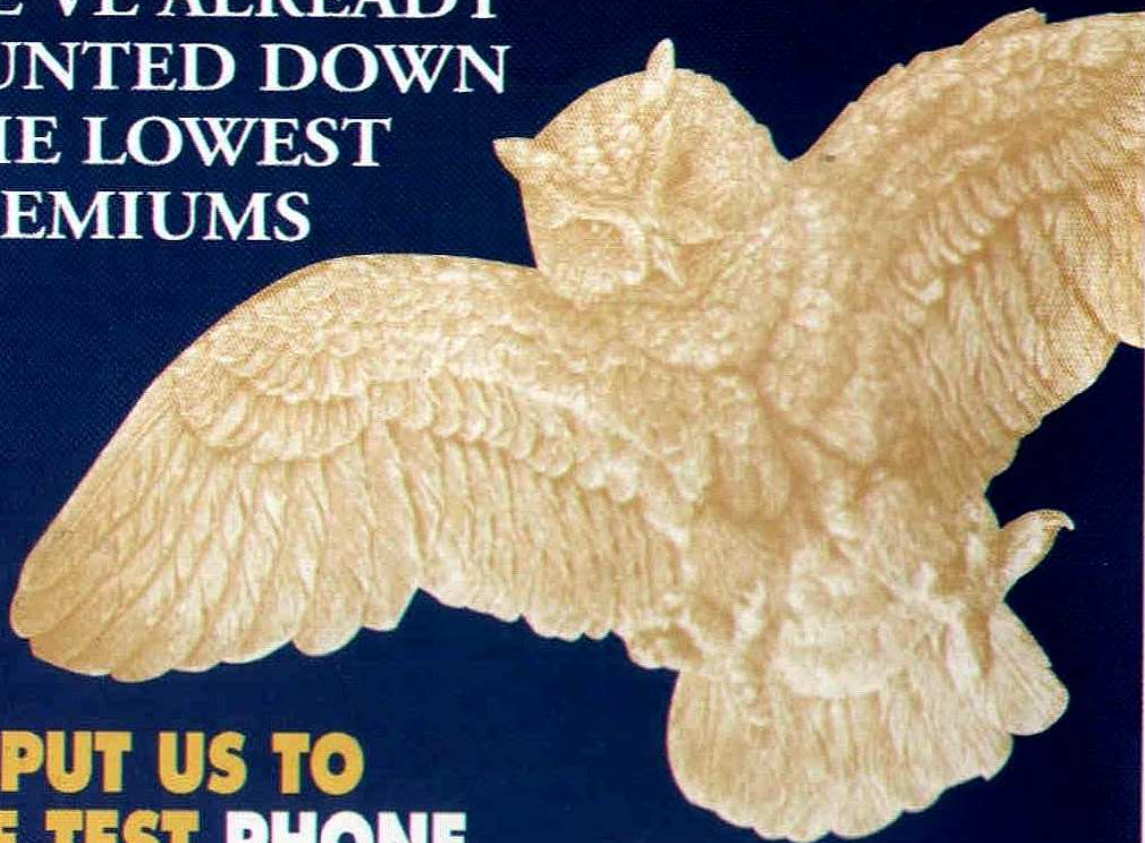

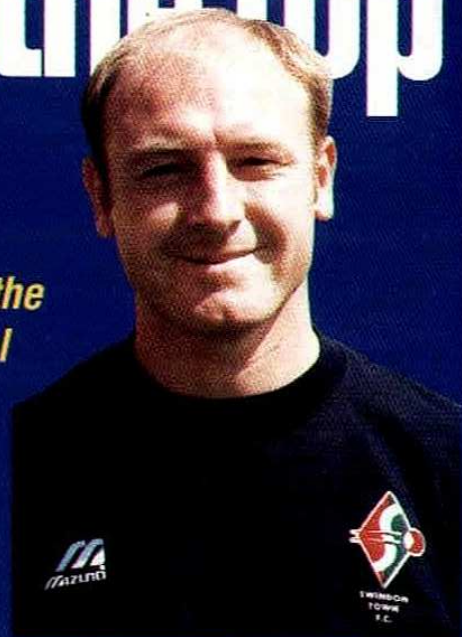

The whole Club is in tremendous spirit at the moment. You can feel a buzz around the place now - it is not something I have experienced since I was at Liverpool.



It is a long time since I have been in such a good atmosphere between players and everyone connected with the Club - supporters as well. It has been a great start but I wouldn't get carried away, there is still an enormous job to be done here. The only thing we have to guard against is ourselves. We must not become complacent, we can't afford to take things for granted.

I'm pleased to say we haven't done that so far. We have earned our right to play and done it superbly well.

We were disappointed after our last home game, because we knew we were better than that. But we didn't produce the goods consistently for the ninety minutes, whereas I thought we did last Saturday at Brentford.

We have had to make changes and been without players through injury. You could say at times it has been a makeshift team, but we are getting a pattern of play and the players who have come in have earned the right to play and deserve to be in the side.

People like Edwin Murray, who shows his importance to the squad when one week he plays right-back and the next week as a striker. He's got a great attitude, is good to have around, and as I say his versatility is brilliant for the squad.

It is so important - the players know this - because we are not going to get anywhere this year without a strong dependable squad. The quality of the players not in the starting line is probably the key to it all. The strength of the team is down to the men who are not playing. If they are good and pushing the men in possession of their shirt then it keeps everyone on their toes. And they are happy because things are going quite well.

It is all about the squad not the eleven who start the game.

Chesterfield had a good season last term and though we didn't know too much about them we have done our homework as a staff and had them watched and discussed the probabilities as usual. We will pay them a lot of respect.

So far so good then and give yourselves a big pat on the back too, for indirectly our supporters have contributed to our success. The support at Brentford was magnificent, as it was at Hull and on the long journey to Carlisle. This has been crucial to the lads and the rapport between the fans and the players is the most pleasing aspect of the season so far for me. It has been a two way thing, with the players responding to the crowd and the fans to the players. It is brilliant to experience. Keep up the good work. We will be trying our best.

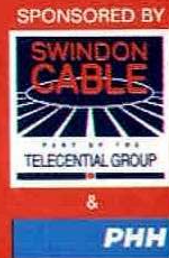

Chesterfield

Chesterfield entered this new chapter in their history on the back of the euphoria surrounding their Wembley Play-Off triumph last May, an excitement that Town fans can well appreciate. But their early experiences at the higher level have been a little disappointing with two wins and a draw their reward from the opening five encounters in Division Two.

Manager John Duncan's moves to strengthen his promotion squad this summer resulted in the signing of central defender Mark Williams from Shrewsbury. It cost them £120,000 down and will rise eventually to £150,000 but looks like money well spent.

Williams was in the starting line for the opening day of the season, when Lawrie Madden was also present. Madden, the former Arsenal amateur who has played for Mansfield Town, Charlton Athletic, Millwall and Sheffield Wednesday amongst others, will be 40 later this month, and it seemed his career at Saltergate was finished when he was released last season. But an injury to Nicky Law meant there was a vacancy and the stalwart defender filled the breach. Alas, for him, he suffered a cracked bone and had to retire from the 1-0 defeat at Oxford United.

The complete line-up at Oxford was: Beasley; Jules, Perkins (Morris), Curtis, Williams, Madden (Hewitt), Robinson, Davies, Lormor, Howard (Narbett), Dyche.

Beasley, who did so well in the second half of last season when he had to cover for Chris Marples who broke a leg, has been the first choice custodian this season. Jules, Law, Williams and Perkins form the back four with Curtis, Robinson, Dyche and Howard in midfield behind Davies and Lormar.

A 1-0 home defeat by Bury in the Coca-Cola Cup then followed - the second leg at Gigg Lane was played this week - before the Spireites got off the mark with a 3-0 home win over Carlisle United. Goals from Lormor, Robinson and Morris exacting revenge against the club, that denied them automatic promotion last season.

Local teenage star Kevin Davies grabbed two good goals at Swansea but it was not enough, the Swans striking back three times to send Chesterfield back pointless. The gloom was lifted by an encouraging 2-1 victory over York City. Morris and Lormor again on target, but the Spireites hundred per cent home record was punctured last Saturday when Hull City held them to a goalless draw.

The team was: Beasley; Hewitt, Rogers (Jules 75), Curtis, Dyche, Law, Robinson, Davies (Howard 75), Lormar (Roberts 82), Morris, Perkins.

So Chesterfield come to Swindon Town in search of their first away points of the season, and with seven points already in the bag for their home endeavours a change of fortune in this direction will establish them as promotion candidates yet again.

Andy Beasley

- **GOALKEEPER.** A free transfer signing from Doncaster Rovers in August 1994, he was drafted into the side for the injured Chris Marples in the second half of last season, and was on the losing side only three times in 26 League and Cup appearances. Was in the Blues starting line at Oxford on the opening day of this season. Andy joined Luton as an apprentice in 1981 but did not make his League debut until December 1984 when he had joined Mansfield and helped them achieve a 0-0 draw at Chesterfield! It was one of only three League outings for the Stags that season and after loan spells with Peterborough and Scarborough he moved on to Doncaster Rovers in 1992-93. Born: Sedgeley 5-2-64.

Darren Carr

- **CENTRAL DEFENDER.** Tall commanding pivot who cost Chesterfield £30,000 (fee set by a tribunal) to sign from Crewe Alexandra in the summer of 1993. Stands 6'2" and came into League football with his home-town club Bristol Rovers, making his bow in a 2-0 defeat at Gillingham in May 1986. Added 29 more League games to his record in the next two campaigns, joining Newport County in 1988 after a loan. Played just five Fourth Division games for them before being snapped up by Sheffield United in season 1987-88 and scored one goal in 13 League games for the Blades. Was allowed to move to Crewe in December 1990 for £25,000, but has enjoyed his best spell with the Blues, finishing last season as the Player of the Year. Born: Bristol 4-9-68.

Tom Curtis

- **MIDFIELD.** A young man with a bright future, Tom is combining his playing career for Chesterfield with his studies at Loughborough University. Tommy was picked up by Derby County as a schoolboy and spent two years at the Baseball Ground before impressing

John Duncan during a trial spell. Had made 92 senior appearances for the Blues by the start of this season. Born: 1-3-73.

Kevin Davies

- **STRIKER.** The Blues see Kevin as a tremendous prospect. A local lad he became the youngest player to appear in the League Cup, when Chesterfield took on West Ham United at Upton Park in September 1993. At the age of 18 he is already an experienced campaigner and his 13 goals - 11 of them in 41 League appearances - last season had him not only top of the Blues score-chart, but the subject of much attention from Premier League scouts. Was capped by England at Under-18 level several times last season and seems set to make a real impact on Division Two, opening his account with two goals at Swansea City.

Sean Dyche

- **MIDFIELD.** Was Chesterfield's Player of the Year at the end of the 1991-92 season but since then his appearances have been very limited through injuries, though he did appear in 22 Third Division games last season. Sean was signed from Nottingham Forest during the 1989-90 campaign as a midfield player, and made his League debut in Chesterfield's colours, but he has put in some of his best performances for the club as an attacking fullback. Born: Kettering 28-8-71

Wayne Fairclough

- **DEFENDER.** Signed on a free transfer from Mansfield Town during the 1994-95 close season. Wayne made 13 League appearances for the Blues last season. Served his apprenticeship with Notts County for whom he made the first of his 71 League appearances in a 3-2 win at Darlington, in September 1985. In March 1990 The Stags paid £80,000 for his services and he repaid them with 12 goals in 140 League games. Born: Nottingham 27-4-68.

Jamie Hewitt

- **DEFENDER.** A utility man, now in his second spell at Saltergate after rejoining the Spireites in October 1993 from Doncaster Rovers. Originally joined the club from school making his League bow in a goalless draw at Plymouth Argyle in November 1985. Played 18 more games that season and was a regular choice by the following year. Was given a free transfer at the end of the 1991-92 season (14 goals in 249 League appearances) and joined Doncaster Rovers. Has now made over 350 first team appearances for his home-town club. Born: Chesterfield 17-5-68.

Jonathan Howard

- **FORWARD.** Made one start and eleven substitute appearances in the Third Division last season - scoring once. A highly rated squad member, Jonathan was awarded a contract after proving his worth in the Reserves. Came into football with Rotherham United, who gave him a professional contract in July 1990, but never established himself as a regular choice, making 36 League appearances with the Millers in four years. Born: Sheffield. Age: 23.

Mark Jules

- **UTILITY.** Originally recruited as a winger, Mark has enjoyed his best spell with the Blues as a man-marking fullback. Strong in the tackle he was snapped up from Scarborough for £40,000 after a dazzling two-goal show against the Spireites in the final game of the 1992-93 season. Started his career with home-town club Bradford City but after just one substitute appearance was allowed to join Scarborough on a free in August 1991. Made 23 Third Division appearances last season, 13 of them as a substitute. Born: Bradford 5-9-71.

Nicky Law

- **CENTRAL DEFENDER.** Has been playing League football since February 1982 when he made his debut for Barnsley in a 2-1 win at Shrewsbury Town. Prior to that he joined Arsenal as an apprentice in 1992 but did not get a senior team opportunity and moved to Oakwell in 1982. Was five years with the Tykes, clocking up 114 League games (1 goal), before a transfer took him to Blackpool in 1985. Another 66 appearances in the League were made before Plymouth recruited his services in March 1987 and his career continued with Notts County, Scarborough and Rotherham, until October 1993, when he moved to Saltergate in an exchange deal that took Tony Brien the other way. Has proved an influential club captain with over 450 games experience now to his credit.
Born: London 8-9-61.

Andy Morris

- **STRIKER.** Nicknamed 'Bruno' for obvious reasons, this six foot-five attacker is the tallest man in the Chesterfield squad. Has been with them since January 1988, when he left Rotherham United who he joined in 1984. Played seven times for the Millers after making his Division Three debut in a 1-0 win at Orient in April 1985. Has developed into a deceptively skilful forward and scored his 46th goal in his 232nd League appearance, against Carlisle United last month.
Born: Sheffield 17-11-67.

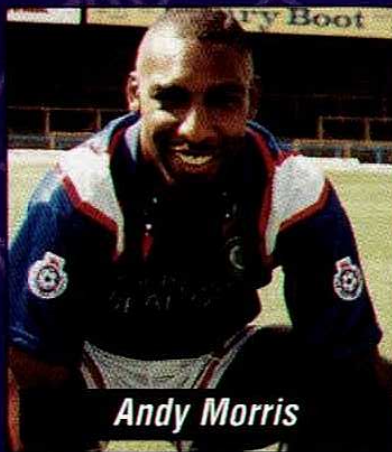
David Moss

- **MIDFIELD.** Another player recruited from Belle Vue, David arrived from Doncaster Rovers in an exchange deal, involving Lee Turnball in October 1993. David scored on his Chesterfield home debut in a 3-1 win over Torquay United and has averaged a goal every four games, which is excellent for a midfield player.

Contributed 10 in 27 (5) Third Division games last season.
Born: Doncaster 15-11-68.

Chris Perkins

- **DEFENDER.** In his second season with the Blues following a free move from Mansfield Town in the summer of 1994. Brought in as cover he ended up playing in 25 games in 1994-95, including the Wembley Play-Off Final and was in the Chesterfield starting line for the opening game of this season. Still only 21.

Darren Roberts

- **STRIKER.** Gained a reputation as a prolific scorer in non-League football tempting Wolves to sign him from Burton Albion for £20,000 in April 1992. Yet despite scoring a hat-trick on his League debut he struggled to make the grade at Molineux and joined Chesterfield in the summer of 1994, made just 4 starts and 7 sub appearances last term, registering one Third Division goal and joined Telford United on an extended loan. Age: 25.

Phil Robinson

- **MIDFIELD.** A goal-scoring midfielder who chipped in with 10 goals in 25 appearances last season including Chesterfield's second goal in the Play-Off Final

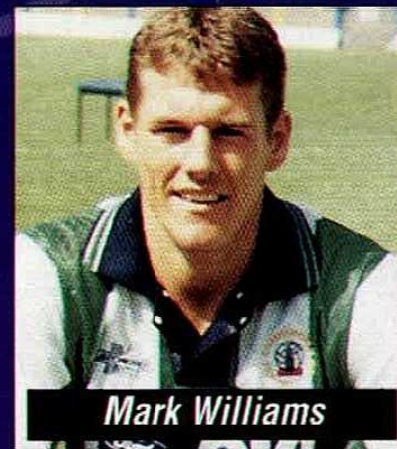
victory over Bury. Joined Aston Villa's apprentice ranks in 1984 and made the first of his three League appearances for them in a 5-0 defeat at Southampton in March 1987. Joined Wolves the following summer and has served Notts County, Birmingham City (loan) and Huddersfield Town from where he was acquired on a free in December 1994. Born: Stafford 6-1-67.

Lee Rogers

- **DEFENCE.** A regular since arriving as a trialist in 1986, Lee is now the longest serving of the squad with around 350 appearances behind him. The players' Player of the Year last season, he was formerly an apprentice at Doncaster Rovers but was blooded in the League by Chesterfield at Blackpool in August 1986. Born: Doncaster 21-10-66.

Mark Williams

- **CENTRAL DEFENDER.** Signed in the summer of '95 from Shrewsbury Town, he made his Chesterfield debut on the opening day at Oxford. A former Crewe apprentice, Mark was in non-League circles with Newtown, when the Shrews signed him in March 1992. Made 32 Second Division appearances for them last season. Age: 25.

Manager - John Duncan

A class striker in his day, who averaged a goal every two games for Tottenham Hotspur (53 goals in 103

League appearances) between 1974 and '78 and then returned figures of a goal in every three games (12 in 36), for Derby County (1978-80) having come south following a successful career with Dundee United (62 goals in 124 Scottish League games).

Left the Baseball Ground to become player-manger of Scunthorpe United in 1981. In 1983 he took charge of Hartlepool United but stayed less than a year. Chesterfield being his next port of call.

Here John experienced success, leading the Spireites to the Fourth Division Championship in 1985 and his good work was rewarded, when in June 1987, Ipswich Town enlisted his services as manager.

Things did not go well at Portman Road and in 1990 he was sacked, leaving the game to go into teaching. But when Chesterfield were in trouble in February 1993, following the departure of Chris McMenemy, John answered the clarion call to pull off an amazing double by guiding the Blues to another promotion by beating Bury in the Third Division Play-Off Final at Wembley in 1995.

Born: Lochee he is 46.

Under the Spotlight

Netted the Blues first League goal of the new season, against Carlisle United, to add to the 10 he scored last season in 23 Third Division outings.

Tony achieved legendary status at Saltergate following a free transfer there from Peterborough United in December 1994. His debut, in the Boxing Day victory over Doncaster Rovers, coincided with the start of Chesterfield's record breaking run of 21 League games without defeat and the big striker played in every game.

Anthony served his apprenticeship with Newcastle United, helping

them beat Tottenham Hotspur 2-0 on his League debut, as a substitute, in January 1988, when Paul Gascoigne scored both goals. Had another run out from the bench in a 1-1 draw at Watford and celebrated his first game in

the Newcastle starting line-up with the opening goal in a 3-1 win over Oxford United (30-4-88).

Scored the winner in the next game - a 2-1 victory at Portsmouth. Three goals in 8 League games were his final stats for Newcastle, before continuing his career with Lincoln City, after a short loan spell with Norwich City during which he did not get a senior game and Tony netted 29 goals in 90 League appearances for the Red Imps.

Born: Ashington 29-10-70.

That brilliant 2-0 victory at Griffin Park last Saturday made it three wins out of three away games for us and no goals conceded. No wonder we are three points clear at the top!

Only one other side in the Division is still on a clean sheet away from home and that is Bradford City - one draw - who will be severely tested at Wrexham this afternoon.

It was Bradford who temporarily deposed us from poll position after a 2-0 midweek away win at Notts County. Then last Saturday they crashed 4-0 at home to Wycombe Wanderers, a setback that cost them three places.

Wrexham are looking for their first home win after two drawn games so this one is interestingly poised. Perhaps it will be a third home stalemate for the Welsh club after all.

Blackpool, 2-0 winners at Shrewsbury last Saturday, are going well too. Former Crystal Palace forward Andy Preece got both goals to add to the crashing volley that opened his account for the Seasiders against Peterborough United. Today he will be trying to beat the Stockport County goalkeeper Neil Edwards at Bloomfield Road where the Tangerines have a hundred per cent record with four goals to one.

It looks a home win this, but don't discount Stockport, who opened the season with a 2-0 victory at Walsall. They are only two points behind Blackpool.

AFC Bournemouth are a team to watch. Incredibly quoted at 33-1 before the season kicked off, they have a good young squad of talented players and in Steve Jones, the former West Ham United reject, one of the most prolific marksmen in Division Two. He was thwarted by Rotherham

goalkeeper Matt Clarke on Saturday as he tried to equal Ted McDougall's (incidentally another former Hammer) Bournemouth record of scoring in six consecutive games at the start of the season.

However Jones made up for it by laying on the winner for Matt Holland and the Cherries will be defending their unbeaten record this season at Notts County today. Notts were fancied for promotion and of course are still likely contenders but that 2-0 home defeat by Bradford was followed by a 1-0 defeat at Brighton & Hove Albion last week and AFC Bournemouth should be good for at least a point.

That game at the Goldstone Ground incidentally provided Brighton with their first win of the season. It was badly needed by Liam Brady's team who found County's Welsh Under-21 International goalkeeper in breathtaking form. He couldn't keep out Junior McDougall's fierce half volley however.

Brighton are down at Ashton Gate this afternoon and will need to keep tight on David Seal. The Australian striker blasted his sixth goal of the season at London Road last week to earn Bristol City a 1-1 draw with Peterborough United. The Posh have not lived up to their name this season - just one win in five Second Division games a disappointing return - but there is no lack of spirit in the side. Remember they came back from 4-1 down to knock Swansea out of the Coca-Cola Cup and they could pick up their first away point of the season at Wycombe today. Goalkeeper Jon Sheffield

previously with us on loan is now between the sticks at London Road.

Walsall, still looking for their first home win of the season, could record it against inconsistent Swansea City while Bristol Rovers will be expecting to get a result at bottom of the table York.



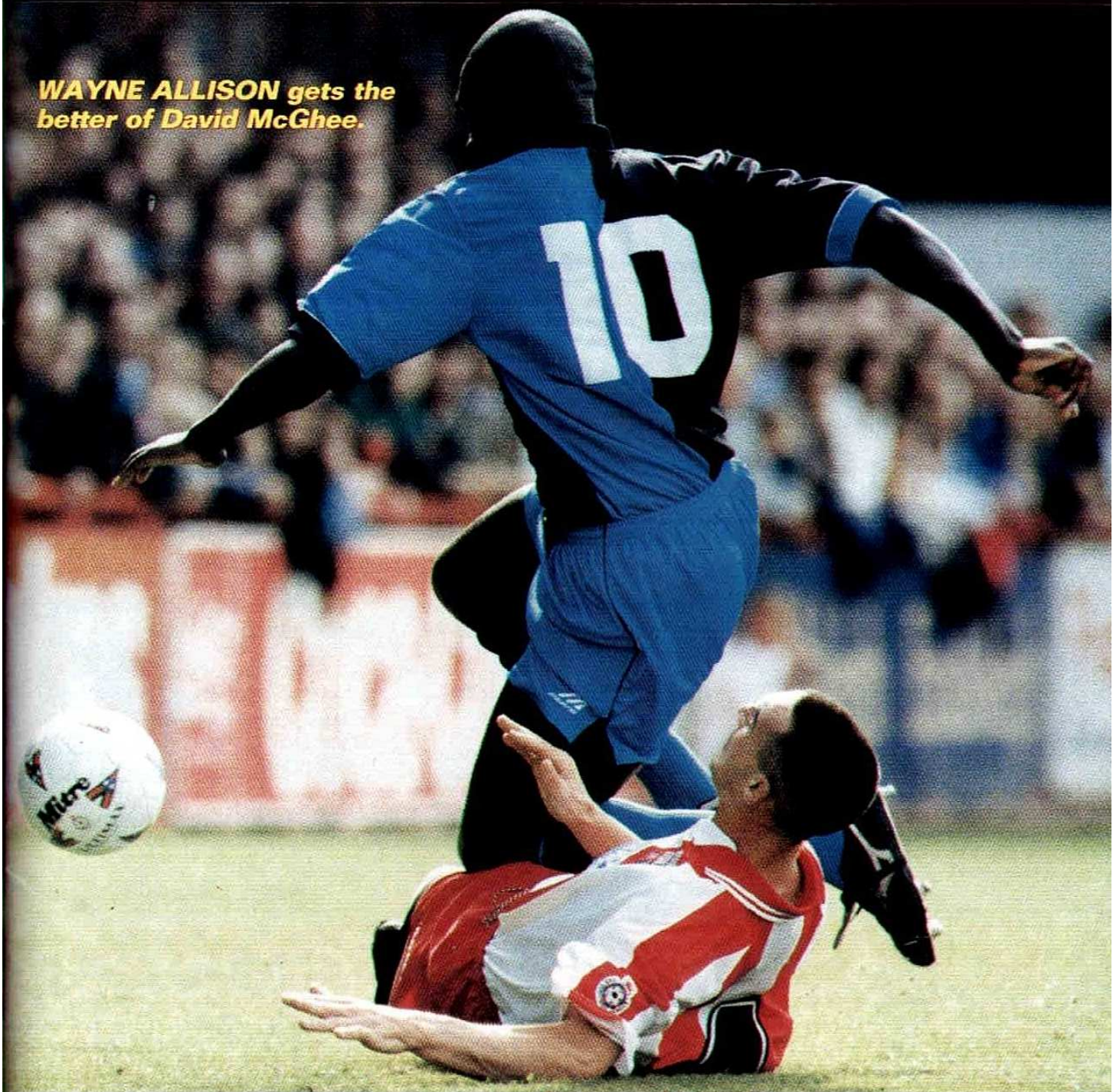

Having such a small squad this season, we have to be very careful and guard against injuries, so twice a week or so we have had to train



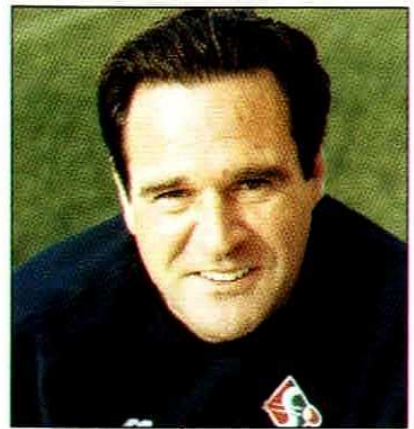
on the County Ground, which has been kept watered, thanks to the new system which was installed during the summer.

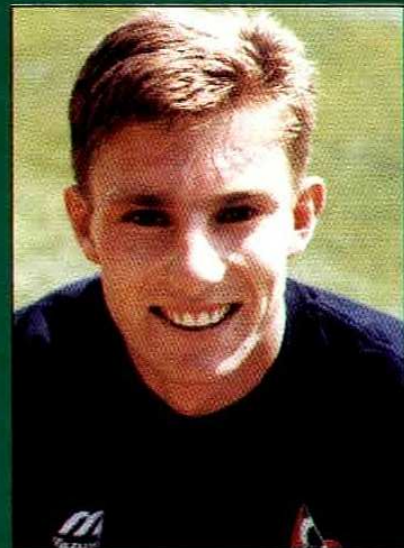

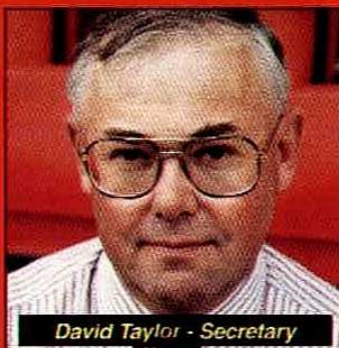

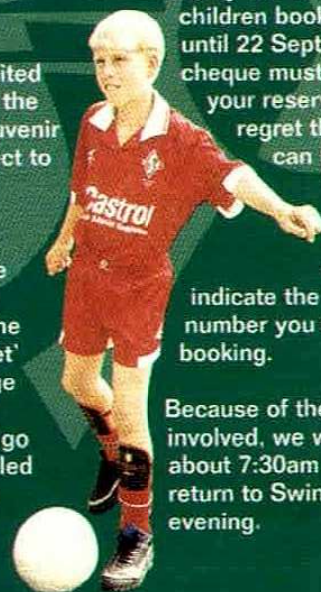

Supporters will be directed down the front of the Castrol Stand to pitch level and then to exit gates at either end of the stand.

The whole exercise will be filmed by television cameras which will be used to assist in training Officers for such an emergency should it happen in the future.

Hopefully it will not be necessary but you will know what to expect in the unlikely event of an emergency evacuation.

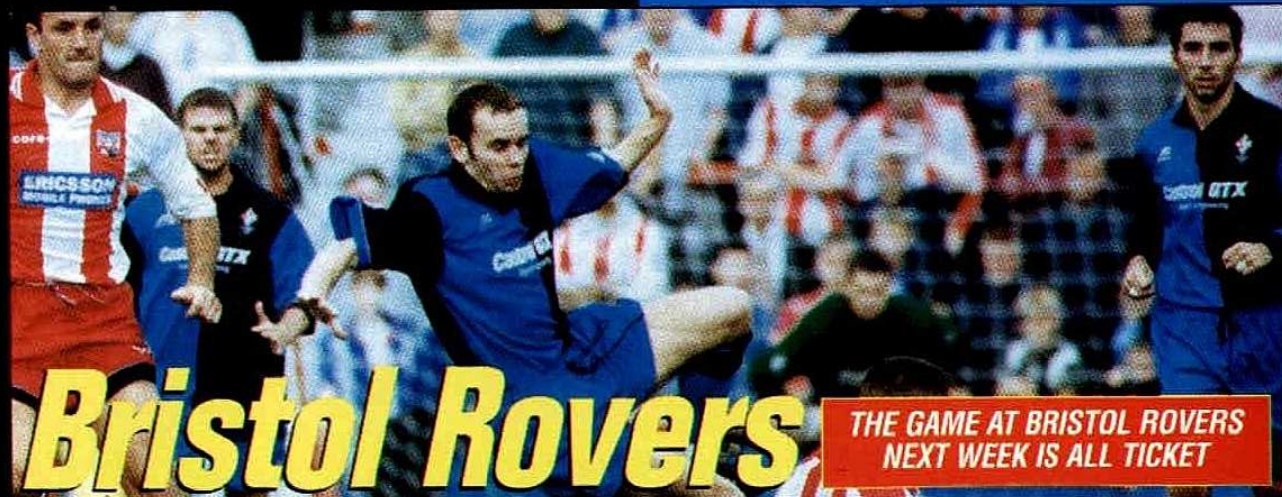

Edwin Murray

Talks to Colin Benson

CB: Well Edwin you certainly hit the headlines with that cracking winner at Carlisle. You must be thrilled with your start to the season?

EM: Yes...It was good really, I'm very happy with it. It could have gone anywhere but luckily it went in for me.

CB: Tell us about the goal. How did it come about?

EM: Well, all I can remember is just checking the ball. It dropped and I thought 'just have I go.' I did and it flew in. It was good, a good feeling.

CB: How far out were you?

EM: I don't know. Twenty yards I suppose.

CB: It is even better when it is the winner as well isn't it?

EM: Yes, it is a really nice feeling, really good. You have a sense of achievement. Especially when it is such a long journey. It would have been terrible to have come back from there without the points. We worked very hard so it was to good to get something for our effort.

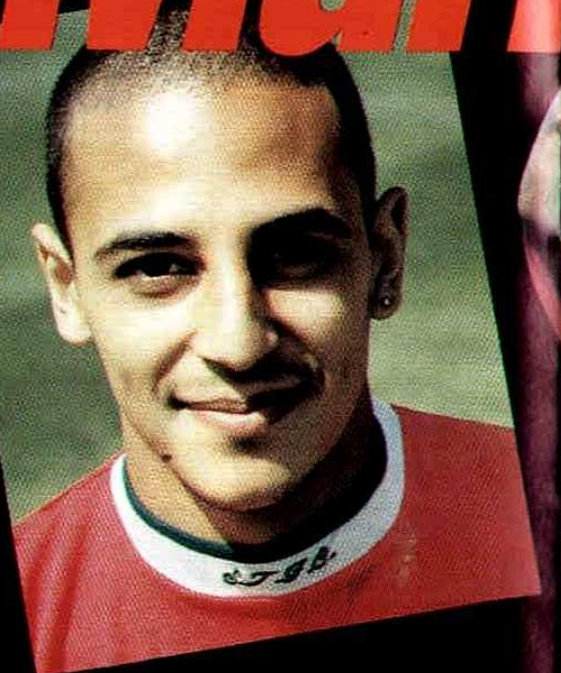
CB: Now then Edwin you are not noted as a striker so how did this all come about?

EM: I'm certainly not, but since Steve McMahon has come he has played me in a few places. I can't complain, it is just good to play in the first team whatever the position.

Playing a variety of roles I guess is a good thing as well - I'm just quite happy to be playing. I was a leftback at Watford last season but have always played centreback in Youth and Reserve team football really. That is the role I have played since I joined the club as an apprentice. But it is good to be able to play a few positions.

CB: What about before you got into professional football. Where did you feature as a youngster?

EM: When I was young I played centre forward or centre back. But when you are a Schoolboy you play anywhere anyway though those were the two positions I was generally given.



CB: Your first experience of professional coaching was with Norwich City I believe, but you slipped through the Canaries net did you not?

EM: I don't know about that. My old man got a job down here and we moved to Highworth and I started training with John Trollope. I just never contacted Norwich again I guess.

I have now been with this club six years and seen quite a few managers come and go.

A closer look at Edwin Murray

The son of an Agriculture College Lecturer, Edwin was born and bred in Lowestoft where he emerged through Schoolboy football. He was spotted by Norwich City as a 12-year old and invited to attend the Norwich City Centre of Excellence at Carrow Road where he stayed until he was 14 when his father took up a position at Cirencester and the family moved to Highworth.

It was then that he joined Swindon Town graduating through the Centre of Excellence under John Trollope to serve an apprenticeship and gain full professional status.

Made a glorious senior debut in a FA Cup Fourth Round tie at Watford on the 28th January 1995, deputising at leftback for Paul Bodin and continued in that role to make his Football League bow the following Saturday at Burnley.

Made seven starts last season including the Coca-Cola Cup semi-finals against Bolton Wanderers. Edwin celebrated his 22nd birthday last Thursday week.





CB: Which of the previous managers made the biggest impression on you?

EM: Hahh, hahh, hahh... Well, I was a Schoolboy under Lou Macari so I never got to know him. Ossie Ardilles was quite good. He gave young players a lot of confidence. He was good for all of us at the time and encouraged us to play with imagination. Glenn was good in that respect as well. But I think Steve McMahon has been the manager who has helped me the most. It is as simple as that really.

Under the previous managers I never played in the first team but since Steve McMahon has come along he has given me a chance, encouraged me to play, and you can't do more than that can you?

He trains like he plays the game. He wants everything to be done with quality, he wants it sharp and right. He takes training very, very seriously indeed and we just follow his lead really. How he trains is how he plays and this is what he expects from the players.

CB: Well now you have got a few games behind you are you a more competent performer?

EM: It is hard to explain really. I think because I have played a couple of games now I feel a bit more confident than before when it was pretty hard in my first few appearances. It is still not easy of course but the experience you gain helps you cope better. You have more belief in yourself.

CB: The Carlisle experience was the first time you have played up front though isn't it?

EM: Well it is the first time I have played a full game there. At the end of last season I played ten minutes up there when I came on against Wolves, and a couple of times in the Reserves. That is it. I never thought I would play there again.

CB: It is obviously awkward because you are not used to making the same sort of runs that a natural striker would make so it needs a lot of concentration from you no doubt.

EM: It is a completely different game to what I am used to.

There is a lot of hard work involved in being a forward which I guess you don't realise until you play there. I think it is a lot harder with your back to goal, knowing where people are and things like that. But when you are thrown in you just have to do the best you can and get on with it.



There were times in the game at Carlisle where you could see it was hard for the midfield to pick me out when they were looking to play the ball up to the front man. Steve Finney knows what to do, he shows all the time, but I was sometimes in two minds whether to come for the ball or look for the ball over the top. So it does confuse you a bit yeah. You just have to adapt as quickly as you can and get used to it or you are out of the game and no use to your team mates.

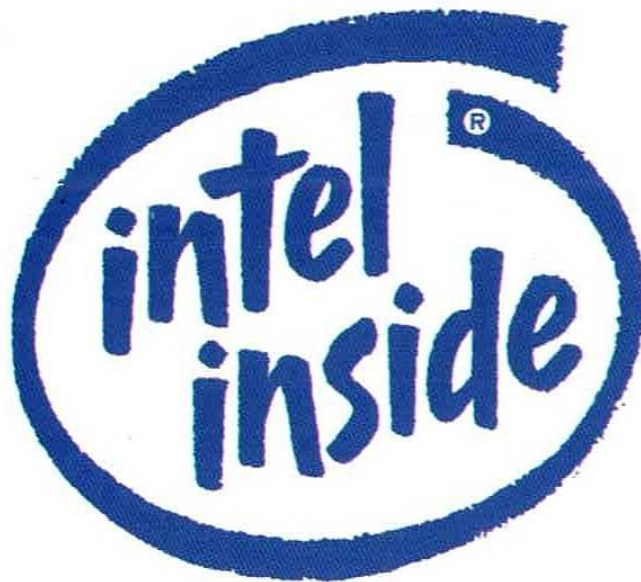
CB: You won't be criticising the front men now?

EM: No. They do a lot of hard work to be fair. They are always moaning that people don't appreciate this but it is hard work I can tell you.

CB: Carlisle United were the bookies firm favourites for the Championship this season. How did you rate them Edwin?

EM: Umm... I don't know. That is a hard question. I haven't really got a clue to be honest with you. It is so hard and I was so involved I did not have time to take note of them. I was just concentrating on my own game so I could not really say whether they are a good team or a bad team really. All I know is that they were hard to play against. They have a few big lads and are physically strong. But we beat them and it was a very good win.

I was talking to Rod Thomas afterwards and he told me that last season everything went for them. This year the ball isn't rolling for them. It was like that for us last season wasn't it so maybe this is going to be our year.

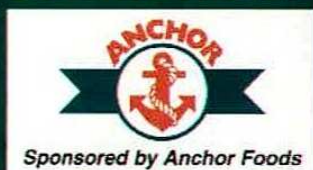

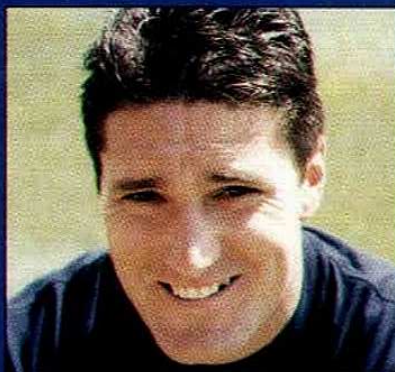

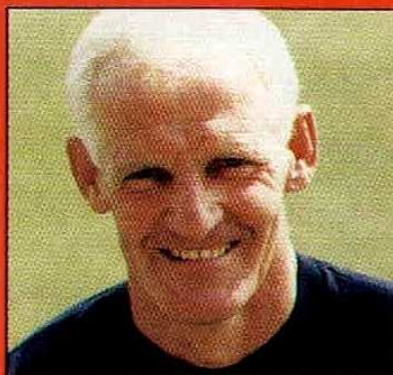

A short corner was headed goalwards, which looped into the corner of the goal to give them a one-nil interval lead.

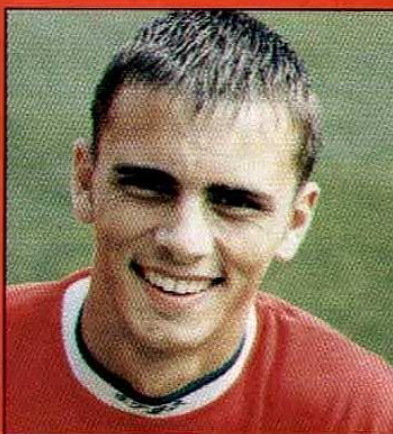

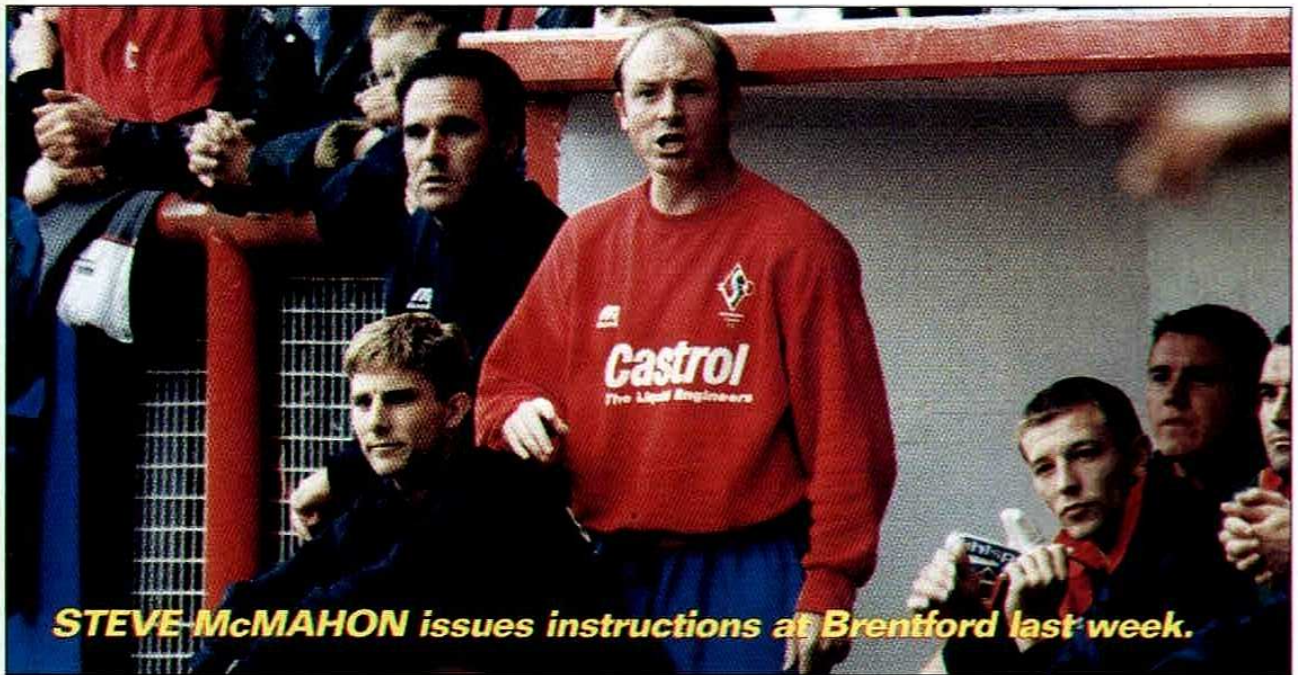

pitches in 11-a-side games, which did not help them develop at all, as the size of the pitch and the goals, made most games a lottery. With the biggest and strongest boys the dominant force the small skillful play was lost to the game.

Due to this directive from the F.A. it is my intention to encourage the boys under 13 to enjoy and continue to play for their local sides and during the school holidays arrange for 8-a-side matches against other League clubs.
