong?

A. Well'it started just after Mike Walker left Carrow Road to take over as manager of Everton. I was asked to sign a new contract but was not quite happy with one or two things in it and held it over until the summer.

## Q. Then what happened?

A. I was given an ultimatum. To either sign or not be included in the first team.

Things just went into limbo, it became a stalemate, with me holding out for what I felt I deserved and the management doing likewise. Both sides were pig-headed about it I suppose.


Anyway they were as good as their word. I have not played for Norwich City in the Premiership or Coca-Cola Cup this season. The situation just seemed to escalate and it appeared the only sensible way of resolving our differences was to leave the club.

## Q. So you must have been delighted when you heard Swindon were interested?

A. Of course. The suggestion of coming here on loan gave me the opportunity to prove myself to the gaffer and everyone else. From day one my objective was to impress the manager enough to persuade him to give me a full contract.

## Q. It can't be easy coming to a new club on loan?

A. That is true but the lads here are terrific and really made me feel welcome right from the start. It is not always easy fitting into a new team but they made it easy.



## Q. What was the biggest problem?

A. Match fitness. Having not played first team football since last season. I had to quickly try to adjust to the pace of the First Division. It is nowhere near as intensive as the Premiership of course but is still a big step up from Reserve Team football. Slowly I have got better.

The loan system has its detractors but I believe it is a very good idea and should even be extended.

At the moment we can't move from one Premiership club to another on a temporary basis which is a shame. There are a lot of class players operating in the Reserve Teams of the bigger clubs who could not only do themselves some good by playing first team football for another side but also help some of the smaller outfits as well. It would be good for the player, good for both clubs, and good for the fans.

You can only play thirteen players on a Saturday yet institutions such as Manchester United, Newcastle and Arsenal, will carry 40-man squads. Consequently many fine players are being lost to a public who would appreciate their skills.

## Q. Is football in a healthy state?

A. Well we are only into the third year of the Premiership yet already there is a big divide. It is virtually two Leagues with the big money glamour clubs out on their own and the rest left to pick up the crumbs.

It's getting harder and harder for little clubs such as Swindon, Leicester and Ipswich, to compete at that level. If you can't pull in massive crowds and do not have benevolent benefactor then you can't compete on a financial basis. Never has this divide been so obvious.

### Q. What of Swindon!

A. I am quite happy to come to Swindon, it is a great little club. If we can get one or two good results it could take off.

Since I have been here things have gone fairly well though we have not picked up as many wins as I think our performances have deserved. But there is a lot of talent in the team and I am sure we will improve our position the in the League table before long.

## Q. What about the Coca-Cola Cup. Any happy memories of this competition?

A. No. I don't think I have got one. Hopefully after tonight's game there will be something to treasure.

There is so much at stake we will treat this as a Cup Final. I am sure the Chairman and Directors will be anxious for success because a semi-finals will bring in much needed revenue. But we will not be thinking of that. We just want to concentrate on the football and get through and win the game.


We have been scraping draws away from home lately but we need to get things right at home. If we can turn that around we will really start to get things rolling. We are so keen to win at home we have probably been a little too enthusiastic. The gaffer has told us to take our time and not to be rushed.

We miss him not being in the team. The way he came back at Oldham was inspiring. He really gets everyone around him going though he was not on for long.

Congratulations to Millwall boss Mick McCarthy who was named last Friday as the Endsleigh League Manager of the Month for December. The Yorkshire born former Republic of Ireland captain and centre half is one of the straightest guys in the business and always good for a joke or two.

I must admit though that I was surprised to learn that this is the first time Mick has won the award. He has done such a good job at The Den since taking over. First as player-manager, that one tended to take it as read that he had been successful before in this respect.

It goes to show you how hard it is to earn this accolade. Certainly 1994 ended on a good note for Millwall who took maximum points from their last five First Division fixtures. These included a 1-0 win over Wolves and wins at both Southend and Notts County. Now we eagerly await Steve McMahon's first title.

Talking of managers, the Football League have named David Pleat to take charge of a Football League squad to play the Italian League in a representative match at Andria, in South Eastern Italy, on Wednesday 15th February.

The game will feature players under the age of 21 from both the Italian League Serie B and the Football League although David Pleat says he intends including some over-age players in his squad of 16.

Swindon Town have been well represented in these fixtures in recent years with Glenn Hoddle of course taking charge of the squad two years ago but there was no age limit at that time.

As it happens we hope that none of our players are available for selection for this fixture clashes with one of the dates for the semi-final of the Coca-Cola Cup.

The last meeting between the Football League and the Italian League by the way took place at Bristol City in October 1992 and resulted in a 3-1 victory for the home side.

While on the subject of Anglo-Italian co-operation Stoke City play last year's losing finalists Notts County for the right to face Ascoli in the Anglo Italian Cup Final at Wembley in March.

As this column this week has taken on an International flavour I was interested to read a comment on the situation in Hungary at the moment.


The Hungarians, who in the 1950's were the outstanding football nation in the world, are now down in the dumps. Their national team didn't win a single game in 1994 leaving this once proud nation in 59th place-in the latest official FIFA rankings.

The Hungarian FA are now embarking on a major development programme with children in mind but in the meantime they need to bolster the public image of the Hungarian game to entice not only interest but financial support for the project.

The unforgettable feats of the past still haunt them however, today's players are constantly being compared with the legends of yesteryear. Great names such as Puskas, Hidgekuti, Czibor and Rozaik. The funny thing is that these names were a millstone around English football's neck for so long after that infamous November afternoon on 1953 when the "Magical Magyars" took England apart at Wembley.

They beat us 6-3, the first foreign side ever to beat England on English soil. They arrived at Wembley as Olympic Champions and were en route to reaching the World Cup Final in 1954.

That famous victory is still an icon for the Hungarians. In 1993 they staged special celebrations to mark the 40th anniversary of that triumph and this is now an annual event, a Day of Hungarian Football. A day when outstanding work on behalf of the Hungarian game is rewarded and awards presented. Alas, just now the Magyars have nothing to shout about... Makes Terry Vennables' problems seem quite insignificant.





# AMONGST OUR SOUVENIRS By MIKE SKINNER

Tonight we focus our attention on two of the club's more recent acquisitions, the Barclays Performance of the Week awards acquired this month in 1991 and 1992.

The first came in a season not too dissimilar to the present one, with Swindon struggling to come to terms with the previous summer's demotion, following a fine 4-0 demolition of Bristol City at Ashton Gate on January 12th. City must have fancied their chances of completing the double with Town having won just two of their last 18 League games, but Swindon were worthy victors in a display reminiscent of their performance against Sunderland in the Play-Offs.

The visitors dominated for most of the game and, but for the display of City 'keeper Leaning, could have won by a greater margin. As it was Micky Hazard gave Swindon the lead after 38 minutes, pouncing on a lose ball following a shot from Steve Foley. Either side of the interval City pressed hard for an equaliser, but it was Steve White who next got his name on the score sheet from a cross by Tom Jones.

With City committed to attack two goals in the final minutes sealed the Town's third away win of the season. Duncan Shearer, who had earlier wasted some good chances, made amends from a Hazard cross, and White added to his tally after another good run from Jones who put in an outstanding performance.

Just over 12 months later, on January 25th 1992 the Town were again in action away from home, this time in the FA Cup to fellow Second Division side Cambridge United. The travelling support held out little hope against a side that had already done the double in the League, but the 3-0 win was a long overdue victory in the debate between the 'direct' and 'purist' styles of play.

Hero of the afternoon was captain Colin Calderwood who, despite suffering concussion early in the first half, was on hand to give the visitors the lead on the stroke of half time from a corner by Hazard. Five minutes into the second half it was 2-0. Paul Bodin floated a free kick into the area, Shearer ghosted in behind the defensive wall, and that was that.

Four minutes later Shearer wrapped it up with a superb volley from Martin Ling's through ball, leaving

the Town with the prospect of a fifth round tie for the first time since 1970, and England manager Graham Taylor had little option but to select this as the Performance of the Week.




