

# KICK-OFF With Dave Bassett

I hope you all had a marvellous Christmas Day. It's back to business for us this afternoon as we entertain our fellow promotion chasers Swindon.

Not too many people would have put money on Swindon being in the promotion frame at the half-way point of the campaign but Steve McMahon has done a terrific job at the County Ground.

Swindon may not possess too many big names but they're a talented outfit and you disregard teams like them at your peril – rather like Stockport, who made life very difficult for us on Saturday.

I know for a fact we can play much better than we actually did against Stockport. One or two players had an off-day and as a team our general level of performance was below par.

But not even the great teams in world football play well week in, week out. Take Manchester United for example. They didn't play particularly well against Newcastle on Sunday but won 1-0.

Newcastle, on the other hand, played quite well and probably deserved something for their efforts but were left empty-handed.

That's the way it goes but I was pleased with the perseverance the players showed on Saturday. They stuck to their task and we got our reward in the form of a 2-1 win with both of our goals coming in the final 10 minutes.

Pierre van Hooijdonk scored his 14th League goal of the campaign from the penalty spot to cancel out Stockport's opener and then Steve Stone supplied the match-winner with his first goal of the season.

I'm sure that will have done his confidence the power of good. I got the impression that Steve was trying a little too hard in front of goal, such was his desperation to get off the mark.

His goal against Stockport is sure to have eased some of the pressure he was putting himself under and it would be nice to think he might start contributing a few more goals to our cause.

I was pleased with Andy Johnson's contribution. He did well in what was his first start since mid-September, especially when you consider we had been forced to rush him back into the first team after a spell on the sidelines with a knee injury.

I'd also like to mention Steve Guinan's contribution. He came in for his first start of the season in place of the injured Kevin Campbell and although it wasn't easy for him, he did well – as did lan Moore, who came on as a substitute for him lateon.

There are sure to be other times between now and the end of the season when I'll need to call on Steve and I'm sure he will be much the wiser for his run-out on Saturday.

Away from the first team scene, meanwhile, our youth team were sadly beaten by Southampton in the third round of the F.A. Youth Cup on Friday.

They lost 3-0 at The Dell but according to Paul Hart, they played better than the scoreline suggests.

In comparison to many other youth teams, our side is relatively inexperienced but we believe it's important, as part of their development process as players, that we expose our young talent to good quality opposition.

And although they may have lost at Southampton, I'm sure the players gained yet more valuable experience.

Back to first team matters . . . and following today's date with Swindon we're off on our travels with a couple of tough away games. Needless to say, your support could prove invaluable.

We head to Manchester City in two days time. They've already beaten us once this season and took three points off Middlesbrough on Saturday, so we're in for another stern test.

Then a week tomorrow we face Charlton in the third round of the F.A. Cup.

We may have beaten them 5-2 in a League encounter at The City Ground last month but they haven't lost since then, which speaks volumes for their ability.

A good cup run is always welcome and adds extra stimulation to the season. Whilst this will be a hard game, we will do our best to reach round four.

All that's left for me to do is, on behalf of myself, the coaching staff and players, wish you all a very Happy New Year.

One thing's for sure, we're in for another big test – although it would be nice to think we could produce a performance of a higher quality than that which we turned in against Stockport on Saturday.

We got the points thanks to a 2-1 win but apart from the last 10 minutes or so – when we scored both of our goals – it was a scrappy game and we really struggled to make an impression.

We went in at half-time a goal down but we still felt we could win the game. We just felt the hardest job was going to be grabbing the equaliser . . . and that's the way it turned out.

But hopefully we'll be able to get the right result which would set us up nicely for Sunday's trip to face Manchester City, who are sure to be on a high after their win over Middlesbrough six days ago.

Finally, I'd like to sign off by wishing you all on behalf of the players a very Happy and Prosperous New Year. Let's hope 1998 proves to be the year when we book our return to the Premiership.


And although we slumped to a 2-1 defeat, Johnson had reason to be pleased after opening his goal account for us.














# There's no Dell-ight after Cup defeat



Steve McMahon has successfully established Swindon in the promotion running – without breaking the bank!

He's assembled a talented squad at the County Ground and he's done it on something of a shoestring budget.

That has not only earned him a whole host of admirers but given Swindon a real chance of returning to the Premiership for the first time since 1994, when they lasted just one season in the top flight.


Canny operator McMahon may have forked out £500,000, £400,000 and £330,000 for George Ndah, Darren Bullock and Chris Hay respectively this year.

But he has largely contented himself with the acquisition of free transfer talent – like Brian Borrows, a veteran of more than 400 League games for Coventry, and Northern Ireland star Alan McDonald.

Both of them have become key figures in Swindon's promotion push and McDonald, capped more than 50 times by the Irish, is full of praise for the man at the Wiltshire club's helm.

He told reporters recently:
"Steve has got to be in the frame
for a top job now. Just look at my
old club Queen's Park Rangers.
They've spent nearly £8million on
transfers in the last year and are
nowhere.

"Look at what Wolves have forked out. Yet, I don't suppose Steve has spent even £1 million. The rest of us have been frees or loans."



There's no doubt that McMahon will be looking for the most recent addition to his squad, Ndah, to make a big impact in the second half of the Division One campaign.

The striker – who celebrated his 23rd birthday three days ago – struggled to make an impact at his previous club Crystal Palace but announced his arrival on the Swindon scene in the best possible fashion.

Ndah marked his debut against promotion rivals Middlesbrough with a spectacular strike and is now looking to reward McMahon for the faith he has shown in his goal-scoring ability.

The Swindon boss will hope to see Ndah forge a prolific partnership with the man who has been such a rip-roaring success in the first half of the campaign – former Celtic star Hay.

He checked-in from Parkhead just a week before the start of the season and is now pushing our own leading marksman Pierre van Hooijdonk for the Division One's 'Golden Boot' award.

Hay will be looking to make up for lost time having served a three-match ban only to then miss the 2-1 defeat at the hands of fellow high-fliers Sheffield United 13 days ago with a knee injury.

In his absence, McMahon handed former Manchester City man Steve Finney the opportunity to make his mark in Swindon's front-line alongside new boy Ndah.

Finney arrived at the County Ground in a free transfer – as did former Aston Villa, Rangers, Liverpool and England wideman Mark Walters and French duo Frederic Darras and Philippe Cuervo.

The unfortunate Cuervo, who signed a three year contract during the summer after impressing McMahon during a trial, has been

dogged by injury since his arrival from Sochaux.

But 31-year-old Darras, a former Under-21 international, has established himself as a key figure at the back alongside the likes of McDonald, Borrows and Mark Robinson.

Versatile defender Robinson cost Swindon £600,000 - a record outlay at the time for the Robins - from Newcastle in 1994 but has since more than justified that price tag.

Swindon had to pay a more modest £35,000 to secure the services of goalkeeper Fraser Digby but he has also made a big

Currently the club's longest serving player, the former England Under-21 international enjoyed a well-deserved testimonial last season during which time he was also voted 'Player of the Year.'

Digby kept us at bay in our goalless encounter with McMahon's men at the County Ground in September and will be aiming for a similar outcome this afternoon.



Swindon boss Steve McMahon has enjoyed numerours successes – both as a player and as a manager.

As a player, he won League and F.A. Cup winners' medals with Liverpool, bagged 17 England caps and was a member of Bobby Robson's squad for the 1990 World Cup finals.

And in his first full season in charge of Swindon following his managerial appointment in November, 1994, he led the Wiltshire club to glory in the form of the Second Division Championship.

McMahon, a tenacious midfield general, launched his playing career with Everton before moving to Aston Villa. After a successful spell in the Midlands, he found himself heading back to Merseyside where he became a key figure for Liverpool.

In 1991 he joined Manchester City in a £900,000 deal and continued to perform at the highest level before taking over as playermanager at Swindon.



# FRASER DIGBY

Swindon's longest serving player, he celebrated his testimonial season in 1996/97 and what's more, was voted 'Player of the Year.' The former England Under-21 international served his apprenticeship with Manchester United but moved to the County Ground in a £32,500 deal after a successful loan spell.

## **BRIAN BORROWS**

Signed an 18-month contract with Swindon last month

after ending his long association with Coventry City in a free transfer. The vastly experienced Liverpoolborn defender made more than 400 League appearances for the Sky Blues and has also represented Everton and Bolton.

### MARK ROBINSON

Launched his career with West Brom but made such an impact at Barnsley that Newcastle swooped to sign him in 1993 for £450,000. Lost his place in the St. James' Park first team through injury and joined Swindon for a then club record fee of £600,000 in July 1994. Can play at full back or in the centre of defence.

### DARREN BULLOCK

The tough-tackling central defender joined Swindon from Huddersfield in February of this year in a £400,000 deal. The 28-year-old was a late starter in the

world of professional football and only joined Huddersfield four years ago after a successful spell with non-league Nuneaton Borough.

# FREDERIC DARRAS

A former French Under-18 and Under-21 international, he made a free transfer switch from Bastia last year. Spent 11 years with French 'double' winners Auxerre, during which time he gained a great deal of experience in European competition. Is comfortable playing anywhere across the back line.

# ALAN McDONALD

The 34-year-old former Northern Ireland captain

had spent his entire career with Queen's Park Rangers before joining Swindon during the summer. A highly-committed central defender, his wealth of experience attracted boss Steve McMahon when he realised his contract was up at Loftus Road.

# DAVID THOMPSON

Although widely regarded as one of Liverpool's most promising youngsters, he has yet to muscle in on the first team scene at Anfield. The 20-year-old joined Swindon on loan last month and has made a big impact at the County Ground with his cultured midfield displays.

# LEE COLLINS

The talented youngster was forced to watch from the sidelines for much of last season through injury but signed an extension to his contract and is keen to land a regular place in midfield. Signed for Swindon two years ago after impressing while on trial at the County Ground.

# STEVE FINNEY

A series of injuries restricted him to just nine starts last season but the 24-year-old has bounced back to re-establish himself. Launched his career with Preston and then moved on to Manchester City, where he didn't get the chance to make a League appearance. Joined Swindon in a free transfer.

### **GEORGE NDAH**

The speedy winger joined Swindon from Dave Bassett's former club Crystal Palace last month in a £650,000 deal and has wasted little time in making an impact at the County Ground. He marked his debut against Middlesbrough with an excellent goal and looks to have a very exciting future.

## TY GOODEN

Signed by Swindon four years ago after being released by Wycombe Wanderers. Made more than 30 appearances during the 1995-96 campaign when Town collected the Second Division title but was hampered by injuries last term and as a result only played a handful of games.

# **CHRIS HAY**

The fleet-footed young striker was signed from Celtic a week before the start of the Division One campaign for £330,000 and has since responded with more than a dozen goals. Signed a three-year contract and Swindon are convinced they landed themselves a bargain.

### STEVE COWE

He may only be 5ft. 6ins. tall but what he lacks in inches he makes up for with his pace and skill on

the ball. A livewire front player, he initially joined Swindon on loan from Aston Villa but was soon snapped up on a permanent basis. Scored seven goals last season in 32 starts.

## **MARK WALTERS**

On his day he's still one of the most talented wingers in the English game. Last season he showed the kind of skills that made him such a big hit with Aston Villa, Rangers and Liverpool before a knee injury sidelined him for the final few months of the campaign. The former England international joined Swindon on a free transfer.

# MAT CFrom the past

# **21ST OCTOBER, 1972... FOREST 2, SWINDON TOWN 2.**

Forest, in search of their first victory in more than a month, had little more than 24 hours before being rendered managerless, following the departure of Matt Gillies, who had tendered his resignation following weeks of mounting opposition to his leadership from the terraces.

A mild mannered Scot, Gillies had been in charge a little short of three years, during which time the club had drifted aimlessly towards relegation.

Crowds that had averaged 25,000 during his first season at the helm had slumped dramatically.

Little wonder that a mere third of that average were assembled for the clash with Swindon, as Forest, in dire need of inspiration both on and off the field, slithered slowly toward Division Three.

The manager's reigns had been taken up, although only temporarily, by assistant manager Bill Anderson.

Electing to play the side selected prior to Gillies' resignation, Forest took to the field with their leading goalscorer Martin O'Neill as substitute . . . whilst Swindon sought their first away win of the season, and what would have been their first ever victory over the Reds.


Forest gave every indication that the visitors would gain that victory

... dour and devoid of any attacking ideas the Reds goalscoring burden lay at the feet of Alan Buckley and Sammy Chapman, while the Robins massed in defence, relying on rapid counter attacks from their two wing men Don Rogers and Steve Peplow (who was later to join the Reds for a brief spell) to provide goalscoring opportunity.

It was from one of those counter attacks that the visitors snatched the lead through Peplow.

Rarely did Forest look like hauling themselves back into the game as they toiled to break down a solid rearguard.

On the rare occasion they did carve out an opportunity John Robertson and John Cottam both failed to force a save from goalkeeper Downsborough.

With six minutes left Swindon appeared to have secured the win they had waited so long for when Don Rogers slipped clear to carve out a chance for centre forward Ray Treacy to score his fourth of the

The goal signalled a mass exodus, yet as Forest's supporters swarmed over Trent Bridge, the Reds, to the disbelief of Swindon and those remaining, hauled themselves level in the final two minutes.

Having never looked like salvaging anything from the instant Peplow had the visitors ahead, Forest's young midfielder John Robertson struck what appeared to be a consolation goal after exchanging passes with Buckley.

Almost from the kick-off captain Tommy Gemmill in support of what was to be the last attack of the game strode into the penalty area from the left, before unleashing a shot that opposing skipper Frank Burrows blocked on the line . . . the ball fell at the feet of substitute O'Neill who scrambled home what must have been the most untidy goal of his long

Swindon could not believe what had happened - acting Forest manager Bill Anderson did little to ease their pain when conceding that Forest never looked like scoring, an opinion until those final two minutes no one would have questioned.

Forest set about installing a new man at the helm with justified haste, as the names of leading up and coming managers of the day were bandied about . . . Dick Graham of Colchester, John Bond at Bournemouth and Peterborough's Noel Cantwell . . . a few touted the merits of former player John Barnwell.

Forest's next manager, though, slipped out of the City Ground little more than an hour after he had been subjected to daylight robbery.

Dave Mackay, the departing Swindon manager, having seen his outside right Rogers sold to Crystal Palace was appointed Gillies' successor just over a week later.

# BRADFORD FIGHTBACK SPOILS THE CELEBRATIONS


We were left frustrated by Bradford a fortnight ago after they fought back from 2-0 down at the City Ground to snatch a point.










# January

- 4 Alfie Haaland turns down our offer of a new four-year contract.
- 6 Businessman Grant Bovey, who had been in the takeover running, offers to buy former City Ground favourite Nigel Clough from Manchester City. Clough is already back on Trentside, in a loan deal.
- 8 Assistant manager Alan Hill brings his long association with us to an end by resigning to take up a similar post with Clark at Maine Road.
- 9 Steve Stone undergoes surgery to remove a supportive wire from the knee he injured earlier in the season.

- 13 Bassett confirms his interest in former England star Chris Waddle, who is apparently available to leave Bradford City on a free transfer. Ian Moore, meanwhile, becomes our second signing of the week, joining us from Tranmere in a £750,000 deal.
- 14 We fail in a bid to sign Celtic midfielder Brian O'Neil on loan after the Glasgow club stall over completing the necessary paperwork. The player, who had flown to Nottingham and hoped to make his debut the following day against Liverpool, is left with little alternative but to head back to Scotland.
- 18 O'Neil is able to breathe a sigh of relief as his loan switch is finally completed.



# July

- I We appoint Mike Kelly as our goalkeeping coach. Kelly, who played for QPR and Birmingham, has worked extensively with the English and Swiss national squads.
- 2 Andy Johnson completes his move to the City Ground some time after agreeing to join us. The talented midfielder, who was also wanted by Premiership outfits Leicester and Crystal Palace, struck a deal with us in June but Norwich refused to rubber-stamp the £2.2million deal until July.
- 3 Alan Rogers becomes the second new arrival in the space of 48 hours. The highly-promising left back arrives from Tranmere in a £2million transfer.
- 9 Former England midfielder Geoff Thomas checks-in at the City Ground in a free transfer switch from Midlands rivals Wolves. Thomas was also wanted by Premiership newcomers Barnsley but is happy to sign a 12-month contract with us.
- 14 Yet another new arrival . . . this time vastly-experienced Swiss No. I Marco Pascolo,

who costs us £750,000 from Italian side Cagliari.



- 18 Another surprise as Pearce is signed by Kenny Dalglish for Newcastle.
- 23 Paul McGregor, who was dogged by injury for much of last season, faces up to another spell of inactivity after damaging a knee in a pre-season game at Arnold.
- 30 Leeds are ordered by a transfer tribunal to pay us £1.6million for the services of Haaland much to the disappointment of Bassett, who had placed a higher valuation on the Norwegian.
- 30 Stone, sidelined since September with a knee tendon injury, is told he can make his comeback in a pre-season game against Leeds – if a specialist gives him the all-clear.
- 31 Steve Wigley, our former winger, is named as our new Youth Development Officer.



# August

- 3 Stone makes a successful return as a substitute against Leeds but there's bad news as Colin Cooper suffers a badly gashed leg which could sideline him for two months.
- 4 We make yet another signing, paying Norwegian side Rosenborg £500,000 for Jon Olav Hjelde. The 25-year-old, who played in the European Champions League last season, finds himself in line for a quick-fire debut in the absence of Cooper.
- 9 We launch the new campaign in the best possible style – with a 1-0 win at Port Vale. Kevin Campbell scores the only goal of the game.
- 18 We find ourselves facing a goalkeeping crisis after Pascolo joins Crossley and Fettis on the injured list.
- 21 Dave Beasant, Southampton's former England 'keeper, is drafted in on a month's loan. In the process, he renews acquaintances with Bassett, his manager at his first club Wimbledon.
- 27 Bassett reveals that he has rejected a £3million bid from an Italian club for Hjelde just a matter of weeks after paying Rosenborg £500,000 for his services.
- 28 There's growing concern that Stone, just back after a lengthy lay-off with a knee problem, may now have a hernia.



- 10 Craig Armstrong is forced to pull out of the England Under-21 squad for the European Championship play-off first leg with Greece in Crete through injury. But we still have a representative in the squad after Rogers is given a late call-up.
- 12 Long-term injury victims Thomas and Crossley prepare to resume full training.
- 14 Welsh international David Phillips joins our First Division rivals Huddersfield on a free transfer.



- 19 We decide to sever our links with Italian striker Andy Silenzi and release him from his contract. After struggling to make an impact at the City Ground, he joined Venezia on loan last season but has been kicking his heels in Italy after failing to clinch a permanent move to the Serie B club during the summer.
- 27 Transfer-listed winger Allen joins Second Division strugglers Luton on a month's loan.



So, with that in mind, a spell in the First Division (where the standard isn't quite so high) might just prove beneficial for them and enhance their prospect of progressing into the first team set-up – although as I keep having to remind some of them who believe they should be training with the seniors, they've got to earn that right.

But make no mistake, we'll be striving to keep our place among the Pontins League elite and I'd like to think we might have more of a settled side in the second half of the campaign.

That certainly hasn't helped our cause, particularly in defence where we've been forced to chop and change personnel on a regular basis.

I tend to think that you can get away to a certain extent with making a number of changes up front and in midfield but you need a settled defence . . . and that's a luxury we haven't enjoyed this season.

But Stuart Thom has recently returned from injury and I'm looking forward to seeing him working alongside the likes of Cralg Armstrong and Andrew Dawson.

One man who was particularly disappointed that last week's reserve game was called-off was Finnish trialist Aki Riihalati.

Having figured in our previous game against Birmingham, Riihalati was due to get another run-out against Everton.

\*Naturally, he was disappointed but we hope to have him back here to play in our first game of 1998 against Leeds when, all being well, the likes of Geoff Thomas (pictured) and Mark Crossley will also be in a position to hit the comeback trail after their respective injury problems.





# Super supporter Stuart Astill passed a remarkable milestone last month . . . by watching us in League action for the 1,000th consecutive time!

Our 1-0 win at Ipswich took his tally to the magical four-figure mark but he has no intention whatsoever of easing-up.

Stuart's remarkable labour of love kicked into gear in September 1973 at Bolton, since when he has clocked-up thousands of miles . . . and spent just as many pounds.

He admits: "People are always asking me to try and guess how much I've spent following Forest down the years but although I can honestly say it's been worth every penny, I really don't like to think about it.

"When I started back in 1974 I didn't set out to try and attend 1,000 League games on the trot. I just enjoyed it – as I still do – and simply kept going and going."

The former British Rail
Engineering employee hasn't
managed to make it to all our Cup
ties during his 24-year spell of
unstinting devotion but it's not
always been for the want of trying.


He explains: "One of the Cup games I missed was the European Super Cup game against Valencia. I booked to go on a one-day trip to Spain but the organisers didn't get a big enough response, so they decided to tie it in with a week-long trip.

"If I'd gone for a week, I would have missed the previous Saturday's League game as well as the following Saturday's League game . . . so I decided against making the trip."

Stuart is now semi-retired but even when he was in full-time employment – at the BREL site in Derby – he managed to fit following our fortunes the length and breadth of the country around his work commitments.

He recalls: "As long as I put in the required hours I was okay and so I always managed to leave at lunchtime if Forest were playing away.

"I must admit I used to pinch the odd half day here and there and I remember one occasion when I'd had three afternoons off in a



fortnight our charge hand told me the supervisor wanted to see me.

"I really thought I was for the high jump but he just sat me down and told me 'Stuart, most of the men who work here are full-time fitters and part-time football supporters but you're a football fan who works as a fitter in his spare time.'

"I was amazed when he told me to carry on enjoying myself while I could, which was a relief because I was planning to leave early the next day to go and watch Forest."

Although he's a follower of our fortunes first and foremost – he has been a keen fan since 1956 when he watched us in action against a Middlesbrough side that included Brian Clough, who scored a hat-trick that day, and Peter Taylor – he also takes pleasure in watching other sides in action.

In fact, he manages to watch in the region of 120 to 130 League games a season and has even managed to attend three games – in one day! "That was Good Friday 1975," he recollects. "I watched West Ham against Stoke in the morning at Upton Park, then went to White Hart Lane to watch Spurs against" Wolves in the afternoon and then in the evening headed back up to the Midlands to watch Coventry against Sheffield United."

What's more, 52-year-old Stuart – who is one of our former shareholders and is now a Life Vice President – has only missed two of England's home internationals since 1970

But there's no doubt that we've provided him with the most memorable moments. "We hold the record for the longest unbeaten run – 42 games – and I saw everyone of them and, of course, I was there at Coventry when we clinched the League title in 1978.

"I've some marvellous memories
. . . and hopefully I'll collect a few
more in the years to come!"

# The 1977/78 Season, By John Remembered Lawson

Nottingham Forest's game on Boxing Day 20 years ago was understandably built up as a potential game of the season.

The visit of Liverpool, who had been champions for the previous two years, to the City Ground was never going to decide the League title but it would nevertheless have a significant bearing on the outcome.

Forest had opened up a lead at the top of the table – they were two points ahead of Everton and six above the men third-placed from Anfield and in the days of just two points for a win, Liverpool did not want the gap growing any wider.

Forest warmed up for the showdown by taking a pre-Christmas Spanish break in Benidorm but Clough and Taylor had the players ready for action on their return.

A crowd of 47,218, comfortably the biggest of the season, squeezed into the City Ground for an eagerly-awaited confrontation . . . and they were not disappointed.

Forest ripped into Liverpool from the start and when Viv Anderson and Tony Woodcock set up an opening goal for Archie Gemmill, whose 20 yard effort screamed into the Liverpool net, it looked as though the Nottingham Reds would flourish.

But Liverpool revealed the quality and character of which champions are made and hung on under intense pressure to snatch an equaliser through Steve Heighway.

It was an absorbing affair but there was not the same intensity in the next game as Forest travelled to the North East and comfortably beat a Newcastle side, whose eyes were anxiously on the other end of the table, 2-0.

David Needham, who had wasted no time in making an impression, and John McGovern were the scorers and Needham repeated his goalscoring act when Forest completed the double over Bristol City in a 3-1 win at Ashton Gate.

Woodcock and Martin O'Neill also got their names on the scoresheet as Forest ended the year in style.

Could they take their exhilarating form into the New Year. The next side bidding to check their runaway progress were Everton, who had title aspirations of their own.


