colin todd writes...

Signing as many foreign players as we have in recent times and continuing to look abroad for new talent prompts the obvious question: Are we restricting the opportunities for home grown talent to come through the ranks?

The answer quite simply is NO.

If any youngster attached to this football club is good enough, he will get all the chances and all the encouragement he needs to come through. But he must accept that he has high standards to aspire to.

Claus Jensen and Ricardo Gardner - 21 and 19 respectively - are setting the benchmarks for all our young players. They've both been playing first team football since they were 17 and they have both gained a wealth of experience already at international level - Claus with the under 21's, Ricardo with the full international side.

But all their talent and experience won't be enough to keep a home grown player out of the action if he proves he is good enough.

We have promising young talent here. I've seen it in the reserves and I am monitoring the progress of all our young players. One of the main things I'm looking for is mental strength - the determination of those young players to make the most of their chance when they come along. If they are ready, they'll do well; if they aren't, they will only be letting themselves down.

They have to be tough too. At times youngsters have a tendency to let their disappointment show when things aren't going their way. I see it and the rest of my staff see it. You see how much a player wants to succeed when he grits his teeth and deals with his disappointment in the right way.

You get different pictures when you involve your younger players in the first team squad. You discover whether they are ready for the challenge and the responsibility or whether they need more time.


It's the same with senior players when they are left out of the first XI. They'll come knocking on the manager's door, wanting to know why they aren't in the side. That's understandable; managers have to make unpopular decisions from time to time.

But that shouldn't stop the player from being ever ready to play his part because things can change rapidly and dramatically in football. Injuries, suspensions and loss of form are all factors that can force team changes when they are least expected.

For instance, who would have thought before the game at West Brom earlier this month that Arnar Gunnlaugsson and Bob Taylor would get the opportunity to strike up an attacking partnership. But Nathan Blake and Dean Holdsworth picked up injuries and were suddenly unavailable and Arnar and Bob showed they were fully prepared to take their chances.

People have got to be ready to play their part, however disappointed they might be.

Enjoy the game.



swindon town



Having just survived the relegation dogfight of last season, this time round Swindon are already being pegged by pundits for the drop.

Their struggling fortunes took another turn for the worst last week when manager Steve McMahon left the club.

Tony Matthews previews today's visitors...

the robins

Last Wednesday Steve McMahon quit his job as boss of our welcome visitors to The Reebok Stadium this evening, Swindon Town - the first Division One managerial casualty of 1998-99.

In fairness his leaving had been on the cards for quite some time, especially after a run of disappointing results, at home and away, which came to a head after the Robins had faltered to a 4-1 home reverse against Watford.

Now whoever takes over (the former Bolton Wanderers centre-half Mike Walsh is currently acting as caretaker-manager) will certainly have a difficult job on his hands in terms of settling things down at The County Ground, installing confidence back into the players and more than anything else, winning matches - to avoid a relegation battle!

Since winning promotion in 1995-96, Swindon have had two very disappointing seasons, finishing 19th in 1996-97 - when they were only just clear of relegation - and 18th last term - and again they are lingering far too close to the bottom end of the table, after a series of mixed results, including a 5-2 hammering at Portsmouth, that horrible home reverse against Watford, a 3-0 defeat at Bury, a 1-0 loss away at Wolves and 2-1 beating at Sheffield United.

Before his departure McMahon had been determined to put things right at The County Ground - despite not having a great deal of money to splash out on rebuilding his squad - but after taking a fair amount of criticism from noisy, irate supporters who demonstrated after that defeat at the hands of the Hornets, McMahon left - to seek pastures new.

On paper Swindon Town seem to have a pretty useful squad which includes some experienced and capable footballers. But unfortunately things aren't working out according to plan and one anticipates that the Robins could well be in for another difficult season....if results don't improve quickly.

There is no doubt that whoever takes charge of the team will have his work cut out. One feels that the ardent supporters have had enough of watching a struggling team and with almost a quarter of the season gone, results need to improve sooner rather than later.

If you remember Swindon lost at home to Vauxhall Conference side Stevenage Borough in the F.A. Cup last season - a bitter pill to swallow - but the players quickly got over that humiliation and battled away to finish off the campaign reasonably well.

Now they will have to do the same again - fight on and climb up the table, hoping to even edge towards the play-offs. Football, is a funny game - and anything can happen.....we all know that!

There's no doubt that everyone at Swindon Town had anticipated a far better start this time round, but that's not materialised, and now with autumn upon us and winter slowly drawing in, one suspects that it could be a long, hard challenging season for the Robins. We shall see.

SWINDON TOWN The Facts

CHAMPION SCORER

Over a period of seven years - 1926 to 1933 inclusive - Harry Morris scored a record 230 goals for Swindon Town. In his first season at the club (1926-27) he netted 48 times and all told claimed 216 of his goals in Football League matches.

RECORD HOLDER

Full-back John Trollope made 889 appearances for Swindon in 21 years at the club. He made his debut in 1960 and played his last game in 1981. A total of 770 of his appearances came in the Football League - and only five players - Peter Shilton, Terry Paine, Tommy Hutchison, Robbie James and Alan Oakes - have played in more games in this competition. Trollope also managed Swindon Town from 1980 to 1983.

MANAGERS

Five former internationals - Dave Mackay and Lou Macari (of Scotland), Ossie Ardiles (Argentina) and Glenn Hodde and Steve McMahon (both of England) - have all managed Swindon since 1970. Swindon appointed their first team-manager, Ted Vizard, (ex-Bolton Wanderers and Wales) in 1933.

CAP THAT

Rod Thomas, a full-back with Swindon Town from 1964 to 1973 - appeared in 30 international games for Wales during his time at The County Ground, making him the Robins' most-capped player.

INTRODUCING

Goalkeeper **Frank Talia** (26) was born in Melbourne, Australia and played for Sunshine City in his homeland.

He came to England and had trials with West Bromwich Albion before joining Blackburn Rovers in August 1992.

He failed to make the breakthrough at Ewood Park and after a loan spell with Hartlepool United, he moved to Swindon Town for £150,000 three years ago.

He has now made almost 50 appearances for the Robins.

Swindon's second string 'keeper is young **Steve Mildenhall** (20) who, in fact, kept three blank sheets in his first three outings for the club early last season.

Full-back **David Kerslake** (32) returned to Swindon Town last March, five years after leaving The County Ground for Leeds United. A Londoner, born in Stepney in June 1966, he began his career with Queen's Park Rangers for whom he appeared in 74 senior games before moving to Swindon in November 1989 for £110,000. During his first spell with the Robins he amassed 165 League and Cup appearances, following up with a further eight for Leeds before transferring to Tottenham Hotspur for £450,000 in September 1993. He even had a loan spell back with Swindon in November 1996 and similarly with Charlton Athletic before switching his allegiance to Ipswich Town.

Another loan spell followed, this time with Wycombe Wanderers, prior to his return to The County Ground. Capped by England at schoolboy, youth and under 21 levels.

The vastly experienced Kerslake has now amassed some 335 competitive appearances at club level.

Sunderland sold defender **Gareth Hall** to Swindon in the summer after the 29 year-old former Chelsea man had been on loan to Brentford.

Capped by Wales at full and under 21 levels and by England as a schoolboy, Hall made over 170 appearances for Chelsea.

He can occupy a variety of positions in the back line.

Wimbledon boss Joe Kinnear sold attacker-cum-defender **Alan Reeves** to the Robins three months ago. Now aged 30, he has been in the game for 10 years, having started his League career with Gillingham whilst on loan at The Priestfield Stadium from his first club Norwich City. From Carrow Road he switched to Chester (for £10,000 in 1989) and after three years with Rochdale (July 1991 to September 1994) he moved into the top flight with the Dons.

A powerfully built player, strong in the air, he is dangerous at set pieces and has loads of enthusiasm. Alan's twin brother, David, plays for Chesterfield.

Veteran defender **Brian Borrows** (38 in December) joined the Robins on a permanent basis from Coventry City in September 1997 after a successful loan period at The County Ground. He played initially for Everton, then made over 100 appearances for Bolton Wanderers before going on to make more than 450 for the Sky Blues. He's also served with Bristol City.


Mark Robinson (30) can play at right-back, in the centre of the defence or wide in midfield. He started his professional career with West Bromwich Albion, and after spells with Barnsley (159 outings) and Newcastle United, he signed for Swindon Town in 1994 for £600,000. He has now amassed close on 200 appearances for the Robins

Bobby Howe (24) was signed from Nottingham Forest in January for £30,000 following a loan to Ipswich. He spent eight years as a 'pro' with Forest, playing in 18 games.

Darren Bullock (29) joined Swindon for £400,000 from Huddersfield in 1997. He has appeared in more than 50 first team games for the Robins.

SWINDON TOWN THE ROBINS

The Squad CONTINUED

Mark Walters, the former Liverpool, Aston Villa and England winger, enjoys a wide berth on either flank, but prefers the right these days. He joined the Robins from Southampton at the start of the 1996-97 season.

A former team-mate of ex-manager Steve McMahon at both Villa Park and Anfield, Walters (now aged 34) has lost none of his trickery and is still a class player.

Born in Birmingham, he left Aston Villa for Glasgow Rangers in a £500,000 deal in 1987; he joined Liverpool for £1.25 million four years later and after loan spells with Stoke City and Wolves he moved to Southampton in 1996.


Winner of one full, one 'B' and nine under 21 caps for England, he gained a European Super Cup winners medal with Villa and Scottish Premier and Scottish League Cup winners medals with Rangers and an F.A. Cup winners medal at Anfield. Walters has now passed the personal milestone of 600 appearances at club level (140 goals).

Scott Leitch who is 29 and like Bullock plays in centre-field, was on loan to Swindon from the Scottish club Heart of Midlothian before joining the 'Robins' on a permanent basis at the start of the 1997-98 season for what has proved to be a bargain £15,000, for he's now a key figure in the team's engine-room.

Born in Motherwell, he played over 100 games for Dunfermline Athletic between 1990 and 1993.

Ty Gooden (26 next month) comes from Canvey Island and joined Swindon Town from Wycombe Wanderers in September 1993. He has so far appeared in close on 120 games for the Robins, all of them in midfield and last season he netted twice in 42 outings.

George Ndah (23) from Dulwich, was a £500,000 buy from Crystal Palace last November. A former England youth team player, he began his playing career at Selhurst Park as a trainee, turning professional there in 1992. A big, forceful striker, he scored 11 goals in 100 games for the Eagles and also had loan spells with Bournemouth and Gillingham before joining the Robins.



Iffy Onoura

Fellow striker **Steve Cowe** (24 today) left Villa Park for Swindon in March 1996 for £100,000 after failing to get a game with the Premiership club. He's now had over 80 outings for the Robins and has shown a lot of character as a utility forward, scoring a dozen goals.

Iffy Onoura (aged 31) comes, surprisingly, from Glasgow. He is a 6ft.1in. 13st.12lbs. striker who broke out with Huddersfield in 1989 after leaving Bradford University. He netted 40 times in five years with Huddersfield and then added another eight goals with Mansfield Town before embarking on a career with Gillingham, who secured his services for £25,000 in August 1996.

He claimed 26 goals in 73 outings for the 'Gills' prior to his £120,000 transfer to Swindon Town last March.

• Other squad members include: defender **Sol Davis** (19) from Cheltenham; **Craig Taylor** from Dorchester; **Adam Willis**, formerly of Coventry, midfielder **Robin Hulbert** from Plymouth; Frenchman **Philippe Cuerva**, once of Sochaux; **Kevin Watson** ex-Spurs, and striker **Chris Hay**, who prior to this season had scored 14 goals in 38 games for the Robins since joining from Celtic.

THE MANAGER MIKE WALSH

Mike Walsh needs no introduction to the supporters of Bolton Wanderers, for he played professionally for the club between July 1974 and August 1981, making over 200 appearances as a defender.

Born in Manchester in 1956, he left Burnden Park for Everton and after loan spells with Norwich City, Burnley, Fort Lauderdale (NASL) and Manchester City, he signed for Blackpool in February 1984. He had over 150 outings for the Seasiders prior to having a brief spell with Bury - his last League club.

He was boss at Gigg Lane (1990-95) and after after serving with the Unibond club Barrow he became No.2 at Swindon (under McMahon who had been a colleague at Everton) in October 1996.

Capped five times by the Republic of Ireland, Walsh made more than 350 League appearances over a period of 17 years.

This match was the first of the Marathon League Cup-tie, which turned out to be the longest League Cup-tie in the history of the competition. The Cup-tie eventually went to a third replay. In the first match the Wanderers made a great comeback with the match looking like earning Swindon a home tie against Southampton. Mark Came took to the field, with the game poised at 3-2 for the Robins.

Came was making a comeback after breaking his leg 14 months earlier and he hit a last minute equaliser to earn the Wanderers a 3-3 draw.

In the replay Burden Park saw its biggest crowd for 3 years when 11,535 saw the two sides fail to produce a winner after extra time. The tie finished 1-1.

Phil Brown fired home a 25 yard shot seven minutes into the second period of extra time, which looked like earning the Whites victory, but only two minutes later Duncan Shearer took the tie to a 3rd match. A flip of the coin decided the venue, Phil Brown calling correctly to secure Burden Park as the choice.


This time 14,129 fans saw another 1-1 draw and another 120 minutes of football. Tony Phillisikirk converted a penalty for Bolton, whilst David Felgate saved a penalty from Swindon's captain Ross MacClaren, but Swindon's much travelled striker Steve White hit their equaliser.

A 68 year old club record was equalled that night when the Wanderers unbeaten home run of 27 games unbeaten matched the one set by the side of season 1920-21. With the Wanderers losing at Blackpool on the Saturday in the FA Cup they were determined not to go out of both major cup competitions inside four days.

The side with many injury problems were minutes away from forcing Ossie Ardilles' outfit to a fourth replay, but it was not to be as a Ross MacClaren's deflected shot saw the Robins end this thrilling Cup tie. Mark Came scored the Wanderers goal in the 2-1 defeat. Bolton had done the 3rd division proud by matching Swindon man for man.

The First Division side certainly knew they had been in a cup-tie. Phil Neal's team was definitely improving as a team and it was proved, as they reached the play off final (pre Wembley days) losing to Notts County 3-1 on aggregate.

Keeping the fans Dry







It was good to see boys of 9 year of age playing small-sided games and being encouraged to show their skills.

- The oldest teams in the Division, in terms of status, are Bolton, West Brom and Wolves, who were all founder members of the Football League way back in 1888.

- Swindon Town won their opening League game in some style and their goalscorers in that nine-goal drubbing of Luton Town were Fleming (4), Batty (2), Davies, Jefferson and an opponent (og).

PLAYED FOR BOTH CLUBS

BRIAN BORROWS

Liverpool born Brian Borrows was signed by Everton as a Schoolboy in 1975. He made his first team debut at right back, for the Toffeemen against Stoke City in February 1982.

He made his last appearance for the Merseysiders in a Derby Match against Liverpool in November 1983. He joined Bolton originally on loan in March 1983, and took up a midfield place in the Clubs unsuccessful bid to stay in Second Division

In the following season Borrows moved back to his more familiar position of right back in his two full seasons with the Wanderers Borrows proved to be a model of consistency.

That form persuaded Coventry City to part with £80,000 for his services, again at Coventry Borrows made the right back position his own making over 350 appearances for the Midlands Club.

In recent times Bristol City and Now Swindon Town have had the pleasure of Brian Borrows playing skill and a true professional.

Wanderers record 110 appearances.

MARK SEAGRAVES

Mark Seagraves started his career with Liverpool; he didn't manage a League appearance for the Reds but did play in two-Cup ties. In September 1987 Manchester City paid £100,000 but it wasn't till 1989 that Seagraves became a regular.


He made 42 appearances for City before the Wanderers signed him in September 1990 for again £100,000. He formed a partnership with Alan Stubbs at the heart of the Wanderers defence during 1990-91 it helped the Whites reach Wembley in the play off final against Tranmere Rovers a match, which they lost 1-0.

A regular member of the side that won promotion from Division two in 1993.

Injury kept him out for most of the 1994-95 season and his final game for Bolton came in April 1995 in a 1-1 draw at Stoke City.

In June 1995 Swindon Town signed him again for £1000,000 and he became an important member of their defensive set-up as they won the second division championship.




Nathan Blake and Mark Fish in action against Crewe







Over the last few weeks the BBC GMR roadshow has been situated in Bolton's town centre, and appears to have attracted plenty of interest from Wanderers fans.



In goal Phil Whitehead wears the number one shirt at present. Oxford defence includes the experienced Steve Davis who arrived from Barnsley for £75,000 last years' "player of the year". Along with Les Robinson, Phil Whelan and youngster Simon Marsh.

Dean Windass leads the midfield, the ex Hull and Aberdeen player came to the Manor Ground last season. Martin Gray and Danny Hill came from Sunderland and Tottenham respectively. The forward line is lead by Nicky Banger, the ex-Oldham and Southampton man is now finding his feet after a slow start in Oxfordshire.

The O's prize asset and a player linked with the Wanderers during the summer is last season's leading goalscorer Joey Beauchamp. Beauchamp is a real handful for any defence on his day. Waiting in the wings is the 6ft 7 striker Kevin Francis who joined Oxford for £100,000 from Birmingham City last year.

So it look like being a uphill struggle for Shotton and his team this season and if Bolton are going to bounce straight back to the Premiership it's teams like this they've got to beat at the Reebok.






EDDIE GOODALL


Goalkeeper Eddie Goodall hailed from South Shields and began his career with Jarrow. He played for both Chesterfield and North Shields before being snapped up by Hull City where he made his League debut.

He played 26 games for Hull during 1937/38 before signing for the Wanderers later that season. He went straight into the Wanderers line up at the start of the 1938/39 season which saw a 2-1 first division victory over Charlton Athletic at Burnden Park.

He went on to play in twelve League games that term as Stan Hanson managed to reclaim his place in the line up.

Those were to be Goodall's only League games for the Wanderers in peace time but he was the club's regular 'keeper during 1939/40 in the North West Division of the War Regional League.

He passed away aged 64 years in September 1978.

HARRY GOSLIN

Harry Goslin joined the Wanderers in August 1930 for a donation of £25 to Nottingham club Boots Athletic.

Goslin hailed from Willington in the north east and succeeded Fred Kean at half back, making his debut in a 7-2 defeat at Liverpool in September 1930.

He became a mainstay in the Wanderers line up, being appointed the skipper, and was also a familiar face in the town where he ran a cycle shop in the Churchgate area.

Goslin helped the Wanderers reach the FA Cup semi's and win promotion from Division Two in 1935 and missed only six games in five seasons before the war.

He left the Wanderers' team to sign up for the 53rd Field Regiment Royal Artillery at the start of the war and captained that side in numerous games that were played around the world.

He gained England recognition in their wartime team and also guested for both Norwich and Chelsea during the hostilities.

His last appearance for Bolton came in a war game against York City in March 1942 and he lost his life whilst serving his country in the Italian campaign in December 1943.

In all he played 334 Football League and FA Cup games for the club in which he scored 23 goals.

Doing His Owen Thing

Birmingham fans are badly in need of consolation after their side lost at home to Grimsby last week but manager Trevor Francis believes that it will not be long in coming.

He thinks supporters are about to witness the emergence of a new teenage sensation: 17-year old Andrew Johnson who made his debut against Bury and Francis said: "Andrew did well.

He is the leading light among my youth squad, a real bright spark who will surely enjoy an extremely exciting future.

"He is quick, very, very quick. He can pause - and then leave defenders for dead with another burst of running."

Johnson himself says: "Michael Owen is my idol. I study his every move - how he finds room, how he uses his tremendous pace, how he acts in the penalty box. "I look at his phenomenal progress and set out to be as good as he is.

"He should be a hero for all players of my age."

Upside Dean

Cash-stricken Oxford United were beaten 7-0 recently but reckon they have a player who can save their season alone. Dean Windass is their club's record signing, bought with money made available by the sale of Matt Elliott to Leicester. Windass cost £475,000 from Aberdeen over the summer, but his versatility means that he is worth every penny.

He is already the chief playmaker and leading scorer - and now he claims that his best position is up front where he played in Scotland for years.

He says, "I got two goals from midfield against Portsmouth, but I have told the manager that I would be happier if I could play up front.

"I have played up front all my career and believe I can do a job there for Oxford, but at the moment they want me in midfield."

Oxford's assistant manager Mark Harrison says, "Dean is a very creative player, and we can all see the quality he has got. We just need to get the ball to him more."

Young, Gifted and Thwack

Crystal Palace manager Terry Venables is worried about wonderkid Matt Jensen. The 21-year old is a talented dribbler, but word of his skills has got round First Division defenders and Venables knows that he has become a marked man.

He warns: "Matt must sort out when he should run with the ball and when he should release it. He has got talent in abundance."

Missing the Point

Bury may be through to the next round of the Worthington Cup, but manager Neil Warnock knows that his side has more realistic chance of success in the League than in cup competitions.

"I would swap three points anytime for a win in this cup, although I know that the Chairman will not agree because of the money factor," he says.

The Shakers slipped into eighth position this week after their narrow 1-0 defeat at the hands of Wolves and have drawn Manchester United at Old Trafford in the next round of the Worthington Cup!

Huddersfield Town manager Peter Jackson has a blue and white striped shirt in a frame behind his desk. Under it is the inscription, "Wear the shirt with pride."


That was what Jackson did in his 135 appearances as a player for the club and he is now trying to instill that attitude into every player at the club.

McGhee admits that he could do with the money, and the club's finance chief John Richards is fully aware of the dilemma. He says: "Froggatt wants to compete at the top level, and who can blame him? We have a saleable asset worth £1.5m today who could be worth nothing in just a few months time. But what should we do? Steve may well prove to be worth much more to us than that if he helps us to get into the Premiership."

Keep Your Aaron

Stockport County are sure that they have unearthed a star of the future in 18-year old Aaron Wilbraham. The youngster had a hand in both goals in their recent 2-0 win over Grimsby, despite only coming on as substitute in the 70th minute.

County chairman Brendon Elwood says: "Aaron is a superstar in the making." He has offered him a contract keeping him in Stockport until he is 22. Wilbraham sees himself as a first team fixture and says: "I have not renewed my season-ticket for Manchester City after having one for over six years.

"They probably would not want to see me there anyway. I got my only ever goal against them last season."

to programmes down the years

This is the seventh in a series of 25 articles by the Editor of **PROGRAMME MONTHLY** magazine describing how programmes have changed over a century and a quarter of Association Football

7. Wembley and the Big Match Programme

We have previously noted that the Football Association were reluctant to get involved in programme production for F.A. Cup Finals, but that all changed in 1923 when Wembley opened; albeit the publishers of Cup Final and international issues from that venue were the stadium authorities themselves, with F.A. approval!

The scale and design of these programmes matched that of the venue. For the first time, colour appeared on British programme covers, and the contents were more substantial with more photographs and greater coverage of players.

Wembley opened with that famous 'White Horse' final in 1923 and the programme for that fixture (reproduced here, courtesy of Tony Matthews) comprised 28 pages, arguably the most pages published up to that time. It should be noted, in passing, that this truly is the 'Penny Black' of programme collecting - it is the most famous item, but by no means the rarest nor the most expensive nor coveted!

Host clubs continued to issue programmes for Cup semi-finals and international and representative matches played at their grounds (until the 1950s the majority of England's international matches were staged on club grounds).

Hitherto, the clubs had merely issued similar, if not identical, programmes to their standard League issues, but the example shown by Wembley spurred them into making a special effort for the big games entrusted to their care.

An example of this is Chelsea, who maintained the same four or eight page issue, with blue print on white paper, until after the Second World War.

In October 1934, they staged the English League v. Scottish League match at Stamford Bridge and issued a special programme, comprising the normal 8 pages, but with photographs on the centre spread and front cover, and red print as well as the standard blue on the front page. The price remained at the usual 2d.


Wembley programmes were not only the first to use full colour, but they also saw a rich variety of programme designs. All of the pre-Second World War covers relied on sketches and graphics, with photographs used sparingly, and some of the full colour sketches were very attractive indeed.

Almost all of them featured the 'twin towers' in some form or another, whether in a photograph (1925), logo (1935), or as background (1933 and 1931).


Most years saw an advertisement at the bottom of the front page - either 'Drink Bovril...Once it's in your sinew' or 'Expert Criticism of today's cup tie by Charles Buchan in the Daily News (or News Chronicle).'

The example set by Wembley ensured that from then on big match programmes would invariably fit the occasion they sought to represent, and programme buyers could anticipate something superior to the normal League fare.
