



Collecting Football Programmes

Part 12 of a series by John Lister, Editor of "Programme Monthly" magazine.

WHAT TO COLLECT-FINALS AND SEMI FINALS

There is no better medium for recording the big, set-piece events in the footballing calender, than matchday programmes. Hundreds of thousands of FA Cup Final issues are produced every year with football followers and TV viewers anxious to obtain a highly specific souvenir of the highlight of the football season. Similarly with important League games, such as the Liverpool v Arsenal and Spurs v Arsenal "deciders", to name but two, and for international matches at home and abroad.

As with all other programmes, the best source of big match issues older than 25 years is via dealers' catalogues, and to a lesser extent from dealers at programme fairs. Prices vary widely.


FA Cup Finals are the most popular collectable, and many seek to obtain one from every post-war final. Not difficult in terms of straight forward availability although some prices reflect relatively hard to obtain issues. The 1970 Chelsea v Leeds United replay at Old Trafford is traditionally a rare issue (£15) although just about every other Cup Final issue from the last 20 years will be priced below £2.


Cup Semi Finals form a varied and interesting big match

collection, and are of particular interest with regard to those quickly forgotten teams - the beaten semi finalists. Birmingham v West Brom (1968), Leicester v Sheffield United (1961), Burnley v Fulham (1962) and Preston v Swansea (1964) are, with respect to the clubs involved, unlikely semi final pairings in today's game, but the programmes from these fixtures can be picked up for a few pounds each and faithfully record the Cup aspirations of the clubs. In Scotland, just about every present day First and Second Division clubs has reached the semi finals of one of the two national cup competitions within the last 30 years, and programmes are readily available to testify to such flirts with glory.

To those traditional domestic highlights - Cup Finals, League Cup Finals and Semi Finals of both competitions, we now have Autoglass and Anglo-Italian Cup competitions (and their variously sponsored predecessors) with area finals and nationals finals at Wembley. In the 1970's, there were Watney and Texaco Cup (later Anglo Scottish Cup) competitions, which produced interesting, varied and very collectable programmes.







At long last a television deal would appear to have been made which will involve the lower division clubs with the intention that it will prevent a breakaway to establish a second division of the Premiership.

It's supposed to be a life saver for clubs such as Rotherham United but it remains to be seen whether they will really benefit to a much greater extent than they get at the moment.

As everyone would have anticipated, the First Division clubs are insisting on taking the vast majority of the £125m which has suddenly become available and when you divide what is left by the the bottom two division clubs, there will not be a vast amount to share out.

The compensation for the lower clubs is, of course, the fact that 12 league games will be televised on either Fridays or Sundays but that does not guarantee that every club will appear by a long stretch.

There is also the chance to be featured in one of the earlier cup games and the play-offs will get full coverage so that is very much a plus factor.

But will the deal mean that clubs' already hard pushed financial situations will be stretched even further as there is a strong possibility that spectators will be encouraged even more to stay at home and watch the box rather than visit the grounds?

Archie Gemmill and John McGovern have had an awful lot of injuries to contend with recently but I bet they haven't come across a problem like I heard about recently for a Sunday League team.

The outfit concerned had had a poor start to the season but they were gradually putting things together and pulling off a few good results when their manager had to make a substitution that surely no one had ever been faced with before.

One of his players turned out for the first hour of the game and then promptly announced that he would have to leave the field as he had to attend a christening!



Football wins with Littlewoods and the Football Trust every Saturday

Littlewoods Pools pay out millions to winners every week and together with Littlewoods Spot the Ball put over £30 million back into football every year through the Football Trust.

Football also receives £8 million a year for the use of fixtures on coupons and Littlewoods, the game's biggest benefactor, is the first sponsor of the FA Cup.

The Football Trust is helping the game at all levels. Clubs are building new grounds, stands, seating and roofing.







A Warm Welcome to SWINDON TOWN



The last visit to Millmoor by today's visitors was back in February 1987 when a Mick Gooding penalty was not enough to prevent the Millers slipping to a 2-1 defeat when Town were on their way to promotion from Division Three.

Five years later they embarked on a quite remarkable rise and fall in fortunes for Swindon went up into Division One from where they quickly gained promotion to the Premier League only for that stay to last just one season.

But of course, they can boast that they have been there and they achieved that status on merit but they spent the 1994/95 season in Division One again before falling straight into the Second Division where they have been the leaders for practically the whole of the season.

Town started life as a founder member of Division Three back in 1920 and they remained in the Southern Section of that bracket until regionalisation came to an end in 1958.

It took them until 1963 to climb up into Division Two where they stayed for two years before dropping back down again and after a four year spell in Division Three, it was back up to the second again in 1969 where they spent the next five years.

From 1974 to 1982 it was life in Division Three and in 1982 came a drop down into Division Four but they soon got on with their revival which looks like continuing this season.

Town's greatest achievement was in 1929 when they won the

League Cup and of course, Rotherham followers will need no reminding that Danny Williams was the manager who led them to glory. Today will be only the 11th time that Swindon have visited Millmoor and they have recorded four victories from those games so they have quite a good record here.

Town will be optimistic of continuing that record for they come to Millmoor with the Division best away record to their credit having already won six games on their travels. These victories have come at Hull, Carlisle, Brentford, Bristol Rovers, Brighton and Notts County while they have suffered just one defeat that coming in a 4-3 setback at Wrexham.

Swindon's two drawn away games have been at Bournemouth and Stockport while they have progressed into the third round of the FA Cup by beating Cambridge United and Cardiff City but they suffered a shock home defeat at the hands of Hereford United in the Auto Windscreens Shield.

After disposing of Cambridge on the Coca-Cola, Town came close to pulling off a surprise themselves when they were leading Blackburn Rovers before losing 3-2 at home then going down 2-0 at Ewood Park.

Visitors' PEN PICS

Fraser Digby (Goalkeeper)

Joined Manchester United from school as an apprentice twelve years ago, Fraser did not make the first team at Old Trafford and had loan spells at Oldham Athletic and at Swindon Town before joining us on a permanent basis in September 1986. Has now made over 400 first team appearances for the club although he did return to Manchester United for a loan spell during the season 1992/93.

Frank Talia (Goalkeeper)

Blackburn Rovers signed Frank from Sunshine George Cross in August 1992 and spent some time on loan at Hartlepool that season making 15 appearances. Unable to break into the first team at Ewood Park, Frank signed for Swindon in November 1995 having spent a month on loan earlier in the season.

Shaun Taylor (Defender)

An ever present in the team again last season for the second consecutive year, Shaun was signed from Exeter City in July 1991 for £200,000. He came into professional football late signing for The Grecians from Western League Bideford Town at the age of 23. He played 233 first team games for Exeter before he joined Swindon Town. He has just signed a new contract which will keep him at the County Ground until 1997.

Mark Seagraves (Defender)

Big strong central defender signed from Bolton Wanderers for £100,000 in June 1995, Mark forms a solid defensive partnership with shaun Taylor. A former Liverpool apprentice, Mark had a loan spell with Norwich City before a £100,000 move to Manchester City in 1986. In 1990 he moved to Burden Park but was unable to command a place in last seasons side who gained promotion to the Premiership.

Kevin Horlock (Defender)

Northern Ireland Full and U21 International, Kevin was signed from West ham United on a free transfer in the summer of 1992 and made his League debut in the 3-1 defeat at Portsmouth that year after injury sidelined regular full-back Paul Bodin.

Mark Robinson (Defender)

Signed as an apprentice for West Bromwich Albion on leaving school in June 1985 and made his Football League debut against Sheffield Wednesday on 22 April 1986. Surprisingly he was not offered a contract at the end of his apprenticeship and was picked up by Barnsley but had to wait until 1989 before earing an extended run in the first team. In March 1993 he was transferred to Newcastle United for £450,000 but injury and the vast squad at St James' Park prevented Mark from getting an extended first team run. In July 1994 he moved to Wiltshire for a then Swindon Town club record of £600,000.

Ty Gooden (Midfield)

Released by Wycombe Wanderers at the end of season 1992/93 when they were elected to the Football League. Ty was signed by John Gorman in December 1993 after a successful trial period at The County Ground. He made his Premiership debut as a substitute in the draw against West Ham United in March 1994.

Jason Drysdale (Defender)

A former England Youth International Jason signed in at The County Ground on transfer deadline day 23 March 1995 for a fee of £340,000 from Newcastle United. A former trainee with Watford where he won a F. A. Youth Cup winners medal, Jason made 160 appearances for The Horners scoring 13 goals once he signed professional forms in September 1988. A fee of £425,000 in August 1994 took him to Newcastle United but after less than seven months at St. James Park Jason joined Swindon having not been able to command a first team place.

Paul Allen (Midfield)

One of the renowned footballing Allen family, Paul was signed by Swindon Town on a free transfer in October 1995 having been released from Southampton. Previously with west ham United with whom he signed as an apprentice in August 1979 and went on to make 197 appearances scoring 11 goals. In June 1985 a £400,000 move took him across London to White Hart Lane where he made 377 appearances for Spurs scoring 28 goals. In September 1993 he transferred to southampton for a fee of £550,000 but with the departure of manager lan Branfoot, Paul was only to make 43 appearances for the Saints. During his time at The Dell he went on loan to Luton Town and Stoke City. Paul in an England 'B', U21 and Youth International.

Ian Culverhouse (Defender)

Signed from Norwich city at the end of December 1994 for a fee of £250,000 decided by a Football League tribunal after Norwich's requested of £900,000 was turned down by Swindon. Ian was a former apprentice at Tottenham Hotspur before turning professional and making his League debut as a substitute at Notts County on 21 February 1984. He had only made one full appearance while at White hart Lane before signing for Norwich City in October 1985 for £50,000. He featured in The Canary's UEFA Cup successes last season but was unable to agree new terms at Carrow Road.

Wayne Allison (Forward)

A Football League tribunal decided that Swindon Town had to pay £475,000 for the registration of Wayne from local rivals Bristol City, for whom he was top scorer last season, in July 1995. Born in Huddersfield, Wayne started his career as an apprentice at Halifax Town before moving to Watford for £250,000 in July 1989. The following year a £300,000 deal took him to Ashton Gate where he became a firm favourite with the fans.

Steve Finney (Forward)

Manager Steve McMahon knew of Steve when they were both at Manchester City and took Finney on a free transfer from Maine Road during the summer. He scored his first goal for Swindon Town on the clubs pre-season of Finland. Following an injury to Peter Thorne, Steve was given an unexpected run in the first team at the beginning of this season.

Peter Thorne (Forward)

Young striker signed from Blackburn Rovers for an undisclosed fee in January 1995. Was signed on as a trainee player at Ewood Park in July 1989 before progressing to the professional ranks in the 1991 close season. First team opportunities were restricted because of the form of the likes of Alan Shearer, Chris Sutton and Mike Newell and Peter relished the chance of a move to Swindon Town with the opportunity of regular action. His only first team appearance for Blackburn was when he came on as a substitute in the Charity Shield at Wembley against Manchester United. Made an impressive start in his career at Swindon Town scoring four goals in his first two games. Began this season by netting all five goals against TP Seinajoki on the pre-season tour in Finland.

MANAGER PROFILE STEVE McMAHON

Appointed Player/Manager at the end of November 1994 following John Gorman's departure. An Associated Schoolboy with Everton he was deeply hurt when they overlooked him when handing out apprenticeships - but he battled back and soon impressed enought o make his League debut at Sunderland in August 1980.


He went on to register 11 goals in 100 League games for Everton before a £300,000 transfer to Aston Villa in the summer of 1983. By then Steve was a seasoned England U21 International, having made his debut against The Republic of Ireland at Fratton Park in February 1981 and he continued in the squad to be part of England's European U21 Championship winning side in 1984. With Villa Steve proved to be a midfield general of the highest quality but his career in the Midlands was short lived as Kenny Dalglish splashed out £375,000 to land him in his first major deal for Liverpool in September 1985.

McMahon filled the position vacated by Graeme Souness and played his first game for Liverpool at Oxford. By the end of the season he had League and Cup medals to flaunt as Liverpool clinched the 'double'. Further trophies were added to his collection as Steve shared in Anfield's phenomenal success, while at international level Bobby Robson drafted him into the 1990 England World Cup squad as cover for Bryan Robson. He was capped 17 times.



On Christmas Eve 1991 Manchester City paid £900,000 for his registration and until his move to Swindon, McMahon has continued to demonstrate his agility at the highest level.

MAN TO WATCH JASON DRYSDALE



Bristol born Jason started his professional career at Watford in September 1988 as serving as a trainee and he soon established himself as a regular in the Hornets' first team.

He gained England Youth International honours and he went on to play 160 league and cup games for Watford scoring 13 goals from his left back position.

His fine form tempted Newcastle United to pay £425,000 for him in August 1994 but he was unable to force himself into the league team so he moved to his present club at a cost of £340,000 in March of this year.

Jason was to be Swindon's only transfer deadline signing and he made his debut in a 1-0 home defeat at the hands of Chariton Athletic.

He had been bought as stand-in for long term injury victim Paul Bodin but his first game saw him suffer an injury which left him hobbling on crutches after what turned out to be his one and only Town game last season.

Jason's farther Brian played over 300 games for Bristol City so he will be hoping to follow in his footsteps as he looks to help and guide Swindon to promotion.

WHAT'S INSTORE

There's just one game left before Christmas for the Millers after today and that comes next Saturday with a visit to Peterborough United where last season the game ended in a 2-2 draw.

It was the second away game under John McGoven and Archie Gemmill and it was nearly a second successive away win for them as the Millers were leading 2-1 after 20 minutes.

Posh had taken a second minute lead but goals from the two Shauns - Goodwin and Goater - put Rotherham in front only for Henry to hit his second goal of the game 11 minutes from time to deny the Millers a victory.

Earlier this season Rotherham pulled off a splendid 5-1 victory thanks to a couple of goals from Goater and one Trevor Berry, Mike Jeffrey and Andy Roscoe and that gave the Millers a record of seven unbeaten games against Peterborough.

Meetings between the two clubs only started in the league in 1974 and Posh have managed just three victories out of 15 games although they were 1-0 winners at Millmoor in the third round of the FA Cup in January 1970. The visit will revive memories for John McGlashan as it was from Peterborough that he joined the Millers so it's certain that he will be looking for a victory and he would also be happy to get on the scoresheet himself.

After the visit to London Road comes the first of the holiday games when Walsall are the visitors to Millmoor on Boxing Day for what will be their first league game here since 1991 when goals from Tony Cunningham and Julian Watts gave the Millers a 2-1 victory in Division Four.

That made it a winning double with Shaun Goater and Des Hazel on target in a 2-0 win at Bescor Stadium.

Rotherham were, of course, the last team to play against Walsall in the league game at their Old Fellows Park ground when a Mark Dempsey goal lead to a 1-1 draw.

Walsall won promotion from the Third Division last season when they finished as runners up to Carlisle United, two points in front of Chesterfield. The game will see the meetings of two Bermundian Internationals for in addition to our own Shaun Goater, Kyle Lightbourne is likely to be playing for the opposition and Shaun is sure to be wanting to get one over his compatriot.

FOOTBALL LEAGUE'S AUTONOMY ASSURED


Football League officials were "highly delighted" with Tuesday's announcement of a five-year deal with Sky Television - worth a total of £125 million. The deal, which has been agreed directly between The Football League and Sky Television, ensures the continued independence of the World's original League Football competition. It also maintains a link with the League's current broadcasting partner, ITV.

Although discussions had been held with both The Football Association and the FA Premier League about joint television agreements, The Football League have demonstrated their own negotiating skills by concluding a separate deal. The League's Controller of Broadcasting, Lee Walker, who moved quickly following the meeting of clubs two weeks ago to set the negotiations in motion, was delighted with the outcome. "It's a great deal," he said, "I am particularly pleased that the League's board of Directors received and approved the deal unanimously."

Football League President, Gordon McKeag, was also very positive: "This agreement breaks new ground for The Football League but at the same time assures us of our autonomy. Nevertheless, we intend responding positively to Graham Kelly's call for joint talks between ourselves, the Football Association and the Premier League, because there are a host of subjects which benefit from a unified approach."

"Now that we have successfully concluded our broadcasting arrangements for the next five years, we can get on with the business of addressing the other major issues facing the national game."

Commenting upon the sizeable increase in revenue which will be generated from the new deal with Sky Television, Mr McKeag said: "As we have emphasised all along, a significant proportion of any new monies which are generated from television will need to be directed towards the First Division in order to help them compete with the Premier League, but this deal will go a long way towards securing the financial future of the whole League."

MARTIN SCOTT

When a club sells a player who has come through its junior ranks, it is always very pleasing to see that player go on and do well at a higher standard and that has certainly been the case as far as Martin Scott is concerned.

He was born in Sheffield - he will be 28 next January - but he joined the Millers to serve his apprenticeship and signed for Rotherham as a full time professional in January 1986.

Left footed Martin was quickly showing his budding talents outside the first team and he soon displayed his ability to play in more than one position as he looked just as comfortable in midfield as he did at left back.

The following season Martin made his debut at left back when Phil Crosby suffered an injury and he made his debut on 14th March 1987 in a goalless draw at Bolton Wanderers in a Division Three game and he went on to play in all the remaining games giving him 12 appearances.

He was in the team from the start of the 1987/88 season and played in the first 18 league games and seven various cup games getting on the scoresheet for the first time. That came in the first round of the first leg of the Littlewoods Cup against Huddersfield Town but it was in the second round against Everton that most Rotherham fans will remember him for.

He took a free kick at Goodison Park that screamed into the net before Neville Southall could even blink but the Millers unfortunately finished on the wrong end of a 3-2 defeat mainly as a result of a dubious last minute penalty.

When Crosby returned in mid-November Martin only played one more league game that season and in 1988/89, he only played a total of 20 league and cup appearances including one as substitute.

The following season he totalled 38 league and cup games and he was attracting the attention of several clubs so it was no real surprise when he moved to Bristol City in December 1990 for £200,000.


His appearances that season had taken him a total of 120 plus one substitute for the Millers scoring seven goals and his fee has gone down in the record books as Rotherham's highest ever sale.


Scotty had been at Ashton Gate for four years, making 199 league and cup appearances and netted 16 goals before a huge fee of £750,000 took him to Sunderland last December.

He quickly won over the Roker crowd with his powerful tackling ability and his willingness to join up with the attack down the left and his overall defensive awareness and pace meant that Sunderland had finally solved a positional problem that had been evident for several seasons.

And he is well on the way to helping them up into the Premiership this season so everyone at Millmoor will be hoping he achieves that success - he deserves it.

Now We Are United

Extracts from the History of Rotherham United by Gerry Somerton - On Sale in the Millersports Shop now.

For a pleasant change the 1936/37 season got off to a good start with a 3-0 home win against Gateshead in front of a 6,000 crowd, and even though the second match saw a 2-1 defeat at Hull, the were said to be unlucky as they played, "some great football". But the early season promise was soon shattered with a heavy defeat at Darlington, followed by a dull goalless draw at home to Hull, before five successive League victories restored pride and hope after the team had been subjected to considerable barracking from the so-called supporters.

Two games saw a barrage of goals, for following a 6-0 home win against Halifax Town - with Brown hitting a hat-trick - Rotherham battled out a thrilling 4-4 draw at Millmoor against Hartiepool United in the first round of the FA Cup. Brown grabbed another three goals in a game which saw Rotherham leading 4-2 with only 20 minutes to go, but the visitors fought back to earn a replay which they won 2-0. There was some consolation in the attendances with 11,552 watching the first game and over 8,000 witnessed the replay.

The dawning of 1937 could not have brought a worst possible time to Millmoor, for the club went through a spell of 13 League and Cup games without a win to leave them floundering at the bottom of the table. But five wins (four of them in successive games) and a draw from the last nine games lifted them to a final 17th position and one of safety.

As a reward for winning those four games on the trot, the players were treated to a day out in the Dukeries before taking tea in Nottingham, and staying on in that city to watch Nottingham Forest v Tottenham Hotspur game in the evening. For another treat the players had spent a day the previous week on the Sitwell Park Golf course - goodness knows what the reward would have been if they had kept on winning!

No one managed an ever present record as 24 players were called upon, although Ernest Smith had the most consistent record, playing in every game after signing for the club in October. Goalscoring was a problem, not for the first or last time, with three players - Smith, Pedwell and Bastow claiming 55 goals between them, out of a total of 77. Pedwell left to join local rivals Doncaster Rovers, but United were happy with the deal as far as financial terms were concerned, for an incoming recruit was goalkeeper Harold Sleight who the previous season had made 16 Third Division appearances for Carlisle United. As the rebuilding continued another departure saw Leslie Heelbeck, who had been captain for the previous three seasons, join his home town club Scarborough. When the League met once again the "four up four down" proposal was rejected.

Instead of the expected heavy financial loss, outgoing transfers resulted in the club showing a small profit, although it was still in heavy debt to the tune of over £12,400.

Dependence for the 1937/38 season was principally placed in the hands of younger players for the days of a high outlay on new players had to be brought to an end, after previous excursions into the transfer market had not had their desired effect. There had been a time when big transfer fees were paid for players, including £1,000 (twice) and £400 (several times).

In an attempt to attract spectators to the ground, there was no increase in the price of season tickets. In fact, the club went even further by offering what amounted to hire purchase terms through local firms who deducted weekly sums from their employees wages, and when all the season ticket money had been collected they forwarded it to the football club. This scheme has already been successfully adopted at Messrs R. Jenkins and Co. Ltd., and it enabled a number of workmen to take out season tickets when they would otherwise not have been able to do so.

Lo and behold! Rotherham United won their opening two games of the 1937/38 season and that was something they had not achieved since 1930, and though they lost the third game, the next two also ended in victory to set in motion a season which was to become the best ever for Rotherham United up to that time.

Injuries soon took their toll and they led the early debut of James Mills who made rapid strides after joining the club, to finding his way into the first team. A native of Bramley, he had played the previous season with Dinnington but felt he was not making much progress, so he turned up at Millmoor one morning and smilingly asked for a trial. He was quickly nicknamed "Smiler" and he shaped up so well in his trial that he was put in the reserve team for the match against Shrewsbury Town at Millmoor before being successfully thrust into the first team.

Rivalry was renewed with Doncaster Rovers, and 18,000 fans turned up at Millmoor to see a 2-2 draw with the difference in the cost of the two teams showing a vast difference. Rovers had spent a massive £18,000 putting their team together, while United's players had not cost the proverbial "brass farthing".

With crowds on the increase and after experiencing some problems from the highly attended Doncaster game, new turnstiles were introduced down Millmoor Lane which would accommodate boys and ladies in one gate, and half time admissions to the ground through another.



My interest in English football started many years ago, at the beginning I mainly supported Leeds but after meeting Peter I am now a Millers fan also. Obviously I am delighted that my clubs have had good relations for many years and here I have in mind all the transfers between them and co-operation as in the recent example of Paul Pettinger: a Leeds goalkeeper loaned to cover Steve Farrely's injury period. However in years of late there have been many such similar examples which I will now write about.

I am sure not many people will remember the first Leeds players to come to Millmoor, they were in fact HERBERT LOUNDS & HAROLD MILLERSHIP (a Millers connection there!) which was in 1919. In those days both teams played under different names: Leeds City & Rotherham County. For fans today the transfer sums are a shock even taking into account te inflation. Lounds cost 250 and Millership 1000! The prices were decided by a tribunal when Leeds City was dismissed from the league after a financial scandal.

In the following years the next transfers included amongst others: in 1949 when JIMMY RUDD came to Millmoor from Elland Road. 1960 saw DON WESTON at Millmoor who four months after coming from Leeds scored twice against his former club, helping the Millers to a 4-3 win.

Moving on to more recent years we all remember ANDY

WILLIAMS who in 1988 left for Leeds for £170,000 and after playing for a few years there, part of the time in which he was out injured, returned to Millmoor. I am sure Millers fans will need no reminding what happened to JOHN BUCKLEY at Millmoor in that tragic match against Plymouth, well even John played at Leeds. It is a tragedy that John's playing career came to such an end.

Now on to IMRE VARADI, a good all-round goalscorer, and in his time at Leeds he was more of a reserve player but he did get some important goals including at Leeds' first match back in Division One o few years ago. In Rotherham's current squad is BOBBY DAVISON one of Leeds' greatest scorers in their last two years in Division Two. Let's also not forget about NORMAN HUNTER who after a super career at Leeds was the manager here from 1985-87.

On an ending note how many Millers fans know that current joint manager JOHN McGOVERN was also a Leeds player? He played for Leeds in the 1974/75 season and played just 4 matches after which he left with Brian Clough for Nottingham Forest where he had 7 successful years. I hope that good relations between Leeds & Rotherham will continue, In a future article I will write about interesting matches between Leeds and Rotherham.

Good afternoon everyone and a warm welcome to SWINDON TOWN and their supporters who have made the journey north.

I attended a Commercial Managers meeting recently and it was most worrying to hear every club complaining about lost revenue due to the National Lottery. The weekly amount now wagered on the Lottery is almost £30 million. In addition the scratch off cards are also coining in huge amounts. That £30 million plus per week is hitting many organisations. It is not an extra £30 million that is being generated. I have heard some most disturbing stories recently of people

cutting back on food on the table, not paying bills etc. Football and other sporting organisations are suffering with Lottery and lifeline sales, some worse than others. 
