



Ithough generally accepted that the club was founded in 1881, it has to be said that there is no evidence that the name "Swindon Town" was used by founder the Rev. William Pitt, until two years later on the amalgamation with another local side.

riginal members of the southern League in 1894, the Robins made a calamitous start, finishing bottom after taking only nine points from their eighteen games

From those humble beginnings, there have been notable successes along the way. Three seasons ago, under the managership of Glenn Hoddle, the Wiltshire club

finally made it to the top flight for the first time in their history. Promotion to the F.A. Premiership was achieved after a thrilling 4-3 victory over Leicester City at Wembley in the Play-off Final.

That achievement made up for the profound disappointment experienced two years previously when the club thought they had secured a First Division place following a 1-0 win over Sunderland at Wembley. On that occasion,

Swindon did not get the chance of kicking a ball in anger amongst the country's best - they were demoted by the Football Association following financial irregularities.

Previously their most memorable moment also came at Wembley, way back in the 1968-69 season. Then, as a Third Division club, they lifted the League Cup with a 3-1 extra-time victory over mighty Arsenal. Even then there was disappointment.

The club were not able to take their place in Europe in the Fairs Cup because they were a Division
Three club. They did, however, get a chance to play in Europe in the following season. They were entered in the newly organised Anglo-Italian Cup, and won the tournament, defeating Napoli 3-0 in the Final in Italy.

Original members of the Third Division South, along with the majority of their Southern League

rivals, in 1920, the Wiltshire club stayed in the section throughout, winning a place in the newly-formed Third Division in 1958.

Five years later, Swindon experienced Second Division football for the first time, and from then on, they yo-yoed between the two divisions for the next twenty years.

In 1986, there was a brief dalliance with the Fourth Division, but at this juncture, the fortunes of the club took a turn for the better.

The revival was started by Lou Macari, taken on by Ossie Ardiles and then Glen Hoddle. Hoddle's untimely departure to Chelsea left John Gorman cutting his managerial teeth in the F.A. Premiership. He and his players found it a frustrating experience, but Swindon won many friends for the football they produced.

Following a further struggle last season in the First Division, Gorman was replaced by STEVE MCMAHON. Although he was unable to stave off relegation, he immediately started the rebuilding of the side, and will be hopeful that his team can maintain the form it has shown so far this season and carry off the Second Division title, and thus make an immediate return to the higher section.

In recent weeks, his squad has been hit by injuries, but the manager has brought in several players to augment his squad, and these are likely to be available today.

Goalkeepers

Former Manchester United apprentice FRASER DIGBY is the first choice 'keeper, and has made over 350 first team appearances since joining the club in September 1986.

He has warded off a challenge from FRANK TALIA, who after a loan spell with the club has now joined the club on a permanent basis. The Australian-born custodian was signed from Blackburn Rovers.

Defenders

In recent weeks, the Swindon defence has been weakened by the loss of skipper SHAUN TAYLOR and his central defensive partner, MARK SEAGRAVES.

Taylor returned to action last Saturday in the 2-1 home win over Carlisle United, the former Exeter City player, signed in July 1991, was an ever-present in the previous two seasons. Shaun came into League football late, having been signed by **Exeter City from Western** League Bideford at the age of twenty three, but has more than made up for lost time. He is one to be watched at set pieces.

Seagraves, out with a back injury is nearing fitness, and could be in contention today. The big,

A Football League Tribunal decided that Swindon should pay Bristol City a £475,000 fee when the Huddersfield-born striker moved to the County Ground just before the start of this season.

He started his career at Halfax Town, before moving to Watford for a £250,000 fee in July 1989. The following year, a £300,000 deal took him to Ashton Gate, where twice he was leading goalscorer. He has already justified the fee placed on his head, by not only scoring his fair share of goals, but laying on goals for his colleagues.

strong central defender came to the club from Bolton Wanderers in the close season for a £100,000 fee. A former Liverpool apprentice, he has also had a spell at Manchester City.

Thirty-one-year-old IAN **CULVERHOUSE** has been a regular since his arrival from Norwich in December 1994. He began his career as an apprentice at Tottenham before moving to Norwich City in October 1985. He cost the Robins a tribunaldecided fee of £250,000 after the Canaries had asked for £900,000, whilst at Carrow Road, lan made more than 300 appearances.

Injury has also restricted the appearances of Bristol-born JASON DRYSDALE. He was signed from Newcastle United for a fee of £340,000 in March 1995. a former trainee with Watford, Jason won England Youth caps and made 160 appearances and scored thirteen goals for the Hornets before a £425,000 move to the North-East. After seven months at St James' Park, Jason returned South after failing to break into the first team at Newcastle.

Welsh international fullback PAUL BODIN is now in his second spell at the County Ground. He was originally signed in 1988 from Newport County for a £25,000 fee, and moved to Crystal Palace three years later for a fee of £350,000. within ten months, he was back at Swindon after failing to command a regular first team berth at Selhurst Park. He, too. hasn't had the best of luck with injuries.

Another of Swindon's defenders, MARK



ROBINSON, also joined the club from Newcastle United. That was back in March 1993, and he has been a regular since. An adaptable player, who can play in midfield, Mark was an apprentice at West Bromwich, but after surprisingly being released from the Hawthorns, made his name in League football at Barnsley.

Injuries have given EDWIN MURRAY opportunities this season. He has been on the club's books since signing as an Associate Schoolboy in 1988.

Midfield

The manager himself, STEVE McMAHON has been influential in this area, but a knee operation last month has sidelined him for the time being.

He acted quickly to bring in Everton midfielder TONY GRANT on loan, and he is likely to be in Town's engine room today. Grant signed professional forms at Goodison Park in 1993. and is a promising youngster who is looking to break into the first team there. A combative player, he has already figured prominently in his games for the Robins.

Alongside, the experienced MARTIN LING has re-established himself after injury problems. Like PAUL BODIN, he is in his second spell with the club. He originally joined the club from Exeter City for £25,000 in July 1986. His stay was a short one - just

over three months later, he was on his way to Southend. It was in July 1991 that he returned to the County Ground when Glenn Hoddle paid £15,000 to secure his services.

Northern Ireland international KEVIN HORLOCK has revelled in a more forward role this season, and has been amongst the goals. Signed on a free transfer from West Ham United in the summer of 1992, he began his career as a full-back, and has deputised there this term when Bodin has been missing.

Cyprus-born WAYNE
O'SULLIVAN also
started his career as a
full-back, and until
recently has been a
regular in the Swindon
midfield, in the last few
games, however, he
has had to be content
with a place on the
bench.

That's because former Wycombe player TY GOODEN has forced himself into the first team reckoning. Released by the League's new boys in 1993, he was signed after a successful trial at the County Ground.

Youngsters LEE
MIDDLETON, JAMIE
PITMAN and BEN
WORRALL are all
pushing for inclusion,
and all three have had
substitute opportunities
this term.

Forwards

Up front, manager McMahon has paired WAYNE ALLISON (see One to Watch) and PETER THORNE in recent games. Thorne has had a spell out of the side through injury, but on his recent return to the team, he has regularly appeared on the goalchart, and indeed, scored twice against the Swans a month ago in his side's 3-0 victory at the County Ground.

His signing from Blackburn Rovers at the start of the 1995 season was inspirational, and he has regularly found the net. His return to the side means that another of McMahon's bargain acquisitions, STEVE FINNEY has had to make do with a place on the substitute's bench.

Finney was a team mate of McMahon's at Manchester City, and was signed on a free transfer from the Maine Road club. Despite his recent absence from the side, he has already notched double figures so far this season.





Past Times

SEASON 1956/57

The club was heavily criticised in the local press during the close season for continually adopting the policy of replacing quality players with cut priced replacements. Derek King, a former Spurs junior had been purchased for a £3,000 fee, but after only five League games, announced his retirement through bad knee injury.

Tom Kiley had still not recovered fully from his injury, and the Swans despite providing tremendous goal scoring entertainment, leaked goals consistently, which ultimately prevented them from establishing themselves as genuine promotion candidates.

During the season the Swans scored ninety League goals, but also conceded ninety goals. It came as no surprise towards the end of the season that players started to ask for transfers, stating that the club had no ambition for top flight football, and were content to stay as a Second Division outfit. 'Speculate to accumulate' was a phrase continually being mentioned even in those days.

By the end of the season, the Swans found themselves in tenth place, with four players scoring goals in double figures. Yet again, unfortunately, the Swans lost in the Final of the Welsh Cup, losing to Wrexham 2-1 at Ninian Park. Ivor Allchurch enjoyed a purple patch of goal scoring midway through the season, with seven goals from eight League

Another significant move by the Directors in the close season saw the appointment of Trevor Morris to the General Manager's post, a move which ultimately saw Ron Burgess resign from the Team Manager's role in August, claiming his position had been reduced to that of Assistant Manager.

> Davies arrived from Newcastle as part of the Allchurch deal, with Webster being bought from Manchester United for a £6,000 fee. Overall the Swans still had a surplus of nearly £19,000 on the Allchurch deal.

The Club's Directors at this moment felt more optimistic about it's future, with the Club's overdraft being substantially reduced.

Despite the disappointment from the supporters over the likes of Allchurch and Jones leaving the Vetch, plans were drawn up to cover the North Bank, at a cost met by the the Swans' Supporters' Club.

At the turn of 1959, an interesting statistic emerge out of the team fielded by the Swans at Fulham - all eleven were internationals - eight full and three youth caps. That side

King, Thomas (Dai), Griffiths, Hughes, Nurse, Kennedy, Allchurch (L), Davies, Charles, Palmer, Webster.

Graham 'Flicka' Williams arrived from Everton in February, and he quickly became a firm favourite with the supporters with his electric wing play. Roy Saunders was signed from Liverpool a month later, in an exchange deal with Des Palmer, and he was to start a long career on and off the field with the Swans eventually seeing his son Dean Saunders make his League debut for the club as well.


March also saw the eventual move of Mel Charles to Arsenal from the Vetch, when he was sold to the Gunners for a fee in the region of £43,000, plus the arrival of Peter Davies in part exchange. It was no coincidence that, by the end of the season, attendances had fallen away alarmingly, with only 8,000 watching the last home game of the season against Liverpool.



DIVISION TWO Crewe lose ground

On Ice

After a midweek setback at Bradford when they lost 2-1. Crewe's hopes of maintaining the pressure on today's visitors to the Vetch, Swindon were literally put on ice. Crewe were due to play strugglers York City at Gresty Road, but a heavy overnight frost caused a postponement.

It gave Steve McMahon's side the chance to increase their lead at the top to six points as goals from strike duo Peter Thorne and Wayne Allison gave the Wiltshiremen a 2-1 home victory over Carlisle United at the Count Ground.

Rory Delap did pull a goal back near the end for the visitors, but the honours were taken by United's talented young keeper Tony Caig. He. pulled off vital saves to keep his side in touch.

County Close Gap

A Tony Battersby goal, his first since his £100,000 move from Sheffield United at the turn of the year, brought Notts County a 1-0 win at home to Peterborough United and closed the gap on second placed Crewe to just one point.

"I'm relieved to have got off the mark. People have told me that the first goal for a new club is always the hardest to find. Now that I've got it, hopefully it will be the first of many." said the young striker.

Peterborough manager

Mick Halsall felt his side deserved a point.

"A draw would have been a fair reflection. Having said that, there are a fair few teams who say they should have got something from their games with County but not many of them have. You don't get results week in and week out by being lucky."

In - And Out!

The subject of a million pound approach from Barry Fry's Birmingham City, Bristol Rovers' forward Marcus Stewart slotted home his nineteenth goal of the season from the penalty spot to clinch a 2-0 home victory over Walsall.

The Saddlers, who had conceded only two League goals in the last three months, had earlier seen Peter Beadle grab his fifth goal in nine League starts and defender Charlie Ntamark sent off.

Rovers manager John Ward commenting on Stewart's possible departure said "I'm hoping Marcus will still be with us at the end of the season, but it's not my money running this club."

Denis Unhappy

Oxford United fresh from clinching a first away win in the League a few days earlier had manager Dennis Smith furning after going down 1-0 to Rotherham.

"We should have wrapped the game up in the first half." he said, "Then we were well on

top and I'm annoyed with my players."

The win was the Millers fifth successive victory, a run that earned joint managers Archie Gemmill and John McGovern the January Divisional Manager of the Month Award.

Cherries Go Wandering

Bournemouth's play-off hopes were dented by a 3-2 home defeat by Wycombe Wanderers, who did their own aspirations no harm at

Cherries manager Mel Machin is determined to keep the momentum going, despite this setback and is hoping that he can extend the loan period of young Manchester United player Chris Casper.

Jeff's Worth A Mint

Brighton have now gone seven games at the Goldstone without a victory and the Seagulls are in trouble at the wrong end of the Second Division.

However, two Jeff Minton goals salvaged them a point against Wrexham in a 2-2 draw.

Manager Jimmy Case was obviously relieved that his side had rescued a point, but refuses to panic.

"There's nothing like a few victories to lift the spirits, and we've a bit jittery because we badly need to win before our own fans."

Tigers Bank On Steve

Hull City picked up a valuable, if surprising, point at promotion chasing Blackpool thanks to an uncharacteristic mistake by the home side's keeper Steve Banks.

Banks let Neil Allison's shot - the Tigers only ontarget effort throughout the ninety minutes through his legs to cancel out Rick Holden's goal.

Get Behind Us

Burnley slipped to another defeat, this time at Brentford, and lost more ground in their battle for at least a playoff place. Nicky Forster's goal gave the Bees a welcome three points and prompted disgruntled Burnley fans to call for the head of manager Jimmy Mullen. The Clarets have now won only once this year.

Midfielder Paul Weller sprung to the defence of his manager. "It was frustrating because we felt we had done enough to get at least a point It was good to hear the fans back the team, but we must hope they continue to back us all."







Talking Point

hey say that football never really throws up any unique news; that it is often a used formula or a variation on a theme.

But over the last few weeks, those doubters must surely concede that Newcastle's possible signing of Faustino Asprilla from Parma suggests that we are in for a new dimension and era in our game.

One minute, Parma's talented, but apparently temperamental, forward is on his way to join Kevin Keegan's 'Toon Army', the next the deal is off, the player is suffering from a chronic knee injury: he is unlikely to obtain a work permit because of a previous misdemeanour; there are threats to his safety, etc, etc...

We await with baited breath to see whether the wranglings can be sorted out satisfactorily as Keegan desperately looks to net his man.

It does seem a little immoral for Newcastle to be paying a fee of nearly seven million

pounds, not forgetting a million pound signing-on fee. On top of that Mr Asprilla will also be earning a reputed £30,000 per week. There are a lot of clubs in the lower divisions, who would love to clear that out of today's attendance!

Where will it all end? How does it effect the poorer clubs?

Let's face it, in the past it has been the lower divisions who have provided the talent to these 'giants'. Very often, the smaller clubs have to plough their resources into producing their own players in the hope of finding 'the jewel in the crown' to sell on.

All the way down the scale, costs have escalated. In the quest for success, the poorer managements will take a chance and meet players' demands for higher wages and take a chance that riches will follow.

It has to be said that not many clubs can be that successful every season, and quite often, the financial burden can cripple those clubs. It is at such clubs that drastic reductions have to be made.
Only a few weeks ago, for instance,
Birmingham City dispensed with their
Centre of Excellence - preferring to buy their future players.

Elsewhere, playing staffs have to be reduced and even coaching staffs are pruned - all to the detriment of those clubs, and indeed, the game in general.

The future of our game must surely be invested in the Youth levels and an organised system for the production of players. To do so, good quality coaching has to be provided to speed the process, or at the very least, assure its success.

Currently, the step up from the Youth set-up to full professional requires the bridging of a fairly wide gulf. Perhaps there needs to be another rung on the ladder of progress. Maybe, there needs to be more attention focussed on the Under 21 or 22 age group.

These are the formative years in their professional lives.

Having learned and developed the basics, it is at this stage that they need encouragement, and continuing guidance. They must also have the reliability of the respective Club Coach to be there as a confidant, as a shoulder to cry on when things are not going well.

Over the years, the Swans have a fine record of producing their own and have gleaned the rewards from those going on to greater things. We have all read of the concerns of clubs like this one regarding poaching.

It is well known that it goes on; Manchester United were found guilty only a week or two ago. There must be scope for the smaller clubs to go on producing their own players. It is their lifeline.

They'll never be able to afford the likes of Asprilla, Juninho and the rest. They can only hope to reap the rewards of their own endeavours.

PLAYING CONNECTIONS

H (Harry) Morris can lay claim to the first transfer deal between the Swans and Swindon, when he was sold by the Swans to Swindon in June 1926 for a £300 fee. He made only eight League appearances for the Swans after signing from Millwall for a £400 fee in May 1925.

Local product Brinley
Humphries joined the Swans
in June 1923, but after only
eleven League appearances in
four seasons joined the
Wiltshiremen in June 1927 for
a £250 fee.

Sid Lawrence was capped in his first full season with the Swans - in 1932 against Northern Ireland, and during his career at the Vetch Field. made a total of eight appearances for Wales. Signed from Welsh non-league side Penrhiwceiber, Sid was a skillful, reliable defender for the Swans, making 312 League appearances and scoring 11 goals. In 1939, along with Bill Imrie, he was persuaded by former Swans manager Neil Harris to join Swindon Town.

Imrie was a record signing at £1,500 for the Swans, following his transfer from Newcastle United in July 1938. He made 27 League appearances during his only season at the Vetch, and was sold to Swindon twelve months later for an £800 fee.

Full-back **Terry Elwell** arrived at the Vetch from Barry Town in August 1948, and until his transfer to the County Ground in July 1952, made 48 League appearances for the Swans. In two seasons for the Robins, he made a further 61 League appearances.

Two Vetch Field heroes **Mel Nurse** and **Billy Lucas** both have dual links.

Lucas was bought by Bill McCandless for a record £11,000 transfer fee in March 1948 from Swindon Town to provide the missing link in the side that would claim the Third Division Championship in the following season. Billy led by example; the general linking up with his defence and attack. During a career at the Vetch that spanned 203 League games, with 35 goals, the value of his leadership qualities were only truly noticed when he left the Vetch to join Newport County as Player/Manager, Welsh international Billy returned to the Vetch as Manager in 1967 when the club was struggling to avoid relegation from the Third Division. He was unable to save them, but he was instrumental in blooding and bringing on a whole clutch of youngsters at the Vetch. He resigned in March 1969 to devote more time to his business in Newport.

Mel Nurse is surely one of the Swans' great central defenders, making 256 League appearances for the club between 1955 and 1971. He made his debut for the Swans in the 1955-56 season, and three seasons later was a regular at the heart of the defence. In October 1959, he was awarded his first Welsh cap, winning a further eleven in his career.

Mel was sold to Middlesbrough for £25,000 in September 1962, and three years later, moved to Swindon. After 122 League appearances there, he returned to the Swans for a small fee, helping them to promotion from Division Four in 1970. He retired twelve months later, and is now a

successful businessman in the City.

Pat Terry scored 23 League goals from 60 appearances for Swindon between February 1967 and June 1968. A consistent goalscorer with every club he played for, Pat stayed just eight months at Swansea in 1958, scoring nine goals from 17 League appearances.

Former Nottingham Forest, Stoke City and Sheffield United midfielder Paul Richardson joined Swindon as Player/Coach in July 1983, making seven League appearances for them during the 1983-84 season. An experienced player with over 400 League appearances to his name, Paul was released by the Robins in September 1984, and joined Swansea on a non-contract basis. After only twelve League games, he was released by the Swans.

Ray McHale's longest spell in football with one club came at Swindon between the period September 1976 and May 1980. Whilst at the County Ground, he made 173 League appearances and scored 33 goals. By the time he was appointed manager with Scarborough in 1988. the energetic, hard-working midfielder had made almost 600 League appearances. Ray joined the Swans from Sheffield United in January 1985 on a free transfer, and, until his release in May 1986, after making 47 League appearances, always gave a committed, one-hundred per cent performance for the club. Not noted for his goalscoring achievements during his time at the Vetch. Ray did score a hat-trick for the Swans during a Welsh Cup tie at Haverfordwest.

Central defender **David Cole** arrived at the Vetch Field shortly after the start of the 1984-85 season following his release from Sunderland. A tall, slight defender, David made just eight League appearances for the Swans before he was released on a free transfer to Swindon. There, in the following season, he made 44 League appearances for the Robins as they walked away with the Fourth Division Championship

with an eighteen-point margin from runners-up Chester. In February 1986, David was transferred to Torquay United after a total of 69 appearances for Swindon.

Former Trowbridge Town striker, Bryan Wade joined the Swans from Swindon during the 1988-89 close season for a small fee. He scored ten goals, six in Cup matches, in his first season at the Vetch, but after a disappointing second season, was given a free transfer. Bryan's first season in League football with Swindon had seen him score ten goals from 34 League appearances as the club swept all before them during that title campaign in 1985-86.

Jimmy Gilligan was only 22 when he joined Swindon from Grimsby Town. During a short nine-month stay at the County Ground, Jimmy scored five goals from seventeen League appearances. By the time he joined the Swans from Portsmouth in August 1990 for a fee of £175,000, he was a proven goalscorer, and it was a huge blow to them when he was forced to retire from football because of a serious back injury midway through the 1992-93 season. In 62 League games for the Swans, Jimmy scored 23 goals.

Swansea-born midfielder **Gary Emmanuel** joined Swindon from Bristol Rovers in a player-exchange deal in July 1981, and during his stay at the County Ground made 111 League appearances for the Robins. Following a later spell with Bristol City, Gary joined the Swans in September 1985, and prior to retiring from football following a back injury, made 109 League appearances for the Swans.

Joey Beauchamp was a hit with the Swans during his loan spell at the Vetch from Oxford United midway through the 1991-92 season, scoring twice in five League games. He joined Swindon from West Ham in August 1994 after only two months at Upton Park, but after making 42 League appearances for the Robins, returned to Oxford.

Nevertheless, I am sure that the new Chairman would have taken some heart from our performance and would have been suitably impressed.
