

Background

Life is a circle – and so is football



few days ago my memory was more than jogged when a journalist was trying to get me to comment on the present England manager situation. He wanted me to do an article for Football Monthly.

I nearly succumbed, for that football magazine was part and parcel of my teenage years. Charles Buchan's Football Monthly.

Unlike today it had little or no competition although I do remember another magazine called Soccer Star which only cost one shilling as opposed to Football Monthly's one and sixpence!

For some reason I still have all of the magazines from 1959 through to 1966. I don't know why – perhaps because I got a binder for each of

those eight

years

and consequently they have managed to sit quietly on my bookshelves during the last 40 years.

As a matter of interest I glanced through the March 1959 edition and here is a selection of some of the personalities mentioned along with the footballing issues that were of paramount importance all those years ago.

The magazine always opened up with an opinion column by Charles Buchan himself

In March 1959 his column was headlined 'Only one way – cut divisions down to 18 clubs to gain spare days'.

He quoted Nat Lofthouse as wanting the season to start on March 1 and end on October 31. The quest for summer football is certainly not new.

Stan Cullis wanted a winter break in January and February extending the season until the end of July.

There was an article on Roy Dwight – we all know his cousin Reg – of Nottingham Forest explaining why he had left Fulham.

Joe Shaw of Sheffield United explained that he actually became a centre-half by chance. The Blades were playing Manchester City and Don

Talking points in the letters pages, and a column by journalist John Thompson covered such issues as:

- League clubs to be used as social centres for youngsters
- The poor state of stadiums, especially Wembley
- · The advent of summer football
- The poor preparation time for the international team
- · Stop the back pass to the goalkeeper
- . The poor standard of British referees

Thompson actually finished his article in a somewhat cynical fashion by saying that one glimpse of hope for the year 2000 was that Stanley Matthews would still be the world's greatest outside right!

Arthur Rowe, manager of the Spurs 'push and run' champions, had an article on centre forwards.

Clifford Webb wrote about how clubs should take on board the value of women supporters, but I am certain he would not get away today with his comment that "once they get into the swing of things, they can be extremely decorative in the stands and on the terraces".


There were photographs of Ray Pointer, Arthur Cheesebrough, Colin McDonald, Johnny Angus and Brian Pilkington – players from that successful Burnley side.

Ron Ashman of Norwich City, Phil Taylor manager of Second Division Liverpool, featured in the magazine.

In all it was a good read – stirring many memories but only proving once again that in the main what goes round also comes round. Same arguments, same discussions – just different names in a different era.





How the Hornets' web is spun

When he was matchball sponsor for our recent game with Sunderland, Andy Houldsworth of Digital Ink (Solutions) Ltd almost enjoyed an afternoon off.



Andy, pictured with his children Alexander and Grace, and Alexandre Bonnot, Chris Day, Keith Millen and Nigel Gibbs, designs and manages the official site. Much of his work revolves around matchdays, and although he dined in the Hornets Nest Restaurant and watched the Sunderland game from the Rous Stand, he still came armed with his lap-top to provide regular site updates.

By the start of tonight's match against Swindon the news page on the Official Watford FC web site will have been updated well over 100 times since the start of 1999. This figure doesn't include changes to the results on the fixtures list, league positions, match and player statistics which are updated after every match. Nor does it include updating scores and fixtures for the Reserves and Academy teams.

To give you an idea of what is involved in bringing this service to fans at home and abroad, we thought we would give you a 'behind-the-scenes' look at what went on during our FA Cup Third Round tie against Spurs.

- 14:30 WFC Press Officer Andrew French phones Andy Houldsworth with the team line ups for the match. The news page and the main club home page are updated and fans on the independent Watford Mailing List are e-mailed to notify them that the teams are listed.
- 15:00:52 Richard Johnson scores after 52 seconds and AF rings AH with the good news, the news page and the welcome page are updated and the goal e-mailed to the mailing list.
- 15:11 Iversen scores for Spurs and the update process is repeated (with less enthusiasm this time!) as AF rings AH.
- 15:13 Darren Anderton scores a penalty, AF rings AH as he is still updating the previous goal.
- 15:19 Anderton corner, Iversen scores again another update and more e-mails.
- 15:34 Kennedy makes it 3-2, again AF rings, AH updates the news and the main page and e-mails the mailing list.
- 15:42 Allan Neilsen drives home a low shot from 25 yards and, you guessed it, we repeat the process.
- 15:46 Half time, AF rings AH with a mini-match report and also rings to let him know that Ronny Rosenthal comes on as substitute for Micah Hyde.

 Another news page and main page update.
- 16:45 Fox scores after 86 minutes.
- 16:48 Match ends, AF rings AH with the crowd figures and the substitutions.





"The BBC were very keen to work with Watford, because they were aware of our long-standing commitment to all areas of the community," explained Football in the Community Officer Kirk Wheeler.

Media coverage is a welcome reward for the Scheme's efforts - but just as pleasing for Kirk, Rob Smith and the other members of the Community Scheme are the happy faces and positive reactions of those that their work touches.

A perfect example of this was the recent visit by Allan Smart, Nick Wright and Richard Johnson to the Stanmore Orthopaedic Hospital where they met Daniel Porter, who is recovering from cancer treatment (see picture above right).

WINDON TOWN FC was founded in 1881 by Reverend William Pitt as a result of a merger between two teams from the old and new areas of the town.

After a disappointing spell at the turn of the century, they improved greatly between 1908 and 1914 under Sam Allen.

They never finished lower than fourth in the Southern League, were champions twice and runners-up on three occasions.

In 1911 Swindon won their first championship but they lost 8-4 when they met Manchester United in the Charity Shield.

Although the Second World War had a major effect on football, Swindon prospered financially as players were only paid for appearances, thus reducing the wage bill. But, after the war, things took a turn for the worse with poor form and money problems.

The period surrounding the League Cup success in 1969 was in many ways the golden era of the club.

Although just missing out on promotion, Town won the cup with a 3-1 extra-time win over Arsenal at Wembley.

The 1969/70 season saw Town win more silverware - the Anglo-Italian Cup Winners Cup and the Anglo-Italian Cup, beating Roma and Napoli respectively.

The Robins

They also finished fifth in the Second Division - the club's highest-ever finish.

In the early 1980's the club were languishing in the Fourth Division when Lou Macari became manager.

After a shaky start (Macari was sacked for several days before being reinstated) the new manager's belief in fitness and direct play saw Swindon win the league with 102 points. They followed this with promotion again the next season, by beating Gillingham in the play-offs.

In 1990, Town - under the guidance of Ossie Ardiles - beat Sunderland in the play-offs at Wembley to reach the top flight for the first time. However, players and fans were then left stunned as the Football League punished them for financial irregularities by demoting them two divisions.

However, in 1993, with Glenn Hoddle in charge, they beat Leicester 4-3 in a classic play-off final to reach the Premier League.

Their attacking play won many friends but not enough points, and they were relegated after one season. Within 12 months they had dropped to Division Two, but bounced back to Division One the following season as runaway champions.

Our last encounter

EFORE last September's meeting at the County Ground our last League clash against Swindon Town was in the 1994-95 season.

The game took place on March 11, 1995, and prior to the match the Wiltshire side were in the relegation zone with the Hornets in 11th place.

The game went by the form book eventually, but it was not until the second-half that the Hornets made the breakthrough. Skipper Andy Hessenthaler netted the opener and then helped to set up Kevin Phillips for the deciding strike his second League goal for the club in four appearances.

Swindon Town were unable to escape the drop at the end of the season after falling out of the Premiership a year earlier.

In charge

IORMER Swindon Town I favourite Jimmy Quinn has gathered a wealth of experience over his career, playing for the likes of Blackburn Rovers, Leicester City and West Ham United, as well as managing Reading and picking up 48 full international caps for Northern Ireland.

During his stint as a player at the County Ground, he scored 43 goals in 86 appearances and went on to net 94 times for Reading.

Jimmy was appointed as Swindon manager earlier this season, shortly after Watford's 4-1 victory at the County Ground.

Since then he has turned the club's fortunes around, and they are now moving up the Division One table.

Jimmy has the former Bolton Wanderers, Everton, Manchester City and Blackpool defender Mike Walsh as his assistant.

In charge

Having struggled during the early part of the season, Swindon now find they have some breathing space between themselves and the relegation zone. Manager Jimmy Quinn has drawn on his many years of experience to steady the ship after arriving during the season, and now has Town heading in the right direction.

USTRALIAN keeper Frank
Talia was spotted playing for
his country's Under-21 side
and after several trials was signed
by Blackburn Rovers in 1992.
Failed to make a first-team
appearance at Ewood Park and
joined Swindon in November 1995.

Jimmy Glass moved to the County Ground from Bournemouth under the Bosman Ruling in the summer. He began his career at Crystal Palace and went on loan to Portsmouth before switching to Dean Court.

Another player to join Swindon under the Bosman Ruling was defender **Gareth Hall**. His career began at Chelsea where he flourished under Glenn Hoddle. The Welsh international then moved to Sunderland and was a regular in the Premiership.

Mark Robinson started his career at West Bromwich Albion joining Barnsley on a free transfer. His form there persuaded Newcastle to pay £450,000 for him in 1993. Swindon then paid a club record £600,000 to sign him in July 1994.

Swindon paid non-League Dorchester Town £25,000 in April 1997 for Craig Taylor, younger brother of former Town favourite Shaun. Made a dream debut with a 35-yard goal against Port Vale.

Former Bolton, Everton and Coventry defender **Brian Borrows** joined Swindon in November 1997. The Liverpool-born defender made more than 400 appearances for Coventry.

David Kerslake is currently enjoying his third stint at Swindon having joined on a free transfer from Ipswich in March 1998. He made 165 appearances in his first spell before a £500,000 move to Leeds, and later played in the Premiership with Spurs.

Alan Reeves quit the 'Crazy Gang' at Wimbledon to join Swindon. The defender cost the Dons £300,000 when he moved south from Rochdale four years ago.

Impressive form in trial matches earned **Adam Willis** a free transfer move from Coventry to Swindon.

He was recommended by Brian Borrows, who had seen him firsthand at Coventry.

Young defender Sol Davis may be only 19, but has become a regular member of the Robins' team this season. He joined the club as a trainee and has worked his way through the ranks at the County Ground.

Ty Gooden was signed by Swindon in 1993, having been released by Wycombe Wanderers. Played a major part in the Second Division Championship success but was hindered by injuries the following season.

Former Motherwell, Dunfermline and Hearts midfielder **Scott Leitch** signed for Swindon in 1996 for just £15,000. Had originally impressed during a loan period at the County Ground.

Having been capped by England and played for Aston Villa, Glasgow Rangers and Liverpool, **Mark Walters** was an experienced asset to Swindon's ranks when joining from Southampton in July 1996. Has come back after suffering a knee injury at the end of last season.

Young midfielder Robin Hulbert went on loan to Newcastle last season, and gained experience working with the Premiership club. Was a member of the England Under-18 squad for the European Championships in the summer.

After 17 appearances for Nottingham Forest, **Bobby Howe** moved to Swindon in January 1998. The midfielder had previously had loan spells at Kettering and Ipswich.

Following 12 first-team outings at Spurs under Terry Venables, **Kevin Watson** went on loan to Bristol City and Barnet before joining Swindon on a free transfer in July 1996.

After missing most of the 1996/97 season through injury, **Lee Collins** has worked his way back. Joined Swindon for £15,000 from Scottish side Albion Rovers.

French midfielder **Philippe Cuervo** impressed during a trial period and then signed from Sochaux just before the start of the season. Has been hampered by a hip problem.

Key players


Striker Chris Hay was signed from Celtic for £330,000 a week before last season started, and immediately repaid Swindon by hitting 13 goals in 20 appearances before Christmas. Town had spent a year tracking him before he joined.

After the departure of Wayne Allison to Huddersfield, Swindon snapped up George Ndah for £500,000 from Crystal Palace in November 1997. The former England Youth international scored on his debut.

Former Huddersfield, Mansfield and Gillingham striker Iffy Onoura joined Town in March 1998. Scored the winner on his debut but then suffered a fractured cheekbone a few weeks later after an accidental collision with a referee!



Charlie Griffen was signed for £10,000 from non-league Chippenham Town, where he was top scorer in the Screwfix League with 30 goals.






TALKING through topical issues with Watford's no 1 and the 1997/98 'Player of the Season', Alec Chamberlain

FTER all the rumours, it is now confirmed that Kevin Keegan is the new England manager - until June anyway.

I think it would have been difficult for him to go back on his word after saying he wanted to honour his contract at Fulham.

Lawrie McMenemy made a good point, saying that by taking the job part-time he has been shrewd. He can see how things go, have a look at results, decide whether the media are backing to him. Then, after that, he can decide if the job is for him or not. If he is going to do the job part-time then he will have to delegate, and give some of the duties to the backroom staff that he has chosen. The only problem might be that Keegan can't go and watch Premiership games on a Saturday.

He is the perfect man for the job in terms of charisma and experience though. He has been there and done everything. He commands a lot of respect, both for what he did as a player and for his style as a manager. That is half the battle, to have people want you and to enjoy the way you play the game.

Looking further ahead, if these four games he is in charge for go well then he might turn round and say he can be part-time for the rest of his Fulham contract. If that is the case, you have to wonder what other options the FA have. He is their choice and probably the people's choice. He would have been my selection as manager. Terry Venables was probably the journalist's choice because he was

so media-friendly, but Keegan has a similar personality and I feel he has already proved he has the credentials for the job.

THE other big story recently was clearly the FA Cup tie between Arsenal and Sheffield Wednesday, and the decision to replay it.

In my opinion, the

Arsenal players were out of order by doing what they did. They knew what they were doing in my mind. You could possibly excuse Kanu but throwing the ball back is a worldwide thing. It's not something exclusive to the English game. But there was no excuse for Overmars. He saw what was happening but then made a darting run to score. You would think he

would have stood still and left it. With the decision to replay the game, I think Arsenal have come out of it all smelling of roses. I think the replay should have been at Sheffield. It would have been grossly unfair had Sheffield not got a replay, and I think Arsenal were very cute to offer a replay straight away. After all, they knew they had home advantage and would have players back from suspension. This incident must lead to a rule change - that is the best thing that can come out of it all. If there is a rule change, there is no fear of anyone trying to abuse this sort of situation again.







The Football Task Force Rt. Hon. David Mellor PC QC

T is a pleasure to be asked to contribute to the Hornets' programme as Chairman of the Football Task Force.

I have fond memories of watching Watford take on Everton in the FA Cup Final of 1984. I am glad to see that the club, under the able stewardship of Graham Taylor, has bounced back so well and is still in the hunt for a promotion place.

Watford has long been regarded as a well-run family club and in many ways it might almost be seen as a model setup. It reaches out to all sections of the community and by and large secures equal treatment for its fans. Thanks to the work of my good friend Howard Wells, the club has in place a good team off the pitch, working diligently behind the scenes, as well as on it.

The Hornets represent much of what the Football Task Force stands for in trying to secure a fairer deal for supporters across the country. Football has continued throughout the 1990's to be a growth industry, with more and more money flooding into the game. Fans have not always felt the benefits. Indeed, in many instances supporters have suffered at the hands of an industry increasingly concerned with profitability at the expense of traditional supporters' rights.

Whilst in opposition, the Labour Government's 'Charter for Football' set out the vision for a 'Football Task Force'. In an effort to improve all aspects of football, the Task Force was charged with "establishing a detailed response to a widely recognised need for change". We were presented with a challenging remit, to secure a fair deal for football fans and the game.

The Football Task Force represents the first attempt to bring together individuals from all areas of the game to discuss the issues that will dominate the game in the future. This consensual process has been the backbone of success. The ability of the Task Force to bring together representatives from all areas of football, acknowledge individual concerns and still bring about agreement on difficult issues has been

one of our greatest strengths and has given real substance to our recommendations.

Added to this, the Task Force has undertaken a rigorous national tour in order to make sure that real fans have had the opportunity to have their say. This series of regional visits, to ten cities in all areas of the country, has allowed us to discover the issues that really concern the fans.

And now, as the Task Force enters the final and most complex part of its work, its standing has never been higher. We have produced three reports dealing with Disabled Access, Racism and most recently "Investing in the Community". Each one has been warmly welcomed throughout the game and in particular by those whom the report was specifically targeting.

We made over 30 major recommendations in each of our reports "Eliminating Racism from Football" and "Improving Facilities for Disabled Supporters". Both reports will secure important improvements in their relevant fields, be it outlawing racist chanting by individuals or allowing home and away disabled fans to sit amongst fellow supporters at all grounds.

On January 11 of this year the Task Force launched its third report "Investing in the Community", tackling the issues of players as role models, football in the community and the importance of supporter involvement in the running of clubs. The report made some tough recommendations on all issues. It paves the way for huge new investment in football's grassroots. We must now push for government to take these recommendations

forwards.

As the Task Force embarks on its final, and some say, most difficult report into commercial aspects we will have to tackle head-on many vital issues. The Task Force has a responsibility to our national game and we must not shirk from the responsibilities that we face in the coming months. We must present a coherent strategy for securing the future prosperity of football – a strategy which recognises the commercial concerns whilst securing the rights of those to whom the game ultimately belongs, namely the fans.





Andrew French talks to... CHRIS

BIT like the losing team's ribbons on Cup Final Day, the reserve goalkeeper is in contention for the game but seldom gets a slice of the action.

For Chris Day, that has been the story of the season at first-team level but he remains positive and, more importantly, ready should his chance arrive.

"It doesn't really frustrate me because, come a Friday, you know that if Alec Chamberlain is fit he is going to play," he explained.

"Then, on a Saturday, you watch the game and see what everyone else sees. You just have to make sure you are ready."

Goalkeepers tend to have good working relationships, but the understudy must always have that feeling that an injury or loss of form could open the door.

"It is a strange feeling at times. Although you are always looking for a chance to get into the first team, I wouldn't wish injury or poor form on Alec because we get on very well.

"You have to be able to work with each other. You need the other goalkeepers at the club to back you up. There is this sort of goalkeepers' union, because we do get stick from the outfield players and it is a specialised position.

"But I think any goalkeeper would say you do think sometimes that if the keeper did get just a little niggling injury, it would give you the chance to nick a place in the team."

Spare time on Saturday afternoons is not something Chris has much of though, as he has spent much of the season as a co-commentator on BBC 3 Counties Radio.

"I think I've become the Entertainment Manager at Watford," he joked. "Whether I'm having my picture taken in the Rous Stand, meeting disabled fans or doing the commentary, I'm usually up to something on a Saturday. Instead of a keeper's jersey next season, I think they're making me a redcoat!

"I do enjoy the radio work. It keeps you tuned into the opposition teams, so if I get my chance I know that Bradford's Blake likes a long shot or Keane at Wolves likes to turn a certain way. You see those things because you have to comment on them during a commentary. Who knows, perhaps in later years it is something I might be able to go into.

"I'd never done radio work before I came to Watford, but then I am never short of a word or two around the club. I always felt I could adapt to it. I think the next stage is to perfect my Mike Vince commentary voice!"

On the field, Chris has helped the Reserves to challenge for the Avon Insurance Combination title with a ratio of a clean sheet every two games.

"In any game you play you must play to win, and it doesn't matter if that is first-team, reserves or just a friendly. I put my all into the Reserves and this season has been really pleasing. Last season the boys were younger but this time round they are a year wiser and that reflects in the results.

"I believe this will be the last year of the Combination, so I keep reminding the boys that I won it and got a tankard at Spurs, and that this is their last chance.

"As for the clean sheets, that is my job. That is what I train for. Alec keeps joking with me that he'd like to borrow some of my clean sheets. There have been a lot this season, but when I was at Spurs in the youth team I kept 19 in 24 games once. The only problem was I let in four and five in the middle of that sequence luckily we scored five and six and won those two games!"

Chris is also the proud holder of England caps at both Under-18 and Under-21 level.

"I think people tend to forget that I played 10 games for the Under-21's and won the European Championships with the Under-18's. I also played 30 games for Crystal Palace in the season they reached the Premier League. But the only thing fans ever shout at me is 'Tottenham reject', and that was a kid wearing an Arsenal shirt behind the goal at Northwood when we were playing Chelsea Reserves!"

Any interview with Chris has to include the question prompted by so many of his colleagues' comments in the programmes is his dress sense really that bad?

"I think, earlier in the season, the boys weren't sure who to pick for worst dancer and worst dresser, so they kept picking Clint and me because they knew we would take it well.

"As it has gone on, Nick Wright and Allan Smart have had a few mentions. I've actually picked Smarty because he possesses some real 'Alan Partridge' gear.

"I've got to say as well, the foreign lads are in a completely different league to us, on and off the pitch. The way they prepare, the way they play, it's different to the rest of us, but I'll tell you what - the way they dress is as well. Some of their gear is outrageous.

"I haven't got bad clothes. I just don't like wearing bog-standard suits - I would rather jazz them up a bit. I get a bit of stick for it, but I don't mind that."

Sunday February 14 1999 Saracens 48 West Hartlepool 27

N a cold, wet and windy winter's afternoon the first Premiership clash to be played at Vicarage Road for 5 weeks was set to be a fascinating encounter.

West Hartlepool have been in "Giant Killing" form of late, dispensing easily with Wasps in January and coming close to a couple of other notable scalps, whilst Saracens up turn in form have seen them unbeaten in their last seven games, producing some excellent spells of running rugby and memorable tries.

Two minutes into the match Saracens were awarded a penalty which was kicked well into the visitor's 22 and from the attacking line-out Alain Penaud's dummy and side step saw him over for a try, which, surprisingly went unconverted. Shortly after the restart another penalty was placed deep inside "West's" territory and, after an excellent catch and drive Saracens were held just short of the line. From the resulting scrum Pienaar broke, linking with Diprose who powered over to score. Ten points up after 6 minutes and another penalty, which again was kicked to the corner. From the resulting catch and drive Saracens were awarded another penalty for infringing and Johnson duly slotted the kick.

Saracens now seemed to be in charge with Diprose sending a long pass out to Thirlby on the wing who sped round his opposite number and then chipped the full back only to be late tackled. West seemed to gain some resolve at this point and slowly began to get themselves in to the game. Had Wallace, Hill and Penaud not been so sound in defence they would have got there sooner.

Saracens' domination of the set scrums now seemed to incur the displeasure of the referee and the forwards seemed to lose the plot a little in the loose. West now gained the upper hand and a lot more possession and for ten minutes exerted a lot of pressure which resulted in three converted penalties from Vile their fly half. Next Penaud, whilst running out of defence, attempted a long pass to Thirlby which was read by West's winger, Jones, who promptly intercepted to race unopposed under the posts to make the scoreline read 13-14.

At this point the ghosts of Christmas past seemed to be rearing their ugly heads but Bracken soon exorcised these thoughts as Pienaar headed an impressive forward

drive with three forwards in turn driving on and then laying the ball back for the next man, the fourth being Bracken who shot through the middle to score under the posts and Johnson duly converted to make the half time score 20-14.

For ten minutes of the second half the visitors held their own, defending well and getting a good share of possession, but a fine run by Daniel set up Ravenscroft who was denied only by a last ditch tap tackle and Saracens were back on top. Now came a surprise break from Penaud with Diprose thundering up in support to take his pass and go over for his second, Johnson converted and Saracens were clear by 27-14. At this point Hill left the field for repairs and was blood replaced by Ogilvie who was to add to his growing reputation, and almost immediately Penaud was off again speeding round a ruck inside his own 22 and then spinning an excellent long pass out to Constable who put his foot down, shooting past his opposite number and winger, and then passing the ball back inside to the supporting Thirlby who ran in unopposed from the 22, Johnson again supplied the extra two points.

West Hartlepool again showed resilience and pinched a Saracens lineout with centre Tanginoa finding a perfect line of running to go in under the posts. Hill now returned and Pienaar and Flatman left the field to be replaced by Reidy (where's the hair?). Diprose now sparked a move by taking a quick penalty and was on hand to finish it with his hat-trick try. Another Vile

penalty pegged Saracens back to 41-27 but Daniel was to have the final word. As he received a clearance kick inside Saracens half the crowd seemed to sense that he was setting himself up for one of his mesmerising runs and urged him forwards. In front of him lay the whole West Hartlepool midfield defence and he ran up to

them prodding for a weakness. Then in an instant he had squeezed and rolled through a half gap, side-stepped one defender, wrong footed another only to be caught by two more. Miraculously seconds later he popped out of their clutches and now had a few yards to disable his next assailant by showing him the outside and shimmying inside, the final defender was, in-turn, treated with disregard but to his credit he managed to slow Daniel down by grabbing hold of his boot. With Daniel now suspended his efforts looked to have been in vein but for the stampeding Danny Grewcock who appeared in a flash to take a pop pass and then fake to the outside, straighten up and sprint for the line. The game finished with the crowd on their feet in appreciation as Thirlby added the finishing touch with the conversion.



A foot in both camps

A biographical look at a player who played for both sides. This afternoon the spotlight falls on:

Cornelius Hogan

of Watford and Swindon Town, who had an exotic family background.


ORNELIUS Hogan and one of his sisters were born in Malta, a second sister in Nova Scotia, their father in Ireland and their mother in India. Brother William was born overseas too, but was baptised in Aldershot which gives a clue to the military background which explains all these far-flung origins, his father being a soldier whose various postings had taken him to exotic places.

Cornelius himself was a mere 4ft & 11.5 ins when he joined the Royal Munster Fasiliers as a boy soldier in 1892. (He eventually stood 5ft 11ins). His football career took off when he signed for mighty Aston Villa in November 1897 and the club bought him out of the army three months later, but his Villa Park stay was a brief one and he moved to Millwall at the end of the season without having appeared in the first team. A single Southern League appearance was all he had to show for a year in London, but he

followed this with a couple of seasons with New Brighton Tower, for whom he had experience in the Football League (18 appearances and one goal) before moving to Watford in the summer of 1901.

He began the season as our first-team centre-half and played in the opening two Southern League fixtures, which brought a 1-0 away win against

Queens Park Rangers and a 2-0 home defeat by Reading, He didn't appear again and a couple of months later moved to Burnley, where he immediately - and surprisingly - became the Lancashire club's regular centreforward in the 2nd Division of the Football League. He went on to finish as top-scorer at Turf Moor two winters running, with 10 goals in 23 League appearances and then 7 in 20 the following season, when Burnley finished bottom of the table. At this point




he resumed his Southern League connections for one more season, which he began at Fulham and ended at Swindon Town.

The rest of his career was spent in Lancashire, where he played for St. Helen's Recreation, Nelson and Rossendale United. His father's regimental headquarters had been in Preston and it was in that town that he was residing and working as a tram conductor when, on March14,1909, he was carried off by the debilitating effects of phthisis at the age of 30.



Vicarage Road's first-ever abandonment in peace-time

HAT should have been our final game of the 1958/59 season turned into a shambles. Shrewsbury Town, needing vital promotion points, ran-up a 5-2 lead in this Tuesday evening fixture, but it was all in vain. The visitors' player-manager,

Arthur Rowley, scored more goals than anyone else in Football League history. He was by now massively broad in the beam, but still "...darkness scoring prolifically and it was he who descended and gave his team the lead. At half-time the referee, Denis Howell, a Member of Parliament who later served as a minister in Harold Wilson's cabinet, was informed that the floodlight fuses were missing, but he played on in the hope that the problem would be resolved.

It wasn't and as darkness descended and spectators lit newspaper torches on the terraces, the game stuttered to its' inevitable abandonment

- the first such conclusion to a Vicarage Road game in peacetime.

Two days later the Football League Management Committee fined Watford £100 and ordered a replay. This took place on May 7, with Shrewsbury needing a draw to pip Exeter City for the fourth promotion place.

They won 4-1.

There was much investigation and discussion of what had been one of the more ridiculous episodes in the history of Watford Football Club. The disappearance of those fuses officially remained a mystery, but there were at least a couple of insiders who knew rather more than they were prepared to admit.



Were the FA right to replay the ArsenallSheffield Utd FA Cup tie?

Kenny's view:

"I think the decision to replay the game definitely sets a precedent for the FA to step in if similar instances arise in the future.

"However, once Arsène Wenger had said he was prepared to have the game replayed, then I think the FA really had to get involved.

"It would have been

interesting if Wenger had said nothing – I wonder what the FA would have done then.

"But as soon as Wenger had made his offer, I think the FA really had to act.

"I think you can excuse what the Arsenal players did to a degree. Kanu maybe wasn't aware of what was going on but he played in the World Cup and throwing the ball back was happening in almost every game.

"In fact, throwing the ball back has been happening the world over for many years, so it is hard to see that Kanu wasn't

aware that was what his teammates were trying to do.

"Overmars must surely also have seen what was happening - and he went on and scored the goal.

"You could say the referee should have booked them both for ungentlemanly conduct but that is a tricky decision because this is such a grey area.

"What you will find is there are always grey areas where rules are concerned. I think it is almost impossible for it to be black and white.

"During my playing career I remember similar things happening. In a game at Newcastle, I recall Mark McGhee telling his teammate not to throw the ball back. They didn't go on and score, but they didn't give it back either.

"It has always happened, but like so many things in recent years, the increased amount of media attention – particularly television – means we get to see and read about these things.

"There are cameras at every ground and every incident is highlighted. There can't be many football fans who haven't got an opinion on this latest incident because it has been shown everywhere.

"I don't think it calls for a rule change though. If there was, I'd worry that you would have players on the floor with a serious injury and the opposition not wanting to put the ball out of play. I think it is still best to leave it open to discretion."

Luther's view:

"I don't think there should have been a replay. What's done is done.

"However, you can't excuse the Arsenal players for what they did. I don't care what they say, even if Kanu had only been in the country two minutes, throwing the ball back may be an unwritten rule but everybody in world football knows about it. It was done right through the World Cup, in which Kanu played, they do it in Italy, in France, in every league you care to

"Overmars was no better. All he saw was a chance to score a goal. For me, what Overmars did was even more premeditated than what Kanu did.

"I think Arsenal had a look at what happened and thought quickly about what they could do to appease people. They wanted to be

seen to be fair after the incident had happened, and so they offered to play the game again. Whether they thought the FA would take them up on it is a different matter.

"Hard though it may seem on Sheffield United, these things do happen. There are lots of injustices in football. You can't have a replay for all of them.


"There might have been an outcry if there was no replay, but then there has been a huge outcry because the replay took place anyway.

"At the moment, people are moaning at the referee, and at the FA – the only difference if there was no replay would be that all the moaning would be directed at Arsenal.

"Arsenal were clever, because by going for the replay they have deflected the criticism and spread it out. Everybody is talking about this incident, every newspaper, every radio and TV football show.

"To be perfectly honest, I think when the incident happened the referee should have taken a stance there and then and disallowed the goal, and given a free-kick for ungentlemanly conduct. Then he should have booked the two Arsenal players.

"I'm sure there will be a rule change of some kind, the interesting thing will be to see how they phrase it. I believe, if your team kicks the ball out because of an injury, the opposition should throw it to one of their players who kicks it out of play for you to have the throw-in."

Play it again, Ivan

Murphy books first class return to Crewe

Liverpool midfielder Danny Murphy went back to his old club, Crewe Alexandra, on loan a couple of weeks ago and was in Dario Gradi's side at Selhurst Park on February 13th. Crewe earned a point in a 1-1 draw against Crystal Palace thanks to a Dave Walton goal cancelling out Clinton Morrison's early opener for the Eagles. Van der Laan on recovery trail
