



This afternoon we extend a warm County Ground welcome to the players, supporters and staff of Huddersfield Town Football Club for this Nationwide League Division One match.

We hope you all enjoy your trip to Wiltshire and wish you a safe journey home after the game.

The Terriers come to the County Ground today keen to make amends for their last visit here - while Robins fans will go home happy if there's any repeat of events of just under a year ago.

On 16th October 1996. Huddersfield came to town with, it must be said, a slightly depleted side, and went home on the end of a 6-0 hammering in what was Swindon's biggest victory of the season. A Peter Thorne hat-trick, and goals from Mark Walters, Wayne Allison and Kevin Horlock did the damage.

An idea of how Brian Horton's side managed to pull things together can be gleaned from our second meeting last term, which resulted in a goalless draw at the Alfred McAlpine Stadium on the last day of 1996/97.

A likeable and honest manager, Horton appears to retain the faith of both the board and the supporters at Huddersfield and the club can call on the services of a promising young squad this season, as well as experienced heads such as 1996/97's top scorer Andy Payton and the 'Player of the Year' Tom Cowan.

Among the youngsters hoping to make a breakthrough in 1997/98 are three members of the Republic of Ireland's youth squad which memorably attained third place during last summer's World Youth Championships in Malaysia goalkeeper Derek O'Connor, defender Robbie Ryan and midfield man Stephen Murphy.

It will also be interesting to see how the two Marcuses - Browning and Stewart - perform. Both players arrived from Bristol Rovers last season and gave promise of great things to come.

Stewart, in particular, is a player of whom Terriers' fans have high hopes. His £1.2 million transfer smashed the Huddersfield club record in July 1996. but injury prevented him showing his best form in 1996/97.


On the other side of the coin, the Terriers will be without two of their more experienced grafters from last season.

Ex-England U21 player Lee Sinnott has moved on to Oldham for £70,000, where he joins former team-mate Paul Reid, a battling midfielder.

Brian Horton the manager

Following the departure of Neil Warnock to Plymouth during the summer of 1995, many critics suggested that Huddersfield would struggle to maintain their new found First Division status.

Warnock had led the Terriers to the promotion but the board at the spanking new Alfred McAlpine Stadium moved swiftly to appoint Brian Horton to the Huddersfield hot-seat, and the popular 48-year-old has certainly kept up the good work.

After a wobbly start to life in the higher division, the Terriers settled down quickly and finally finished the 1995/96 campaign just outside the Play-Off positions, in 8th place.

Last season things slipped a little and the Terriers finished narrowly out of the relegation places, in 20th spot in Division One, thanks in no small part to a catalogue of injury problems.

As a hard-working midfielder, Horton won a reputation as a master of the effortless interception and well-timed tackle in a playing career that took in Port Vale, Brighton, Luton and Hull.

He was appointed player-manager at Hull in 1984, and moved on to Oxford United in 1988, when he was appointed assistant to Mark Lawrenson.


Following Lawrenson's resignation, Horton

struggled to keep things together at Oxford as the Club was torn apart by the death of Chairman Robert Maxwell and the subsequent uncovering of

huge debts. In September 1993, Horton was appointed manager at Manchester City where he endured mixed fortunes before being replaced by Alan Ball towards the tail end of 1994/95. Horton insisted that the problems at Maine Road ran deeper than the choice of manager, and the validity of his belief has been proved by City's subsequent relegation, the sacking of Ball and the inner turmoil which at time threatened to tear City apart last season.

A highly-respected figure within the game, Brian Horton held his head high and concentrated on the task in hand - keeping

Huddersfield in the First Division.




Huddersfield's scorers

Huddersfield's 10 year league and cup record





After a game of swaying fortunes Town emerged with a point from their Division One match at Molineux.

Craig Maskell notched his first goal for his new club to put Swindon ahead after 15 minutes but Andy Mutch equalised just before half time. A bullet header by Shaun Taylor following a Paul Bodin corner seemed to have secured the points but two minutes from time Keith Downing fastened on to a rebound to score Wolves' equaliser. A Huddersfield team featuring Kieran O'Regan went down 1-0 at home to West Bromwich in Division Two.

JO YEARS AGO

Swindon got their first points of the season with a 2-0 win over Sheffield United.

Before the match started a minute's silence was observed for the victims of the Hungerford massacre.

Colin Calderwood headed
Town in front after 22 minutes
but controversy surrounded the
second Swindon goal. Andy
Leaning in the United goal was
penalised for holding on to the
ball too long and despite the
presence of the entire Blades
team on the goal line Jimmy
Quinn scored. Second Division

Huddersfield went down 6-1 at Home Park against Plymouth. It was the first of 28 League defeats in a season which saw them finish bottom of the table. Duncan Shearer was their top scorer with 10. Aldershot had to postpone their home game with Mansfield as safety work costing £120,000 had not been completed.

15 YEARS AGO

Arkell's agreed to help advise on the running of the Supporters Club, the Rendezvous Club and the Squash Club at the County Ground. Paul Batty collected his award as Swindon Young Player of the Year from Chairman Cecil Green. In pre season friendlies after a disheartening 4-1 defeat at Cardiff, Swindon restored some morale when Paul Rideout scored the only goal in a behind closed doors match with

Reading. The World Cup meant a late start to the season and Mick Buxton's side were looking forward to being in the Second Division for the first time since 1975. Liverpool won the Charity Shield with a 1-0 victory over Spurs.

FLASH-BACK

One of the few bright spots of the dismal 1964-5 season came on the 26th September when Swindon were hosts to Huddersfield. The Robins had been having a torrid time with their previous four matches all being lost and no goals scored, while 13 had been conceded. Swindon gave a debut to Peter Leggett the former Weymouth winger and he gave the Yorkshire side's full-back Bob McNab a roasting. Huddersfield had not appointed a replacement manager to Mr Eddie Boot who had left the club after a relationship which

had stretched back to the thirties and they were rocked by two goals in a four minute spell mid way through the half. The first came when Ray Wood could only turn a shot from Leggett onto the bar and Mike Summerbee scored from the rebound. Leggett was also involved in the second goal when his centre was only partially cleared and Roger Smart followed up to score. Gulliver reduced the arrears at the start of the second half but Ernie Hunt added a third for Swindon when he scored a picture book header from a

cross by Summerbee. What was described by one paper as a jet powered raid by Rogers which saw him dribble past four defenders founded off Swindon's victory five minutes from time.



diary of the week



August 13th.

After our opening day victory over Crewe we went into the first leg of our Coca Cola Cup tie with Watford full of confidence.

Unfortunately we had an off night and went down 2-0 to the Second Division Club.

We created several early chances but were denied by their keeper Alec Chamberlain who made some outstanding saves.

Then we fell behind when our defence failed to react quickly enough after a free kick had come back off the woodwork and their striker headed the ball home unchallenged.

When Watford had Jason Lee sent off for elbowing Alan McDonald just before half time we felt we stood a great chance of recovering but we weren't patient enough and failed to find a way through.

As is often the case in these situations we were caught on the break with Watford grabbing a second and although it is only half time in the tie, we have left ourselves with a tough job at Vicarage Road.



August 14th.

There were a lot of miserable faces around the ground after the previous night's defeat but there was no point in moping about and we had to get our minds focused on our next game in the League at Reading.



August 15th.
The lads enjoyed a good work

out on the training ground as we played two touch football. Sky Sports and Meridian were filming us for their sports programme's so the Gaffer rose to the occasion by firing home a hat trick!

Our Friday ritual continued with a pasta lunch up in the Executive Lounge followed by a signing session before we all went off to prepare for the big game the next day.

Saturday

August 16th.

We travelled to Reading and had a pre-match meal at a hotel in the area before arriving at Elm Park at 1.30pm.

Once again it was a blistering hot day but the lads still gave everything they had as we emerged with a great 1-0 win.

It was back to business as usual with everyone in for training as we started to focus on our next match.



win for Swindon with goals from Matthew Collins and Karl Palmer. Michael Pook ended up as the leading scorer with 8 goals.




The Under 14's ran out winners in all their games before taking on a team from the USA called San Diego Surf in the final.



Firstly, congratulations to the team for their flying start to the league campaign.

Two wins out of two is, all in all, a dream start and ignoring the result against Graham Taylor's Watford, third place in the league is about 10 places higher than even the most optimistic fan could have hoped for at the start of the season.

Plaudits also to Bournemouth who head the early Second Division table. Less than 12 months ago the club was on the verge of bankruptcy. To cut a long story very short, with the aid of local company finance and the money of its supporters,

the club was saved from the liquidators; now, for maybe only one Saturday of the season, the Cherries have good cause to celebrate.

So what. Well, it was less than 20 years ago that our club was in itself in danger of going out of business and while we are in considerably better shape these days, the Bournemouth's and Brighton's of this world are clubs on a comparatively equal footing to our own.

We do not live comfortably with Manchester United, Liverpool or even Southampton for that matter. Clubs down and out(side) the Premiership should therefore look to one another for ideas and advise if there is

any hope of the game remaining in its present form in the lower leagues.

Possibly the most important aspect of this trawling for ideas is in each club seeking the advice of its existing supporter base as to how the clubs can improve the package, so to speak, that they presently offer the supporter. At Swindon Town we have been extremely fortunate over the past few years that we have had a Board of Directors sufficiently openminded as to incorporate the representation of supporters' views to the board in the form of the Shadow Board. Long may it continue.

Okay - I hold my hands up I got it wrong...In this column on the opening day of the season I predicted that gates would be down because the season was, in my opinion, starting far too early.

I haven't altered my views on the timing but the official Nationwide Gates Analysis for the opening day shows our game got off to a flying start. Division One in fact pulled in an extra 37,202 over the 12 games played compared with the returns for day one in the 1996-97 season, an incredible increase of 23.3 per cent, yes almost a quarter up. Indeed, all three divisions were better than last year to produce an overall upward trend of 18.9 per cent.

Manchester City had the fourth highest attendance in the country with an opening day gate of 30,474 against Portsmouth while Middlesbrough, despite their relegation, attracted 29,414 to the Cellnet Riverside Stadium for the comparative unfashionable opposition of Charlton Athletic.

It is good news for all of us but our turn out of 8,334 against Crewe was a trifle disappointing, being up on our first home game in 1995/96, against York City, which was watched by 7,746 but marginally down on last season's opening home First Division game with Port Vale, to which 8,706 responded.

I still maintain that opening the season during the most popular holiday period is somewhat counter-productive in commercial terms, but that said it is time to eat humble pie. The Most Talked About subject of the week has been Tony Blair's governmental decision to tell soccer, rugby and cricket that there is no room for us in the new sports academy.

I am one of those people who takes any rebuff to our beloved sport personally and the prime minister's intervention to change the concept of Britain's proposed new National Sports Academy and ignore the nation's most popular team games left me speechless.

What is the man thinking about? He is in danger of becoming as big a clown as Tony Banks, the Sports Minister, who after suggesting we should disband the home nations and

frustration in the London camp.



























The 28 year old midfield maestro is already proving to be a revelation and although he's not to hot on the English language - he's letting his feet do most of the talking!

On agreeing a three year contract at the County Ground he said he was "very pleased" to be joining and was "looking forward to playing in England."

Well, the Swindon fans are also highly delighted to be witnessing his French flair on the pitch and fellow countryman Freddie Darras has at last got someone he can have a lengthy conversation with.

Indeed the two French lads have forged something of a potent partnership down the right flank for Swindon.

The Swindon squad has certainly got something of a cosmopolitan look about with the two Frenchmen, an Australian (Frank Talia), four Scotsmen (Chris Hay, Scott Leitch, Lee Collins and Alex Finlayson) along with a Northern Ireland International in Alan McDonald and young Welsh Under 18 skipper Michael Pattimore.


