



Today we're under no illusions about the mountainous task ahead of us but with your support we've got a great chance.

I'm not going to start saying we've turned the corner- Port Vale was a good result, now we've got to build on it.

The lads pulled together at Vale and deserved to get the three points. What pleased me most was that they showed a lot of effort and determination, something that was lacking against Tranmere.

Good Start

We got the best possible start with a great goal from Collins. Finney did well to get to the byline he then hit a low cross into the six-yard box where Collins fired it in. It was nice to see him get a goal, the lad was magnificent all night, working hard down the right hand side. From here you could see the team's confidence grow. With about half an hour gone Finney cut inside their defender and hit a left foot shot at the keeper

and we continued to create chances.

I took the decision to play Darren Bullock in a defensive role. Despite his height, he's

good in the air

and has plenty of

aggression. Vale had their share of chances but we battled and we fought to stop them becoming a threat, Bullock making some important challenges.

It is during games like this that you see what a team is made of. In the dying minutes of the game we're without Drysdale and Digby, so the lads were down to the bare bones again.

But Steve Finney took over as goalkeeper and pulled off a great reflex save to tip Gareth Ainsworth's volley round the post, giving us an important victory.

Looking Back

Looking back at our last two games against West Brom and Tranmere it is clear we have been inconsistent.

Against West Brom I thought we were unlucky not to get more out of the game. We controlled the first half, and created some good opportunities but they scored from virtually their first attack. The Baggies are a team in play-off contention so it was a good yardstick with which to judge ourselves.

A week later I saw the other side of the coin when we were turned over by Tranmere 3-0. There can be no excuses for a performance like this. I only had fourteen players to pick from, but those who did play should have been capable of a decent ninety minutes. Instead I saw seven players who didn't perform. A team can carry one or two bad players but if half the team don't do the business you're going to struggle.

After this, it is clear we still need a few new faces at the club and I'm determined to bring some in within the next week or two. We've got players lined up and we need them desperately to brighten things up.

Today's fixture has always stood out as one of the big games of the seasons. Manchester City may be in the bottom half of the league but we know better than anyone that, on their day, they can really turn it on.

Fanatical and remarkably loyal support, a team full of quality players and a proven manager with a great track record mean



Joe Royle the manager

A former Manchester City playing hero, Joe Royle returned to the Maine Road hot-seat last Wednesday, in succession to the beleaguered Frank Clark.


After a bright start under Clark last season, City have slipped away in 1997/98, and the men in suits clearly decided it was time to arrest the club's alarming slide down the First Division table. Last Saturday's dispiriting 1-0 defeat at the hands of fellow-strugglers Bury proved the final straw for the likable Clark.


Royle - who helped City win the League Cup in 1976 - has experienced the 'return of the prodigal son' feeling before - having previously managed at Everton, the club where he first found fame and fortune. He had been the goal scoring hero of Everton's successful sides of the late 1960s and early 1970s and, with his great power in the air and on the ground, won six caps for England.


When he succeeded Mike Walker at Goodison, Royle came with an impressive track record. On a shoestring budget he had guided Oldham back into the old First Division - as Division Two Champions in 1991/92 - for the first time in more than 65 years, and perhaps more impressively kept them in the top flight for three seasons.

In addition he led the side to the 1990 League Cup Final (lost 1-0 to Nott'm Forest) and to the Semi-Finals of the FA Cup in the same year, where they lost a thrilling replay to eventual winners Man Utd. As a player, Royle scored 119 goals in 272 appearances for Everton and helped the club to their 1970 League title, as well as appearing in the 1968 FA Cup Final side, before moving to Maine Road in December 1974. He went on to represent Bristol City and Norwich before a serious knee injury brought his playing career to a premature halt in April 1982. As manager he took Everton to the 1995 FA Cup Final - where they beat Manchester United 1-0 - but failed to mount a serious title challenge and ultimately paid the price, for his failure to reign over neighbours Liverpool, by losing his job during the summer. Now he has moved to Manchester, and City will be hoping that brighter times lie ahead for the new Royle Blues.




















COKING DACKAR

down 2-1 in their Premiership
match at Carrow Road and slip
down the table to 10th position.
A four Year sponsorship deal
with the Premiership is finally
agreed by Ross Brewers.

10 YEARS AGO

All the goals came in the first half in Town's match at the Gay Meadow. Bernard McNally put Shrewsbury in front from the penalty spot when Dave Bamber handled in the eighth minute. Two minutes later Town's tall striker made amends with a close range shot. The decider came in the 20th minute when Victor Kasule cut inside Dave Hockaday and shot high into the net. The match had been an ill

tempered affair but the major controversy came after the final whistle. As he ran off the field Chris Kamara appeared to elbow Jim Melrose. It was a momentary loss of temper which was to cost him dear as Town suspended him for a month and he was given a hefty fine by the courts. Manchester City go down at home 1-0 to Notts County. In a bad spell they fail to win a League match throughout the whole of February and March and the end of the season sees

them lose their place in the top Division with Swansea and Brighton. Brian Clough suggests banning soccer from TV screens for three years.



15 YEARS AGO

A late goal at Colchester's Layer Road robbed Town of what would have been a well earned point. Mick Walker in the Colchester goal had twice been called upon to pull out

FLASH-BACK

When they travelled to Maine Road early in 1965 Swindon had the worst away record in Division Two having lost ten and won just two. They adopted a defensive formation with nominal outside right, Wilf Shergold, actually playing as an extra defender. Tony Hicks in the Town goal was called on to produce a fine save from City's left back Sear as early as the third minute and throughout the game it was the home side

diving saves to keep out Paul Batty but the only goal of the game was something of a fluke, a mistimed header by United's on loan John Linford evading the Swindon defenders and falling to Micky Cook who headed the ball in, Ian Scott,

who had 90% of the play.
Swindon took the lead after 19 minutes though Brown when he fastened on to a right wing ventre from Don Rogers. Hicks was only beaten once in the first half and then Swindon were saved by the bar when Jimmy Murray's shot crashed against it. The Robins increased their lead after 62 minutes when a pass from Brown caught the City defence square and allowed Summerbee to dash through to score. A long range shot from

Paul Simpson and Paul Moulden are the scorers as City beat Plymouth Argyle 3-1 at Maine Road to earn a place in the Sixth Round of the F A Cup. Where a 44,000 strong crowd will see them suffer a 4-0 home defeat at the hands of Liverpool.

Alan Oakes reduced the arrears but there was no further goals for Manchester's smallest ever Saturday crowd of just 8,015 to cheer. There were rumours that City, whose manager George Poyser missed the game to go scouting were interested in signing Town's Mike Summerbee but a new man was to be in charge at Maine Road before Swindon's versatile forward moved North to Moss Side.




17th February







The trialist Elliott broke the deadlock in the second half by blasting home a shot from twenty yards when Oxford failed to clear.







"I am left amazed that we lost 6-0 to Manchester City in September"

One look at the fixture list and you see 'home to Wolves Wednesday and Man City today.

You think 'great, two massive games'. That is a lie. These should be routine games - our minds are clouded by their names, their histories, their heritage, their stadia. These are not big games this week.

Of course for pride, and in search of justice in relation to our performances in the first half of the season, we have to get points here - it is vital that we give the rest of the season a shot. But if you think that we have been disappointing this season and thrown it all away, what must it be like to a Manchester City fan.

I rarely slate an opposition before a match but Manchester City, 'You can not live on past glories, you have let your fans down as much as any team this season. The two teams will be made up of mainly under 11's and under 10's. Kick-off is 1.45pm.


We hope that the game will encourage more kids in Swindon to take advantage of the coaching sessions run by the Town while also showing the standards attained by the young players.








FIGURE 10 TO THE PROPERTY OF T



How many of you reading this were witness to the game in which we entertained Birmingham City back in December I don't know.

What I do know however, is that I left the match incensed by the performance of the man in the middle. He must have been in dire need of some form of optical enhancement my mate Ashley Heath would say. Others in the stand were less than complimentary, questioning his parentage! Which ever way you look at it the man had a bad hair day so to speak.

When I was asked to put pen to paper for this column my mind wondered back to that day and the subject of referees. The men or women in black (just to be politically correct), bastions of football society. Probably the most talked about and most controversial people in the game.

I spent hours toiling over what I was going to write. Refereeing is a subject that is emotive but as time moved on and the ink began to run out, my attitude changed to a more sympathetic view.

In addition to reporting for ComTel on Swindon's Local Channel I am an ardent supporter of Swindon Town Football Club, and have been for many a year. My anger that day in December was based on frustration and emotion. We didn't win the match.

George Ndah blatantly out of the game and receiving a yellow card; Darren Bullock sent off. It was hardly surprising I felt aggrieved as I watched the match. But surely that is one of the problems. We do get passionately involved with what has happened to out team: the controversial penalty incident at Charlton; the disallowed goal at Sheffield United; we are slightly biased and blinkered and want to blame somebody - the referee is an easy target. I wonder how many players have been guilty of playing out of position or giving the ball away resulting in a goal for the opposite, or a manager has got it dreadfully wrong with his team selection and tactics and watched in horror as 3 points slip away. As supporters we leave the

stadium disappointed and the goal or lost points become a topic for after match discussion in the local. Sadly for the referee if he or she makes an error of judgment they know about it instantly. When you face facts it doesn't matter what decision a referee makes during a game somebody is going to be unhappy.

There are calls for referees to become professional and provide them with video screens for action replays. I would certainly agree to the professional bit.

Football is a big business run by professional people so why should amateurs have such an important role to play every match day.

But video evidence? Never.

Where would we draw the line?
Throw-ins, fouls, goals? The list is endless. Messrs Hansen, Hill and Brooking can get it wrong on MOTD and that's after seeing the incident 4 or 5 times. No, leave video play tracks to the Americans and let's enjoy our national game as it is.

Warts and all.

Mind you if you do want to see the incidents again you can always tune into Swindon's Local Channel which broadcasts on Channel 01 on ComTel, with local programmes being shown at 5pm, 6.45, 7.45, 9.45 and 11.45pm.

Enjoys todays game and let's hope we can reverse the scoreline from September, the referee is seen and not heard (but do give him a chance) and Swindon's season is back on tracks.

Michael Owen booked his ticket to France with a sparkling England debut but the Liverpool starlet and the English team were upstaged by a Chilean side that frankly was more skilled and better organised.

Marcelo Sales caught the eye and showed just what persuaded Alex Ferguson to track the £12million striker. His execution of the opening goal, when he cushioned a long through ball on his thigh and volleyed past goalkeeper Nigel Martyn, had hardened journalists drooling that it ranked with the best ever seen at Wembley, maybe so but it is almost an impossible claim to make.

Sales was not the only star in the Chilean armories as for my money, Javier Margas was possibly the man of the match. That endorsement was in fact given to Owen, the third youngest player ever to represent England in a full international.

No one expected us to lose to Chile even though Glenn Hoddle used the game for experimental purposes. Now I see nothing wrong with this policy, in fact he is doing the right thing but what I would question is the England coach's persistence in playing people out of position.

Glenn fielded seven players out of position in his very first selection and for the Chile game had four operating in unfamiliar territory. Philip Neville looked uncomfortable and was replaced by Le Saux at half-time; Robert Lee, so effective in the centre of midfield with *Newcastle* was hardly influential on the right, where Michael Owen ended up after Alan Shearer was brought

on in the 62nd minute.

We had another example of this in the "B" international the previous evening when *Leicester City's* Steve Guppy was thrown on at right wing-back. Guppy is a natural left-footer and a fine crosser of the ball but was unable to demonstrate the fact until being switched to his normal position ten-minutes from time.

Maybe our former manager is trying to assess which players will be most adaptable but the result at Wembley was a disjointed exhibition by a side lacking solidarity at the back and creativity in midfield.

One wonders if he is going to persist with a three-man back line or whether he should not turn to *Arsenal* and *Aston Villa* for his defensive players for these are the only two Premiership sides who have persisted with this strategy and their players are the only ones who seem to understand it and be able to make it work.

Having said that, even Brian Little has abandoned the system recently to revert to a four-man back line. The problem is the three-back game falls apart if the two wing-backs fail to tuck in and support.

So many times Neville, Adams and Campbell, were left exposed against Chile. If they moved out to cover the gaps on the flanks they left the door open through the centre. If they kept this closed they were exposed on the wings.

I noted that in the after-match interviews Roy Hodgson, Blackburn Rovers' astute manager who took Switzerland to the 1994 World Cup Finals, took issue with Glenn's acceptance of the defeat. He felt strongly that we should be very concerned about a loss on home soil.

In retrospect this is possibly England's worst result at Wembley since Sweden beat us 3-2 on a dismal rainy afternoon in October 1959. Then, as now, we never contemplated defeat by the Swedes even though

they had been World Cup Finalists the previous year.

On the positive side Owen proved he has the pace to take on the world and Nigel Martyn looked capable enough and certainly could not be faulted for either goal. But why was Shaka Hislop on the bench, or in the "B" squad for that matter? Surely he is not consistent enough to be considered at this level. Our own Fraser Digby is a better goalkeeper in my opinion and surely it would have been more productive to have included one of the Under-21 custodians for experience.

There is still a lot of work to do between now and June for our former management team of Glenn Hoddle and John Gorman.







If you were writing a script for a TV serial on a team struggling against relegation you wouldn't come up with half the events that have shadowed Manchester City's season.

At Norwich City a fortnight ago City enjoyed at least seventy per cent of the play but could not score, Uve Rosler in particular squandering a handful of chances. West Brom are back in the playoffs and should account for Bury; Reading will expect to ease their position at home to Portsmouth, who crashed 3-0 at Crewe, The gap between Pompey and Bury is widening.

Dario Gradi is the man who keeps unearthing great talents The latest is Colin Little, signed from Hyde United for £50,000, and a striker who will eventually earn the club much more. Keep an eye out for him on the scoresheet at Tranmere today.

OCCSSID Mark Robinson

Mark Robinson has been a regular and consistent performer for the Town and during his four year spell, has made the rightwing back position his own.

Yet as a child "Robbo" was an avid Man City fan. Asked where his loyalties lie for a game like today's he replies "You always have a soft spot for the team you supported as a kid, but when you're a pro you want to win, no matter who you're playing."

Mark Robinson was brought up in Manchester and at the age of 16 signed for West Bromwich Albion. Here he learnt his trade as a footballer and at the end of a two year apprenticeship had played a couple of games for their first team.

Robbo failed to make an impact with the "Baggies", and in 1986 moved on a free-transfer to Barnsley. "This is where things started to go right for me" says Robinson. "It was during my time with Barnsley that I truly believed I could play at a high level and make a career out of football".

At Barnsley Robbo's form was such that he began to attract the attention of bigger clubs and was snapped up in March 1993 by Newcastle for £450,000.

"When I signed for Newcastle they were top of the First Division, ten points clear with eleven games left, so I joined at a great time, they were on the up. We had a terrific squad and


won the league, I thought at the time that it doesn't get much better than this."

Then things went wrong for Mark. In a pre-season friendly he picked up an injury which cost him the first half of the Premiership season. But he isn't bitter "although I was injured for six months, I played in the second half of the season and we ended up third in the race for the title. For a lad like me who, not so long ago, was playing for Barnsley, it was an awesome experience."

But, at the end of this successful season, Robinson knew he would be moving on. Newcastle's manager Kevin Keegan, always looking for perfection, wanted to bring in some big money signings. For Robbo, this meant he could well be sidelined.

A keen competitor, Mark wasn't prepared to languish in the reserve team or keep the subs bench warm, so he looked to the south and Swindon. After talks with John Gorman, Mark Robinson signed in July 1994, the club paying a record £600,000.

"I fancied the move to Swindon Town. I knew a lot of the players, and whenever I played against them they always played good, attractive football. I also saw the set-up was very professional, geared towards playing well and getting back to the Premier League. On a personal note, the countryside is beautiful which makes it a nice area to live in."
