With Manager Steve McMahon

Tonight's match might be billed as a top of the table clash but at this juncture in the season I don't see the result of this game having too much relevance to who will go up and who will not at the end of the season.

If there were six games to go it could be crucial. This one is still very important obviously but six games into the season is hardly going to have a major bearing on who will win the Second Division Championship - or on who is going to be in contention.

But both teams have made a good start to the season which indicates that we are in for an exciting night. We of course are unbeaten: Bradford have not lost away - and of course they are the ones playing away tonight, so it will be interesting.

We have dropped four points at home in our last two engagements, against Oxford United and Chesterfield and obviously this is an area we need to tighten up on. So we have got something to improve and strive for tonight.

In the second-half against Chesterfield I thought we did everything but score. I just felt that we could have been a bit more patient. I don't know, it was just one of those funny games.

They had a man sent-off and everyone starts thinking the goals are going to come quickly. But sometimes these things affect the other side more. You know in your mind that they are a man down and logic suggests you should make a nno.

quick impact to exploit this deficiency. It doesn't work like that, and sometimes because of this the side with eleven begins to get a bit anxious and what is a physical advantage turns into a mental disadvantage.

You need to be patient, to work hard, and bide your time. All credit to Chesterfield they stuck at it, got everyone behind the ball and made it extremely difficult for us. But we need to have a bit more craft about us at times.

Tonight all we are thinking about is going out to win. It is too early, as I said, to be making comparisons with our opponents. All we can do is go out and win and if we do then it will obviously be three points Bradford can't get. But we have to make it difficult for teams coming here, we have to make sure that opposing sides are afraid of coming to the County Ground and we can only do that by winning regularly. It is no good winning away games if you drop points at home.

There are some tough teams out there in Division Two - they are all going to be hard and as they say in this game we can't look too far ahead. We will just take each game as it comes.

Bradford City were 20-1 outsiders before a ball was kicked in anger, yet if the form guide is a true reflection of their quality, the Yorkshire side will provide Town with their toughest test yet in the Second Division.

Beaten just once in their opening eight League and Cup encounters. The Bantams' deposed Town from the top spot in the Second Division table when they beat Notts County at Meadow Lane at the end of August. Eddie Youds, the former pswich town centre-half who is now proving a revelation as a goalscoring midfielder, struck their opening goal in the first minute to give them the best of starts with Paul Showler claiming the second to wrap up the points.

That win put them a point above us. We played Oxford United the following night - and Yorkshire fans were expecting City to consolidate their position the following Saturday at home to Wycombe Wanderers They were in for a shock.

Wycombe ran not with hat-trick hero Miguel de Souza coming back to haunt manager Lennie Lawrence, who had released him on a free transfer when the two were together at Charlton Athletic. The Wanderers won 4-0 leaving Lennie gasping. "If there is a banana skip around we find it." It had been substitute Neil Tolson who had got Bradford off to a winning start in their opening game, home to AFC Bournemouth. Tolson grabbed a late goal to give them a hard-earned win when he got the final touch in a goalmouth scramble following a deadly freekick by debutant Tommy Wright. The team was: Ward, Huxford, Liburd, Robson, (Showler), Mohan, Mitchell, Wright, Youds, Ormondroyd (Tolson), Shutt (Kiwomya), Murray.

Mr Lawrence has gathered together quite an array of talent and in terms of experience at the highest League level there isn't a side in Division Two that can match them. Goalkeeper Gavin Ward was in Leicester City's Premiership team last season, while in front of him the contract defensive partnership of Nicky Mohan - who has played at the top with both Middlesbrough and Leicester - and Graham Mitchell looks as sound as a bell.

In midfield Gary Robson played in the old First Division with West

Bromwich Albion, while the abrasive Tommy Wright, who is a fine dead ball kicker, has also had experience at this level. Eddie Youds once of Everton then Ipswich is another with a Premiership pedigree.

Youds, always regarded as a defender has exploded into the Second Division scene in midfield. He scored twice in a 1-0 win over Shrewsbury Town and had netted four goals before last weekend. Carl Shutt was the other scorer against the Shrews, a striker with first class experience and references, who alongside lan Ormondroud, once of Aston Villa looks set to revive his career.

A 0-0 draw at Brighton and a 3-2 win at Blackpool (Wright, Hamilton and Youds the scorers) in the Coca-Cola Cup - City won on aggregate - sees Bradford City arrive here unbeaten away from home this season.

- MIDFIELD. A strong determined ball winner who is equally at home in a defensive role. Graduated through the ranks at Valley Parade, making eight starts and two substitute appearances in the Second Division last season and is now on the fringe of establishing himself as a regular. Born: Pontefract 7-8-76.

Chris Dolby

• FORWARD. Former Swindon defender Chris Kamara spotted Chris, who was signed in the summer of 1995 after Rotherham released him on a free transfer. Chris has been in the limelight as the first Asian professional footballer. Plays on the wing where he relies more on craft than pace and delivers quality crosses. Made just two substitute appearances in Division Two for Rotherham last season. Born: 4-9-74.

Jon Ford

- DEFENDER. A pay dispute with Swansea resulted in Jon's transfer to Bradford in the summer of 1995 for a fee set by a tribunal of £210,000. It was less than half the asking price for the Swans only ever-present last season. A commanding pivot, or leftback. Jon chalked up 100 League games for the Welsh club, who had signed him from Cradley in 1991, made his debut as a substitute in a 1-1 draw with Bolton (24-8-91) and was regular in the Swansea side from then on.

Born: Birmingham 12-4-68.

Neil Grayston

 DEFENDER. Was still a trainee when he made his senior debut at the end of the 1993-94 season.
 Now a second year professional he is looking to build on his four first team outings last season.
 Born: Keighley 25-11-75.

The Lions had picked Richard up from Barnet on a free transfer in the summer of 1993 and he operated in a number of positions for the Dockers. Finished that season in the Second Division with Hull City and later moved to Rotherham United, where he stayed until his move to Bradford on a free transfer in the summer of 1994. A solid performer, he was the fans 'Player of the Year' last season. Born: Sheffield 3-2-69.



Andy Kiwomya

- FORWARD. Younger brother of the Arsenal and former Ipswich Town striker Chris, Andy made his Bradford debut on the opening day of the season against AFC Bournemouth. Signed from Scunthorpe United in the summer of 1995 on a free, he made 9 Third Division appearances for the Irons last season, scoring three goals. Watch out for his pace - he is electric. Born: Bradford 1-10-67.

Richard Liburd

- FULLBACK. Brought to Valley Parade by manager Lennie Lawrence, who had given him his chance at Middlesbrough after signing him from non-League circles. He cost the Yorkshire club 5200.000, but played only nine first team games last season before he was crocked at Cambridge United. Was beck in the starting line for the opening game of this campaign however and hopes to emulate season 1993-94, when he was virtually a regular in the Boro' side Born: Nottingham 26-9-73

Graham Mitchell

- DEPENDER. All experienced comparigner with over 200 league appearances for Huddersfield Town behind him. Graham first stepped onto the League stage at Crystal Palace in September 1986. Moved to Bradford during the early part of the 1994-95 season as part of the deal that took Lee Simmit and Lee Duxbury to Huddersfield. A footballing defender who reads the game well and distributes accurately, he played 26 times tast season. Born. Shipley 12-2-68

Shaun Murray

- MIDFIELD, was naled as a Tottenham Wenderboy, when his outstanding ball skills earned him England Schoolboy and Youth International honours and despife not making the first team at White Hart Lane. Portsmouth shelled out 290,000 for his transfer in the summer of 1989. Shaun made his League bow as a substitute at Brighton in September 1990 and recorded his first goal in the return fixture against the Seaguils in April 1991. Played over 30 games for Pompey, but was tren allowed to join Scarborough, where he made quite an impression before moving to Bradford last season Born. Newcastle 7:12:70

- CENTRAL Defender Another over 70 League appearances for his home town club before joining the summer 1994. Scored an own-Premiership games for the Filberts. Became victim of Mark McGhee's clear-out and joined Bradford in the summer for just less than a quarter

Gary Robson

- MIDFIELD. The younger brother of Middlesbrough boss and former England captain Bryan, Gary spent most of his career with West Bromwich Albion, for whom he made his debut against Southampton in May 1983. A regular with the Albion until he left the Hawthoms two seasons ago to play for Bradford. Made 25 appearances last season Born: Durham 6-7-65.

Paul Showler

- FORWARD. A former Batley policeman. Paul has spent most of his career as a part-timer in non-League football with the likes of Altrincham Barry Fry took him to Barnet where he established numself as a tricky outside-left and he was 27 when he became a full-time professional with Bradford a couple of seasons ago. Scored seven goals last season in 19 appearances. Born: Doncaster 10-10-66.

Carl Shutt

- STRIKER. It's ten years now since Carl left Spalding United to find fame with Sheffield Wednesday making his League bow in a 1-0 win at Oxford United in August

1985, netting 16 goals in 40 First Division games for the Owls before spreading his wings with Bristol City in 1987. In 1988-89 he was recruited by Leeds United but had limited first team opportunities though he contributed two goals to the Second Division Championship run in 89-90. Manchester City was the next port of call then it was on to Birmingham City before transferring to Bradford midway through the 1994-95 season for £75.000. Was not played in his natual front-line strike role by Bradford who gave him a wider berth, but still managed five goals in 35 appearances. Born: Sheffield 10-10-61.

Neil Tolson

- STRIKER. Arrrived at Bradford as part of the deal which saw Sean McCarthy go to Oldham Athletic in season 1993-94, but the one time Walsall youngster is still looking to establish himself as a first team regular. Went to Chester City on loan last season and scored two goals in 4(6) League games for Bradford but with Ian Ormondroyd back at Valley Parade this 6'1' target-man has even more competition for a first-team shirt. Born: Wordley 25-10-73.



Gavin Ward - GOALKEEPER. A summer recruit from Leicester City. Gavin was valued at £175,000. Seen as a brilliant prospect when he was almost an ever-present in Leicester City's promotion side in 1994 helping them to a Wembley Play-Off Final triumph, but he lost his place in the Premiership side making just six appearances last season. Previously on the books of Shrewsbury Town and West Bromwich Albion it was when he was with Cardiff City that he caught the eye - Leicester paying over £200,000 for his signature. Born: Sutton Coldfield 30-6-70.

Tommy Wright

- FORWARD, Lennie Lawrence paid Leicester City £650,000 to take Tommy to Middlesbrough in 1992 and went back there in the summer to re-sign him for nowt! Tommy hardly had a look-in after Bryan Robson took over at Ayresome Park but scored a hattrick for the Reserves in a 7-0 win at Bradford City! A true competitor Tommy can play on the flank or as a striker. Made 81 League appearances (24 goals) for Leeds United with whom he served his apprenticeship and added another 112 (22 goals) in the colours of Oldham Athletic. Born: Dunfermline 10-1-66.

Eddie Youds

- MIDFIELD, Installed as Club captain after his £150,000 move from Ipswich Town last season. Eddie led by example with three goals in 17 games. Started with Everton as a trainee and in his five years at the club made several first team appearances as well as having loan spells with Cardiff and Wrexham. A defender who can operate at centre-half or fullback. he was signed by Ipswich for £250,000 in 1991, but his debut at Derby County was cut short by injury and he never really got another chance to establish himself in the team. Born: Liverpool 3-5-70.

Manager - Lennie Lawrence

Lennie Lawrence's reputation was hewn out of eight years in charge of Charlton Athletic during which he led the Valiants back to the old First Division in 1986, but perhaps even more sensationally, kept them there on a shoe-string budget. in an annual fight against relegation. It was an achievement that earned him the title "Houdini".

A former schoolmaster, Lawrence's playing career was lived on the non-League circuit of the Isthmian League with Croydon, Carshalton Athletic and Sutton United.

Upon taking up coaching he has given a break by Colin Murphy at Lincoln City in 1979, where for three years he was Murphy's right-handman, helping Lincoln City achieve promotion to Division Four. Malcolm Allison then invited him to be his assistant manager at Plymouth Argyle but when "Big Mal" was axed Lennie moved to Charlton Athletic as Reserve Team coach. Eventually promoted to assistant to Ken Craggs at the Valley he moved in to the hot-seat himself in November 1982. His success was startling. Charlton contesting the Full Members Cup Final at Wembley as well in 1987.

Honest, straightforward, confident in his ability his prowess as a motivator is second to none. He became an institution at Charlton and II was a great surprise when he decided to cast his kingdom aside and take on the challenge of Middlesbrough.

Lennie had guided Boro' to the top flight in his first season but they were relegated in 1993 and his failure to win back promotion at the first attempt cost him his job.

Far from delusion he was back in work within the month as manager of progressive Bradford City.

Under the Spotlight

The lanky 6ft 4in Tyke is back home after a football journey that has taken him to Villa Park, the Baseball Ground and Filbert Street.

It hasn't always been an enjoyable ride for this down to earth Yorkshireman who was far from cosseted into the old First Division. After earning a reputation as a quick skillful striker in non-League circles lan was given his chance by Bradford City.

The 20-year-old was still grafting in the warehouse of a mail order firm and was contemplating joining the police force. Then he saw them being pelted with bricks during the miners strike and thought again.

However, life as a footballer has had its brick-bats too. It's true that the punters at Aston Villa called

him "Rodney" after that skinny, gormless Trotter in 'Only Fools and Horses', but though there was some affection in the jest, what they did to the likable striker horrified Graham Taylor. The former England boss had paid a Villa vecord £659,000 for lan in February 1989, after he had impressively scored 22 goals in 101 appearances for Bradford City. He found it hard to settle and a return of 10 goals in 56(23) appearances did not appease the Villa fans.

His height and blond thatch make him forever conspicuous and there will always be Del-Boys ready to pronounce him a plonker fair has guts and no mean skill and after failing to assert himself at Derby County then Leicester is determined to do the business for Bradford. Six goals in 10 games on loan with Hull City last season proved the point before his return to Valley Parate in the summer in the near half-million deal which also brought Nicky Mohan and Gavin Ward from Filbert Street.

Last Saturday was not a good day for League leaders. Not one of the teams topping the four divisions won. Newcastle United fell at Southampton in the Premiership; Millwall crashed at home to Barnsley in Division One, whilst we dropped two points to Chesterfield and Gillingham did likewise at Scunthorpe.

No doubt all will hope to redeem themselves in their midweek fixtures this week and all have the chance except Newcastle United, who are not involved until Saturday, when they play hosts to bottom of the table Manchester City.

This is a busy week for the rest of us and there is no doubt where the Second Division 'Match of the Week' is. It is here, this evening, when we take on second placed Bradford City.

The Yorkshire club took advantage of our slip up on Saturday by winning 2-1 at Wrexham, with Carl Shutt and Eddie Youds - who just can't seem to stop scoring netting the vital goals in the 52nd and 80th minutes. Those three points lifted Bradford to within a point of us and like us they are unbeaten away from home!

This is the only fixture in Division Two tonight, all the others played last night, which means it is conceivable that Crewe Alexandra, or Bristol Rovers, or Stockport County, could have dislodged us from poll position.

Dario Gradi's team, who thrashed Shrewsbury Town 3-0 on Saturday. were home to Brighton and as they have nine goals, the same as us. Any win over Liam Brady's lads, will take them top on goals. On paper it seems a sure bet, but then Brighton pulled off the shock win of the day on Saturday, when they triumphed 1-0 at Bristol City. Let's hope they made it a second away win at Gresty Road.

Bristol Rovers, also on eleven points after last week-ends 1-0 victory at York, needed to win at Rotherham by scoring two goals or more. A tall order, for the Millers were undefeated at home and full of confidence following a 1-0 win over Brentford.

Compulsory drug testing has now been in operation for three seasons and although over 160 players throughout the Leagues have been tested, no trace of any performance enhancing drug has been found. It is common knowledge however, that a number of top professional players have received treatment and counselling for `social' drug abuse.

Social drugs include alcohol, marijuana and ecstacy - they all come under Football Association's list of banned substances and players can be charged as per performance drugs for bringing the game into disrepute.

With players under the spotlight this season, they cannot afford to even take the wrong medication for a common cold, as many of the off-the-shelf medicines such as Benylin cough syrup, Lemsip, Night-Nurse and Solpadeine all contain banned substances which will cause a player to test positive. These brands are just a few of the hundreds that players cannot take, however good they are. Any player now has to consult with our club doctor, before taking any sort of medication, however trivial.

The F.A. will continue to conduct post match testing as we experienced last season in our game at Bristol City with Fraser Digby and Wayne O'Sullivan being randomly selected.

They are also introducing the testing of designated players, targeted by their club after training sessions. Not only will the senior professional players be liable for



testing, but the Trainees and even Associate Schoolboys can now be tested.

Therefore this season will see players targeted from nine years old for testing!

Beware then when giving your son a Lemsip-it could test positive!

England coach Terry Venables' remarks concerning Matthew Le Tissier, suggest that the Southampton wizard will definitely not be part of England's European Championship plans and accordingly, under the FIFA rules, which state that if a player has not played in a competitive match, he is not tied to that specific country and is therefore, eligible to play for any other nation for which he could qualify, should he so wish. Matt could soon be in other colours.

This has obviously opened the door of speculation, as Le Tissier's Channel Islands birth right makes him eligible for all four home nations. Thankfully, Scotland chief Craig Brown, has turned down any thought of Matt pulling on the Scottish jersey, saying, quite rightly, that he thought he might be eligible under FIFA rules he does not meet the criteria, set by the Scottish FA, i.e. birthright.

That leaves Le Tissier with three options. Wales, Northern Ireland or sticking with and hoping England change their boss. Certainly Bobby Gould has no reservations or Gaelic pride to cloud his judgement. He wants the Southampton skipper to play for Wales and makes no bones about it.

Let's face it, who could blame him. Le Tissier is an exceptional talent and would surely grace any team. Sure you don't see him charging around the field for ninety minutes, but what he does in ten is usually more potent than 180 minutes, of scurrying around by some others we could mention. The rejection of such a unique talent hurts me deeply, for our national team desperately needs the golden touch of a master to ice the cake. One pundit, I'm told, reminded Mr Venables that even if he did see Le Tissier as a fairy, it is traditional to decorate the top of a Christmas Tree with such an ornament!

Venables returned to his much publicised "Christmas Tree" formation, for the friendly against Columbia last week and one has to record this was the most enjoyable England exhibition since the former Tottenham Hotspur boss took control. In Barmby and Redknapp, we had two exuberant young players, who showed they were not out of place at this level, yet despite all the possession, the running, closing down and hustling, England did not convince as a true Championship contender.

England are still trying to build a team at a time, when I would have thought they should be consolidating and building up harmony with a settled formation. But Mr Venables says that it is at the turn of the year, that he will be hoping to field the team he will be putting his European reputation on.

It will not include Le Tissier that is for sure; and Andy Cole and Les Ferdinand might not be in the frame either. What does seem settled is the pattern of play and that suggests that we are going to labour away with one front-runner to lead our assault.

One has felt sorry for Alan Shearer, too often marooning in foreign territory. He is without a goal in seven Internationals now and one wonders just how this will affect overall confidence. No

doubt Swindon fans are hoping this is already the case, when he leads the Blackburn Rovers attack here next Wednesday night in the Coca-Cola Cup.

Meanwhile, English fans must be resigned to losing Matt Le Tissier, unless the unassuming maestro shows the same loyalty to England as he has to Southampton. You never know. They say Saints are entitled to public veneration. Perhaps this time next year we will have an England coach who feels the same way!

Talks to Colin Benson CR: Did you have a good trip with the Welsh squad Paul?

PB: Yes. I was a bit disappointed I didn't get on but it was a good break and nice for us to get back to winning ways at International level. Moldova did not make it easy for us. as is usual with European teams. they kept the ball. kept possession. But it was a good result. a good start for Bobby Gould and gives us something to work on.

CB: It is a bit of a problem for defenders like yourself on the bench isn't it. because fullbacks very seldom are called upon as substitutes except to replace injured colleagues?

PB: This is the thing. It is difficult. If things need changing they will put a midfield player on or a striker to try and change the course of the game but we have to be patient.

I am really keen to get on because I am stuck on 24 caps and I want to get my quarter of a century. After that I can start on the next 25. I made my debut in 1990 against Costa Rica. CB: Well Germany is the next one Paul and that would be a great way to chalk up number 25.

PB: It would be. We still have pleasant memories of the last one we played against them. We beat them 1-0 and I set up the goal. It would be nice to beat them, for although we can't qualify for the European Championship Finals, we want to finish on a high and as far up the table as possible.

CB: How different is the Welsh set-up under Mr Gould?

PB: Oh, it is very different. Without being disrespectful to the last manager, the organisation is far better and I think he has sort of given us a target really. It is more organised. Things that you have to do, he has literally told everybody what is required.

I think it is a difficult job being an International team manager. They have such little time to work with the players, by the time you get together, the game is upon you almost immediately.

There is also the problem of players being unavailable . Last week we missed Dean Saunders, who had to pull out because of his wife's pregnancy and Ryan Giggs always seems to have a problem or two coming into the Welsh squad for some reason. So I think it is a very hard job. Perhaps not so much for England, but certainly with the Welsh situation, because we have not that many players to choose from.

A closer look at Paul Bodin

Capped 24 times for Wales and a member of the current International squad, Paul is a cultured footballing defender who can operate in midfield as well. Comfortable on the ball with tight control and an accurate passer he was introduced to League Football by Newport County, who drafted him in from local football in 1987.

Paul made his League debut in a 5-1 defeat at Stockport County on January 29, 1988. He was to play five more times in Newport's Fourth Division campaign that season. scoring his first League goal in a 2-1 defeat at Crewe (13-2-88). In March 1988 Swindon paid 25,000 for the young midfielder whose baptism with Town was in the number 11 shirt at Oldham on 12th March 1988. Paul made a scoring entry in a 3-4 defeat - Quinn and Henry our other scorers.

Three years later Paul was snapped up by Crystal Palace - then in the top division - for £550,000. It proved an unhappy move, for virtually ignored by manager Steve Coppell he got only a handful of opportunities to play, and returned to Swindon ten months later for £225,000.





CB: The Giggs situation is a puzzling one isn't it. You would think a young player like him would be dying to show his skills on the International stage - yet he always seems to pull out. What is the problem do you know?

PB: It is strange because when he is with the boys he certainly seems to really enjoy the occasion. I think he is under a lot of pressure from his club and when they named the squad he wasn't fully fit. He hasn't played a full game for Manchester United this season any way, so perhaps at this particular time it was the smart decision.

CB: Do you feel that now we are in the Second Division it is somewhat hampering your progress at International level.

PB: I don't know really. Just the fact that I was called up for the squad suggests that this is not so. It was a big surprise I must admit, but I don't think it will make any difference. I have certainly got the experience and as long as I am playing well. I should be okay. Certainly the team being at the top of the table helps, because it keeps us in the limelight. So no, I don't think it is too much of a hindrance in this respect at all.

CB: Well things are certainly going well at club level aren't they?

PB: Very well, very well. It is amazing for me really, because I was only a substitute for the first game and it could have been a frustrating season for me, but I got into the side when Jason Drysdale was ruled out and haven't looked back since then. It is unfortunate that one man's misery is another man's happiness. I suppose. That's the way it is in this game. It is a cynical old game isn't it? - as we all know.

That is how I got my first Welsh cap really. Mark Bowen injured his knee and I got called up and played and stayed in the squad for a few games. Hopefully now with things going so well. I will keep my place when Jason is fully fit.

CB: Bradford City come here Paul with a host of experienced players in their squad. Do you agree they will present out toughest examination so far this season?

PB: I think you are right. We have already overcome a few hard tests so far and hopefully we will master this one. But I look at our

squad and think what a fantastic group it is. With the players we have, we should win the Division really. But of course it never works like that, but as long as we keep playing as we are, we should be able to make an impression. We have to take each game as it comes and go for it.

CB: Well you and your fellow defenders can take a big pat on the back for the defensive record is superb isn't it.

PB: This is the amazing thing. Perhaps we have conceded so many over the last two years our opponents have used up their quotas. Of course things are slightly different. Looking at the players I mean "Culs" is now back from injury - he was sorely missed last season without a shadow of doubt - I was out for four or five months and we have got a new centre-half in Mark Seagraves. You look at that and we have sort of got three new players in the back five. All things like this help.

We have also dropped down a standard and obviously there is a difference in the quality of the opposition. I think though to be fair we have played very well. Cambridge away was our worst defensive result. So the fact that we conceded four goals in eight games is fantastic.

No goals conceded yet away in the League. We use a Sweeper both home and away but I think perhaps it is of more value away where the onus is on the home side to attack. I don't think it hinders us at home, when we need to press and look to win the game, but perhaps it works a bit better for us away. But we have a strong squad, as has been seen when we have to make changes, and this is why I believe we are going to go all the way.

Swindon Town Ladies made an encouraging start to the new season when they visited Milton Keynes United. The Town, who last season gained promotion the Second Division of the Southern Region League, were well worth the 4-0 victory.

In the first half the Town had the edge and went ahead through Nadine Lloyd. After the interval Milton Keynes packed their defence and relied on the quick break. Although the Town were in command it was difficult to create clear cut chances and had to rely on long shots. Nadine Lloyd added two more to complete her hat-trick and Kerie Garwood added a fourth.

The Town's home pitch on the County Ground Extension has become a victim of the weather. That's something you don't write very often in September. The Council have said that the ground is very hard and cracks have opened up all over the pitch and playing on it with the vibration of 22 players, there is a chance that they will get worse, so making it dangerous for players. We have therefore been asked, as with other pitches in the area, not to play on it before October.

The ground has not had chance to recover from last season and the goal mouths were filled and reseeded during the summer and the new seed has not had chance to take, leaving a dust bowl at each end. We are currently looking for other grounds to play our home games on, until the County Ground Extension becomes available again. In addition to not being able to play home games on the pitch, the Monday night training sessions for 9 to 15 years olds, has had to be cancelled.

On Sunday 17th September, providing we can obtain a pitch, we entertain Cardiff Institute in the First Round of the Womens FA Cup. Last season, the first time that we entered, we reached the Third Round, beating Weymouth Town and Southampton, before being beaten 4-3 by Newbury.

This the 97th Football League Championship, kicked off with a new amendment to the substitution regulation that would have created a furore had it been suggested twenty years ago. Yet the move to allow a team to introduce three substitutes during a game is almost unnoticed it seems.

The utilisation of substitutes was long frowned upon by British football administrators who deplored the system that was widely operated by clubs on the Continent and in South America. It was seen by the sceptical Brits as an open book for cheating, yet how they came about such a ridiculous appreciation has always been beyond me. Surely a team plays its strongest eleven from the off. What dastardly advantage could be achieved by holding back your best man to be flung on late into the game?

Ludicrous, wasn't it? Yet the traditional British suspicion of anything foreign prevailed for donkeys years. with Joe Soap paying his gate money to see sometimes eleven play ten or even nine, when serious injuries depleted teams of their full compliment.

Of course such dramatic circumstances often conjured up great moments of drama and courage from the contestants, and one recalls in particular the 1956 F.A. Cup Final when that great German goalkeeper Bert Trautmann continued to defy the Birmingham attack after breaking his neck! Bravery and dedication beyond the call of duty for Manchester City. How such exploitation of a player's loyalty, courage and dedication could be described to good old fashioned English sportsmanship is quite frankly beyond me.

Indeed, the Cup Finals of the late 1950's seemed to be haunted by mishaps the following year Manchester United goalkeeper Ray Wood was crocked by an over zealous Roy McFarland and it lost them not only the Cup to Aston Villa, but the "double!" Then in 1958 Harry Gregg - who later became Lou Macari's assistant here - was badly injured by Nat Lofthouse and should not have continued in goal. In 1959 it was Roy Bright who broke a leg to ruin what was until then a splendid Final between Nottingham Forest and Luton Town. The following year Blackburn Rovers were reduced to ten-men when Whelan suffered a similar fate against Wolverhampton Wanderers.

It wasn't until 1967 that substitutes were allowed in the Cup Final, and this was two years after the Football League had somewhat reluctantly given ground and allowed one per team "for injuries only."If that wasn't a licence for cheating I don't know what is.

Keith Peacock, of Charlton Athletic, was the first substitute introduced to a League game for such purposes and of course the sham of players feigning injury so that they could be 'legitimately' replaced was eventually abolished when common sense prevailed and substitutes were allowed for any reason, and for the 1987-88 League campaign each club was allowed to deploy two substitutes in a game.

Now we have three and this is a much different ball game. It represents almost a third of the outfield and consequently gives managers a much wider scope to manipulate tactically, for example a team having two wingers and a midfield player on the bench could alter the pattern of a game drastically by throwing all three on together and changing from a oneman attack to three or four. The permutations are limitless and Steve McMahon is one who realises this and thus favours naming three outfield players instead of two and a goalkeeper.

Says Steve "I think in certain games, particularly at home, you can be a bit more flexible with outfield selections, you have to take into account the situation. Injuries dictate who you have on the bench to some extent. If you have a big squad then you have to look at it. If you are playing tough games then you have to look at that."

It all depends what position you are in the table and what position you are in with regard to injuries. It does give you a little bit of leeway. I'm sure that if you put three subs on at the same time it will change things about, but then if you have to do that obviously things are not going particularly well, I wouldn't like to be in that position."

Point taken, but whatever the manager decides substitutes are not just there to make up the numbers
