could be happy with a draw, skipper Peter Shirtliff setting up Bully's goal after John Aldridge had put Tranmere ahead on 35 minutes.


"The Premiership is a big prize and one we have to go out fighting for it now," says Peter.

The injured defender is back at Molineux to continue his programme of rehabilitation after his knee operation in Holland

John is cautious about his progress, preferring not to say exactly what his plans and expectations are. But he is less reticent when voicing his frustration at a time when he had hoped to be playing a part in Wolves' promotion battle.

"It was a really bad time for me to be injured just as we were coming to the end of the season and the time you are fighting to win prizes," he says.

"Every week I was playing for Wolves I was getting better and I thought I had played great in my last game. I feel very frustrated by what has happened."

John is no stranger to injury. The Dutch international has suffered many knocks before - one to his right knee kept him out of action for 18 months.

The experiences have taught him all about the patience and hard work needed to fight your way back to fitness. John preferred that fight to begin back in his home country.

"It was better for me to go back to Holland because I could explain better to people there how my knee felt inside. It is important that you can say exactly how it feels and I could do that better talking in my own lanquage.

"Now my knee is getting better I have come back to Wolves and I am working hard, jogging and doing exercises to stabilise my knee.

"It still hurts, but if you have an injury then you are going to have pain. Every day I feel a little bit better."

The injury was a double blow for John. Not only was he just finding his best form for Wolves when he was stretchered off, in the match against Sunderland, but he had just settled his family into life in Wolverhampton.

"It was very strange," says John. "I had just got a house for my family and they had come to England to be with methen I had to go back to Holland and I was the one on the phone calling them in Wolverhampton.

"It was lucky that the boys had a three week holiday from school so they were able to come back home and we could all be together. We were planning to go back to Holland during the summer break but I will have to wait to see what happens now."

During the weeks away from Molineux, John managed to keep up-to-date with the progress of the team.


"I kept in touch with what was happening at Wolves by watching teletext, but it is not the same as being here," he says.

I am well aware that the great majority of people who attend football games are good and decent.



to make a quick return to the top flight. But, after getting off to a good start this term, they went into a run of 14 League games without a win and that plunged them into a relegation situation in which they have been involved for the remainder of the season.

It was during that first poor run that the club decided to dispense

with the services of manager John Gorman. Steve McMahon, the former England midfielder, was signed from Manchester City and took over as player-manager at the end of November.

Yet, in spite of some new signings, results did not show a marked improvement and Town's fate was sealed last weekend at the end of a run of three consecutive defeats.

McMahon signed striker Thorne from Blackburn for £200,000 in January and he made a splendid start, scoring eight times in his first 11 full games for the club. That included a hat-trick in their 5-2 win at West Bromwich.

With Thorne scoring so well, it was decided to sell top scorer Jan Aage Fjortoft to Middlesbrough for £1.3 million shortly before last month's transfer deadline. Norwegian international had scored 26 times.

Sadly, Thorne has not been the same without Fjortoft alongside him and he has not since added to his goals tally.

Ty Gooden, who had earlier been playing in midfield, has been partnering Thorne in the Swindon attack.


Some of the Fjortoft fee was used to re-invest in left-back Jason Drysdale. signed from Newcastle for £340,000.


The left-back position had posed something of a problem since Paul Bodin was injured. Ed Murray played here for a while. then Kevin Horlock was switched from midfield. Drysdale played only one then Mark game. Robinson was switched from right-back.

Last week Mark Viveash, who had been playing in central defence, reverted to his old position on the left side of defence.

In spite of Swindon's struggles, Horlock's form has not suffered and he has recently been included in the Northern Ireland squad.

Horlock had earlier looked settled in one of the two central midfield positions, the other being occupied for much of the season by Joey Beauchamp.





Martin Ling, playermanager McMahon, Horlock and Luc Nijholt are the other contenders for midfield places.

Viveash and Shaun Taylor had been filling the centre-back positions but, with Viveash switching to the left, Andy Thomson was recalled here last weekend. Andrew Todd has been filling the right-back spot.

The versatile Wayne O'Sullivan has played both in defence and midfield as McMahon has been ringing the changes in a bid to find a winning team.

Nicky Hammond and Fraser Digby remain in fierce competition for the goalkeeper's jersey, Digby having been in favour for the past few weeks.

Swindon have won three away games in the League - at Notts. County (1-0), Burnley (2-1) and West Brom (5-2). They drew at Port Vale (2-2), Stoke (0-0), Oldham (1-1), Grimsby (1-1)Sheffield United (2-2) but were beaten at Tranmere (2-3), Charlton (0-1), Barnsley (1-2), Portsmouth (3-4), Middlesbrough (1-3), Bolton (0-3), Bristol City(2-3), Southend (0-2), Luton (0-3), Millwall (1-3), Watford (0-2), Derby (1-3), Reading (0-3) and Sunderland (0-1).

Whilst they have been struggling in the League, Swindon made a bold bid for a place in the Coca Cola Cup Final at Wembley. After leading Bolton by 2-1 from their home-leg in the semifinal, Swindon battled well in the return game but were ultimately beaten on aggregate by a goal two minutes from the end.

Though they achieved a 2-0 home win over non-League Marlow in the third round of the FA Cup, Town went out at Watford (0-1) at the next stage.

As they bid farewell to First Division football at Molineux today, manager McMahon is preparing for a major rebuilding job at The County Ground.

It is eight years since Swindon last played at third-league level and the intervening years saw them enjoy some of the most dramatic moments of their history. They won the old Second Division play-offs in 1990 and were preparing for their first taste of football at top level.

But they were denied that privilege after being found guilty of financial irregularities. They battled on with character and in 1993 they defeated Leicester 4-3 at Wembley in the play-off final and this time they were duly promoted to the Premiership.


Sadly, the Robins found themselves out of their depth, suffering immediate relegation.

The club was founded in 1881 and gained election to the Football League in 1920. They spent most of their early life the old Third Division and it was as a Third Division club that they so sensationally defeated Arsenal 3-1 in the League Cup Final at Wembley in 1969.

It was not until 1963 that Swindon first rose above the old Third Division level and they later dropped all the way down into Division Four before working themselves from the basement to the very top.

Who's the Boss

Steve McMahon, who took over as Swindon's player-manager in November, found himself deeply involved with a double challenge - he was hoping to guide his team through to a Wembley cup final whilst, even more importantly, he was faced with the task of trying to preserve Swindon's First Division status.

Town lost their Coca Cola Cup semi-final against Bolton and he did not have time to halt the club's

slide towards relegation.

But he sees his task at The County Ground as a two to three year rebuilding job. "I am trying to change the club's style of play," he says "We have had this 'nice guy' image and it has got us nowhere.

"I am looking for more aggression. I shall not complain if my players pick up a few yellow cards. We have got to be harder to beat. In the past Swindon have played some good football but earned a reputation for being a bit of a soft touch.

"I want to change all that."

McMahon's distinguished playing career embraced both Merseyside clubs and a run of 17 games in the England team.

He joined Everton whilst still at school, turning professional in 1979. Soon after making his senior debut the following year, he was in the England under-21 side, winning six caps at that level.

He enjoyed three full seasons in the Everton side before moving on to Aston Villa, who signed him for £300,000 in 1983. He remained with them for just over two years before returning to Merseyside with Liverpool. Whilst at Anfield he won three League Championship medals, played in two FA Cup Finals and one League Cup Final and collected all of his full England caps.

He moved on to Manchester City for £895,000 in December 1991, remaining with them until taking up his present post.

Throughout his career, McMahon has been associated with attack-minded teams so he has naturally encouraged his Swindon men to continue with their pleasing style of play.

The fight is over

The last two years have not been good for Swindon Town. The Robins come to Molineux today knowing their time has run out in the First Division.

Last week's defeat at Portsmouth condemned Steve McMahon's team to Second Division football next season and the future of the club has been thrown into doubt after successive years of relegation.

One man who has seen all the highs and lows in recent years has been captain Shaun Taylor, who now looks set to return to the lower leagues after starting his career in at Exeter.

"We know that we have let ourselves down this year," admitted the 32 year old defender. "When we have played against the top sides we have performed well and got decent wins along the way.

"We have had to cope with injuries and suspensions as well as the fact that a new manager has come to the club half-way through the season. This has been difficult for everyone. We also lost our star striker Jan Fjortoft with just a few weeks of the season left, which was a blow.

"It seems that you believe you are too good to go down, but no-one should have that attitude, as you will pay for it in the end. We all expected to be at the other end of the table back in August when the campaign began, but it has all gone wrong and who knows what the

future holds now.

"People will say that we have never recovered from the blow of losing Glenn Hoddle to Chelsea a couple of years ago, but that was just one of those things and he will look at us now and believe that he made the right decision.

"In the end we were not good enough this season and there is not a lot more you can say."

There is a strong chance of a clear-out at the County Ground this summer, with Taylor keen to stay if required in the bid for a quick return to the First Division next season. year 2 Manchester United and Blackburn were the visitors to Swindon. Next season Bradford and Peterborough will be treading the same turf.

But the club captain believes his side will need no motivation today in their last Division One game for at least a year.

"It should be a big crowd and we will want to go out with a bang," continued Taylor. "We know we can beat Wolves as we did it at the start of the season at our place. It will also give the lads a chance to prove that they can live with the big clubs. A good result would also give our fans hope for next season.

"Wolves should have guaranteed their place in the play-offs and will be looking forward to finishing the season at Wembley in the finals which is a great day as we know from our success there in 1993.

"The players at Swindon should be playing for their careers, as the manager has already stated that players will have to leave in a bid to bring fresh blood in.

"Personally, I am under a two year contract and am happy to stay if that is acceptable


to everyone. No one likes playing in the lower leagues, but we need to bounce back straight away. The manager will be tested next season to see if we can come straight back.

"I have had plenty of highs at the club since I joined in 1991, as well as plenty of lows. Hopefully, we will leave the first division on a high today."

So Wolves cannot expect and easy ride from doomed Swindon this afternoon. They have a point to prove and this is their chance to make it.

Swindon's last game in the Premiership ended in a 0-5 home defeat by Leeds.

Manchester United, who had already won the Premiership Championship, were held to a goalless draw by Coventry at Old Trafford.

Plymouth Argyle equalled a club record when winning 8-1 away to Hartlepool in Division Two.

5 YEARS AGO:

Our season ended on a sad note with our heaviest defeat of the campaign (0-4) at West Ham.

Swindon, needing a draw to be absolutely sure of qualifying for the Second Division play-offs, achieved just that with a 1-1 result at Stoke. Duncan Shearer scored their goal.

Liverpool, having already been crowned Champions, celebrated with a 6-1 win at Coventry. John Barnes scored three of their goals.

Leeds needed to win their final game at Bournemouth to be sure of winning promotion to the First Division. A goal from Lee Chapman gave them the result they needed.

10 YEARS AGO:

We made a desperate late bid to escape relegation from the Second Division with a 2-1 win over Huddersfield at Molineux. Alan Ainscow and Derek Ryan got the goals but, as Middlesbrough took a point from a goalless game with Birmingham, we were doomed to go down.

In spite of goals from Leigh Barnard, Peter Coyne (penalty), Colin Gordon and Lee Dixon (own goal), Swindon were held at home to a 4-4 draw by Chester in Division Four.

Runaway League Champions Everton achieved a 2-0 home win over Q.P.R.

Kevin Wilson contributed a hat-trick in Ipswich's 5-1 home win over relegated Stoke.

20 YEARS AGO:

John Richards gave us a seventh minute lead against Leeds at Molineux but a late equaliser from Frank Gray made the final score 1-1.

Two goals from Peter Bastoe gave Swindon a 2-1 victory at Wrexham to take them level on points with third-placed Charlton in Division Three. But Charlton had a better goal-average and, in any case, had one more game to play which they won to make absolutely sure of promotion.

League Champions Derby completed their season with a goalless home draw against bottom club Carlisle.

Blackburn won 4-1 at Port Vale in Division Three.

Games mentioned here were played on the neares weekend match closest to today's date When he was transferred from Wolves to Arsenal in August 1938. Bryn Jones became the costliest footballer in Britain - his move costing The Gunners a cool £14,000, a fortune in those prewar days. His move provoked a storm of protest from Molineux fans who had taken the little Welshman to their hearts in his five year association with the club.

Born in Penyard, near Merthyr Tydfil in 1912, he played local football and, after a spell working in the pits, failed to impress in a trial at Southend in 1931. He moved over to Ireland for a season with Robbie Dennison's former club Glenavon, before returning to his home land to play for Aberaman.

It was from the non-League Welsh club that Jones moved to Molineux in November 1933. He made his debut in a 2-1 win at Goodison Park on the 18th of that month, and scored in his second game in a 3-1 defeat at Derby two weeks later.

In all, he made 177 League and FA Cup appearances for Wolves scoring 57 goals. But his superb control of a football created countless other goals for his team mates. He was capped

ed Breakers



17 times by Wales and one of the highlights of his career was scoring one of the goals in his country's shock 2-1 win over England. The game took place in 1936 - at Molineux.

He stayed at Highbury until 1949 when he moved to Norwich as player-coach. Bryn retired from the game in 1951 to run a newsagents shop in North London. He died in 1985 at the age of 73.

His £14,000 fee in 1938 was a mere pittance to the money that exchanged hands in the Steve Daley-Andy Gray transfer saga.

The deal was set up by former Molineux manager John Barnwell. Barnsley born Daley joined the Molineux staff as an apprentice in June 1969. He turned professional two years later and, after making two appearances as substitute in the early part of 1971/72 season. scored on his full debut in 4-2 win over Southampton.

Later that season he scored in the first minute to help his side overcome Ferencvaros in the UEFA Cup semi-final. By the time that Manchester City came in for his services in September 1979, Daley had played 218 full games for Wolves plus another 26 as substitute. He scored a total of 43 goals. During that time he won a Second Division

Championship medal in 1976/7, when he was an ever present as Wolves returned to the top flight after one year's absence.

City's manager in 1979, Malcolm Allison, was a big admirer of Daley's silky midfield skills and he paid a reported £1,437,500 to take him to Maine Road.

The transfer fee was as good as spent though, for on the 8th September 1979, Andy Gray became the most expensive footballer in Britain when he signed for Wolves prior to their home game with Crystal Palace. The reputed fee that made the short journey to the coffers of his former club, Aston Villa, was £1,469,000.

Gray like Bryn Jones, made his debut for the club at Goodison Park scoring in a 3-2 victory over Everton. Later that season he scored the only goal of the game in that never to be forgotten League Cup Final win over Nottingham Forest at Wembley.

He left Molineux in November 1983 for Everton for a fee of £250,000. Gray played a total of 159 games for Wolves (plus three as substitute) and scored 45 goals. He is now working for Sky television.

Another million pound plus man to arrive at Molineux from Villa Park is Tony Daley. Sadly, this popular figure has had his first season at Wolves all



Hendrie finds scoring touc

John Hendrie could scarcely have rediscovered his scoring touch at a scene for a uniming confirmation with Oldham. more opportune moment for Middlesbrough, coming good with the two goals that enabled the Boro' to defeat Luton 2-1 on Sunday.

That left them needing just one more point to make absolutely sure of First Division Championship and automatic promotion to the Premiership.

But, if Bolton failed to win at Stoke on Wednesday, Middlesbrough will already be beyond reach before travelling to Tranmere today.

Hendrie's goals extended Middlesbrough's unbeaten run to five matches and a crowd of 23,903 - their best of the season - turned up to watch the club play at Ayresome Park for the last time. Ayresome Park, one of the grounds used for the 1966 World Cup finals, has been the Boro's home since 1903 but next season they will be

moving to a new 30,000 all-seater stadium alongside the River Tees.

Quite astonishingly, none of the four play-off places had been claimed by last weekend and, subject to the result of mid-week games, the situation could well be the same as we take the field for today's game with Swindon.

Much will have depended upon the result of our game at Tranmere and Bolton's experience at Stoke on Wednesday.


Barnsley needed to win their home game against Oldham on Tuesday to remain in serious contention. The Tykes followed their 1-1 draw with Middlesbrough at Oakwell by defeating Sheffield United 2-1 there on Saturday. Two goals from Brendan O'Connell

did the trick and set the scene for a thrilling con-

The last visiting club to win at Oakwell in the League were Wolves. goals from Robbie Dennison, Lee Mills and Neil Emblen giving us a 3-1 win on New Year's Eve - and we are still the only visiting team to have scored more than twice at Oakwell this season.

Since then, Barnsley had been unbeaten in nine home League games, seven of which have been won.

Oldham confirmed that they are not in the business of doing anyone any favours when they defeated neighbouring Bolton 3-1 at Boundary Park. Two goals within four minutes, mid-way through the opening half, broke Bolton's back. Though John McGinlay pulled one back before the interval - with his 19th goal of the season - Paul Rickers clinched the Latics' victory with his first League goal six minutes into the second-



half.

Bolton looked a serious contenders for the Championship until a few weeks ago. As they progressed to the Coca Cola Cup final - in which they were beaten 2-1 by Liverpool Wanderers enjoyed an unbeaten run of eight League matches.

Bolton had seemed the unlikeliest of sides to "blow up" but that is precisely what has happened. Prior to their mid-week game at Stoke, Bolton had managed only one victory in five games and that was at home to lowly Sunderland (1-0).

Tranmere Rovers are another of the promotion hopefuls to lose their nerve. They suffered their third successive defeat - a sequence in which they conceded 12 goals - when crashing 5-1 away to lowly West Bromwich.

The man to do the damage was Lee Ashcroft, with the first hat-trick of his senior career. With two goals behind him, Ashcroft was invited to take the 70th minute penalty after he had been pulled down by John McGreal. He made no mistake with the spot-kick so, with the other goals coming from Kevin Donovan and Bob Taylor, the Throstles celebrated their biggest victory of the season.

Tranmere's despair was complete when Dave Higgins was sent off for his second bookable offence against the

lively Ashcroft. It was Higgins' third dismissal of the season. The Tranmere goal came from a John Aldridge penalty, taking his tally for the season to 25.

Reading's revival came marginally too late to give them a chance of taking top place. The Royals have won their last three games but it is not now possible for them catch to Middlesbrough.

Lee Nogan, who has been such a key figure since joining the club Watford £250,000 in January, got the goal which turned out to be the winner at Bristol City. It left Reading needing just one point to be sure of a place in the play-offs.

Stuart Lovell opened the scoring at Ashton Gate with Nogan making it 2-0 with a ninth goal for the Royals in the 59th minute. Brian Tinnion struck a late goal for Bristol City who were already relegated.

Derby's McFarland became the first end-of-season managerial casualty. With the Rams failing to maintain their late recovery - and thus missing out on the play-offs - McFarland was informed that his contract would be renewed when it ended last Saturday.

On his final day, he saw his team beaten 2-1 at home by Southend United. Former Wolves' forward Lee Mills scored his seventh goal, since joining Derby in March, but goals from Phil Gridelet and Gary Jones

gave Southend their third successive victory.
