Much as I would like to be in a position to enter the transfer market, that is simply out of the question at present. We must make do with the players we have already got - and there is some real quality here - and those that we can secure on loan or at no cost.

We are constantly monitoring the situation on the continent, particularly in Scandinavia where the season has just finished, and have already had three players on trial here.

In addition we have secured the services on loan of two proven Premiership performers in the shape of Jason Cundy and Gerry Creaney and I am sure they will both prove to be valuable additions to our squad.

I feel that Jason has given us the strength and aggression at the back we have sometimes been missing this term, while Gerry's understanding with James Scowcroft and the midfielders is getting more and more promising by the game.


Since my last programme notes we have played host to Southend, and I was disappointed to only get a draw against the Shrimpers.

In the first-half I felt we played some good football and were much the stronger side, with Mick Stockwell, in particular, in great form. 



Spotlight on...

As Ipswich Town's Professional Footballers' Association (PFA) delegate, Geraint Williams has found his name firmly in the headlines this season.

There has been something of a Mexican stand-off between the PFA and the Football League in 1996/97, following the massively increased TV income generated by Sky Television's exclusive deal with the Clubs outside the Premiership.

Players' Player

The League have opted out of their long-standing agreement to pay the PFA 10% of all television earnings; while the players' union have demanded that the amount is paid in full.

Welsh midfielder Geraint has found himself stuck in the middle, conveying information between the PFA and the players - just months after taking over the union role from Town's previous delegate, defender Neil Thompson.

After months of haggling between the two parties, and the threat of strike action during televised games by the players, there at last seems to be an acceptable solution in sight.

"We have received a letter from the PFA
Management Committee, who have agreed in
principle to a deal with the Football League's
representatives," explains Geraint. "Now that offer
has to be accepted by the full Football League
committee and once that happens we can just get on
with the football."

As a player famous for his commitment, and his hatred of missing matches, 34-year-old Geraint will be glad to see the back of the possibility of strike action - although he is anxious to underline his belief in the threat.

"To be honest, a strike doesn't benefit anyone," he says. "I don't think the players really want to strike, but it is vital that we have the ability to threaten that as a last course of action if we feel our interests are not being properly looked after."

Away from his high-profile start as the 'Arthur Scargill of Portman Road', mild-mannered Geraint is keen to promote the positive aspects of the PFA - such as vocational training for players, sickness benefits and the suchlike.

"If any of the lads are released, or want to move to another Club, then I can put them in touch with the relevant people at the PFA to help them secure the best deal and also to give practical advice," explains Geraint.

"Also a lot of players are interested in re-training and going on vocational courses and I can sort out all that. In fact I'm doing a computer IT course myself at the moment, which I'm thoroughly enjoying.



"For young lads, particularly, it is more and more important. A lot of youngsters don't make it in this game, but the cost of doing a vocational course can sometimes put them off.

"The PFA are there to help with those costs and generally enable the players to get themselves a better education outside the game just in case it all goes wrong for them.

"I've been quite surprised really. When I took over from Neil Thompson he said: 'It's a doddle, you don't have to do much', but it's only when you get involved that you realise how active the PFA are and how much good work they do for the players in all aspects of life."

National Pride

Wales' 7-1 thrashing by Holland in their recent World Cup Qualifier reverberated all around the football world - and nowhere more so than in the Williams household.

A proud Welshman, Geraint is the first to admit that the Welsh were well beaten on the day.

"I'd watched the match at Cardiff Arms Park a few weeks earlier," he says. "And we were 1-0 up going into the last fifteen minutes, ended up losing 3-1 and it could easily have been six or seven.

"It was always going to be a tough task over there, but I didn't expect it to be quite as bad as it was - I haven't actually watched the game, but I understand that Neville Southall made a few great saves as well, so it could have been even worse.

"But the manager has come in and made some decisions, and picked the people he thinks can do the job. I would have to say I disagree with some of the choices he's made, but he's the manager and that's what he is paid for."

Geraint has worn the red of his country on no fewer than 13 occasions, most recently as a substitute in a 2-1 defeat against Germany last October - so does he expect to be back in national colours before long?



Scott DUNCAN

Long-serving Scottish manager Scott Duncan guided Town into the Football League in 1938 and to the Third Division (South) title in 1953/54. As a skilful outside-right, he joined Newcastle from home town Dumbarton in March 1908 and helped to win the League Championship in 1908/09. Subsequently with Rangers, Dumbarton (again) and Cowdenbeath, he became Hamilton's secretary-manager in

July 1923 and rejoined Cowdenbeath in a similar capacity in October 1925. He took charge of Man Utd in June 1932 and plotted their 1935/36 Second Division title success, resigning in November 1937 to replace Mick O'Brien at Ipswich. Relegation in 1954/55 marked the end of his record reign at Portman Road, although he continued as secretary for three years before retiring to Helensburgh and died in October 1976.

John ELSWORTHY

Tall, long-serving left-half John Elsworthy (pictured right) was the only Ipswich player who won Championship medals in the Third Division (South) in 1953/54 and 1956/57, Second Division in 1960/61 and First Division in 1961/62. Initially an amateur inside-left with Newport County, Scott Duncan signed him as a professional in May 1949 and he made his League debut at home to Notts County seven months later. Partnering Tom Garneys in attack, he was a revelation after switching to left-half in 1955 and represented the Third Division (South). He scored 44 goals in 396 League outings prior to retiring in May 1965 and had a joint testimonial with Jimmy Leadbitter against Arsenal in March 1966. Still living locally, he was a grocer before running Felixstowe Road Post Office for 24 years until retiring in May 1993.



One of only nine English clubs to feature in all three major European Club competitions, Ipswich Town trounced Floriana 14-1 on aggregate to meet AC Milan in the European Cup First Round in 1962/63 and defeated AZ 67 Alkmaar and SW Innsbruck en route to a European Cup-Winners' Cup Third Round clash with Johan Cruyff's Barcelona in 1978/79. Ipswich qualified for the UEFA Cup eight times in ten years under Bobby Robson, beating Aris Salonika, Bohemians, Widzew Lodz, St. Etienne and FC Cologne to face AZ 67 Alkmaar in the 1980/81 two-legged final. Goals from John Wark (2), Frans Thijssen (2) and Paul Mariner gave the following team a 5-4 aggregate victory: Paul Cooper, Mick Mills, Steve McCall, Frans Thijssen, Russell Osman, Terry Butcher, John Wark, Arnold Muhren, Paul Mariner, Alan Brazil, Eric Gates.

FA CUP WINNERS

After beating Cardiff, Hartlepool, Bristol Rovers, Millwall and West Brom en route, the following Ipswich Town side faced Arsenal in the FA Cup Final at Wembley on 6th May 1978: Paul Cooper, George Burley, Mick Mills, Brian Talbot, Allan Hunter, Kevin Beattie, Roger Osborne (sub: Mick Lambert), John Wark, Paul Mariner, David Geddis, Clive Woods, Ipswich controlled the game throughout, with Woods tormenting Pat Rice, Geddis forcing Sammy Nelson ever further back and central defenders Hunter and Beattie repelling Arsenal's infrequent attacks. Wark blasted two drives against the same post and Pat Jennings brilliantly saved Burley's header before Osborne scored from Geddis' cross in the 78th minute. Overcome with emotion, Osborne was substituted as Ipswich held out for their sole FA Cup triumph to date.

Jim FEENEY


Popular ex-Northern Ireland international full-back Jim Feeney featured prominently in Town's 1953/54 Third Division (South) title success and FA Cup run. He helped Linfield to win the FAI Cup three times before following Sammy McCrory and Norman Lockhart to Swansea Town in December 1946. A big favourite at the Vetch Field, he was one of several Irish players who starred in Swansea's 1948/49 Third Division (South) title campaign. Scott Duncan paid £10,500 for him and McCrory in March 1950 and he partnered the likes of Len Tyler, Dave Deacon and Basil Acres in Ipswich's defence, making 214 League appearances prior to retiring in April 1956. He subsequently returned to Belfast where he died in March 1985. His son Warren was a Northern Ireland international striker with Glentoran.

Bobby FERGUSON

Bobby Ferguson managed Ipswich to the Milk Cup Semi-Finals in 1984/85 and Second Division promotion Play-Offs in 1986/87. A former Newcastle junior, he signed professional in May 1955 and gained top-flight experience prior to joining Derby for £4,000 in October 1962. He was sold to Cardiff for £5,000 in December 1965 and helped to reach the ECWC Semi-Finals in 1967/68, then was player-manager of Barry Town and Newport County before

joining Ipswich as youth coach in July 1971. Subsequently first-ream coach, he succeeded Bobby Robson as manager in August 1982 but was unable to prevent relegation in 1985/86. He was dismissed in May 1987 and managed Al-Arabi in Kuwait, then coached Birmingham City, Colchester, Coventry and

Sunderland before scouting for England under Terry Venables.


These players came to the Club thinking they had joined a side chasing honours and suddenly they are watching a hatful of goals go in their net and they are getting very frustrated.

In the beginning...

It is generally accepted that Swindon Town came into being in 1881, although there is no firm evidence that the Club's founder, the Reverend William Pitt, captain of the Spartans - an off shoot of a cricket club - changed his Club's name to Swindon Town before 1883, when the Spartans amalgamated with St. Mark's Young Men's Friendly Society.

The Boss... **Steve McMahon**

If you are looking for success, then it makes sense to turn to a natural winner and Swindon certainly did that when they appointed Ex-England midfielder Steve McMahon to the manager's post at the County Ground in November 1994.

A player for whom competitive is an understatement, McMahon simply hates the taste of defeat, and he has added some much-needed grit to a Swindon side already full of talent and promise.

Still a force to be reckoned with on the field of play, injury prevented the former Everton, Aston Villa, Liverpool and Man City star from playing the part he would have liked last term, but he still managed to notch up 21 League appearances as the Robins steadied themselves after two successive relegations to win the Second Division title at a canter, nine points clear of nearest challengers Oxford.

After picking up the Division Two trophy, McMahon declared the moment as the highlight of his career some claim from a man who has won three League Championships, two FA Cups and three Charity Shields, not to mention the small matter of 17 England caps.

Liverpool born and bred, McMahon was on Everton's books as a youngster and made his debut at Sunderland in August 1980, before moving to Villa in 1983, where he emerged as a midfield general of the highest order. His career in the Midlands was

short-lived, however, as Kenny Dalglish took him back to Merseyside in a £375,000 deal in September 1985.

From then on it's been glory all the way for the hard-working and skilful midfield man - and he is continuing that winning habit at the County Ground.







Up Against...

GOALKEEPERS

First-choice between the sticks for Swindon this season has been Australian international 'keeper **FRANK TALIA** (DoB: 20.07.72), who joined the Robins after a short spell on loan from Blackburn in November 1995.

Coincidentally, Frank was initially recalled from his loan to sit on the bench for Blackburn...against Swindon in the Second Round of the Coca-Cola Cup!

Having transferred for £150,000, the 24-year-old Aussie played second fiddle to

Swindon have experienced the varying emotions of tremendous success and soul-destroying failure in the last few seasons, as the Robins have flown up the League only to suffer two successive relegations followed by yet another promotion last term.

FRASER DIGBY (23.04.67) until March, finally won a regular place...and then missed the Title run-in with injury.

Digby is a former Man Utd apprentice who moved to the County Ground for £32,500 in December 1986 and soon won England U21 honours following some impressive showings. He is celebrating his testimonial season with the Club in 1996/97.

DEFENDERS

One of the division's outstanding defenders, and a natural in the sweeper role favoured by many Clubs, is the former Norwich player IAN CULVERHOUSE

IAN CULVERHOUSÉ (22,09,64).

One of several players to have moved from Tottenham to Carrow Road, Ian cost the Canaries a mere £50,000 when he joined them in October 1985.

A League Tribunal set his transfer to the County Ground at £250,000 in December 1994, and Ian was voted onto the PFA Second Division Representative team last season.

Also formerly at Norwich, although only on loan, was MARK SEAGRAVES

(22.10.66), who moved to Swindon from Bolton for £100,000 in June 1995 and impressed in his early games before injury sidelined him for several weeks.

Anxious not to miss out on the current trend for overseas players, Steve McMahon swooped to sign the impressive Frenchman FREDERIC DARRAS (19.08.66) from Bastia in August this year. Formerly with French double-winners Auxerre, Darras has already made quite an impression at the County Ground.

JASON DRYSDALE

(17.11.70) has suffered with injuries since moving to the Club from Newcastle in March 1995 for a fee of £340,000 and last season lost out to Welsh international Paul Bodin in the left-back slot. But with Bodin gone, Drysdale is anxious to justify his price tag this time around.

Happy in defence or midfield is the Northern Ireland international **KEVIN HORLOCK** (01.11.72), who grabbed 12 League goals last season in the Championship drive. A strong tackler, and good striker of the ball, Horlock moved from West Ham on a free transfer in the summer of 1992.

Home-grown youngster
EDWIN MURRAY

(31.08.73) has yet to establish himself in the first-team at the County Ground, while

WAYNE O'SULLIVAN (25.02.74) is another lad to have joined Swindon straight from school.

A talented full-back, O'Sullivan broke into the senior side last season and also earned himself a regular spot in Eire's Under-21 side.

Swindon forked out a then Club record fee of £600,000 to bring MARK

ROBINSON (21.11.68) south from Newcastle in July 1994, while GARY ELKINS (04.05.66) moved to Swindon in September 1996 for £100,000, having previously made more than 100 appearances for Wimbledon in the Premiership. Also formerly with Fulham.





MIDEIELD

One of the star attractions in Swindon's midfield is former West Ham, Tottenham and Southampton wide man PAUL ALLEN (28.08.62). A member of the famous Allen clan, Paul is as committed to the game as ever, and his foraging runs down the wing still provide inspiration for the Robins.

Manager Steve McMahon, himself still registered as a player at the County Ground, sees a little of himself in combative midfielder LEE COLLINS (03.02.74). Formerly with Scotland's basement-dwellers Albion Rovers, Collins signed for Swindon in November 1995 following a successful trial period at the County Ground.

TY GOODEN (23.10.72) was signed by former boss John Gorman in 1993 after being released by Wycombe, and he played a big role in the Club's surge to the Second Division title last season. He managed 26 League games before being ruled out of the closing weeks of the campaign with a hernia.

Another player to have recovered from injury during the summer is former Hearts midfielder SCOTT LEITCH (06.10.69), who cost a cut-price £15,000 when he signed from Tynecastle in March 1996.

ALEX SMITH (15.02.76) is a skilful but lightweight former Everton apprentice who can operate anywhere down the left hand side. Prior to moving to Swindon in January 1996, Alex's only first-team experience had come in the European Cup-Winners' Cup!

Ex-England, Villa, Rangers and Liverpool winger MARK WALTERS (02.06.64) signed on a free transfer from Southampton in the summer, as did former Tottenham reserves KEVIN WATSON (03.01.74).

Star Man

A 1995 close season signing from Second Division rivals and near neighbours Bristol Cirv, this big Yorkshireman enjoyed an outstanding first season at the County Ground, where he grabbed 20 goals and finished a glorious campaign as the Club's

...goal you've ever seen?


People are going to think I'm a Newcastle fan, but David







