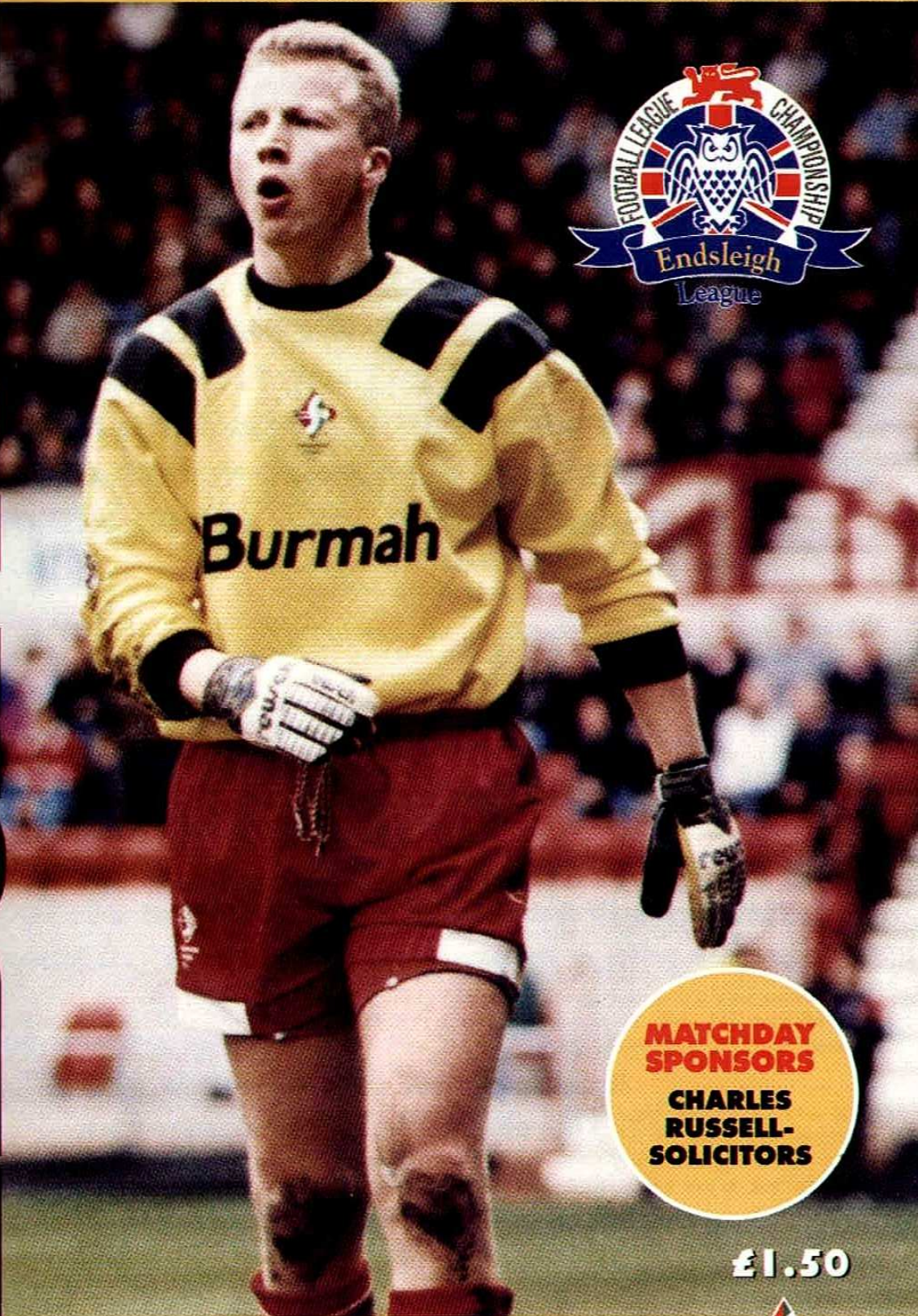

FROM THE TOP *With* STEVE McMAHON



Saturday's defeat at Watford in the FA Cup was very very disappointing. No one likes losing at any time but our performance at Vicarage Road was particularly disappointing in terms of the way we had played in previous games.

The lads let themselves down and know it.

I can accept being beaten. That is no problem providing the team has worked hard and shown full commitment. This was not the case on Saturday.

We had set our own standards in our performances against Millwall and Middlesbrough, and to some extent in the second - half against Marlow. This is the yardstick by which we will judge every game from now on in and if we fall below it then we can't expect to reap any rewards.

The surface on Saturday was extremely heavy and certainly was not a stage for pretty football. But both teams played on the same pitch and there can be no excuses for not matching the opposition in terms of commitment.

Only two of our players came out of the Watford defeat with a lot of credit. Young Edwin Murray, who was making his first start in the senior side, and goalkeeper Nicky Hammond.

You can sometimes get away with having two or three players on an off day but not six or seven. As I say, we let ourselves down. The lads know the standards they are capable of achieving. They have to reach them and produce them consistently week in week out.

They know that if they play like that again we will not only be out of both Cup competitions but we will be in the Second Division next season. They don't need telling how crucial tonight's match is against Bristol City, who like us are fighting for First Division survival.

This game might not have the hype and trimmings of a Liverpool or Manchester derby but the passion for success should be just as deep within the players. Derbies are derbies, whatever the context, and I know just how important this game is to our own fans.

I watched Bristol City on Sunday and they were very unlucky against Everton. They played exceptionally well and must have been bitterly disappointed by the final outcome. It is good to welcome Joe Jordan to the County Ground and of course we offer a special welcome to John Gorman on his first trip back here.

But points are the priority tonight. It is important we get back on the rails again right away.

When Joe Jordan was appointed manager, for the second time, at Ashton Gate in mid-November he inherited a dispirited outfit floundering in 22nd place in the relegation mire. But Joe has always been a man of action and after appraising his resources he quickly strengthened his fighting forces.

December proved a busy month. The cheque book was brandished and in came Martin Kuhl from Derby County and the reliable Gary Owers from Sunderland, as well as Richard Dryden from Birmingham City, to provide some quality in the middle of the park.

The former West Ham United defender, or midfielder, George Parris had previously been recruited from St Andrews, on loan, and immediately slipped into the right-back position, before being given a midfield role, and Mr Jordan went to White Hart Lane for Kevin Watson, signing the 21-year-old Tottenham Hotspur mid-fielder also on loan.

It takes time to turn a team around however and frustration got the better of the Bristol manager during their 2-1 home defeat by Grimsby Town, his outburst earning him a brush with the authorities for "continuing dissent".

A loss at Burnley was more than a little harsh after a tenacious performance from the City team who then lost at home 1-0 to Bolton Wanderers - Patterson's goal netted 29 seconds into the game!

Parris and Watson had been involved in these games but new boy Dryden was kept on the bench at Sunderland, where City lost 2-0. The manager claimed afterwards "I've got to make changes," as the club dropped closer to crisis. He recruited our previous manager John Gorman, as his assistant and a run of six successive defeats was halted when Wayne Allison scored two second-half goals to clinch a 3-1 win over Stoke City.

The revival was short lived however, Bristol losing 2-0 at Tranmere, then drawing 0-0 at home to Watford on a boggy pitch. It was also goalless with Stoke in the FA Cup and then at Portsmouth in the League.

Two extra time goals gave City a 3-1 win over Stoke in the replay to give them a home tie last Sunday with Everton.

WAYNE ALLISON - Striker. City's top shot with 20 goals last season he won acclaim from the fans who voted him Player of the Year. Started his career with Halifax Town in 1986 and scored three goals in 8 Fourth Division games in his first season, having made his debut in March 1987 against Wolves. 23 goals in 84 League games his final analysis. Signed for Watford in 1990 but made only 7 League appearances for them. Born: Huddersfield. 16-10-68.

IAN BAIRD - Striker. Strong bustling six-footer who cost £295,000 to sign from Hearts in July 1993. Served his apprenticeship with Southampton, making his League debut in a 2-0 win over Sunderland in February 1983, but never really established himself in the Saints side, scoring 5 goals in 22 First Division games in three years. Had loan periods with Cardiff and Newcastle before joining Leeds United in 1985. Scored 33 goals in 85 Second Division games, then in 1987 was sold to Portsmouth. One goal in 29 games was seen as failure and he surprisingly returned to Elland Road in 1988. Made a short stop with Middlesbrough before scoring 6 goals to help Hearts finish second in the Scottish Championship in 1991-92. Born: Rotherham 1-4-64.

JUNIOR BENT - Forward. Quicksilver winger who can on his day, be a real match winner. First hit the League stage in the colours of home-town Huddersfield Town against Middlesbrough in October 1987. City paid £30,000 to secure his transfer in March 1990. Stands just 5'5" tall. Born: Huddersfield 1-3-70.

MATT BRYANT - Central Defender. Local lad who joined City's Youth squad from school. Played three League games for Walsall on loan to gain experience. Proved a resilient reliable stopper but injuries restricted his progress last season. Born: 21-9-70.



RICHARD DRYDEN - Midfield. Signed from Birmingham City for just £175,000 in December 1994. Richard hails from Stroud in Gloucestershire and served his early days with Bristol Rovers. Made his League bow at Brentford in December 1986. Born: 14-6-69.

ROB EDWARDS - Midfield. Arrived at Ashton Gate from Carlisle United in March 1991. The deal cost £135,000. Versatile performer who featured at centre half and fullback before making his mark in midfield, where he was a regular last season. Capped by Wales at Youth, Under-21 and "B" levels. Born: Kendal, Cumbria 1-7-73.

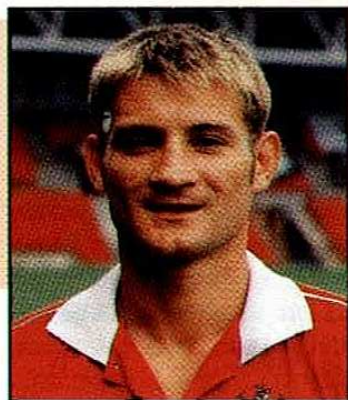

ROBERT FLECK - Striker. Bubbly Scottish International who has been given an opportunity to rekindle his career after two years in the wilderness at Stamford Bridge, during which time he has played just 7 games. Injury has not been the only reason for Fleck's absence from the Blues side following his £2.1 million signing from Norwich City in August 1992. Started his career with Partick Thistle, who spotted him playing for Possil YM, and he scored 29 goals in 15 Scottish League outings for Rangers before moving to Carrow Road. Netted 40 goals in 143 League games for the Canaries before his transfer to Chelsea. Joe Jordan signed him on loan from Chelsea this month. Played in the 1990 World Cup with Scotland. Born: Glasgow 11-8-65.

GARY OWERS - Midfield. Another December signing, Gary had spent all his previous career with Sunderland, who he joined as an apprentice. Was a regular until recently, following his League debut at Brentford in August 1987, can operate anywhere in midfield or in either fullback position. Played rightback in the 1992 FA Cup Final side beaten 2-0 by Liverpool at Wembley. Born: Newcastle 3-10-68.

RICHARD ROWE - Goalkeeper. Released by Southampton in the summer of 1994, Richard was invited to Ashton Gate for a trial and then awarded a one year contract as Keith Welch's understudy. Born: Plymouth 12-5-76.

MARK SHAIL - Central Defender. Hails from Sweden yet has represented England at semi-professional level. Was playing for Yeovil Town when City signed him for £45,000 in March 1993. Was given the captain's armband within six months of joining the club and had made 40 League appearances (2 goals) by the start of this season. Born: Sandviken, Sweden 15-10-66.

BRIAN TINNIION - Midfield. Signed from Bradford City in March 1993, for £180,000, Brian joined the apprentice ranks at Newcastle United in 1985. Made the first of his 32 League appearances for the Magpies at Everton in April 1987. Was allowed to join Bradford City and scored 22 goals in 145 League outings for the Yorkshire club before moving to Ashton Gate. Born: Stanley, Durham, 23-2-68.



KEITH WELCH - Goalkeeper. Has been at Ashton Gate since the summer of 1991 when City paid Rochdale £200,000 for his signature. Stands six-two and was an ever present in the 1993-94 campaign and is rated by Bristol as one of the best custodians outside the Premiership. Started his career in 1986 with his home town club Bolton Wanderers but made his League debut v Leyton Orient in February 1987, after signing for Rochdale. Became a fixture in the Scotland side making 205 League appearances. Born: 3-10-68.

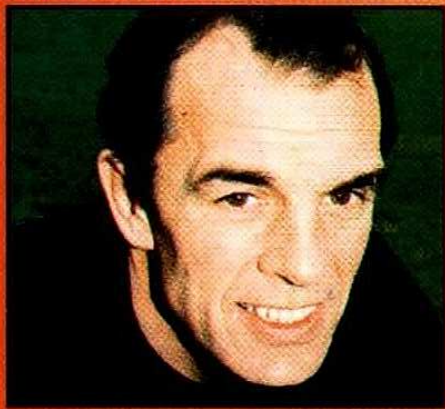

THE MAN IN CHARGE



Manager **Joe Jordan**

Big Joe Jordan was appointed manager, for the second time at Ashton Gate on the 15th November 1994. He took over from the axed Russell Osman following a dismal run.

Jordan will be best remembered as a swashbuckling centre-forward whose toothless grimace was enough to frighten the hardest defenders.

Started his playing career with Morton, scoring one goal in 10 Scottish League appearances before being snapped up by Leeds United in 1971. Led the line with vigour and registered 47 goals in 219 senior appearances - including 5 goals in 21 games in Europe - before heading for Old Trafford in 1977.

Joe claimed 37 goals in 109 First Division games for Manchester United before transferring to AC Milan in June 1981. Twelve goals in 52 Italian League games was a fair return in those ultra-defensive days in Italian football and a short stop off with Verona (1 goal in 12 appearances) on his way back to the UK added to his experience.

Joined up with Southampton where he scored another 12 goals in 48 League games before switching to Bristol City in February in 1987. Exactly a year later he was elevated to player-manager in succession to another former Leeds favourite, Terry Cooper, and he took City to the Play-Off Final only to be beaten by Walsall in a replay.

The following season Joe guided City to the semi-final of the Littlewoods Cup, they lost to Nottingham Forest in extra-time- and then in 1990 he led them to promotion from Division Three. In September 1990 he left Ashton Gate to take over at Hearts and took the Scottish Premier League side into Europe.

At the end of his contract he had spells as assistant manager at Celtic and then as manager of Stoke City which ended in the sack earlier this season.

Born: Carlisle 15-12-51.

UNDER THE SPOTLIGHT

Midfielder **Martin Kuhl**

Bristol City is Martin's sixth League Club. Born at Frimley on the 10th January 1965, he joined Birmingham City from school as an apprentice and emerged through the youth ranks to make his Football League debut in March 1983 at the Hawthorns, where Birmingham City lost 2-0 to West Bromwich Albion.

It was the season of 1983-84 that saw Martin establish himself in the Blues first-team. He became a firm favourite in midfield where his tigerish tackling and mature vision were already coming to the fore.

Martin had made 111 League appearances (five goals), when midway through the 1986-87 season Sheffield United pounced. Martin went to Bramall Lane in exchange for Martin Wigley who joined Birmingham. It wasn't long before Martin's leadership qualities were recognised and he was installed as Sheffield United's captain. He made only 38 League appearances for the Blades however, (4 goals) before being traded again, in mid-February 1988, this time for £40,000 and Terry Agana and Peter Hutchison.

Watford gave Kuhl only four League outings and in September 1988 he transferred to Portsmouth for £125,000. At Fratton Park he was to again assume the role of skipper and at the end of the 1990-91 season was voted Player of the Year.

Proved a regular scorer with Pompey, netting 10 goals in 1989-90 and 13 the following season to finish his career with the club with stats of 23 goals in 157 League games.

Was not able to follow this trend at Derby County where he played more of a holding role and scored just once in 68 League outings for the Rams, his record this season being 9 appearances in the First Division; 1 in the Coca-Cola Cup and 1 in the Anglo Italian Cup.

City paid £330,000 for his transfer in December 1994.





ENDSLEIGH LEAGUE

PREVIEW

Tonight's game with Bristol City has been brought forward from later this month because of our Coca-Cola Cup semi-final commitment with Bolton Wanderers.

Cup fixtures and a virtual postponement of the programme the week prior, due to inclement weather conditions has left the First Division cast to the shadows of late.

There were two games on Saturday, re-arranged as the participants had been eliminated from the FA Cup, and both were of great significance. League leaders Middlesbrough, who are having a lean spell since losing here, played hosts to Barnsley while Bolton Wanderers - in a rich vein of form at the moment - took on Sheffield United.

Boro certainly needed a win to maintain poll position for coming up next Saturday they take on rampant Reading at Ayresome Park. Reading were one of the lucky ones to gain a win on January 21, their 2-1 victory at Burnley being their seventh in the League away from home.

Only one other club can match this. Do you know which it is? You need look no further than David Pleat's Hatters. Yes, Luton Town boast seven wins and four draws from 14 away games thus far. The bad news for them is that they are home to Oldham Athletic this coming Saturday and at Kenilworth Road they have lost seven and won but three.

Oldham on the other hand are climbing up towards the Play-Off positions after a disappointing start to the season and could be good enough to force a draw.

It is at the bottom where the interest lies at the moment. Notts County, now under the direction of Howard Kendall pulled off a sensational 2-1 win at Sunderland last time out in the League, but they looked pretty ordinary in a 0-0 draw at home to Stoke City in the first-leg of the Anglo Italian Cup semi-final last week. Lou Macari's boys were firm favourites for the second-leg last night which determined who faces Ascoli in the Wembley Final.

Kendall has already used his charm to recruit Steve Nicol from Liverpool but it will take much more than

that to upset Tranmere Rovers at Prenton Park on Saturday.

There is a crucial fixture at Turf Moor too and we will be looking for a second away win of the season against Burnley, who have slipped badly of late. That 2-1 defeat by Reading was their fourth home defeat of the season.

Port Vale are another side who have suffered lately. Like us their away form is poor - they have picked up one more point than us - but must still have hopes at Roker Park where Sunderland have lost four and drawn eight. Perhaps draw number nine is on the cards here.

Portsmouth are not the side they used to be but they could be capable of capitalising on Stoke City's uncertain home form. Former Town striker Keith Scott has missed the Potters Anglo Italian Cup ties with Notts County as he is Cup-tied but should be back in the side on Saturday.

Two goals from McGinlay and one from McAteer helped Bolton thrash Charlton 5-1. The Wanderers have now scored 44 goals in 28 League games and only one First Division outfit can beat that - Wolverhampton Wanderers.

The two clash at Burnden Park in Saturday's First Division match of the day. Bolton have conceded fewer goals than Wolves, a classic format for a share of the spoils perhaps.

Tonight's visitors Bristol City will be looking to cash in on home advantage against Barnsley while Watford, our opponents in the FA Cup last Saturday could be good for a point.

Derby County vs Sheffield United and Millwall vs Grimsby Town are interesting fixtures. The Lions have been embroiled in high profile Cup ties with Arsenal and then Chelsea, Grimsby could bring them down to earth with a jolt.

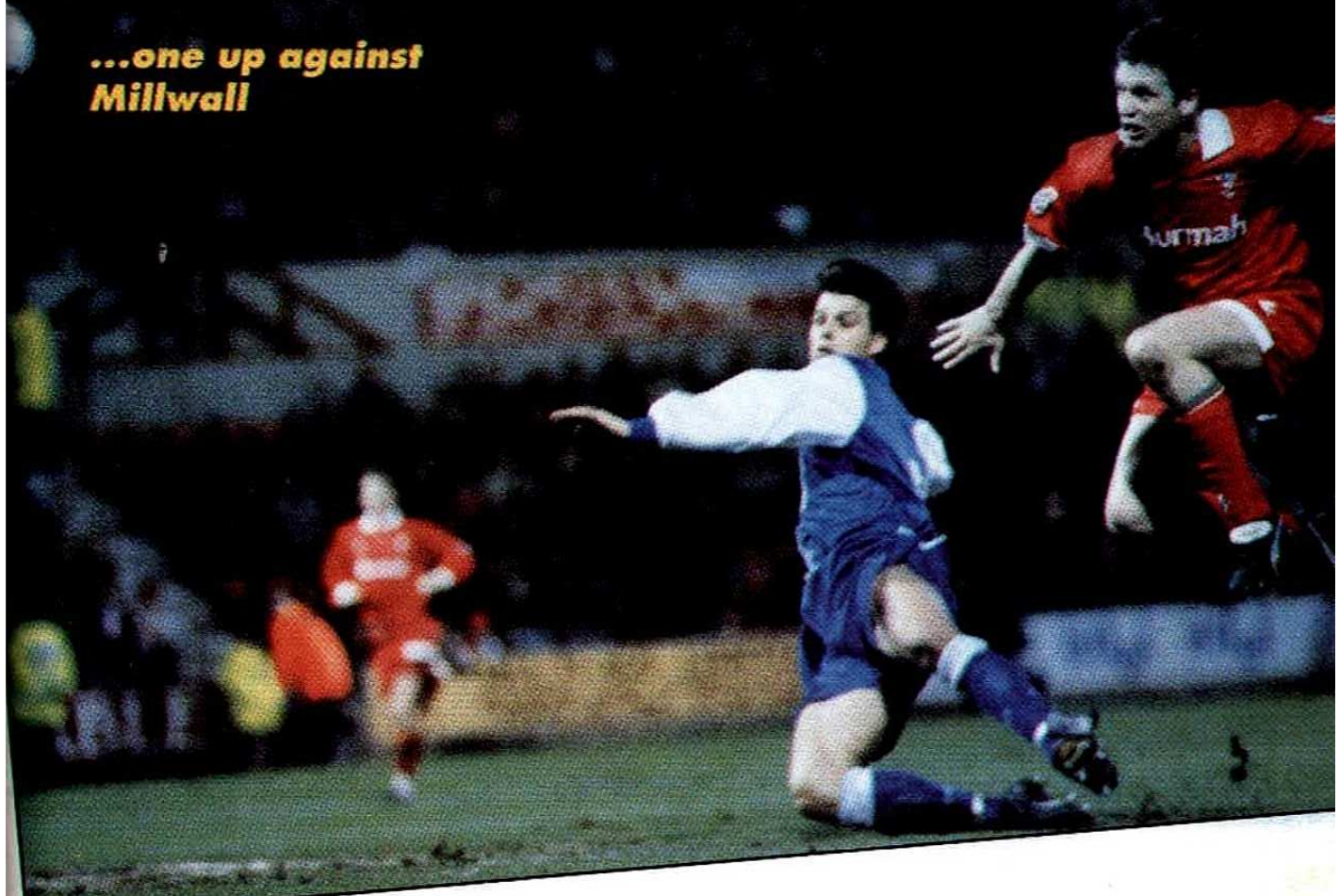

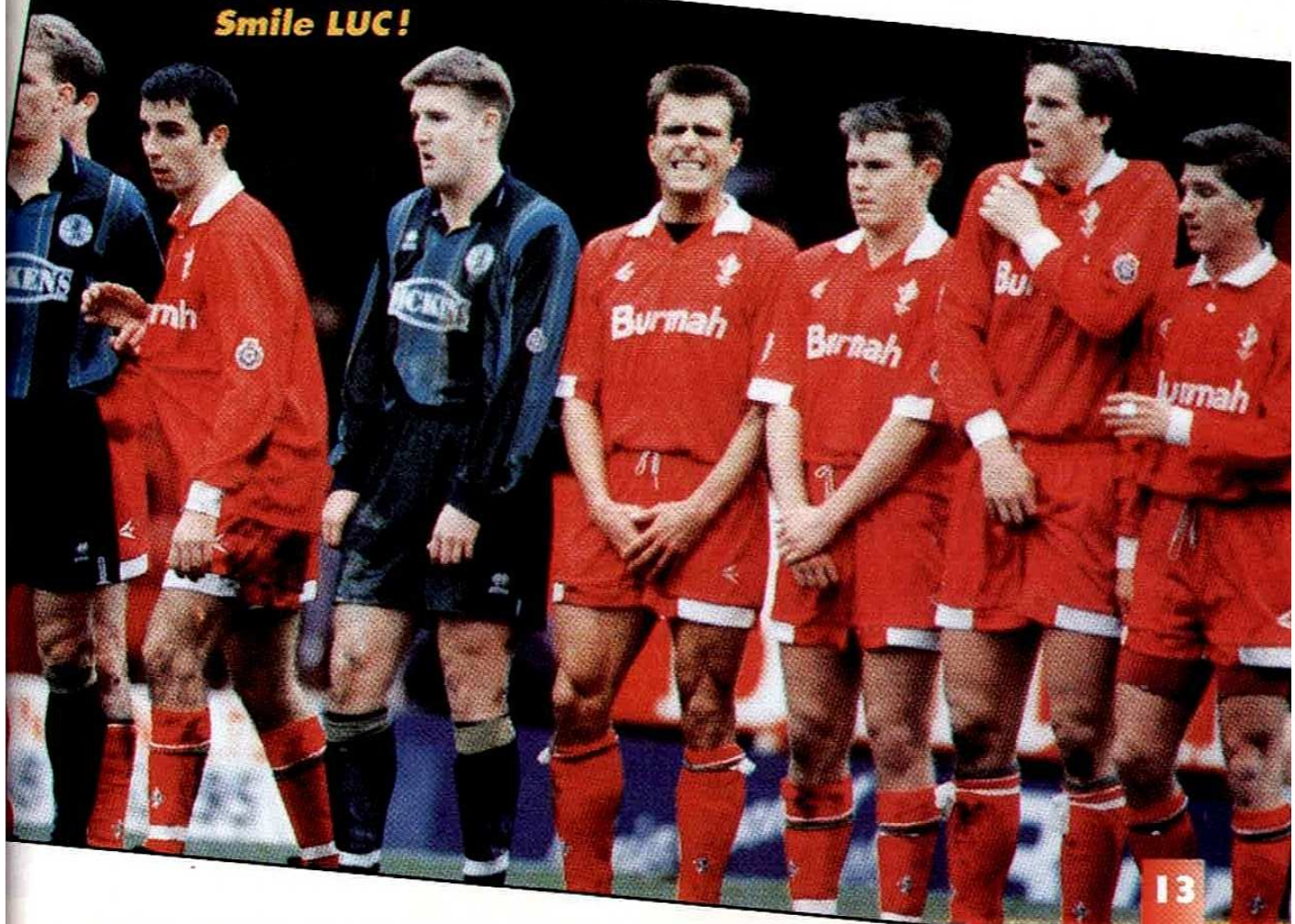

Later this month we have our Half Term Funweek in the week commencing 20 February.

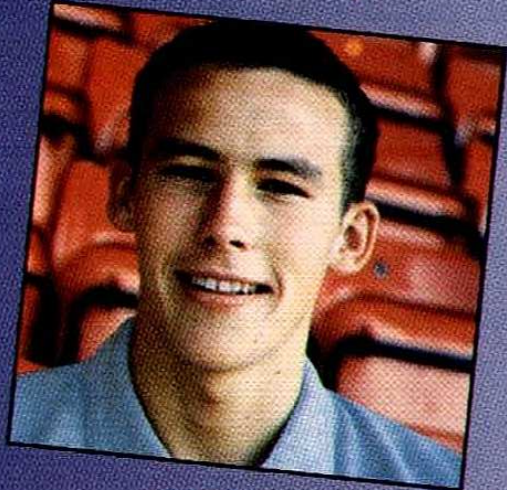

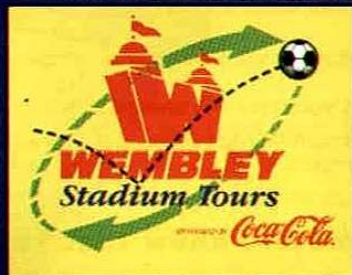

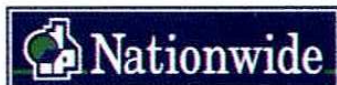

TOWN TALK

Tonight Peter Thorne talks to Colin Benson.

Q. You hail from Manchester so how did you come to be involved with Blackburn Rovers?

A. Well, originally I was with Manchester City as a youngster, then I got a nasty injury and had a bad illness which combined kept me out for over a year and I never went back to City.

When I was fit again I wrote to Blackburn because I thought I would have a better chance there, I was given a go, did well and was signed as an apprentice.

Q. Always as a forward?

A. Yes always as a forward. I was an England Schoolboy trialist and got through to the last twenty I think it was. Then tore two hamstrings and caught viral meningitis and that knocked me out of the game for a long time.

Q. How did you find Blackburn?

A. Great, They replied to my letter straight away and invited me down and I did really well. I was there five years in all and really learned a lot.

Q. What about your development?

A. Obviously it got better following the arrival of Kenny Dalglish and the introduction of all the better players like Shearer and Sutton. You can watch them in training and it brings a lot out of yourself. You can see what they are doing and try and do the same things, maybe not quite as well but you got better.

Q. Shearer and Sutton are really awesome aren't they. But are they really as good as their reputations suggest?

A. I think so, yes. There is a lot of pressure on someone like Sutton who is only a 21 year-old and had come for £5-million and I wasn't sure how he would take it. But he has done brilliantly hasn't he.

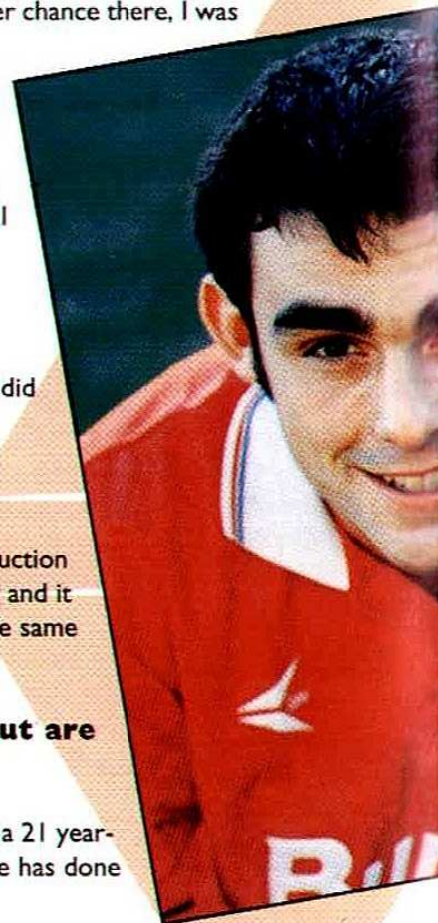
But to be honest if you get in that team anyway, and you have got something about you, you will always score goals. They create so many chances. But obviously Alan and Chris have got a good understanding together and in training it is good to watch. Something must rub off on us.

Q. Isn't it a little frustrating though to be in their shadows and know that your chances of taking their shirts are minimal?

A. It is even worse than that, so strong is the Blackburn squad. After Shearer and Sutton there are people like Mike Newell and Kevin Gallacher, who are both fit again waiting their turn.

I was the youngest one of the lot and as they cost big money and I came up through the ranks I tended to get pushed back all the time. The management is obliged to play them because they paid so much money for them.

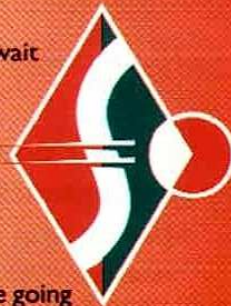
Sometimes when you know you are doing well and you feel you should be getting a shot you feel put back. They tell



you that you should be in but there is nothing they can do as the squad is that big you have to wait your chance.

In the end it just got too much and I had to get away. I saw no future for myself at Ewood Park. They have so much money that if they are really desperate to make changes they just go and buy somebody. All us young lads were stuck together all the time. It is so annoying it is untrue.

When Jack Walker came there was a big buzz right through the club. We all thought great we are going to go somewhere now. Then you gradually realise that his millions are of no help at all to the young players. It is ever so exciting for the club but as to furthering your own career it is a non starter.



Q. What is Dalglish like?

A. Brilliant. At first it was a bit hard because he is such a perfectionist. Like in training he is brilliant and he thinks the rest of us should be like that. But it is good in a way because you have to work that much harder. You know you are going to get slaughtered if you do something wrong, especially if you are on his side.

But he has got that much class about him and obviously knows what he is on about and he helps a lot of players in a way. I don't think Shearer or Sutton would have done so well if it wasn't for the coaching at Blackburn. Ray Harford is brilliant too. In fact all the coaching staff there are marvellous.

Q. What was the attraction of Swindon?

A. I don't know really. It has always been a name that is important to me. When I got into the first team squad for the first time we were travelling to Swindon. That was the season before last. I didn't make the bench but it was an important step for me and an exciting experience.

There were a few other clubs in for me including Southampton but I just wanted to wait. Southampton wanted me down there on a week's trial and the gaffer was not too keen. Then Swindon came up and that was brilliant.

Q. So what are your first impressions?

A. It is brilliant, I am thoroughly enjoying it. The lads are great and I really enjoy the training. Everything is all right and of course it is not too far from home in Manchester - and that helps. I am looking for some digs at the moment.

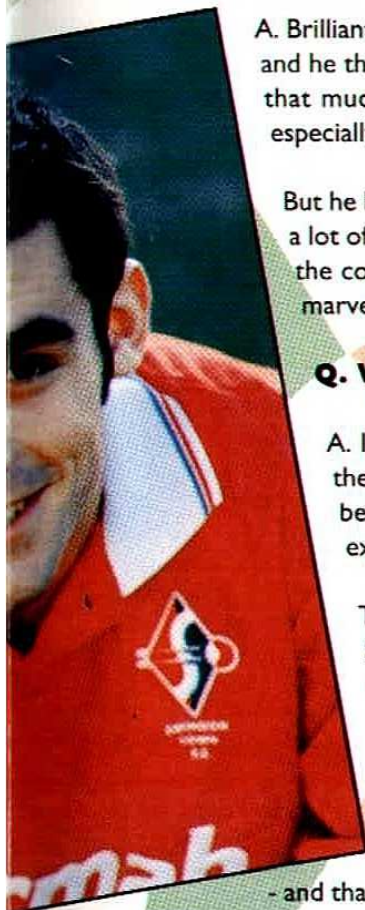
Q. How about Steve McMahon?

A. Brilliant. He is a good laugh. Seems relaxed in training and that is a good thing. Before Kenny Dalglish came to Blackburn some of the managers we had used to get really worked up in training and a bit worried and their tenseness was transmitted to us, it is an important aspect because what happens on the training field becomes part of your game. Here it is nice and relaxed and fun.

Q. Disappointed no doubt that your debut was rained off at Millwall?

A. If it was going to be my debut. I don't know, we had not been told the team. But I must admit when we got to the ground I was getting pretty excited but my time will come.

My only game for Blackburn was for 25-minutes in the Charity Shield at Wembley against Manchester United. It was the best game of my life up to now, I wish I had been on longer. I should have played, and should have started the game.

The FA should be charged with bringing the game into disrepute. That was the observation made by one of my sons after seeing the quite ludicrous sending off of Alvin Martin in the West Ham United v Sheffield Wednesday Premiership game at Upton Park. And I wouldn't disagree.

Never has the rift between managers, players, and officials been so great as it is now. Yet week after week as controversy rages and the game is made a laughing stock by over zealous officials - some of whom bask in the attention awarded them - the game's governing body maintains a head in the sand attitude and do precisely nothing.

To be honest, if I had paid £20 for a ticket to see that Hammers game against Sheffield Wednesday then I would be thinking of reporting the Football Association to the Department of Trade. The referee's total incompetence ruined what could have been a great game of football. Certainly the paying customer does not fork out all that money to see a team reduced to ten men only ten minutes into the game because a player loses his footing and brings an opponent down in his opponents half!

This incident came hot on the heels of a controversial decision at Old Trafford which ruled out what seemed like a legitimate equaliser for Blackburn Rovers... United have now taken six points from their closest rivals in the Championship chase courtesy of crass bad officiating and it is time that referees and linesmen were held accountable for their actions. Everyone else is.

It has been bad in the First Division this season as well though I must reflect that on average the referees at this level seem to be displaying more common-sense than the supposed elite in the Premiership.

Let's get it straight. We are talking about referees who become drama queens rather than unobstructive figures maintaining quiet control. The directives issued last summer on the interpretation of the laws of the game are one thing, and though there is a body of opinion that feels they are far too stringent that is not what I am beefing about here.

The incidents that have hit the headlines have caused anger not because of the new directives but because they were BAD decisions in the first place. Wrong judgements of crucial incidents that have had a direct bearing on the eventual results.

There is a lot of talk about making referees full-time professionals. As to whether that would make them more competent is questionable. It would certainly

allow them more time to work on physical fitness but as to decision making I don't know.

Attitude is something that needs to be worked on. There is too much of them and us about it all in my opinion. There are those referee's who go onto the field believing that the players are there to con them and that whatever they do is devious. There are others who show more understanding of players and their motives.

Perhaps the best solution would be to groom ex-players. How about someone like Brian Kilcline taking up the whistle when he hangs up his boots? Nobody would argue with "Killer" surely.

Talking of common sense our delegation at Lytham St Annes last Wednesday won the day for football when they persuaded a Football League tribunal to boot-out Norwich City's outrageous demands of £900,000 for the transfer of Ian Culverhouse.

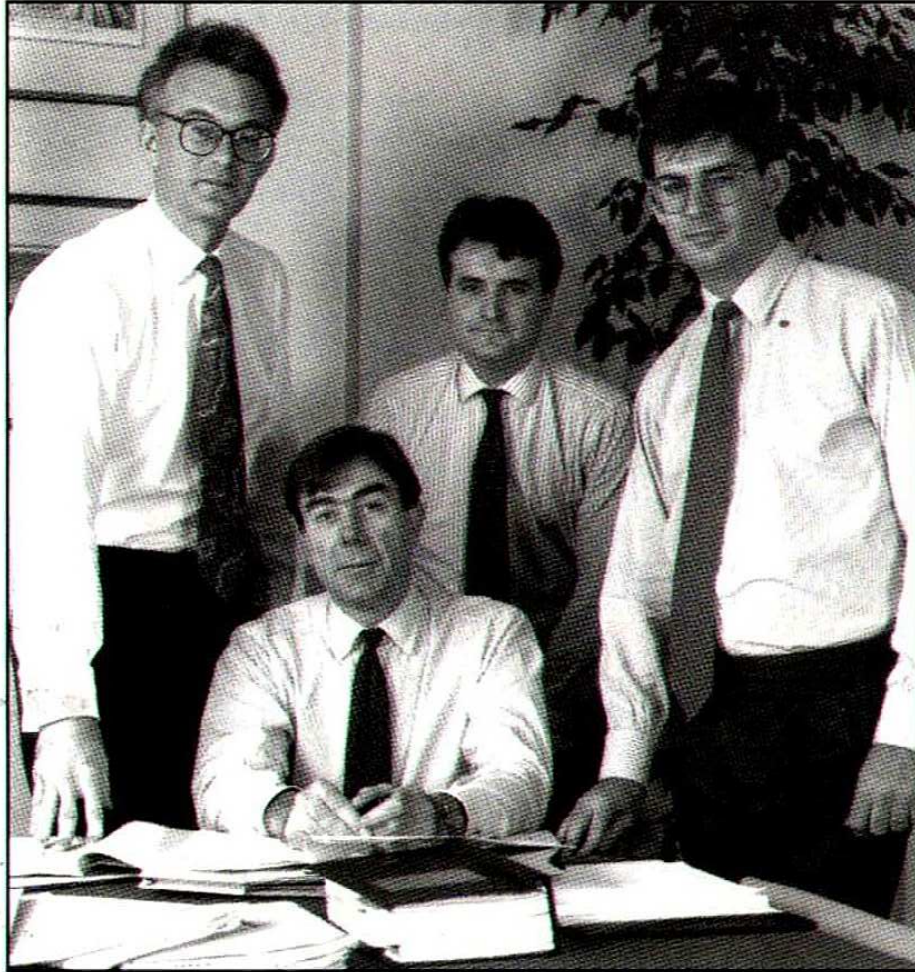
Thankfully, Town were told to pay a more realistic figure of £250,000 for the defender the Canaries had put out to seed all season because he refused to sign a new contract at the terms offered by Norwich.

Now that Ian has changed his feathers he is playing as well as ever at the heart of the Town defence.

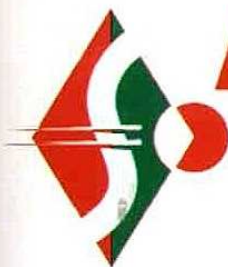

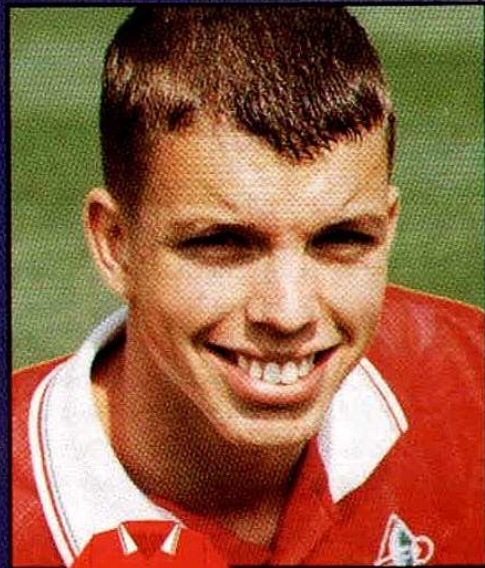

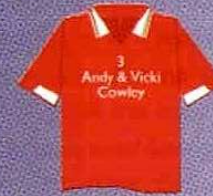

WHERE ARE THEY NOW?

Howard Pritchard

In the 1940's Maurice Owen scored in three successive Town visits to Ashton Gate. Ernie Hunt achieved the same feat in the 1960's. And in the 1980's Howard Pritchard managed it - with a difference. He had changed Clubs before completing his 'hat-trick'!

Howard grew up in South Wales, representing both Cardiff and Glamorgan Boys, before being offered an apprenticeship at Ashton Gate. Exciting times were just around the corner for City and by the time Howard had signed pro forms, in August 1976, they had gained promotion to the old First Division.

An injury to Chris Garland at the start of the 1978/79 season gave Howard his debut in the top flight, against Aston Villa, but he had to wait sixteen months before getting another opportunity, when Villa were again the visitors. Howard grabbed his first senior goals in a 6-2 FA Cup win over Derby and made 15 First Division appearances. But City suffered relegation at the end of the season.

With only seven wins in 1980/81, City slipped straight through to the Third Division. And Howard did not feature in the plans of Bob Houghton - who had taken over from Alan Dicks - so he was soon on his way down the M4 to Swindon.

After a couple of appearances in the number twelve shirt, Howard was in the Town's starting line-up for the first time in a FA Cup tie against Taunton Town - and scored both goals in a 2-1 victory. The Cup seemed to bring out the best in Howard and while at the County Ground he netted eight goals in eight games in that competition -

including a hat-trick in a 7-0 win over Aldershot.

Unfortunately, his only League goal was in a 3-0 win at Ashton Gate at Easter - Swindon's first there for over 30 years. But it did neither club any favours as as both were relegated to the Fourth Division. Howard scored in both encounters with City in 1982/83, but despite netting four goals in eight games following Ken Beamish's appointment as manager, he was allowed to go back to Ashton Gate on a free transfer.

It proved a good move. Howard was ever-present and bagged 13 goals as City won promotion. He stayed there two further seasons, scoring his last goal for the club in a Freight Rover Trophy Final against Bolton at Wembley in 1986.

Howard then left the South West, signing for Gillingham, who were to be great rivals to both City and Swindon in the Third Division promotion race in the season that followed. He knocked in 14 goals as the Kent club took the Town to a Play-Off replay before finally conceding defeat.

In the summer of 1988, Howard had the chance to join Wolves, newly promoted to the Third

Division, but instead joined former City colleague Gerry Sweeney who was assistant manager at Walsall, just promoted to the Second. Undefeated in their first five starts, the Saddlers' season then fell apart and they were never out of the bottom two.

Howard went back to Kent in October 1989, signing for his former Gills boss Keith Peacock at Maidstone. But just over a year later, he returned to more familiar surroundings, assisting Clive Whitehead at Yeovil Town - where he also took on the job of part-time fireman! Short spells followed at Yate and Nailsea Town but for the past fifteen months, Howard, now 36, has been channelling most of his energy into running his own business as a driving instructor.

CHARLTON ATHLETIC have to date used an amazing thirty seven players in their Reserve games this season.

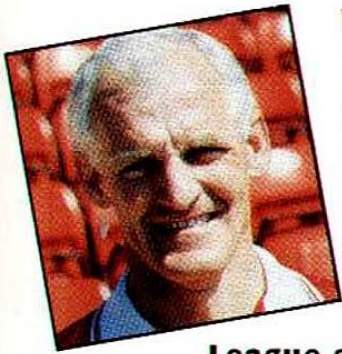

That aside the cost factor is only part of our promotion to encourage Mums and Dads to bring along the young ones - our fans of the future.

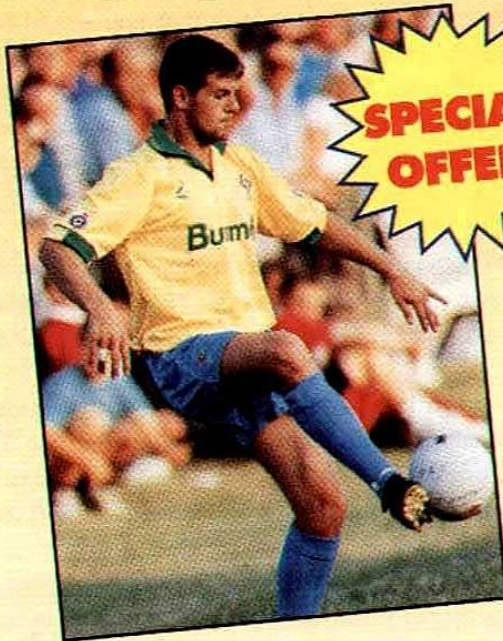
There is a whole programme of concessions and various entertainment lined up for the Town End Family Enclosure which is what we intend to adopt for the rest of this season and indeed for next season also.

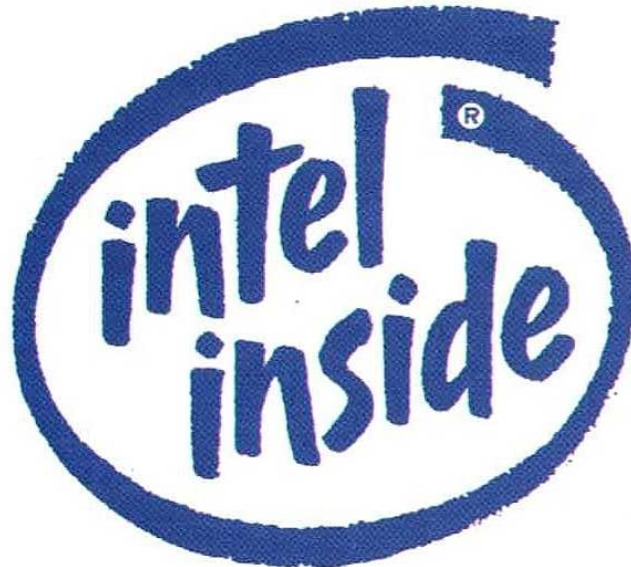
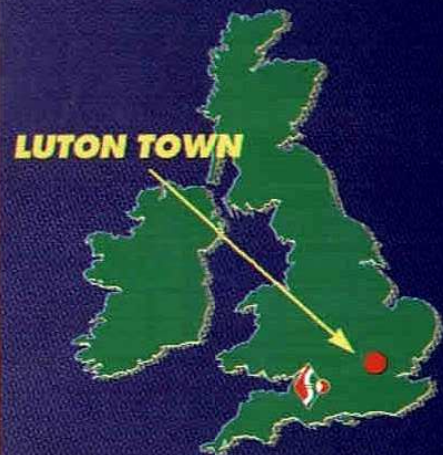
